TREASURE AND TRINKET FUND FOR COMMUNION SERVICE

AT BISHOP CHESHIRE'S DISPOSAL

Important Notes

I. The Feast of the Purification is the annual corporate Communion day for the diocese.

II. The eves of the Feasts of St. Andrew, the Epiphany, the Annunciation and the Transfiguration are the special intercessory days for the diocese. And copies of

the Missionary Litany for use at these times are to be had from the Missions House.

III. A special prayer for use before and at the time of the election of officers has been prepared for this diocesan branch by a priest of the Church and is to be found on page 3. Impressive and prayerful elections must make a difference in the life of any branch.

IV. The books of the Treasurer close for the year, December 31.

V. All money for the United Offering should be sent to Mrs. F. J. Murdock, United Offering Custodian, Salisbury, but all other money to be reported must pass through the hands of the Treasurer, Mrs. W. D. Burwell, Henderson.

VI. This branch gave \$2,891.05 toward the United Offering of 1916. At least \$5,000 is the aim set for 1919. The amount on hand to date is \$3,032.00—leaving nearly \$2,000.00 to be made up by October 1.

VII. At the annual meeting in Chapel Hill it was unanimously voted that the last Sunday in September be kept as a special United Offering Day—and that in addition to the presentation, custodians ask their rectors to preach a special sermon on the United Offering, the gift of money and the gift of life.

VIII. The special representative of the American Church Institute for Negroes, Dr. R. W. Patton, says the U. S. Commissioner of Education has "literally begged the churches to give four times what they are now giving to train Christian leaders for the negro race." This plea of the government makes the American Church Institute for Negroes one of the most important items on the pledge list.

IX. The text-book for Mission Study classes this year is "Neighbors"—Sturgis.

Form of Bequest

HOW WE CAN HELP THE BOARD OF MISSIONS GET VOLUNTEERS FOR THE FOREIGN AND DOMESTIC MISSION FIELDS

The Chapel Hill branch sent to the Blue Ridge Missionary Conference at Black Mountain in June a student from the University; and, judging from the impression he made upon the entire conference, and from other evidence, it looks as though this was one of the very best investments of \$25.00 ever made in the Diocese. With the Auxiliary Fee, supplemented by special gifts from a number of branches, five students were again sent from St. Mary's School. The Diocese of East Carolina also sent three students from St. Mary's. Church people present were so impressed with what these St. Mary's girls meant to Blue Ridge and with what Blue Ridge had meant to St. Mary's School that a plan was launched to bring girls next year from Stuart Hall, Virginia; and, within the next few years, from many other schools in the South.

The aim for next year is 150 Episcopalians at Blue Ridge, with as large a proportion as possible college students. Wouldn't it be a wonderful thing if 100 college and high school students could be gathered there from our Church? If any person, or branch, would like to give one-half the expenses of a delegate for next year from St. Mary's or the University, or the Normal College, please send \$25.00 to the Treasurer, Mrs. W. D. Burwell, Henderson.

WILL YOU DISCUSS THE FOLLOWING AT A MEETING THIS YEAR AND LET THE CHAIRMAN OF THE LIFE-WORK COMMITTEE (See Page 6) HAVE YOUR FINDINGS AND PLANS TO PASS ON TO OTHER BRANCHES?

1. How can we bring before nurses training in the hospital in our town the need for nurses in the Mission Fields at home and abroad?

2. How can we bring before the teachers in our community the need for teachers in the Mission Field at home and abroad?

3. How can we get the Spirit of Missions and great Missionary biographies into our public library?

4. How can we use thrilling Missionary biographies to the best advantage?

5. How can we arrange for a good Missionary play or pageant for our community?

6. In what other ways can we help the Board of Missions find Missionaries for the work at home and abroad?

Every morning at 7:30 prayers are being offered that "many men and women full of faith and the Holy Ghost may go from this Diocese into the mission field." Will you be one of these intercessors?

The United Offering, a Victory Offering?

Three years ago the North Carolina branch determined that the United Offering in 1919 should be not less than \$5,000. About \$2,000 remains to be raised between now and October 1 and no one doubts that we will do it. But is this aim, \$5,000, worthy of us now?

Since this goal was set, we have been at war. Our very souls have been tried with fire but God saved us from the depths into which other nations had to enter. We prayed unto Him and He delivered us out of all our trouble. Surely we shall not be unmindful in our first great thank-offering since victory was given us of all His benefits—giving no more than we had planned to give before the war!

Many other dioceses are gathering great victory offerings to present in Detroit because of their deep thankfulness and because of the pressing need. The Pennsylvania branch has this to say to the women of the Church:

"Yes, the War of the Nation is over, but the Church is still the Church Militant. Peace is not yet. The Soldiers of the Cross are not returning. They fight on at the front against the powers of darkness. Ofttimes they are in weariness and loneliness, but their hearts are willing and glad "In the Service of the King." They look to us, as did the Soldiers under the Flag, for love and sympathy, for prayers and gifts. Women of the Church, what are we doing about it, and shall not each one of us make a "Victory Offering" (large or small) because of the war that is off and for the war that is on?"

The last Sunday in September, in this diocese, is the special United Offering Day. May we see to it that every woman in every parish of the diocese knows about this opportunity to make this Victory Offering, and the need for it? And then on Sunday, September 28, when this is presented may we ask our rector to preach a special sermon, calling for workers for the Mission Field? Miss Lindley is asking the women of the Auxiliary to "pray that one result of the Triennial may be a wonderful offering of lives to the Mission Field."

Extracts from the Minutes of the Annual Meeting

The thirty-seventh Annual Meeting of the North Carolina branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was held in the Church of the Holy Comforter, Burlington, April 22-24.

The opening meeting took place on Tuesday evening, when the Auxiliary listened to a splendid address by Miss Grace Lindley on the effects of the Advent Call and the Nation-Wide Campaign.

At the close of the address, the meeting of diocesan officers was held—all officers but three being present.

The following matters were presented for discussion:

1. A plan for making North Carolina a self-supporting diocese.

2. The Treasurer's request that the Central Fund be increased to 25 cents instead of 10 cents per member. This increase was voted.

3. Stationery for diocesan officers. This matter was left in the hands of the President and Secretary.

4. Whether the present chairmen of diocesan committees be made permanent. This was done.

5. What disposition to make of about \$50 reported by Rev. N. C. Hughes to be on hand for his work among prisoners. It was moved that Mr. Hughes be asked to keep the amount until more information as to the work at the State farm could be gained.

6. Miss Lindley suggested that all specials be completed before December on account of the Nation-Wide Campaign.

The celebration of the Holy Communion at 7:30 o'clock was well attended.

At 10:30 the thirty-seventh Annual Meeting was called to order by the president, Mrs. W. A. Hoke. After prayer Mrs. J. H. Holt welcomed the women to Burlington with a few gracious words. Seven officers and twenty-seven branches responded to roll-call, there being seven

officers and thirty-six delegates present. Reports of officers and chairmen of committees were read. Miss Rebecca Cameron, after more than twenty-seven years correspondent of the C. P. C., tendered her resignation. Mrs. Bickett, Mrs. Arrington and Mrs. London were appointed by Mrs. Hoke to convey to Miss Cameron the love and regret of the Auxiliary. At 12 M. the convention spent ten minutes in prayer and it was very inspiring that so many women voiced petitions and thanksgivings.

At 12:30 Miss Ellen Lay conducted the Conference on the M. E. M. Conference at Blue Ridge, first telling of the wonderful effect Blue Ridge had had on the lives of many St. Mary's girls and paying a glowing tribute to the work of Susan Smith. Mrs. H. G. Cooper told of the inspiration derived from the "Morning Watch" at Blue Ridge and Miss Katherine Batts of that held at St. Mary's during Lent—the average attendance of the latter being 20. Miss Corinna Gant gave an interesting talk on the "Social" side of Blue Ridge.

Before adjournment the branches were asked to report the names of members who had died the past year and many were named.

At 2:30, after prayer, Miss Lindley addressed the meeting on the New Junior Plan—first calling attention to the fact that the United Offering to be presented next fall at Detroit would be a Victory Thank Offering. Taking up her assigned subject, Miss Lindley said she still considered the Junior Work the most important; that "the next generation might see the coming of the Lord" because they may do the thing we have not done, evangelize the world in their generation. The idea is to co-ordinate all young people's societies into a "League of Service," which is the name suggested for the new organization. Miss Lindley said further that it was about decided to limit the "Little Helpers" to what is now the "Font Roll" and when the child becomes a member of the Sunday School admitting it into the "League of Service." Mrs.

Bonner, Junior Educational Secretary, spoke next, telling of the work of the General Board of Religious Education and urging the use of the Christian Nurture Series.

It was moved and carried that a message be sent Miss Cheshire expressing love and regret at her absence and Mrs. Spruill was appointed to do this. The Secretary was requested to send notes of regret to the absent officers.

The meeting then adjourned to attend an informal reception given by the Burlington branch at the rectory.

During the evening meeting, there was an address by Bishop Cheshire in which he urged the organization of the Auxiliary in every parish and mission and in which he commended the work of the American Church Institute for Negroes. Mrs. H. G. Cooper made an enthusiastic talk on the "United Offering—Prayer and the Gift of Money." This was followed by the Rev. H. O. Nash, Rector of St. Andrew's Church, Greensboro, on "The Gift of Life." He urged that in the clothing and feeding and improving the condition of people the greater responsibility of bringing them to Christ be not overlooked as is so often the case in the social service ideas of the present time.

The Bishop was the celebrant at the celebration on Thursday morning; assisted by the rector, Rev. J. B. Gible. At this service the United Offering was presented.

At 10:30 Mrs. J. S. Holmes led the Conference on "How to Interest War Workers in Church Activities," and a very interesting discussion followed.

The matter of aiding the Colored Auxiliary was next brought up and it was moved and carried that a message be sent the president of the colored branch that she may call on us for assistance in organizing branches.

The vote was taken as to how this diocesan branch stands on the question of women on the Board of Mis-

sions and by a large majority it was decided in the affirmative.

It was announced that \$800 would make this diocese self supporting so far as the white work is concerned. Mrs. Bickett called upon the meeting to raise this amount and \$1,115 was immediately subscribed—largely by individuals, not branches.

Mrs. Hoke announced that the United Offering up-to-date is \$3,032.75—leaving nearly \$2,000 to be raised by September, and that the total amount given by the North Carolina branch this year was \$8,164.63.

Miss Hall presented the needs of the Thompson Orphanage, asking for bolts of cloth for underclothing, of which 14 bolts were immediately promised. Miss Hall also asked for clothing and shoes for boys from 5 to 15 years of age; and for table-cloths and napkins.

Mrs. Bickett moved that a rising vote of appreciation be given to Mrs. S. P. Arrington of Warrenton, which was eagerly done. Then Mrs. Bickett spoke of the Bronson Memorial at the Thompson Orphanage asking for 30 cents from every Auxiliary member.

The last session began with the Conference on the "Advent Call and Call to Service," led by Mrs. Bickett in which she emphasized the importance of the work of the American Church Institute for Negroes and urged that this diocese give the \$925 asked of it.

Ninety-five dollars was subscribed in order to again pay half the expenses of five St. Mary's girls to the Blue Ridge Missionary Conference. Miss Jessamine Gant, of Burlington, was appointed chairman of a committee to secure funds for the school for missionaries' children at Kuling, China.

It was suggested that branches hold Mother's Meetings and that each branch be asked to interest itself in rural work—to urge church women out-of-town to come into town to service and to meetings. Miss Hall asked that every branch appoint an Educational Secretary. Mrs.

London urged that War Workers now put their energies into Church work. Mrs. Alston talked about the Treasure and Trinket Fund and asked for more silver in order to complete the Communion service. Mrs. John Bennett, of Rockingham, made the report for the Courtesy Committee and after a telegram of thanks for coming to us was sent Miss Lindley, the thirty-seventh Annual Meeting came to an end.

*Report of the President of the Woman's Auxiliary,
Diocese of North Carolina*

A year has passed since the resignation of Miss Kate Cheshire deprived the North Carolina Auxiliary of its devoted and efficient President, after her fourteen years of faithful service. In her last report, she said: "At this time, the two words that stir the heart are God and Country," and we understood because we were then under the shadow of the great conflict in which our boys were giving their lives and our women their time and strength for our Country and all were feeling the need for God. "We cried unto the Lord in our trouble and He delivered us from our distress." And now, as we come together again, with thankful hearts that our prayers were heard and victory and peace have come to our land, I think we realize that the year of suffering and sorrow and of prayer has brought to us a clearer vision of the spiritual needs of all the nations of the earth and that our patriotism must grow into that love of country that will strive to make her worthy to be used of God in His plan of salvation for the whole world; that Christian America, guided by the Holy Spirit, may lead other nations into the fold of Christ, where they may find "Eternal Life" which is "the gift of God."

What share can the women of the Auxiliary in North

Carolina have in this splendid task? Our leader at the Missions House, Miss Lindley, has set standards for the National Auxiliary that we shall do well to follow and she has come herself from New York, at our earnest request, to talk to us and to help us face our responsibility during these days of tremendous opportunity. In your name, I wish now to thank her for coming and for her beautiful message to us last night.

After the Civil War, Bishop Atkinson made his visitation at Scotland Neck and, seeing how heavily the people had lost during the war, he asked if they would be able to go on with their Church work at home and give as much to Missionary work as they had previously done. The answer was: "We intend to do more because the need is greater." Shall we not today live up to this ideal that is ours by inheritance? The greater need is here. Is the self-sacrificing love of our forefathers here also?

This year has been to us a testing time. How have we borne the test? In the midst of war and pestilence and discouragements, our work has been blessed with the following results, as shown in the reports of officers:

The Educational Secretary reports 80 study classes with 800 students. A Junior Educational Secretary has lately been appointed and is doing efficient work.

Only about one-third of the branches answered the questionnaires sent out which makes it impossible to give list of branches observing Intercessory and Corporate Communion Days. These days are most helpful to the branches that are faithful in their observance and it is hoped they will be generally kept throughout the Diocese in future.

Miss Lindley has outlined for us "The Nation-Wide Campaign" and we know North Carolina must be in line ready to do her duty and her first duty, it seems to me, is to start at home and make the diocese strong to take her place in the nation for the work before us.

I should like to see this assembly of women put itself on record as favoring a movement for the diocese to assume the support of all Missionary work within its borders and to send a message to the Bishop and the Convention saying the Woman's Auxiliary stands ready to help as soon as it is judged wise to begin such a movement, and make the attempt to place North Carolina among the dioceses that will lead the nation in helping to win the world for Christ.

In all our work, may we abide in Christ and He in us.

Life has become a very solemn and sacred thing to be used as witnesses unto Him, "Both in Jerusalem and in all Judea and in Samaria and unto the uttermost part of the earth."

Every woman in the Church should have a share in this great Thank Offering to be presented at the Convention in Detroit in October of this year.

Think of the work being done by faithful women in all the lands over which our flag flies—East, West, North, South. In China, Japan, Africa! All made possible by our United Offering which has steadily increased year by year. Much has been accomplished. More must be done. Never in the history of our Church have these workers been more needed. Moved by the urgency of the times, and inspired by the thought of what may result if we can furnish sufficient money to enable the Board to send out many more women who are willing to give even their lives for their fellow men and their Master, let us “Press with vigor on” and reach our goal, \$5,000. In submitting this report I do not think that it in any wise represents the work of the C. P. C. in the diocese.

We have 17 parishes connected with the Club and only four reports were returned to me: St. Mary's School, Monroe, Littleton and St. Martin's, Charlotte. According to them, we are sending out regularly 39 current periodicals, 12 persons contributing. Two hundred and forty-four odd magazines have been sent out; and of money, Mrs. Burwell reports \$21.80, and I subsequently sent her \$6.00 from one parish and \$2.00 from another, and Miss Kate McKimmon reported \$6.00 from St. Mary's School, which makes \$35.80 in all.

With this report, I beg to hand in my resignation as correspondent of the C. P. C. for the diocese of North Carolina. Failing health and rapidly increasing blindness set impossible limits to my further usefulness.

In giving up this work I most heartily regret that I have proved so unsuccessful with it and earnestly hope that my successor will succeed where I have failed and make it widen into the great and merciful agency that it can become.

And now in taking leave of all my fellow workers, I give them my love and best wishes, and thank them with all my heart for their kindness and patience with me and pray their forgiveness for wherein I may have failed, "For I may not pass this way again."

Report of Junior Educational Secretary, 1918-'19

Madam President and Women of North Carolina: Since my appointment as Junior Educational Secretary I have had time to accomplish very little.

Just before Lent, I sent out letters to the Junior leaders, and also to the leaders of the Little Helpers, requesting them to undertake specific mission study work during Lent. I sent a letter to our Diocesan paper, "The Carolina Churchman" relative to my work. I hope you read it. I suggested the use of the mission study books issued by the Educational Secretary of the Board of Missions.

I regret to say I received few letters in reply to those sent out, but the ones which I did receive made me glad that I had offered suggestions.

At the request of Miss Hunter, I wrote to the Rectors

and Superintendents of every Sunay School in the Diocese asking them to make a special offering for "The American Church Institute for Negroes." I have no definite knowledge of the results of these requests.

I have sent out leaflets and pamphlets; I ordered four dozen Lenten copies of *The Spirit of Missions* for the Sunday School pupils of Christ Church, Raleigh. These were sold by them and both new subscriptions to this splendid missionary magazine of ours were secured and many renewals. I have distributed "*The Missionary Calendar*" also.

We had one normal class for Junior leaders in Raleigh for the several parishes. This class was led by Miss Bertha Richards and was well attended. I cannot report the number of mission study classes held in the Diocese, but hope Miss Hall has them embodied in her report.

I have some definite plans to present to you this afternoon in connection with the Sunday School work. I hope the leaders will co-operate with us in trying them during the coming year.

Let me close with a message from Bishop Lloyd given to the women at the presentation of the United Offering at one of our Triennials: "Take up your work with reverence for your body as the temple of your souls, reverence for God and His work. Never take it up in a hurry simply to be doing but with reverence and sincerity—and always show a willingness to experiment. If discouragements and failure come, take them into that upper chamber where the victorious Master entered and hear Him say 'Peace be with you' and remember that peace is yours."
