## SECRETARY'S REPORT.

The Woman's Missionary League of the Diocese of Northern New Jersey presents its tenth annual report.

After the summer vacation, the monthly meetings of the League were resumed on the 8th of October, 1884, and since that time have been held, without interruption, on the second Wednesday of every month, until the 13th of May, 1885, inclusive. On some of these occasions the time was devoted entirely to the business before the League; on others, we had the pleasure of listening to addresses from active workers in the Missionary field. At the November meeting Miss Sybil Carter spoke on behalf of Missions in general, making an especial appeal for the Mormons, in March the Bishop of Arizona addressed us and presented the claims of his own branch of church work.

The Annual Meeting was held in Grace Church, Jersey City, on December 11th, 1884. It was opened with Morning Service and Celebration of the Holy Communion, after which addresses were delivered by the Bishop of the Diocese, by the Rev. Mr. Kimber, the Rev. Dean Holley, a ~~Priest~~ Priest who had formerly been a Missionary to the Indians, and Mr. Gardiner, a lay Missionary to Japan. In the afternoon the Delegates held their business meeting, at the close of which Miss Julia C. Emery, the General Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, delivered a very interesting and touching address. In the evening Prayers were said in Grace Church, the music being rendered by the surpliced choir. Mr. Herbert Welsh made an earnest speech on behalf of the Indians, Dr. Brown, formerly a Medical Missionary to China, spoke for the cause which he represented, and Bishop Elliott offered a plea for the Missions under his charge.

During the day of the Annual Meeting the Delegates were the guests of Grace Church, Jersey City, and of St. John's Free Church, Jersey City Heights. To the ladies of these Parishes they are much indebted for the kind hospitality which they received.

The reports of the Directresses who have charge of the six departments into which our work is divided, are as follows:

Mrs. Hicks, Directress for Diocesan Missions, reports that she has sent to the Associate Mission three packages, the value of which collectively was \$44.00, and that she has also sent to three Missionaries the sum of \$172.00, making a total of \$216.00.

Mrs. Holley, Directress for Domestic Missions, reports one box sent to Fairfield, Iowa, valued at \$210.40; cash sent to a Missionary at Kinston, North Carolina, to the amount of \$35.00, and \$5.00 for the support of Sister Eliza, Denver, Colorado, making a total of \$250.40.

Mrs. Niles, Directress for Foreign Missions, reports \$25.00 for the Bishop Odenheimer Scholarship in Jaffa, Syria; \$200.00 for the building of a Hospital in Tokio, Japan; \$40.00 from Grace Church, Orange, Scholarship in St. Mary's Hall, Shanghai, China; \$40.00 for Grace Church Scholarship in Duane Hall, Shanghai, China, and \$40.00 for "Pinckney-Henderson-Adams" Scholarship in Japan, making a total of \$345.00.

Mrs. Henderson, Directress for Mexican Missions, reports \$50.00 from Grace Scholarship, given by girls of Grace Church Sunday School, Orange, New Jersey; \$20.00 from McCall Adams Scholarship, paid by Ladies' Parish Association, Grace Church, Orange; \$40.00 for the Julia Starkey Scholarship, from the League, and \$20.00 for a suffering clergyman in the Diocese of Hidalgo, Mexico, making a total of \$130.00.

Mrs. Russell, Directress for Indian Missions, reports four barrels of clothing sent, the value of which collectively was \$258.44; \$60.00 given for the Northern New Jersey Scholarship in St. Paul's School, Yankton; \$25.00 for a clerical suit for an Indian Missionary, and \$5.00 towards the purchase of a bell for a church at White Swan Agency, making a total of \$348.44.

Mrs. Wright, Directress for Home Missions to the Colored People, reports \$50.00 given to support a Scholarship in Rev. Mr. Babbitt's School, Columbia, South Carolina; a Christmas box sent to Lincolnton, North Carolina, valued at \$10.00; a Christmas box sent to Lawrenceville, Va., valued at \$10.00; packages to Rev. Mr. Babbitt's School to the amount of \$25.25, and contributions for stipends for Missionaries to the amount of \$32.00, making a total of \$127.25.

The League supports four Scholarships: the Northern New Jersey Scholarship at St. Paul's School, Yankton Agency; the

Bishop Odenheimer Scholarship at Jaffa, Syria; the Julia Starkey Scholarship in the City of Mexico, and the Harrison Williams Scholarship in Columbia, South Carolina. Six Scholarships besides are reported through the League, though sustained by individual Parishes: one in Salt Lake City, supported by the women of Trinity Church, Bergen Point; the Pinckney-Henderson-Adams Scholarship in Japan; the Grace Scholarship in China; the Girls' Scholarship in St. Mary's Hall, China; the McCall Adams Scholarship in the Orphanage, Mexico, by Grace Church, Orange, and the Bishop Tuttle Scholarship, by St. Mark's Church, Orange.

The League numbers 78 members, representing 22 Parishes. Two new Parishes have been added since the last report was written, that of the Holy Communion, Paterson, and St. Stephen's, Short Hills. Four other Parishes have reported through the League, though sending no delegates to its meetings.

In an Appendix we present a short abstract of what has been done during the year in certain Diocesan Institutions, namely: St. Barnabas's Hospital, Newark; Christ Hospital, Jersey City, and the Arthur Home, Summit. As much of the work in these Institutions is under the charge of women, or is the result of their exertions, it was thought proper that, although it is done quite independently of the League, some notice of it should be taken in the yearly account of our labors. Therefore it was resolved, at our last monthly meeting, to make this brief addition to our report, trying by this means to give a more nearly accurate record of woman's work in the Diocese than we could do were this left out of our pages.

Dear friends, we have tried to give you the statistics of what has been accomplished by our organization since we last addressed you, and the story, as you read it, may seem cold and dull, yet we beg you to look underneath the written word and try to perceive the hidden characters which bear witness to the spirit which has animated our efforts.

Consider that the duty in which we are engaged is, essentially, Woman's work. The Church sends forth her dedicated sons and daughters, to teach the heathen in foreign lands, or to instruct the ignorant and erring in our own remote borders. To these who are exiles for the Lord's sake, their sisters in the Church who remain at home send boxes packed with clothing and useful articles, which we hope carry cheer to many a Missionary house-

hold and encouragement to hearts tried by the privations of life on the frontier or in heathen lands. We have had the assurance of more than one Missionary Bishop, that these boxes furnish valuable help to the workers in their jurisdictions. The preparation of them forms a large and important part of the task of the League, but it is not all we have undertaken to do. The cause of Church education has claimed a share in our regards, and we have endeavored to aid it by our Scholarships, by contributions to the stipends for teachers among the colored people, and by sending books where they may aid in the instruction of Divinity Students at the South, or in the teaching of children.

If there is any department of charitable ministration which appeals more strongly than another to the heart of woman, it is that which embraces the care of the sick. We need only point you to the sum raised for the building of a Hospital at Tokio, Japan, to testify that we have been not unmindful of our duty in this respect.

To the wardship of our Church and Nation are committed two races, alien in blood, but of which many members are one with us in the faith of the Church. That we have a Directress appointed to take charge of our work among each of these people, shows that we have remembered those for whom we have a double responsibility as Americans and Churchwomen.

In this summary we have to avoid being prolix, left unnoticed some of the details of the League work and brought to view but little more than some of the general divisions under which it can be classified. We have sketched the outlines and leave it for you, who may read, to fill them in for yourselves from the Parish Reports which are to follow. We pray you in conclusion to remember those women who are trying in their own way, humble though it be, to aid the grand cause of the Church. Remember them in your prayers and in your offerings; help, as you can, the members of our League to make the society to which they belong more and more useful in fulfilling the duties which devolve upon it, and to become more and more worthy of being one of the Lord's own handmaidens.

"The Guild received at its final meeting a statement from the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees, showing that only two hundred dollars was required to complete the Odenheimer Bed Endowment, begun five years ago. The Guild therefore resolved that the two hundred dollars that had just been paid to its Treasurer by the Publishing Committee should be immediately placed on this endowment, so that it might be completed before the close of the Hospital year, on St. Barnabas' Day, 1885."

"A very pleasant feature in the work of the Guild this winter has been the forming, under its auspices, of the Guild of St. Catherine. This Guild of young ladies, under the care of Sister Frances, is already in excellent working order; it holds a meeting at the Hospital on the second Monday of every month, and through its different committees assists in the Chapel services, reads to the sick, mends and sews at the Hospital one day each week, and carries up every day some delicacy for the very sick patients."

CONSTITUTION  
OF THE  
WOMAN'S MISSIONARY LEAGUE.

ARTICLE I. This Society shall be called the WOMAN'S MISSIONARY LEAGUE of Northern New Jersey.

ARTICLE II. Its object shall be to work in connection with the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE III. This Association shall consist of all persons who shall contribute to the treasury thereof annually at least the sum of one dollar, or who shall render, in materials or serving, substantial aid to missions. Any one may be constituted a life-member by the payment, at one time, of the sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25).

ARTICLE IV. The officers of this Association shall be a President, Vice President, Corresponding Secretary, Recording Secretary, and Treasurer. There shall be, moreover, a Board of Managers, consisting of the above-named officers and of two or more ladies from each parish represented in the Association, whose duty it shall be to regulate its affairs, and, under the supervision of their rectors, to further the work of the League in the parishes to which they respectively belong. The methods by which the ends of this organization can be furthered are the raising of money for the support of missionaries and teachers; for the education of those who may be preparing for the work, and for other benevolent purposes connected with the mission; the making, collecting and transfer of clothing, and other material aid; and the publication of papers and pamphlets that may serve to stir up a public interest in the welfare of the different missions.

ARTICLE V. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at the meetings of the Association and of the Board of Managers; to call special meetings of the same when occasion shall require, and to countersign all drafts on the Treasurer.

ARTICLE VI. It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to conduct the correspondence of the Association, especially that with the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, and from her to obtain fresh information of the different missions, to be read at stated meetings of the Board.

ARTICLE VII. It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to keep minutes of the proceedings of the Association and Board of Managers; to send out all notices of stated and special meetings of the same, and to prepare an annual report.

ARTICLE VIII. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and keep account of all moneys and materials contributed for the work of the Association, and to pay all drafts on the funds when countersigned by the President.

ARTICLE IX. This Constitution shall not be altered except at an annual meeting of the Association, notice of the proposed change having been given at a stated meeting of the Board of Managers.

## BY-LAWS.

1. There shall be a Public Anniversary of this Association in the Autumn of each year, with missionary addresses or sermon, at which time a collection shall be made for such mission or missions as shall be designated at the time.
2. There shall be an Annual Meeting of the League in the Spring of each year, at such hour and place as the Secretary, with advice of the President, shall designate.
3. The election of Officers and Board of Managers shall take place at such meetings, and they shall continue in office for one year, or until their successors are appointed.
4. In case of vacancy of any office by the death or removal of its occupant, the same may be filled at a stated meeting of the Board of Managers, and any one so elected shall continue in office until the next meeting of the Association.
5. The stated meetings of the Board of Managers shall be on the second Wednesday of each month, in Trinity Chapel, Rector street, Newark, or any other place designated.
6. At the meetings of the Board of Managers any number present shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, and at the Annual Meetings a number of members equal to one-half the number of parishes represented therein shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.
7. Each parish shall be considered as represented at the stated meetings of this Association in the absence of their delegates if a report is sent to the Corresponding Secretary.
