MINUTES OF MEETING

OF

N. C. Branch of Woman's Auxiliary,

Raleigh, N. C., May 18th, 1893.

The North Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary met in Christ Church Chapel. The meeting was called to order by Mrs. Battle, President of Christ Church branch, and prayer was said by Rev. Jas. A. Weston. The roll being called, the following representatives of the various parish branches answered:

Mrs. Wilkes, Charlotte, Diocesan Secretary; Mrs. James Webb, Hillsboro; Mrs. F. S. Spruill, Louisburg; Miss Mary Horner, Oxford; Mrs. Badger, Christ Church, Raleigh; Mrs. McVea and Mrs. Child, Church of Good Shepherd, Raleigh; Mrs. A. B. Hunter, St. Augustine's School, Raleigh; Miss McKimmon, S. Mary's, Raleigh; Miss Garrett, Ringwood; Mrs. J. J. Battle, Rocky Mount; Mrs. White and Mrs. Hunter, Warrenton; Mrs. Prescott, Weldon, and many others—there being about seventy present.

The Secretary read the Minutes of Meeting of 1892. The Diocesan Secretary, Mrs. Wilkes, read her annual report. Miss Rebecca Cameron's report of the work of the Church Periodical Club was read, and her letter.

The President then introduced Miss Emery, General Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, who made a most stirring appeal for a united offering from the whole Auxiliary, to be presented during the General Convention in 1895 at Minneapolis. She also spoke of the encouragement she received from the Junior Auxiliary, giving many useful hints as to how this work should be carried on in future. She particularly urged the early training of children as workers for Missions, telling us of whole Sunday Schools being recently organized as branches of the

Junior Auxiliary. She suggested as means of interesting and teaching such schools, maps of mission fields; monthly reports of mission work written out by one and another of the children; papers selected and read to or by them relating to the history of the special field selected; and letters from missionaries in the field to tell of special needs or stories of the work. Where one is found to be earnest and enthusiastic, the missionary talent should be cultivated as are talents for music or drawing, and thus we might give not only time or money, but—*ourselves*.

Mrs. Wilkes then asked for reports or questions, if any had not been handed in, or information was desired.

Mrs. Pittenger of Church of Good Shepherd, Raleigh, reported the organization of a branch in that parish in March and promised to send in a report of its work thus far, to be added to this year's report.

Miss Horner read a report of the Junior Auxiliary in Oxford, the noticeable feature being the liberal contribution to the Enrolment and Clergy Retiring Funds, and the increased knowledge of the work done by other branches. St. Agnes' and St. Timothy's Guilds of Christ Church, Raleigh, which work only for the Thompson Orphanage, were reported as desiring to be enrolled as branches of the Junior Auxiliary, and the account of their year's work was handed in to be added to the yearly report.

Mrs. Hunter of St. Augustine's, Raleigh, reported a society among the pupils of the school which she wished enrolled as a Junior Auxiliary, but this report was not handed in.

Miss Horner asked Miss Emery to suggest work for the ensuing year for the Junior Auxiliary, whereupon the Indian work, scholarships in various schools, etc., were recommended and discussed. Mrs. Wilkes asked if there were any special work to be urged upon the North Carolina Branch. The work in China and Cashier's Valley, hitherto supported, were considered necessary and recommended to increased support. The work in Western Texas, in which North Carolina has hitherto been interested in the Montgomery Institute now given up, was also recommended by Miss Emery, and the Insurance Fund for Foreign Missionaries is always a most worthy object.

The meeting then adjourned.

ADDRESS OF THE DIOCESAN SECRETARY.

RALEIGH, N. C., May 18th, 1893.

DEAR FRIENDS AND FELLOW WORKERS:

This year I have a more cheering report to present to you, not only in dollars and cents, but in the access of activity and interest in the work, as evidenced by additional branches, as well as by the results of their labors.

Last year we reported twenty parish branches and six Juniors belonging to four parishes. This year we have twenty-four branches, and eleven Juniors belonging to eight parishes. I have transferred St. Mary's School, Raleigh, to the Junior Department where it rightfully belongs, and where its splendid example of steady and conscientious work will have more influence upon the Juniors in the Diocese. Its numbers give it exceptional strength, but if every parish would make an effort to interest the boys and girls, they would do as well in proportion to numbers, and would give a strong impetus to the work of the Church.

While speaking of Junior Auxiliaries, I must call attention to those of Trinity Parish, Asheville, where three Junior branches are organized, comprising fifty eight members and twenty six associates, whose pennies, slowly gathered and wisely expended, have amounted to \$191 73. Who can measure the comfort given by this sum, or the influence on the lives and characters of the young people themselves, who are thus trained in self denial, thoughtfulness for others, devotion to the Church, and all that is so beautifully gathered by St. Paul into the one word Charity?

The Guilds of St. Agnes and St. Timothy of Christ Church, Raleigh, which work exclusively for the Thompson Orphanage, set an example to other youthful societies, and show the strength and power there is in union. Do let us all try to have a Junior Auxiliary in every Parish. A class in Sunday School, or a few gathered into a quiet room, may be "Auxiliary" to the great cause, as well as if great numbers or large wealth is represented. The leaflets issued by the Connecticut Woman's Auxiliary to the Junior Department, would be most helpful and interesting. The Board of Missions also issues a number which can be obtained at 21 Bible House.

The Church at Cashier's Valley was destroyed by fire last August, and the Auxiliary was urged to help this struggling parish. \$79.00 was sent to Cashier's Valley by four Auxiliaries and one Junior branch.

To the Orphanage at Shanghai, \$11.00 was sent by two Auxiliaries and one Junior. I am sure if North Carolina

Churchwomen could have heard the addresses given in Baltimore last October by missionaries who have lived in China, they would make a stronger effort to aid these luckless little girl babies. If they will read the appeals from China, they cannot but take more interest in this part of the mission work.

The Montgomery Institute, Texas, has received \$53.20 from five Auxiliaries and one Junior. After many vicissitudes this school has been closed, as it was impossible to maintain it longer. The last money that was sent me for it, I directed to be paid to Bishop Johnson of Western Texas, to be used for such schools as needed it.

The Thompson Orphanage has received \$202.20 from eleven branches, \$101.20 of which was from three Juniors.

I repeat the request made last year that all societies of women and young people working for this Orphanage will report their work through the Woman's Auxiliary. It would be an advantage in many ways, and as the work of Churchwomen, it justly belongs to the Auxiliary.

The Enrolment Fund collected in 1892 amounted to \$235.32 given by sixteen Auxiliary branches, three Juniors, and three parishes not regularly connected with the Auxiliary. \$6.50 was expended in printing and mailing letters on the subject, so that \$228.82 was presented in the Offertory at the Woman's Auxiliary service in Baltimore. You have all heard of the sum there offered by the Auxiliary, amounting to over \$20,000.

At the Officers' meeting then, it was resolved to try to raise \$50,000 between October, 1892, and the next General Convention, October, 1895. This sum to be used at the discretion of the Board of Managers to endow a new missionary Episcopate, thus carrying on the idea of the Enrolment Fund. I ask you all to think of this, and to collect sums from time to time as convenient, so that we may have our proportion to give to our Lord's work at that time. Do not postpone this until 1895, but in every Auxiliary and in every Parish, lay by as God has blessed you, that you may have a store to offer when the time comes. Let this object be set before us from now until September 1895, and let us all try to do our duty. Interest the Sunday Schools, inspire rich and poor with the knowledge that by gifts to this fund, each one is helping to carry God's word to the people of our own land. Do not let this "United Offering" interfere

with existing pledges, or stop any work that we have set our hands to. Let us not only pray "Thy Kingdom Come," but each in our own sphere help to prepare the way, as God gives as grace and opportunity.

C., made six reports to the General Secretary, enrolled four new Librarians, sent to the Treasurer of the C. P. C. \$4.00 (four dollars) for the expenses of the Central Office, and spent \$2.58 for stamps, postals and stationery out of \$3.00 sent me for the purpose by Rev. A. B. Hunter of Raleigh, in February 1892, leaving a balance of 42c. in hand to the credit of the work.

HILLSBOROUGH, N. C., May 10th, 1893.

I herewith enclose a report of the Church Periodical Club work in the diocese of North Carolina, from May 1st, 1892, to May 1st, 1893. And also desire to say a few words about the great and most helpful work that the C. P. C. is doing.

Starting Jan., 1888, by the sending out of one single paper by Mrs. Fargo, it now requires enumeration by thousands to represent the current periodicals and Sunday School papers, sent regularly all over the country through its agency.

These are the latest figures reported. "We are now sending out regularly 6957 periodicals and 1711 Sunday School papers. Have distributed over 42,259 odd numbers of periodicals; given away 1621 books, 577 Sunday School books, 59 Bibles, 14 Testaments, 381 Prayer books, 387 Hymnals, 406 Catechisms and over 19,8 Christmas and Easter Cards. We now have 51 Dioceses working with us."

The amount of good done by this agency cannot be even guessed at, unless one is in a position to see the letters which come from every part of the country, asking for books or papers from the Club, and speaking of its helpfulness, especially in mission work and in country parishes.

It has been part of my duty to send in many requests to the C. P. C. for periodicals, books, papers, &c. for people in our diocese, and never have I failed to get even more than what was asked for. So much is sent into our diocese that I blush for shame that we give so little.

Oh if I could but say the right word! Could but make you all realize, as I do, the greatness of the privilege of this giving to God the things, that left in our houses only become rubbish, and yet if sent to others, are a new delight to each recipient as they travel from hand to hand. Think of *one copy* of The Churchman that is sent through the Club to a missionary out West, being read by *51 families*, and then being sent sent 150 miles farther to another mission station where it is read by almost as many more; and then see if you can get your own consent to keep your copy longer than it takes you to read it. I trow not.

Dear Sisters, who never fail in good work, who are so faithful in well-doing, will you not take up this work too? Will you not join me daily in a prayer that a branch of the C. P. C. may be established in every parish in this diocese, and in the Church at large, and the work be carried on with an earnestness and loving charity, that will make it a means of growth in grace, both to the givers and receivers of its benefits? It is not more than the cup of cold water; it is only the tithe of mint, anise and cummin; it is but a gathering of the fragments: yet out of its smallness and insignificance, God can accomplish great results, and *we* can be faithful in the putting out at interest of this one talent, entrusted to us by the Lord of All, and thus turn what was our pleasure, into a beautiful work fit for the Master's use.

And I pray God most earnestly that he will incline your hearts so to do.

RULES

For the Organization of the North Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.

1.—This organization shall be called the NORTH CAROLINA BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

2.—Its objects are, by means of union and systematic effort, to diffuse missionary intelligence; to increase missionary activity among the women of the Diocese; to unite previously existing societies; and to encourage the formation of societies where there are none.

3.—All parish societies, and all individuals desiring it, will be considered members of this Association.

4.—The officers of this Association shall be a Diocesan Secretary and an Assistant Secretary in each Convocation, to be appointed by the Bishop.

5.—The Diocesan Secretary shall call meetings and preside over them; shall correspond with the General Secretary and the Missionaries and find out where help is needed, and of what kind; shall inform the parish Secretaries, and arrange about their work, so that a general oversight of the work may be kept by one person. She shall prepare an annual report for circulation in the diocese; shall receive and forward all money offerings and shall keep account of all money and articles contributed for missionary purposes by the parish branches or by individuals, and shall embody a full account of this work in the annual report.

6.—The Assistant Secretaries shall try to increase missionary spirit in their respective convocations, by arousing the women to greater efforts in raising money for the cause; and by diffusing intelligence concerning the missionary work of the Church. They are to search out the scattered families and individuals belonging to the Church, and try to interest them in missionary work. And to correspond with the parish Secretaries and the Diocesan Secretary in regard to missionary work. The Assistant Secretaries are authorized to hold meetings in their own Convocation whenever they consider it desirable.

7.—The Secretaries of the parish branches shall correspond with the Diocesan Secretary, transmit the information received

from her to their respective parish branches, and shall report to her by April 1st, in each year, an account of work done by their parish.

8.—Each parish shall send one or more delegates to the annual meeting if possible.

9.—There shall be a meeting of this Association each year, during the Diocesan Convention.

10.—Five persons shall constitute a quorum at all meetings.

11.—To provide for the expenses of the Diocesan officers in postage, stationery and printing, or other matters, a contribution of 10 cents a year shall be asked from each member of the Woman's Auxiliary in North Carolina, to be collected by each parish Secretary and forwarded to the Diocesan Secretary by the 1st of April.
