The Annual Meeting at Cleveland

May 14th, 1914

The Annual Meeting of the Ohio Branch of Woman's Auxiliary took place at Emmanuel Church, Cleveland, on May 14th.

The Convention began its day with the service of Holy Communion, Bishop Leonard being celebrant, assisted by the Archdeacon, the Rev. R. W. Woodrooffe, Rev. E. J. Harry, Rev. J. M. Withycombe, and the Rev. B. W. Paxton.

At the business meeting immediately succeeding, Mrs. H. P. Knapp occupied the chair. At roll call, delegations answered to their names from Akron, Ashtabula, from all the Parishes of Cleveland, from Cuyahoga Falls, East Cleveland, Lakewood, Elyria, Findlay, Fremont, Gambier, Geneva, Hudson, Huron, Kent, Lorain, Massillon, Medina, Monroeville, Niles, Norwalk, Painesville, Perry, Sandusky, Steubenville, Toledo, Warren and Youngstown.

Upon motion, the reading of the minutes of the last meeting was omitted, the same having been printed and distributed.

Rev. Mr. Woodrooffe gave a cordial word of welcome from Emmanuel Church. He was followed by a greeting from Bishop Leonard, who expressed pleasure at being with us, regretting his absence at our last gathering. He read a statement of the distribution of money he had received through the Woman's Auxiliary during the year.

After the report from the Junior Director, Bishop Leonard spoke with much feeling, of the work of the Junior Branch, regretting the inroads which the "Camp Fire" girls had seemed to make in their ranks. He appealed, to all Directors, to make great effort, to draw and hold the girls. To look into the methods adopted by the "Camp Fire" girls, and present the same, or equal attractions, to our Juniors.

A Nominating Committee was elected, as follows: Chairman, Mrs. E. J. Backus, of St. Paul's, Cleveland; Mrs. L. E. Lyman, of Emmanuel, Cleveland; Mrs. Thomas

Jenkins, of St. Paul's, Fremont; Mrs. J. W. Sharp, of St. Mark's, Toledo; and Miss Grace Mickey, of Ascension, Lakewood.

Mrs. Knapp then gave a word of greeting and appreciation of the work accomplished, urging still more zeal and interest for the year to come. She spoke of the day named for intercession for Missions by the Woman's Auxiliary, set for September 29th, in our Diocese, and urged that all church women bear this date in mind.

Reports covering the work of the year were made as follows: Mrs. Savage gave her report as Secretary, and also read the report of the Treasurer, Mrs. Bates, whose absence, we again note. Miss Mather gave her report of the Cleveland Convocation; Miss Spencer, of the Sandusky Convocation; the Third Vice-President, Mrs. Walbridge, reported the work of the Toledo Convocation, followed by the Fourth Vice-President, Mrs. Cooke. At the noon-day hour "Intercession for Missions" was offered by the Rev. Mr. Woodrooffe. Report of the United Offering was given by Mrs. Hatch, and that for the "Little Helpers," in the absence of the Director, by Mrs. Hicks, followed by Miss Kimball, the Educational Secretary, Miss Truesdell, Director of the Auxiliary Daughters, and Miss Atwood, our Junior Leaders. The final report was given by Mrs. Hart, Diocesan Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club.

At the luncheon hour, all repaired to the Assembly Hall, at the rear of the Church, where a delicious repast was served by the ladies of Emmanuel Church, assisted by the other East End Auxiliary Societies.

Re-assembling in the Church, there followed consideration of the pledges for the coming year. In order not to consume time, which we wished to give the speaker, Bishop Thomas, it was announced that the Treasurer should understand that all the old pledges would remain as last year, unless she was notified to the contrary, except that the pledge for Sacramento would be changed to Nevada.

The address of the day was then made by the Rt. Rev. Daniel Sylvester Thomas, Missionary Bishop of Wyoming.

The discourse was greatly enjoyed by all, his pleasing personality, and gift at story-telling, unloosed the purse-strings of our Auxiliary women, and his work received the largest pledge ever made at an Annual Meeting, exceeding five hundred dollars.

A rising vote of the entire Convention was taken, expressing to Emmanuel and all the East End Parishes most hearty thanks and sincere appreciation of the day's delightful hospitality.

An invitation was extended by the women of St. Paul's Church for the next Annual Meeting and was thankfully accepted.

The new Board of Officers chosen is as follows: Honorary President, Mrs. W. A. Leonard; President, Mrs. H. P. Knapp; Vice Presidents, Mrs. H. E. Cooke, Miss Carrie Tschumy, Mrs. T. H. Walbridge, Mrs. Samuel Ward; Secretary, Mrs. J. B. Savage; Treasurer, Mrs. C. S. Bates; Director of Junior Department, Miss M. E. Atwood; Director of Auxiliary Daughters, Miss J. Truesdell; Director of Little Helpers, Mrs. F. R. White; Director of United Offering, Miss K. L. Mather; Educational Secretary, Miss Martha Kimball; Correspondent Church Periodical Club, Mrs. H. H. Hart.

We note with pleasure that our Honorary President is with us today, and are most grateful for her restoration to health. With regret we record the absence of our Treasurer, whose presence is always an inspiration.

The meeting was closed with a short service of prayer and benediction.

Address of the President

It is a great pleasure to have so many with us today and especially to welcome the members of our new Branches, and those who have not been accustomed to coming to our Annual Meetings.

You will soon hear of the work done in the various departments of the Ohio Branch. Before these reports are made, may I express my deep appreciation of the loyalty of the Diocesan officers and of the ready help given? And not only the Diocesan, but the Parochial officers and the members of the Branches, by their steady, faithful service, have made possible the good reports for which we are thankful today.

Wise plans may be laid, but it is only as each woman feels her responsibility for their carrying out that any results can come. We have finished our Diocesan year, but the year of the Board of Missions to which we are Auxiliary does not end till the thirty-first of August.

You have doubtless all read of the anxiety that hangs over us because of the condition of the Missionary treasury. We share the responsibility for this condition. What can *we* do to avert disaster? A little leaflet of suggestions has been published and we have five hundred here for distribution. We ask each of you to take one, "read and inwardly digest it." Let us carry out the suggestions and see what a difference they will make in the year's ending.

We are to put into effect this year a resolution proposed at the last Triennial that each Diocesan Branch appoint a day of prayer for the Auxiliary.

Your officers have decided that the Feast of St. Michael and All Angels, September 29th, shall be Ohio's day. We ask that each of our members reserve that day, so near the beginning of our fall activities, as a day of intercession for Missions, for the Auxiliary and for our own Diocesan and Parish Branches. Letters will be sent to each Rector asking that a Celebration of the Holy Communion be held, with special remembrance of these things.

If we begin our year as Marys, sitting at the Master's feet to learn of Him, will there not be a holier, sweeter undercurrent to our Martha tasks?

Annual Report of the Secretary

(Annual Meeting, Emmanuel Church, Cleveland,
May 14th, 1914.)

It gives us great pleasure to welcome to Cleveland, today, the Diocesan Branches of our Ohio Auxiliary. These Annual Meetings have increased largely in attendance, in the past few years, and we hope the time is not far distant when every Society, even the weakest ones, and those at the greatest distance from Cleveland, shall feel it a duty, as well as for their education and profit, to have representation at these meetings. It is here in Cleveland—which is of necessity the center of our Auxiliary activities—that an awakening to our responsibility is to be best learned, and our real, vital interest is to be aroused.

The spirit and enthusiasm of the women, at our recent Triennial, has been a great help and encouragement to us through the year. It has made us more mindful than ever of the great work which is being carried on by women in all lines of Missionary activity, as well as proving the wonderful spirit of devotion and self-sacrifice which characterizes their lives. For they count themselves happy to endure hardship and isolation, if only they can promote the betterment of mankind and extend the knowledge of Christ and His kingdom.

The success of the Monthly Conferences, in Cleveland, have been a stimulus and help to all who have been fortunate enough to attend them, particularly have they been a source of encouragement to our smaller Parishes. The meetings in the Toledo Convocation, inaugurated by Mrs. Walbridge, long ago, have been very successful. It is our hope that something of the kind may soon become also a regular part of the work of the Sandusky Convocation.

The services of the "Quiet Day" were attended by a larger number of Church women than in any previous

year. Very practical and helpful was the note sounded by the speaker, and it met a quick response in the hearts of all who heard.

One source of encouragement in this year's work has been the unusual number of Woman's Auxiliary and Junior Branches which have been organized. Some have already done good work, others are ready to begin with the opening of the new year.

We have among our good Church women many who are deprived of the privileges of the Church, because of living at a distance from the towns. An effort has been made, through correspondence with these isolated women, to put them in touch with the work of the Auxiliary. They are to be supplied with "United Offering" boxes, and have promised to bear in mind the "United Offering" prayers, as also the prayers for greater awakening and growth in all Auxiliary work. At Mrs. Bates' suggestion, we shall call them "Twigs"! Let us hope they will so increase as to add strength and symmetry to our steadily growing Ohio Branch.

The new pledge made last year, known as the "Sarah L. Leonard Scholarship," for the education of a native girl at Fortella Hall, in Nenana, Alaska, is to be a permanent pledge. We hope that all contributions will be continued the same as last year. The letter to Alaska, containing the first one hundred dollars, was on the steamer "Jennie," which sank in the Pacific ocean, last fall, but was afterward raised. Mr. Madara, who is in charge of the school, wrote that the mail-bag was but little damaged, and our draft, after lying several days in the ocean, was perfectly good and was most welcome.

The pledge for Sacramento will be changed to Nevada. We ask those who contributed to the former for so many years, to transfer their aid to the Missionary District of Nevada. Sacramento has now become a Diocese and has less need for our help than has Nevada.

For our own special Mission of Glen-Alpine we contributed the money for a new horse,—one hundred and

twenty-five dollars. This amount, with the exception of one generous gift of fifty dollars, was given in small amounts by many of our Auxiliary Societies. It is perhaps difficult for us to appreciate what it means to the welfare of the Mission that Mr. and Mrs. Joyner have a horse to take them about over this mountainous district. Receiving, as we have, their overflowing thanks and appreciation, we may better understand the limitations that would be placed upon their work with no means, other than walking, to get them about the country. We sent also fourteen pair of sheets, as Easter gifts, to Mrs. Joyner's Auxiliary women. These no doubt added to the comfort of as many households. The Mission at Glen-Alpine was founded by our Ohio Branch and has been ever since our special charge; and over and above our annual gifts of money and clothing, it is a satisfaction to occasionally add something that gives unlooked-for pleasure. We made it possible last year for a double floor to be laid in the Mission House. This was a great comfort to both Mr. and Mrs. Joyner and to the children. We can easily understand the suffering of sitting in a school-room, with cold air blowing up between the boards upon one's feet. With such conditions prevailing in our part of the country, it is quite certain the children would "strike," not to mention the teachers!

For the meeting of the Fifth Department, which was held at Trinity Cathedral, Cleveland, October, 1912, we raised a sum of money to defray the expense of entertaining delegates. The money left over, after paying expenses, was placed in the bank to the credit of the Auxiliary. It has been used to meet the expenses of speakers who have come to us from a distance; also, the car fare of our own Auxiliary women who have gone among the smaller Parishes, at their invitation; and for Conference notices, sent out each month. As this money is about depleted, our officers desire to have what shall be known as an "Extension Fund" (over and above what can be spared out of the Expense Fund) to be used for the purpose above mentioned. We hope the Auxiliary Societies will be glad to contribute towards this

fund, as well as to avail themselves of the privileges which it offers. Let me remind you not to overlook the Contingent Fund, which gives such material help in the completion of our Domestic Boxes for the clergy and their families. We have filled a larger number of these orders than usual this past year, and derived for ourselves much satisfaction in being put in closer touch with the Missionary, his family and his work.

All pledges made by the Ohio Branch for specific sums, all scholarships, salaries, etc., are paid in full. We have also been able to surprise Bishop Leonard with an extra one hundred dollars. This savors of interest and growth, and gives much encouragement for additional effort. In reviewing, as we have, the more prominent features of the work of the past year, we have reason to be gratified. Let it be a stimulus to every Auxiliary woman, in whatever part of the Diocese she may be, for a deeper interest in the Missionary work of the Church. May we look continually beyond the borders of our own small field, into the field of the whole world, believing that, in doing more for others, we shall receive a greater blessing for ourselves and a clearer perception of our obligation to do our full share towards the extension and growth of the work of the Church.

The Auxiliary Daughters

It hardly seems possible that a whole year has elapsed since this new Department of Auxiliary Daughters was organized in this Diocese, organized to interest the older girls and younger women in the Missionary work of the Church and to train them to go into the Woman's Auxiliary as valuable members, capable not only of appreciating and understanding the work of the Auxiliary, but its educational and spiritual side as well.

A conversation overheard at the General Convention in New York, last fall, emphasized particularly the spiritual side, which we are so apt in our younger Branches to put aside for the work. Bishop Kinsolving, from Brazil, was talking to one of the delegates; she was regretting that her Parish Branch had been unable to do anything for him—having already so much to do. "There's one thing you might have done," said the Bishop. "Have you ever prayed for the work in Brazil?"

Our first report comes from only twelve Branches. We want to thank the officers, as well as the members of each society, for although the Daughters are few in number, they make up in untiring energy, doing everything they can to make their new Department successful. We have one hundred and sixty members, with an excellent showing in money and box values. In the work our Branches have accomplished, we look forward to another year of earnest endeavor—to do not only those things left undone, but many more we can find to do.

From so many Parishes where we have tried to have a new Branch organized comes the cry of too few to do the work or lack of interest. But in every Parish there is surely one girl or woman interested. Why should there not be? Do we not every one of us enjoy all the blessings and benefits which the knowledge of Christ and His gospel have brought to us? And is there not then a certain obligation on our

part to carry as well as we can this same knowledge and these same blessings to others?

So we are grateful for this first year. May we enter into our second year with a deeper consecration to Him and a resolve that, no matter how little we can do, we can do something, for it is all good in His sight.

If, in our Diocese, we could only attain the ideal (and why can we not?) to have Missionary Societies in every Parish—the Junior Auxiliary, the Auxiliary Daughters, and the Woman's Auxiliary—with every communicant an earnest, active member of one of these societies. What a wonderful power for Christ's Kingdom our Diocese would be!

The Junior Auxiliary

The present Junior Director has followed the good methods used by her predecessor, Mrs. Knapp, and has tried to build upon the foundations already well laid.

It was my privilege to attend the General Convention in New York, and to bring back suggestions and ideas for work received from the splendid Junior Conferences, Study Classes, General Convention Services and the Junior Exhibit.

We are glad to welcome seven new Junior Branches and two reorganized Branches. We regret that in a few Parishes the Junior work has lapsed this year, due to the inability of the Rector to procure a leader for the Juniors.

The great need today is for consecrated women, who, for love and gratitude to God, will be willing to teach the young people of the Church to realize their share in the Master's work, not only of their responsibility, but their privilege of working for the kingdom which He founded.

I am deeply grateful for the splendid help and loyal support of the Junior Directors the past year. Upon them falls the greater part of the Junior work. The Junior Directors in Cleveland held their first meeting on December 2nd, at the Rectory of the Church of the Ascension, Lakewood. Two other general meetings were held, when we were invited for luncheon by this same Parish. Much credit is due to Miss Mickey, who arranged these meetings and who also has acted during the year as assistant in Cleveland.

In November, the Juniors of the Sandusky and Toledo Convocations sent United Christmas barrels. In April, the Juniors of the Cleveland Convocation had a Union meeting and sent a barrel to Mrs. Meadow's in Virginia. At this time the Juniors of the Church of the Ascension, Lakewood, gave the mystery play "Princess Merryheart and the Light Fairies."

The Juniors of the Sandusky Convocation united in sending their Lenten barrel to St. Mary's Mission, Nixon, Nevada. At their meeting "The Great Trail," an Indian mystery play, was given by the Junior Auxiliary of Calvary Church.

The Juniors in the Toledo Convocation sent their united barrel to St. Ann's Mission, New Brookland, South Carolina. Another year of opportunity has been given us. We offer it to the Master, and ask Him to accept it and bless it.

The Juniors have to report \$514.36 in money and \$776.92 in box values. This year Christmas gifts and candy were supplied for five Diocesan Mission Sunday Schools; a pleasure and a useful gift and candy were supplied for one hundred and sixty children at Glen-Alpine, N. C., and for two hundred Arapahoe Indian boys and girls.

The Juniors also sent several packages and boxes to various Mission Stations. Money has been given to the United Offering, so they can have a share in the great "Thank Offering." We cannot expect enthusiasm unless there is knowledge, so during Lent the Juniors were asked to study the Junior Course on China. In order to remember it better each Branch was asked to make a Scrap Book, illustrating the story "China, Forward March." The best book was made by the Junior Auxiliary at Huron, and as a reward we are glad to welcome the two delegates today. In nearly every Parish some kind of study was used during Lent. In several Parishes mystery plays have been given. Not only do they help the children taking part but they are instructive and helpful to all who witness them.

The Juniors were asked to say every day the noon-day prayer for Missions. There has been greater consecration and devotion on the part of the Directors and I trust another year we may be able in far greater measure to plan, pray and work together, so our interest, devotion and efficiency may be increased. We have not yet attained our possibilities, but every year sees progress in the work of the Junior Auxiliary. Our ideal will not be realized until in every Parish there is a strong Branch of the Junior Auxiliary

in which every girl and in time the boys will be working, praying, giving toward the Master's kingdom, until all who are enlisted in the Church's army can sing with enthusiasm "Like a Mighty Army Moves the Church of God." That the kingdom of this world shall be the kingdom of our God and of His Christ, so all may have a share in the victory that won the final triumph, and can some day look in the face of our Divine Saviour and say "Master, I was there."

So through the summer months, while many will not have meetings, we can all give or make something. We can read about what the Church is doing and we can pray for "The Coming of the Kingdom." Also that some day we may go as the Church's representatives into the Mission field; or do our share in sending others. If we do so, I am sure God will bless the work of the Ohio Juniors and help us to be more loyal and faithful members of Christ's Church. "The noblest end of life is to live for the service of God. And everything is in His service by which we can be or give a blessing to another."

We are glad to welcome two new Branches, one started in Christ Church, Cleveland, and one in Calvary, Sandusky.

May the next year prove that the “Little Helpers” are living up to their name, giving more freely, both their prayers and their pennies for Jesus’ sake.

Reports From the Convocations

REPORT OF THE CLEVELAND CONVOCATION.

At a meeting of the Diocesan officers early in the fall, the suggestion was made that a number of papers should be prepared, which could be read at Auxiliary Meetings; and I was asked by our President to secure the writers and assign subjects, and I report, with pleasure, on the willingness and hearty co-operation I met with from all I asked. We had seven "Visiting Speakers," who held themselves in readiness to respond to any invitation, from any Branch throughout the Diocese, to read their papers. The subjects chosen were three explanatory of the Auxiliary matters, and as the text-book chosen for Mission Study Classes by the Educational Department in New York was "The Emergency in China," we had three papers on China, and one on Mexico. Mrs. Dake, of St. Paul's Church, wrote on "Medical Work in China," and she reports that she read her paper six times: at St. James', Painesville; St. Peter's, Lakewood; Church of the Incarnation; Emmanuel; Trinity; St. Paul's, Cleveland. Miss Armstrong, of the Cathedral, her subject was "Educational Work in China." She reports reading it five times: at Trinity, and Emmanuel, in Cleveland, and at Painesville, Ravenna, and at Warren. At Ravenna, the meeting was in the evening. Mrs. Darby, of St. John's Church, wrote from personal experiences on "Two Days in Hankow and Wuchau" and she reports reading it three times: twice at the Church of the Incarnation, and once at Trinity.

Mrs. Collacott, of Painesville, wrote about the Auxiliary: subject "Why we are—What we do—How we do it." She reports having read it at Trinity, St. John's, Emmanuel, Cleveland; Christ Church, Warren, and at Ashtabula. The paper on "The Apportionment Plan" was written by our Treasurer, Mrs. Bates, and read by Mrs. Winsor, of the Cathedral. She reports reading it at Trinity, St. Paul's

and St. John's, Cleveland; St. James', Painesville; at the Conference at Church of the Holy Spirit, Cleveland, and by request she sent a typewritten copy to St. Peter's, Ashtabula. Miss Mary Taylor, of St. John's Church, wrote of a "Winter in Mexico." She reports that she read it before the Woman's Auxiliary in Painesville, the Cathedral, Church of the Incarnation, St. John's and St. Paul's, Cleveland, and Warren. She also read it before the Midway Club in Cleveland; the Monday Club in Painesville; at Winter Park, Florida. It is interesting to know that women who are not Churchwomen, had wished to hear a paper of that sort. As Miss Taylor went South in January, Mrs. Sheadle, of Trinity, read it at St. Peter's, Lakewood, and at St. Timothy's, Massillon—eleven times in all.

I read my paper on "General Missions" at the Church of the Incarnation, Trinity, St. John's, Cleveland; St. Timothy's, Massillon; Christ Church, Warren, also before the "Mother's Meeting" at Grace Church, Cleveland. I think the Committee all felt interested in their subjects, and derived much pleasure from the knowledge they gained in their preparation; and we only wish we might in some way reach those who are not already much interested.

THE EXTRA PLEDGES.

At the time of the General Convention in New York last fall, we women of the Auxiliary had the privilege of listening to many speakers who impressed us with their enthusiasm, but two definite appeals took shape and Committees were formed to raise as much money as possible, for the needs were urgent and immediate. One was for St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo, Japan, and the other St. Mary's Hall, Shanghai, China. Acting for our President, I pledged for Ohio \$200.00 for each. I then sent a circular letter to every Branch, explaining the matter, asking if they would not wish to have a hand in the furthering of these two wonderful opportunities which were appealing to the Church at large. I wish to report that I have been able to send to Mr. Geo. Gordon King, Treasurer of the Board of Missions, for St. Mary's Hall, the sum of \$230.73; to Mrs.

Chas. R. Pancoast, Treasurer of the Woman's National Council, of St. Luke's International Hospital, Tokyo, the sum of \$219.90. I am sure more has been given to both objects, credited to the Ohio Auxiliary, that has not passed through my hands.

REPORT OF THE TOLEDO CONVOCATION.

As a rule we are apt to measure the success of the Woman's Auxiliary by the amount of its pledges paid and the value of its boxes.

Very often the most potent factor of its strength is entirely lost sight of in the face of cold figures. The penetrating influence of each and every member should be manifested in the spiritual life of a Parish. All members should feel consecrated to bring light to the minds and hearts of women, who do not know, the blessedness of Missionary work for Christ. They should be ready to witness for Christ by word and deed, and thus be true Missionaries whether they stay at home or offer for a foreign field.

Talk Auxiliary! You will be surprised to find the number of women "who do not know" and yet are willing workers when they realize the true inwardness of Missionary activity. The quickening power of God's presence will soon broaden the vision if we but open the way.

We believe that the outlook for Auxiliary work in the Toledo Convocation is most encouraging. We feel a growing sense of personal service, and a desire to interest those who have no activities in Church work.

Those Branches having Mission study classes report greater interest than ever. One Branch, upon finishing the "Emergency in China," gladly made an extra pledge of twenty-five dollars for Missions.

The United Offering shows an increase over any former first year after the Triennial.

I feel that much depends upon the personal devotion of each United Offering Treasurer, and is what counts.

This is exemplified in the wonderful success of one Treasurer who more than trebled in 1913 any previous Offering given by her Parish. Already it has made an increase over last year. Her slogan is "an Offering from many." Our annual all day meeting was held in Trinity Church beginning with a service of Holy Communion with the Rev. Franklin Cole Sherman as preacher.

Luncheon was served to a large number of delegates in the Parish House.

At the afternoon Missionary meeting our Diocesan President gave a most interesting report of Auxiliary activities at the General Convention. As a result of her earnest plea for St. Mary's Hall, Shanghai, and St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo. The offering of \$36.43 was divided between the two.

At the January gathering Mr. C. W. Williams told most practically the needs of Missionary work in Alaska. The offering of \$18.00 was given to Mr. Williams.

A third meeting is to be held June 3rd, when the Rev. P. N. Tsu will present the cause of China. Next year we hope to have an organization of all officers in the Convocation and to hold Monthly meetings where we may discuss all Auxiliary problems, and by personal experience and co-operation enlarge and strengthen the scope of our work.

REPORT OF THE SANDUSKY CONVOCATION.

A report is expected from the Sandusky Convocation. I fear it will not compare favorably with the Toledo or Cleveland Convocations, but I present it as the best I can offer.

The study of China, suggested for our winter's work, was taken up by several Branches, and much interesting information gained as to the customs and needs of this great country. Let it be the aim of our Church women to inform themselves that they may be better fitted to interest

those who have not yet been roused to their responsibility to aid in the Missionary work of the Church.

I have only one new organization to report, that of Calvary, Sandusky, meeting monthly, but with the expectation of more frequent gatherings when the work opens in the fall. At a recent meeting held with this Branch, Church women from Huron, Fremont and Put-in-Bay were entertained right royally. Addresses were made by our President, and the neighboring Clergy. A suggestion was made that meetings be held throughout the Convocation: one at Mt. Vernon, for the extreme southern part; one at Mansfield, for the middle portion; one at Elyria or Lorain, for the eastern; and one at Fremont or Sandusky, for the western section; all near by Branches being expected to attend. That a program be arranged for each meeting, and a social half hour spent afterward, to strengthen the interest and good feeling among our Auxiliary women. It would be gratifying to have this plan materialize. In looking over past records I find that the work of this Convocation has shown some increases. It is gratifying that we are not standing still, but can we not do better another year?

Report on Conferences and the Annual Quiet Day

The Monthly Conferences of the Woman's Auxiliary in Cleveland, which were something of an experiment last year, proved this year, by the increase in attendance and in interest, that they had come to stay. Even if nothing else has been accomplished, the bringing into closer touch of the Branches of all the different Parishes in the city, the learning to know each other better, and the feeling of the strength that comes with union, have proven these Conferences well worth while. We have held six, from November to April inclusive, in Parishes in different part of the city, with special subjects for each Conference.

The first one was held at St. Philip's Church, with the subject, A Review of the Triennial. The second at Christ Church, when we heard about The Church Periodical Club. The third at St. Peter's Church, Lakewood, where we gladly gave up our appointed subject to listen to Mr. John A. Ely, who has for a year been teaching at St. John's College, Shanghai, while Mrs. Ely was teaching at St. Mary's Hall. They have both been at home preparing themselves for further work, in the same institutions of learning, and were impatient to return. Mr. Ely talked to us about St. Mary's Hall in a most interesting way, and also answered many of our questions.

Our next Conference was held in the Church of the Holy Spirit, and the subject was: Our Organization—Four Departments, presented by the heads of these departments in our Diocese.

In March we met at St. Mary's Church, and the subject was, What Relation does the Study of Missions bear to Woman's Auxiliary Work?

The last Conference was held at the Cathedral, where we heard of the uses made of this United Offering.

We want to take this opportunity to thank all those who, by their courteous hospitality, their papers, and addresses, and by their presence, helped to make these Conferences interesting and helpful. As a mark of the estimation in which these Conferences have come to be held, we have already been asked to hold our first one in the Fall at St. Luke's Church.

The Annual Quiet Day for Women was held at Grace Church, on Friday, March 20th, and was conducted by the Rt. Rev. Joseph M. Francis, D. D., Bishop of Indianapolis, and those who took advantage of the great privileges of the day, were deeply impressed by the spirituality, power and practical helpfulness of all the addresses. While more of our women were present than last year, yet the attendance was by no manner of means as large as it would have been, if all realized the inspiration to be derived from such a day spent in the presence of the Master in this special way.

The United Offering

The last year of the Triennial is always the busiest and most interesting one for the United Offering, then one must be on the alert every moment, to see that no one of the Parishes and Mission stations is overlooked, even though letters have been sent each year, explaining the work, and begging every one to share in it.

Last year at the time of our annual meeting, we had about \$5,000.00 in the treasury. Soon after we started "a coin campaign." First we wrote to the Rector of each Parish and Mission station, where there had been no interest shown, and asked him if he would be willing to send us a list of the women and girls in his Parish, to whom we might write, and as fast as these names were received, we sent an explanatory letter, United Offering leaflets, and a coin card. We started this work with high hope, but were somewhat disappointed, first, with the Clergy, who failed, in some cases, to respond, and then, sometimes, with the women themselves, whom evidently we failed to impress, however we feel that it was worth while, as it served at least to bring our "Thank Offering" once more to their attention, and with persistent effort we may yet succeed in reaching them.

On October first we had our Presentation Service at the Cathedral, with Bishop Thurston, of Eastern Oklahoma, as the preacher; it was a fine service, and disappointing only in the matter of attendance. It was indeed a happy day for those to whom the United Offering is dear, for at its close we had added almost \$4,000.00 to our treasury.

Then came the exciting days in New York, where the money poured in, until the very last moment, culminating with the wonderful service at the Cathedral of St. John, the Divine, when your Treasurer proudly and reverently laid upon the altar a check for \$9,207.00, as the gift of the loyal women and girls of Ohio. Then followed, in the

afternoon, the great mass meeting at Carnegie Hall, with its ringing addresses and inspiring music, and one realized perhaps, as never before, the splendid vision of the blessedness of service, and that no sacrifice of time or effort is too great for the Master's work.

At the meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary, which followed, there were many discussions about the United Offering, and I am sure the Treasurers came away with the idea that the mite box plan was the very best one. In our own case, while we are very proud and grateful for the growth of the past three years, still the fact remains that if every one of our women and girls had averaged two pennies a week, we might have had \$15,000.00! The ideal way is to give regularly, and systematically, a certain sum, whether it is two cents or much more each week, with a special gift whenever one receives some blessing for which she is particularly grateful.

We are always so glad of the large gifts, but equally so for the systematic small ones, which do count for so much in this work; so we have advised, more strongly than ever, the use of "the little blue box," and have distributed thirteen hundred of them since January the first. The Offering, since the Triennial last October, has been \$882.13, which averages about the same as the amount received for the first six months, three years ago.

When we can put a mite box into the hands of each woman and girl in every Parish and Mission Station, and when we receive the gift of life for service in the field, then, and *then only*, will the ideal United Offering be realized in our Diocese. God speed the day.

The Church Periodical Club

The Church Periodical Club is an Association or Guild, if you will, of which all the Parishes in the country are its members. It furnishes literature to those unable to procure it in any other way, and therefore of immense benefit; but that great work cannot go on enlarging unless the members, that is—the Parishes—through a faithful Librarian making individual effort—contribute time, thought and money—a yearly sum of at least two dollars, so that the Central Office or Guild in New York may not be hampered.

It was with great reluctance that I assumed the responsibility of correspondent last year, for while there may be a fresh impetus, there must at first, of necessity, be some loss by a change of officers. It is a work of great scope and much benefit in many ways, and requires only a little thoughtful effort and a few pennies on our own part, to send on each month a magazine which we have ourselves enjoyed to some one less fortunate, who has no other opportunity to see it. We want every Parish in the Diocese to have a Librarian, and an active one. This year only twenty-five Librarians, of the fifty enrolled, have done anything.

In January the National Executive Secretary, Mrs. J. L. Chapin, who had for twenty-three years devoted her life to the work, was called to her reward, and at a recent memorial meeting the Rt. Rev. David H. Greer, Bishop of New York, paid a tribute of Commendation and Appreciation for the years of untiring service, unselfish devotion and wise administration in the affairs of our organization, which he designated as one of the most valuable adjuncts to Mission work in all its branches, both domestic and foreign, and which he trusted and believed would suffer no deterioration through loss of her efficient leadership.

The Mission Study Classes

The aim of the Educational Department this year has been to have an educational leader in every Parish in the Diocese, someone vitally interested in Missions, and who would be untiring in her efforts to arouse others to the opportunities and privileges given to us all in this great work. Nine of the Parishes secured such leaders, and through their efforts we were able to have thirteen Mission Study Classes, having from fifteen to thirty-five members each. One evening class had both men and women. The members of another class showed their interest by sending twenty-five dollars to the Board of Missions for the China fund.

The suggested programs for Lenten use were based on the text book "The Emergency in China," and were used by the fourteen Parishes that had program meetings.

Reading Circles were also held in fourteen Parishes. The Spirit of Missions and one of the books on China, usually "The Life of Bishop Ingle," being read. Missionary papers were read in seventeen Parishes, many of them having several of the ones arranged for by the Conference Committee. Those of us who heard these splendid papers feel that every one should have taken advantage of this opportunity. Missionary lectures and addresses were given in sixteen Parishes, some of them having several, usually given by the ever faithful Rector. I would not discourage the Rectors, but would we not be the stronger if we made the mental effort ourselves? I would urge that more of the Juniors and Sunday School children be trained to give "Mystery Plays." Nine have been given this year and have proved a means of arousing much interest. Out of the eighty-four new subscribers to the Spirit of Missions, thirty-one came from one Parish. Through the efforts of the Auxiliary this magazine has also been placed in nineteen public institutions, such as hospitals, libraries, Y. M. C. A.

buildings, etc., and is being sent to twenty-five isolated church women. The winter's meetings are over, but God's work goes on, and it is important that we remember the things that we can do by ourselves.

Think what it would mean if every member of the Auxiliary were to secure one new subscriber to the "Spirit of Missions." Surely that is worth trying. Our prayers are always needed, and that our prayers and work may be more definite, and that we may come nearer to living missionary lives, let us become better acquainted with the missionary field by reading at least one missionary book during the summer.

This year, as before, will be held the Interdenominational Conferences, and we urge that many from Ohio take advantage of the splendid training and wonderful source of inspiration for all branches of the Church's work.

The Annual Pledges

The largest one of our pledges is made to the Board of Missions for the annual salary of a lady missionary in China. The amount is \$750. Miss Elwin, who is thus "our own missionary," is in charge of St. Mary's Orphanage, Shanghai, a post of much responsibility and importance.

Since the founding of St. Paul's Mission at Glen Alpine in the Blue Ridge Mountains, we have had the honor of paying the salary of our very successful missionary there, Mrs. Eva. F. Dixon Joyner. Her husband, the Rev. James Joyner, who has mission work in the vicinity, makes his headquarters at Glen Alpine, and in consideration of the occasional services which he can render, we contribute a small amount toward his salary also. The sum for which we pledge ourselves to Glen Alpine is \$500.

A new pledge was determined upon one year ago to be called the "Sarah L. Leonard Scholarship." It requires the payment of \$100.00 annually and is given for the support and education of a native Alaskan girl in the school at Nenana.

The "Bishop Leondard Fund" is for use among the missions of Ohio, when and where the Bishop thinks it best. We have pledged to him \$550; he will pay \$300 of this amount to the support of the Colored Mission in Cleveland, \$200 to the salary of the Archdeacon, and the rest as need may require.

The "Expense Fund" covers the cost of publishing the annual report, occasional leaflets and notices; the postage of the Secretary, the Treasurer, and Officers of the Junior Department; traveling expenses in starting new Branches, and that of missionaries whom we invite to address us. It is hoped that each society will contribute \$1 at least, during the year, and that the stronger societies will contribute considerably more.

The "Contingent Fund" is available for all sorts of emergencies and is of great service. Most often it has been expended for overcoats needed without delay, or for clerical suits not otherwise obtainable. The Honorary Membership fees are allotted to this fund. Our list of Honorary Members has again been sadly depleted by death. It is much to be desired that other women may take the places of those who, so long as life lasted, took pleasure in aiding this fund.

Varying sums are pledged each year to Bishop Rowe's work in Alaska General Missions, to the Districts of Oklahoma, Nevada, Asheville, the Philippines and others.

The Bishop Bedell Scholarship and the Julia Bedell Scholarship pay for the education of native pupils in St. John's University, Shanghai, China. They require \$70 each per annum. The "Ohio Scholarship" in St. Elizabeth's—one of the Bishop Hare Schools in South Dakota—pays for the education of an Indian pupil; it requires \$60 per year. Several other scholarships are maintained by individual Parishes, and by the Juniors. The "Foreign Insurance Fund" provides insurance upon the lives of foreign missionaries for the benefit of their families. We of the Ohio Branch have for thirty years paid \$50 each year into this fund; we have now increased the amount to \$100. It is a fund which should particularly appeal to us.

Those of our pledges which help the Board of Missions to meet its appropriations (and which therefore count toward the "apportionment" of our Parishes) have been this year as follows: Salary of our missionary in China, General Missions (that is to say, Foreign and Domestic Missions); Missions in the Districts of Alaska, Cuba, W. Nebraska, Oklahoma, Nevada, Lexington, East Oregon, the Philippines and Nevada Juniors' Fund for Day School in China; Japan; School at Cape Palmas, Africa; Julia and Bishop Bedell Scholarships, China; "Sandusky Scholarship," China; "Julia McGrew Scholarship," St. Hilda's, China; and "Ohio Scholarship" in St. Elizabeth's, South Dakota.

Notes

All contributions for the United Offering are to be sent to the Director and Treasurer of that fund, Miss K. L. Mather; other sums are to be sent to the General Treasurer, Mrs. C. S. Bates. All "pledges" are to be paid to Mrs. Bates. If you send money direct to Church Missions House, New York, do not fail to say that it is to be credited to the Woman's Auxiliary, and also state whether it is to be a "special" or may be assigned to the appropriations of the Board.

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PLEASE NOTE that packages sent to Mrs. Savage for distribution in missionary boxes should be addressed, *not* to her residence, but to *St. Paul's Parish House, 4108 Euclid Ave., Cleveland*. It is there that the packing is done. The janitor resides in the house and packages are always cared for. All articles received will be assorted by the Secretary, or the Junior Director, and sent out again according to need and the particular sizes desired. But if you have enough to fill a barrel or over fifty-pound box there is no economy in sending to Mrs. Savage at all; in that case please send direct to the Mission for which it is intended. Before sending a box or barrel be very sure that you have the correct address. Write the name of the State in full. Put your own address, also, on the outside. This is often important for purposes of identification, and it will enable the receiver to acknowledge the gift at once. It is always best, also, to mail the freight receipt to your missionary; he will then be able to secure the box without trouble.

The Convocations

A list is here given of all the Parish and Mission Stations of each Convocation in which we have either Auxiliary or Junior Branches, or both, and also a list of those where we have none. Please study your own Convocation. Note especially the places that are yet to be gained; if you have friends at any of these points, or can in any way aid us, may we not count upon your assistance?

Cleveland Convocation

We have two Branches in Akron, one each in Ashtabula, Boardman, Canton, in 18 Parishes in Cleveland and suburbs, Cuyahoga Falls, Geneva, Hudson, Kent, Massillon, Medina, New Philadelphia, Niles, Painesville, Peninsula, Perry, Ravenna, Salem, two in Steubenville, in Warren, Wellsville, Wooster, two in Youngstown.

We have none in the Parishes of St. Alban's and St. James', Cleveland, and of St. Stephen's, East Liverpool, nor in the Missions of Alliance, Barberton, Berea, Collinwood, Conneaut, Cross Creek, the Atonement in Cleveland, Dennison, E. Plymouth, Harbor, Jefferson, Kinsman, Lisbon, Unionville, Willoughby, Windsor Mills.

Sandusky Convocation

We have branches in Bellevue, Bucyrus, Cardington, Catawba Island, Coshocton, Elyria, Fremont, Galion, two in Gambier, Huron, two in Lorain, Mansfield, Marion, Marysville, Milan, Monroeville, Mt. Vernon, Norwalk, Oberlin, Port Clinton, three in Sandusky, Shelby, Tiffin, Upper Sandusky.

We have none in the Missions of Clyde, Fostoria, Lyme, Mill Creek, Mt. Gilead, Venice.

Toledo Convocation

We have Branches in Bellefontaine, Defiance, Findlay, Kenton, Maumee, and in seven Parishes in Toledo.

We have none in the Missions of Bryan, Hicksville, Lima, Napoleon and Sidney.

Diocesan Constitution

ARTICLE I—Name.

The name of this association shall be The Ohio Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE II—Object.

Its object shall be to work in connection with the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, the field being co-extensive with the Church, diocesan and general. The methods by which the ends of this organization can be promoted are: the raising of money for the support of Missionaries and Teachers, for the education of those who may be preparing for the work, and for other benevolent purposes connected with Missions; the making, collecting and transfer of clothing, and other material aid, and the circulation of papers and leaflets that may serve to stir up a public interest in the Missions of the Church.

ARTICLE III—Membership.

Section 1.—Any Parish Auxiliary (Senior or Junior) may become a member of this association by a written announcement of its organization to the Diocesan Secretary.

Sec. 2.—The officers of Parish branches shall send to the Diocesan Treasurer all pledges and money given for other than local purposes, and shall report to the Diocesan Secretary by May 1st each year all work done, with value of boxes and money given. Each Parish branch shall be entitled to but one vote in the annual Diocesan meetings, but may send any number of delegates, one of whom shall be authorized to cast the vote and assume pledges for specific work undertaken by the Diocesan branch.

ARTICLE IV—Officers.

The officers of this association shall be a President, four Vice-Presidents, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and Directors of Junior Auxiliary and Auxiliary Daughters, of Little Helpers, and of United Offering, an Educational Secretary, and a Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club, to be

appointed by the Bishop from names presented by a committee of five (each Convocation to be represented thereupon) elected annually in convention.

One Vice-President shall be chosen from each of the three Convocations of the Diocese, as follows: First, Cleveland; second, Sandusky; third, Toledo; the fourth shall be a Vice-President at large, and these with the other officers shall constitute a Board of Managers and trustees of the association. But it shall be competent for the same person to hold two or more offices if in the judgment of the Board of Managers the best interests of the work require it.

The Board of Managers shall also have power to divide the work of any department when they deem it expedient, and the proper officers thereto shall be elected as herein-before provided. If desired, an Honorary President may be elected.

ARTICLE V—Duties of Officers.

Section 1.—The President shall preside, and in her absence one of the Vice-Presidents, in Convocation order. She shall call meetings and perform such duties as pertain to her office; and shall make every effort, through the Vice-Presidents and otherwise, to direct the work of the Parish branches in raising money for the support of some one or more of the departments of missionary work, and shall form new Parish auxiliaries wherever practicable.

Sec. 2.—It shall be the duty of the first, second and third Vice-President in addition to the customary assistance to the President, to take general charge of the missionary work in her own Convocation and she may arrange for one meeting of representatives from the Parishes in the Convocation, held annually in the Autumn, and shall in every way strive to arouse and maintain active interest in all departments of the work. The especial duty of the fourth Vice-President shall be to assist the President, and she may also be assigned to duty in any part of the Diocese where such assistance is desired.

Sec. 3.—The Secretary shall correspond with the General Secretary and the missionaries and find out where help

is needed, and of what kind; shall inform the Parish secretaries and arrange about their work, so that a general oversight may be kept by one person. She shall keep a correct list of all Diocesan officers, Parish secretaries and clergymen in the Diocese, with addresses of the same. She shall take the minutes of all meetings and prepare an annual report for circulation in the Diocese. The Treasurer shall receive and forward all money offerings, and shall pay out money only as voted by the Diocesan branch or Board of Managers, except money received for a definite purpose may be paid for that purpose without a formal vote; shall keep an account of all money contributed for missionary and other purposes by the Parish branches, or individuals; and shall, after the accounts and vouchers are audited, embody a full account in the annual report.

Sec. 4.—An Auditing Committee of two persons, to be appointed by the President, shall examine the accounts and vouchers of the Diocesan Treasurer, and report result.

ARTICLE VI—Amendments.

The Constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual meeting of the association; provided, that notice of the proposed change has been given with the call for a meeting.

By-Laws

I.

The Annual Meeting of this Association shall be held on Thursday following the Diocesan Convention; but, for good reason, the Board of Officers may appoint the meeting upon some other date.

The place of meeting may be determined upon by vote at an annual meeting; or, failing this, shall be arranged by the Board of Officers.

II.

In case of vacancy in any office the same may be filled at a stated or called meeting of the Board of Managers, and any one appointed by them shall continue in office until the next annual meeting.

III.

Special meetings may be called by the President at such time and place as she may designate, for the purpose of stimulating interest in the work.

IV.

The stated meetings of the Board of Managers, with the President as Chairman, shall be held in May at any place designated, and at these meetings any number present may constitute a quorum.

V.

It is expected that each parish Branch shall contribute not less than one dollar (\$1.00) to the expense fund.

VI.

These by-laws may be amended at any annual meeting by vote of majority present.

VII.

The order of services and of business at the annual meeting shall be as follows:

Holy Communion.

Bishop's Address.

Roll Call.

Reading of Minutes of Last Meeting.

Reports of Officers and Committees.

Statement of Future Work—Receiving Pledges.

Unfinished Business.

Miscellaneous.

Addresses or Papers.

Adjournment.
