IMPORTANT NOTES

I. The Feast of the Purification is the annual corporate Communion day for the diocese.

II. The eves of the Feasts of St. Andrew, the Epiphany, the Annunciation and the Transfiguration are the special intercessory days for the diocese. And copies of the Missionary Litany for use at these times are to be had from the Missions House.

•III. A special prayer for use before and at the time of the election of officers has been prepared for this diocesan branch by a priest of the Church and is to be found on page 2. Impressive and prayerful elections must make a difference in the life of any branch.

IV. The books of the Treasurer close for this year, December 31.

V. All money for the United Offering should be sent to Mrs. F. J. Murdock, United Offering Custodian, Salisbury, but all other money to be reported must pass through the hands of the Treasurer, Mrs. W. D. Burwell, Henderson.

VI. This branch gave \$2,891.05 toward the United Offering of 1916. At least \$5,000 is the aim set for 1919. The amount on hand to date is \$1,710.84—leaving \$3,289.16 to be made up in one and one half years.

VII. At the annual meeting in Chapel Hill it was unanimously voted that the last Sunday in September be kept as a special United Offering Day—and that in addition to the presentation, custodians ask their rectors to preach a special sermon on the United Offering, the gift of money and the gift of life.

VIII. The special representative of the American Church Institute for Negroes, Dr. R. W. Patton, says the U. S. Commissioner of Education has "literally begged the churches to give four times what they are now giving to train Christian leaders for the negro race." This plea of the government makes the American Church Institute for Negroes one of the most important items on the pledge list.

IX. "His Star in the West" is the text-book for junior mission study classes this year. "Our Church and Our Country" or "The Call of a World Task" is the senior text. It is recommended that a course in one of the race problems follow the regular course and it is earnestly recommended by Dr. Patton, and a special committee of

his appointment, that in the Fourth Province this second course be on the negro. In the University of North Carolina last year 278 students and others grouped themselves into classes and studied "The Negro in the South." It would mean tremendously if the Woman's Auxiliary would do this which Church and government have called us to do.

REPRESENTATION.

Branches with ten members, or under, are entitled to one representative at the annual meeting; branches with twenty members, two representatives—with one additional representative for every twenty-five members over and above the first twenty.

HOW WE CAN HELP THE BOARD OF MISSIONS GET VOLUNTEERS FOR THE FOREIGN AND DOMESTIC MISSION FIELDS :

1. There was paid from the Auxiliary Fee fund last year half the expenses of a student from St. Mary's School, Raleigh, to the Blue Ridge Missionary Conference. This student returned to St. Mary's to do wonderful things. She is now a volunteer; and to keep up the work begun, five St. Mary's students were sent to the last conference at Blue Ridge. Next year in addition to the 4 St. Mary's girls, half the expenses ought to be provided for 3 Church girls from the Normal College and 3 Church boys from the University to go to the Missionary Conference at Blue Ridge. The Auxiliary Fee will be about one-third of the amount necessary. Will any person, or branch, willing to provide one of these scholarships (\$17.50) send it to the Treasurer, Mrs. W. D. Burwell, Henderson?
2. Last winter a missionary service with a sermon calling for nurses for medical work in the foreign mission field was held in one of the hospitals of the state. A monthly service in this hospital is one of the results.
3. The Spirit of Missions is sent to the nurses of another hospital.
4. "The Missionary Literature in the Raney Library" was the subject of a talk made at a meeting in Raleigh in January. Later a woman asked to give this library some of the great missionary biographies.
5. At the annual meeting it was voted to ask U. O. custodians to ask their rectors to preach the last Sunday in September on the United Offering, and to emphasize the offering of life as well as of money.
6. During a conference on "How we can help the Board of Missions find missionaries for the work abroad," the principal of a city graded school said, "Every branch might give a tea to the Episcopal teachers in the town and have a missionary, or someone, present to put the

needs before them—teachers have all kinds of appeals except this made to them.”

7. Is there a boy, girl, young man or woman you would like to have think seriously about this matter? Select the right kind of missionary biography, get his promise to read it and put it into his hands. One of the greatest of the great missionary leaders today is the product of a missionary book he promised to read.

8. Every morning at 7:30 prayers are being offered that “many men and women full of faith and the Holy Ghost may go from this diocese into the mission field.” Will you be one of these intercessors?

WILL YOU DISCUSS THESE THINGS AT A MEETING THIS YEAR?

1. Will you see that every member knows about it ahead of time?
2. Will you try to get many to take part in it?
3. Will you encourage them to write out in their own words very definite prayers for this meeting? Perhaps many will, at least, pray a sentence prayer.
4. Will you close with the Missionary Litany?

FORM OF BEQUEST:

I give, devise, and bequeath to The Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, for the use of the Society \$..... If it is desired that the bequest should be applied to some particular department of the work, there should be substituted for the words, “For the Use of the Society,” the words “For Domestic Missions,” or “For Foreign Missions,” or “For Work among the Indians,” or “For Work among Colored People,” or “For Work in Africa,” “For Work in China,” etc.

THE NEW JUNIOR PLAN.

The Woman's Auxiliary and the General Board of Religious Education have asked that for the next three years the Junior Auxiliary be developed in connection with the Sunday School.

The most important thing is to get superintendents and teachers into a mission study class.

The following recommendations are being carried out in some of the Sunday Schools of the diocese:

1. That the offering the last Sunday of every month be given for missions.

2. That ten minutes of every last Sunday be given over to items of interest about the mission field receiving that month's offering.

3. That children be taught to give in proportion to their allowance—not five cents a month from every child.

4. That it is better training for children to have the responsibility of at least part of the support of their Sunday School.

5. That the working out of the plans for week-day meetings—and whether the Junior Auxiliary and the Scouts, Camp-fire Girls or Girls' Friendly Society can be correlated—be left to each Sunday School without a suggestion for the present.

6. That all but the Advent and Lenten offerings be sent the Junior Secretary and Treasurer, Mrs. J. B. Gible, Burlington, N. C.

7. That this offering list be followed:

DECEMBER, Advent Offerings: Diocesan Missions.

JANUARY Offering: Province of Sewanee.

For Work among Negroes or for Work among the Southern Mountaineers.

FEBRUARY Lenten Offerings: *General Missions*, Mite Boxes

MARCH

APRIL Offering: Alaska.

For Windows and Doors Fund or for some other object in Alaska.

MAY Offering: Africa.

JUNE Offering: The Indians.

Articles for a Christmas Box for Indians or for some other work among Indians.

JULY Offering: Mexico.

For St. Andrew's School for Boys or for some other object in Mexico.

AUGUST Offering: Cuba or Porto Rico or Philippines.

SEPTEMBER Offering: Japan.

Toward the Support of a Cot (\$30) in the Children's Ward in St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo, or for some other object in Japan.

OCTOBER Offering: Toward the Support of Rev. G. L. Tucker, Educational Secretary for the Province of Sewanee.

NOVEMBER Offering: China.

Toward the Support of an American Clergyman (Missionary) in China or for some other object in China.

The above is not the ideal—only a step in that direction. When we superintendents and teachers have had courses in Missions and in Christian Nurture and when we realize that "we cannot teach the Incarnation, Atonement, Resurrection or any part of our Christian faith without teaching missions" then there will not be the need of setting apart this *special* time for studying and giving for missions. This ought not to be necessary.

In order to carry out this plan the Junior leader will find more to do than ever before. Co-operating with the superintendent, she can see that brief, live items are found ahead for the ten missionary minutes every month; that the money is sent to the Diocesan Treasurer promptly; that week-day meetings are held for manual work or for special mission study during Epiphany; that if each class does not meet with its Sunday School teacher for the week-day meetings then that children be grouped together, but according to grades in the Sunday School—not according to age.

In one Sunday School the leader visits every class for a few minutes on the missionary Sundays.

The Chairman of the Diocesan Board of Religious Education had this notice in the July Carolina Churchman:

IMPORTANT.

The Diocesan Board of Religious Education recommends that all parishes and missions wherever possible adopt and use the Christian Nurture Course of instruction in Sunday Schools as the standard of this Diocese.

EXTRACTS FROM THE MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING.

The thirty-sixth annual meeting was held in the parish-house of the Chapel of the Cross, Chapel Hill, April 16 and 17, 1918; Miss Kate Cheshire presiding. After the opening prayers, Mrs. Collier Cobb, President of the Chapel Hill branch, gave gracious greetings in the name of her branch. The Secretary reported from the officers' meeting in the morning the specials before the Auxiliary this year and the names of those appointed as chairmen to raise money for these specials (see page 4) and read for the Treasurer a new and simplified pledge list, which was unanimously adopted (see page 7).

The Woman's Auxiliary War Plan was read and at once Mrs. T. W. Bickett, followed by others, spoke earnest words of commendation. It was generally accepted as that for which the Auxiliary had unconsciously awaited since the war began. Later, Mrs. Bickett was appointed chairman for the plan in this diocese.

Officers' reports followed (see pages 16-30), then Committee reports: Mrs. S. P. Cooper reported \$62.32 given for the Church General Hospital this year; Mrs. H. A. London, \$188.48 for St. Agnes' School the past year; a student from St. Mary's School, for the Committee on the Offering of Life, reported that five girls at St. Mary's are considering work in the mission field.

Miss Cheshire called on Mrs. Bickett for a few words about the Blue Ridge Missionary Conference. Mrs. Bickett said the ten days spent there last year was, she thought, the most blessed time of her life; and then pleaded for deeper prayerfulness during these serious times.

Miss Cheshire's own report closed the first business meeting; and at its conclusion, she told of her resignation. The Auxiliary stood a moment in appreciation of what Miss Cheshire's 14 years in the Auxiliary have meant; and the Vice-president, Mrs. Wall, appointed a committee to draw up resolutions on Miss Cheshire's resignation.

At 4 o'clock Miss Hall, in the absence of Mrs. Gible, led the conference on "Missions in the Sunday School." The conference showed that many parishes are experimenting—more are not, and some reported no knowledge of the work in their own Sunday Schools. The conference closed with a motion by Mrs. Hoke that we go back to our homes and into our Sunday Schools and try to work out the New Junior Plan.

At 8 o'clock the Bishop of the diocese addressed the

Auxiliary, emphasizing especially the diocesan work among deaf mutes. Dr. W. C. Sturgis' address was on "The Mission of the Church" and at its conclusion Bishop Cheshire urged the Auxiliary to lend its aid in furthering the One-Day's Income Plan.

At 7:40 o'clock Wednesday morning the United Offering was presented at the annual corporate communion of the Auxiliary.

A short business meeting was held Wednesday morning. The work among deaf mutes and the One-Day's Income Plan were again commended and Mrs. D. H. Blair was appointed chairman of the latter (see page 4), and it was moved and carried that Miss Cheshire advise with the Bishop and Mrs. Bickett in carrying out the War Plan.

The delegates' conference followed. Many of the reports were suggestive:

"We have evening meetings for those occupied during the day." "The Christian Nurture Series will fit us to work out the New Junior Plan." "The support of a Bible woman in the foreign field and the Thompson Orphanage in the home field are our special interests." "We do not make money for missions but give it." "Mission study is our greatest interest." "The intercessory services are the most helpful phases of the work to us." "The Prayer Committee asks every woman to spend five minutes on her knees before coming to the Auxiliary meetings." "We should do Red Cross work and Auxiliary work as never before."

A telegram from Rev. W. J. Gordon was read—and followed by many expressions of appreciation of clergymen of the diocese.

Miss Laura Carroll told briefly of her work in Iredell County and Miss Bertha Richards, of St. Augustine's, Raleigh.

Mrs. Hoke asked that a Sunday be chosen for the presentation of the United Offering and that custodians ask their rectors to preach on the United Offering on that day—emphasizing the gift of life. The last Sunday in September was selected for those branches not following other plans. Mrs. Hoke reported the offering for the year, \$1059.43—for the year and a half since the Triennial \$1710.84—half of the three years gone, but not half of the \$5,000 on hand.

Miss Cheshire reported as the grand total for the nine months making up the last fiscal year, \$6,442.01. \$7,670.21 was contributed in 1916-17—an increase, when divided by three-fourths, of \$669.38. Twenty-nine branches

were represented by thirty-four delegates and six diocesan officers.

Before adjournment to the church for the noon-day intercessions led by Dr. Sturgis, Mrs. Hoke read these resolutions:

We, the members of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of North Carolina in this 36th Annual Meeting assembled offer the following resolutions:

1. That we have heard of the resignation of our beloved President, Miss Kate Cheshire, with heartfelt sorrow and desire to express to her our loss in giving her up as our leader but, with faith in her and the Bishop, we know we must submit to their judgment.

2. That her fourteen years of faithful and enthusiastic service have revealed a pure devotion to her Master that has been an example and blessing to all who have come under her influence.

3. That we pledge to her successor the loyalty of the Auxiliary in helping to carry on the work she has so ably planned and conducted, knowing that this is the best way we can live up to her ideals for the Auxiliary.

4. That we trust our Heavenly Father is conserving her strength for greater work for Him, and that she will continue to guide us by her wise counsel and her unfailing prayers.

In the closing meeting these matters were discussed:

1. Leaflets—the splendid new ones just published at the Missions House.

2. The program for the Triennial of 1919.

3. Sending, instead of one, four delegates from St. Mary's School to the Blue Ridge Missionary Conference—half the expenses of these girls was quickly made up.

4. The "Williamsborough Plan" for district meetings.

A letter was read from Miss Blacknall in Alaska.

Prayers were asked for Bishop Lloyd's safe return from Liberia.

Then Mrs. Hoke told of an offer of \$100 toward the \$143,000 deficit if individual members of the Auxiliary present would give a like amount. \$143.26 was immediately pledged.

Miss Susan Smith of St. Mary's School was presented as a volunteer for the foreign mission field and just be-

fore adjournment, the new president of the Auxiliary— At the conclusion of the service of intercession at noon, the Bishop had announced the appointment of Mrs. W. A. Hoke of Raleigh to succeed Miss Cheshire. This appointment met with genuine approbation and the Auxiliary stood to express its gladness at this appointment.

At 4:30 Dr. Sturgis led a conference on Mission Study. At 8 o'clock Dr. R. W. Patton made an address on The American Church Institute for Negroes and Dr. Sturgis closed the annual meeting with a wonderful address on Prayer.

REPORT

of the President of the Woman's Auxiliary-Diocese of North Carolina.

The only things which seem worth while at the present time are patriotic and missionary work; and the two words which really stir the heart are God and our Country. We have all been giving our thoughts and prayers to our country and her Allies; and some of the best hours of our busy days to the work of the Red Cross.

Now the Auxiliary has been called "The Great Red Cross of Christian Warfare"—Are we taking it up with the same spirit and enthusiasm; working in season and out of season for our great cause?

As your representative I have come to report upon our year's work; or rather—since our fiscal year has been changed—to report our nine-months' work, from April 1st, 1917 to January 1st, 1918.

In spite of the straightened times and the many calls upon us for patriotic giving I think there is much of encouragement in our report. Listen, and see if you do not think the same. Our Treasurer records that we have given in these months.

Now, as you know, this offering is only a part of our obligation. We promise first, to pray for missions and then to study about the needs of the field. 15 branches have reported the observance of a Corporate Communion—our highest act of prayer and worship.—19 branches observed the Intercessory-Days of prayer. Our Educational Secretary reports the number of Study Classes as 75, with 750 members and 15 delegates pledged for Blue Ridge.

And now, having reviewed our past, let us set our faces toward the future and see how we can best strengthen and extend our work. Can we not get some suggestions from our own government in this crisis?

The government selects as officers and leaders the men who have proved themselves best fitted to lead. Let us select our Auxiliary Officers carefully and prayerfully and let them give their highest service to this high cause. Our Secretary has suggested that if we make good use of the prayer in our Annual Report for the election of officers—then the officers, in their turn, will endeavor to live up to our prayers—Then see how the government urges us to give. The needs of the Nation and her Allies are presented in such stirring appeals that our wealth is poured out; we give and give until it hurts.—Do we present the cause of missions with all the earnestness and eloquence in our power; and do we give and give until it hurts? Cannot we follow the example of our Mother Church of England and give more in time of war than in time of peace?

Our country looks to the Church to spiritualize her army and navy and to Christian people to pray unceasingly for their success. Let us by private and intercessory prayer put a deeper spirituality into the work of the Auxiliary.

And under government every man must serve. The armies have their marching orders.—So have we. Are we all obeying the marching orders of the great Captain of our salvation?

We have Chapel Hill and feel that it belongs to us, for it belongs to our boys;—our sons and our brothers; our fathers and our sweethearts and husbands, and you know it is a joy to have the Annual Meeting of the Auxiliary in our beautiful University town. We love it all the more because in the past, and now in the future, it has inspired these same fathers and brothers and sons to go forth at their country's call and to give their lives, if needed for her safety and ours. May we, members of the Auxiliary, show the same zeal and self-sacrifice in serving the Master and His cause as they who are serving their country.

If one speaks at all, at the present time, it must be of war and in terms of war—for nothing else seems really worth while. And speaking of war, everyone knows that conditions have greatly changed. In old times the army and navy went to war and the rest of the nation sat still and listened for reports of victory or loss.

It was the same way with the Church. A small army of missionaries went out to obey Christ's great command to conquer the world; and the other Christians sat still and listened for reports of their victory or death.

But now, our country is at war and we are all serving—our Church sends out her army of missionaries, and each one of us, men and women and little children, must be made to feel a personal responsibility. The Woman's Auxiliary is trying to live up to that responsibility; and for this reason Bishops, Priests and Laymen are willing to leave their pressing duties and come at our call to help in our great undertaking.

We have as a distinguished guest this evening a gentleman whom I have always known, by reputation, as a man's man. Think what a triumph it is to have captured him for the Woman's Auxiliary. I don't think we could have captured him at all without the proper bait;—and the bait in this instance was a University town full of young men!—

REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY, 1917.

It is indeed a great privilege to be the bearer of glad tidings in days as grand and as awful as these; this is the best year's work the Educational Department has had, the reports are all aglow with what has been accomplished in the Study Classes. 75 classes have been held with a membership of 750, many attending for the first time. 50 subscriptions to the Spirit of Missions have been secured and 15 delegates are promised for the Blue Ridge Missionary Conference in June. One class has developed

8 Leaders this year who have taught classes in other towns. The wonderful work of the Leaders this year cannot be estimated. A deeper interest in the study of the Bible has been aroused and the effects of the year's study are manifested in the increased efforts that are being made "to know Christ and make Him known." I know these are busy days when hearts and hands are full to overflowing but I beg that you will holdfast to what has been accomplished through Mission Study and continue with increased effort.

The story is told that a soldier returning from the battle of Waterloo was asked what he saw; and he replied nothing but smoke and clouds; when asked what he did, he replied "I stuck to my gun," friends we must stick to our guns in these days even if the clouds and smoke obscure the way, for never in the world's history has it been so important for the Master's work to go forward. He gave us our marching orders two thousand years ago, all the world has not been reached, but our face is still forward and we are marching on in the strength of the Lord of Hosts through the way of prayer and thanksgiving.

TWENTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB.

In submitting the following figures I do not suppose that they represent in any degree the actual work of our diocesan branch of the Church Periodical Club, for of our sixteen librarians only seven made any report of their work, and the major part of these reports unhappily could not be reduced "to the cold logic of figures", simply embodied in such phraseology as "very great quantities of magazines sent the soldiers" or specifically to "Camp Greene." One reported "several magazines sent to Alaska and St. Mark's Mission." But these were too indefinite to be reduced to figures.

What I can actually tabulate from figures specifically given is that 44 current periodicals are sent regularly from 28 contributors, 300 magazines were sent to the Camp at Chattanooga Park and 50 picture post cards.

The money reported sent by librarians for freight and express was \$7.35—sent through me to the C. P. C. Treasurer, \$10.35. In all, as reported to me, our contributions amounted to \$21.70.

We could do better and with all my heart I wish we would.
