REPORT OF ANNUAL MEETING

THE Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliaries and Guilds of North Dakota was held in the Guild Hall, Devils Lake, at 1:30, Monday afternoon, May 26th, 1913.

As the President, Mrs. Aldrich, had been recalled to Fargo by her father's sudden illness, the Honorary President, Mrs. Cameron Mann, took charge of the meeting which was opened by the singing of a hymn, followed by prayer. Mrs. Mann read Mrs. Aldrich's address, after which the Committee on Credentials, Mrs. Pitts of Grand Forks and Mrs. Currie of Park River, presented their report.

After roll call the Secretary read the minutes of the meeting held in Fargo last June. Mrs. J. B. Wineman then read the Treasurer's report and also the list of boxes reported through her. Mrs. C. C. Gowran presented the report of the United Offering. All of these reports were accepted. Mrs. Gowran and Mrs. Mann gave short talks regarding the United Offering.

The report of the Junior Auxiliary, prepared by Mrs. Maglone, was read by Mrs. Hancock; also the letter of thanks from the Sister Superior of St. Mary's-on-the-Mountain for the box prepared and sent by the Juniors of North Dakota.

After the Mission Study report was given by Mrs. R. J. Haxby, Mrs. Wineman spoke briefly on the aims and work of the Woman's Auxiliary.

The report of the Church Hall, Valley City, was presented by the Matron, Mrs. Small, after which it was moved and carried that a Nominating Committee be appointed by the Chair. Mrs. Thomson of Fargo, Mrs. Murtinger of Casselton, and Mrs. Stuart of Minnewaukan, were named.

The President spoke of St. Michael and All Angels' Day and urged a more general attendance at the Corporate Communion celebrated that day for woman workers throughout the State.

A Committee, consisting of Mrs. Gowran of Grand Forks, Mrs. Currie of Park River, Mrs. Wiig of Kenmare, and Mrs. Haxby of Fargo was appointed to consider the best apportionment of the funds at the disposal of the meeting.

The report of the Nominating Committee was presented and approved, resulting in the election of the following officers:

Secretary Mission Study—Mrs. R. J. Haxby, Fargo.

The question of reviving the Babies' Branch came up for discussion. Mrs. Mahan, Wahpeton, Mrs. Guest, Jamestown, Mrs Daniels, Minot, Mrs. Juergens, Devils Lake, Mrs. Lindberg, Rugby, Mrs. Von Nieda, Williston, Miss Wilson, York, and Mrs. Larsen, Lisbon, all expressed themselves as interested in this work and offered to do what they could to further it upon returning to their homes. Later the President appointed Mrs. Murtinger of Casselton, to act as Secretary of the Babies' Branch.

It was moved, seconded and carried that it be left with the President to appoint the delegates to the General Convention. (The following were named later: Mrs Cameron Mann, Fargo; Mrs. R. J. Haxby, Fargo; Mrs. W. B. Overson, Williston; Mrs. Frank Daniels, Minot, and Mrs Tibbs, Devils Lake)

A motion was made and carried by standing vote that a hearty expression of thanks be tendered the ladies of Devils Lake for their cordial hospitality.

On motion the reading of the reports of the various Guilds was deferred owing to the lateness of the hour.

The report of the Committee on Appropriations was then presented recommending that \$50.00 be given to the General Clergy Relief Fund; \$50.00 to the Bishop's Purse for work in North Dakota; and \$45.00 be sent to Japan.

It was moved by Mrs. Daniels, seconded by Mrs. Thomson, that instead of giving \$45.00 to Japan, \$25.00 be sent there and the balance given to the Church Hall at Valley City. Carried.

With this amendment the report of the Committee was adopted.

During the singing of a hymn an offering amounting to \$12.07 was taken up.

Miss Smith, the Educational Secretary of Minnesota, then gave an interesting address telling of the literature provided by the Church Missions House as an aid in all departments of the Church's work, laying especial emphasis on the importance of the Mission Study Class.

At the conclusion of the address it was voted that the offering of the day be given to the United Offering and after the benediction was pronounced, the meeting adjourned.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

Friends and Members of the Auxiliaries and Guilds:

ONCE MORE we assemble for our Annual Meeting, to hear reports of what has been accomplished in the past, and to make our plans for the work in the future.

We are assembled for worship, for instruction, and for what is commonly called business. All that we do here will come under one of these three heads.

Let us strive to make this meeting the heartiest and most profitable one we have ever had, and let us determine to find in each of its activities, something which we may take home to our various branches as an encouragement and inspiration.

It is not always possible to have both the Auxiliary and Guild in each Parish and Mission. But everywhere there can be a Study Class during Lent, or a Program Meeting once a month instead of the regular Guild meeting. A beginning has been made on these lines in several places, and a report will be given later by the Secretary.

Do we members of the Church realize our obligations to promote, with our prayers, our toil, and our gifts, the object of that petition so often on our lips, "Thy Kingdom come." I think the Churchwomen of this District are much more aroused than heretofore to the possibility and the duty of the work of the Woman's Auxiliary and that they feel the need of a larger and more intelligent grasp of the general conditions of missionary work.

Surely it was not merely to give more money to the General Board, that this now great organization came into existence, but to know, and care, and pray more for the men and women, who are our representatives in both the domestic and foreign work.

The ideal of our meetings,—whether the weekly one of the Auxiliary, the monthly one of the Guild, or this Annual one,—is that there should be a clear statement of the work going on in some part of the field, an interest aroused in that work, and an attempt made to help it on by prayers and offerings.

May our present meeting be in accordance with that ideal, and have as one of its results, the realization of the same ideal in the various organizations of the women of our District.

REPORT OF THE JUNIOR AUXILIARY FOR THE YEAR 1912-13

THIS year we have had but six branches, with an average membership of twelve. For work done I would report the best missionary box we have ever sent. This went again to St. Mary's, Sewanee. It was filled with clothing, mostly new, and all in first-class condition, and was valued at \$85.00. This was contributed by the branches at Grand Forks, Fargo, Casselton, Park River, Jamestown and Larimore. In some places the members of the Woman's Auxiliary helped the children make some of the more difficult articles, and for such help we are very grateful. I attach to this report the letter of thanks just received from the Sister Superior. It surely is a pleasure and a privilege to help these good people in their noble work. While feeling thankful for what we have been able to do, yet I wish it were possible to have more of our Parishes and Missions with us in this work of love. In some places it is quite probable that there is no material, but I feel sure that in many others good working branches could be formed and maintained if only some one would volunteer to help and lead the Juniors. Will not some of the members of the Woman's Auxiliary here today think this over and make up their minds to make this a part of their missionary work? It may require a little self-sacrifice at first, but it is a work which is full of interest for the children themselves come to love it, and are glad to help if only someone will take them in hand and show them how and lead them in their prayer and study, and they will thus come to be splendid members of the Woman's Auxiliary in future years.

REPORT OF CHURCH HALL AT VALLEY CITY

I HAVE COME to tell you something of the work at the Church Hall during the past year. As this is my first year there and consequently the first time I have come before you I should like, even at the risk of repeating what you already know, to tell you just what we want the Hall to do for the girls who come to it.

The Normal School with its large attendance (over 600 enrolled last year) offers large opportunity for influence if one can become intimately associated with these young people. We can accommodate twenty-six young women at the Hall, and this is not so large a number but that we come in close touch with each girl. There are certain rules regulating their punctual attendance at meals and at a short service immediately following dinner, their study hours, and free evenings, but we try to make it as uninstitutional as possible, to give each girl the individual care she may need and to surround all with the refining influence of a home.

We want each one of you to feel a personal interest in the Hall. It belongs to the State as a whole and not only to Valley City, where it happens to be located. The donations of canned fruit and some linen which we have received from the Women's Guilds throughout the State have been so liberal and of so much assistance that I want to thank each one of you most sincerely. Boxes of fruit and some linen were received in the fall from the Guilds and Auxiliaries of Fargo, Grand Forks, Devils Lake, Williston, Minot, Lisbon, Minnewaukan, Walhalla, Casselton, Wahpeton and Jamestown. Later, as Lenten offerings, table linen from St. George's Guild, Bismarck, St. John's Guild, Larimore, Church of the Redeemer, Bathgate, a quilt from St. Agnes' Guild, Carrington, and \$5.00 from St. Margaret's Guild, Lawton, which we shall use as a nucleus for some table silver we need; tablecloths from Mrs. Sherping of Fergus Falls, Minn., Mrs. Mansfield of McHenry, and Mrs. Hugh McDonald of Valley City; napkins from Mrs. Beede of Rolla; towels from Mrs. James Earley of Valley City, and seven quilts, four tablecloths and a dozen napkins from All Saints' Guild, Valley City.

All you housewives know what a financial help and labor-saving these contributions are and I feel sure this generosity on your part has had much to do with the gratifying financial status of this year. We have paid off some outstanding bills, all current expenses to date, and have a small balance on hand. We have made some improvements and repairs, painting the dining room and kitchen and laying a cement sidewalk being the most important. The money received from the girls is just enough, with careful management, to pay our running expenses and take care of some minor repairs due to wear and tear; anything more than this must come from outside.

Last year we asked for canned fruit and table linen and you responded most generously; this year our wants are somewhat different but just as numerous. We ask for the canned fruit, bed linen, and are most anxious for contributions of money to help with the table silver we need. We ask the same interest and support for the coming year as you have given during the past one. The work is well worth while,—the girls in most cases responding readily to all one does for them.

Just one word more. Our Hall is the only Church Institution of its kind in the State; but we have not as large a proportion of Episcopalian girls among our girls as we should like. We feel that all Church girls attending the Normal should be at the Hall, and we ask your co-operation in this also; using your influence in this direction whenever the opportunity offers.

REPORT OF MISSION STUDY

MUCH has been said, during this Convocation, of the value of the Mission Study Work. I have nothing new to say to you on the subject, but perhaps by repeating some of the things already said, I can fix them more surely in your minds.

I feel so keenly the fact that knowledge of a subject begets interest in that subject, that I wish all might know of the work being done in the mission field. We cannot really be interested in that of which we know little or nothing, but the more we know and the more interested we become, the more we will wish to know and, the more we will wish to do. Let me say, however, that because you may not be able to do all you *wish* to do in your home Parishes, please do not think, for that reason, you can do nothing at all.

If you can have a Mission Study Class, by all means have one;-- if not, and you think the Missionary Program Meetings would be possible, try them. If neither of these methods seems possible, at least you can choose some one of the excellent books provided for us by the Church Missions House and read that at your meetings. For this purpose, if you have not read it, let me urge you to read the "Conquest of the Continent", a book I wish all Church people might read. It was written by the Rev. Hugh L. Burleson and deals with the growth of the Church in this, our own, country. Beginning with the geographical expansion of the country it traces the growth of the Church along the same lines. After you have finished reading it you will understand some of the trials and discouragements through which our Church has come and will also realize more fully what it has accomplished.

The educational department of the Church Missions House gets out, each year, a set of books for study about some one of the mission fields. There is the text book proper, together with a little booklet giving suggestions to leaders and telling how to organize classes. In addition, there are several books which may be used for supplementary reading. Last year the field chosen for study was Japan;--this coming year, it is to be China.

We, in Fargo, had tried the Program Meetings, but never until last year did we try the Study Class. Then we sent for the set of books on Japan and formed our Class to meet once each week during the early winter. When we had finished we voted the undertaking the most interesting one we had ever tried, and are enthusiastic now to try the course on China next year. One of the practical results of this Class was the forming of Classes by two of its members for the study of "The Conquest of the Continent", which met during Lent.

I have with me several copies of the "Conquest of the Continent"

and two sets of the books on Japan, which I shall be glad to give, at the close of this meeting, to any who wish them.

I ran across a quotation from John Ruskin recently, in "The Churchman", which seems to me very apropos of this whole subject of mission study and mission work. He says "If you do not wish for His Kingdom, don't pray for it. But if you do, you must do more than pray for it; you must work for it."

ST. MICHAEL AND ALL ANGELS' DAY OF UNITED PRAYER

THE following resolution, presented by Mrs. Morrison of Duluth, was adopted at the Department Meeting held in Sioux Falls, October, 1909:

"Resolved, That in order that we may better realize the sacredness of all work done for the Church, the Woman's Auxiliary in the Sixth Department establish in every Parish and Mission in the Department, an Annual Consecration Meeting, to be held in early autumn for all women workers, in all branches of Church work."

It was further resolved that such service be held on St. Michael and All Angels' Day. Since then, September 29th has been observed throughout this Missionary District, and most of the Clergy have had special services: Holy Communion, prayers for missions, address, and an offering for women workers.

May the day come when all over the land this service shall be recognized and all women shall unite in prayers for missions.
