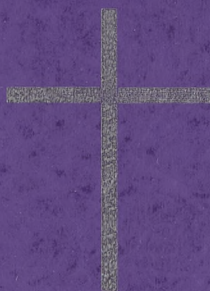

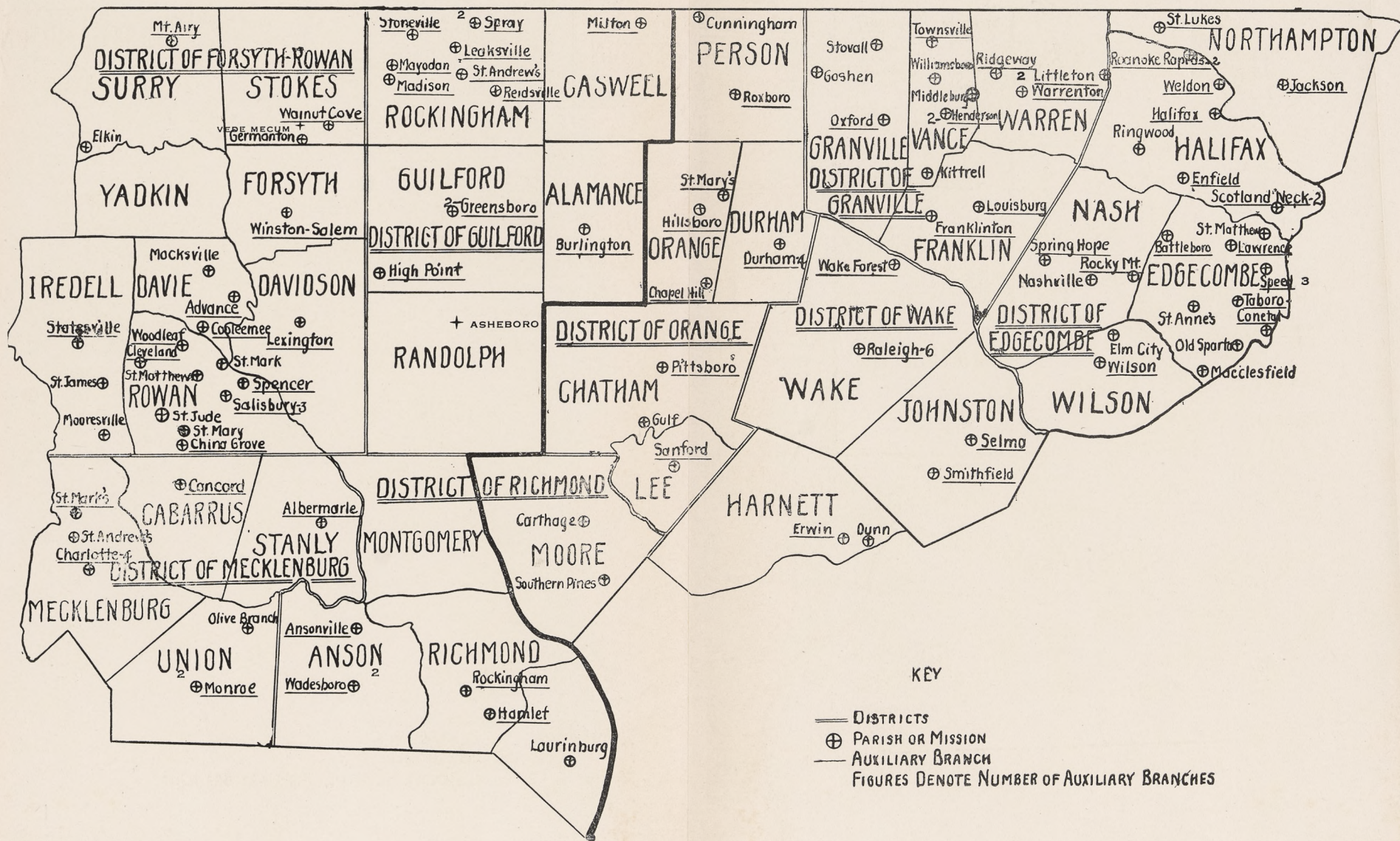

THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY IN THE LIFE OF THE CHURCH

OUR IDEAL

That Christ may dwell in your hearts by faith; that ye, being rooted and grounded in love,

May be able to comprehend with all saints what is the breadth, and length, and depth, and height;

An to know the love of Christ, which passeth knowledge, that ye might be filled with all the fulness of God.—EPH. iii:17, 18, 19.

What does it mean to be a member of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council? Taking a mite-box, going to a meeting now and then, sewing for a missionary box, attending an occasional missionary service? Often it does mean just that; sometimes it means much less; but it can mean infinitely more.

Over and above these "practical things" it ought to mean a world-wide view of what the Church of God is sent to do, and a deep and real sense of personal responsibility for sharing in that mission. Do we think of the Church as the Body of Christ, doing the mind of its Head. Are we, as members of the Auxiliary, constantly seeking to learn the mind of Christ, that we may obey it in our own lives and interpret it to others? The question is not so much, What are we doing? as, How are we doing it? Do we work on our knees, doing our work so consciously in the presence of God that it receives His blessing, talking over everything with Him before we try to do it? Do we ask Him always to show us what His Will is, and to empty us of self, that we may be filled full of Him, so that He may work in and through us?

We need great ideals. We need to realize the Christ working in us. We need to commit ourselves to infinite things, and then to put such a spirit into the Church as shall cause the things done to be done in the spirit of Christ. If we all would put the emphasis in the right place it would be a tremendous source of power. Are we, as members of the Auxiliary, vitally conscious that we are sharing in the work of bringing souls out of darkness into His marvelous light? All the religions earth ever had were trying to find out God. No one is wicked because he is a Buddhist or a Hindu. He is only waiting for his answer, and Christianity is his answer. This is our priceless possession, and the world is pleading that we give it to all men. The revelation of God must be given to all men because Christ is praying always that they may know the Father so that they may come back home again. Does it fire our imagination, and kindle our zeal, and deepen our compassion, to realize that our Father's heart is breaking because so many of His children do not know? To this high task we are called. He has planned no other way. He has given us the world

to win for Him. Our hearts ought to sing all the time for joy that He has blessed us with the privilege of being workers together with Him.

Is this what it means to us to be members of the Woman's Auxiliary? If it means this, we shall go to our meetings with our minds and hearts full of the news and needs of the field; and meetings will no longer be dull and uninspiring. If it means this, the sewing for our missionary boxes will not be irksome, for our imagination will picture the place to which each box is going and the people to whom it will bring joy. If it means this, every Eucharist will become a service of intercession in which we join our prayers with Christ's for all the souls whom He has redeemed with His most precious Blood.

Even hours of enforced idleness and pain can be made to count for the Kingdom by prayers, broken and fragmentary though they be, for all those who suffer without relief or hope.

Let us identify our work more closely with the field. All we need is a little imagination to see that making bandages for a far-off hospital is as romantic an exploit as binding up a broken Chinese head. It is all part of the same work. The missionary nurse, moving daily amid sights and sounds of suffering, does not speak flippantly about her mission; yet how often we jest about ours. Is it because we do not realize, or do not believe, that we are all missionaries, the *sent ones* of the King, and not our field but our faithfulness matters?

A MESSAGE FROM MISS LINDLEY

The end of work coming either after a year or a longer period is an opportunity to measure what we do. Because I always think of the Woman's Auxiliary of North Carolina as one of the branches ready for new and greater efforts, I am using a quotation from Dr. Barry:

"Christianity is the worship of the Father the vision of God as revealed in Christ. For the modern mind this is the crucial difficulty. Nearly all the forces that play upon us conspire to make belief in God difficult. In the old world everyone believed in God: that is perhaps the most signal difference between ancient and modern history. The task of the earliest Christian preachers was to persuade men who believed in God to accept Christ's interpretation of Him. The task of the Church today is almost the opposite: to help people who at different levels and in various degrees believe in Christ to win conviction about God. The revival, and even, it may be, the survival of Christianity in the world today depends on its success in this enterprise."

As I read Mr. Barry's statement I realized the deepening emphasis of the Church's Mission, and because I had had the privilege of watching the work in North Carolina I am daring to use this impressive quotation as something by which the Auxiliary may be challenged anew and may go on to even greater things in the future.

**Resolution adopted at the Triennial Meeting of the Woman's
Auxiliary, 1934, Atlantic City, N. J.**

**CLOSER RELATIONS BETWEEN HOME DIOCESE AND
MISSIONARIES**

Whereas, It has been found that there is a wide difference in the methods of maintaining a personal touch with the missionaries who have gone out from the several dioceses, and

Whereas, Some missionaries seem to receive much more personal attention than others,

Be it Resolved: That this Triennial Meeting assembled recommend to the diocesan officers of the Woman's Auxiliary that the name of each missionary who has gone out from the diocese, together with that of her home parish and her address in the missionary district where she is serving, with her occupation and United Thank Offering designation, if that be the case, be printed in the Annual Report, or given suitable publicity in order that the women of the diocese may establish friendly relations with her, and

Be it Further Resolved: That it is recommended to these same officers that the dates of furlough and vacation of such missionaries be secured through definite correspondence with them, in order that plans may be made to make their return to their home diocese a pleasant and profitable holiday. If special training is desired, we recommend that information and advice be secured from the Church Missions House in order that they may be guided without loss of time as to the best ways of advancing in their profession or work.

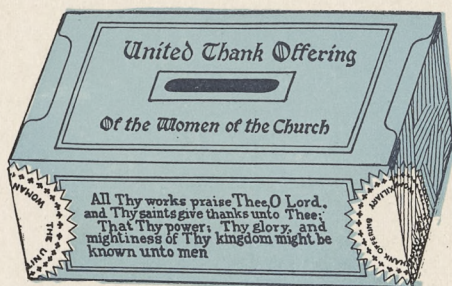
Thanksgiving

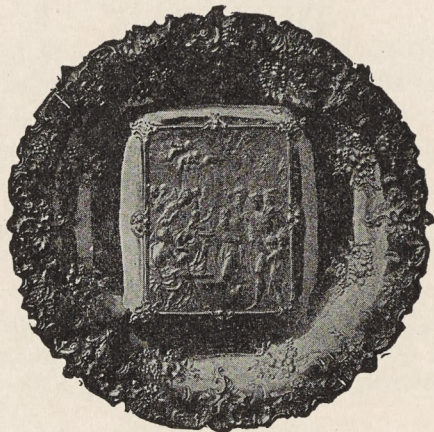

ANNUAL MEETING

1936

Keynote: "Christ For the World"

Minutes

The Fifty-fourth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Diocese of North Carolina convened Tuesday morning, April 21st, at eleven o'clock, in St. Philip's Church, Durham. Following the opening hymn and prayers, the Rev. David Yates, rector of St. Philip's made a short address of welcome.

The President called the meeting to order and the roll was called by the secretary.

Mrs. Harold Bird extended a welcome to the meeting for St. Philip's Branch and Mrs. T. P. Thomas of Wilson responded in the name of the Auxiliary.

As a token of the affection and regard of the Auxiliary, a set of vestments was presented by the President to Bishop Penick, who graciously accepted the gift.

The President's annual address followed, in which she gave a resume of the activities of the past year and work accomplished, closing with an earnest appeal for a more zealous missionary spirit and a truer discipleship.

Findings on Discussion—Mrs. R. N. Wilson, Chairman; Mrs. E. W. Lewis, Miss Maude Cutler.

Courtesy—Mrs. W. S. Holmes, Chairman; Miss Carrie McIver Wilkes, Mrs. W. L. Long.

Diocesan officers then made their reports, which were ordered incorporated in the year book.

A recommendation was made by the Treasurer that the budget for 1937 be revised, eliminating the Auxiliary's pledge to Japan, changing the pledge to Liberia to \$500, thereby releasing \$1000 to be used for salary of nurse at Anvik, Alaska. This recommendation was accepted by the meeting.

The noon-day prayers and meditation were conducted at twelve o'clock by Miss Grace Lindley, National Executive Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Bishop Penick delivered his message to the women of the diocese at the close of the noon-day prayers, reminding the women that the primary purpose of the Auxiliary is the extension of the Kingdom of God and warning them that there is grave danger of over-diversification of activities. The Bishop also asked the women to extend their "mothering care" over the young people with special emphasis on their missionary education; to have a neighborly attitude toward the Negro branches; to attend the Vade Mecum conferences for women and to take part in the parochial programs for the Forward Movement.

The Credentials Committee reported 53 branches represented with 125 delegates present, including members of the Executive Board.

At 1:15 P.M. the meeting adjourned for lunch and reopened at 2:15, immediately after which election of president took place. Mrs. W. J. Gordon's name was proposed by the nominating committee and the meeting voted that rules be suspended and the secretary cast the ballot for Mrs. Gordon, thereby unanimously electing Mrs. W. J. Gordon President of the Auxiliary and Representative on the Diocesan Executive Council.

Introduced by Bishop Penick, Miss Grace Lindley spoke to the meeting, opening her talk with a word of appreciation for the place occupied by the Diocese of North Carolina in the general work of the Church. She spoke of some of the characteristics of the Auxiliary and its problems, emphasizing the fact that Christ's way of living is the solution of all our problems and that the Church's mission includes world peace. Miss Lindley reminded the Auxiliary that they should be concerned about the spiritual life of young people, the training of workers for service at home as well as abroad, the work of the Church in rural districts and the financial crisis in the Church. In closing she emphasized that in big things and small, it is not what we do but what we are that counts—"being is more important than doing."

Invitation was extended by Christ Church, Raleigh, for the 1937 Annual Meeting, which was accepted by the Convention.

Mrs. J. P. Watters then spoke in behalf of the North Carolina Churchman urging everyone to subscribe, read and create interest in the diocesan publication.

Reports from chairmen of the following special committees were read: Prayer Partnership Plan, Recruiting, Church Periodical Club, and Work with Isolated.

Referring to Miss Lindley's address, Miss Hall reminded the Auxiliary that while the deficit in the budget of the General Church had been over-subscribed, the fact that the pledges had not yet been paid must not be overlooked.

The President read a letter from Miss Bessie Blacknall, missionary at Nenana, Alaska, telling of the crisis in the work there. In the discussion that followed the reading of this letter, it was agreed that something must be done to send Miss Blacknall a helper. The roll was called and over \$300 was pledged by the branches towards this project.

At 4:45 P.M. the meeting adjourned and a pilgrimage was made to Ephphatha Church, where the Rev. Roma C. Fortune held a brief service, interpreted by his son, Mr. James Fortune.

Evening service was held at eight o'clock in St. Philip's Church, the sermon being preached by the Rt. Rev. W. Blair Roberts of the Missionary District of South Dakota. Bishop Roberts in a stirring address told of his work among the Indians of South Dakota and what the Gospel of Jesus Christ means in their lives.

At 7:30 on Wednesday morning the annual corporate communion was celebrated, Bishop Penick, celebrant, assisted by Bishop Roberts. The United Thank Offering was presented and prayers made in commemoration of the departed.

The meeting convened at 9:45 Wednesday morning, April 22nd, with opening prayers by the Rev. Frank E. Pulley. The minutes of Tuesday's meeting were read and approved.

The president then called for written reports from the districts, which were turned in by the District Chairmen, to be included in the Year Book.

It was moved, seconded and duly carried that notes be sent to Miss Heloise Smith, Chairman of the District of Richmond, and Mrs. F. H. U. Edwards, Chairman of the Negro District, expressing regret for their absence from the meeting on account of illness.

Bishop Penick spoke a few words of appreciation for the Bishop Purse of \$900 given him by the Auxiliary in 1935.

Mrs. Whitmel Webb in a short talk expressed appreciation in the name of the Auxiliary for three years of devoted service given by Miss Emma Hall, the retiring president. A rising vote of love and appreciation was given Miss Hall by the Convention.

Bishop Roberts spoke informally of his work in South Dakota and the part the Woman's Auxiliary has had in it.

Reports on the diocesan objectives followed. Mr. H. F. Kloman, Chaplain at St. Mary's School, Raleigh, made an interesting talk about the school and the way it is building Christian character. Miss Alice Alexander, Alumnae Secretary, spoke for the Alumnae Association.

The Rev. W. H. Wheeler, Superintendent of the Thompson Orphanage, made a short talk about that institution. He reported 113 children in the Orphanage, all well provided for. Mr. Wheeler then introduced Tom Myers, student at the University of North Carolina, who graduated from the Orphanage in 1935. Mr. Myers spoke with deep appreciation of what the Orphanage has meant to him.

Miss Margaret Williams, Student Secretary at St. Mary's House, W. C. U. N. C., introduced Miss Penelope Watkins, member of the student vestry, who told of the aims and work of this student center. Miss Williams then gave a detailed report of her work and the needs of St. Mary's House.

Vade Mecum was represented by the Rev. David Yates who spoke enthusiastically about the summer camps and conferences. He said the Auxiliary Conference will be from August 24th to 29th.

Noon-day prayers and meditation were lead by Miss Grace Lindley.

The president read again Miss Bessie Blacknall's letter in order that those who were absent when this letter was read on Tuesday night might have an opportunity to consider this matter and express their wishes. The roll was called and over \$400 was pledged. On the strength of these pledges, the Convention voted to send Miss Blacknall a message telling her that the women of the Diocese of North Carolina will stand behind her and see that she has a helper.

The budget of \$6600 for 1937 was presented by the Treasurer and adopted by the Convention.

Miss Annie Gray Burroughs, returned missionary from Liberia, spoke most interestingly of the work at Cape Mount, exhibiting bead work, basketry and weaving done by the girls at the House of Bethany.

A motion was made and duly carried to send greetings from the Annual Meeting to the Methodist women in convention assembled in Durham.

Mrs. R. N. Wilson, Chairman of the Committee on Findings, made the following report:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FINDINGS FROM THE DISCUSSION

Mrs. R. N. Wilson, Chairman

1. That the opening hymn expressed the keynote of the convention.
2. That the President's message as always was inspiring, six new branches being a tangible evidence of Miss Hall's devoted service.
3. That in spite of the excellent educational institutes and the systematic study course, there is yet lacking the proper emphasis on Bible Study and Prayer Groups.
4. That Miss Lindley's inspiring messages have given us a new vision of service and challenged us to use the Auxiliary as an avenue for greater service to all mankind, realizing that victory is truly in Christ Jesus.
5. That the Bishop's message came as a timely warning to safeguard the real purpose of the Auxiliary.
6. That the expeditious proceedings of the elections proved the advisability of last year's resolution.
7. That the visit to Ephphatha Church made us thankful for the privilege of having a share in this work. "I will sing and give praise with the best member I have."
8. That there has been repeated expression of our responsibility for prayerful study of the needs of our young people and a determined effort to meet their need.
9. That we feel deeply concerned about Miss Bessie Blacknall in her hour of need and we are determined to send her help.
10. That we are indeed thankful for the work being done in our schools, camps, and orphanage.
11. That from the attractive word picture presented by Miss Annie Gray Burroughs, we find our work in Liberia in a healthy condition and we feel thankful for our share in promoting this worth while project.
12. That Bishop Roberts gave us a re-valuation of our missionary work in terms of Life rather than material objectives. That life, that abundant Life, Christ's gift to us, can and must be given to God's children everywhere. "Thy Kingdom come, Thy will be done, on earth, as it is in Heaven."
13. That the intent and purpose of this convention has been, "To know the Truth, and the Truth shall make you free."

The following resolutions were recommended by the Committee on Resolutions and duly adopted by the meeting:

1. Whereas, conditions having been changed: Be it resolved that the incoming president appoint at her convenience a committee to revise and amend the constitution.

2. Be it resolved: That a telegram be sent to Mrs. Bost expressing greetings from this meeting.

3. Whereas, Miss Bettie Gordon has completed twenty-five years of active service in this diocese, serving as missionary worker at St. Luke's Spray, first under the United Thank Offering, then with diocesan support, and for a part of the time as voluntary worker; Therefore, be it resolved: That this meeting go on record as expressing its recognition and appreciation of Miss Gordon's service.

4. Be it resolved: That the members of the Woman's Auxiliary follow our Bishop's injunction that we make a study of the National Programme of the Church and its singularity of purpose.

5. Be it resolved: That some plan be devised whereby the reports of the Diocesan officers and all other proceedings of the sessions may be more distinctly heard by all present.

6. Be it resolved: That more publicity be given the District and Diocesan meetings through the Press.

7. Be it resolved: That the members of the Auxiliary sponsor sympathetically the activities of our young people by exemplifying the Church's mission in their own active Christian living.

8. Whereas, Miss Emma Hall in her wise administration has simplified, clarified and enlarged the objectives of our Auxiliary work, and by her devotion and spiritual vision has inspired us to more consecrated service: Therefore, be it resolved: That this meeting express its deep appreciation of Miss Hall's leadership, realizing that she has truly been among us as one who has served faithfully and well.

Mrs. W. S. Holmes, Chairman of the Courtesy Committee, read the following report, which was adopted by the meeting:

The Courtesy Committee wishes to express their appreciation for the privilege of saying "thank you" to all who have so wonderfully contributed to making this convention a great one.

We wish to thank the parish of St. Philip's for its cordial invitation, its gracious welcome and thoughtful provision for our comfort. To the rector, for his words of greeting; the committee on transportation, for their generous lending of their time and cars; the choir and organist, who made our services more beautiful; the altar committee, for the beauty of the flowers; the sweet young girls who acted as pages:—to all of these, we say thank you heartily.

The setting was perfect for the wonderful program prepared by our beloved retiring President, and to her we express our gratitude, not only for this program, but for her untiring zeal, during the years of her administration, in helping shape our policies so that we feel a distinct advance during her term of office. We thank Mrs. Zachary for her splendid work as secretary.

To our own Bishop, we are indebted for his unfailing support and timely admonition.

We have been most happy to have our National Executive Secretary, Dr. Grace Lindley, and we feel deep gratitude to her for showing us the joy of the freedom of service to the risen, victorious Christ, our Lord and Master.

Bishop Roberts told us interesting facts which made us rejoice that we had had a small part in so great a work through our Domestic Missionary project.

Miss Burroughs gave us a little of the atmosphere of the Liberian project, and we thank her for the exhibition of handiwork, as well as her interesting talk.

The privilege of worshipping in Ephphatha Church concentrated our attention on this miracle of achievement.

For all of these arrangements, we earnestly thank the President and branch of St. Philip's Church.

We would not forget our indebtedness to the local press for efficiently covering our proceedings.

Looking forward to next year in Christ Church, Raleigh, we submit this report of thankfulness.

The United Thank Offering presented at this meeting was announced as being \$2,744.87.

The minutes of this meeting were read and approved, the new president duly installed, and all business having been finished, the fifty-fourth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of North Carolina was adjourned.

THE PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS TO THE CONVENTION
OF 1936

I am filled with mixed emotions as I present this my last report as your President. I have many regrets for the failures and things that I have left undone, but I also have deepest gratitude for all the enrichment of the privilege of working with you, and I wish to assure you the experience has been so deep, so rich and so rewarding, and has brought a joy that will remain with me always. Some one has said that what we most need in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary is leaders, but I feel the great need is followers, and that is what you have been. All the pledges of our challenging program have been paid in full, two appealing specials have been completed, and our United Thank Offering has made a substantial gain.

I attended two meetings of the Provincial Board, the Synod Meeting at Lexington, Ky., the Leader's Conference at New Orleans, La., Auxiliary Day at Kanuga, eleven District Meetings, three Executive Board Meetings, four meetings of the Executive Council, the Diocesan Convention and twenty-five Branch meetings.

The Auxiliary shared in the World Day of Prayer and the reports showed that the Day of Prayer (Armistice Day) was observed throughout the diocese.

I am happy to report six new branches organized and two revived this year, namely: the Frances Hunt Branch at Lexington, Betty Martin Branch at Leaksville, Christ Church Branch at Albemarle, St. Andrew's Branch at Leaksville, Christ Church Branch at Albemarle, St. Andrew's Branch at Charlotte, Chapel of Hope Branch at Charlotte, Business Women's Branch at High Point, and St. Mary's, Speed, and St. Peter's, Salisbury, (Catherine Bourne Branch) revived. We welcome them into the joy of service in the Auxiliary.

The work of our church in Latin America was presented at four splendid Educational Institutes, promoted by Mrs. J. P. Watters, our Educational Secretary, and led by Dr. A. M. Sherman. The offering from the classes on Latin America is to be given to the Bishop of Mexico.

The Executive Board is making a vital recommendation to you in regard to a change in one of our pledges with reference to the work in Alaska, which I wish to heartily endorse.

A resolution was passed at the Synod Meeting that we always use the full name of the United Thank Offering and not the initials U. T. O. Another resolution was passed to ask the editor of the Spirit of Missions to have the August or September Spirit of Missions a United Thank Offering Number, in order that we might use it in our programs before our fall ingathering. A resolution was also offered asking that as Church women we use Christmas cards with a spiritual significance. The resolution passed, that I am sure comes with tremendous import to us all, was a resolution on Peace, asking that Diocesan and Parish officers urge all Churchwomen to spend some time each day in Church or at home in prayer and meditation for Peace, and to join some recognized organization working for Peace. Let us work and pray, realizing that no nation was ever made secure by arms, that preparation for war leads to war, and that it is friendship, understanding and good-will that guarantee peace.

Let us remember that the missionary urge is an inevitable expression of living Christianity and that we have no other end to serve, save the great end of giving the Gospel of Jesus Christ to the world. Missions is the biggest business in the world, but not many understand this truth, or the "King's business" would not struggle along so poorly supported or so harshly criticized. Our task is to clear the way for a better interpretation of the meaning of the Son of God. Let us put the Cross in the place of our question marks and doubts, and follow in the way He leads for

"Not only by blue Galilee
Did He the leper cleanse, the dead
Raise into life and all hearts
His matchless glory shed.
Today He speaks in homes of men,
To heal each spirit sick with sin
And at the door of every life,
He stands and seeks to enter in."

We sing "O Master, let us walk with Thee," forgetting the permission is ours, to avail ourselves is the difficulty. In deep humility let us pledge ourselves in the coming year to pause each day at noon and pray from our hearts, "Thy Kingdom Come."

At the close of an undertaking we weigh achievement against the unaccomplished tasks. Inevitably there is regret and disappointment over hopes unrealized and

tasks uncompleted, but in that way lies discouragement and that is not the Christian way. One who stood in the shadow of Calvary said with sublime audacity, "Be of good cheer, for I have overcome the world," and He, as a citizen of Eternity could say such words because of His divine faith in us. We have not yet realized the fulfilment of His assurance because we are slow to answer His call to service. The challenge of the Church today is more imperative than ever before, the need greater; the menace to Christianity is not denial of God, but indifference and absorption in the material interests which dull our ears and dim our eyes to His summons.

My prayer for us all is that we might, like St. Matthew of old, hear and heed His voice.

"I heard Him say, 'Come follow,' that was all.
I cast a glance about my tax-booth stall,
My gold grew dim, my heart went after Him,
I rose to join Him, letting the coins fall.
Who *would* not follow, if he heard Him call."

The Church exists for the specific purpose of saving humanity. "I am come that ye might have life and have it more abundantly." "I am come to seek and to save that which was lost." The Church has been very remiss in some phases of Christian Social Service. I am constrained to ask the question, Can it be possible that the Church is so busy saving its own soul that it hasn't time to save the souls of boys and girls, men and women who have strayed from its fold?

Outside the Church there are many fine groups serving youth today. The Boy and Girl Scouts have extended their magnificent character building into young manhood and young womanhood. The boys' and girls' clubs of many cities open doors of opportunity for happy development. Our Young People's Service League has a marvelous field for service. But now is the time not only to save bodies, but to win a soul for Christ. I beseech you to accept this responsibility. The door is standing open. Those who build for the future must build youth.

I urge upon you the importance of making some one's need your vital concern. Take a child under your care; feed and clothe a needy family; give relief to mind and body and and soul of despairing individuals. Bring to them hope, courage and a new lease on life. Our program should embrace the community, the schools, the organized groups within our community and the individual.

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY**1935**

Comparison of the report of last year with the total of activities handed in now shows a healthy increase in almost every activity, with the exception of the reading circles, which fell off in number.

71 branches reported from 59 parishes that there had been 14 representatives sent to summer conferences (this shortage due probably to the necessity of keeping Vade Mecum closed). The Educational Program was followed in 57 branches, reports came of 16 who held Bible classes, 51 program meetings, and 53 study classes. Five branches had prayer circles, 3 had reading clubs and during the summer, 15 produced missionary plays or pageants, 34 had reference libraries or book shelves. Committees or representatives were appointed from 11 branches to help in adult education, 30 to encourage and aid the young people and 27 for the Church School.

The Institutes held by Dr. Sherman on Latin-America in three centers in January were enthusiastically attended and great interest promised in the study classes for this year.

I cannot stress too greatly the necessity for a threefold education in our work towards spiritual development, in devotional

services, in prayer circles, in reading the Bible, the Forward Movement leaflets, and other books along that line, in consecrated attendance at public worship and in encouragement of religion in the home; the historical background of our Church, with the inspiration to be gleaned from the lives of those who lived and died that we might have Christianity today; and the comprehensive knowledge of the present program of the Church at home and abroad, in parish and mission, with its far reaching aim to influence all sides of life towards the coming of Christ's Kingdom.

Surely, if we were to educate ourselves along these lines, the Church, with all of its power for bringing to the world the Life Abundant, would go forward!

These District Secretaries are working through the Parish Young Peoples Secretaries, if this officer has been appointed, if not through the President or Educational Secretary. Two conferences have been held by the Diocesan Secretary at which five District Secretaries and three District Chairmen were present. Two of the Secretaries absent from these meetings have been contacted personally and one by letter.

The *Five Major Objectives Set Up In the Conferences* Are as follows:

1—To further Teacher and Parental Training Institutes in each District.

- 2—To aid in every way possible in sending Counsellors of Young People's Service League to Summer Conferences for training.
- 3—To work toward getting Little Helpers Secretaries appointed in Parishes where there are none, and creating interest in the Work of the Little Helper's Department.
- 4—To further Missionary Education especially through the five Missionary Offerings Little Helpers—Birthday Thank Offering—Diocesan Offering for the Deaf Work—Christmas Box Offering—Lenten Offering.
- 5—To help with finding the isolated children in our Diocese so that all parents may have help in the Christian Education of their children.

Each President was given a copy of this with appropriate scripture selections for each topic; to create intensive Bible study (Jno. 5:39) and eliminate Spiritual Illiteracy which threatens our church and home. Matt. 22:29. Lu. 24:32.

This has already resulted in a request from the Bettie Martin Chapter in Leaksville for a Bible class each week which is being greatly blessed and through it the girls are assisting me in the Christian Social Service work in the County Institutions, thus getting the wonderful inspiration of practical experience.

The Magnificent commission and privilege accorded Mary Magdalene that first Easter A. M. "Go Tell" is ours today and only through Bible study will our women awaken to their wonderful possibilities. How can one stand silent and neutral with such a specific command? Rev. 3:16.

The replies from the different branches as to results of Questionnaire will be used as a basis for determining our greatest need in the district.

Work among our Young People will be stressed, this is a challenging call 1 Tim. 4:12, Ec. 12:1—Best method Prayer, Precept, Practice. Let us "Go Forward" with our youth. A section for young peoples work has been appointed in every branch in the district of Guilford.

Keeping informed through Church Periodicals will be emphasized, increased knowledge stimulates giving and praying.

Another means of forwarding the Church's influence throughout Rockingham County is through my association with the Inter-denominational Sunday School Association. On Good Friday I held a Three Hour service at a Baptist Church in the County with hearty co-operation Jno. 17:22, from all denominations. On Sunday, May 31st, at our S. S. Convention a young man, Charles

Stulzer, from St. Stephen's, N. Y., candidate for Holy Orders will preach our convention sermon and Miss Cutler will conduct a round table conference on the theme "Facing Life."

Re-establishing the Family Altar in every church home will be stressed throughout the year, in connection with the study of the Nine Point Outline of Religion in the Home.

When I was asked to fill Mrs. Spruill's unexpired term, as Recruiting Secretary for the Diocese of North Carolina, I found I could not improve on the program already outlined by Mrs. Spruill, so I adopted many of her ideas and sent them in the form of a bulletin to each District Recruiting Secretary. I also wrote a personal letter to them, asking their co-operation in contacting the branches and later, I sent a questionnaire hoping to get a concrete report from each branch secretary.

Out of the eight districts I have had five splendid reports:

They show real achievement and a better understanding of the Recruiting program. Many of the branches say that the questionnaire has definitely outlined the duties of a Recruiting Secretary and that they will use it as a guide for their work next year.

One District Secretary wrote me that "This phase of Recruiting, getting more people interested in His work, for the extension of His Kingdom, in this world must be truly pleasing to Him, and with this thought in mind I have gotten increased pleasure in this work."

I wish I could give you in full the reports of the five mentioned Districts, especially the one from Mrs. Lynn Bernhardt, Secretary Forsyth-Rowan. Mrs. Bernhardt used the questionnaires received from her branches, which was nearly one hundred per cent and in an interesting manner grouped the high lights from each branch in a concise report. May I quote just a few of those high lights?

"A young girl has offered herself for the mission field, and is waiting, hoping to be called."

"We furnished books for a Theological student and were instrumental in placing a young man at Catawba College, who it is hoped will study for the ministry."

"Every member personally contacted and invited to join the Auxiliary, with special emphasis on the younger women, who came in a body and joined."

"A wholesale organization move to recruit children for the church school with gratifying results."

Guilford Secretary reports that they are responsible for one recruit for the mission field and partly responsible for another, and much interest manifested in camps and conferences. One of her branches reports recruits for the choir, which suggests another duty for Recruiting Secretaries.

Edgecombe Secretary reports one branch working up an interest in the church paper, which suggests still another duty for Recruiting Secretaries.

Many of the branches reported soap wrappers for Thompson Orphanage. Dare I suggest that soap wrappers be still another duty for Recruiters?

This report covers about fifty per cent of our branches but I am gratified over the work accomplished. I am sure the other

districts have not shirked their responsibilities and will let us hear from them next time.

I wish to thank Miss Hall and Mrs. Zachary for their interest and patience while getting this program launched. I could not have done it at all without their help.

To the District Recruiting Secretaries, who really did the work, I pledge my support, and ask their continued co-operation.

REPORT OF CHAIRMAN OF WORK AMONG THE ISOLATED

Thirteen branches report 58 isolated persons reached and two families, one of which contains five children . . . a total then of 65 or more persons.

With this as a measuring yard there would seem to be 400 members of this Church in the diocese without any contacts with the Church. Another fact to be noted is that, with one exception, the isolated persons found so far have been found by small, rural branches. The one exception is one of the largest branches in one of the most thickly settled parts of the Diocese. This branch in one item of its excellent report says that 15 Easter cards were sent to isolated people asking them to attend the Easter service in the parish Church. These facts would indicate that isolated persons are within reach of both large and small branches and in the most thickly and the most sparsely settled parts of our Diocese.

For two years your Chairman of this work has hesitated to ask for the appointment of a special parish officer in every branch to undertake this task, because of the feeling we all have against overly organizing our work. It seems necessary, however, if we are really to do this task both of finding and of serving these people to ask for this offer in every parish. And in addition to ask that the Educational Secretary, Social Service Secretary, and United Offering Secretary serve with the parish Isolated Secretary on a committee in order to give these people Church contacts after they are found. For example, the Social Service Secretary might assume the task of supplying ways for bringing people who have no other means of transportation to Church on certain occasions. Hillsboro for example has two members who go six miles whenever it is possible and bring to Church and Sunday School a mother, her five children and two nieces. The Educational Secretary would see that Church literature is furnished and that the names of all children who cannot attend Sunday School regularly at least once a month are furnished Miss Cutler for the Correspondence Course for the Isolated which the Department of Religious Education of the Diocese will be ready to offer in the fall. The United Offering Custodian would be able to give many a woman, who will perhaps never be able to do anything else, the privilege of giving and praying for missions through the medium of the blue box.

The president of one of the largest branches asks for a suggestion of "some practical way in which this work could be started." Last year it was suggested that the most complete mailing list available covering the county in which the branch is located be secured and a return postal be sent to every person on the list asking about church affiliation. This, however, did not seem practical because of the expense. The suggestion is now made that this task might be undertaken jointly by all the women's missionary organizations in the community. This would be another way of working with other Christian women and it would cut the expense and work down one-fourth or more. This seems the only thorough-going way of finding our people. If any branch can think out any other way of accomplishing our purpose, which is to find *every one* which our Church should be ministering to and making of them witnesses wherever they may be the plan will be most gratefully received and passed on to every branch.

May we the year that is ahead do a real task. First let us think our ways to approach this problem, and then act decisively. We are probably at work for a group of our Church members larger than any congregation in the Diocese of North Carolina.

Your chairman last year reported 15 branches of the Diocesan Auxiliary actively engaged in the work of the Church Periodical Club. While there has been an increase since then, it is so slight in comparison to the number of branches in the diocese that one cannot point with pride to the gain made. However, we are glad to report that the work of the C. P. C. in our diocese compares favorably with what is accomplished in other dioceses.

The demand for magazines and books at C. C. Camps and penal institutions is greater than it was a few years ago. In addition to this phase of the work, donors of current periodicals and Church papers to clergymen are secured; Bibles, Prayer Books and hymnals, tracts, Christmas and Easter cards were sent to all parts of the world; and since 1922, a Library Fund to provide missionary workers with suitable books has been provided.

Your chairman recommends that every parish C. P. C. librarian secure information regarding the activities of this organization and present its needs at Auxiliary meetings, and also request Rectors on the second Sunday in May to summarize briefly what has been accomplished by your Diocesan C. P. C., and have an offering to further the work.

With the growing demand for literature and Bibles, we need assistance from branches that are not actively engaged in this work, and assure them that by so doing they will experience the spirit of sharing that brings joy to "those who give and take."

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CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of this organization shall be, "The North Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council"

ARTICLE II

Object

The object of this organization shall be to carry out in the Diocese of North Carolina the three great aims of the Church: Extension of the Kingdom, Religious Education, and Christian Social Service.

ARTICLE III

Membership

All women of the Diocese, by virtue of their Baptism, are eligible for membership in the Woman's Auxiliary.

ARTICLE IV

Officers

Section 1. The officers of this organization shall be: a President, a Vice-President, who is also Secretary of the Supply Department, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Secretary of the Department of Religious Education, a Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Service, and a Treasurer of the United Thank Offering.

Sec. 2. These officers, with the District Chairman, shall constitute the Executive Committee and shall meet twice a year, at the call of the President.

ARTICLE V

Duties of Officers

Section 1. The President shall have general oversight of all work, and shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for. Shall preside at all meetings, and at every annual meeting shall address the Auxiliary.

Sec. 2. The Vice-President shall act in the absence of the President, and shall have charge of the Supply Department.

Sec. 3. The Secretary shall record the proceedings of the Diocesan Branch, carry on all necessary correspondence, assist the President in preparing and having printed the Annual Report, and at each annual meeting shall make a report.

Sec. 4. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money except the United Thank Offering and Box Work money, and shall make report of same at the annual meeting. At the end of every fiscal year the Treasurer's accounts shall be verified by a public auditor. The Treasurer's report, as audited, shall be published in the Annual Report. The Treasurer shall act as Chairman of the Committee on Credentials.

Sec. 5. The Secretary of the Department of Religious Education shall arrange two Institutes each year before Advent, one to

be held in the Convocation of Raleigh and one in the Convocation of Charlotte, and shall carry out the Educational program provided by the National Council.

Sec. 6. The Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Service shall carry out as nearly as possible the suggested program of the National Council.

Sec. 7. The Treasurer of the United Thank Offering shall receive the United Thank Offering in March and September; and shall deposit same in a Savings Bank, or immediately remit to the Treasurer of the National Council for Investment.

ARTICLE VI

Term of Office

Section 1. All Diocesan Officers shall be elected for a term of three years; the President to be elected at the second annual meeting after the Triennial; the Treasurer, Secretary of the Department of Religious Education and Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Service the third meeting after the Triennial; and the Vice-President, and United Thank Offering Treasurer the first meeting after the Triennial. No officer shall be eligible for two consecutive terms. Vacancies occurring during the year shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

Sec. 2. The Secretary shall be appointed by the President for one year.

ARTICLE VII

Districts

(a) For effective service the Diocese shall be divided into Districts.

(b) Each District shall meet twice a year.

(c) A District shall be under the direct supervision of a Chairman, duly elected by her District for a term of three years.

ARTICLE VIII

Election of Diocesan Officers

Section 1. The President shall appoint a committee of three at the annual Convention to receive nominations. Nominations may be in writing or from the floor. All names shall be presented to the Convention. If there is no majority on the first ballot, all names shall be dropped but the three having the largest number of votes.

Sec. 2. Any delegate may nominate. A branch to have voting privileges must have paid the Central Fund. No vote shall be cast by proxy. All elections shall be by ballot.

Sec. 3. All members of the Executive Committee may vote independently of their branches.

ARTICLE IX

Finance

Section 1. In the fall the Treasurer shall send to every branch the following ascending scale, and each branch shall designate the class which it desires to enter: \$5.00 Class, \$10.00 Class, \$15.00 Class, \$20.00 Class, \$25.00 Class, \$30.00 Class, \$35.00 Class, \$40.00 Class, \$50.00 Class, \$55.00 Class, \$100.00 Class, \$110.00 Class,

Sec. 3. From the amount contributed according to this scale the Treasurer shall turn over one-half to the Forward Movement Fund, and one-half to such specials as the parish branch may designate.

This Constitution may be amended at the annual meeting of the Diocesan Branch by a two thirds vote of the delegates, due notice of the proposed amendments having been given to every branch at least one month before the annual meeting.

5. These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a majority of the delegates at any Annual meeting.
