IMPORTANT NOTES

1. See Constitution and By-Laws on pages 54-55.
2. The Feast of the Purification is the annual Corporate Communion day for the Woman's Auxiliary of the National Church; and the Eves of the Feasts of St. Andrew, the Epiphany, the Annunciation and the Transfiguration are the special Intercessory Days for the Diocese. Please observe these days.
3. The special prayer for use before and at the time of the election of officers may be found on page 3.
4. Note carefully Article IX of Constitution.
5. Article VII of the Constitution reads in part, "A branch to have voting privileges must have paid the Central Fund."
6. Article VIII, Section 3, reads in part, "From the amount contributed, according to this scale, the Treasurer shall turn over one-half to the Nation-wide Campaign Fund," this amount to be distributed according to the needs as seen by the Presiding Bishop and Council. Inasmuch as this organization is Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council, this money will go to the general fund, therefore any amount a branch may wish to go for diocesan objects should be designated from the remaining half of the branch's contribution.
7. Send all money, except the United Thank Offering, to Mrs. R. B. Davis, 425 Tarboro Street, Rocky Mount, Treasurer. Books close for the year December 31, 1925.
8. Article VIII of the Constitution explains the letter placed by most branches in the list of parish branches and their officers. Where there is no letter the branch either did not enter the scale, which every branch should feel free to do or not do as seems best to its members (a surprisingly large number, however, did follow the new plan), or it did not divide its gifts in a way to approach anywhere near the place in the scale the amount given entitled it. (At least half must go to the General Nation-wide Campaign Fund.) It seems fairer to place no letter by a branch in a case where \$600, for instance, had been given, less than \$250, however, going undesignated, because if a letter had been used it would have been C. Whereas if \$300 or more of this \$600 had been left undesignated—given to the General Nation-wide Campaign Fund—the branch's letter would have been A.

FORM OF BEQUEST

If it is desired that the bequest should be applied to some particular department of the work, there should be substituted for the words, "For the Use of the Society," the words "For Domestic Missions," or "For Foreign Missions," or "For Work Among the Indians," or "For Work Among Colored People," or "For Work in Africa," "For Work in China," etc.

MINUTES OF ANNUAL MEETING

The forty-third annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions and the sixth annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council in the Diocese of North Carolina was opened on the afternoon of Tuesday, April 28th, 1925, at the Church of the Good Shepherd, Rocky Mount, with a Quiet Hour, conducted by Bishop Penick.

At 8:00 p. m. Evening Prayer was said in the Church of the Good Shepherd, followed by words of welcome spoken by Bishop Cheshire and greetings from the parish by Rev. Francis H. Craighill, Rev. Henry D. Phillips, D.D., Rector of Trinity Church, Columbia, S. C., delivered an address on "Peace."

On Wednesday, April 29, at 7:30, Holy Communion was celebrated by Bishop Penick. At this service the U. T. O. was presented, and there was commemoration of the Departed of the Auxiliary.

At 8:45 A. M. breakfast was served at the Parish House of the Presbyterian Church. The subject of this Group Conference was "Our Supply Department," led by Mrs. G. K. B. Wade, from the Church Missions House.

The business session opened at 9:45, the President, Mrs. W. W. Way, presiding. A hymn was sung, prayer was offered by Bishop Penick.

Rules of Order were read by the President, who introduced Mrs. Samuel Lawrence for the Dispatch of Business, whose duty was to keep the time. Mrs. Way read, from the Constitution rules for the election of officers, and announced there would be an election of Treasurer, Social Service Secretary and Educational Secretary. The Secretary called the roll of delegates by Branches.

The following Committees were appointed:

The President read her address.

Mrs. Edmund S. Boice, President of the W. A. of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Rocky Mount, welcomed the Auxiliary to the parish. Miss Mary H. Hinton responded.

The Secretary's report was read and accepted.

The Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

The Church Periodical Club's report was read by Miss Mary Hoke.

Miss Hall moved that telegrams of sympathy be sent Miss Tillotson, Mrs. Spruill, Mrs. Benton and Mrs. Wilkes, all of whom were ill.

Mrs. Bickett, Chairman of the committee serving on the Legislative Council of Women, gave her report.

Mrs. James H. Cordon read report of the Girl's Friendly Society.

Miss Susan Smith spoke on her work in Alaska.

Mrs. Alston gave reports on Prayer Partnership and Treasure and Trinket Fund for St. Margaret's, Tokio.

Mrs. Murphy read her report on Colored Work.

Miss Sophronia Cooper could not be present so her mother, Mrs. H. G. Cooper, read her report on the Offering of Life.

It was asked that Intercessory Days be kept by the Branches.

Rev. I. W. Hughes' report on work of the Church Service League was read by Mrs. Hughes.

At 12:00 M. Noon Prayer and meditation were held by Miss Lindley.

Following this uplifting service, Mr. Frank Spruill, Jr., was introduced and read his mother's report on the U. T. O. Rev. E. Bertram Brown delivered address on U. T. O.

Luncheon was served in the Parish House of the Church of the Good Shepherd by the Woman's Auxiliary of the parish.

Business session began at 2:15 P. M.

The U. T. O. pageant was presented.

Mrs. Delaney read report of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Colored Convocation.

Mrs. Holmes gave her report on Social Service, closing with an appeal for Thompson Orphanage.

Mrs. Bickett spoke impressively on Social Service.

Mrs. Devin gave report of Supply Department, followed by address by Mrs. G. K. B. Wade.

Miss Shaw gave report on Religious Education. Bishop Penick, after a hymn was sung, spoke on this subject and closed the session with prayer.

At 5:00 P. M. a reception was tendered the Auxiliary at the Country Club.

At 8 o'clock Evening Prayer was said. Rev. Albert S. Cooper spoke on "China" and Rt. Rev. Henry St. George Tucker, D.D., LL.D., spoke on "Japanese Reconstruction."

THURSDAY, APRIL 30

Holy Communion was celebrated by Bishop Penick at 7:30 A. M.

At 8:45 in the Presbyterian Parish House the Breakfast Conference was held, when "Our Auxiliary Problems" were discussed, Mrs. Way leading.

The business session opened at 9:45 with hymn 83 and prayers by the Rector, Mr. Craighill.

Miss Hall was called upon for report as Chairman of District Chairmen.

Reports were read by the Chairmen of the nine districts.

St. Philip's, Durham, invited the Auxiliary to meet there in 1926. Accepted. A telegram was received from Rev. Henry G. Lane extending an invitation on behalf of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Raleigh, to meet there next year which arrived after the acceptance of the invitation from St. Philip's.

Report from the Nominating Committee was then presented by the Chairman.

After ballots were cast, it was announced Mrs. R. D. Bulluck was elected Social Service Secretary. Mrs. H. deC. Mazyck, Educational Secretary; Mrs. R. B. Davis, Treasurer.

At 12:00 M. noonday prayer and meditation by Miss Lindley. Hymn No. 111 was sung.

Mr. Alfred Lawrence spoke on "The Needs and Opportunities for Student Work in our Diocese."

Luncheon was served in the Parish House of the Church of the Good Shepherd at 1 o'clock.

At the opening of the business session at 2:00 P. M. a hymn was sung and prayer offered.

The "Bishop Tuttle Memorial" was the first work taken up.

Moved and carried that list be sent District Chairmen and that they raise balance from their Branches.

The following delegates to the Triennial to be held in New Orleans were elected: Mrs. Way, Miss Mary Hoke, Mrs. Bickett, Miss Hall, Mrs. Mazyck.

Alternates elected: Miss Shaw, Mrs. Blair, Miss Arrington, Mrs. H. B. Cooper, Mrs. Devin.

Mr. David Yates delivered address on "Our Young People's Work."

In absence of the Chairman and members of Resolutions Committee the Secretary read the resolutions.

Resolutions to abolish roll call was referred to Executive Committee.

Mrs. Neely asked to send little Chinese girl, Lucy Leo, to Blue Ridge, moved, seconded, carried. Mrs. Neely is to take charge of this, if the girl can go. A call is to be made on Branches and take \$25.00 left over from summer conferences.

Closing words were offered by the President then prayer, after which the annual meeting of 1925 adjourned.

The delegates enjoyed an automobile ride at 4:30 P. M.

At 8 o'clock Evening Prayer was said. Miss Lindley gave an outline of her tour around the world.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

For the first time I stand before you as your president (quoting our Constitution) "to outline the work of the year ahead."

The year past has been an inspiring and successful year in the Auxiliary—successful, as we have accomplished our program as planned—inspiring, because not satisfied with what we *have* done, we look to a future with closer companionship with our Lord, with more earnest prayer and joyful service, doing all we can towards the spread of His Kingdom.

Two things are foremost in our minds as we prepare for the Triennial next October.

First—That we meet our pledge of \$3,000, towards the "Auxiliary Special"—the two houses in New York and St. Augustine's School—one a home for white women in training for missionary work; and for missionaries at home on furlough, preparing for future work in their fields; the other, a training school, the first of its kind, where colored women may be trained for work among their own people. And second—Our United Thank Offering.

The first is a sacred pledge.

The second is a free-will offering, with joyful thanks and prayer.

Our two Bishops have requested that the Auxiliary of this diocese undertake, as a duty and privilege, the support of Miss Lillie Hill in her work at Leaksville. The Executive Committee has accepted this responsibility and you will be given opportunity to endorse their action, if you so desire.

In my work as president I am thankful to express to you my belief that the Auxiliary in this Diocese is well organized for work. The members for the most part are active, and I take this opportunity to express to you my grateful appreciation for your loyal support, your spiritual vision, and the active and loving co-operation I have received. And I ask you in your daily prayers to pray that I may be guided to do my work—I know many of you do this already—even as I pray daily for you.

This excellent organization that we have can only work properly when each member of the Auxiliary in our diocese does *her* part of the work. We have a President, Secretaries of Departments, District Chairmen, etc. When there is a proper response from every call that comes as a part of our work, when every Auxiliary letter is answered promptly, then we shall *know* our real strength and go on to greater things.

There are 87 parishes and missions reported on the Nationwide Campaign roll in our diocese. We report 74 branches, 63 working branches.

I present to you the slogan, "87 parishes and missions, 87 auxiliary branches in the Woman's Auxiliary, before the end of this year 1925." How can we do this? There are nine districts in our Auxiliary, all of them at work. Every place in each district is accessible to our members in that district. Let us help to organize a branch in every mission, in every district, where one is not already established, and encourage and help in the work of these struggling new branches near us by sympathetic co-operation. And let us picture to ourselves those spiritually lonely women, members of the Church in this Diocese, who can attend, only infrequently, the services of the Church, and see that at least they have the opportunity to attend the District meetings and (even if unable to attend *any* meetings) that they have United Thank Offering Boxes and so feel themselves remembered, a part of the Church and working in His vineyard. We have four Intercessory Days with special offerings each year on our Auxiliary program, besides the Annual Corporate Communion held throughout the Church. Some of you keep these days regularly. I hope this year *all* branches will observe them. These days, and many other items of interest and necessary information, are noted in our "Annual Report," which I hope you will read carefully.

In several parishes in the Diocese new Branches of the Auxiliary, composed of *young* women, have been organized. I believe this is a wise plan. The older Branch grows in interest, and the younger women also do splendid work. We feel, when we see the work of these younger women, that the future of the Auxiliary is assured.

I commend to you the suggestion of our Executive Council in New York—"That the Woman's Auxiliary pledge itself to co-operate in helping the diocese meet its quota for the work of the General Church," and "That we assist the diocese in the advanced work of the program assigned each diocese."

And lastly, and first in importance, let us pray earnestly, and work joyfully in our Father's Business. I believe if each of us, before she goes to the meetings of her Branch, prays earnestly that God will guide the work of the meeting, and *her* work in it; that if before every election of officers our prayer is earnestly offered; that if we give prayerfully, as our conscience directs us, the work of the Auxiliary will go forward in each parish or mission as God wills.

I commend to you "The Manual of Family Prayer," "The Daily Bible Readings," the leaflet on the Christian Home, all of which can be obtained here.

Some of us have had the blessing of knowing (as we have read "The Daily Bible Readings" each day) that many of the Auxiliary in our diocese daily read and study the same words, praying together for the strength that comes through the study of His Word.

In the words of another leaflet sent out for our use by our Executive Council, "Let us learn to know Christ by a study of the Gospels," "Seeking to know Him as your companion, your critic, your co-worker." And, "As you honestly take upon yourself His tasks, adopting for your own His Way of life, He will mean everything to you. You will bring joy to *His* heart, and *know* the reality of peace."

SECRETARY'S REPORT

Your Secretary's initial work was conducting the correspondence for the first Executive Board meeting of this administration, held in Christ Church Parish House, Raleigh, June 3, 1924. Later, arrangements were also made for the September and March meetings of the Board. The minutes of the three meetings have been recorded.

After Christmas report blanks were mailed to all branches, old and new. From 72 answers were received, giving a membership of 2,132 and the following information which was sought by the Church Missions House:

In April more than one hundred programs were mailed to every Branch President, members of the Executive Board, Chairmen of Committees, and speakers.

During the year the President and Secretary have worked together one day in each week, unless the correspondence was insufficient to require that amount of time, which was seldom.

All other necessary correspondence received prompt attention. Four hundred and seventy letters and forty cards have been written and sent out.

The best-known and best-loved work in the Church today is that of the United Thank Offering.

What is the purpose of this offering?

It is a woman's work for women. Every woman and young girl in the Church is given a little blue box and asked to place in it an offering when she is thankful. The funds thus obtained supply the needs of our own women who so bravely face the trials and dangers of the Mission Field.

As Bishop Tuttle said: "The United Thank Offering is an outward and visible sign of an inward and spiritual grace," the little blue box representing the material side of this holy work.

In this day of multiple organizations it is a comfort to feel that there is one phase of the Church work which is conducted by each individual, with responsibility to no one but God Himself. The stimulus comes not from public meetings, but from daily contact with our dear Lord. May we reverently call this a little society of two, the individual giver and the blessed Master? In the ordinary society there are assessments and dues, but here we have the joyful exhilaration that comes from the voluntary thank offering.

The isolated woman and the invalid are no longer helpless. Through fervent prayers and secret gifts the wonderful privilege is given them, quietly and alone in their own homes, to aid in the advancement of the Kingdom of Almighty God.

Somehow there is a sense of inadequacy in the merely spoken word of thanks. The language of love is giving, and the individual secret gift is anointed with the oil of gladness above its fellows. I believe that the woman who takes her part in the United Thank Offering is helped in her own soul, and will find a truer happiness in her religion and a deeper reality in the sacramental life of the Church.

Let us dedicate ourselves afresh to this work. We are thankful for our daily blessings, beautiful sunshine, showers, health, friends, food, raiment, escape from accidents, relief from pain. Do our little blue boxes daily receive our expression of this thankfulness?

Let our slogan be: To serve those who serve.

Our aim: A thank offering when we are thankful.

There is an honor roll for the parishes whose offerings are increased each year, but the ideal honor roll is the one in which every woman and girl understands the purpose of the United Thank Offering and has a share in it.

I pray God's blessing on our effort.

Miss Elizabeth Smith (a nurse), from Scotland Neck, has volunteered since last year, and her appointment is pending.

Miss Adelaide Smith, from Charlotte, is continuing her training at the Deaconess House, Philadelphia. This summer she expects to be busy with the ten weeks summer work that is required.

The second phase of the work of the Committee on the Offering of Life is that of encouraging and securing funds for Diocesan Delegates to Summer Conferences. And that you may see how these two work together, I will say that in a recent letter from Miss Adelaide Smith, I learned that the Deaconess House at Philadelphia expects to send a representative to Blue Ridge this summer, and Miss Smith especially wished that should any of our volunteers be there that they should meet her and then learn about the Deaconess House and the offered training so necessary for the Mission Field.

Our committee is especially anxious that each of you understands about our Diocesan Delegates to Summer Conferences.

We wish you to know definitely (1) how the money is collected; (2) what is the purpose of the money; (3) who are the delegates.

(1) How the money is collected?

The Committee on the Offering of Life sent out letters, signed by the chairman of the committee, to each parish branch of the Auxiliary, asking for a contribution to be sent Mrs. Parks and designated Diocesan Summer Conference Delegates. Of course, we are interested in your parish delegates, and trust that you are sending a goodly number, but our committee is concerned only about the financing of those sent from the Diocese-at-large. In response to this letter, donations to this fund have amounted to \$95.

(2) What is the purpose of the money?

The purpose of this fund is to bring to the student life of our Church the information and the inspiration of the great Church Conferences.

(3) Who are the delegates?

The amount of the money sent in largely determines the number of delegates. This year our committee, with the hearty approval of our Diocesan President, has decided to send two girls to Blue Ridge and one to Sewanee. You may know that the distance to Sewanee will necessarily make the cost of one delegate to Sewanee almost equal that of two to Blue Ridge. We especially wish you to know that the Auxiliary does not pay all of the expenses of these delegates. To the Blue Ridge delegate \$25 is given; the remainder of the expenses, which is between \$25 and \$30, is paid by the delegate herself. To the Sewanee delegate \$50 is given, and she herself pays the remainder—about \$30.

The delegates are elected by the Saint Mary's student body, and the delegates for the 1925 Summer Conferences are:

REPORT OF SOCIAL SERVICE DEPARTMENT

We have adopted as our Diocesan policy—a policy upon which the Auxiliary could unite as a whole—the strengthening and support of agencies already existing for the social betterment of our State, and particularly the State Department of Public Welfare. In addition to this general policy, we have developed local organization for the strengthening and spread of local social service work, and we now have in about forty branches a chairman specially in charge of this phase of the Auxiliary work. We should not be content, however, until every parish, no matter how small, shows a feeling of responsibility toward the life of the local community.

Our branches have studied the activities of the State Department of Public Welfare through the educational work of the Social Service Department of the Auxiliary. I think I may say that the State welfare institutions have been placed on the map, as it were, for our Church people.

Our social service committees have also co-operated with other agencies in a study of the Juvenile Court system as it works in our State, with a view to help make it what it should become—a great child-saving agency. These committees have moreover focussed attention upon a condition in North Carolina that is holding back a large class of our citizens. I refer to the condition of tenancy among the white and colored populations on our farms in Eastern and Piedmont North Carolina.

Bearing in mind the teaching of Jesus that the forces of evil should be attacked in His Name, the Church (through the Auxiliary) has taken a brave step in allying herself with the

secular women's organizations for remedial legislation. The work of the Women's Legislative Council has already been reported upon by the chairman of your representatives on the council, and so I shall not go into detail concerning it. But what encouragement can we find to offset the apparent failure of our efforts in this direction? First, and foremost, a real interest in welfare legislation has been aroused in our branches. This is attested by the fact that our quota for the expenses of the council in its legislative activities has been oversubscribed by \$27.50, which sum has been given to the Samarcand Chapel, and that as many as thirty branches, ranging from the very largest down to the very smallest, had a share in sums ranging from \$15 to \$1 in subscribing this fund of \$177.50.

I wish that all the parish reports could be read and incorporated in the Annual Report. That is impossible, but I shall mention a few of the outstanding things that are being done besides the usual care of the sick, visits to jails, Christmas boxes, etc., etc. I find from Winston-Salem "co-operation in a practical way with the local Child Welfare Department and a series of talks given before the Auxiliary by the head of this work"; from Henderson, "aid to Colored Hospital and money sent to Samarcand Chapel"; from Charlotte, "a free clinic at Saint Peter's Hospital for tonsil cases, \$300 given to the Good Samaritan Hospital, a talk by the Commissioner of Public Welfare; from Durham, response to emergency call for aid in suffering caused by industrial situation in one of our mill towns, close co-operation with the Superintendent of Public Welfare; society of young girls formed for welfare work, with the Auxiliary social service chairman as adviser; from Greensboro, the "endorsement of international peace plans and representation at the Sociological Congress held in Charlotte"; from Wadesboro, "support of a tubercular patient for three months at a sanatorium"; from the Good Shepherd, Raleigh, the support of an old lady at Saint Luke's Home at an annual cost of \$300. Particularly fine was the report sent in by the Rocky Mount branch, whose activities along social lines cover almost every field that one can think of, including visits to many of the State institutions, and involving an expenditure of several hundred dollars. These items are gleaned from full reports

sent me, and they can probably be matched by many other branches which have not, however, reported to me their local work.

REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT

Surely no Educational Secretary could have been more fortunate in being called into service than at the annual meeting held in Saint Martin's Church, Charlotte, three years ago! At this time the district system was inaugurated and the Diocese divided into nine districts, thereby simplifying and systematizing the work, making it possible to present the wonderful programs adopted by the Church to nine groups of women comprising almost the entire Diocesan organization. In this way, reaching out and coming into personal touch not only with every branch of the Auxiliary, even to the smallest and most remote, but with every individual member. No innovation in the organization in recent years has been more progressive or more effective.

Under the old system, educational work may be regarded as having been largely preparatory for the new day that was dawning and the wider field of service in store for the women of the Church. We have become not only citizens, but citizens of the world. The ends of the earth have been brought nearer together, and we must think and act in terms of the world.

It has been said there is everywhere a growing consciousness of the unity of mankind, and there was never a time in history when clear thinking and sound Christian education were of greater importance than the present in order to face the difficult situations before us and to arrive at a correct solution of the problems.

To meet the changed conditions the Church has marshalled her forces and organized a great nation-wide campaign of education and service. Splendid leaders are giving their time and their best efforts—the responsibility now rests upon us! The questions for us to decide are, "Do you know?" "What shall we do about it?" Two small pamphlets bearing these names are suggested for your consideration. As educational work for

Church as well as State now begins in the early fall and practically ceases in the early summer, these annual meetings may, in a way, be called the close of the school year, to be followed by Summer Conferences that make our vacations count and well worth-while. Gone, indeed, are the days when there was nothing to be done! In making out reports for the year's work, much is always left to be desired, but it must be remembered that, after all, Christian education is only in its pioneer stage. Some one has gone so far as to speak of the efforts that have been made as first aid to the injured. However, where there are signs of life and growth, there is always hope, and it may be truly said that there has been increased interest and progress in every department. Old branches have awakened with renewed vigor and new ones have been formed, all coming under observation of the Educational Department, have done something—many have done well.

In connection with mission study for the year, "One Hundred Questions on China" were sent out, and to the first circle, Roanoke Rapids, District of Edgecombe, has been awarded the distinction of having returned the largest number of correct answers. If others have gained as much from the work of the past three years as the Educational Secretary herself, she should be satisfied.

I thank you for your co-operation and for the privilege of serving you.

REPORT OF THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

The Church Periodical Club of the Diocese of North Carolina is made up of thirty-six branches, about half of which are active at the present time. The report for the year 1924 is incomplete, due to the fact that only ten of these branches sent in statements of their year's work. The work reported is as follows:

Current periodicals sent regularly.....	58

In addition to this, upon the request of Miss Isabel Graves, a teacher at the Valle Crucis Mission School, \$5 was sent to buy books needed for the School Library.

While this report is small, we are glad to be able to say that the Church Periodical Club work has been growing during the past few months, and it is earnestly hoped that at the end of this year all the various branches will be doing active work. It has been said of the club:

"The Church Periodical Club is a society through which magazines, books, cards, and pictures are sent out all over the world to those who need them. It offers opportunity for service to all in the Church who have any wish to serve. The C. P. C. is for every one in the Church; its work is so varied that there are few, indeed, who cannot do something for it. It is your organization, and without your help it could not do its splendid and most necessary work."

When we realize that every magazine in our homes can be used to great advantage and can bring enlightenment and pleasure to those who need it most, and also when we realize that there are so many different phases to the club that every one in each parish can serve it in one way or another, then we see how great an opportunity for service lies open to us in this field. For those who can give money, there are always urgent calls for books for libraries in the universities and colleges of the Mission Field. For those who subscribe to periodicals, there is the plea to have them forwarded each month. This is the chief work of the club, and in this connection there has come a special appeal from headquarters that more Church papers be offered, as there is an increasing request for them. Then there is always a place in hospitals, institutions and homes around us for books of all kinds and magazines which can be passed on when read by us.

"The neighbors whom you can serve through the C. P. C. are found, not only from Maine to California, but from Liberia to Tokyo, and from Alaska to the Philippines. They are of 'all sorts and conditions of men.' Some of them are clergymen and missionaries in isolated posts and the people among whom these work. Some of them are in hospitals, in prisons, in almshouses and orphanages; others are soldiers in distant army

posts and sailors on long voyages. A great many of them are just individual neighbors scattered all over this country and in far-away corners of the world: women on lonely farms, men isolated by the snows of the long Alaskan winter, invalids shut in by pain and weakness. But, one and all, they need 'something to read.'

It will be of interest to you to know that in answer to an appeal from our Diocesan officers to the Executive Secretary of the C. P. C., a Lectern Bible has been promised by the club for the new Episcopal Church at Albemarle, N. C.

REPORT OF PRAYER PARTNERSHIP PLAN

Since our last annual meeting I have requested that the Prayer Partnership Plan be carried on in this Diocese by the method used first by the District of Mecklenburg—i.e., each branch in each district should write to and pay special attention to its Prayer Partner for one month, in rotation with the other branches in that district, while the whole district is asked to pray for her regularly. The missionary is not expected to answer all these letters, but any letter received from her should be sent to all the branches in the district.

Nearly all the districts have adopted this plan, and I ask that those who have not will do so as soon as possible. I also ask that each district chairman will appoint a special chairman for this plan (as has the District of Edgecombe), whose duty it will be to attend to the details and keep the importance of the plan before all the branches in her district.

May I suggest that in writing to the missionaries we make it plain that we need their help to increase our interest in the mission field and that we need their prayers? If we can gain their spirit, God's Kingdom will come.

A personal contact with the workers in the field and those who stay at home must be established. Miss Lindley devised this plan for that purpose. Let us, with the help of the Holy Spirit, renew our efforts to make it a success in North Carolina.

REPORT OF GIRLS' FRIENDLY SOCIETY

As President of the Girls' Friendly Society of the Diocese of North Carolina, I feel that it is a privilege to say a few words about the Friendly to this representative body of women, the Woman's Auxiliary.

The Girls' Friendly Society is the Church's organized effort and purpose to reach every girl, whatever her creed or race, at as early age as possible, to induce her to pledge herself to strive for the best things in life—spiritual, intellectual and social—and to help her attain them.

The Girls' Friendly Society was founded in England fifty-one years ago by Mrs. Townsend, who saw the need to band together girls and women for mutual aid and help, sympathy and prayer. It was organized in this country two years later, and we will celebrate our fiftieth anniversary in 1927.

Think of the Christian lives, character and service of over 60,000 girls and women banded together, not only to *be*, but to *do*—to be the highest type of Christian womanhood and to do for others for the Glory of God. It is here that we women of the Church should realize our responsibility and opportunity to serve the girls of our Church and *all* girls, for, you know, membership is open to girls of all denominations. An opportunity is thus afforded to the Church to expand its influence in the community, for girls cannot attend the weekly meetings of the Friendly without being inspired by the beautiful and impressive service of the Church.

You women have so much to give. A seed planted brings forth an hundredfold, and so your influence on girls will bring forth an hundredfold—nay, much more. We budget our money; why not budget our personality? There is not a talent *you have* that is not needed in the Friendly, as we have various departments in it: Missions (last year we gave \$33,507), Social Service (giving over \$45,000 last year), Literature and Social Amusement; so you women who have not lost your youthfulness and ability to understand young girls can do a wonderful work as leaders of these girls. The responsibility is yours.

We have in our Diocese seven branches which are doing splendid work, the one here in Rocky Mount especially. A

year or two ago they made \$100 and gave it to the Rector for the parish; so you see we are doing work for the parish as well as Missions and Social Service.

Many of you may not know that we have a Girl's Friendly Lodge in Raleigh, where a girl can get board and lodging for \$7 a week. If at any time any of you know of a girl coming to Raleigh who wants a home, send her to the Lodge, where she will be well taken care of and chaperoned. We are most fortunate in having a house-mother, Mrs. Portia McClenaghan, who has the happy faculty of understanding girls, and they love her. I wish you could see the nice letters which Mrs. McClenaghan receives from the girls who have been there; you would then understand the home atmosphere which pervades the Lodge. Every girl's birthday is celebrated by a birthday cake which is made by one of the directors of the Lodge.

Now, ladies, if you haven't a branch of the Friendly in your parish, I want you to talk to your Rector as soon as you get home and organize one. Is there any girl that does not need the cardinal principles of the Friendly—Purity of Life, Dutifulness to Parents, and Faithfulness in Work and Thrift?

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RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were adopted at the Annual Meeting, 1925.

Resolved, That our delegates to the Triennial be given authority to meet as an Executive Committee of the Provincial Synod.

In conformity with the request of the Executive Committee of the Women's Legislative Council made at its final session during the meeting of the Legislature, that the same program of legislation that was presented this year be endorsed by each organization represented in the Council for presentation before the 1927 General Assembly, we hereby endorse the program and promise to use our best efforts to further these important measures.

Resolved, That the offering on the Intercessory Day at the Epiphany be taken for Dr. A. W. Tucker's Insurance and "At the disposal of Mrs. A. W. Tucker."

Resolved, That according to Article IX of the Constitution, this body formally adopt the Amendment to the Constitution "that the District Chairmen shall be members of the Executive Committee of the Woman's Auxiliary."

Recognizing the fact that the Woman's Auxiliary is Auxiliary to the National Council, and that the responsibility for raising the apportionment should be shared by the women of the Church as well as by the men, therefore be it

Resolved: (a) That a Committee shall be appointed (or elected) in each branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to assist the Rector and the Parish Treasurer in raising the apportionment.

(b) That the Chairman of this Committee shall request the Parish Treasurer to notify her whenever the payments to the Nation-Wide Campaign do not equal the apportionment, and shall bring this deficit to the attention of the members of the Auxiliary.

(c) That the Committee shall then with the advice of the Rector and in cooperation with the Parish Treasurer endeavor to raise the money due from that Parish (or mission).

(d) That Copies of this resolution be sent to every branch of the Auxiliary.

Resolved, That on our pledge list we have a fund at Bishop Penick's disposal.

Resolved, That the Woman's Auxiliary to the Diocese of N. C. assume the privilege and pleasure of providing the sum of \$600.00 for the support of Miss Lillie Haines Hill, who is doing such splendid work at St. Andrew's Mission.

Moved and carried that lists of pledges for Auxiliary Special be sent each District Chairman and they take up the matter with the Branches who have not pledged.

It is our earnest conviction that the bringing of international peace and goodwill is the most momentous problem before the world today, and that no efforts to obtain peace can be effective which are not based on the education of the individual. In view of the fact that the branches which have pursued during recent months the course of study recommended by the Presiding Bishop and Council have had their faith in the righteousness of Peace and in the possibility of the abolition of war greatly strengthened and deepened; we therefore recommend the further study of constructive methods of obtaining Peace to all branches of the Auxiliary, and urge that before next October they devote further time and effort to the study of this vital subject, in order that the women of the Church as a body may add their influence to the effort that the General Convention will certainly make towards this end.

CONSTITUTION**ARTICLE I****NAME**

The name of this organization shall be "The North Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church."

ARTICLE II**OBJECT**

The object of this organization shall be to enlist the women of the diocese in active service for making the Christ known throughout the world. This object shall be carried out through Missions, Religious Education, and Christian Social Service; and by means of faithful and definite prayer, study, systematic giving of means and service, and by finding recruits for the mission fields.

ARTICLE III**MEMBERSHIP**

The membership of this organization shall be composed of all parish and mission branches within the diocese.

ARTICLE IV**OFFICERS**

SECTION 1. The officers of this organization shall be: a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Secretary of the Department of Education, a Secretary of the Department of Social Service, and a Custodian of the United Thank Offering.

SEC. 2. These officers, with the District Chairmen, shall constitute the Executive Committee, and shall meet in September and March of each year.

ARTICLE V

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The President shall have general oversight of all work and shall appoint all committees unless otherwise provided for. She shall preside at all meetings and at every annual meeting shall address the Auxiliary—outlining the work for the year ahead.

SEC. 2. The Vice-President shall act in the absence of the President and shall have charge of the Box Work.

SEC. 3. The Secretary shall record the proceedings of the Diocesan branch, carry on all necessary correspondence, prepare and have printed the Annual Report, and at each annual meeting shall make report of the past year's work of the branch.

SEC. 4. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money except the United Thank Offering, and shall make report of same at the annual meeting. She shall, at the end of every fiscal year, turn over accounts to a public auditor for verification, and shall publish his statement along with her report in the Annual Report. The Treasurer shall act as chairman of the Committee on Credentials.

SEC. 5. The Secretary of the Department of Education shall have charge of the educational program of the branch.

SEC. 6. The Secretary of the Department of Social Service shall have charge of the social service work of the branch.

SEC. 7. The United Thank Offering Custodian shall receive the United Thank Offering in March and September and shall deposit same in a savings bank or immediately remit to the Treasurer of the Presiding Bishop and Council for investment. The Custodian shall make every effort to secure the interest and a contribution from every woman in the Diocese.

ARTICLE VI

TERM OF OFFICE

SECTION 1. The President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary of the Department of Education, Secretary of the Department of Social Service, and United Thank Offering Custodian

shall be elected for a term of three years; the President to be elected at the second annual meeting after the Triennial; the Treasurer, Secretary of the Department of Education and Secretary of the Department of Social Service the third meeting after the Triennial; and the Vice-President and United Thank Offering Custodian the first meeting after the Triennial. No officer shall be eligible for two consecutive full terms. Vacancies occurring during the year shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

SEC. 2. The Secretary shall be appointed by the President for one year.

ARTICLE VII

ELECTIONS

SECTION 1. For the election of the President: The President shall appoint, at the annual meeting, a committee of three to receive nominations. Nominations must be in writing, except any that may be made from the floor at the time of election, and from these written nominations the committee shall present three names. If there is no majority on the first ballot, all names shall be dropped but the two having the largest number of votes.

SEC. 2. Any delegate may nominate, but a branch may cast but one vote. A branch to have voting privilege must have paid the Central Fund. No vote shall be cast by proxy. All elections shall be by ballot.

SEC. 3. All other elective officers shall be chosen according to the manner prescribed for the election of the President.

ARTICLE VIII

FINANCE

SECTION 1. The Treasurer shall send to every branch, two months before the annual meeting, the following sliding scale: Class A, \$600; Class B, \$500; Class C, \$400; Class D, \$300; Class E, \$200; Class F, \$100; Class G, \$50; Class H, \$25; Class I, \$10; Class J, \$5; and at the annual meeting each branch shall designate the class which it decides to enter.

SEC. 2. The United Thank Offering, Box Work, and Central Fund shall be in addition to the contributions made according to this sliding scale.

SEC. 3. From the amount contributed according to this scale the Treasurer shall turn over one-half to the Nation-wide Campaign Fund—not to be counted on the parish pledge unless so requested—and one-half to such specials as the parish branch may designate.

ARTICLE IX

AMENDMENTS

This Constitution may be amended at the annual meeting of the Diocesan branch by a two-thirds vote of the duly appointed representatives, due notice of the proposed amendments having been given to every branch at least one month before the annual meeting.

BY-LAWS

The time and place for the annual meeting of two and a half days shall be approved by the Bishop and the Executive Committee.

1. The Order of Business for the annual meeting shall be arranged by the Executive Committee.

2. Each branch shall be assessed twenty-five cents per member to provide for Provincial expenses, printing, postage, stationery, and traveling expenses of speakers; \$50 shall be set aside from this fund for the President's traveling expenses. All offerings at district meetings and institutes, except when given for some special object, shall be added to this fund, which shall be known as the Central Fund.

3. The annual report of the Church Periodical Club may be printed in the Annual Report.

4. One-fourth of the branches having the right to vote shall constitute a quorum at the annual meeting. Three members shall constitute a quorum at the Executive Committee meetings.

5. These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a majority of the delegates to any annual meeting.
