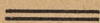

The next Annual Meeting of the Ohio Branch of the Auxiliary will be held (D. V.) in Emmanuel Church, Cleveland, on a Tuesday in May. Ample notification of the exact date will be given.

The Annual Meeting at Cleveland, May 18th, 1909

The Annual Meeting held at St. John's Church, Cleveland, was the occasion of much interest and enthusiasm. It had been proposed that this convention be made "a west side affair" and that all the parishes on that side of the river act jointly in the undertaking. The plan proved to be a great success; the workers not only of St. John's, but of All Saints', St. Mark's, St. Luke's, St. Philip's and Ascension gathered in strong force and with great unanimity carried through every detail of hospitality. It was an occasion long to be remembered with pleasure.

The attendance was large, completely filling the church; beside the nearly four hundred delegates, a noticeably large representation of the city clergy honored us with their presence, and there were many visiting church women not heretofore identified with the Auxiliary.

The meeting began at 10:30 a. m. with the service of Holy Communion and an inspiring address by the Bishop.

The meeting then went into business session, Mrs. Leonard, the President, in the chair. Roll call was first in order. The following delegations answered to their names: From Akron 5, from Cleveland—All Saints' 8, Christ Church 14, Emmanuel 29, Grace 11, Grace Church (south) 3, Good Shepherd 5, Incarnation 11, St. Andrew's 4, St. John's 52, St. Luke's 31, St. Mark's 3, St. Paul's 38, St. Philip's 4, Trinity 37, Cuyahoga Falls 3, East Cleveland 6, Lakewood 24, Elyria 3, Gambier 2, Geneva 10, Lorain 8, Medina 4, Monroeville 2, Norwalk 1, Painesville 27, Perry 5, Ravenna 1, Sandusky 11, from Toledo—St. Andrews' 1, St. Mark's 3, Trinity 5, from Warren 6.

Upon motion, the reading of the minutes of the last meeting was omitted, the same having been printed and distributed.

The nomination of a Nominating Committee was then called for and Mrs. A. L. Conger, of St. Paul's, Akron, responded with the following names: Miss Ella Wright, Cleveland, Chairman; Mrs. Samuel Burridge of Painesville, Mrs. James H. Andrews of Akron, Miss Atwood of Sandusky, Mrs. Wolverton of Toledo. This Committee was unanimously elected.

Reports of the work of the year past were then read by the following: Mrs. C. S. Bates, Secretary and Treasurer; Mrs. H. P. Knapp, Director of Junior Branches; Miss Miriam Norton, Director of Babies Branch; Mrs. C. D. Hatch, Director of United Offering and Miss Jean Backus, Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club.

Mrs. S. N. Watson, 1st Vice President, being unable to be present, sent her report by Mrs. Andrews. Mrs. W. A. Thompson, 2d Vice President, and Mrs. T. H. Walbridge, 3d Vice President, also sent their reports which were read by the Secretary.

At 1:30 the meeting adjourned for luncheon. Four hundred and fifty were served. The lunch was a very bountiful one and beautifully served by representatives of all the west side parishes.

Reassembling in the Church, a paper upon the management of a Junior Society was read by Miss Marietta Atwood of Calvary parish, Sandusky. This paper was prepared by way of carrying out the idea that each Annual Meeting should offer the delegates something of value upon practical method.

The pledges were then taken for the work of the year to come. Immediately after, the Missionary Address of the day was given by the Rev. George P. Mayo, worker among the Mountaineers of Virginia. There was no attempt at rhetorical effect, but the address held the audience with closest attention and aroused much enthusiasm. It was a plain unvarnished tale of the "how and why of Missions" to the people of the mountains. And it was most reassuring to know that the Church's work is being carried on by methods so absolutely sane and practical. Mr. Mayo

made a special plea for money to buy additional land much needed by the Industrial Farm. At the close of the address about \$400 for this object was pledged by the various societies and by individuals.

A resolution expressing appreciation of the hospitality enjoyed by the Convention and thanks therefor was passed by a rising vote of the entire assembly.

An invitation for the next Annual Meeting was given by Emmanuel Church, Cleveland, and was accepted with enthusiasm.

The Bishop then announced that the Board of Officers would remain the same as before, he having approved the list presented him by the Nominating Committee.

The meeting closed with a short service of prayer and benediction.

Address of the President

(Annual Meeting, St. John's Church, Cleveland,
May 18, 1909.)

Another Annual Meeting; another year of work and opportunity behind us; this day we bring our sheaves of effort and lay them at the Master's feet. May He accept them as not unworthy of His service and our great privilege.

There are two things I wish to say at this time. First, I would make a plea for more *intelligent* interest on the part of the Auxiliary workers. I do not mean this as applicable to you who are here, for most of you are officers and know, or ought to know, fully about the cause for which we are working. But I confess I am often astonished to be asked the questions that indicate too frequently, absolute ignorance on Mission subjects. When in answer to these questions I say "Why, have you not heard this before?" I am constantly told, "No, I never did."

Now, my dear friends, we take too much for granted, life is strenuous in this day, everything is crowded; therefore we must *take* the news to others who are unacquainted with it. What I would like to impress is the fact that *each* delegate here must be a center of Missionary information; our duty is to become so familiar with every branch of the service, and to develop such a zeal in our own hearts, that we feel the obligation to impart what we know, and inspire others with some of our own earnestness of purpose. We must talk Missions, we must give away Mission literature, and if we seize the opportunity and do it in the right way, it will tell in the end. Sometimes this is difficult, the subject is not always popular; then it is, that by your ability it is to be made attractive, and win the way for this great cause. When a man like President Taft speaks about Missions as he has done after observation in the Mission field, is not

that testimony that should carry conviction to those who are indifferent?

We were much encouraged this winter on receiving twenty-eight favorable responses to the letters sent out asking if, during Lent, the different parishes would study Missions. This coming year we earnestly hope that a Class will be organized in each parish, and we will try to arrange for it early in the Fall.

Secondly, I desire to accentuate again the *spiritual* side of our duty. The material side is necessary, but we shall not work less if we pray more; let prayer for our Missions be a living *reality* with us; cultivate this spirit. It has been said that "the goal of history is the salvation of the world." Let us do what we can while we have the time. If each one of us here today, felt strongly the compelling need for the necessity of individual interest, how much could be accomplished, for I find that it is generally the *personal* appeal, the *personal* touch, that brings about the desired result.

So, my dear fellow-helpers, let us determine that we will try to do more loyally what we have undertaken, have the courage to interest others, and above all have the conviction that upon each of us is placed the responsibility *for* and a share *in*, our Divine Master's service.

I must take this opportunity of saying a few words concerning the Pan Anglican Congress of Missions which met in London last June, and to which Mrs. Knapp and I went as your accredited delegates. The great Conferences were so impressive and uplifting that words cannot adequately describe them. For one week these meetings were held in different halls and churches, and subjects were classified in separate sections. Many large gatherings were devoted to women's special field of work, and on two of those occasions thousands of Christian women, representing every part of the world, gathered together to hear the reports of careful research and investigation on matters relating to Mission ventures for women, and social reform; and earnest words were spoken for the enlargement

of this work, and for greater fidelity to the cause of Christ. I wish that I could bring to you here, even a small portion of the enthusiastic spirit that characterized these Conferences. To see such vast numbers interested in these earnest projects was, in itself, a religious uplift, and we were filled with a stronger desire than ever before, to go back to our places, and serve more willingly and gladly, wherever Christ gives us the privilege.

With my word of cordial and affectionate greeting, and *sincere appreciation* of all that you have done in the past, let us turn our faces hopefully and *thankfully* to the future.

Annual Report of the Secretary

Once again, dear friends, it is my privilege and happiness to greet you.

We gather in this dear old Church of St. John's—fragrant as it is with a thousand prayers and holy aspirations. We should gain uplift and inspiration from the memory of the noble lives lived out right here,—right here giving out their best of love and labor.

So many of our Auxiliary workers are falling at our side year by year, that surely it must be borne in upon us that "the time is short," that if we really wish to do something to show our love for the dear Master, we ought to be about it! "Work for the night is coming!"

It has been a happy year for the Ohio Branch. A great amount of most faithful labor has been done. The large societies have piled up their totals into the hundreds, and two of them into the thousands. But the reports that touch me most are those that come from the societies of the weak little parishes and mission stations. These women must give so much of their strength just to maintain their own services—to pay the coal bill, to repair the leaky roof, to eke out the small salary of the minister;—is it not a wonder that they will undertake still further labor for people and missions far away, whom they have never seen, shall never see? Why do they do it? In little parishes where not one single woman is able to hire kitchen help, but where they do all the work of the household themselves, they yet manage, by their needles and their wits, to meet large obligations for the parish, and yet further to do a creditable share of mission work! It shows a splendid loyalty to Christ that often brings the quick tears to one's eyes.

Now, on the records of our Auxiliary we take no ac-

count of the work done for one's own parish, or for the poor of the town, or for the City Hospitals and the like. Did we do so, we should swell our columns many fold. Remembering that we are Auxiliary *to* the Board of Missions, we confine our records to what may be called strictly missionary work. Yet, it is a delight to know that it the *very same women* who are the most earnest and active in Auxiliary work, who are also most effective and generous in labors for the poor and afflicted, and most loyal to their rectors in enterprises of the parish.

And this is what one might reasonably expect when we consider that the motive power is *one*—it all flows from the same source,—loving hearts filled with earnest desire to help the cause of the Master;—to help His cause *everywhere*,—not overlooking an opportunity because it is near,—not failing to discern it because it is far away.

I am glad to tell you that the pledges, though larger than ever before, have all been paid. The "apportionment" to the Board of Missions has been paid and about \$300 over. We are glad to feel that though many beautiful "specials" have been undertaken, we have seen to it that the sum which common honesty could expect of us, is first paid. For we are a part of the Church that has deputized to the Board of Managers the arranging of the Church's Missionary work, deciding what must be maintained and *promising* for us the necessary salaries and expense to carry it on, and we are *bound to stand behind* them and do our share! This is all that is meant by that word "apportionment." And when the Board tells the Ohio Branch that so far as they can calculate it, \$2,000 is our "fair share", we are particularly happy to send them \$2,300.

The total money offerings from all our departments is \$7,702.39. The box values, including Church Periodical Club, is \$7,470.92. The "grand total" is \$15,173.31.

We have had some very handsome and unusual gifts this year. At St. James', Painesville, a member has given a large and expensive phonograph, assigned to the authorities at Church Mission House for use in that part of the

field where it can be made of most benefit. At St. Paul's, Norwalk, a large and handsome Family Bible was given for the lecturn of a Mission Church. As soon as the new chapel is finished at our St. Paul's Mission, Glen Alpine, in the Blue Ridge Mountains, it is to have a sweet-toned bell, as the gift of one of your number. In a place where the people are so scattered and are destitute of time pieces, you get back to primitive conditions and a bell is almost a necessity. The new chapel (which you my friends have so generously been helping to build this year,) stands upon a splendid bluff, just where, far below, the Catawba River makes a wide bend, thus opening up magnificent views of hill and valley for many, many miles. Into the metal of this bell will be cast the words "Oh ye mountains and hills, bless ye the Lord; praise Him and magnify Him forever!"

Last year, for the first time in this Diocese, the Auxiliary funds received money left to us by will. The women who so remembered us, were Mrs. A. E. Adams of Trinity, Cleveland, and Mrs. Chas. H. Hoyt of St. Paul's, Norwalk. Each had been President of her own society for a number of years and the desire was a natural one, to continue year by year to share in the work they loved, even after passing away beyond mortal sight and hearing. It is a beautiful thought and I commend it for consideration to those of you who have means to dispose of after death.

During the year a number of new Branches of Juniors have been formed, a number of new Baby Branches added. Among the seniors, we rejoice in a new Branch at the Church of Our Savior, Akron, and another at St. Mark's, Shelby. To each and all of these we give most hearty welcome.

We face the new year with eager anticipation—happy that the dear Lord still gives us the privilege of doing something for Him. *Doing something for Him!* Is that a reality to you? My friends, take for yourselves the joy of it, its glow of feeling. Do not let your work degenerate into the humdrum! Do not let your *spirit* get tired—however tired the body may be! Do not lose the significance of your work.

Why do we fill this box and sew and sew and skimp and save for it? Not because some one has said it was the thing to do,—because it seems to be expected of us! By no means! We sew and sew and skimp and save here a little and there a little to fill our box *because it is going to be a real help in forwarding the Kingdom of Christ*. It is to go to a missionary on the frontier; his communicants now are few and scattered, and his salary a bare pittance. Perhaps he can make it do for food and house rent, but what about books? Ah, the Church Periodical Club will help him there! What about clothes? That is where your box will come in! Perhaps it is that very box that will enable him to remain at his post. I have read letters from many missionaries who have said, "*but* for the help given me by the Woman's Auxiliary I must have abandoned this work long ago." It is not alone the material aid so necessary, but your box has given the touch of sympathy which makes him feel that the Church has *not* sent him out on the skirmish line and then forgotten him. You have given him courage, you have renewed his faith.

When you are trudging wearily about collecting dues for the United Offering, let not your heart be heavy; your feet may be tired, but your spirit should rejoice! Why, with that United Offering the Church will accomplish wonderful things. Hundreds of young women are being trained and sent into the missionary fields. No sooner had our missionary Bishops begun to realize what a strength these women could be and beg for more of them, than the young women step forth on the right hand and the left asking for the training—volunteering to go. And our United Offering pays all the expense of it. With that United Offering growing as we expect to make it grow, the Church bids fair by and by to really double her strength in the Mission field. We ourselves have scarcely begun to realize the significance of it all.

So then, keep up your faithful and persistent labor and be filled with the joy of it. Every stroke will tell! It is not your little arm alone! You are a part of a great army,

whose commander is our Lord Himself. Eventually evil will be driven out and the glorious day of our Lord *shall* be brought in! The army is *bound* to be victorious, get the joy of feeling *you* are a part of it!

The Junior Auxiliary

It is with a feeling of deep thankfulness that I report the growth of our Junior Auxiliary in the number of branches and the value of gifts. There are still parishes having vigorous branches of the Woman's Auxiliary that are without its most valuable adjunct—the Junior Department. During the past year, two of our branches have disbanded because there was no woman to lead them. It seems to me this is something for the members of the Woman's Auxiliary to lay to heart and consider seriously. From these Juniors are to come the future members of the Senior society, and it will be a shame if our young people are lost to this service because of the indifference or unwillingness of women to direct them. Certainly the praying, studying and giving, which are the objects of the Junior Department will have a blessed effect on the character of the future Churchmen and Churchwomen of this Diocese.

During the past year our Juniors including the Babies' Branch have given \$754.90 in money, and boxes to the value of \$791.27, a gain of \$417.64 over the year previous.

It was my honor and privilege to be one of the delegates from this Diocese to the great Pan Anglican Congress in London last June. The pleasure and inspiration derived from that vast gathering cannot be put into words, but it has been a privilege to try to pass them on as far as possible.

In October, through the courtesy of the rector of Grace Church, a corporate communion for the Junior Directors was celebrated. Very few responded to the invitation, but those who were present realized the value of a service which we hope to make an annual one. This was followed by an informal conference.

For the benefit of the branches outside of Cleveland a "Round Robin" letter was started in the fall, to carry the plans for the year's work and to pass suggestions from one branch to another. In this letter, since several of the branches were to study Miss Sturgis's "Overcoming of the Dragon," grew the idea of our Juniors assuming the support of a Day School in China.

This plan has been realized, the Juniors having given the \$50 needed, and the school at H'au'ch'uan in the district of Hankow has been assigned to the Ohio Juniors for three years. A united gift for General Missions was also suggested and \$18 has been given towards this.

At Christmas time the Juniors supplied their usual Christmas gifts for St. Paul's Mission, Glen Alpine, and the Arapahoe Indians, as well as for three Diocesan Sunday Schools. Space does not permit the mention of the many places where the Juniors have helped. Possibly the best thing of all is that they have given almost 20 per cent. more than they were asked towards the apportionment.

A visit to Glen Alpine last month has brought added enthusiasm for the splendid work being done at St. Paul's Mission. The chapel walls are rising rapidly and we are asking the Ohio Juniors to give the \$50 needed for the ten windows. One branch has already paid for two and we trust there will be eight others glad to let light into dark places.

Next October brings the Twentieth Anniversary of the Junior Department of the Woman's Auxiliary and we are hoping to celebrate that event in some fitting way in Ohio.

We have before us for another year the need of both extensive and intensive work; the enlarging of our gifts, but behind all a deepening of our realization of the reason for our gifts and work. We must do more in our Junior branches in study and prayer; study about our various missionary districts and the opportunities daily opening there. Above all we need more study of the Bible that, learning

how God hath hitherto worked, we may see Him as He works now. And with the study should always come deeper and more earnest prayer for guidance, and that He will "give us some work to do for Him and help us to follow every holy call."

Babies' Branch

The smallest and youngest branch of the Woman's Auxiliary is flourishing. We say it with pride and pleasure. Since growth shows most plainly the development in child life, the fact that two years ago the Babies had only eight parish branches, and today are represented in twenty-five parishes, proves the well being of this department.

Perhaps you do not all know what the Babies' Branch is, and for those who are ignorant let me say, that after baptism each child should be enrolled, then receive a little red mite-box into which he puts each Sunday a penny, repeating the prayer: "God bless all the missionaries all over the world and all the Little Helpers for Jesus' sake." Amen. Thus is instilled into their young minds, the habit of loving service, of prayer and of gifts for the Master.

There were eight new branches formed this year, two of which have been too recently started to send in any financial return, and unfortunately we have no report from seven old branches; yet in spite of this, the money received in the mite-boxes is double that of last year.

The total amount is \$80.44. This money is devoted to General Missions, except \$2.25 given to a Diocesan Missionary, and \$2.19 to the Akita Kindergarten in Japan.

Two special gifts have come to us this year which ought to be mentioned. One of \$10 from Mrs. McClane of All Saints' Parish, Cleveland, given as a loving tribute for her little granddaughter, Eleanor McClane, and \$10 from St. Paul's Church, Akron, in memory of the little baby boy who died, David Thurston Peabody. It seemed fitting that these two touching offerings should be used for a special purpose. That from Mrs. Peabody is to be devoted, according to her desire, to the care of sick babies in a church hospital; that from Mrs. McClane to the fund

for sending a baptismal font to some little mission station,—
a sweet and beautiful gift from members of the Babies'
Branch who at their own baptism became members of that
Holy Church which is the great Missionary Society.

Reports from the Convocations

REPORT OF THE FIRST-VICE PRESIDENT—CLEVELAND CONVOCA- TION

The Woman's Auxiliary in the Cleveland Convocation has grown in numbers during the past year. One new branch has been gained. The number of organized branches is forty-four and our Church maintains services at fifteen places within this Convocation at which there is no organized missionary effort on the part of the women.

This year we have had fewer speakers from abroad than usual to arouse our enthusiasm but the work has gone steadily forward. Dr. and Mrs. John Henry Hopkins spent a month in visiting the Diocese, interesting and helping many women, in both large and small parishes.

The Annual Quiet Day was conducted by the Rev. Mr. Reese of Columbus, Ohio. I have written and received about thirty letters and have made two visits.

In January the Diocesan Officers were the guests of Mr. Leonard at luncheon and after luncheon held an informal and wholly delightful Missionary Meeting. The consensus of opinion seemed to be that the only reason that all Church Women were not actively interested in the work of the Auxiliary was that they did not know enough about it.

We hope that this coming year will see every woman and girl in our Diocese recognizing her privileges as a baptized person and working for Missions.

The Auxiliary is not a Society to which one is elected. *The Auxiliary is the Church at work helping others.* Membership should be all-inclusive. Leadership we must have in each parish.

In some form or other that thought can be worked out in a practical way in every parish and mission station.

Boxes and reports of monies given visualize for us our spiritual growth and help us to realize that St. Paul knew the very essence of life and worship when he writes in that wonderful book which we call I Corinthians, "Therefore my beloved brethren be ye stedfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, for as much as ye know that your labor is not in vain in the Lord—Now concerning the collection"—and so must we teach those whose leaders we are that Worship and Giving are one.

The United Offering

At our last annual meeting in May, 1908, we had on hand \$596.57, the amount given at the first collection for the United Offering of 1910. To this amount has been added the two collections made during the past year, so that we have in our treasury today the sum of \$1,879.65 which represents the gifts of fifty-two Parishes, \$53.71 of which is given by the Juniors. Twenty-three branches have as yet made no contribution. Some of these will make a great effort at the very last and will doubtless send in fine contributions, but this does not seem the best or wisest plan, for the interest in the United Offering should be kept alive constantly all through the three years.

We always find that wherever there is a devoted and earnest woman at work as Treasurer of this fund, that Parish is sure to send in amounts that are often astonishing, particularly when we know, that in many cases there are perhaps less than a dozen women who are active workers. Really the amounts sent in from these small Auxiliary Branches far exceeds proportionately the gifts of the large city churches, and always goes to prove what the systematic endeavors of one faithful woman may accomplish, even when the burdens are heavy and the workers are few.

We have taken as our motto this triennial, "A Gift from every Church woman in the Diocese."

How may we achieve this great result?

First by earnest prayer that God will put it into the hearts of our women to feel not only their obligation, but also their privilege in having a share in this great Offering, and second by the appointment of a faithful woman as treasurer of the fund, who shall make it her duty to give this matter her personal attention by trying to induce every one of her Church women to give *something* even though it

may be but a few pennies each year. Will you not go home today and appoint a United Offering treasurer if you have not already done so? I know you will find it worth your while.

We always expect generous sums from the few, but a penny or two a week from the many often represents more real sacrifice and devotion than the larger gifts. We just want this to be a *real United Offering* which will represent the gifts of all our women.

Each tri-ennial we plan to increase our contributions at least \$500.00. We gave last time \$4,515.00 and we have on hand now \$1,879.65, which leaves about \$3,000 yet to be raised, and the time is half over.

What shall we do in the time that remains? It is for you to answer that question—let us hope, right royally.

The Church Periodical Club

When I took charge of the Church Periodical Club last May I found it in fine condition, doing good and active service in the splendid work of sending periodicals and books to those who must otherwise do without good literature. Mrs. Wolverton, my predecessor, through her labors and devotion, during the past three years, had brought the Club of this Diocese to be the largest branch in the Middle West. During the past year I have endeavored to follow in the path that she had already marked out.

Last May 22 librarians were registered, 19 having reported. As the ideal for which we work is to have a librarian in every parish of the Diocese, last fall 38 letters were sent out to the clergymen in those parishes where the Church Periodical Club was not represented, asking them to appoint some one to take charge of the work. Eight letters were received in reply, two gave the names of persons willing to act as librarians, the other six said that there was no opportunity for such work, or that the matter would be taken up later. Three new librarians have been appointed as the result of these letters, and our librarians now number twenty-five, twenty-one of whom have reported.

Trinity and St. Mark's, Toledo, Trinity and Emmanuel, Cleveland, and St. James', Painesville, can, as always, be specially commended for their faithful and valuable work.

The summary of the reports for the past year is as follows: Number of current periodicals sent regularly, 143; number of miscellaneous books sent, 100 also 3 sets of encyclopedias; number of old magazines and papers sent, 2,341; number of Xmas cards sent, 11; number of pictures sent, 5. Of miscellaneous literature, we have sent 9 barrels, 5 boxes and 3 packages. Money contributed, \$100.39. Total amount in money and boxes, \$382.03.

The traveling library, which was sent out last year has been in Pierre, South Dakota, and is now in Dallas, South Dakota.

My plea for the coming year is for renewed interest and redoubled efforts on the part of the friends of the Church Periodical Club and an aroused and active interest on the part of those to whom this Club has been but a name.

We need a librarian in every Parish to arouse interest among people and to direct the interest when aroused—a librarian with enthusiasm for the work, who will impress each donor with the importance of sending a magazine regularly with postage prepaid, and who will tell of the need of funds to carry on the work. Is it too much to ask for such a one to be put in charge of the work in each Parish to do something, though only a little, for this splendid work?

I hope that another year will see the influence and value of the Church Periodical Club in this Diocese greatly increased.

The Annual Pledges

The largest one of our pledges is made to the Board of Missions for the annual salaries of a lady missionary in China and for two native helpers in Japan. The amount is \$682. Of this, \$550 is paid to Miss Elwin, of Shanghai, \$72 is paid to Miss Yamada, of Fukue, and \$60 to Miss Hayashi, of Sakae.

We pay also \$400 for the support of a missionary among the mountaineers of the Blue Ridge,—Miss Eva F. Dixon, St. Paul's Mission, Glen Alpine, North Carolina.

The "Bishop Leonard Fund" is for use among the missions in Ohio, when and where the Bishop thinks it best. We have pledged to him \$550; he will pay \$300 of this amount to the support of the Colored Mission in Cleveland, \$200 to the salary of the Archdeacon, and the rest as need may require.

The "Expense Fund" covers the cost of publishing the annual report, and occasional circulars or leaflets, the stamps and stationery of the Secretary, traveling expense in starting new Branches, and that of missionaries whom we invite to address us. It is hoped that each society will contribute \$1 at least, during the year, and that the stronger societies will contribute considerably more.

The "Contingent Fund" is available for all sorts of emergencies and is of great service. Most often it has been expended for overcoats needed without delay, or for clerical suits not otherwise obtainable. The Honorary Membership fees are allotted to this fund. Our list of Honorary Members has recently been sadly depleted by death. It is much to be desired that other women may take the places of those who, so long as life lasted, took pleasure in aiding this fund.

Varying sums are pledged each year to Bishop Rowe's

work in Alaska, to General Missions, to the Districts of Oklahoma, Sacramento, Ashville and the Philippines.

The Bishop Bedell Scholarship, and the Julia Bedell Scholarship pay for the education of native pupils in St. John's University, Shanghai, China. They require \$70 each per annum. The "Ohio Scholarship" in St. Elizabeth's—one of Bishop Hare's Schools, in South Dakota—pays for the education of an Indian pupil; it requires \$60 per year. Several other scholarships are maintained by individual Parishes. The "Foreign Insurance Fund" provides insurance upon the lives of foreign missionaries for the benefit of their families. We of the Ohio Branch pay \$50 into the fund.

Notes

All pledges are to be paid to Mrs. Bates. If you send money direct to Church Missions House, New York, do not fail to say that it is to be credited to the Woman's Auxiliary, and also state whether it is to be a "special" or may be assigned to the appropriations of the Board.

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In sending missionary boxes by freight, be sure that the address is written correctly, and write out the name of the state in full. Also put the address of the sender on the outside of box, and then mail your freight-receipt to the recipient. Thus he will have no difficulty in securing the goods, and will be able to send acknowledgment as soon as it arrives.

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PLEASE NOTE that packages sent to Mrs. Bates for distribution in missionary boxes should be addressed, *not* to her residence, but to *St. Paul's Parish House, 4108 Euclid Ave., Cleveland*. It is here that the packing is done. The janitor and wife residing in the house, have charge of our "missionary closets," and packages are always cared for. All articles received will be assorted by the Secretary, or the Junior Director, and sent out again according to need and the particular sizes desired.

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The "Daughters of the Church" of the Cathedral Branch have held their eighth annual sale of Indian lace for the benefit of the women themselves, members of Miss Carter's lace schools in the Northwest. The amount cleared for them this year was about \$400.

"How we Manage in Our Society."

A PAPER ON THE PRACTICAL MANAGEMENT OF A JUNIOR
SOCIETY.

"Take my life and let it be
Consecrated, Lord, to Thee."

These lines from the beautiful consecration hymn of Frances Ridley Havergal, have been chosen by the nine girls who constitute the Junior Auxiliary of Calvary Parish, Sandusky, O., as their motto for the present year. With this prayer of consecration upon our lips, and voicing the longing of our hearts, we have endeavored to keep clearly in mind the fact that those children of Our Father who have yet to hear the sweet Gospel story of redeeming love, are equally precious in His sight. In a word—that the central thought underlying our organization, is none other than that of promoting and supporting Christian Missions.

Activity in our Junior Branches may be resolved into three well-defined, but closely allied elements, namely: *Prayer, Study and Work* for Missions. Our Calvary Juniors have endeavored to keep all of these constantly in mind and heart.

I. We have one meeting each week during the working portion of the year. These meetings following each other in close succession have a strong tendency to keep interest aroused, and they likewise enable us to arrange our study and work with due regularity. We have found that meetings at longer intervals fail to sustain interest, and accomplish little in the way of systematic work. These gatherings are planned so as to be attractive, and not too long drawn out. They are always opened with suitable devotions—the Junior Collects and other missionary prayers being used.

We try to have the girls of our Auxiliary carry the

subject of missions into their daily private devotions, and they regularly use the Junior collects in their homes. Thus recognizing that the spiritual is the source from which all else flows, we have been gratified to note that spiritual growth is invariably followed by marked increase in material gifts. The words of Lord Tennyson: "More things are wrought by prayer than this world dreams of," have been amply verified in our experience.

One thing that we emphasize above all else, and try to observe with strict regularity is our corporate communion which occurs at the mid-day celebration on the first Sunday in every month. We recognize this crowning act of Christian worship as the basis of all our work, and the prime source from whence we seek spiritual food and strength to fit us for acceptable service in His Name and for His sake.

II. The spirit and the will to work being quickened by our approach to God in prayer, the question immediately arises, "For whom shall we work and where are our efforts most needed?" To answer this question intelligently involves at least some attempt at mission study, both domestic and foreign, for knowledge creates interest, and knowledge is power the world over. During the past winter in order to know something of the mission field and its wants, we have, in turn, prepared short papers on the various missionary districts, and these have been read while we worked. Articles from each number of *The Spirit of Missions* were also carefully selected and read. This method we found most helpful because the various articles are short, concise and interesting, but are sufficiently full to give us a good general knowledge of the missionary activity of the Church, both at home and abroad.

III. Our mission study teaches us how and where to work effectively in the broad mission field of the Church. At our work-meetings a short business session is first in order, and the practical side of our activities is discussed and planned with dispatch. Business being disposed of, the balance of the evening is devoted to sewing and preparing material for our missionary box. Garments, and other

articles that are intended for this purpose, are cut and carefully prepared prior to the meeting by our directress or other competent person. A definite amount of work is assigned for each meeting, and if not finished is taken home by the members and returned completed the following week. In this way systematic progress is assured. The past season, Calvary Juniors made seventy-seven articles, ranging in character from scrap-books to bedding.

The last half hour of our work meeting is spent in social chat and music, and light refreshments are served by the hostess of the evening, for we meet at the homes of the different members.

We have adopted the birthday system for our United Offering. One of our members collects the individual offerings and we have found this method most successful.

In order to raise money for pledges, and also to purchase materials for our boxes, we give entertainments and socials in our Parish Hall. We likewise have social evenings at which each one makes a small offering.

We care for local charities in addition to our mission work, and many needy homes are made glad by periodic visits from the girls with supplies of food and clothing.

One of our Junior members has organized a little children's missionary society, so that they may, through early training and experience, be prepared to step into the ranks and fill our places when, in the course of time, we are privileged to move up to the Senior Branch. In this way it is hoped to recruit our Junior Branch from material better trained and prepared than we were, so that efficiency may increase as the years go by.

We encourage attendance at the annual meetings of the Auxiliary by as many of our girls as can at all make it convenient to come, in order that they may gather inspiration and zeal for another year's work.

The Convocations

A list is here given of all the Parishes and Mission Stations of each Convocation in which we have Auxiliary or Junior Branches, and also a list of those where we have none. Please study your own Convocation. Note especially the places that are yet to be gained; if you have friends at any of these points, or can in any way aid us, may we not count upon your assistance?

Cleveland Convocation

We have Branches in Akron, Ashtabula, Boardman, Canton, in 20 Parishes of Cleveland and suburbs, Cuyahoga Falls, Geneva, Hudson, Jefferson, Kent, Madison, Massillon, Medina, Painesville, Peninsula, Perry, Ravenna, two in Steubenville, in Warren, Wooster, Youngstown.

We have none in the Parish of St. Stephen's, East Liverpool, nor in the missions of Alliance, Berea, Conneaut, Cross Creek, the Atonement in Cleveland, Dennison, Harbor, Kinsman, Lisbon, New Philadelphia, Salem, Unionville, Wellsville, Willoughby.

Sandusky Convocation

We have Branches in Bellevue, Bucyrus, Cardington, Catawba Islands, Clyde, Coshocton, Elyria, Fremont, Galion, two in Gambier, Huron, two in Lorain, Mansfield, Marion, Marysville, Milan, Monroeville, Mt. Vernon, Norwalk, Oberlin, Port Clinton, three in Sandusky, Shelby, Tiffin.

We have none in the missions of Fostoria, Lyme, Mill Creek, Mt. Gilead, Upper Sandusky, Venice.

Toledo Convocation

We have Branches in Bellefontaine, Bowling Green, Defiance, Findlay, Kenton, Lima, Maumee and in seven Parishes in Toledo.

We have none in the missions of Bryan, Hicksville, Napoleon and Sidney.

Diocesan Constitution

ARTICLE I—Name.

The name of this association shall be The Ohio Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE II—Object.

Its object shall be to work in connection with the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, the field being co-extensive with the Church, diocesan and general. The methods by which the ends of this organization can be promoted, are the raising of money for the support of Missionaries and Teachers, for the education of those who may be preparing for the work, and for other benevolent purposes connected with Missions; the making, collecting and transfer of clothing and other material aid, and the circulation of papers and leaflets that may serve to stir up a public interest in the Missions of the Church.

ARTICLE III—Membership.

Section 1.—Any Parish Auxiliary (Senior or Junior) may become a member of this association by a written announcement of its organization to the Diocesan Secretary.

Sec. 2.—The officers of parish branches shall send to the Diocesan Treasurer all pledges and money given for other than local purposes, and shall report to the Diocesan Secretary by May 1st each year, all work done, with value of boxes and money given. Each parish branch shall be entitled to but one vote in the annual Diocesan meetings, but may send any number of delegates, one of whom shall be authorized to cast the vote and assume pledges for specific work undertaken by the Diocesan branch.

ARTICLE IV—Officers.

The officers of this association shall be a President, three Vice Presidents, a Secretary and Treasurer, and Directors of Junior Auxiliary, of Babies' Branch and of United Offering, to be appointed by the Bishop from names presented by a committee of five (each Convocation to be represented thereupon) elected annually in convention.

One Vice President shall be chosen from each of the three Convocations of the Diocese, as follows: First, Cleveland; second, Sandusky; third, Toledo, and these with the other officers shall constitute a board of managers and trustees of the association.

ARTICLE V—Duties of Officers.

Section 1.—The President shall preside, and in her absence one of the Vice Presidents, in Convocation order. She shall call meetings and perform such duties as pertain to her office; and shall make every effort, through the Vice Presidents and otherwise, to direct the work of the parish branches in raising money for the support of some one or more of the departments of missionary work, and shall form new parish auxiliaries wherever practicable.

Sec. 2.—It shall be the duty of each Vice President in addition to the customary assistance to the President, to take charge of the missionary work in her own Convocation and she may arrange for one general meeting of representatives from the parishes in the Convocation, held annually in October and shall assist the Diocesan officers in the distribution of work, and in every way strive to arouse and maintain active interest in all departments of the work.

Sec. 3.—The Secretary shall correspond with the General Secretary and the missionaries and find out where help is needed, and of what kind; shall inform the parish secretaries and arrange about their work, so that a general oversight may be kept by one person. She shall keep a correct list of all Diocesan officers, parish secretaries and clergymen in the Diocese, with addresses of the same. She shall take the minutes of all meetings and prepare an annual report for circulation in the Diocese. She shall receive and forward all money offerings, and shall pay out money only as voted by the Diocesan branch or Board of Managers, except money received for a definite purpose may be paid for that purpose without a formal vote; shall keep an account of all money and boxes contributed for missionary and other purposes by the parish branches, or individuals; and, as Treasurer, shall after the accounts and vouchers are audited embody a full account in the annual report.

Sec. 4.—An Auditing Committee of two persons, to be appointed by the President, shall examine the accounts, and vouchers of the Diocesan Treasurer, and report result at the annual meeting.

ARTICLE VI—Amendments.

The Constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual meeting of the association; provided, that notice of the proposed change has been given with the call for a meeting.

By-Laws

I.

The Annual Meeting of this Association shall be held on Tuesday of the week following the Diocesan Convention ; but, for good reason, the Board of Officers may appoint the meeting upon some other date.

The place of meeting may be determined upon by vote at an annual meeting, or, failing this, shall be arranged by the Board of Officers.

II.

In case of vacancy in any office the same may be filled at a stated or called meeting of the Board of Managers, and any one appointed by them shall continue in office until the next annual meeting.

III.

Special meetings may be called by the President at such time and place as she may designate, for the purpose of stimulating interest in the work.

IV.

The stated meetings of the Board of Managers, with the President as Chairman, shall be held in May at any place designated, and at these meetings any number present may constitute a quorum.

V.

It is expected that each parish Branch shall contribute not less than one dollar (\$1.00) to the expense fund.

VI.

These by-laws may be amended at any annual meeting by vote of majority present.
