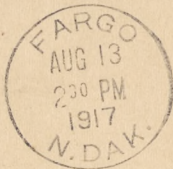

REPORT OF ANNUAL MEETING

At the organization meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary and of the Guilds, held in St. Paul's Parish House, Grand Forks, Sunday evening, May 20, the chair appointed Mrs. R. A. Stuart of Minnewaukan and Mrs. E. A. Pray of Valley City a committee on credentials to report at the regular meeting.

The chair also asked the pleasure of the meeting as to the committee on nominations. It was moved by Mrs. Kloman of Fargo, seconded by Mrs. Perritt of Grand Forks, that the chair be empowered to appoint this committee. Carried. Mrs. Robins of Minot, Mrs. Frame of Fargo, Mrs. Drew of Lakota, Mrs. Coffin of Dickinson, and Mrs. Cairncross of Wahpeton were named as the committee on nominations.

It was also moved that a committee on resolutions be appointed. Mrs. Maglone of Larimore and Mrs. Blakemore of Fargo were so named.

The committee on appropriations was named as follows:—Mrs. Kloman of Fargo, Mrs. Williamson of Lisbon, Mrs. Brayfield of Jamestown, Mrs. Perritt of Grand Forks and Mrs. Powell of Devils Lake. Meeting adjourned.

The regular meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary and of the Guilds for the District of North Dakota was opened on Monday afternoon May 21 by the singing of Hymn 599, followed by the opening prayers given by the bishop, the president, Mrs. Hancock, presiding.

The committee on credentials made their report and the minutes of the 1916 meeting were read by the secretary.

The president gave her annual address, speaking a word of commendation for the work done in the past and of encouragement for the work to be done in the future.

The report of the treasurer as to money and boxes received was read and accepted and the United Offering report was also read by the district treasurer, Mrs. Wineman, in the absence of the United Offering treasurer, Mrs. Gowran.

Expressions of preference were asked by the chair as to how the money given for missions at Convocation should be appropriated and the committee on appropriations was asked to make note of these preferences.

The report of the Valley City Hall was read by Mrs. Pray and an earnest appeal made for assistance for this institution. Pledges were given by the following guilds—Larimore, Devils Lake (\$10.00), Devils Lake Juniors (\$10.00) Williston, Mrs. Lowe of Kenmare (\$5.00), Lisbon, Lisbon St. Agnes, Minot, Recreation Club of Fargo, Park River, Walshville, Minnewaukan, Fargo (\$25.00), Jamestown Altar (\$10.00), Grand Forks and Wahpeton.

The appropriation committee now being ready their report was called for. They recommended that \$25.00 be given to the Foreign Insurance Fund, \$50.00 to Bishop's Purse, \$50.00 to St. Lukes Hospital, Tokyo, and \$30.00 to the Valley City Hall. This report was accepted

and on motion of Mrs. Lowe, Kenmare, seconded by Mrs. Tyler, Fargo, it was duly adopted. A further motion prevailed that any additional money received be given to the Valley City Hall. \$5.00 was later so received making that appropriation \$35.00.

Acknowledgment was made of a check for \$48.00 for the support of a Bible Woman in China.

The report of the Junior Auxiliary was given by Mrs. Black of Grand Forks and the Mission Study report read by Mrs. McRoberts of Fargo. These reports were duly accepted.

The committee on nominations then made their report recommending that the following officers be named:—

President—Mrs. Geo. Hancock, Fargo.

First Vice President—Mrs. Devine, Wahpeton.

Second Vice President—Mrs. Harrington, Jamestown.

Third Vice President—Miss Mary Hudson, Valley City.

Secretary—Mrs. Haxby, Fargo.

Treasurer—Mrs. Wineman, Grand Forks.

President Junior Branch—Mrs. Maglone, Larimore.

Vice President Junior Branch—Mrs. Black, Grand Forks.

Secretary Mission Study—Mrs. Holt, Fargo.

Treasurer United Offering—Mrs. Gowran, Grand Forks.

This report was accepted and with the substitution of Mrs. Pray, Valley City, for Vice President, in place of Miss Hudson, the report was adopted.

During the singing of hymn 249 the collection was taken and it was voted that this offering amounting to \$24.66 together with that given in the morning at the Corporate Communion \$10.80, be given to the United Offering.

A report from the Little Helpers Branch of Fargo was read. This is a new branch made up of the wee ones from one to eight years.

The address of the afternoon was given by the Rev. Wellington Salt of Bellecourt on the Indian Work in North Dakota. Rev. Mr. Salt came to N. D. during the episcopate of Bishop Walker, first bishop of the district and his experiences have been many and various. His description of some of them was both interesting and unusual—some humorous and some pathetic. As Mr. Salt quoted most aptly "God moves in a mysterious way, His wonders to perform." Bishop Tyler supplemented this address by a brief account of Rev. Mr. Salt's work in the district.

The resolutions committee submitted the following report which was accepted and its provisions duly adopted.

"On February 17, 1917, after a very short illness God in His Wisdom saw fit to take unto Himself the sweet spirit of the Right Reverend Samuel Cook Edsall, Bishop of Minnesota, who was second Bishop of North Dakota from 1899 to 1901. In the death of Bishop Edsall the Church has lost one of its great leaders.

Resolved—That The Woman's Auxiliary of North Dakota express to the family of Bishop Edsall its heartfelt sympathy in their great loss and its deep appreciation of all his generous services to us during the years of his ministry.

Resolved further—That a copy of these resolutions be sent to the family of Bishop Edsall, also to the Woman's Auxiliary of Minnesota and a copy to be placed on the records of this body."

"Right Reverend William D. Walker, Bishop of Western New York, entered into rest at his home in Buffalo, New York, on May 2, 1917. Bishop Walker was the first Bishop of North Dakota, laboring in the pioneer work of this district in the years from 1883 to 1896 and it was he who organized the Woman's Auxiliary in this district.

Be it therefore resolved—That the Woman's Auxiliary of North Dakota express to Mrs. Walker an expression of profound sympathy in her great sorrow and record their appreciation of his long life of faithful service—May God grant him peace and felicity in His heavenly Kingdom.

Resolved further—That the secretary be requested to send a copy of these resolutions to Mrs. Walker and to the Western New York Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, and enter the same upon our records."

"After a lifetime of loving and unselfish service Miss Julia C. Emery last fall resigned as General Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Miss Emery put herself into the work, laboring wisely, patiently, lovingly and efficiently, endearing herself to all the members of the Woman's Auxiliary and to the Church at large. At this, our first opportunity, therefore be it resolved—

"That the North Dakota branch of the Woman's Auxiliary regret that it is no longer possible for Miss Emery to lead us in our work, feeling, however, that her loving interest will never cease and we hereby express our appreciation of her unselfish service.

Resolved further—That our secretary be requested to transmit a copy of these resolutions to Miss Emery and to spread a copy of the same upon the records of our organization."

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

Greetings and welcome! From far and near in our great state we have come to hear what has been accomplished during the past year, to find out how our work may be made more effective, and to be strengthened by the Christian fellowship and worship which are so important a part of our Convocation gatherings.

Six of the state officers and the Bishop were present at the luncheon and informal meeting held in Fargo last September for the discussion of Auxiliary business at which twenty dollars were voted from the general treasury to be given for missionary purposes by the delegates to the Triennial Convention. I may say that of this, ten dollars were sent to the fund for the repair of Christ Church, Anvik, Alaska, which was built by the first United Offering and the same amount for a hostel for Japanese girls in Honolulu.

Mrs. Tyler and I were the only Auxiliary delegates from North Dakota who attended the Triennial Convention in St. Louis and many times I wished that more of our women might have been present. Church people are so comparatively few in this part of the West that we need the realization of what a great Church it is to which we belong and what a great work she is doing for the spread of the Master's Kingdom at home and abroad. You know what benefits are to be obtained from a state meeting such as this. Just picture the inspiration and the enlarged vision to be gained from a gathering where delegates are present not alone from the whole United States and its dependencies but also from Mexico, China, Japan, and the islands of the sea as well as representatives from the mother church of England and the sister church of Canada. Think of listening to the Church's leaders telling you at first hand of what is being done in our crowded cities, of what is being attempted on the stretches of our vast prairies or in the mountain regions of the missionary districts, of the daring and devotion of those who carry the gospel to the frozen wastes of Alaska and of the earnest missionaries who labor for the physical, mental and spiritual uplift of the Orient where the needs are so vast and so pressing and where the workers are so few. Surely as you listened your hearts would burn within you and you would realize that great truth which is being thrust upon our consciousness now by the ruthless hand of war that the world has indeed become a neighborhood and that if we are to dwell in peace and happiness we must know that all men are our brothers, that we can no longer concern ourselves merely with our narrow selfish interests but must attain to world vision and world sympathies. The great founder of our religion surely had these when he gave his parting command to his disciples "Go ye into **all the world** and preach the gospel to **every creature.**" How slow we are even today to grasp the fullness of this command and the breadth of this vision!

Through the columns of the Sheaf I have already told you something of the United Offering Service at St. Louis where more than eight hundred women from all parts of the American Church gathered in Christ Church Cathedral to approach in earnest devotion the table

of the Lord and to lay upon the altar the fruits of the three years giving; of the Auxiliary Mass Meeting, where stirring addresses were made and missionary hymns sung and the amount of the United offering announced; of the great Church Pageant held in the Coliseum where the story of the Church from the Day of Pentecost to the present time, was set forth with reverence and beauty and dramatic power.

One of the most notable features of the Auxiliary meetings at St. Louis was the coming of a committee from the Board of Missions to ask that a committee of women be appointed to act with the Board in the administration of the United Offering. Previous to this, while the women had always voted upon the general object for which this great thank offering should be used, they had no say as to its disposition nor the workers who carried out its purpose. Such a committee was accordingly appointed, consisting of one member from each of the eight provinces, to act in this capacity.

In listening to the interesting stories of the work in different parts of the Church's field and the appeals for more workers and additional equipment your delegates could not help wishing that they had unlimited funds at their disposal in order to be able to contribute to the many worthy causes which were so ably presented. The most pressing of these was the fund for St. Agnes School for girls, Kyoto, which was founded twenty-three years ago and whose buildings are now so inadequate and in such poor condition that the school stands in danger of losing its license from the Japanese government. Fifty thousand dollars are needed for additional land, a new dormitory and a new Academic building and the Auxiliary as a whole undertook to raise this amount before Nov. 1st, 1917. Pledges were made by individuals and organizations. I promised that North Dakota would give at least \$25.00 and as much more as possible. It is by all working together that great things can be accomplished and I hope you will remember St. Agnes when you are voting the money at our disposal for missionary purposes.

Another great enterprise, which is the largest missionary undertaking ever attempted by our American Church is the raising of the sum of \$500,000.00 for an international hospital at Tokyo, Japan, to be a concrete evidence of the healing power of Christianity both physically and spiritually. When the Convention met, \$89,000 of this amount were still lacking and a mass meeting was held where addresses were made and pledges were called for. Bishop Tyler promised that the District of North Dakota would give \$250.00. As you know I made an appeal last winter to the Auxiliaries and Guilds for contributions for this purpose and so far \$129.00 has been received and forwarded. I wish to thank all who have responded to this appeal and to commend it to the attention of those who have not yet done so.

In November I was invited to visit Grand Forks and Larimore and give an account of the Great Convention which I was pleased to do. My expenses were paid and I was most hospitably entertained. This is a feature of our state work which can be made most effective by co-operation. Mrs. Holt, Mrs. Haxby, Mrs. Gowran, Mrs. Wineman or myself all stand ready to visit any of the Guilds upon invitation, to explain new methods of work and tell of matters of missionary interest.

We all need shaking up at times and an outsider can often awaken interest and give us a new view point when we are working in a rut and need to know something of what others are doing. Will you not make this a feature of your work when you resume activities in the fall? Secure a speaker, arrange for a big meeting, see that all your members are notified and tell them to bring their friends. Appoint a good committee who will provide a couple of musical numbers and direct the serving of light refreshments at the close of the meeting so there may be opportunity for talking over what has been presented. Put the interest and the careful planning into it which have characterized the club movement in our state and you will be surprised at the results. If two or more towns on the same line of railroad can arrange meetings on consecutive days and have the same speaker the expense of the railroad fare can be lightened in this way.

It was a matter of deep regret to all Auxiliary women when we learned a few months ago that Miss Emery the general secretary of the Women's Auxiliary had resigned after forty years of service. As Bishop Lloyd said "Miss Emery and the Auxiliary have grown up together" and much of the effectiveness of this splendid organization is no doubt due to the spiritual personality of its leader. Miss Grace Lindley, who has been at the head of the Junior Auxiliary for several years and has been a great force in the promotion of mission study has been appointed in her place. Mrs. Biller, widow of the late Bishop of South Dakota is also doing good work as assistant secretary and I have been informed that she will spend some time in our Province next fall in which case we certainly wish to have her come to Fargo and visit as many points as possible. I heard Mrs. Biller speak in St. Louis and she is an interesting, convincing talker, a woman of great earnestness and spirituality. It is planned to have her visit followed by the holding of an institute for the training of workers and if these plans mature we will be glad to entertain all who come to Fargo for this purpose.

(The portion of the address relating to the Pilgrimage of Prayer has already been printed in the Sheaf and will be omitted here.)

Standing upon the threshold of the nation's entrance into the great war which we are entering, not for material gain nor selfish advancement, but to further the cause of liberty and democracy, we are called upon to give of our sons, of our means and of our time to help this great cause. I am sure our churchwomen will not be found lacking in response to the many appeals which will come to them but in responding to these I hope that our missionary work will not be neglected. In the last three years of strain and stress in England and in Canada missionary funds have grown rather than diminished and there has been an increasing appreciation of what this great work means to the world at large.

In these troublous times, when change and distress and uncertainty are all about us and we know not what a day may bring forth, may we be strengthened and sustained by the promise which comes to us individually now just as it came to the prophet of old, "Fear thou not; for I am with thee; be not dismayed for I am thy God; I will strengthen thee; yea, I will help thee; yea, I will uphold thee with the right hand of my righteousness."

WOMAN'S MEETING AT INDIAN CONVOCATION

The following reports were read and accepted—**St. Gabriel's Red Hail** read by Mrs. Mary Gates—Seventeen members—people scattered, meetings irregular. Gifts to missions \$12.75. Special gift from Mrs. Joseph Two-bears for missions \$5.00, and \$17.00 expended to help needy in village. Two members of guild died during winter.

St. James' Cannon Ball, report given by Mrs. Julia Bearpaw. Earnings for the year \$53.00, gift for missions \$20.51. Spent for seed wheat (proceeds from field to go to missions) \$5.00. Many in village needed help during the winter. Thirty-two members mostly women on in years.

Mrs. Emma Different-cloud, an old woman, made an appeal for help towards a well at the mission.

St. Paul's Ft. Berthold, Mrs. Paul Yellow-bear, president of guild. Report given by Mrs. Byron Wilde. Four members. Mission divided by river, people seldom get together. Gift to missions \$6.00. Worked all year to get ready for Convocation. Earnings for year over three hundred dollars. Over two hundred people to be entertained meant hard work for a congregation numbering ten. Convocation a foretaste of Heaven, people from many places coming together for the one purpose of Praise.

The following officers were elected: President, Mrs. Byron Wilde, Ft. Berthold; Vice-president, Mrs. Ella Simpson, Ft. Berthold; Secretary, Mrs. Eva Rattling-tail, Cannon Ball; Treasurer, Mrs. Julia Cross, Cannon Ball.

The meeting was most inspiring and helpful. The work done by the Indian women of North Dakota is worthy of the greatest praise.

CHURCH HALL REPORT

On the first of May, 1917, we closed the 12th year of the work of the Church Hall, Valley City, and the fifth year that I have submitted a report of that work to you.

The work among the girls is much the same from year to year. We are a pretty large family, and, in the main, a very happy one. Of our average 24 girls, a proportion of somewhat over one third are communicants of the Church, while several others are attendants at the services. Three girls were confirmed from the Hall this year, Lydia Nelson, of St. Paul, Louise Porter of Finley, and Geraldine Howell of Lisbon. All are most loyal and faithful in their attendance at the services, and active in the Choir, Sunday School, and Altar Guild.

It is a matter of great regret that, financially, we are unable to submit as favorable a report as in the past five years. This is due to a number of reasons, first and foremost of which is the ever present topic of the high cost of living. It was recommended at the Convocation last year that the price of board and room be raised from \$4.50 to \$5.00 a week, or from \$18.00 to \$20.00 a month. This was not done until the winter term, the reason being that the State and other Dormitories were not willing at that time to make the change, (tho' they found it necessary to do so later), and we felt it impossible or at least inadvisable to be the only one to do so. We have also for the first time, had one or two vacancies each term this year, the cause also in this matter being the H. C. of L. Starting with the Hall full at the commencement of the term, one or two, for one reason or other have dropped out of school. An epidemic of Scarlet fever of a light nature in the city, affected us also, and some of the girls were in the Detention Hospital for several weeks. We do feel however that we have done everything we could to economize, without lowering our standard of board and general efficiency. We are now keeping but one maid, while two of the girls are helping with the work, receiving a reduction on their expenses for so doing. But in spite of all retrenchments, we have fallen behind this year about \$200.00.

At Convocation last year, Mr. W. L. Williamson of Lisbon, and Mr. C. C. Gowran of Grand Forks gave \$25.00 each to much needed repairs in the Matron's rooms. With this money the roof and ceiling were repaired, floors varnished and a small gas grate installed. All of this has added greatly to the appearance and comfort of the rooms and we are very appreciative of the gifts which made it possible.

Many Guilds and Auxiliaries have remembered us this year, and although we have thought that we were appreciative of such assistance in years past it has seemed doubly welcome this year, when so much thought has had to be given to all expenditures. We have received boxes or money from the following:

Williston Guild—Barrel of fruit, etc.

Valley City Guild—Box of Taylor Fruit, 2 table cloths and two dozen napkins.

Walshville Guild—Two prs. of blankets, three quilts, etc.

Devils Lake Guild—\$5.00.

Dickinson Altar Guild—\$5.00.

Grand Forks Auxiliary—Four dozen napkins.

Fargo Guild—\$25.00.

Beach Guild—Household linen, bureau scarfs, towels, comforters, pillow slips, etc.

Jamestown Guild—Box of fruit and linen.

Sarles Guild—\$5.00.

Webster Guild—\$5.00.

Williamsport, Pa.—Five quilts, 12 pillow slips, 6 sheets, 2 dozen napkins, towels, etc.

We ask your continued interest and assistance for the coming year; it is going to be a very hard year, for us, and we shall need the co-operation of the whole Church in the District, and of everyone in it who is interested in this phase of the work of the Church. With your efforts added to ours, we hope to still be able to solve the problem of furnishing a **real home** to our girls at as moderate cost as possible during the coming year, in which there seems little prospect of any material decrease in prices.

MISSION STUDY REPORT

The Cathedral Parish has endeavored to at least set a good example to other parishes in the line of Mission Study, this past year. Two new classes have been formed, credit for which is due our Dean.

The Men's Mission Study discussion class held weekly meetings during Lent, and used as the basis of their discussions, "The New World" a book prepared by the Mission House, especially for mission classes. The different members in turn acted as leaders. Our president, Mrs. Hancock, conducted a boy's class, which also met weekly during the Lenten season. The book entitled "Manana", an attractive version of "The New World", prepared especially, for Junior Study was used by the leader. The junior girls at their regular work meetings were instructed in church history. The Woman's Auxiliary for their regular monthly programme meetings have taken as their subjects for papers, talks and readings, the work of the church among the Southern Mountaineers, and colored people. During Lent a study class met weekly, using as its text book "The New World". Wahpeton has made a most encouraging beginning. The president reports a program committee appointed, a program meeting held, and selected readings given at each guild meeting. United offering boxes have been distributed, and she adds, "we hope to more than double what we gave last year."

Grand Forks Auxiliary selected for their monthly programme meeting miscellaneous subjects of missionary interest. For their Lenten Mission study class which met weekly, they also used "The New World" as a text-book. I will say for the benefit of those who are not familiar with this book that the New World is Latin America, which includes Mexico, Central and South America, Cuba, Porto Rico, Haiti and Panama. So many problems of politics, industry, race and religion are presented in the book, that it affords material for thought and discussion for more than a Lenten season.

The Mission House at considerable trouble and expense prepares a book yearly for this work. Some country where the needs are deemed urgent, or some phase of mission work that the Board desires to bring to the knowledge and attention of the people is selected; the situation is carefully studied and then presented in a brief interesting way with questions and suggestions, that aid in the study. It is the desire of those who prepare this work, that all the Auxiliaries and study classes make use of it, for if all the Church people throughout the country were to **read** and **think** and **pray** for the same object, what a great spiritual force it would be.

The material for the juniors is usually arranged in the form of stories, plays or dramas. A list of these can be found in almost every "Spirit of Missions."

I will again state as I have for the last three years, that the Fargo Auxiliary has on hand material which it will be glad to supply to any one desiring it. Outlines of programmes will also be furnished on application.

The material used for our programmes on the Southern Mountaineers and Negroes, we will gladly send to any guild, sufficiently interested to make use of it. There is also available a brief history of the United Offering suitable for one or more programme meetings.

In addition we have at present a nice series of "Missionary Reviews", for which the Bishop subscribes and which he presents to the Auxiliary. These are especially suited for readings at Guild meetings, for they contain many interesting articles on countries where our church has no missions, and of which therefore, we have little or no knowledge. We are glad to share these magazines with others.

I wish all the church women could realize the importance of subscribing to the "Spirit of Missions". It is a Mission library in itself, and should be a great aid in the realization of the importance of this work. Those whom we regard as authority in the matter tell us, that it is what we do for **others**, not ourselves, not our own parish, that is the real measure of our Christian efficiency, our spiritual attainments.
