CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS.

ARTICLE I. The name of this society shall be The North Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

ART. II. The object of this society is threefold—viz:—Prayer for Missions, Study of Missions and Work for Missions.

ART. III. The officers of this society shall be as follows, a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, four Convocational Secretaries; two Secretaries and Treasurers for the Juniors and two for the Babies' Branch; Secretaries for the United Offering, and Church Periodical Club.

ART. IV. All the women of the Church are, by baptism, entitled to be members of the Woman's Auxiliary, and this active membership shall be recognized by annual contributions to the Central Fund.

ART. V. There shall be an annual meeting of this society; time and place to be decided by the executive board.

ART. VI. The Diocesan officers constitute the executive board and, under the Bishop, direct the work of this Branch of the Auxiliary.

ART. VII. This Constitution may be altered by a two-thirds vote of any Annual Meeting.

BY-LAWS.

1. It shall be the duty of the President to call meetings, preside over them, and have general oversight of the whole work.

2. It shall be the duty of the Vice-President to act in the absence of the President.

3. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to conduct the correspondence of the society; to prepare for the Bishop and the Diocesan Convention an Annual Report of the work of the Auxiliary and to have printed for circulation a report of the work and of the Annual Meeting.

4. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all moneys and disburse the same.

5. It shall be the duty of the Convocational Secretaries to keep in touch with the existing branches and to form new ones.

6. It shall be the duty of the Secretaries and Treasurers of the Junior Auxiliary and of the Babies' Branch to have the oversight of the work in their Branch; to receive all moneys and pay out the same by April 15th; and to send an annual report to the Secretary.

7. It shall be the duty of the Secretary for the United Offering to arouse interest in the fund by correspondence and the circulation of literature.

8. All moneys shall be paid quarterly to the Treasurer; the last payments to be made not later than the 15th of April.

REPORT

of the Diocesan Secretary of The Woman's Auxiliary.

Rt Rev. Father in God:

Last year the Woman's Auxiliary of our Diocese reported taking part in the great services commemorating the bringing of Christianity to our own country and contributing to the United Offering presented at our Triennial Meeting. This year we report participating in what was, perhaps, the greatest Missionary gathering in the world's history. At the Pan-Anglican Congress representatives of this branch of the Auxiliary had the privilege of attending the inspiring services held in Westminster Abbey, St. Paul's Cathedral and other historic Churches and halls of London; and of taking part in the glorious Thanksgiving service—adding their small share to the great offering made for missionary work throughout the world.

During the month of October and November your Secretary visited several branches; and by invitation of the rectors of the parishes and officers of the branches gave some account of the Pan-Anglican Congress both in our own diocese and in the diocese of East Carolina.

Since that time, an illness has prevented her from taking any active part in the work;—but it seems that during this period the work has gone on better than usual. She thankfully reports an increased interest, and a much greater proportional increase in the offerings than ever before.

REPORT OF THE MEETING OF THE OFFICERS OF THE
WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

The Diocesan officers of the North Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary met at Christ Church Chapel, Thursday morning, May 13th, 1909.

The first thing brought up was the amount in the hands of the Treasurer, for Littleton. The Treasurer having consulted the Bishop, he recommended that the Diocesan Officers give this money to Mr. Joyner to reimburse him for money he personally paid out for the salary of a teacher at Roanoke Rapids. The school at Littleton was not started last year. This recommendation was accepted, and the Treasurer instructed to pay the money to Bishop Cheshire for that purpose.

The Pledge List was revised, and some changes made. The Auxiliary officers wish to encourage the Branches to give freely to Diocesan Missions.

The Secretary of the Convocation of Charlotte, Mrs. Van Landingham, sent in her resignation and it was accepted with regrets. Miss Laura Orr of Charlotte was nominated in her place. Mrs. M. A. Bland, Secretary of the Junior Branch for the Convocation of Charlotte being compelled to resign her position, Mrs. J. T. Bennett, has been requested to take that office. Miss Esdaile Shaw of Rockingham was nominated to fill the vacant place of Secretary of the Convocation of Charlotte. Both of these nominations met with the approval of the Bishop.

The officers then adjourned to meet in Christ Church Chapel, on Friday, May 14th, at 10 o'clock.

MINUTES.

The twenty-seventh Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of North Carolina was held in the Chapel of Christ Church, Raleigh, at 10 o'clock, May 14th, 1909.

After singing the Jubilee hymn, the Bishop in a few words welcomed the women, thanked them for the help of the past year, and wished them God speed.

Roll call being postponed till the afternoon, the minutes of the meeting of the Diocesan officers were read.

The report of the Treasurer followed, showing most gratifying work. The increase over last year's offering being \$312.71. Again she urged the importance of sending all money through her, as offerings sent direct to the missionaries could not be reported by her, and often occasioned much inconvenience.

The Secretary then stated, that as the President had been out of the Diocese most of the time, and she herself prevented by illness from taking much active part in the work since October, the burden had fallen upon the Treasurer, and she therefore moved that her report be received with thanks. This was carried by a rising vote.

Mrs. Lewis, Secretary for the Convocation of Raleigh, reported faithful work, but urged that the office be given to young women—women of earnestness and enthusiasm, who would give themselves to the work.

A letter was received from Mrs. Winston regretting that ill health had prevented active work, and expressing regret that she could not be with us. Her absence was a great disappointment to us but we earnestly hope that she will soon be able to resume her duties.

It was announced that both Secretaries of the Convocation of Charlotte had been obliged to resign. Mrs. Bennett, who had succeeded Mrs. Bland as Secretary of the Juniors in the Convocation of Charlotte, sent her report as she was detained at home by illness. She asked for sympathy and co-operation in the work of the Juniors, and urged the claims of Hamlet. It was moved that a note be sent to Mrs. Bennett expressing our sympathy and regret at her absence. The Secretary of the United Offering reported gratifying interest although thirteen branches had made no report. St. Philip's, Durham, is the banner branch in contributions to this object.

Miss Cameron, Librarian of the C. P. C. made a most earnest appeal for books and magazines. Miss Addie Smith urged that each member of the Auxiliary give at least twenty-five cents a year to this work.

The Secretary of the Junior Auxiliary in the Convocation of Raleigh made a most encouraging report showing the average gifts of the Juniors to be \$1.00, the interest increasing, and

the prospects for the coming year cheering. Good work was done by the branch in Oxford which was not reported.

Mrs. Bennett, the new Secretary for the Convocation of Charlotte, emphasized of the importance of securing good leaders, and asked the co-operation of parents.

Mrs. Spruill, Secretary of the Babies' Branch in the Convocation of Raleigh, made a touching and beautiful appeal to the mothers, and reported the satisfactory condition and splendid work done by the baby helpers of the Auxiliary.

The report from the Babies of the Convocation of Charlotte showed that they, too, were keeping up with the forward movement, the last year's work being the best they have ever done.

The revised pledge list as recommended by the Diocesan officers was then read. As the Auxiliary had paid the Bishop more than the amount promised, it was suggested that the offerings of the day be used to purchase a tablet to be put into the Jubilee Memorial Chapel at Selma. This motion was seconded and carried.

The Junior branches of Raleigh were called upon for their reports. Mrs. Iredell reported for Christ Church. The branch in Henderson showed good work and excellent methods. An offering was taken for the tablet to be placed in the Church in Selma, amounting to \$27.62 including the Communion Alms of the morning.

After noonday prayer by Mrs Wilkes, the meeting adjourned to the Church to hear the report of the Secretary. This was read before the Convention by Rev. Francis Osborne, and showed steady, satisfactory growth, notwithstanding her difficulties and disadvantages of the year. The women's hearts are in the work. On motion of Mr. R. H. Battle, the thanks of the Convention were given to the Woman's Auxiliary, the Junior Auxiliary and the Babies' Branch for their work of the past year.

At four o'clock the Auxiliary assembled in afternoon session. The report of the Juniors of the Good Shepherd was then read.

The Junior Auxiliary of the Good Shepherd then made its report. Mrs. Cheshire then presented for the consideration of the women, the inscription written by the Bishop for the tablet for the Church in Selma. Mrs. Wilkes stated that the Bishop

had suggested that as only the larger parishes were able to entertain both the Convention and the Auxiliary, the women, should consider the advisability of the Auxiliary meeting with the Convocations of Raleigh and Charlotte in rotation. After discussion, it was moved by Miss Bailey that the matter be postponed for another year, that it may be ascertained what the whole Auxiliary desire.

Mr. Nash came in at this point to thank the women for the help they had given to St. Mary's, Speed, and prefaced his remarks by saying he hoped the women would continue to meet with the Convention.

Rev. Mr. Owens then thanked the Auxiliary for the aid they had given to the mission at Spring Hope and asked their continued interest. The Archdeacon of the Raleigh Convocation then spoke of the work in Clayton.

Rev. Mr. Berkley made an earnest appeal for the work at Walnut Cove and at Mayodan. An offering of \$14.05 was taken for Mr. Berkley's work at Walnut Cove. It was then announced that the Auxiliary had been invited to visit St. Augustine's School with the members of the Convention.

Rev. Mr. Hoover spoke of the important work which he is doing at Spray, and bespoke for it the interest of the Auxiliary.

Miss McKimmon reported the work of the Juniors at St. Mary's School. It was then moved and carried that a collection be taken for moving the Church at Walnut Cove. This collection amounted to \$11.50.

The Secretary then expressed the thanks of all the delegates for the many courtesies and the unbounded hospitality shown us by the congregations of Raleigh.

The meeting then adjourned.

Two interesting services were held on the evenings of the 12th and 14th.

The first was for the members of the Junior Auxiliary in the Church of the Good Shepherd. At this service the vested choir was composed entirely of Juniors and addresses were made by the Rev. Thos. H. Faulknér, of Greensboro, and Rev. Thos. L. Trott, of Durham.

On the evening of the fourteenth the members of the Woman's Auxiliary united with the Convention in a great missionary service in Christ Church; and missionary addresses were made by Rev. Samuel M. Hanff, of Duke, and Rev. Bertram E. Brown, of Tarboro. At both these services was sung "For My Sake and the Gospels Go, and Tell Redemption's Story"—a Jubilee Hymn used during the great Pan-Anglican Congress. The offering was for Diocesan Mission.

NINETEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CHURCH
PERIODICAL CLUB IN THE DIOCESE OF N. C.

I wish I was submitting a more encouraging Report of the Church Periodical Club. It reminds me of the Valley of Dry Bones, and that I am in no sense an Ezekiel: I cannot reanimate it, try I ever so faithfully! In March I wrote a personal letter to all of the Librarians asking for some account of their work during the past three years. This was more to feel the pulse of the work than to obtain statistics. Eight out of the seventeen replied. One to resign what she says has been a nominal office, only, for several years; three to report a practical suspension of all work; and the other four showed earnestness, faithfulness, and more or less work accomplished.

I then wrote to all of the clergy in the diocese in whose parishes we have no Librarian, asking that one be appointed.

There are seventeen of them also. Rev. Mr. Bost, of Durham, replied at once making a very efficient appointment. Rev. Mr. Cocke, of Winston-Salem, gave an address to which I wrote, so far without results; Rev. Mr. Loudon, of Louisburg, could find no one who would take the work; and Rev. Mr. Ogilby, of Burlington, was in like helpless case.

The remaining thirteen (unlucky number!) are still to be heard from.

As the case now stands, we have twelve parishes in which there is a C. P. C. Librarian, viz:—St. Matthew's, Hillsboro; Christ Church, Raleigh; St. Paul's, Monroe; Trinity, Scotland Neck; St. Andrew's, and St. Barnabas, Greensboro; All Saint's, Concord; St. Peter's, Charlotte; Calvary, Wadesboro; and Cooleemee Mission, Davison County; and at St. Mary's School, Raleigh, but St. Mary's sent out only money, so far as last year's work is reported.

We are sending out regularly, (at least I hope so) eighty-two (82) current periodicals; have given away six (6) prayer books and hymnals; one hundred and twenty (120) tracts and catechisms; one box of miscellaneous reading matter, and one thousand and twenty-eight (1,028) odd numbers of magazines and papers.

The money reported to me as sent by the parish branches and the Librarians is \$27.75, besides \$6.00 from the Junior Auxiliary at St. Mary's School; and \$1.00 from St. Matthew's, Junior Auxiliary, Hillsboro, a total of \$34.75. I wish I knew how to awaken the interest of the good, kind women of the church to a realization of the value, necessity, importance and mercifulness of the work done by the Church Periodical Club.

There are so many, so very many people, who, but for its most merciful ministry, would be absolutely deprived of the pleasure of a new book or magazine.

'There are 1,616 clergymen and 4,677 lay people who are recipients of the literature distributed by the C. P. C. and I know personally of more families than I like to think of who are wholly dependent upon it for every periodical that they see.

I knew of one copy of the Churchman, sent regularly to a Missionary on the Western frontier that travelled afterwards a circuit of five hundred miles and reached fifty other families.

I knew of a woman out West, who cried for joy when a box that was sent to her contained nothing but books and magazines, tho' she needed other things badly enough.

I knew of one copy of the Review of Reviews that went into three states and seven families. I could multiply instances like these, but surely these will suffice.

Some of the letters written to the Central office are so full of gratitude and joy that it positively hurts you to think how great the privation has been; and how many more there are in like case, who are receiving nothing!

"My brethren, these things ought not so to be."

The need is so great, and it costs so little, both of time and money to supply it that it seems to me if once good women could but realize it, they would feel ashamed to let a magazine stay in their houses after it has been read.

To many of us the hunger for books is as real as the hunger for bread. Indeed, I have known the time when I would have traded off the bread for the book most joyfully. Can't we, and won't we do more than we have ever yet done?

The need is so real, and as wide spread as the Church itself. We have the means to supply it right at hand in our homes. Shall it go longer unsupplied?

A MESSAGE TO THE MOTHERS.

FOURTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BABIES'
BRANCH, CONVOCATION OF CHARLOTTE.

MY DEAR LITTLE HELPERS:

I come to day to lay before you the result of your last year's work, the best year's work that you and I have ever done together.

From nearly two hundred babies, representing fourteen parishes, has come \$108.02.

The tables show just where the money came from, and where it has gone. I wish to speak only on a few points. Thirteen years ago, the Diocesan Babies' Branch was established with one object in view, the support and training of a Japanese orphan girl. Much, very much, besides this has been accomplished, and now Mr. Ishii writes that this scholarship will be completed in one year more—that "little Tuka" will soon be able to teach or nurse in this same Christian home. What a blessed work the babies of North Carolina have been permitted to do—a work whose influences will go on and on through Eternity.

The memorial gifts go again to little Carrie May Cochran, the brown-eyed baby of the Thompson Orphanage.

During the year two little babies have passed into the paradise of God—baby boys of two of our faithful parish secretaries.

St. Peter's Infant Class again sent their pennies to a sick child under the care of Miss Hicks at Manila. Miss Hicks, you know, was herself once a North Carolina baby, and so we love to help her in her work in the far away Philippines.

And then this Class gave a Christmas tree to one of the missions of Charlotte, the value of the gifts being \$7.70.

And now, without forgetting any of our old friends, we have taken up a new work. \$14.00 has been put into the Savings Bank, the beginning of a fund to buy a Font for the church in Hamlet. Do you not think it would be a beautiful thing for the babies of this Convocation to have this Font ready for the Church when it shall be built? To do this we need every one of you and many new members, and every one must remember the penny every Sunday. This is not a big thing I am asking, but if it be done, and every penny given with baby's prayer, the result will be—perhaps not a larger sum of money, but it will be the biggest work and the most blessed work that you have ever done.
