FORM OF BEQUEST:

I give, devise, and bequeath to The Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, for the use of the Society If it is desired that the bequest should be applied to some particular department of the work, there should be substituted for the words, "For the Use of the Society", the words "For Domestic Missions," or "For Foreign Missions," or "For Work Among the Indians," or "For Work Among Colored People," or "For Work in Africa," or "For Work in China," etc.

IMPORTANT NOTES.

I. This fiscal year will end December 31st instead of March 20th as heretofore. The Treasurer's books are to close on that day and the report to the annual meeting next April will contain only moneys received up to January 1st. On January 1st, 1918, another pledge list will be sent out to run the full twelve months.

II. Hereafter no money can be reported except that which passes through the hands of the Treasurer.

III. If elections are held in November and results reported with the other data in December, the names of the new officers will always appear in this report.

IV. A special prayer for use before and at the time of the election of officers is to be found on page 2.

V. The new object on the pledge list is The American Church Institute for Negroes which was "organized for educational work among the negroes of the South and incorporated under the laws of Virginia."

VI. This diocesan branch gave \$2,891.05 toward the United Offering of 1916. At least \$5,000, is the aim set for 1919.

VII. The Missionary Message of the Bible is the course of study for this year. "Simon Peter: Rock" and "The Call of the King" are the courses for Juniors. Wonderful results would undoubtedly follow if the 1440 Auxiliary women of this diocese would group themselves into classes of ten or twelve to study the Bible this year.

VIII. The Feast of the Purification is the annual Corporate Communion day for the diocese.

IX. The week beginning November 25th is the week of prayer for "the Auxiliary throughout the Church"—the last week of the Pilgrimage of Prayer.

REPRESENTATION.

Branches with ten members, or under, are entitled to one representative at the annual meeting; branches with twenty members, two representatives—with one additional representative for every twenty-five members over and above the first twenty.

THE NEW JUNIOR PLAN.

The Woman's Auxiliary and the General Board of Religious Education have asked that for the next three years the Junior Auxiliary be developed in connection with the Sunday School.

In February special effort was made to get Sunday School superintendents and teachers into Mission Study Classes and for several years this will be the most important thing. Shortly before the meeting of the convention and the annual meeting in May a joint meeting of the Board of Religious Education and Junior officers was arranged and a list of questions (based largely on W. A. leaflets, 207 and 212) with other literature, was sent to each person to attend in order that the matter might be given thoughtful consideration before the discussion. It was agreed to recommend the following plan to the clergy, superintendents and Junior leaders of the diocese—the chairman of the Board of Religious Education, as well as the Junior Secretary, to communicate with the clergy and superintendents :

1. That the offering the last Sunday of every month be given for missions.
2. That ten minutes of every last Sunday be given over to items of interest about the mission field receiving that month's offering.
3. That children be taught to give in proportion to their allowance—not five cents a month from every child.
4. That it is better training for children to have the responsibility of at least part of the support of their Sunday School.
5. That the working out of the plans for week-day meetings—and whether the Junior Auxiliary and the Scouts, Camp-fire Girls or Girls' Friendly Society can be correlated —be left to each Sunday School without a suggestion for the present.
6. That all but the Advent and Lenten offerings be sent the Junior Secretary and Treasurer, Mrs. J. B. Gibble, Burlington, N. C.
7. That this offering list be followed :

DECEMBER, Advent Offerings: *Diocesan Missions.*

JANUARY Offering: *Province of Sewanee.*

For Work among Negroes or for Work among the Southern Mountaineers.

FEBRUARY Lenten Offerings: *General Missions, Mite Boxes*
MARCH

APRIL Offering: *Alaska.*

For Windows and Doors Fund or for some other object in Alaska.

MAY Offering: *Africa*.

JUNE Offering: *The Indians*.

Articles for a Christmas Box for Indians or for some other work among Indians.

JULY Offering: *Mexico*.

For St. Andrew's School for Boys or for some other object in Mexico.

AUGUST Offering: *Cuba or Porto Rico or Philippines*.

SEPTEMBER Offering: *Japan*.

Toward the Support of a Cot (\$30) in the Children's Ward in St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo, or for some other object in Japan.

OCTOBER Offering: Toward the Support of Rev. G. L. Tucker, Educational Secretary for the Province of Sewanee.

NOVEMBER Offering: *China*.

Toward the Support of an American Clergyman (Missionary) in China or for some other object in China.

The above is not the ideal—only a step in that direction. When we superintendents and teachers have had courses in Missions and in Christian Nurture and when we realize that "we cannot teach the Incarnation, Atonement, Resurrection or any part of our Christian faith without teaching missions" then there will not be the need of setting apart this *special* time for studying and giving for missions. This ought not to have to be done.

In order to carry out this plan the Junior leader will find more to do than ever before. Co-operating with the superintendent, she can see that brief, live items are found ahead for the ten missionary minutes every month: that the money is sent to the Diocesan Treasurer promptly; that week-day meetings are held for manual work or for special mission study during Epiphany; that if each class does not meet with its Sunday School teacher for the week-day meetings then that children be grouped together, but according to grades in the Sunday School—not according to age.

In one Sunday School the leader visits each class for a few minutes on the missionary Sundays.

EXTRACTS FROM THE MINUTES OF THE
ANNUAL MEETING

The thirty-fifth annual meeting was held in St. Timothy's parish, Wilson, May 15th and 16th, 1917; Miss Kate Cheshire, presiding.

After the report from the preceding officers' meeting, the three following resolutions were severally voted on:

1. *Resolved*: That for a period of two years, in order to test the plan, the Woman's Auxiliary meet at a different time from that of the diocesan convention

2. *Resolved*: That our fiscal year be made to correspond with the fiscal year of the diocesan convention.

3. *Resolved*: That Spray and Roanoke Rapids be dropped from the Pledge List and that the American Church Institute for Negroes be substituted.

The first two motions were unanimously adopted. The third received 28 votes in its favor with 15 against it. The motion was then rescinded and a motion to include all three objects was unanimously agreed upon.

The reports of diocesan officers followed (see other sections of this report).

At noonday there were special intercessions for the Army, Navy and this Nation as well as for Missions.

Mrs. H. A. London, Pittsboro, was appointed chairman of a committee to raise funds for St. Agnes' School Kyoto; and Mrs. S. P. Cooper, Henderson, chairman of the committee in the interest of the Church General Hospital, Wuchang.

In the afternoon, Mrs. J. B. Gibble, conducted a conference on the New Junior Plan and, later, Miss Cheshire presided at a missionary mass meeting. Mrs. C. L. Coon very graciously extended a welcome to the Methodist Church in which these meetings were being held and Mrs. C. E. Blount and Mrs. W. T. Clark brought greetings from the Methodist and the Presbyterian missionary organizations. Miss Emma Hall, Mrs. H. G. Connor, Miss Claudia Hunter and Mr. B. F. Finney also made short talks.

At 7:30 on Wednesday morning the United Offering was presented in St. Timothy's Church at the annual Corporate Communion service.

At 10:00 o'clock, Mrs. H. G. Cooper, Oxford, presided over the Delegates' Conference.

Immediately after noon-day prayers at St. Timothy's,

the Auxiliary Report was read to the Bishop and the Convention assembled.

Upon adjourning to the Methodist Church again, the meeting was addressed briefly by Rev. J. E. Ingle, Rev. N. C. Hughes, and Mr. H. C. Martin. An offering of \$15.38 was later given Mr. Martin for the Patterson School in the District of Asheville.

At 3:00 Miss Emma Hall led a helpful conference in Mission Study.

Unfinished business followed: Miss Hairston's resignation as United Offering Treasurer was noted with regret.

Following the Bishop's suggestion, the time for the annual meeting is Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of the second week in April. It was then moved by Mrs. F. S. Spruill that invitations for the next meeting be sent Miss Cheshire at once and that this decision be left with her.

Mrs. Spruill then reported \$734.99 as the amount given for St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo, the past year.

An offering of \$21.00 was given for Lawrence at the disposal of Miss Cheshire, in appreciation of her work there.

Mrs. London made an appeal for St. Agnes' School and received pledges amounting to \$68.00.

Letters, in part, were read from Miss Blacknall telling of her first year's work in Alaska.

Mrs. London moved that Misses Hill, Carroll and Gordon be introduced and tell briefly of the work in and around Spray.

Fifty-six delegates were present.

After passing a resolution on the war, which had just been passed in the diocesan convention, this meeting was closed with America and a prayer.

REPORT

*of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions in the
Diocese of North Carolina.*

Rt. Rev. Father in God:

The year which has just passed shows a steady and wholesome growth in the work of the Auxiliary, with absolutely no change in its outward aspect. Not only have the officers continued their work but the work itself, represented in our Pledge List, has been little changed; the special objects represented this year being St. Agnes' School, Kyoto, Japan, and The Church General Hospital, Wuchang, China. These take the place of St. Luke's International Hospital, Tokyo, which is now on a firm foundation, and St. Mary's School, Shanghai, the fund for which has already been completed.

We are glad to report that several parishes are carrying out successfully the ideas suggested by Miss Lindley in her New Junior Plan.

Our officers and members have enjoyed unusual advantages during this year. The Blue Ridge Conference held during the past summer, was very largely attended by the members of our Church; the majority of them being Diocesan and Parochial officers of the Auxiliary. Our full delegation was present at the General Convention and Triennial of the Woman's Auxiliary in St. Louis and were greatly benefitted by these inspiring meetings. In January representatives from the Wake and Granville Districts met in Raleigh where two important conferences were held and addresses made by our Bishop, by Diocesan Officers and Delegates and the Rev. Dr. Patton, Secretary of the Province of Sewanee.

It was here that we sent a loyal greeting to Miss Grace

Lindley, our new General Secretary, who is so ably filling this office left vacant by the resignation of our beloved Miss Emery.

Our Diocesan Secretary has been most active in visiting and stimulating the zeal of parish branches; and our Diocesan President, besides her usual work in connection with the Auxiliary and our Diocesan paper, has been doing regular teaching and Mission work in her own county.

One encouraging feature of our work has been the gathering of various branches of the Auxiliary into great Missionary Meetings. In the larger cities these meetings have been held by the several parish branches; and in some instances the small Mission branches have joined forces and received the stimulus which comes from personal contact and united effort.

Following the example of our English sisters we are emphasizing, more than ever before, the *spiritual* side of the Auxiliary: and we humbly pray that "The Pilgrimage of Prayer" which the women of the Diocese—and of the American Church—have entered into so heartily, may bring a deepening of spiritual life to ourselves and manifold blessings upon our work.

REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

1916-1917

Another year of service for the Master through Mission Study is ended and we find that despite hindrances through inability to secure the necessary text-books, that the study classes have done excellent work. Ignorance and indifference have been overcome by knowledge, many splendid leaders have given themselves to the work and we can visualize what has been accomplished in the totals gathered from the reports as follows:—70 classes have been held with 650 in attendance, 250 of these attended a Mission Study Class for the first time, 75 new subscriptions to the *Spirit of Missions* have been secured and 25 delegates are promised for the Blue Ridge Missionary Conference. \$25.00 was contributed for the "New World" School at El Coto, Porto Rico. These are the facts in numbers which mean much, but the reports on the results of this year's study mean more, for all say the results have been a deepening of the spiritual life: increased interest in missions, more purpose in prayer, a deeper prayer life, daily prayers for peace and for the spread of Christ's Kingdom. Thus a rich harvest of blessings has been gathered in our effort "to know Christ and make Him known."

TWENTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

I herewith make the twenty-seventh annual report of the Church Periodical Club in this diocese.

We have seventeen librarians, of whom seven sent in reports from which I compile these figures; although of course, they do not cover all that is actually done, but it is all I have a right to count. There are thirty-one contributors, who send out regularly sixty-eight current periodicals. Of odd numbers of magazines and papers 518 are reported sent, also 100 Christmas and Easter cards; seventy-six pictures; two boxes contents not stated and of money sent to me there was \$16.40.

The vacant parishes have not appointed librarians, and the work languishes. Complaint is made that some persons to whom literature is sent do not trouble to acknowledge the receipt of it, and so the contributors discontinue it. It is a pity both ways, but more especially the failure of courtesy on the part of the recipients.

The existing state of war offers a wide field for C. P. C. activity. When the U. S. troops are organized in camps, or for active service, I hope our parishes will all take hold of the work then.
