The Annual Meeting at Cleveland,

May 19th, 1908.

The Annual Meeting of the Ohio Branch of Woman's Auxiliary took place at Grace Church, Cleveland, on May 19th. In spite of the disorganized character of the electric car service both in the city and suburbs, due to the strike, a congregation gathered which filled the Church.

The Convention began its day with the service of Holy Communion, Bishop Leonard being celebrant, assisted by Archdeacon Abbott, the Rev. R. M. Church, and the Rev. C. C. Bubb, rector of Grace Church. In close association, was the annual address of the Bishop,—as always, earnest and helpful.

At the close of this service the business session began—the President, Mrs. W. A. Leonard, presiding. Roll-call was first in order. The minutes of the last meeting were, by resolution, omitted—they having been printed and distributed. The address of the President was then given, followed by the Annual Report of the Secretary and Treasurer, Mrs. C. S. Bates. Mrs. H. P. Knapp made report upon the Junior Auxiliary, and Miss Miriam Norton upon the Babies' Branch. The 1st Vice President, Mrs. S. N. Watson, gave report of the Cleveland Convocation, and Mrs. T. H. Walbridge, 3rd Vice President, of the Toledo Convocation. From the Sandusky Convocation, no report was made, in consequence of the death of Mrs. Hoyt, the 2d Vice President. The report of the United Offering was given by its Director, Mrs. C. D. Hatch, and that upon the Church Periodical Club by its Correspondent, Mrs. Monroe Wolverton. Bishop Leonard also made a brief report as to his disposition of the "Bishop Leonard Fund."

The committee on nomination of new Board of officers appointed were: Miss Stella T. Hatch and Mrs. H. W.

Osborn of Cleveland, Mrs. J. T. Mack and Miss Till of Sandusky, and Mrs. M. B. Schilling of Toledo.

At 12:45 the session adjourned for luncheon, which was served in the Parish House. The luncheon had been provided by the handsome hospitality of the ladies of St. James', Painesville.

At 2:10 the women reassembled in the Church and entered upon the important work of "taking the pledges" for the coming year,—that is, of arranging for the voluntary sharing among the societies of the Annually Sustained Funds. These included six scholarships, the salaries of four missionaries and large sums for Diocesan, Domestic and Foreign Missions. All the funds of last year were provided for, and in addition a new Fund in aid of Bishop Brent in the Philippines was proposed by Mrs. Leonard. Mrs. A. L. Conger, whose residence in the Philippines qualified her to speak with first-hand knowledge on conditions there, addressed the Convention on the great need of the work that Bishop Brent was doing and his marked success; \$225.00 was immediately subscribed.

The Missionary Address of the occasion was then made by the Rev. Dr. Du Moulin, Dean of the Cathedral. It was packed full of suggestive and striking thought—good, portable thought that the delegates might well all carry home with them.

The Bishop then announced his entire approval of the ticket presented him by the nominating committee, and therefrom appointed the following Board of Officers: Mrs. W. A. Leonard, President; 1st Vice President, Mrs. S. N. Watson, of Akron; 2nd Vice President, Mrs. W. A. Thompson, of Sandusky; 3rd Vice President, Mrs. T. H. Walbridge, of Toledo; Mrs. Cyrus S. Bates, Secretary and Treasurer; Mrs. H. P. Knapp, Director of Junior Department; Miss Miriam Norton, Director of Babies' Branch; Mrs. C. D. Hatch, Director of United Offering; Miss Jean Backus, Correspondent of Church Periodical Club. The only changes made in the Board of last year were necessitated by the

death of Mrs. Hoyt and the imperative resignation of Mrs. Wolverton.

The following resolution was introduced and seconded: Resolved, that we extend hearty appreciation and thanks to the ladies of St. James' Church, Painesville, for the very bountiful provision made for us all at luncheon. Resolved, that we are grateful to Mrs. Huntington of St. James' parish who took charge of the dining room and who, with her assistants, served us so well. Thanks are also due Mrs. Handerson of Grace Church and her assistants for a like service in the other rooms. We give special thanks also to the Committee of Grace Parish ladies who took charge of all arrangements here and who so successfully planned all things for our comfort. This resolution was passed by a rising vote.

Bishop Leonard concluded the meeting with a short service of prayer and benediction.

Address of the President.

(Annual Meeting, May 19th, 1908.)

As we come together for this, our Annual meeting, it seems very much like the anniversary of one's birthday. We look back over our year's work, we mark with gratification some things that have been accomplished, and we realize that much that seemed possible and easy to accomplish has not been as fruitful as we had anticipated. And then we look forward to another year of endeavor, with the determination that our aim and work shall be more worthy of the great purposes which we have at heart.

How quickly the years slip away! Does it seem twelve months since we were gathered for our last Annual meeting? No! I am sure it does not. But those months have gone, and it remains with us to live, if God wills it, another year. Shall we not make it one of deeper consecration? I do not say this with any reflection on past efforts; but I am sure we all realize that we do not give our *very best* to our work. How many of us pray with deep earnestness for the dear missionaries, and that their work may be blessed? Some do, I know, but how many do? We must first have the "hearty desire" for the furthering of Missions. It must be a vital question with us; we need the deepening of the spiritual side of our Auxiliary work. Of course we must labor with our hands as hard, and even harder than before,—and we will, if prayer is our motive force.

The Triennial gathering at Richmond was an inspiration to those who participated in it. You have all read about it; how I wish you could all have been present. A great body of people gathered together, and most of their time was spent in considering better methods for the extension of

Christ's kingdom. A great deal was said to stimulate the spiritual zeal of those already working. Material results we must, of course, strive for, but intercession and the development of study must be part of our duty and privilege. We must make it prayer and work.

I have been much gratified at the increase of our study classes for missions. This has been most encouraging, and I feel grateful to Miss Lindley who came and told us how to work along these lines. I feel that a movement in the right direction has been made. While we before had some classes for this study, the growth in interest is marked. In one parish I hear that over fifty persons are enrolled in these study classes. What a power for intelligent service this should be!

Our Secretary will give us today, statistics that will show what you have all been doing in the filling of boxes and the redeeming of your pledges. I am thankful for the record; it marks you as an earnest and devoted band. May you go on and on, and with your good work may you have a larger inspiration and as some one has said "see the vision."

Annual Report of the Secretary.

It is always a pleasure to welcome to the Annual Meeting the dear women and girls who make our Auxiliary work possible,—to meet face to face, those who have shared with us all the year in a common purpose and labor.

Our missionary-year is now ended, we have gathered our harvest; let us examine it with care, to learn if we may, how we can make it even better in the year to come.

The specific plans with which we started out have been well and truly accomplished. The object uppermost in mind at our last Annual Meeting, you will remember, was the United Offering,—the time for its final presentation at Richmond being then less than five months off. We had set our hearts on raising \$3,300, that being five hundred dollars more than our gift of the Triennial before. Mrs. Hatch, Director of the Fund, made so earnest appeals and our women and girls responded with so much zeal and generosity that we really raised not only the \$3,300 which we coveted but \$1,200 beside! It was a splendid demonstration of what an intelligent body of women can do when their hearts are in it.

And we find, too, it was not a mere enthusiasm of the moment. For since the General Convention—during these first months after, in which this object is usually allowed complete somnolence and nothing is done,—Mrs. Hatch has been getting it more strongly entrenched than ever, and you will be surprised when she tells you how the United Offering of 1910 has already begun to grow. But this is Mrs. Hatch's story! The great success of the United Offering is one of the very encouraging features of the year.

Another most encouraging fact is this, that in spite of the sudden "hard times" that have been felt with stinging force, we are told, by almost every family in the land,—

hard times that have crippled so many fair enterprises,—our own Auxiliary work has not paused for a moment but has been able to keep up its record of a fine advance over the achievement of last year. In many towns the numbers thrown out of employment have been so great that our societies have diverted to city charities money that otherwise would have gone into Church enterprises and have turned over to families in need supplies of clothing that were intended for the missionary boxes. Yet, notwithstanding all this, we have not only duplicated the excellent work of last year but have achieved \$1,310.11 beyond it. The whole sum given by the women is \$14,022.57. That of the Juniors including the Babies' Branch is \$1,128.53. The total sum is \$15,151.10. Sixty-seven societies—Seniors and Juniors—have made gains over the work done by them last year. Almost every society—even the smallest—has accomplished something. You will not need more than the fingers of one hand on which to count the societies that have failed to accomplish anything. We feel that our whole field has been thoroughly worked and that the Ohio Branch is really alive, to its finger-tips!

The apportionment to the Board of Missions has been paid in full, with something to spare. That means that we have done what those in authority consider to be our fair share. It should be a matter of pride and satisfaction to you all that in the years since this plan was adopted, not once have we failed to meet our apportionment.

The pledges have been paid. The Ohio Branch now supports six scholarships, maintains two memorial rooms in Hospitals, and pays the entire salary of four missionaries. It has given, beside, \$626 to Bishop Leonard and Arch-deacon Abbott for work in the Diocese, \$553 to Bishop Rowe's work in Alaska, \$560 to Bishop Partridge of Japan especially for the church of the Rev. Charles Reifsnider, who is a missionary from this Diocese. It has given \$120 to Bishop Kinsolving for Brazil, \$100 to Bishop Paddock for East Oregon, \$160 to Oklahoma, \$125 to Sacramento, and many smaller sums to other missions and missionaries.

The missionary boxes have been numerous and good. Some of those which went to the families of clergymen were even ideal in character,—so much of tender sympathy had gone into the making of them. Let me counsel you once again—put Love into your boxes! You may not be able to buy everything you would like for these boxes, but whatever you leave out, do not leave out the Love—the tender consideration that can put yourself in another's place and think what that other would like and how that other would feel.

We have been fortunate this year, more perhaps than ever before, in securing visits to our meetings from Missionary Bishops and other clergy, so that we have gained definite, vivid knowledge of what has been done in these mission fields and what needs to be done. In Toledo, particularly, Mrs. Walbridge was able to secure a list of speakers that proved most inspiring.

Besides this, a well-worked-out series of visits was made by Miss Lindley of New York in the interest of mission study. The Auxiliary is indebted to Mrs. Leonard for this very important step forward. The formation of numerous classes for mission study has been the result. The rector of one parish of not more than four hundred communicants assured me that there were no less than fifty women and girls, in classes conducted by eight or nine leaders, all studying missions with keen interest. If we could have work like this in every parish according to its strength, how surely would follow prayer and personal effort for the missions which we would then know about, whose plans and hopes and needs had become a thoroughly understood and vital thing to us. So, we count these instructions of Miss Lindley a very valuable part of the year's work.

Visits and addresses have also been made by your own officers—Mrs. Leonard, Mrs. Knapp, Mrs. Walbridge, Mrs. Watson, Mrs. Hatch and your secretary. This is something of which we hope to have more done in the coming year, for we are convinced of its value.

We have suffered severe losses by death since last we met. Mrs. Hoyt, our 2nd Vice President, representing the Sandusky Convocation, and President of her parish Branch at Norwalk, after many months of illness was taken from us. Five other Presidents of societies have gone—Mrs. D. P. Rhodes of St. John's, Cleveland; Mrs. Brassington of St. Alban's, Cleveland; Mrs. Thorndike of Findlay; Mrs. Thompson of Painesville; Mrs. Wood of Steubenville. These are women whom we can so ill afford to spare. It is promotion for them—graduation from our humble labors into the glorious work and achievement of the land beyond. How inspiring, how glorious, we cannot even conceive!

But we must find the women who will take up worthily the work which they have laid down. For us who remain there is still our chance,—our chance to do what we can to make humanity better and happier—the precious privilege of helping forward the Kingdom of the Master.

Anyone reading with care the reports of your officers printed in the last Year Book must, I think, have been struck by the one note in common to all of them;—from the very first sentence of the first report to the last and through them all, ran this thought of privilege. Not once, I think, is the word "duty" mentioned, but again and again is emphasized the dear privilege that is given us, to find ways in which we can really serve the Master,—ways in which we can forward the things He cares for.

It is part of the mission of the Auxiliary to find these ways—to be able to put before every woman and every girl who wishes to do something, *a something* which she can do. It is our hope that by instructed thought, by united effort—eager, loving effort—we may make His message tell more fruitfully upon the lives of men. It is our aspiration to really enter into the blessed heritage of service which He offers us—to be indeed fellow-laborers with God,—we say it with awe,—to be fellow-laborers with *God!*

The Junior Auxiliary.

The object of an annual meeting and an annual report is to set us thinking,—thinking of the past year's achievements, of plans for better and truer work in the future, and the many, many reasons we all have for thankfulness for the privilege of service.

The present Junior Director found foundations well laid and good methods established by Miss Thomas and her predecessors, the pioneers for the Juniors in Ohio.

It has been only necessary to follow where they have "blazed the trail," and to build as well as possible on the lines already laid down.

It was my privilege to be present at the General Convention in Richmond in October and to share in the help, and the general enthusiasm that it brought to everyone. Ohio had two exhibits in the Junior Exhibition and we hope they proved suggestive to other branches. Several helpful ideas were brought back for the benefit of our work here.

During the year the Juniors have profited with the Woman's Auxiliary by some of the inspiration that has come from outside the Diocese. Bishop Partridge's eloquence brought a pledge of fifty dollars from the Juniors for his work. Miss Lindley, as Chairman of the Junior department in New York, seemed to belong particularly to us, and her talks gave a most valuable impetus to the plans for Mission Study. It is very gratifying to find how many branches have had mission study in one form or another this past year. The directors of the Juniors are coming to realize more and more that if children and young people are to be trained to give and work and pray for missions, there must first be created a missionary intelligence.

Miss Lindley's beautiful Bible lesson and Dr. Hopkins'

Quiet Day impressed upon us anew the fact that the late Bishop Dudley expressed in these words, "Missionary zeal, flaming, enduring, overwhelming, can be the product of but one power, even of the spirit of the living God," and that "No organization can be of any avail except there be behind it and within it the fire of personal devotion." If we can only increase and develop spiritual life within ourselves and in our young people, there will be a great outpouring of missionary enthusiasm, for the apostolic answer "We can but speak the things which we have seen and heard" is the law of human nature.

Because so many branches were studying China this year, it was suggested in Richmond that the Juniors all over the country unite in a gift to China, a gift which should be over and above their regular pledges. In order to have a part in this, we sent to the Diocese of Newark and borrowed "San Pao," (a Chinese doll dressed by the girls of St. Mary's Orphanage, Shanghai). Five Junior branches gave receptions in honor of Miss San Pao, and Ohio, as a result, has given forty dollars for the China Fund. Two branches have presented "The Little Pilgrims and the Book Beloved." I wish it might be given this coming year in every parish in the Diocese, for it is instructive devotionally and missionary-wise for all who take part and all who listen. The Juniors have contributed to the usual pledges of the Auxiliary. We were asked to give \$200 this year as our share of the apportionment,—eighteen dollars more than last. We have given \$231.50.

In Miss Thomas' last report she said that the Junior department in Ohio needed unity more than any other one thing. To remedy this defect and to make each Branch realize itself as part of a great whole,—like the "leaf on the twig and the twig on the branch" of the nursery rhyme, several plans have been tried this year. A special effort has been made to arouse interest in the United Offering; the Juniors joined in supplying Christmas gifts to five Sunday Schools in the Diocese, in addition to those for our own Miss Dixon's mountain people and for the appreciative

Arapahoes. This spring we have sent joint boxes to Mission Home, Virginia, and St. Agnes' Hospital, Raleigh. Within the past few weeks Miss Dixon has told us of some very modest needs and the Juniors have undertaken to supply the school-room desks and the shades for the mission house. These require only \$32 and thirteen have already been given. Books and toys for special purposes have also been sent.

The Juniors report this year gifts to the value of \$1,128.53, a gain of \$61.09 over last year. Of this amount \$778.52 was in money gifts, an increase of \$266.29. There was a falling off in the value of boxes, probably because of increased local demands.

We are glad to welcome twelve new branches this year; one of the old ones has been promoted to the ranks of the Woman's Auxiliary and two have been reorganized.

We look forward to the day when the young people of every parish shall be banded together for the spread of Christ's kingdom. We pray, too, that some of the Juniors of Ohio will realize so fully that we have a religion worth passing on that they will feel called to be special "Laborers in the Harvest." Will you not all unite in the prayer for that with us? If Ohio can at last give of her own daughters, she will be truly blessed.

Babies' Branch.

It is a pleasure to record that the Babies' Branch has grown. Not as much as we had hoped, of course, for we shall not be satisfied until the Babies are represented in every parish where there is a Woman's Auxiliary. With this end in view, a letter was sent to each clergyman in the diocese asking him to appoint some young woman to take charge of this work in his parish. To the fifty-three letters sent, but fourteen replies were received. Of these six only, gave the name of the person who would organize a Babies' Branch; one church already had a director, while the other six ministers were waiting to find the right woman, or the appropriate season; and one poor parish reported having no babies!

Now, we must appeal to you women of the Auxiliary, asking you to assist us in introducing this youngest branch into the churches where "The Little Helpers" are not known.

Last year we reported \$18.00 received from four parishes. This year we have \$33.67 from ten parishes. From one old branch we have had no return and there are six new branches which have only just been started, so that we could not expect anything from them yet. The fact that we have grown from eight branches last year to seventeen this year, does not mean that we are satisfied. A diocese of the size and strength of ours, ought to have at least forty.

As each year marks a great change in the life of a baby, we hope the coming year will show an equal development in the work of the Babies' Branch.

REPORT OF THE FIRST VICE-PRESIDENT—CLEVELAND CONVOCA- TION

The Convention Year, just passed, has brought to the women of the Cleveland Convocation an opportunity for six general meetings,—Miss Lindley, of New York, conducting Study Classes and giving especial help to the Directors of our Junior Auxiliary. Bishop Kinsolving of Brazil, Bishop Partridge of Japan—adding the charm of his eloquence to the interest that Japan always has for us, Bishop Paddock making his forceful plea for the great diocese that so needs his wise administration and our help, and last, but not least, the Rev. John Henry Hopkins of Chicago and Mrs. Hopkins. Dr. Hopkins conducted a Quiet Day for the Auxiliary in Cleveland, and Mrs. Hopkins who is the President of the Auxiliary in the Diocese of Chicago gave inspiring Missionary addresses in Cleveland and in Akron.

Missionary papers and pamphlets have been sent by me to the smaller parishes in our Convocation and to Mission Stations which have, as yet, no Auxiliary workers. I also wrote fifty letters and made one visit.

Considering monies and missionary boxes as indicative of the practical interest felt in the work, we are not I am sure filling to the full the measure of our opportunity. I would commend this thought to those of you who are leaders in your several parishes—"Loss of interest in one special line of activity is to be regained only by working in new lines, to the exclusion of the one in which we have overworked." Prof. Halleck says that "the dreamer accustoms himself to become incapable of action. In a proper scheme of training every sensation and resulting idea should be made to have some bearing upon action."

It is the privilege of leadership to formulate plans that shall rouse the dreamers to action and give to the over-busy in old ruts a new vision of service.

REPORT OF THE THIRD VICE PRESIDENT—TOLEDO CONVOCA-
TION.

It is with greater happiness than ever before I make the report from the Toledo Convocation. It has been a year of marked increase in spirituality and more and more, women are coming to feel the blessed privilege of missionary work in the Church.

As a result of the General Convention we were enabled to have a number of missionary Bishops and workers address our Convocation Meetings during the year. The first one was held early in November with Bishop Knight of Cuba as the speaker. Two weeks after there was another which Bishop Spalding and Bishop Partridge addressed. Later in the month still another, at which Bishop Scadding told of his Diocese. All of these meetings were most inspiring and engendered great interest in the work of the several Bishops.

At the regular January meeting we had with us the Rev. Thos. J. Jenkins of Ketchikan, who told us of the work in Alaska, which is always interesting to Auxiliary women. In February, Miss Lindley of New York, gave us two talks on Bible Study and Mission Study classes. During Lent a study class was formed composed of interested women from St. Mark's and Trinity Churches, using as a text book "The Uplift in China." This was a direct result of Miss Lindley's earnest appeal for systematic study of missionary problems. Later in February, Deaconess Drant gave us a most interesting account of her work among the Chinese of San Francisco.

I am able also to report new Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary formed at Bowling Green and at St. Andrew's, Toledo; also a Junior Branch at Grace Church, Toledo.

The offerings of the meetings of the year amounted to \$115.77, which was given to the work of the different speakers and to the Clapp Memorial.

The United Offering.

It was my great pleasure to go, for the first time in my life, to the General Convention at Richmond last October, and to be accorded the privilege, by our beloved President of placing the loving Thank Offering of the women of our Diocese upon the alms basin, at the grand service which was held in Holy Trinity Church on the morning of October the third.

To that service came the women of the Church in our own land and in far distant lands, who had been for three years with prayer and love, and earnest endeavor, uniting in this grand gift, and it was a most inspiring and uplifting occasion, and one that amply repaid your Director for the months of work and anxiety which had preceded it. You can perhaps imagine the great joy which was manifested on the afternoon of that day, when the Treasurer of the Board of Missions announced at the great mass meeting, that we had raised the magnificent sum of \$222,000.00. This was afterwards increased by later contributions to \$224,251.55, which is a gain of \$74,000.00 over the last United Offering.

At the Conference of Diocesan Officers, held on the following Monday, the question of the object for the United Offering of 1910 was one of the most important matters to be decided. After careful consideration the following resolution was offered by the committee appointed, and was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the United Offering of 1910 be given to the Board of Missions for woman's work in the Mission Field; including the training, sending, and support of women workers; also the care of such workers when sick and disabled; but that a sum not exceeding \$15,000 be devoted to a building, or buildings, approved by the Board of

Missions on the recommendation of the General Secretary and the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary. Also, that to our united gifts there shall be added our united and earnest prayers, that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves to the work of the Master, in the Mission field.

In this Diocese, it has been the aim of our officers to endeavor to make a gain of \$500.00, each tri-ennial, so with that aim in view, we had named the sum of \$3,300.00 as the amount we must raise for 1907.

At the time of the annual meeting last May we had on hand \$2,734.00, and at the afternoon session, enough was pledged by the enthusiastic women who were present to insure the full amount.

Notice was given that day that we should have a "Rally" in September to gather in all the last contributions before the Convention at Richmond. This "Rally Day" service was held on the 26th of September in the beautiful new Cathedral, two days after the Consecration, and to it came representatives from all parts of the Diocese.

Notices had been sent to each Parish that this was absolutely the last opportunity to contribute to the United Offering of 1907, but even in our moments of wildest enthusiasm we were unprepared for the grand result of that service, for when we counted the offering we found there had been given that day \$1,089.00. To this was added various sums, which kept coming up to the very last moment, even after we arrived at Richmond, so that the total placed upon the alms basin at the Presentation Service reached the grand total of \$4,515.59, a gain of \$1,700.00 over the offering of 1904. Now, in view of this splendid gain, we feel that we are very modest, indeed, to set \$5,000.00 as the standard for which we are to strive, this tri-ennial, which means another \$500.00 gain. Surely we can do that and more!

Perhaps my dream of having *every* Church woman in the Diocese contribute something to this Thank Offering may be realized. It *would be realized* if only each woman,

who knows the story of the United Offering, would tell it to her less enlightened sisters, and so enlist general interest and enthusiasm.

Many of the women of our Diocese have this matter very near their hearts, as is evidenced by the interest manifested this spring, for in spite of the fact, that they worked until the very last moment in the autumn, even as early as December contributions were received for 1910.

Your Director wrote letters to all the Parishes in January and again in April to remind them of the semi-annual collection this spring and to urge them to adopt a systematic method for raising contributions for this object.

We have every reason to be gratified at the result. The amount given at this first collection is \$596.57.

This sum represents the gifts of thirty-five Parishes. There are fourteen others who will send their first offering in the autumn. There are thirty Parishes, who have left my letters and appeals unanswered, but some of these will do their part later, I know, because they have always done so in the past.

It will be our plan in the future to have semi-annual collections—the next one, in October.

There were but six Branches who made no contributions to the last United Offering, and this time we shall leave no stone unturned to enlist their support, so that we may have no blank pages in our book this tri-ennial.

I desire to express my grateful appreciation for the encouraging and helpful letters which are received, and which prove a source of great inspiration to me, and are one of the pleasantest features of the work.

The Church Periodical Club.

Three years ago the Church Periodical Club in this Diocese was known to but a few interested people who were fanning the flame of its existence, to keep it alive. God has seen fit to bless their efforts and it is a real pleasure to be able to report that the Ohio Branch of the Church Periodical Club has at last come into its own and stands today the largest branch of this organization in the Middle West.

At the presentation of our last report, twelve Librarians were registered, nine of whom sent in reports. This year with twenty-two Librarians registered, nineteen have reported. Two of these Branches have advanced by leaps and bounds, as it were, and I take great pleasure in making special mention of them as having made the most progress during the year. They are Trinity and St. Paul's Branches of Cleveland.

The following statistics show something of what has been accomplished this year:

Number of current periodicals sent regularly, 160.

Number of books sent, 82.

Number of odd magazines and papers sent, 513.

Number of Christmas and Easter cards sent, 38.

Number of calendars sent, 7.

Number of pictures sent, 6.

In miscellaneous literature we have sent 9 barrels, 11 boxes and 10 packages.

Money contributed, \$108.96.

Total amount in money and boxes \$398.48.

The special effort of the year has been the "Traveling Library" which has been sent out on its first mission to comfort, cheer and stimulate those in need of intellectual food.

This library has been given by several of our Branches in memory of our loved ones and has been very appropriately named, "All Saints' Memorial Library" of the Diocese of Ohio. There are now in the United States 26 of these Diocesan traveling libraries making their rounds among the hamlets and towns where there are no library privileges. Each case contains from 50 to 60 well-selected books and has a plate on it engraved with the name of the library—ours bearing the name "All Saints' Memorial." This library may be kept in each town from three to six months, each place paying the freight to the next town. Think of the good these libraries can do in a town where there is no library and sometimes no Church. It is said of a sparsely-settled section of North Carolina that the people didn't know anything about the Church but they knew all about the Church Periodical Club.

Our greatest need now is—more workers. St. Paul's, Medina, and The Ascension at Lakewood are at present without Librarians and there are many other Parishes still unrepresented in this important work.

In a letter of grateful acknowledgment of the work of the Church Periodical Club a clergyman speaks of it as "Silent Missionary work of the most effective kind, the results of which are scarcely dreamt of in Eastern Church circles."

In concluding this very limited report I want to quote a few words from a recent missionary address by the Rev. Dr. Manning, Rector of Trinity Church, New York, because it seems particularly to apply to our work.

"Missions give to us the opportunity for the purest offering that we can make—the most direct and perfect acknowledgment of Him whom we worship and serve—to help men and women whom we shall never see until we meet them in the Streets of the New Jerusalem."

The Annual Pledges.

The largest one of our pledges is made to the Board of Missions for the annual salaries of a lady missionary in China and for two native helpers in Japan. The amount is \$682. Of this, \$550 is paid to Miss Elwin, of Shanghai, \$72 is paid to Miss Yamada, of Fukue, and \$60 to Miss Hayashi, of Sakae.

We pay also \$400 to Archdeacon Hughson for the support of a missionary among the mountaineers of the Blue Ridge,—Miss Eva F. Dixon, St. Paul's Mission, Glen Alpine, North Carolina.

The "Bishop Leonard Fund" is for use among the missions in Ohio, when and where the Bishop thinks it best. We have pledged to him \$500; this year, as for several years past, he will pay \$300 of this amount to the support of the Colored Mission in Cleveland, and \$200 to the salary of the Archdeacon.

The "Expense Fund" covers the cost of publishing the annual report, and occasional circulars or leaflets, the stamps and stationery of the Secretary, traveling expense in starting new Branches, and that of missionaries whom we invite to address us. It is hoped that each society will contribute \$1 at least, during the year, and that the stronger societies will contribute considerably more.

It is much to be desired that every society shall be represented by the contribution of at least a small amount, in these three funds—in the Expense Fund, because we all wish to do our share in maintaining our own work in a strong and aggressive manner; in the Bishop Leonard Fund because we wish to be loyal to the work our own Bishop in trying to do in Ohio; and in the Salary Fund of "our own missionaries," because we wish to feel that they are indeed our representatives—our substitutes.

The Bishop Bedell Scholarship, and the Julia Bedell Scholarship pay for the education of native pupils in St. John's University, Shanghai, China. They require \$70 each per annum. These scholarships were established more than twenty-five years ago, and have been maintained ever since.

The "Foreign Insurance Fund" provides insurance upon the lives of foreign missionaries for the benefit of their families. We of the Ohio Branch pay \$50 into the fund.

The "Ohio Scholarship" in St. Elizabeth's—one of Bishop Hare's Schools, in South Dakota—pays for the education of an Indian pupil; it requires \$60 per year.

The "Contingent Fund" is available for all sorts of emergencies and is of great service. Most often it is expended for overcoats needed without delay, or for clerical suits not otherwise obtainable. The Honorary Membership fees are allotted to this fund. Any woman may become an Honorary Member by paying \$5 *per year*.

Those of our pledges which help the Board of Missions in its appropriations and hence have been counted toward our "apportionment" are as follows: The salaries of missionaries in China and in Japan, \$682; the "Bishop, and Julia Bedell Scholarships," \$140; scholarship in Bishop Hare's school, \$60; the "Sandusky Scholarship" (paid by the Branch at Grace, Sandusky), \$40; District of Alaska, \$500; General Missions, \$227; the "Julia L. McGrew Scholarship" in St. Hilda's school, China, \$50 (paid by the Juniors at St. Paul's, Cleveland); to Cape Palmas, Africa, and to the District of Kearney, each \$10 (paid by "Brook's Society" of the same Church); \$50 for a Memorial Bed at St. Elizabeth's Hospital, Shanghai; the Juniors Fund for China, \$40; \$90 to District of Sacramento and \$160 to Oklahoma.

The Secretary will be glad to answer questions at any time in regard to any of the Auxiliary funds, or to make suggestion if desired as to the designation of any gift contemplated.

Notes.

PLEASE NOTE that packages sent to Mrs. Bates for distribution in missionary boxes should be addressed, *not* to her residence, but to *St. Paul's Parish House, 4108 Euclid Ave., Cleveland*. It is here that the packing is done. Mrs. T. F. Burtenshaw, residing in the house, has charge of our "missionary closets," and packages are always cared for. All articles received will be assorted by the Secretary, or the Junior Director, and sent out again according to need and the particular sizes desired.

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The officers of the Auxiliary very much desire to be in close touch with all the Branches. Particularly, it is a pleasure to the Secretary to know just what is being accomplished all over the Diocese. Drop her a line when you have finished a box or made a money gift, naming value and recipient. Many such items go unrecorded and are forgotten if one waits till the annual collection of reports.

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Should you lose by death one of your members, will you not send the name to the Secretary? We desire to keep a record, but for information must depend, of course, upon the local Branches.

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The "Daughters of the Church" of the Cathedral Branch have held their seventh annual sale of Indian lace for the benefit of the women themselves, members of Miss Carter's lace schools in the Northwest. The amount cleared for them this year was about \$400. (This is not included in the reported gifts of the "Daughters.") The making a market for the handiwork of our Christianized Indian women is purely an Auxiliary enterprise, and is of very great service in the work of uplifting these people.

'How we Manage in Our Society.'

The Woman's Auxiliary of Trinity Church, Toledo, is composed of a band of fifty women, of whom perhaps twenty-five are active workers and who make up in enthusiasm and service what they lack in numbers. We hold meetings weekly and to that fact is due our greatest success. The frequency of meeting keeps up the interest and it enables us to accomplish a great deal in the way of garment-making. Last year we made one hundred and thirty garments. We have a most efficient sewing committee who really have all-day meetings each week. On Friday morning they do all the cutting out of garments and such machine stitching as is necessary, and in the afternoon at the regular meeting of the society they superintend the work of the other members.

The making of rag rugs is also a part of our work; these we sell or send away in our boxes. We always try to make our boxes as attractive as possible and send personal remembrances to the missionary. This "one touch of Nature makes the whole world kin," for we all like to be remembered. It has its beneficent effect on all of us too, and we truly feel, "it is more blessed to give than to receive."

None of the money that comes to the Auxiliary either as dues or donations is used for anything but to pay the "pledges." All materials and gifts are contributed by the members, mostly those who cannot give up the time for active work. Except the "dues" all contributions are voluntary, for nothing is solicited. The needs and deficiencies are stated to the society and they govern themselves accordingly.

The meetings begin at 2 P. M. and close at 4:30 P. M. when we all attend the regular weekly afternoon service

of the Church. On the last Friday of each month we have a study and social meeting. A committee is appointed to outline the course of study for the year. A leader is appointed for each afternoon and it is her duty to see that the different topics are given to the members and to assist them as she is able, as to reference books. We are fortunate enough to have a file of twelve years of the Spirit of Missions and it is simply invaluable in our study.

During the past year we have used the leaflets of the "Growing Kingdom," confining ourselves to Domestic Missions. It has all been extremely simple, for some of our members object strenuously to writing papers. Often times just a question would be asked that could be answered most easily and yet it would give each member a personal interest in the mission field under consideration, and that is the main object—interest. The last half hour is devoted to social intercourse, with very light refreshments. The hostesses for the afternoon arrange for the latter and are personally responsible, so that nothing is taken from the treasury. The social part does much for the society, for we can all become better acquainted and it engenders a general good feeling among us.

The main causes of our continued growth are an increased knowledge, year by year, of the need of the world for Christianity, an earnest wish to know more and more of what is being done (which cannot help but increase enthusiasm and zeal), and finally an untiring desire to do our share in fulfilling Christ's command, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature."

The Convocations.

A list is here given of all the Parishes and Mission Stations of each Convocation in which we have Auxiliary or Junior Branches, and also a list of those where we have none. Please study your own Convocation. Note especially the places that are yet to be gained; if you have friends at any of these points, or can in any way aid us, may we not count upon your assistance?

Cleveland Convocation.

We have Branches in Akron, Ashtabula, Boardman, Canton, in 21 Parishes of Cleveland and suburbs, Cuyahoga Falls, Geneva, Hudson, Jefferson, Kent, Kinsman, Madison, Massillon, Medina, Painesville, Peninsula, Perry, Ravenna, two in Steubenville, in Warren, Wooster, Youngstown.

We have none in the Parishes of Our Saviour, Akron, and St. Stephen's, East Liverpool, nor in the missions of Alliance, Berea, Conneaut, Cross Creek, the Atonement in Cleveland, Dennison, Harbor, Lisbon, New Philadelphia, Salem, Unionville, Wellsville, Willoughby.

Sandusky Convocation.

We have Branches in Bellevue, Bucyrus, Cardington, Catawaba Island, Coshocton, Elyria, Fremont, Galion, two in Gambier, Huron, two in Lorain, Mansfield, Marion, Marysville, Milan, Monroeville, Mt. Vernon, Norwalk, Oberlin, Port Clinton, two in Sandusky, Tiffin.

We have none in the missions of Clyde, Fostoria, Lyme, Mill Creek, Mt. Gilead, Shelby, Upper Sandusky, Venice.

Toledo Convocation.

We have Branches in Bellefontaine, Bowling Green, Defiance, Findlay, Kenton, Lima, Maumee and in seven Parishes in Toledo.

We have none in the missions of Bryan, Hicksville, Napoleon and Sidney.

Diocesan Constitution.

ARTICLE I—Name.

The name of this association shall be The Ohio Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE II—Object.

Its object shall be to work in connection with the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, the field being co-extensive with the Church, diocesan and general. The methods by which the ends of this organization can be promoted, are the raising of money for the support of Missionaries and Teachers, for the education of those who may be preparing for the work, and for other benevolent purposes connected with Missions; the making, collecting and transfer of clothing and other material aid, and the circulation of papers and leaflets that may serve to stir up a public interest in the Missions of the Church.

ARTICLE III—Membership.

Section 1.—Any Parish Auxiliary (Senior or Junior) may become a member of this association by a written announcement of its organization to the Diocesan Secretary.

Sec. 2.—The officers of parish branches shall send to the Diocesan Treasurer all pledges and money given for other than local purposes, and shall report to the Diocesan Secretary by May 1st each year, all work done, with value of boxes and money given. Each parish branch shall be entitled to but one vote in the annual Diocesan meetings, but may send any number of delegates, one of whom shall be authorized to cast the vote and assume pledges for specific work undertaken by the Diocesan branch.

ARTICLE IV—Officers.

The officers of this association shall be a President, three Vice Presidents, a Secretary and Treasurer, and Directors of Junior Auxiliary, of Babies' Branch and of United Offering, to be appointed by the Bishop from names presented by a committee of five (each Convocation to be represented thereupon) elected annually in convention.

One Vice President shall be chosen from each of the three Convocations of the Diocese, as follows: First, Cleveland; second, Sandusky; third, Toledo, and these with the other officers shall constitute a board of managers and trustees of the association.

ARTICLE V—Duties of Officers.

Section 1.—The President shall preside, and in her absence one of the Vice Presidents, in Convocation order. She shall call meetings and perform such duties as pertain to her office; and shall make every effort, through the Vice Presidents and otherwise, to direct the work of the parish branches in raising money for the support of some one or more of the departments of missionary work, and shall form new parish auxiliaries wherever practicable.

Sec. 2.—It shall be the duty of each Vice President in addition to the customary assistance to the President, to take charge of the missionary work in her own Convocation and she may arrange for one general meeting of representatives from the parishes in the Convocation, held annually in October and shall assist the Diocesan officers in the distribution of work, and in every way strive to arouse and maintain active interest in all departments of the work.

Sec. 3.—The Secretary shall correspond with the General Secretary and the missionaries and find out where help is needed, and of what kind; shall inform the parish secretaries and arrange about their work, so that a general oversight may be kept by one person. She shall keep a correct list of all Diocesan officers, parish secretaries and clergymen in the Diocese, with addresses of the same. She shall take the minutes of all meetings and prepare an annual report for circulation in the Diocese. She shall receive and forward all money offerings, and shall pay out money only as voted by the Diocesan branch or Board of Managers, except money received for a definite purpose may be paid for that purpose without a formal vote; shall keep an account of all money and boxes contributed for missionary and other purposes by the parish branches, or individuals; and, as Treasurer, shall after the accounts and vouchers are audited embody a full account in the annual report.

Sec. 4.—An Auditing Committee of two persons, to be appointed by the President, shall examine the accounts, and vouchers of the Diocesan Treasurer, and report result at the annual meeting.

ARTICLE VI—Amendments.

The Constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual meeting of the association; provided, that notice of the proposed change has been given with the call for a meeting.

By-Laws.

I.

The Annual Meeting of this Association shall be held on Tuesday of the week following the Diocesan Convention; but, for good reason, the Board of Officers may appoint the meeting upon some other date.

The place of meeting may be determined upon by vote at an annual meeting, or, failing this, shall be arranged by the Board of Officers.

II.

In case of vacancy in any office the same may be filled at a stated or called meeting of the Board of Managers, and any one appointed by them shall continue in office until the next annual meeting.

III.

Special meetings may be called by the President at such time and place as she may designate, for the purpose of stimulating interest in the work.

IV.

The stated meetings of the Board of Managers, with the President as Chairman, shall be held in May at any place designated, and at these meetings any number present may constitute a quorum.

V.

It is expected that each parish Branch shall contribute not less than one dollar (\$1.00) to the expense fund.

VI.

These by-laws may be amended at any annual meeting by vote of majority present.

The order of services and of business at the annual meeting shall be as follows:

Reports of Officers and Committees.

Statement of Future Work—Receiving Pledges.
