REPORT OF THE SECRETARY.

The Sixth Annual Meeting of the Women's Missionary League was held in Trinity Chapel, Newark, on the 13th of October, 1880.

After prayers the election of officers for the ensuing year took place, which resulted in making Mrs. T. A. Starkey, President ; Mrs. C. G. Craig, Vice-President ; Mrs. W. C. Hicks, Corresponding Secretary ; Miss S. J. Schoch, Recording Secretary ; Mrs. J. W. Russell, Treasurer.

The Directresses for the several branches of Missions came next in order. For Diocesan Missions, Mrs. G. L. Heckscher ; for Domestic Missions, Mrs. T. M. Tuthill ; for Foreign Missions, Mrs. Nathaniel Niles ; for Mexican Missions, Mrs. R. C. Rogers ; for Home Missions to Colored People, Mrs. J. S. Mackie ; for Indian Missions, Mrs. J. W. Russell.

The summary of the season's work is as follows :

Mrs. G. L. Heckscher reports three Diocesan boxes sent, value \$367.33.

Mrs. Tuthill reports four Domestic boxes ; one sent to South Carolina, value \$240.22 ; one to Illinois, value \$87.50 ; one to Tennessee, value \$21.00 ; making a total of \$348.72.

Mrs. Niles reports \$25.00 sent to Jaffa, Syria, for the Odenheimer Scholarship in Miss Hays' school ; \$100 contributed to the expense incident to the training and outfit of a nurse for Wuchang Hospital, China.

Mrs. Mackie has sent two boxes to the Freedmen ; one to Virginia, value \$59.00 ; one to Georgia, value \$35.00. Total, \$94.00.

Mrs. Rogers has sent \$57.00 to Mexico.

Mrs. Russell reports three boxes sent to the Indian Missions of the Northwest ; one to the Indian Deacon, Phillip De Loria, value

\$150.00 ; one to the Niobrara store-room, value \$48.00 ; one to Santee Agency, value \$57.56. Total \$255.56.

The value of boxes packed by the League amounts to \$1,247.61 ; money contributed, \$538.44 ; making an aggregate of \$1,786.05. In addition to this the missionary work done in the various parishes represented in the League will be found on another page.

The Bishop and Convocation having determined upon aggressive work in the northern part of the State, asked the co-operation of the Women's League in the project known as the Associate Mission, which is simply the establishment of a centre from which to work in a neglected portion of the diocese. At the regular monthly meeting in March, the Bishop, the Rev. Mr. Stansbury and Rev. Mr. Bishop were present, and the matter was formally presented for consideration. Addresses were made in explanation and favor of the plan, and the delegates were desired to consult with their several Rectors and parish societies as to their inclination and ability to meet this new drain upon their resources. A house was needed, and furniture to make it habitable for a clergyman and family ; his living was also to be secured ; all of which would require no meagre sum. This was not to supersede or embarrass work already begun, nor make void pledges already made ; so, to avoid this, special efforts would be requisite. In response to this appeal, money to the amount of \$1,329.88 was reported at the last meeting in May. There have also been promises of furniture, bed and table linen, etc. A portion of this money has been placed in the hands of the Treasurer of the League ; the larger part is still held by the parishes in which collected. The League numbers sixty-seven (67) delegates, from twenty (20) parishes. The average attendance was thirty-six.

The number of delegates sent is at the option of the parish, and varies from two to six.

Christ Church, Hackensack ; Grace Church, Franklin ; Christ Church, Newark, and Christ Church, Newton, have been added in the past year. These accessions are received with great gladness, and it is hoped that others may follow, feeling sure that such would be the case if the object of the League and its workings were more generally known. A League box is filled by any or all who may feel inclined to contribute, so that a parish not able to send off a box independently may unite with others in like circum-

stances in so doing. Many valuable boxes are packed in this way, and much good done, without great strain or expenditure in any one source. Specially is this the case in sending boxes to the Freedmen and Indians. The school in connection with each of these Missions is a very important feature. Sewing is a very necessary branch, and much time is consumed in the preparation of work. Sewing materials, nicely basted plain sewing, if only pieces of calico, are valuable helps to the over-busy teacher. Underclothing of unbleached cotton for both girls and boys, books and picture-cards, are valuable, particularly about Christmas-time. Clothing that has been laid aside, if in good condition and repair, is acceptable in both of these branches. The League gives the opportunity to all who have the desire to do, and invites cordially any who have time and inclination to work, whether representing parishes or not. Beside the ordinary routine business addresses are frequently made by those who have had experience in the missionary field. Letters are read from those who have received aid or those appealing for it. Bishop Hare made one meeting of the last season interesting by his account of the Indian schools, and also of the promising young Indian Deacon, Phillip De Loria. Miss Emery usually finds time to make us one visit during the season, generally with some urgent appeal in hand, and always finds ready hearers. The Bishop of the Diocese drops in upon us occasionally, with a few words of encouragement and approval. All know the power of united effort and concentrated action—there is a strong bond in a common interest. In doing good to others we benefit ourselves, and, it is hoped, in a humble way help to promote a truly Diocesan spirit.

We have good grounds for encouragement—we have added to our lists several parishes in the past year, our receipts are larger than ever before, and trust that this knowledge may inspire each and all with new energy for the work of the coming year.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY.

The Seventh Annual Meeting of the Woman's Missionary League of the Diocese was held in Trinity Chapel, Newark, October 5th, 1881, the President in the chair.

After prayers the Society proceeded to elect its officers for the year. The officers of the preceding year were retained without exception: Mrs. T. A. Starkey, President; Mrs. C. G. Craig, Vice President; Mrs. W. C. Hicks, Corresponding Secretary; Miss S. J. Schoch, Recording Secretary; Mrs. J. W. Russell, Treasurer. The Directresses of the several branches were likewise reelected. They report as follows:

Mrs. G. L. Heckscher, of Diocesan Missions, reports two boxes sent, value \$182.00; cash, \$77.00. Total, \$259.00.

Mrs. T. M. Tuthill, of the Domestic branch, reports four boxes packed and sent; one box to Franklin, Tenn., value \$253.55; cash to the same, \$30.00; one box to Lima, Ill., value \$106.50; one box to Denver, Col., value \$39.00; one box to Tarboro, N. C., value \$38.00. Total, \$467.05.

Mrs. Nathaniel Niles, of Foreign Missions, reports \$25.00 for the W. H. Odenheimer Scholarship in Miss Baldwin's school, Jaffa, Syria; \$151.73 collected for outfit and expense of sending an assistant teacher to Miss Pitman's school at Tokio, Japan. Total, \$176.73.

Mrs. R. C. Rogers reports \$40.00 for Mexican Missions. At the last meeting in May a scholarship was founded in the Cathedral school in the City of Mexico, to be called the Julia Starkey Scholarship, to which object \$7.00 were given at the time. Total, \$47.00.

Mrs. Mackie, of Home Missions to Colored People, reports two boxes; one box sent to Wilmington, N. C., value \$135.00; one box sent to Halifax, Virginia, value \$125.00; \$7.00 to Columbia, S. C. Total, \$267.00.

Mrs. J. W. Russell, of Indian Missions, reports one box sent Rev. Amos Ross and family, including two catechists, value \$156.00; three barrels to Niobrara store-room, value \$30.00, \$40.00, \$60.00. Total, \$286.00.

For the Associate Mission at Washington, N. J., \$613.37 has been reported as having been paid to Mr. W. C. Hicks, of Summit, the Treasurer.

Two scholarships are supported by the contributions of the League—the W. H. Odenheimer at Jaffa, Syria, the “Julia Starkey” in the City of Mexico. Four are reported by members of the League—one at Salt Lake City, supported by the women of Trinity Church, Bergen Point; two in Duane Hall, Shanghai, China, by those of Grace Church, Orange; one in St. Paul’s school, Yankton Agency, by an individual member of the League.

Eight meetings have been held on the second Wednesday of each month, beginning in October and ending in May.

The League numbered 63 members, representing 18 parishes. The average attendance was 27, lower than that of last year, which is readily accounted for by the very unusual number of cold and stormy days, preventing many from attending whose habit and desire was so to do. The sum total is not so large as that of last year, but the work has not been less; there has been no diminution in number or value of boxes sent. In the Domestic branch there has been a very decided increase. In Home Missions to Colored People, also, the sum reported exceeds that of several preceding years. Foreign and Indian are greater than last year. The seeming decrease in the sum total is in the amount given to the Associate Mission, a special effort having been made for that object last year by the recommendation of the Bishop. The League has not added to its numbers in the past year as we could wish and think would be the case if its operations and workings were more generally known. That the missionary spirit which has been awakened among Church women is greatly quickened by the periodical meetings, by hearing the appeals for aid, the letters of grateful acknowledgment from those who have received it, will hardly be denied; that the work of helping those in need is greatly facilitated by the combination of parishes will also be admitted. What one cannot do, another may or several may unite in doing. None are too poor to contribute to the Indian and Freedmen’s boxes, both of these races seeming to have a special claim upon us—in reality, foreign missions brought home.

That the clergy in the outlying mission stations both South and West should, in their arduous labor and isolated position, look to

us for aid is only natural and proper, and it is a matter for thankfulness and congratulation that they have not looked in vain, for the last report of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions records the sum of \$143,695.80 for the year ending September, 1881—woman's work in forty-three Dioceses. Might not Northern New Jersey be more fully represented?

The annual meeting for the election of officers, which by our By-Laws has taken place in the Autumn, has been changed to the last meeting in the Spring, so that a public meeting may be held in October without retarding the work. We record regretfully several unavoidable changes in our Directresses. Mrs. Mackie, so long the head of Home Missions to Colored People and greatly interested therein, has been obliged to resign her position by reason of change of residence to another Diocese. Her loss will be sincerely and generally felt. Mrs. C. M. Sanderson, of Trinity Church, Newark, takes her place. Mrs. R. C. Rogers, who for the past year has had the Mexican Mission in charge, resigns from a like cause. She is succeeded by Mrs. F. C. Henderson, of Grace Church, Orange. Mrs. Niles resigns her position as Directress of the Foreign department, but still keeps her place and interest in the general work of the League. Mrs. J. S. Cox, of Grace Church, Orange, takes her place. Mrs. T. M. Tuthill, who has been for a number of years identified with the Domestic Missions, and very active in that department, is succeeded by Mrs. W. C. Hicks, of Calvary Church, Summit, who for some years has occupied the position of Recording Secretary. Miss Phoebe Carter, of Irvington, will fill that office.

It will be noticed that four of the six divisions have been changed. Though deplored the necessity, we firmly hope and believe that these changes will in no wise slacken or retard the progress of the work, but rather be the means of instilling greater life and activity in each department. We should be glad if the clergy of the adjacent parishes, who have not heretofore been associated with us, would inform themselves of the object and workings of the League, and send representatives from their respective congregations, increasing the work by increase of numbers. May the encomium be written of each and every one of us, the members of the League, "She hath done what she could."

CONSTITUTION
OF THE
WOMAN'S MISSIONARY LEAGUE.

ARTICLE I. This Society shall be called the Woman's Missionary League of Northern New Jersey.

ARTICLE II. Its object shall be to work in connection with the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE III. This Association shall consist of all persons who shall contribute to the treasury thereof annually at least the sum of one dollar, or who shall render, in materials or serving, substantial aid to missions. Any one may be constituted a life-member by the payment, at one time, of the sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25).

ARTICLE IV. The officers of this Association shall be a President, Vice President, Corresponding Secretary, Recording Secretary, and Treasurer. There shall be, moreover, a Board of Managers, consisting of the above-named officers and of two or more ladies from each parish represented in the Association, whose duty it shall be to regulate its affairs, and, under the supervision of their rectors, to further the work of the League in the parishes to which they respectively belong. The methods by which the ends of this organization can be furthered are the raising of money for the support of missionaries and teachers; for the education of those who may be preparing for the work; and for other benevolent purposes connected with the mission; the making, collecting and transfer of clothing, and other material aid; and the publication of papers and pamphlets that may serve to stir up a public interest in the welfare of the different missions.

ARTICLE V. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at the meetings of the Association and of the Board of Managers; to call special meetings of the same when occasion shall require, and to countersign all drafts on the Treasurer.

ARTICLE VI. It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to conduct the correspondence of the Association, especially that with the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, and from her to obtain fresh information of the different missions, to be read at stated meetings of the Board.

ARTICLE VII. It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to keep minutes of the proceedings of the Association and Board of Managers; to send out all notices of stated and special meetings of the same, and to prepare an annual report.

ARTICLE VIII. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and keep account of all moneys and materials contributed for the work of the Association, and to pay all drafts on the funds when countersigned by the President.

ARTICLE IX. This Constitution shall not be altered except at an annual meeting of the Association, notice of the proposed change having been given at a stated meeting of the Board of Managers.

B Y - L A W S .

1. There shall be a Public Anniversary of this Association in the Autumn of each year, with missionary addresses or sermon, at which time a collection shall be made for such mission or missions as shall be designated at the time.
2. There shall be an Annual Meeting of the League in the Spring of each year, at such hour and place as the Secretary, with advice of the President, shall designate.
3. The election of Officers and Board of Managers shall take place at such meetings, and they shall continue in office for one year, or until their successors are appointed.
4. In case of vacancy of any office by the death or removal of its occupant, the same may be filled at a stated meeting of the Board of Managers, and any one so elected shall continue in office until the next meeting of the Association.
5. The Stated Meetings of the Board of Managers shall be on the second Wednesday of each month, in Trinity Chapel, Rector street, Newark, or any other place designated.
6. At the meetings of the Board of Managers any number present shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, and at the Annual Meetings a number of members equal to one-half the number of parishes represented therein shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.
7. Each parish shall be considered as represented at the Stated Meetings of this Association in the absence of their delegates if a report is sent to the Corresponding Secretary.
