## CONSTITUTION AND BY LAWS.

ART. I. The name of this society shall be The North Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

ART. II. The object of this society is threefold—viz: Prayer for Missions, Study of Missions and Work for Missions.

ART. III. The officers of this society shall be as follows, a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, four Convocational Secretaries; two Secretaries and Treasurers for the Juniors and two for the Babies' Branch; Secretaries for the United Offering, C. P. C. apportionment and a Secretary for the Colored Work.

ART. IV. All the women of the Church are, by baptism, entitled to be members of the Woman's Auxiliary, and this active membership shall be recognized by annual contributions to the Central Fund.

ART. V. There shall be an Annual Meeting of this society; time and place to be decided by the executive board.

ART. VI. The Diocesan officers constitute the executive board and under the Bishop, direct the work of this Branch of the Auxiliary.

ART. VII. This Constitution may be altered by a two-thirds vote of any Annual Meeting.

## BY LAWS.

1. It shall be the duty of the President to call meetings, preside over them, and have general oversight of the whole work.

2. It shall be the duty of the Vice-President to act in the absence of the President.

3. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to conduct the correspondence of the society; to prepare for the Bishop and the Diocesan Convention an Annual Report of the work of the Auxiliary and to have printed for circulation a report of the work and of the Annual Meeting.

4. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all moneys and disburse the same.

5. It shall be the duty of the Convocational Secretaries to keep in touch with the existing branches and to form new ones.

6. It shall be the duty of the Secretaries and Treasurers of the Junior Auxiliary and of the Babies' Branch to have the oversight of the work in their Branch; to receive all moneys and pay the same to the Treasurer; and to send an annual report to the Secretary.

7. It shall be the duty of the Secretary for the United Offering to arouse interest in the fund by correspondence and the circulation of literature.

8. The duties of the Secretary of the Colored Work shall be similar to the duties of the Convocational Secretaries.

9. All moneys shall be paid quarterly to the Treasurer; the last payments to be made not later than the first day of May.

## REPORT

of the Diocesan Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Bishop at the Convention held in Charlotte.—May 19th, 1905.

Rt. Rev. Father in God:—

In making a report of the eleven month's work of the Woman's Auxiliary in the diocese of North Carolina from June 1st, 1904 to May 1st, 1905—the Secretary can only give an account of six months individual effort. During the summer Miss Horner kindly consented to look after the work which she had carried on successfully for many years. Owing to her efforts, combined with the work of the Secretary, Miss Smith, the United Offering was so increased that at the great Triennial Meeting in Boston our Honorary Secretary placed upon the alms basin a check for \$1000, our part of the \$150,000 which is helping all women workers who are making our Church known and loved in every land.

In October a President and new Diocesan Secretary were appointed by you to fill the place heretofore occupied by the Diocesan Secretary and on Nov. 1st they entered upon their duties. The work was well organized under former Secretaries and is still going on under efficient and experienced Diocesan and Parochial officers, —so that no attempt has been made to change any plan of work. And yet there is no organization which cannot be broadened and strengthened; so for this reason the Secretary has had three aims in view towards the accomplishment of this result. First, to organize, with the consent of the Rector, a branch of the Auxiliary in every parish and mission station in the diocese; Second, to interest branches in the study of missions; and Third, to increase the membership and the interest of every existing branch.

By way of accomplishing the first of these objects, the Secretary has visited several small parishes and mission stations and organized branches. The President and Arch-deacons have organized others, so that in the course of a few months seven new branches have been added. It is earnestly hoped that we may go back to the old title and office of Convocation Secretary. These Secretaries, by subdividing the Convocations may come more in touch with the people of the Church and make personal efforts to organize new branches.

As a stimulus to the study of missions, Miss Jarvis, head of the School of Bible Study in New Milford, Conn., was invited to visit as many of the branches as her limited time would permit. She gave eight instructive talks, inspiring those who heard her with a desire to see and know more of the missionary work of the Church.—It is interesting to note that many new mission study classes have been formed; that nearly every branch in the diocese is doing some mission study, and that the course of Lenten study, recommended at the meeting in Boston, has been almost universally adopted.

## MINUTES OF OFFICERS' MEETING MAY 18th.

The annual business meeting of Diocesan Officers was held on Thursday, May 18th at 11 o'clock, a. m., at the residence of Capt. John Wilkes. The officers present were Mrs. John Wilkes, Mrs. W. H. S. Spruill. The meeting was opened with prayer by the President, after which were read the minutes of the February meeting of officers, held in Raleigh. The Constitution and By-Laws framed at the February meeting were read and discussed, clause by clause. As amended they were read at the proper time for voting upon the Constitution. The meeting adjourned at 2:00 o'clock, and convened again at half past eight at night when the revision of the Constitution was completed.

## MINUTES.

The twenty-third annual meeting of the North Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in Charlotte, May 18 and 19th, 1905.

The officers met for special conference Thursday morning, at eleven o'clock at the residence of Mrs. John Wilkes.

In the afternoon a large and enjoyable reception was tendered the Auxiliary delegates and the Daughters of the King at the beautiful home of Dr. C. L. Alexander, by St. Peter's branch and the local chapter of the daughters.

At 8:30 in response to the President's request for further consultation the officers again met with Mrs. Wilkes.

Friday, May 19th was Auxiliary Day. Early Communion was celebrated by the Bishop of the diocese at 6:30 in St. Peter's Church. Promptly at ten o'clock the officers and delegates assembled in St. John's Chapel. After a short service Bishop Cheshire delivered an address. He recalled the fact that he had the honor and pleasure of speaking at the very first meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in North Carolina, which was held in 1883 in Charlotte. He thanked the members for their very helpful sympathy and co-operation and for their substantial contributions, and in a happy manner asked for an increased sum to be placed at his disposal the

coming year. He then introduced to the Auxiliary its new officers. Mrs. W. H. S. Burgwyn, President, and Miss Kate Cheshire, Secretary.

The Secretary read the Minutes of the officers meeting of the day before, and a resolution of regret upon the resignation of the former Secretary, Miss Horner; also a new constitution and by-laws, prepared to meet the growing needs of the organization.

A cordial welcome to Charlotte was spoken by Mrs. John Wilkes. In these words:

Dear Friends:

I am asked to welcome you to Charlotte, and I do this most heartily, although of necessity briefly. I hope that our meeting will do us all good, and make us love each other better; and especially I pray that this conference may result in giving an impetus to the missionary work by rousing us all to greater earnestness and enthusiasm in helping to fulfill our Master's command to make known His gospel of glad tidings to all the dark places of the earth.

I trust that you will all enjoy these days with us so much that you will be glad to come often to Charlotte. We are always glad to receive visitors, and are rather proud of Charlotte's reputation as a pleasant place to visit. And so I hope you will find it—I bid you all a most hearty welcome to our homes and hearts.

This was gracefully responded to by the President in her address as follows:

Madam Chairman, and Members of the North Carolina Branch of The WOMAN'S AUXILIARY:

Amongst the musical sounds in nature, there is none so sweet as the tones of the human voice, speaking words of kindness and love—The King of Instruments in the hand of an artist, is the voice, which has just tendered to us assembled in Convention, kind and fraternal welcome to the homes of this hospitable city; and as an echo we send back the assurance of our appreciation and gratitude.

Thanks are also due from the Chair for the privilege of aiding in the work of the Church, during the last eight months, in the exalted position which I occupy. To my predecessor in office I am indebted for much kindness and assistance, finding her ever ready to help in time of need. The example of our Honorary Secretary, always an inspiration, and the most efficient work of the other Diocesan Officers have been a lamp unto my feet, and a light to my pathway." The duty of making the annual report of our work,

has been assigned to the Diocesan Secretary, so she will tell of the lengthening of our cords, and the consequent strengthening of our stakes. The Quiet Day which was observed in Christ Church, Raleigh, on March first, was ably and kindly conducted by the Rev. Dr. Lloyd, and gave us all the opportunity of great spiritual advancement. The ladies of Christ Church, and of the Church of the Good Shepherd, were loving and considerate in their hospitality, and in making all arrangements for this occasion. For the convenience and information of the Officers and others engaged in Auxiliary work, I recommend that the pledges made by the Parish Branches at our annual meetings, a short Constitution, and By-Laws defining the duties of the Officers, be printed in the Reports, of those meetings. The additional expense incurred by this, will be small, and the benefit derived, very great. As there is inspiration as well as power in knowledge, I urge a more general subscription to "The Spirit of Missions." It will be an addition to any library as an historical and literary magazine, and as an aid to us in Church work, is as necessary as an army or naval journal to a military man, or a commercial publication to the man of business. Last, and by no means least, I beg the assistance of the Rectors of all the Parishes. A little advice and admonition from them, will prove that a word, as well as silence, may be golden. With love for all of you, my fellow laborers, and the assurance, that, at the call of my Bishop, and I tried to think at the call of the Master whom we serve, I have done my best in this work, I am,

The Treasurer, Mrs. Dorian Blair, made her report, which was repeated in that of the Secretary before the convention. Mrs. Blair made special mention of the generosity of the Auxiliary of Christ Church, Raleigh, and the Church of the Good Shepherd in paying the expenses of Dr. Lloyd, the speaker at the observance of the Quiet Day in Christ Church, and in turning into the General Treasury the amount collected beyond what was needed for that purpose. Mrs. Lewis was requested to convey to the two branches in Raleigh the thanks of the North Carolina Auxiliary.

Miss A. E. Smith spoke cheerfully of the increased interest in the United Offering, stating that the amount given by this diocese at Boston at the Triennial service was \$1,000. She recommended an especial United Offering meeting to be held by each branch once a year and suggested September as an appropriate time.

It was announced that the hour had arrived for the reading of the Secretary's report before the Bishop and the Convention of the diocese of North Carolina. The whole assembly went in a body to St. Peter's Church. Miss Cheshire gave a full and comprehensive account of the work since it had been committed to her charge. She stated that the Woman's Auxiliary now has members, 898 whose

contributions for the past eleven months amounted to \$3235.75; that the Juniors number 1,001; their receipts were \$734.47. The Babies' Branch has 487 members and gave \$222.21. Total membership 2386. Amount contributed \$4192.43.

Bishop Cheshire next introduced, Mr. John W. Wood, General Secretary to the Board of Missions. Mr. Wood is ever an interesting speaker. His office makes him familiar with the missionary effort of the Church, his travels keep him in touch with the open field—so he is heard as one having the authority of knowledge. He told the convention that North Carolina is notable for her ready help in the wide work of the Church, that she had been one of the first dioceses to pay in full her apportionment. He spoke with enthusiasm of the Woman's Auxiliary and its United Offering; of what it had accomplished and is yet to accomplish; of the women through it sent as teachers, nurses and deaconesses into foreign fields and of their courage, faith and endurance. He pictured conditions in India, China and Japan and told how women could minister in ways not open to men. He narrated incidents in Indian life, in mining towns and in Mountain recesses proving the great need for women workers in the expansion of the Church at home. He gave a thrilling account of a service in South Dakota where 2000 Indians gathered and erected in a night their tents and an altar unto the Lord. He spoke with gratitude of the accession to the missionary ranks of Mr. Huhn of Wilmington, who is styled "the flying preacher" because of his rapid journeys on dog sleds, and made an appeal for others from this State to follow his example. In reminding his hearers of the convention to be held at Richmond in 1907, when the men of the Church will present a thank offering for 300 years of English christianity, Mr. Wood expressed the hope that it will not only equal but exceed the noble gift of \$150,000 of the women at the last general convention. By motion of Mr. Richard Battle the thanks of the Convention were extended by a rising vote to the Woman's Auxiliary for its report, and to Mr. Wood for his inspiring address.

Upon the return to St. John's Chapel the hearing of reports was resumed. When the Vice-Presidents were called they stated that owing to the fact that their duties had been but vaguely defined they had done little and had no reports. Mrs. Van Landingham said that she has written letters with a hope of starting branches at ten different points but had succeeded in organizing only one, that at Cooleme, with Mrs. Henry Rice as President.

The director of the Juniors, Mrs. F. J. Murdock, sent her report which was read by Mrs. Jos. McNeely. It was with sincere regret that the Auxiliary heard of the resignation of Mrs. Murdock, who for a number of years has most faithfully and efficiently served the Juniors.

Mrs. Walter Smith gave an interesting account of the Babies'

Branch in the convocation of Charlotte, showing a great deal accomplished by her and Mrs. M. A. Bland, the Secretary.

The noon hour having arrived Prayer was said by the Honorary Secretary.

Mrs. F. S. Spruill followed with an excellent report for the convocation of Raleigh and read the eloquent letter written by her to the little baby helpers. Her report was accepted by a rising vote.

Mrs. A. B. Andrews presented a statement of the receipts for the apportionment and reported many letters sent out by her in the interest of the fund, the results of which were most encouraging. Accepted.

A letter from Miss Horner, conveying loving greetings was read by Miss Cheshire, and also Miss Horner's appeal for a thank offering from the assembled branches for the going of Miss Ellen Hicks of Oxford as a missionary to the Philippine Islands. The offering amounted to \$41.00.

Mrs. Bland read the sixteenth annual report of the Church Periodical Club of which Miss Rebecca Cameron is the efficient correspondent. Upon its acceptance the President appointed Mrs. Sharpe, Mrs. Andrews and Miss Cheshire a committee to draw up resolutions of thanks to Miss Cameron with regret at her absence.

On motion of Mrs. John Bennett the names of all ladies present from the Charlotte Branches were placed upon the roll as delegates. The meeting adjourned to meet again at four o'clock.

The chief work of the afternoon session was the consideration of the constitution and by-laws. They are designed to meet the enlarged growth of the Auxiliary, to define the duties of the increased number of officers and to be prepared for the emergency that at sometime it may be desirable to hold the annual meeting at a different time and place from the diocesan convention.

A report of the circulation of the Spirit of Missions, sent by Miss Annie Wetmore, was read by Miss Cheshire. Also an excellent report of the colored work as conducted by Mrs. Delaney.

A gracious letter from Bishop Horner was read by Mrs. Blair. It expressed sincere thanks for contributions from the Auxiliary and told of present needs in the Asheville Jurisdiction. Rev. Mr. Ingle, through Mrs. Blair, made a statement of the receipts from the North Carolina Branch to the Clergymen's Retiring Fund, and gratefully acknowledged appreciation.

Mrs. C. L. Hunter appealed to the members to observe promptness in paying dues, thus lessening the trials of the Treasurers of branches, and the annoyance of the diocesan Treasurer in making her report.

The committee appointed in the morning read the resolution of thanks to Miss Cameron, which was unanimously adopted.

A letter from Boone School, Wuchang, China was presented

requesting books. Various branches at once promised that they should be sent. Miss Esdale Shaw, who several years ago received assistance from the Auxiliary to build a church at Rockingham, told of its completion and its beauty. She amusingly portrayed some of the difficulties met and overcome. Mrs. Van Landingham spoke of an Auxiliary column in the Messenger of Hope which Mr. Smith has generously placed at the command of the Auxiliary. She begged all the branches to send to her all items of interest to the Woman's Auxiliary, the Juniors and the Babies' that it may indeed prove a medium of information to all.

It was resolved that an expression of gratitude be extended the ladies of Charlotte for their gracious hospitality.

Mrs. Burgwyn called Mr. John W. Wood to the chair who conducted an informal conference, speaking on the Spirit of Missions, the United Offering, the Apportionment, Boone School at Wuchang, China, Missionary study and other topics of special interest. He explained the difference between the apportionment of the Woman's Auxiliary and the Missionary apportionment of the various parishes and dioceses, answering many questions asked by the ladies. Rev. Mr. Cocke was invited to make a talk, and most graphically related the experience of a friend who went as Missionary to Africa. Rev. Mr. Mallinckrodt concluded the meeting in a clarion call to service and a buoyant God-speed to the women in their work for the church. A hymn was sung and the Auxiliary adjourned, to meet in Henderson in 1906.

There was an interest in the meeting that was marked. The women assembled promptly, and showed no restlessness. Mrs. Burgwyn presided with a dignity and familiarity with parliamentary usages that dispatched business, yet with a willingness to have every matter duly considered, that was both graceful and gracious. Miss Cheshire threw her energy and enthusiasm into various discussions and convinced everyone that with such leaders the Auxiliary can but go forward. Inspiration was gained from addresses and from personal association. Charlotte will feel the influence of the convention for years to come.

*My Dear Little Baby Helpers:*

I wonder if you know what a big work you are doing. I wonder if you know that the biggest work in the world is done by little babies. All the big trees and forests, all the flowers and fruits, all the grass on the mountains and in the valleys, all the fields of corn and cotton and wheat, every green thing that grows in the world was once a little baby seed. All the big oceans and all the great rivers were once little baby drops of water. The great big mountains that seem to reach the sky are little baby grains of sand piled up on each other. Every big thing in God's universe grows from little baby things. And the biggest thing in this great big world is a little baby boy or girl.

Dear little baby workers, what a big work you are doing! Your pennies—little baby messengers of love—are going flying all over the world. Our branches have grown, and our offerings have grown. Seven new branches work with us, but most of them were established late and have very few members. Salisbury is really an old one come back, and we are especially glad to welcome its zealous Secretary and twenty-five members. Our two little members from High Point have removed from the Diocese. Two other branches reported from only a small part of their number, but we are sure they will do better next year. We want to hear from every member every year. Our Heavenly Father has called one little one to Himself, but a mother's love sends a generous offering—a memorial to the precious baby girl. Our seventeen branches have given \$73.55.

Again we send our offering to keep little Toka in Holy Trinity Orphanage, another to Bishop Horner to help train our little girl in his school at Valle Crucis. A small gift went to Mrs. Hunter for her Kindergarten work. Our largest gift went to the Thompson Orphanage, to help take care of the seventy little ones who find a home there.
