MINUTES OF MEETING.

Winston, N. C., May 18th, 1894.

On Friday, May 18th, at 4 p. m, the members of the North Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary were called together in the Sunday School room of St. Paul's church

Miss M. E. Horner, the only Diocesan Officer present, presided. prayer was said by the Rev. Mr George, Rector of St. Paul's.

Miss Horner said a few words of welcome to the Daughters of the King who were pres-nt, thanked the members of the Auxiliary for their presence and explained the absence of the Diocesan Secretary. She then requested Mrs. Boggs, the President of the Winston Branch, to read the following resolutions of sympathy for Mrs. Wilkes, which were adopted by a rising vote and ordered entered in the minutes:

"Whereas, we have learned of the recent bereavement of our Diocesan Secretary in the death of her son.

"Therefore, be it resolved, that we hereby express our deep sympathy with her and his fa her in this their great sorrow, and pray our Heavenly Father, who hath permitted this trial and who doth not willingly afflict any of his children, that they may have His Spirit and grace given them to say 'Thy will be done.'

"Resolved, that these resolutions be put on the minutes of the meeting.

"Resolved, that a copy of these resolutions be sent to Mrs. Wilkes as a loving token that her sorrow is ours also."

Mrs. Boggs acted as Secretary, and Miss Hall of Charlotte, represented the Diocesan Secretary.

Miss Hall called the roll, and it was found the following branches were represented:

Oxford (2), Winston (5), Elkin (1), Asheville (1), Raleigh, Good Shepherd (3), St. Augustine's (1), Henderson (1), Salisbury (2), Charlotte (1) with two Juniors representing Asheville and Greensboro.

Quite a limited number of branches were represented, but the presence of the Daughters of the King, and many visitors lent a charm to the meeting, and almost crowded the room. Particularly did we congratulate ourselves on our good fortune in having Miss Emery with us. The Bishop and several priests favored the meeting also with their presence.

Miss Hall then read the minutes of the meeting of 1893, the annual report of the Diocesan Secretary, and Miss Cameron's report of the Church Periodical Club. Miss Horner read a report of work done by the Junior Auxiliary, offering a resolution for uniting the work of the Juniors to support a Missionary in Western N. C.

Miss Emery, General Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary was then introduced, and addressed the meeting. She dwelt on the ways and means that could be used to create an interest in missions, first to interest ourselves, then others, which could only be done by a comprehensive knowledge of the work done by the Board of Missions and its Auxiliary; extending a hearty welcome to all who would call at the new Church Missions House, opened in New York on New Year's day, with an assurance that any desired information in regard to missions could be obtained there. Again she urged the importance of the United Offering for the convention of 1895, suggesting that the North Carolina branches take it for their *united work* for the year. She also set forth the importance of aiding in the Salary Fund for the support of women who are doing work in the Foreign and Domestic fields, giving many interesting and forcible illustrations of women who had given themselves a living sacrifice for the service of the church.

Bishop Cheshire then addressed the Auxiliary in a few well

chosen remarks, manifested a keen appreciation of the work of the women, encouraged and animated them to still greater efforts in a noble work, nobly done.

A resolution was offered and carried, to the effect that a gift be made the Bishop, by the women of the Diocese, as a tribute of respect and affection. A committee consisting of Mrs. Wilkes, Diocesan Secretary; Miss Horner, Secretary of Junior Department; and Mrs. Ingle of Henderson, was appointed to receive all contributions and make a selection of an appropriate token.

Addresses had been promised by Rev. Mr. Rathbun and Rev. Mr. Ingle, but a severe storm came up and adjourned the meeting.

The Auxiliary has done remarkably well this past year considering the depression in all business. We have this year 25 Parish branches, and 17 Juniors; and the general report is as follows:

I have received \$17.23 for the United Offering for the General Auxiliary Meeting October, 1895, and have invested it at 8 per cent. All sums coming to me for this purpose will be added to the amount. I earnestly beg that each parish branch, and every churchwoman, will become interested in gathering up the mites for this general offering, in which churchwomen from all over the world will join in October, 1895. Let our gifts and our prayers go together, that Christ's Kingdom may come on earth as it is in Heaven.

RULES

For the Organization of the North Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.

1.—This organization shall be called the NORTH CAROLINA BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

2.—Its objects are, by means of union and systematic effort, to diffuse missionary intelligence; to increase missionary activity among the women of the Diocese; to unite previously existing societies; and to encourage the formation of societies where there are none.

3.—All parish societies, and all individuals desiring it, will be considered members of this Association.

4.—The officers of this Association shall be a Diocesan Secretary, and an Assistant Secretary in each Convocation, to be appointed by the Bishop.

5.—The Diocesan Secretary shall call meetings and preside over them; shall correspond with the General Secretary and the Missionaries and find out where help is needed, and of what kind; shall inform the parish Secretaries, and arrange about their work, so that a general oversight of the work may be kept by one person. She shall prepare an annual report for circulation in the Diocese; shall receive and forward all money offerings and shall keep account of all money and articles contributed for missionary purposes by the parish branches or by individuals, and shall embody a full account of this work in the annual report.

6.—The Assistant Secretaries shall try to increase missionary spirit in their respective convocations, by arousing the women to greater efforts in raising money for the cause; and by diffusing intelligence concerning the missionary work of the Church. They are to search out the scattered families and individuals belonging to the Church, and try to interest them in missionary work. And to corespond with the parish Secretaries and the

Diocesan Secretary in regard to missionary work. The Assistant Secretaries are authorized to hold meetings in their own Convocation, whenever they consider it desirable.

7.—The Secretaries of the parish branches shall correspond with the Diocesan Secretary, transmit the information received from her to their respective parish branches, and shall report to her by April 1st, in each year, an account of work done by their parish.

8.—Each parish shall send one or more delegates to the annual meeting if possible.

9.—There shall be a meeting of this Association each year, during the Diocesan Convention.

10.—Five persons shall constitute a quorum at all meetings.

11.—To provide for the expenses of the Diocesan officers in postage, stationery and printing, or other matters, a contribution of 10 cents a year shall be asked from each member of the Woman's Auxiliary in North Carolina, to be collected by each parish Secretary and forwarded to the Diocesan Secretary by the 1st of April.

REPORT OF CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB.

HILLSBOROUGH, NORTH CAROLINA, 30th of March, 1894.

There are 9 parishes connected with the work. we have 14 librarians, 79 contributors, and 100 periodicals and 35 Sunday School papers are sent out regularly for the current year.

I have written since May 1st, 1893, 130 letters and 22 postal cards, and have sent out 24 copies of the second annual report of the C. P. C.

I received \$3.00 for postage and paid out \$3.06. Since the work began in the December of 1890, our diocese has given 4 Bibles, 6 Books, 675 Sunday School Cards, 183 Christmas Cards, 66 Easter Cards, 97 Catechisms, 31 Tracts, 330 Christmas Carols, 286 Easter Carols, 7 Hymnals, 3 Bible-pictures and 2,110 odd numbers of magazines and papers.

I have written what we have given, but time would fail me to tell all that has been received in our diocese from the C. P. C. Upwards of 300 periodicals and 128 Sunday School papers come to North Carolina regularly; 600 books have been given us, 183 Prayer-books, 167 Hymnals, 24 Bibles, 1,400 Christmas Cards, 180 Pictures, 10,000 odd numbers of periodicals, and many, many other things. And I never ask for anything for either clergy or laity—and my requests have been many—that I do not receive more than I ask for. I wish, oh how I wish, that we ourselves would take up this beautiful work in the same eager, earnest spirit, and give as liberally as we receive. In every home there is something in the shape of books, magazines and papers that could be given to others. One story comes from a prison missionary that is heartrending. In a prison where no work is given to the wretched criminals, one woman went raving mad for the want of something to read!—something that would take her thoughts away from her own misery: and he says even the scraps of newspaper that get into the cells by chance are hoarded as if they were some rare and precious thing! The country is full of houses where there is not a book

to be found, nor a picture to break the dull monotony of whitewashed walls. And yet to us all comes down clear as a bugle call through the rolling tide of eighteen centuries: "Gather up the fragments that nothing be lost;" "She hath done what she could;" and "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these My brethren, ye have done it unto Me."

Oh! can we not win those blessed words to ourselves by a little effort, a little kindly thought, yea, if need be, a little self-denial? for there is a word wide enough to touch us all: "If thou hast much, give plenteously. *if thou hast little, do thy diligence gladly to give of that little*, for so thou gatherest a good reward against the day of adversity."

It only means a few minutes of trouble, and a few cents of postage once a week or once a month, to send magazines and papers to others; but oh, it means so much of new interest, new thought, new hope—a new life—to those who receive them.

And now, as last year, I beg you all to unite with me in a daily prayer that a branch of the Church Periodical Club may be established in every parish in our diocese, and the work be carried on with the earnestness and loving charity that will make it a means of grace both for the givers and receivers of its benefits.
