The Annual Meeting at Cleveland, May 24th, 1910.

The Annual Meeting of the Ohio Branch was held on May 24th at Emmanuel Church, Cleveland. The attendance was large, the exercises inspiring, and the meeting, in every way, a successful one.

The session began with the service of Holy Communion, Bishop Leonard being celebrant, assisted by Archdeacon Abbott, the Rev. W. S. L. Romilly and the Rev. J. C. Jagar, rector of the parish. Then followed, according to cherished custom, the address of the Bishop.

At the business meeting immediately succeeding, Mrs. Leonard, the President, occupied the chair. Roll call was first in order. The following delegations answered to their names. From Akron 16, from Cleveland—All Saints' 5, Christ Church 16, Emmanuel 69, Grace 7, Grace Church (south) 6, Good Shepherd 7, Incarnation 8, St. Andrew's 5, St. John's 4, St. Luke's 16, St. Mark's 1, St. Paul's 40, St. Philip's 4, Trinity 30, Cuyahoga Falls 4, East Cleveland 12, Lakewood 14, Elyria 5, Fremont 2, Gambier 2, Geneva 16, Hudson 1, Huron 1, Kent 5, Lorain 12, Marysville 1, Medina 3, Monroeville 2, Niles 6, Norwalk 1, Painesville 22, Perry 5, Ravenna 1, Sandusky 8; from Toledo—St. Andrew's 2, St. Mark's 6, Trinity 2; from Warren 3, Youngstown 2.

Upon motion, the reading of the minutes of the last meeting was omitted, the same having been printed and distributed.

The President then gave her annual address. This was followed by reports from the Secretary and Treasurer, the Vice-Presidents, the Directors of Junior Auxiliary, of Babies' Branch, of the United Offering, of the Church Periodical Club and from Mrs. Knapp regarding Mission Study.

At noon the Mid-day Prayer was said. Mrs. Leonard then presented a message from Miss Emery, full of helpful and stimulating interest. The customary paper prepared each year on Practical Management in some one department of the work was this year devoted to the United Offering, and the paper was given by Mrs. Herbert McBride, of the Cathedral Branch, her methods having been found to be particularly successful.

A Nominating Committee was then elected: Mrs. E. W. Worthington, chairman; Mrs. A. B. Leslie, from the Cleveland Convocation; Mrs. T. M. Sloane, from the Sandusky Convocation; Mrs. Kent Hamilton, from the Toledo Convocation; and Miss H. Kosbab, representing the Juniors.

A resolution was presented, stating that the development of the work demanded for its greater efficiency, the addition of two more officers to the Board,—an Educational Secretary who should have charge of Mission Study, and a Fourth Vice-President who should be especially an assistant to the President. To effect this the necessary changes in the Constitution were embodied in an amendment, notice of which having been given with the call for the meeting was now passed unanimously.

At 1:30 the meeting adjourned to the chapel for luncheon, which was provided bountifully by the women of Emmanuel, assisted by those of St. Paul's, East Cleveland.

Upon re-assembling in the church, first in order was the work of "taking the pledges," that is, the naming by each Branch of the sums for which it will be responsible in the undertakings of the year to come. All the regular funds of last year were re-pledged, with some additions, and the outlook is very bright.

The Board of Officers recommended by the Nominating Committee was then approved by the Bishop. The list is as follows: President, Mrs. W. A. Leonard; Vice-Presidents, Mrs. S. N. Watson, Akron; Mrs. Levi Buttles, Gambier; Mrs. T. H. Walbridge, Toledo; Miss K. L. Mather, Cleveland. Secretary and Treasurer, Mrs. Cyrus S. Bates, East Cleveland. Director of Junior Auxiliary,

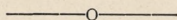
Mrs. H. P. Knapp, Painesville. Director of Babies' Branch, Mrs. D. Z. Norton, Cleveland. Director United Offering, Mrs. C. D. Hatch, Cleveland. Correspondent Church Periodical Club, Miss Jean Backus, Cleveland. Educational Secretary, Mrs. H. P. Knapp, Painesville.

A resolution of hearty thanks to the Branches of Emmanuel and of St. Paul's, East Cleveland, for their gracious hospitality, was passed unanimously, by rising vote. An invitation was given for the entertainment of the Annual Meeting next year by the parish of St. Paul's, Cleveland. This was accepted also by unanimous vote.

The Convention then settled down with pleased anticipation to listen to the address by the Rev. L. B. Ridgely, missionary from Wuchang, China. At its close, \$200.00 was pledged to him for his work.

The Bishop concluded the meeting with a short service of prayer and benediction.

Address of the President

(Annual Meeting, Emmanuel Church, Cleveland,
May 24, 1910.)

Dear Friends of Our Auxiliary:

I bring you affectionate greetings, with a thankful heart that we have been permitted another year of earnest work. From the different records that will be presented to you today, you will have the good news that there has been an increase of interest all along the line. From our Secretary, Mrs. Bates, and from Mrs. Knapp, Director of the Junior Auxiliary, and from Mrs. Hatch, Director of the United Offering, I have been happy in the message that "good reports are coming in." We see back of those reports, hard work and determined effort, and I am sure, when we hear the results, and those of the other officers, we shall all be made very glad and inspired with new courage.

I made reference to the Study of Missions last year, and it is evident that we have taken a long step forward in the right direction. Mrs. Knapp will make a report on this subject, but I desire also to recognize this hopeful sign for the future of our work. The more knowledge we have of the story of the mission field itself, its heroes, its romance, its hardships, and the consecration of our missionaries, the more we shall be stimulated for eager work for Christ, and I hail with happiness the day when we shall have in each parish a Study Class for Missions.

It is well for us to come together for help and encouragement, to count our mercies, and obtain a larger realization of our obligations, and it seems to me that we have each year reason for special thankfulness, because our efforts have been blest. But, we must try and profit by these gatherings, and let them stimulate us to greater endeavor. As we separate, does the vision fade, or are we steadfast in our determination to work for the Master? Sometimes

the distractions are so many that it requires much effort not to fail in what we have undertaken; but let us always remember that we are, each of us, Missionaries by right of our Baptism, and that Christian activity is one of our obligations and privileges. We all know that "the truest life is the earnest life." Many of you are leaders in your own home circle, all are deeply interested,—that fact is indicated by your presence here today. Let me urge upon you that this year you determine to do a larger amount of work *yourself*, and try and inspire *others* to do the same. So much depends upon our *own* attitude in this matter; if we are enthusiastic and happy in our opportunity, it attracts others. I have known of one woman who was so filled with the missionary spirit that she transformed a whole parish; she was interested and she was interesting, and her Rector frankly said, that she had accomplished what he had thought was impossible. This simply indicates to us, that we are each centers of personal influence for which we are accountable.

Let us go back to our places in life, strengthened and benefited by our association together this day, and better realizing that we are members of a great household, with earnest service to render unto Christ, and those who need our prayers and aid.

Annual Report of the Secretary

Again, dear friends, by your faithful work throughout the year you have given me the pleasure of bringing in a very happy and encouraging report. Every obligation which we assumed has been fully met. Our apportionment to the Board of Missions has been paid and something over \$250 besides. The most notable advance has been made by the Junior Department, whose gains indeed it is a great pleasure to record.

The total amount of your contributions in money and boxes, in all our departments, is \$16,810.05. This is a gain over last year of \$1,636.74. So again we thank God and take courage!

The year began very auspiciously with a large interest aroused in the work of the Rev. Geo. P. Mayo, our speaker at the last Annual Meeting, a missionary to the mountain people of Virginia. His plans were so absolutely sane and practical, the good to be accomplished so far-reaching, that the appeal was very strong. Over \$500 has been raised for him. Nine hundred and forty-eight dollars has been given to the work of Bishop Rowe in Alaska; \$143 to the work of Bishop Brook in Oklahoma; \$103 to the District of Sacramento, and numerous smaller amounts to other missionary districts. The usual scholarships have been maintained; \$500 has been given to General Missions; \$585 to Bishop Leonard for Diocesan Missions, and \$146 to the Arch-deacon for his work.

St. Paul's Mission, which we founded at Glen Alpine in the Blue Ridge Mountains, N. C., has prospered abundantly. Miss Dixon, the teacher whom we support, is most energetic and successful and deeply beloved by the mountain people. The little schoolhouse, with which the work began, soon became totally inadequate to hold the congregations that assembled there for church services on Sunday, and for two years we have been aiding them to build a church,

and the beautiful chapel is now completed. The missionary in charge bids me thank the women of the Ohio Branch for their exceeding generosity and to say how greatly it is appreciated. He wishes to assure us that *no work anywhere* (the words are his own)—no work anywhere is doing more for the church than is this Mission of St. Paul's. He congratulates us upon having been privileged to be the instruments of accomplishing so much good.

The Foreign missionary, whom we of the Ohio Branch support, is Miss Elwin, head of the Orphanage in Shanghai. About seventy children are in her charge. As the position is one of great responsibility and as she has now been seven years in work under our Bishop in China, her salary has recently been raised to \$750. This will call for an increased payment of \$68 on our part, if we wish to continue paying the full salary—and of course *we do*.

The United Offering has been well to the front in our work all through the year, with what success Mrs. Hatch will tell you.

There will not be a penny too much. More and more the missionaries are appreciating the value of women workers in the field, more and more the Bishops are begging for them. And, happily, more and more, women are offering themselves for the work, willing and eager to give their lives in devoted service. Shall we not fit these women for the work they long to do, and send them to the work which needs them so much? The United Offering pays the expense of it. Surely there could be no more appropriate object for our woman's offering.

During the year seven new Branches of Women's Societies have been added to our number, five new Junior Branches, and four new Baby Branches. Our roll call now includes all the strong parishes of the Diocese. Indeed, with three exceptions it includes every self-supporting parish, and it also numbers twenty-one of our missions. But why not *every* parish, *every* mission? Would it not be a grand thing if the women of our *entire* Diocese should present a solid front of missionary endeavor—every one, even the

weakest, being in line, all working from love of the Master for the advancement of His Kingdom and for the comfort of His children?

This is the thirty-fifth anniversary of the organization of the Ohio Branch of Women's Auxiliary. The Auxiliary began in all the Dioceses by gathering into its fold all the then existing missionary societies, the idea being that these should form the nucleus to which others might constantly be added. There were eleven missionary societies in operation in this Diocese when the Ohio Branch was organized. Now we number not less than 126. I have had the curiosity to count up the total money value of the work for the entire thirty-five years, and I find it amounts to over a quarter of a million dollars!

But figures tell very coldly the story of all the comfort and help brought to countless servants of the Master in these years, of all the light brought to souls that sat in darkness. We have no scales that can measure the good done by the self-denying labors of thirty-five years, by women—so many of whom have passed and are passing into the larger work of the other life.

Now at the end of these years, wherein do we differ from the Auxiliary at the beginning? We find that we have gained wonderfully in consciousness of power, in confidence in our methods, in knowledge and conviction, in momentum. We are tremendously *certain* that what this world needs is the religion of Jesus Christ. With greater clearness every year the fact stands out that this world—this *whole world*—must be won for Christ.

We are beginning to see more clearly the methods by which it shall be done. Never, in all history, was the outlook so full of promise.

There used to be years of discouragement when it almost seemed as though the whole interest in missions was turned over to "mother and the girls"—moments of depression when it almost seemed as though the coming of the Kingdom was dependent upon the women's butter-money and egg-money and chicken pot-pie suppers and all the other

pitiful expedients by which the women have been wont to eke out their missionary funds. But now, thank God, those days are past. Our brothers and husbands and sons have sprung forward to the rescue! The great Laymen's Movement, the Student Volunteer Associations, the immense Missionary Conventions are bringing together the men of influence and wisdom, and wealth and business training, to focus all their strength upon this question of the evangelization of the world. A large contract, but that is the program our Lord marked out for us. It stirs the blood to think of it!

And so we begin another year with encouragement greater than ever before, with hearts thrilled by the great task and yet more, uplifted by our Lord's quiet, sustaining word, "*Lo! I am with you alway!*"

The Junior Auxiliary

The forty-one branches of the Ohio Junior Department, these "younger helpers" of the Board of Missions, have responded to the demands made upon them during this past year with the freshness and enthusiasm common to youth. More and more we recognize the wisdom that years ago laid hold of these qualities and claimed them for the Master's service.

We began our year in October with a Corporate Communion for the Junior Directors, celebrated for us by the Rev. Mr. Owen, then priest-in-charge of Emmanuel parish. After the service there was an informal conference, when plans for the before-Christmas work were discussed.

Later in the month the Juniors of this same hospitable parish invited all Ohio Juniors and the Diocesan officers to a luncheon in celebration of the twentieth birthday of the Junior department. In spite of a pouring rain, over sixty came, and a most inspiring occasion it was for the grown-ups permitted to be present.

While the guests were still at the table, the president of the entertaining branch rose to her feet, and after a graceful welcome, introduced the speakers of the day. These proved to be girls from the mountain schools of Tennessee and Virginia, one from St. Hilda's, Wuchang, and another from the Juniors' Day School at Hauchuan in the district of Hankow. These were all impersonated by the Juniors of the branches who are helping to sustain the work in these places. Another girl cleverly impersonated our own beloved Bishop and expressed his appreciation of the gifts to the "Bishop Leonard Fund."

Greetings from the Diocesan officers closed a delightful afternoon, so delightful that it was voted to celebrate the Junior birthday annually. The Juniors of St. Paul's parish extended a cordial invitation for our twenty-first birthday this coming fall.

It seemed that there must have been many very happy Juniors in Ohio this last Christmas Day, because they had been proving themselves real dispensers of joy and sunshine. Through their efforts fully five hundred children had been remembered with Christmas gifts and candy,—the children among the Arapahoe Indians, those at St. Paul's Mission, Glen Alpine, N. C., and those in five of our Diocesan Mission Sunday schools. Surely some of the love and joy must have come back in full measure to the Juniors themselves and made them still more anxious to be of service and to send and carry the good tidings of Him who came on Christmas.

The months that followed have been busy ones, with boxes to fill and pledges to pay. Several of the branches have reported unique methods of raising the money for meeting their pledges. One of them made the "Lincoln pennies grow," as Miss Lowrie described in the Children's Number of the Spirit of Missions, and the pennies multiplied to three hundred and fifty-six, and so paid three children's tuition for a year in our Chinese day-school. Two of the older branches have taken the agency for a special mop and duster and are reaping the reward of their industry. Another branch asked its friends to save their old rubber, and when the in-gathering was held, found they had a barrel full. It is a pleasure, too, to know that one of the branches this spring presented "The Little Pilgrims and the Book Beloved." This little play is especially suited for presentation by the Juniors, being both missionary and churchly in its teaching, while its devotional tone is most desirable training for the boys and girls who take part. We hope it will be presented year by year by the different branches.

The Juniors (not including the Babies' Branch) report gifts of \$939.71 in money, and boxes to the value of \$1,122.48, an increase of \$596.46 over last year. Best of all, they have given \$254.56 to apply on the obligations assumed by the Board of Missions, \$54.56 more than we were apportioned.

We are very thankful to extend here a welcome to the five new branches who have entered our ranks this year. Letters have been sent to the rectors of most of the parishes where the Junior Department is not yet represented. Two or three have given encouragement that branches will be formed in the fall, and we trust that those who have not responded are considering the question favorably. We still hope for the day when the young people of every parish will have a share in this part of the church's work.

For all these evidences of zeal, of love, of energy, we are full of thanksgiving, but there is a part of the work of the Junior Department in which we are woefully weak. We are organized for three purposes,—to pray for missions, to study about missions, and to work for missions. We know the branches are working, we trust there are none that are not praying for missions, at home, but also especially when they meet as a Junior Branch, but only two have reported systematic mission study.

Our symbol should be an equilateral triangle,—with prayer as the base and work and study claiming an equal share of our time and thought. May we beg the directors of each parish branch to lay this weakness seriously to heart?

Our great triennial gathering as Church women will come in October. The Ohio Juniors will have a share in the United Offering; other Dioceses will offer of their young women to give the service which the United Offering makes possible. As yet Ohio has not given of our own for laborers in the harvest, but we hope that before another three years goes by some of our Junior girls will feel the call to this wider service.

In Cincinnati there will be an exhibit of Junior work, to which Ohio will send. There are to be meetings especially for Juniors, and study classes for Juniors. It would be gratifying if many of our Juniors and Junior directors would take advantage of the opportunities that may never again come so close to our doors.

The year of 1909-10 closed on April 30th, and on May 1st our new one began. We must not rest. Is it not time

for haste to fulfill our mission? In a general letter to the Junior Department, Miss Grace Lindley, whose name at least most of you know, writes: "Now come the months when most of us do not meet as Junior branches, but that does not mean we are not members of the Missionary Society, for of course we are, for once a member by Baptism we belong to the Church, which is the Missionary Society, to our life's end.

"What can we do this summer? First, let us be sure to pray each day for the Kingdom, and give, too, and let us keep our eyes open for any opportunity which may come to us. Perhaps we can find some children and young people who do not belong to the Junior Auxiliary, and that will give us a good chance to tell them about the work and ask them to be sure and join a branch next year.

"Of course our prayers are our best gift, and that they may be very definite, suppose we take these three special things for which to pray: First, for the spread of God's kingdom throughout the world; second, for the Junior Auxiliary meetings to be held in Cincinnati next October; third, for the Junior work of 1910-11. If we will do this, the Junior Auxiliary will grow in every way, and we shall be glad because we shall be better able to do what we all want to do,—that is, help our King in establishing His Kingdom."

Babies' Branch

One naturally thinks that in a year's interval great changes and development should be noticed. The Babies' Branch cannot claim such distinction this year, yet because it is well and thriving, even though not growing rapidly, ought we not to feel content?

Four new branches have been formed this year; in Akron at the Church of Our Savior; in Monroeville at Zion; in Toledo at St. Andrew's; and in Gambier at Harcourt Parish.

It is regrettable that we have had no return from eleven old branches, but in justification it ought to be said that five of them have recently had no director; in two other cases no collections were made on account of the absence, or the illness of the director, and one branch having only one member who has moved to another parish gives the credit elsewhere.

The total amount received from the babies' boxes is \$86.49, \$6 more than last year. This money is given to General Missions, to the United Offering and to the Akita Kindergarten in Japan. While the sum may seem small in comparison with that of the older organizations, remember these are the pennies put in the little red mite chests by dear baby hands.

It is representative of 346 children making an average of 25 cents apiece.

Does it not strike you as very beautiful to have over 300 children starting in babyhood to learn the great lesson of loving service for the Master? Think what valuable members they ought to make when they enter the Junior Department.

A phase of this Branch of which little has been said is the Memorial Circle. Last year we had two sweet gifts in memory of little children and this year another, and it is a very tender sentiment that gives relief to little sick children in this land, or to the education of those in foreign shores

in the name of some little one who has been loved and lost awhile. Perhaps if more knew of this opportunity to be included in the Babies' Branch through the Memorial Circle they might be glad.

Those of you who are familiar with the Babies' Prayer, "God bless all the Missionaries all over the world and all the Little Helpers for Jesus' sake, Amen," will be interested to hear that it has been most delightfully set to music by the organist of St. Paul's Church, Akron, and dedicated to the branch there. Miss Hart, the aunt of the little boy who started the Babies' Branch, was so pleased when she received a copy that she wishes to have it published for use all over the country.

So we rejoice in the sweet influence of our Little Helpers and ask for your continued and increasing interest in this youngest branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Reports from the Convocations

REPORT OF THE FIRST VICE-PRESIDENT—CLEVELAND CONVOCA- TION.

On St. Michael's and All Angels' Day the Diocesan Officers of the Auxiliary and the Directors of the Branches included in the Cleveland Convocation were asked to be the guests of St. Paul's Parish, Akron. It is the custom of the Parish to begin the year's work of the Auxiliary with a corporate communion on this day, and the guests of the day were asked to share that service, which was held at half past ten o'clock. The Rector was the celebrant, and he was assisted by the Rev. Canon Cooke, of the Cathedral.

A number of the Diocesan Officers were present, and twenty-two parishes were represented. After luncheon, which was served in the Parish House, there was an informal meeting and discussion of plans for the coming year's work. The emphasis that our President has placed upon the spiritual side of our work and her appeal to us to emphasize it, reiterated at this service, seemed to have made a deep impression on all present, and I know that the spirit of it has gone largely through the Convocation. We know what the Study Classes have done for our larger knowledge of Missions, and you will be glad to know that we have added six branches to the forty-four reported last year, making a total of fifty branches. These new branches are: St. Paul's, Conneaut; St. Peter's, Lakewood; Trinity, New Philadelphia; St. Luke's, Niles; Church of the Ascension, at Wellsville.

Mrs. George John Romanes was the guest of the Diocese and visited several parishes.

Mrs. John Henry Hopkins, Miss Julia Emery, Miss Myers of China, have all made visits in this Convocation, and helped to keep our enthusiasm fresh.

The Quiet Day was held at Grace Church, and we could wish that more women found it possible to attend these special services.

In April the Diocesan Officers had a conference with Mrs. Leonard. There are still nine places in the Cleveland Convocation at which our Church maintains services where there is no Auxiliary.

I have written about eighty letters and made one visit.

I would especially urge upon those of you who are present to come to Convocation Meetings if you possibly can. Our General Meeting is necessarily taken up with large plans for the whole work. Even if you have no Parish Branch, send a representative. She is sure to go home and start a branch, and there is no mission station so small that it cannot have a branch to put it in touch with the Church's larger life.

Some years ago I was staying on Nantucket Island, and one afternoon, when I was going to the Sconset golf links, I saw in a field some men erecting a giant pole in the center of the open space. Two weeks later we stood outside a little cottage, near the pole, in a fog so dense that you could not see two feet in front of you, and helped unfurl the flag when the first wireless message was received on this continent, coming to us through the fog and the night from the light-ship forty miles out at sea. To me it was a revelation of power and things spiritual beyond all telling.

Will you not, all of you, do the material task that is your instrument of service, opening for you the way to the greater life of the Church?

REPORT OF THE THIRD VICE-PRESIDENT—TOLEDO CONVOCATION.

It is with a grateful heart that I give the report from the Toledo Convocation. At our annual meeting every

parish showed an increase over last year. We feel this is due to a quickening of the spirit induced by an enlarged insight into the blessedness of spreading the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and this has mainly been a result of education as to missionary needs and labors.

Four general meetings have been held. In May of last year, at Calvary Church, the Rev. Mr. Mayo told of his work among the mountaineers of Virginia. In October we began our year's work with our second all-day session at Trinity. A service of Holy Communion was held at 10:30, with Rev. Geo. Gunnell as celebrant and preacher. A delightful luncheon was served to a hundred delegates. In the afternoon the missionary meeting was addressed by Dr. Angie W. Myers, of St. Elizabeth's Hospital, Shanghai. Her visit was particularly appropriate, as this Convocation maintains a bed in that hospital in memory of Mrs. Clapp.

The February meeting was held at Grace Church, with Dr. and Mrs. Hopkins as speakers. Mrs. Hopkins gave a most inspired talk about the United Offering, and I am sure stimulated a larger giving than ever before.

The May meeting was held at St. Andrew's Church, when Mrs. Thomas Jenkins told us of Alaska from the viewpoint of a missionary's wife. This came as a fitting climax to the year's work, as several of the branches have been studying Alaska in their Missionary Study Classes.

The attendance at all these meetings has been larger than ever before. Besides their educational value, they have given an opportunity to become better acquainted, to talk over our mutual aims and aspirations, and all together engendered a closer fellowship with each other. The offerings have amounted to \$86.19. One new branch has been organized, at All Saints', Toledo.

With such a record in the past, may we not hope for greater blessings in the year to come?

The United Offering

At the last Annual Meeting in May, 1909, we had in our treasury the sum of \$1,879.65, and today we are glad to announce that we have on hand \$4,158.48, of which \$2,278.83 represents the amount contributed by the various branches of the Senior and Junior Auxiliary for this year, ending in May, 1910. This leaves a balance of \$841.52 yet to be raised before the first of next October, in order that we may send the sum of \$5,000.00 to the United Offering, to be made in Cincinnati on Thursday, October the sixth, as that is the sum upon which we have set our hearts.

We have striven most earnestly this tri-ennial to have every Parish and Mission Station share in this great Offering, but there are still a number who have as yet had no part in it. However, we have the assurance that most of them are hard at work and will send in their contributions at the very last moment.

In order to accommodate all these late donors, and also because we intend always to make this beautiful service a feature of the United Offering in this Diocese before each General Convention, we are planning a great Rally Day to be held at Trinity Cathedral, the last week of next September. At that time we shall have one of the great Missionary Bishops of the Church to preach for us, and the last opportunity to contribute to this object will be given, the money being placed upon the Altar, at the Offertory Service.

Due notice will be sent to every Parish, regarding the meeting, and we want it to be a large and enthusiastic one. At our Rally Day Service in 1907 the amount of \$1,089.00 was received, and we are hoping that a still larger amount may be given this year to indicate the growth of our enthusiasm in this work.

We feel confident now that there isn't a Parish or Mission Station in our Diocese that does not know what the

United Offering is and for what it stands. In every letter that has been written, interesting leaflets, that were not too long, have been sent with the request that they should be read aloud at one of the meetings of the Auxiliary, so that we know that our women are being educated in Missionary Work and that is a guarantee of interest and enthusiasm. The Juniors too, are learning,—the increase in their gifts being an evidence of the fact that they are beginning to realize their privilege in the matter of Missions. This is the most hopeful sign of all, for they must take our places in the years to come, and carry on the work, we hope, to a magnitude of which we cannot conceive.

Please bear in mind our motto for this tri-ennial, "A Gift from every Church Woman in the Diocese." If there is anyone here today from either the Senior or Junior Auxiliary, who has not yet contributed to this great gift of our women, will you not pledge your mite before this meeting is over? Will you not also consider that you are each a Committee of one to work for the United Offering in the four months that remain, by seeing to it, that every member of your Branch of the Auxiliary, is asked whether or not she has yet made her contribution. We hope that you will all come to our Rally Day next September, bringing with you your final pennies and dimes and dollars.

The Church Periodical Club

The Church Periodical Club has eight new librarians to report this year, seven of whom were appointed as the result of fifty letters sent to the Presidents of those branches of the Woman's Auxiliary not already represented on the Church Periodical Club books. Some of these branches, though but recently started, have sent in most encouraging reports. Of the twenty-five libraries registered last year, sixteen have reported.

The summary of the year's work is as follows:

Twelve barrels, six boxes and four packages of miscellaneous literature have been sent.

Money contributed \$82.23.

Total amount in money and boxes, \$420.42.

The Church Periodical Club has been called by some one the "Society for the Wasting of Nothing," for it takes books and periodicals, pictures, Easter and Christmas cards, games, calendars, Bibles, Prayer-books and Hymnals, music, and printed matter of all kinds and sends it to all corners of our country, even to all quarters of the earth. It is hard to think of a household in this region where reading matter is not abundant and could not be used to advantage in some desolate place, and it is an easy matter to find where these places are. Individuals among the clergy and laity, schools, reading rooms and hospitals, all are asking for help. If the means were adequate, what possibilities could not be realized! If each year we can increase the number of women, who are faithfully sending their magazines each week or month, getting into touch with the recipient by means of a friendly letter, what good could not be accomplished!

I hope that those who hear this limited report may feel the necessity for and the desire to assist *in* this work. We should from very thankfulness for the abundance of reading matter which we enjoy, be eager to share with those who have it not.

The Lenten Mission Study Classes

In January Mrs. Leonard wrote to all the parishes asking the co-operation of rectors and women in a plan for Lenten Mission Study. To this, twenty-nine favorable replies were received, and a "Suggested Course of Six Program Meetings" were sent out at the beginning of Lent.

The course was based on the book recommended by the Educational Department of the Board of Missions for this year's study, "The Why and How of Foreign Missions." In addition to the review of selected chapters, correlated subjects for papers were given, and suggested Bible readings.

Towards the close of Lent we wrote to all branches to whom the leaflets had been sent, asking three questions,—had the meetings aroused greater interest in foreign missions; what suggestions might be made for another year's course, and whether any practical results might be expected to follow.

Some very delightful and encouraging replies were received. The general import was that greater interest had been aroused by this gaining of greater intelligence. We hope the practical results will be manifested when the pledges are taken today.

In addition to the twelve branches which carried out the course as suggested, we are pleased to note that ten more took some other form of systematic study and still others at least had missionary readings or papers at the meetings. It seems as if at last the ground had been broken in Ohio and that another year will find us eager for missionary knowledge. May we hope that this eagerness will add to the subscription list of the Spirit of Missions, and that the greatest missionary text-books of all, our Bibles and our Prayer-books, will be more carefully studied for the inspiration and strength we need in our work?

Bishop Leonard's Report

The Auxiliary of Ohio keeps me in continued state of obligation; at the same time I am constrained to glad appreciation, and gratification. Once each year at least I may make my public acknowledgment of your favor and goodness. Through this past twelve months I have received \$300 for our successful work among the colored people of Cleveland, which the Rev. Robt. W. Bagnall is administering. Next September the annual conference of colored clergymen and laymen of the entire American Church is to hold its sessions here in our St. Andrew's Church, and this indicates that the importance of our position in this department of religious service, is recognized and regarded beyond our borders. Your treasurer has also sent me \$200 towards the Archdeacon's salary and I need not tell you that this gift is well bestowed and well earned. In addition I need thank you for a donation of \$85. I intend with your approval to use it for the building of the new church at East Plymouth. Over a year ago our old church edifice was destroyed by a cyclone and two men standing nearby were killed.

We have now more than a thousand dollars in hand towards the erection of the new St. Matthews, and you will be glad to contribute towards this important object. The Auxiliary is a blessing to many and to no one more fully than to your own Bishop.

The United Offering and How We Collect it in Our Parish

Our President has requested me to review briefly, the history of that branch of the work of the Women's Auxiliary known as the United Offering; and to report the system employed in Trinity Cathedral parish for the collection of our portion of this offering.

The United Offering, presented at the time of the triennial General Convention, is the sum total of special offerings made by women, chiefly for the education and support of Women Missionaries, both at home and abroad.

The First of the United Offerings was made in the year 1886; it amounted to \$82.71. At the next General Convention the United Offering amounted to nearly \$2,200. One-half of this sum was used to build a church at Anvik, the first Church building in the Alaskan Mission field; the other half was used to send a new missionary to Japan. The next two United Offerings amounted to \$20,000 and \$56,000; these are invested as a fund whose income provides for the salary of the Missionary Bishop of Alaska. The United Offering of 1898 was devoted to the training and support of women missionaries; it amounted to over \$82,000. The several Missionary Jurisdictions received apportionments of the 1901 offering, one part being reserved for work among colored people; the total was over \$107,000. The next two United Offerings (with the exception of \$10,000 for a mission building in Sendai, Japan,) were set apart for the training, sending out and support of women missionaries. The amounts were, respectively, \$150,000 and \$224,000. Thus the United Offerings, eight in number, have risen steadily in amount, from the modest beginning of \$82.71 to the sum of \$224,000, the total aggregating nearly \$643,000.

The Ohio Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary began to share in the United Offering movement in the year 1892. Each of its six offerings has been larger than the one before,

the amounts being in round numbers \$500, \$1,000, \$1,500, \$2,200, \$2,800 and the last, \$4,500, a grand total of over \$12,500.

The next United Offering will be presented at one of the services of the General Convention, to be held in Cincinnati next October. With the exception of \$15,000 for a building to be approved by the Board of Missions, it will be devoted to the chief purpose of the United Offering movement, which may be stated as being the spread of Christ's Kingdom, both at home and abroad, by means of women missionaries, trained and maintained in their work by voluntary gifts from the women of the Church. There are now in the several mission fields one hundred and fifty such missionaries as a result of the United Offerings. The steady growth in the amounts of the offerings indicates a steady growth in sympathy and intelligent interest in their purpose. *Work for women, by women* trained to give help where and how and to whom help is needed—whether it be in clothing the naked, feeding the hungry, healing the sick or carrying light to those sitting in darkness; and whether it be for our near neighbors or those in distant lands—this is a very practical charity which is appealing more and more convincingly to the hearts of our Church women, and winning for itself a constantly increasing generosity.

The method employed for the collection of its portion by Trinity Cathedral parish as follows: Annual instead of triennial offerings are urged upon its members, and every woman on the parish list is solicited, by one of a committee of twenty solicitors. Solicitation is either personal or by letter. Each solicitor is furnished with a type-written copy of her quota of names and addresses, followed by ruled spaces for recording data concerning amounts pledged, received, etc.; also with all the necessary stationery, postage, pledge-blanks and letter-forms. On the third page of each sheet of note paper is printed a brief statement of the purpose of the United Offering Movement, its Results, its Growth, its Future, and its Prayer. Each woman in the parish receives a pen-written letter asking for an annual

pledge, or reminding her when her existing pledge is payable; enclosed with this are blanks and a self-addressed stamped envelope, to induce prompt reply. In response to these appeals there has been paid into the treasury during the last two years more than the total United Offering of the three previous years.

The method is based upon the right principle, it is most thorough in its operation and the results are very gratifying.

The Annual Pledges

The largest one of our pledges is made to the Board of Missions for the annual salary of a lady missionary in China. The amount is \$750. Miss Elwin, who is thus "our own missionary" is in charge of St. Mary's Orphanage, Shanghai, a post of much responsibility and importance.

We pay also \$400 for the support of a missionary among the mountaineers of the Blue Ridge,—Miss Eva F. Dixon, St. Paul's Mission, Glen Alpine, North Carolina.

The "Bishop Leonard Fund" is for use among the missions in Ohio, when and where the Bishop thinks it best. We have pledged to him \$550; he will pay \$300 of this amount to the support of the Colored Mission in Cleveland, \$200 to the salary of the Archdeacon, and the rest as need may require.

The "Expense Fund" covers the cost of publishing the annual report, and occasional circulars or leaflets, the stamps and stationery of the Secretary, traveling expense in starting new Branches, and that of missionaries whom we invite to address us. It is hoped that each society will contribute \$1 at least, during the year, and that the stronger societies will contribute considerably more.

The "Contingent Fund" is available for all sorts of emergencies and is of great service. Most often it has been expended for overcoats needed without delay, or for clerical suits not otherwise obtainable. The Honorary Membership fees are allotted to this fund. Our list of Honorary Members has recently been sadly depleted by death. It is much to be desired that other women may take the places of those who, so long as life lasted, took pleasure in aiding this fund.

Varying sums are pledged each year to Bishop Rowe's work in Alaska, to General Missions, to the Districts of Oklahoma, Sacramento, Asheville and the Philippines.

The Bishop Bedell Scholarship, and the Julia Bedell

Scholarship pay for the education of native pupils in St. John's University, Shanghai, China. They require \$70 each per annum. The "Ohio Scholarship" in St. Elizabeth's—one of Bishop Hare's Schools, in South Dakota—pays for the education of an Indian pupil; it requires \$60 per year. Several other scholarships are maintained by individual Parishes. The "Foreign Insurance Fund" provides insurance upon the lives of foreign missionaries for the benefit of their families. We of the Ohio Branch pay \$50 into the fund.

Those of our pledges which help the Board of Missions to meet its appropriations have been this year as follows: Salary of our missionary in China, General Missions, Missions in the Districts of Alaska, Cuba, Kearney, Mexico, Oklahoma, Sacramento; Juniors' fund for Day School in China; Akita Kindergarten, Japan; School at Cape Palmas, Africa; Julia and Bishop Bedell Scholarships, China; Sandusky Scholarship, China; Julia McGrew Scholarship, St. Hilda's, China; "Ohio Scholarship" in Bishop Hare's School; and Mrs. Clapp Memorial, Hospital, China.

Notes

All pledges are to be paid to Mrs. Bates. If you send money direct to Church Missions House, New York, do not fail to say that it is to be credited to the Woman's Auxiliary, and also state whether it is to be a "special" or may be assigned to the appropriations of the Board.

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In sending missionary boxes by freight, be sure that the address is written correctly, and write out the name of the state in full. Also put the address of the sender on the outside of box, and then mail your freight-receipt to the recipient. Thus he will have no difficulty in securing the goods, and will be able to send acknowledgment as soon as it arrives.

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PLEASE NOTE that packages sent to Mrs. Bates for distribution in missionary boxes should be addressed, *not* to her residence, but to *St. Paul's Parish House, 4108 Euclid Ave., Cleveland*. It is here that the packing is done. The janitor and wife residing in the house, have charge of our "missionary closets," and packages are always cared for. All articles received will be assorted by the Secretary, or the Junior Director, and sent out again according to need and the particular sizes desired. But if you have enough to fill a barrel or over fifty pound box there is no economy in sending to Mrs. Bates at all; please send direct to the Mission for which it is intended.

The Convocations

A list is here given of all the Parishes and Mission Stations of each Convocation in which we have either Auxiliary or Junior Branches, or both, and also a list of those where we have none. Please study your own Convocation. Note especially the places that are yet to be gained; if you have friends at any of these points, or can in any way aid us, may we not count upon your assistance?

Cleveland Convocation

We have two Branches in Akron, one each in Ashtabula, Boardman, Canton, in 19 Parishes in Cleveland and suburbs, Conneaut, Cuyahoga Falls, Geneva, Hudson, Kent, Massillon, Medina, New Philadelphia, Niles, Painesville, Peninsula, Perry, Ravenna, two in Steubenville, in Warren, Wellsville, Wooster, two in Youngstown, Unionville.

We have none in the Parish of St. Stephen's, East Liverpool, nor in the missions of Alliance, Berea, Collinwood, Cross Creek, the Atonement in Cleveland, Dennison, Harbor, Jefferson, Kinsman, Lisbon, Salem, Willoughby.

Sandusky Convocation

We have Branches in Bellevue, Bucyrus, Cardington, Catawba Islands, Clyde, Coshocton, Elyria, Fremont, Galion, two in Gambier, Huron, two in Lorain, Mansfield, Marion, Marysville, Milan, Monroeville, Mt. Vernon, Norwalk, Oberlin, Port Clinton, three in Sandusky, Shelby, Tiffin, Upper Sandusky.

We have none in the missions of Fostoria, Lyme, Mill Creek, Mt. Gilead, Venice.

Toledo Convocation

We have Branches in Bellefontaine, Bowling Green, Defiance, Findlay, Kenton, Lima, Maumee and in eight Parishes in Toledo.

We have none in the missions of Bryan, Hicksville, Napoleon and Sidney.

Diocesan Constitution

ARTICLE I—Name.

The name of this association shall be The Ohio Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE II—Object.

Its object shall be to work in connection with the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, the field being co-extensive with the Church, diocesan and general. The methods by which the ends of this organization can be promoted, are the raising of money for the support of Missionaries and Teachers, for the education of those who may be preparing for the work, and for other benevolent purposes connected with Missions; the making, collecting and transfer of clothing and other material aid, and the circulation of papers and leaflets that may serve to stir up a public interest in the Missions of the Church.

ARTICLE III—Membership.

Section 1.—Any Parish Auxiliary (Senior or Junior) may become a member of this association by a written announcement of its organization to the Diocesan Secretary.

Sec. 2.—The officers of parish branches shall send to the Diocesan Treasurer all pledges and money given for other than local purposes; and shall report to the Diocesan Secretary by May 1st each year, all work done, with value of boxes and money given. Each parish branch shall be entitled to but one vote in the annual Diocesan meetings, but may send any number of delegates, one of whom shall be authorized to cast the vote and assume pledges for specific work undertaken by the Diocesan branch.

ARTICLE IV—Officers.

The officers of this association shall be a President, four Vice Presidents, a Secretary and Treasurer, and Directors of Junior Auxiliary, of Babies' Branch and of United Offerings, an Educational Secretary, and a Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club, to be appointed by the Bishop from names presented by a committee of five (each Convocation to be represented thereupon) elected annually in convention.

One Vice President shall be chosen from each of the three Convocations of the Diocese, as follows: First, Cleveland; second, Sandusky; third, Toledo; the fourth shall be a Vice President at large; and these with the other officers shall constitute a board of managers and trustees of the association. But it shall be competent for the same person to hold two or more offices if in the judgment of the board of managers the best interests of the work require it.

ARTICLE V—Duties of Officers.

Section 1.—The President shall preside, and in her absence one of the Vice Presidents, in Convocation order. She shall call meetings and perform such duties as pertain to her office; and shall make every effort, through the Vice Presidents and otherwise, to direct the work of the parish branches in raising money for the support of some one or more of the departments of missionary work, and shall form new parish auxiliaries wherever practicable.

Sec. 2.—It shall be the duty of the first, second and third Vice President in addition to the customary assistance to the President, to take general charge of the missionary work in her own Convocation and she may arrange for one meeting of representatives from the parishes in the Convocation, held annually in the Autumn and shall in every way strive to arouse and maintain active interest in all departments of the work. The especial duty of the fourth Vice President shall be to

assist the President, and she may also be assigned to duty in any part of the Diocese where such assistance is desired.

Sec. 3.—The Secretary shall correspond with the General Secretary and the missionaries and find out where help is needed, and of what kind; shall inform the parish secretaries and arrange about their work, so that a general oversight may be kept by one person. She shall keep a correct list of all Diocesan officers, parish secretaries and clergymen in the Diocese, with addresses of the same. She shall take the minutes of all meetings and prepare an annual report for circulation in the Diocese. She shall receive and forward all money offerings, and shall pay out money only as voted by the Diocesan branch or Board of Managers, except money received for a definite purpose may be paid for that purpose without a formal vote; shall keep an account of all money and boxes contributed for missionary and other purposes by the parish branches, or individuals; and, as Treasurer, shall after the accounts and vouchers are audited embody a full account in the annual report.

Sec. 4.—An Auditing Committee of two persons, to be appointed by the President, shall examine the accounts, and vouchers of the Diocesan Treasurer, and report result.

ARTICLE VI—Amendments.

The Constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual meeting of the association; provided, that notice of the proposed change has been given with the call for a meeting.

By-Laws

I.

The Annual Meeting of this Association shall be held on Tuesday of the week following the Diocesan Convention; but, for good reason, the Board of Officers may appoint the meeting upon some other date.

The place of meeting may be determined upon by vote at an annual meeting, or, failing this, shall be arranged by the Board of Officers.

II.

In case of vacancy in any office the same may be filled at a stated or called meeting of the Board of Managers, and any one appointed by them shall continue in office until the next annual meeting.

III.

Special meetings may be called by the President at such time and place as she may designate, for the purpose of stimulating interest in the work.

IV.

The stated meetings of the Board of Managers, with the President as Chairman, shall be held in May at any place designated, and at these meetings any number present may constitute a quorum.

V.

It is expected that each parish Branch shall contribute not less than one dollar (\$1.00) to the expense fund.

VI.

These by-laws may be amended at any annual meeting by vote of majority present.

VII.

The order of services and of business at the annual meeting shall be as follows:
