The Annual Meeting at Cleveland May 20th, 1915

In spite of the most dubious weather conditions, ten o'clock on the morning of Thursday, May 20, found in spacious St. Paul's Church, Cleveland, a large and devout congregation of women gathered from all parts of the Diocese for the annual convention of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Ohio. After the short service and a few words of welcome and appreciation from the beloved Bishop of Ohio came the celebration of the Holy Communion. The Celebrant was the Bishop of Ohio, assisted by the Bishop-Coadjutor, Dr. Breed, rector of St. Paul's Church, and the Rev. Joseph Groves, his curate, also the Rev. B. W. Paxton, of St. Andrews' Church, was in the Chancel. Over five hundred women communicated. Four hundred and fifty-nine responded to the roll call from forty-seven parishes.

Difference in time, owing to Cleveland's adoption of Eastern time, made it quite impossible for the representatives of a number of the branches to reach Cleveland in time for the opening service, but before the roll call was completed, over six hundred were present. At twelve o'clock business was suspended for a short time for noon-day prayers. The Bishop-Coadjutor of Ohio, the Rt. Rev. Frank DuMoulin, made his first address to the Woman's Auxiliary of Ohio at their annual convention, having been prevented by illness from being present last year. Bishop DuMoulin spoke in gratitude and thankfulness of the splendid help rendered by the Auxiliary in Ohio and of its strength and efficiency. He explained briefly the new regional groupings in the Diocese which have superceded the old convocations, and closed his address with a glowing appreciation of Mrs. Knapp, the President of the Auxiliary.

Mrs. Knapp spoke of the thankfulness with which the past year's work should be viewed and said that while the reports would show encouraging gains in almost every direction, much of the good accomplished would show in no earthly record.

Mrs. Knapp called attention to the amount of the United Offering, presented by the women of Ohio at the last triennial, and said that while the gift exceeded even the sum hoped for and was justly a cause for great thankfulness, it was in reality pitifully small, as it represented only 68 cents for each member of the Auxiliary, or 23 cents per year. Parish officers were urged to greater efforts, in this last year, before the next triennial.

Reports covering the work of the year were made as follows: Mrs. Sayage gave her report as Secretary, and also read the report of the Treasurer, Mrs. Bates, whose absence we again note. Reports followed from the four Vice-Presidents, who told of the work, in the part of the Diocese over which they have especial supervision.

Miss Mather, Treasurer of the United Offering, reported most encouraging progress, and Mrs. Hart, Director of the Ohio Branch of the Church Periodical Club, spoke of the growing interest in that branch of the Auxiliary work, owing to the better understanding of the character and the aims of the Club.

Because of ill health, Miss Truesdale, Director of the Auxiliary Daughters, was forced to resign her position, and her work was taken over by Miss Atwood, Director of the Juniors. Miss Atwood reported interesting and varied accomplishments by both of these Societies, including boxes for Domestic Missions, contributions to Foreign Missions, a Christmas box for the child victims of the war in Europe, help for the City Missionary and much conscientious study of Missions.

Owing to illness, Mrs. White, Director of the Little Helpers Branch, was unable to be present, but her report was read by Mrs. Norton.

Miss Martha Kimball, the Educational Secretary, reported most encouraging gains, especially as regards Foreign Missions.

At the appointed hour, the Auxiliary adjourned to the Parish House for an hour's intermission for luncheon, here a delicious repast was served by the ladies of the Church. At the close of the meeting a rising vote of thanks was

extended to the women of St. Paul's, in appreciation of their hospitality.

It had been decided to establish a new fund to be known as the "Bishop DuMoulin Fund," its object, to aid the Bishop Coadjutor, in the weaker Parishes under his care.

This, together with the pledge made for the speaker of the day, constitute the new pledges for the coming year.

A motion was made and carried that the Constitution be so amended as to give to the Bishop of Ohio the power to appoint the various officers of the Auxiliary. This was acceded to without a dissenting voice. Heretofore the Bishop has appointed the persons whose names were presented to him by a nominating committee. The change from Convocations to Regional Districts will make some other changes in the Constitution necessary.

The questions of holding the Annual Convention for two days instead of one, as the sessions are becoming so crowded with business that the inspiration of such a gathering is being impaired because of the necessity for hurrying in order to get through within the specified time, and of making the small charge of twenty-five cents for luncheon, as the numbers are becoming so great that few of the Parishes are able to meet the necessary expenses, were at first voted upon and carried. Later it was realized that both questions were of such grave importance that every one should have a part in deciding them, and it was decided to reopen the questions and have them voted upon in each Parish Branch, the decisions in each case to be reported to the Secretary of the Auxiliary not later than January 1, 1916.

The speaker for the afternoon was Mrs. Charles R. Pancoast, of Philadelphia. She made an impression upon her hearers which will never be forgotten. The subject of the address was "St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo."

Pledges were received from a number of branches for this wonderful work, and it was decided to appoint a committee to be named later to take charge of raising as large an amount as possible in the Diocese of Ohio.

A cause for deep thankfulness on the part of the members of the Auxiliary this year was the presence among them of their beloved Honorary President, Mrs. Leonard. After several years of illness, Mrs. Leonard was not only able to be present, but to speak a few words of loving greeting to the body of women who had always been so thoroughly in accord and sympathy with her. In touching words of appreciation she thanked them for the love which had prompted them to make her their first Honorary President, and which had gone farther and had established in her name a scholarship in Alaska, to be known as Sarah L. Leonard Scholarship. Mrs. Leonard spoke strongly and inspiringly of the Influence of Personal Contact and of the far-reaching and inestimable Personal Influence of each woman.

St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo

Mr. and Mrs. Pancoast went on a travel trip to the Orient. What they saw there, the wonderful opportunity and the pitifully poor equipment and small number of workers to meet the opportunity, so impressed them that they remained for a year, entering heart and soul into the work, and then came home to prepare themselves for more efficient work and to try to impress upon the Church people of this country, the tremendousness of the opportunity and the necessity for seizing it now. Mrs. Pancoast said that she went to the far East believing that Missions were a duty and a responsibility. She came home believing that they were the Only Hope. Three words she gave as preliminaries to any great accomplishment—Vision, Appeal, Response. "Where no vision is, there my people perish." Only seeing eyes can behold the vision, only open hearts can feel the appeal; and after vision and appeal must come response, or all is vain.

It has been said that the far East is both our opportunity and our risk. Our great opportunity, if we seize it and use it aright; our great and terrible risk, if we refuse to accept not only our opportunity but our responsibility. If we lose our opportunity the fault is our own.

Twenty years ago came our opportunity with regard to Japan, but we failed to catch the vision and threw away our opportunity. It is said that opportunity never comes the second time. But with Japan that has proved untrue, for again the door has opened and again the vision shines forth. For years Dr. Teusler, the physician in charge of St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo, had been struggling and working amidst most adverse conditions to establish St. Luke's Hospital as a Christian center of usefulness in Tokyo. He had seen it grow from a small dispensary to a well established hospital, efficient as far as it went, but entirely inadequate to meet the appalling needs around it. To Dr. Teusler

came one day Baron Okuma, Premier of Japan, saying that he had for a long time watched the work of the hospital, and he had concluded that he would like to have a share in its success. He would therefore give to Dr. Teusler the sum of \$25,000 for the enlargement of his work on one condition, which was, that the hospital should sever its connection with the Church and become non-Christian. Quietly but firmly Dr. Teusler put away the temptation and went on with his work. After allowing six months of work amidst discouraging conditions, with flitting dreams of what twenty-five thousand dollars would have done to make their impression, again came Baron Okuma with a repetition of his offer. Again it was refused. After an interval came the most surprising result imaginable. Again it was Baron Okuma, this time to repeat his offer unconditionally. He said that he had come to realize that the strength of character necessary to enable a man to refuse material gain for the sake of principle was what Japan needed, and if Christianity gave that, then let the hospital be Christian. Also, he reported, the Emperor had given the project to make St. Luke's Hospital an international hospital under the Protestant Episcopal Church, his unqualified approval and had personally contributed \$25,000. At a meeting held by a number of the most influential men in Japan, enough had been pledged to make the whole Japanese pledge \$75,000, to be paid as soon as the remaining \$250,000 can be raised in America.

Address of the President

There is but one word with which to begin today and that is thankfulness. With so much that is hard all around us, our work has gone steadily on. Not one expression of a desire to curtail our work or gifts has come to our ears; rather have our members seemed to be of this one mind, that in Christ alone is the healing of the nations.

The reports to be read will show, as figures can, the share we have had in the extension of His kingdom, but beyond the figures, we trust that through prayer and a deepened spiritual life, much has been done of which no earthly record will ever be made.

We all feel, I am sure, that our Day of Intercession, which we observed for the first time on the Feast of St. Michael and All Angels, was of great value. That and the Quiet Morning, conducted by our own Bishop, have deepened our spiritual lives and only through greater devotion to our Lord and Master can we look for greater activities and gifts.

You have all heard of the Regional Plan which Bishop DuMoulin has initiated, the division of the diocese, for efficiency's sake, into smaller sections than the old convocations. Recognizing the Woman's Auxiliary as the official organization of women in the Church, he asked the diocesan officers to co-operate in his plan for these Regions. Toledo was already well systematized, but it has been my privilege to attend the first meeting for organization in four of the Regions. We recognize the great possibilities, in the Regional Plan. A contemporary writer speaks of the value of "getting togetheredness," and when we women get together, here in these annual meetings, or in smaller sectional groups, an impetus is bound to be given to the whole work of the Church.

To solidify these groups, and to be of practical service to their officers, we have asked our Vice-Presidents to assume direction of them in this way: The First Vice-President will be the consulting officer for the territory under Bishop Leonard's care. The Second will look after

the Sandusky and Mansfield Regions, the Third, Toledo and Lima, and the Fourth, Youngstown, Akron and the Ohio River. They are ready to assist in any way.

A recent letter from Miss Emery has furnished the suggestion for a definite program of work for our Regional Chairmen. It has been outlined to them, and now is offered to each woman here for serious consideration. Sometimes when we are tempted to be a wee bit vain-glorious about our Ohio Branch and to feel we have "really done very well," it is salutary to hear statistics. This letter from Miss Emery reminds us that of our communicants probably half are women and girls, and that on that basis, our money gifts last year, which were made through this official missionary channel, averaged only twenty-seven cents, and that our United Offering of 1913 (of which we were so proud) meant an average of sixty-eight cents per communicant, or twenty-three cents a year!

Of course we know that by far the larger number of women communicants were not included in these gifts, but does that fact not point our path for the future? Must not our strongest efforts be put forth to interest the women who are not now interested?

We ask the parochial officers to make today some definite plan for increasing the membership in their own Branches. We ask those of you who have friends in parishes where there is now no Auxiliary Branch, to give us their names, that we may make them a "point of contact" in those Parishes. We ask your help and your prayers in an effort to reach every Church-woman in the Diocese of Ohio, and to give her the privilege of sharing in our joy. Some of us have heard a quotation Mrs. Cooke has used: "To know is to glow." It is not right that all our women do not know their privilege as well as their responsibility, for by not knowing they lose the glowing, the warmth of love and fellowship with God and with each other that fills the heart of a true Auxiliary woman.

While we are listening to the reports of work accomplished in the year just closed, let us each compare the amount of time and money we have given to missions with that we have spent on our own pleasures, and then with humility of heart and earnestness of purpose, dedicate ourselves to greater effort in this year of 1915 and 1916.

Annual Report of the Secretary

(Annual Meeting, St. Paul's Church, Cleveland,
May 20th, 1915)

Four years have slipped by very quickly, and we again find ourselves the guests of St. Paul's Parish. I bid you welcome in their behalf! If those of us who have attended annual meetings since that time, will take a backward glance over these four years, we shall be better able to judge of the progress that has been made.

This has certainly been a year of increased activity for the Woman's Auxiliary. The efficiency shown by the women of the Church Missions' House has had an influence which has been strongly felt. They have, by serious and frequent messages, urged us to see our duty and to do our full share, in all ways, for the future progress and welfare of the Church. The Church is needing, more and more, our support and co-operation. Plans for pushing forward the work are constantly increasing. Now, at this crisis in her finances, the women are asked to do their part (fifty thousand dollars) towards an "Emergency Fund."

There are some that are always found ready to give support to any plans for the best interests of the Church. I feel sure Ohio will do her full share. It should not mean large sums given by the few, but small amounts, as well, in which every woman shall participate. We have not forgotten to help the sick, the sorrowing and destitute in the war stricken countries, let us not look less lightly upon this appeal that comes from our own Church.

Our urgent need is a clear understanding of what the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions stands for. We cannot have an interest in the affairs of the Church, and know of her pressing needs or the great effort she is making to bring about successful results, unless we inform ourselves. Why should we not, as Church women, be as desirous of keeping in touch with the progress of the Church, as we are of being informed on the current events

of the day? Let us bear in mind that each year, as it passes, leaves us with one less opportunity of doing our part, along any line of duty. Our Diocesan leaders have set the pace for us. The result has been an awakening of interest that has been encouraging. Some of the larger and most interested societies have held all day meetings once a month, beginning with the service of Holy Communion. This was followed by sewing, with an hour's intermission for luncheon, after which one of our visiting speakers has read a paper regarding some particular problem of interest in our work.

It is in our smaller parishes that the Woman's Auxiliary needs most to be pushed. The problem of self-support in a weak church is a perplexing one, difficult, for many reasons, to overcome. Removed as they often are from the larger centers, where plans are constantly unfolded and developed, it is harder to grasp the spirit and importance of the work.

Could they catch a glimpse of what lies outside themselves, what activity might follow! It is gratifying that through the efforts of our President and Vice-Presidents, several new branches have been organized, and others revived. This gives courage to those who have worked so earnestly in the interests of the diocese. Another year, we shall look for such results as can be accomplished by small groups of faithful women.

At meetings in several Parishes, speakers from abroad have been heard, who have told of their special fields. One was Miss Grider, who told in an interesting manner about Tortella-Hall in which we are particularly interested, owing to our "Sarah L. Leonard Scholarship." A goodly number of packages will be sent her for use among the pupils as soon as the weather will permit. Mr. Betticher, also from Alaska, visited several places in the diocese, speaking and exhibiting pictures taken in the Tanana Valley district. These were both entertaining and instructive. Some of us were fortunate in hearing about St. Andrew's School, Sewanee, Tenn., where the Rev. McVeigh Harrison is working. To see this tall delicate looking man, and listen to his

earnest words, one cannot but feel that he is indeed giving his life to uplift and educate these benighted people, who live in the heart of our great country, and whose ignorance and superstition are almost beyond belief.

We have recently had a flying visit from Miss Adeline Ross, who, after spending the winter in Vermont, was returning to her work under Bishop Thomas in Wyoming. She made brief stops in Cleveland, Sandusky and Toledo, telling particularly of her work among the Arapahoe and Shoshone Indians. To these, the Ohio Branch, for years, has sent a number of barrels of useful and pleasing gifts at the Christmas season, to gladden the hearts of the Indian men, women and children.

We have recently undertaken a scholarship, for a girl, at St. Paul's Mission, Glen Alpine, little Annie May. Winter before last she walked to and from school, nine miles a day, but it proved too much for her strength; so this past winter, she has been staying at the mission. Being an interesting and promising child, Mrs. Joyner felt this effort in her behalf quite worth while. We have also sent extra sheets and pillow cases, as special gifts, to Mrs. Joyner's Auxiliary women.

I regret to record the death of the Rev. James Joyner, which occurred about two months ago. Aside from being a personal affliction to Mrs. Joyner, it means a serious loss to the mission. To Mrs. Joyner, I feel sure, we extend our heartfelt sympathy. Let us bear her in mind as she struggles on to carry the burden of work alone, which for more than five years Mr. Joyner had shared with her.

We have sent assistance to a larger number of domestic missionaries than in any previous year. The orders for these are sent to us from the Church Missions House, the object being to help out the stipend of the missionary. The personal touch which comes to a branch, through direct communication with the missionary and his field, often proves a means of securing consideration from our women. As the whole, or a part of each box, is sent before the holidays, it brings not only comfort but Christmas cheer. A

suit of clothes or an overcoat is required with each box, or sometimes a cassock or a surplice instead. When a branch is not able to provide one of these, the "Contingent Fund" must make up the deficiency. It supplies also bolts of material for societies unable to purchase their own, and thus answers the two-fold purpose of giving sewing to those who wish to help, as well as furnishing the made up garments for distribution. For these reasons, I beg that this fund shall not be overlooked in your pledges.

We have again raised six hundred dollars for Bishop Leonard's Fund, one hundred over our usual five hundred dollar pledge. He has turned this extra amount over to Bishop DuMoulin for use in his part of the Diocese. We have also raised one hundred dollars for Bishop Thomas, over and above the five hundred promised him, for all of which he sent a most grateful and appreciative letter.

Although almost all of our Auxiliary Societies have worked for the relief of the Belgians, and for the unemployed, this past winter, Mrs. Bates is proud to say, that not one of them has given this as a reason for failing to pay its pledges. As usual, a goodly amount has been given for General Missions; this, as you know, has helped towards the apportionment in each parish. The extra effort on the part of our women, towards the Emergency Fund, is a source of satisfaction to all who have the interests of our beloved Church, so close at hand. This report covers but a small part of the work that has been undertaken by our Auxiliary leaders, this past year. While there is still room for increased interest, we have reason to feel that, as a whole, the results of the work have been good. Progress is slow, but perhaps for that reason the more lasting.

God speed the day when every woman in the Church shall feel it her duty and privilege to do her part for the education and betterment of all peoples, and so to hasten the time when the knowledge of Christ and of his His Kingdom shall be spread throughout the whole world.

The Auxiliary Daughters and The Junior Auxiliary

Again it is our privilege to meet together and learn what we have accomplished during the past year for Christ and His Kingdom.

The progress in the Junior Department is necessarily slow, but each year shows added strength.

Last year at the Annual Meeting the Educational Secretary urged us to attend the Summer Conferences. Miss Kimball and I had the privilege of spending ten happy days at Lake Geneva, Wis. It was very interesting and instructive, and the whole atmosphere was delightful. If only more of the Junior leaders and young people could attend one, we would have a far greater interest and enthusiasm for our work.

We are very glad to welcome one new Branch of the "Auxiliary Daughters" and eight new Junior Branches. We lost one Branch this year; the Mission being closed.

I am deeply thankful for the splendid help and co-operation of the Junior leaders, the past year.

In September, the Junior Directors, in Cleveland, held a meeting at which plans were discussed.

In December, we had a general meeting for Juniors at the Church of the Ascension, Lakewood. We had the pleasure and privilege of hearing Miss Grider tell of her work at Nenana, Alaska. Much interest was aroused and the Juniors decided to send a United Barrel to Nenana in June. We will have an all-day meeting, we hope, on the grounds of the Church of the Ascension. In the afternoon a picnic will be held. I wish this idea could be used by more of our Junior Branches. This meeting was arranged by Miss Mickey, who has been very helpful the past year.

In February the Juniors held a general meeting at St. Paul's Church, and had the pleasure of hearing Rev. Mr. Betticher give an illustrated talk on his work in Alaska.

The Juniors in and near Sandusky sent a United Barrel to the Mountain Whites and one to the colored children of the South. As usual the Juniors provided candy and gifts for our own Diocesan Mission Sunday Schools for the two hundred children at Glen Alpine, N. C., and for two hundred Arapahoe Indian children. Fifty gifts were supplied for St. Mary's on the Mountain, Sewanee, Tenn. Besides these, numerous boxes and packages were sent during the year to needy mission stations. We have had a share in the United Offering and hope to give much more next year. In Epiphany the Juniors were asked to give something toward St. Mary's Hall, Shanghai, China, as a thank offering for the twenty-fifth Anniversary.

The Auxiliary Daughters and the Juniors report \$511.12 in money gifts, and \$1,024.79 in box values. We regret our money value is less this year, due, I think, to the financial conditions the past winter in our larger cities. Many of our Juniors, also, are actively engaged during Advent and Lent in earning money toward the Sunday School Missionary Offering. The Branches in Cleveland and Toledo also aided the work of the City Missionaries in their respective cities. Some also helped in making Christmas happier for the children in Europe.

After all, it is not the number of bills which the Junior money helps to liquidate, but it is the training that counts.

The Junior Auxiliary has, as you know, three objects, Prayer, Study and Gifts for Missions. We have tried to emphasize all three. First, Prayer. Every Junior was asked to say the noonday Prayer for Missions and to say the Junior Collect, daily. We must train our young people to pray. When the Church sets itself to pray with the same seriousness and strength of purpose that it has devoted to other forms of Christian effort, it will see the Kingdom of God come with power. We wish the Juniors to learn that the King wants His children to pray about their work, their Branch, and to know what is being done in the Establishment of His Kingdom. There is no limit as to what God might accomplish through His children, for the exten-

sion of His Kingdom on Earth. Second, Study. The Juniors were asked to study the Junior Book, "Building the City"; and "How the Cross goes around the World." The Church and its children need the vision of the Christ; the motive, the enthusiasm which shall make it equal in power to the world situation. Third, Gifts include money and work which were reported. But we must not forget the Gift of Life. We must realize that our future missionaries are in our Sunday Schools and Junior Branches today. We must teach our young people to consider thoroughly and conscientiously the call to Missionary Service; so that some of them may say, "Take myself and I will be ever only all for Thee."

May the loving labor of Thy children bring those who know Thee not to the knowledge and love of Thee!

The Mission Study Classes

This year, for the first time, the various Missionary Educational Boards united and all denominations have been studying the Social Force of Missions. The "Social Aspects of Foreign Missions" was a particularly interesting text book and lent itself well to all forms of Mission Study.

It is with a feeling of great joy and thanksgiving that we are able to report three times as many Study Classes this year as were held last year—thirty-nine in all. Much of the new interest has been shown by the "Auxiliary Daughters" and the Juniors; also we are realizing in a small way our aim to carry the Mission Study into the Sunday School, the Brotherhood and other organizations of the Church.

Fifteen of the Parishes held weekly or monthly Program Meetings and many of the others had Reading Circles, Missionary Addresses or Papers. Our visiting speakers this year were Mrs. L. W. Shey, Mrs. Henry E. Cooke, Mrs. L. E. Lyman, Mrs. G. L. Dake, who read Mrs. Bates' paper, and Mrs. W. H. Cowell. We wish to thank each one for the help and inspiration received from her splendid paper.

These papers, with others of last year, will be kept on file and loaned to any Parish wishing to take advantage of this opportunity. Mystery Plays have been given in nine Parishes and proved a source of arousing much interest. The Spirit of Missions has been placed in fifteen public institutions and thirty-eight new subscribers have been reported.

The three days Institute which was held in Trinity Cathedral in January, and at which Miss Tillotson and Miss Lindley, of the Church Missions House, held study classes, was most interesting and instructive, and all who attended went back to their Parishes filled with new inspiration and zeal. Early in the Fall we shall have ready for use a

Diocesan Lending Library of books of educational value on missionary subjects. These books may be had from the Educational Secretary, and it is hoped that all Parishes will make good use of them.

Last August Ohio sent two delegates to the Summer Conference at Lake Geneva. Too much cannot be said of the great value of these Conferences, where opportunity is given for training under experienced leaders in practically every department of the Church's work. There is no more effective method of recruiting trained workers for various departments of the Church's work than by bringing them under the influence of these gatherings and we urge that all Parishes than can do so send delegates to these Conferenices.

The year has passed quietly and uneventfully with the “Little Helpers.” Two pleasant afternoons were spent by me with the members of the Auxiliary of St. James Church, Painesville, and of St. Andrews’, Cleveland, telling them about this youngest, and, as we think, most precious part of their work.

We always rejoice when we have new branches to report. This year one has been formed at Wellsville, and after a lapse of several years we are particularly glad that those in the Cathedral and in St. John’s have been restarted under new and efficient directors.

It is rather discouraging to write continually to a director, eliciting finally a response that she moved away from that town two years ago and knows nothing about the work. Would it not be a simple matter to notify the Diocesan Officer, and thus save her Parish the embarrassment of a failure to report? However, there are only two directors this year from whom I have had no reply whatever; a vast improvement, but I wonder, now, what has happened to them.

There are several churches where the “Babies’ Branch,” as it was then called, was established some years ago, but through lack of directors or pressure of other work, or other causes, it has been discontinued. I should like especially to appeal to the ladies who are here from the Church of Our Saviour, Akron, from St. Paul’s, in Medina, and in Norwalk, from the Ascension, Lakewood, and from the Incarnation, St. Luke’s, and Emmanuel of this city, to help me in reorganizing the Department of Little Helpers in their midst.

If there are other places where it can be started, so much the better, I shall be only too glad to furnish the necessary information.

A penny a Sunday dropped in a little red mite-box by baby hands, with "God bless all the missionaries all over the world, and all the Little Helpers, for Jesus' sake," uttered by baby lips, these are the requirements of the Little Helpers. And would you like to know what is accomplished? Much help is contributed to General Missions. A cot is maintained for a little sick colored child in the South, the Indian boys and girls receive help, a kindergarten is supported in far-away Japan, and a day-school in China, and always a font is placed in some mission station signifying their own recent admission into Christ's Church by baptism. To these great works go the pennies collected in our Diocese, which this year amounted to \$115.54.

As our little ones grow in mind and body, may they grow equally in the ways of the spirit, becoming more and more truly Helpers in bringing His Kingdom upon Earth.

Report of the First Vice-President

The Monthly Conferences held during the past year, have proved to be a very helpful adjunct to our Auxiliary work. Although they were not quite so well attended as last year, at least towards the last, yet the interest manifested was very deep and real. The value of these Conferences has, as we believe, consisted in the driving of missionary truths home to our hearts, with all the inspiration which an earnest devotional service can arouse.

We held six Conferences from October to April inclusive. The first one at St. Luke's Church, where the subject was "How the Missionary Work is divided, Educational, Medical and Evangelistic."

In November we met at St. Paul's Church, East Cleveland, where those of us who went to Detroit gave a Review of the Fifth Provincial Synod. Mrs. Knapp at this time called our attention to the fact, that on account of this terrible European war, some of the English Missions in China would have had to be closed, had not our own Missionaries there voluntarily given up ten and fifteen per cent of their stipends, in order that this work might go on—and asked if we could not find it in our hearts to give something to show our appreciation of this sacrifice. In a short time over \$48.00 was given, which we all felt it would be a great privilege to send for that purpose.

In December, at St. Mark's Church, we were fortunate in having Miss Grider with us, who interested us deeply, with the account of her work at Tortella Hall, Nenana, Alaska. As an Auxiliary Institute was held at the Cathedral House in January, we deemed it wise to omit the Conference that month.

February we met at the Church of the Good Shepherd, and had as our subject "What shall we say to the man or woman, who says he does not believe in Missions?" In March we were made welcome at the Church of the Ascen-

sion, Lakewood, where we had an excellent paper on "The Children's Challenge to the Church."

Our last Conference was at All Saints' Church, where our President took us on a visit to the Church Missions House in New York, giving many a better idea than they had ever had before of our headquarters.

We trust that the influence of these Conferences will long be felt, by those who attended them, in renewed zeal for the work of that Master, whom we all love and serve.

Report of the Second Vice-President

Delegates from seventeen parishes were represented. Addresses were made by Bishop DuMoulin, Mrs. Stephens, of Detroit, and Miss Marietta Atwood.

The second meeting was held at Calvary Church, Sandusky, Wednesday, February 24th. A very interesting program was planned for the afternoon and evening. After

the opening service Father Jenkins gave an address. Bishop DuMoulin, in an interesting hour's talk, discussed the necessity of a world vision in the work, and what he thought the new organization could accomplish.

Mrs. Knapp appointed a nominating committee for electing Regional Officers. Mrs. John Mack, of Sandusky, was made Chairman; Mrs. Thomas, of Fremont, Vice-Chairman, and Mrs. Williams, of Norwalk, Corresponding Secretary. Mrs. S. Lyman, of Cleveland, read a paper, "Little Journeys to our United Offering Workers." This closed the afternoon program. Supper was served at Calvary Parish House. In the evening a splendid inspiring address was given by Mrs. Knapp, followed by a paper, "The Auxiliary and the Gift of Life," by Mrs. H. E. Cooke, of Cleveland. The Conference and question box closed the evening's program. Delegates from sixteen churches were represented.

This meeting the first of the Auxiliary, under the new system, worked out by the church authorities, was very successful. And I hope that from these meetings, which are to be held quarterly, may come to each one of us, an enlarged vision of the resources of the church and increased responsibility and faith, that God will use them in turning resources into channels which will most speedily accomplish His will, for the spread of His gospel and the extension of His Kingdom.

Report of the Third Vice-President

The February meeting was held in Trinity Church at which time it was our privilege to have Bishop DuMoulin tell us of his "regional plan." We believe that this will greatly increase the number of workers in Auxiliary work. At this meeting it was proposed to start a fund for Bishop DuMoulin to be used at his discretion. It met with enthusiastic response, and a goodly sum was pledged.

The April session was held in Grace Church, when Miss Adeline Ross told us of her work among the Indians in Wyoming.

The offerings at these meetings amounted to \$73.92. Six very informal monthly meetings have also been held with the officers of the different branches. We have discussed the same topics as used in the Cleveland Conferences and I believe interest has been stimulated. These conferences will be continued next year.

I was also able to attend the regional meeting at Lima, at which time an organization was effected, with Mrs. Frank Zimmerman, Defiance, Chairman; Mrs. J. C. Kerr, Findlay, Vice-Chairman; Mrs. Norton, Kenton, Correspondent.

Our hope and watchword has been "increase" and with that ever before us we go forward with renewed energy, to the work that lies before us.

Report of the Fourth Vice-President

At the annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Ohio, held in May, 1914, I was elected Fourth Vice-President, with the care of the following places: Alliance, Canton, Massillon, Salem, New Philadelphia, Wooster and Kent. All of these points I have visited during the past year with the exception of Wooster, where I was unable to obtain an appointment from the Rector.

On September the fifteenth, 1914, I visited the Church of Our Saviour, Salem, and organized a branch of fourteen members, and on the seventeenth of the same month had the pleasure of attending a meeting of the already organized branch at Kent. On September the twenty-ninth, I spent a day at New Philadelphia, but no branch was started at that time. On October the thirteenth, I held a missionary meeting in St. Paul's Church, Canton, with a view to arousing interest in the Woman's Auxiliary, with the result that I was able, at a second visit on October the twenty-eighth, to start a branch with eighteen members. This point was visited again in February and in April.

On November the fourth, the mission at Alliance was visited, and a branch organized with eight members. At the request of the Rector, and with the permission of the Diocesan President of the Auxiliary, I added Dennison to the list of places under my care, and started a branch of eighteen members there, on January the twenty-seventh, 1915. New Philadelphia was also visited for the second time on that date, but it seemed inexpedient to undertake the work at that point, until some future time.

On February the ninth, we had the inspiration of a visit and address from Mrs. Knapp, at St. Timothy's Church, Massillon. Sixty-five women met together on that occasion, including visitors from Canton, Alliance, Dennison and New Philadelphia. In Massillon—my home parish—nine new names have been added to the already large existing branch.

The United Offering

It was with great reluctance that at the Annual Meeting last year, I consented to take the office so ably filled for so many years, by Mrs. Hatch, as Director of the United Offering. Her family's decision to make California their future home, caused much regret in the Diocese of Ohio, where she so faithfully worked in Parochial and Diocesan offices.

In her last report Mrs. Hatch said that at the Triennial of 1913, in New York, she proudly and reverently laid upon the Altar, a check for \$9,207.00, as the gift of the loyal women and girls of Ohio, and that she had gathered during the six months, as a begining for the 1916 United Offering, \$882.13.

During the year since I have had charge, I have received \$1,941.80, which, with the interest of \$32.15, and the amount left by Mrs. Hatch, makes a sum total of \$2,856.08.

There are one hundred and twenty organized parishes and mission stations in the Diocese of Ohio, from fifty-four of which only have I heard.

It is known, of course, that this United Offering is not a pledge, to be made by Auxiliary Branches, but a gift, over and above all other gifts from the individual women and girls of the church, to be presented at the Triennial meetings, when representatives from every Diocese should be present; and at the impressive Holy Communion Service to be placed upon the Alms basin, the loving thank offerings from all the baptized women of their Dioceses, thus making it truly what its name implies, a *United* Offering. And as it is used by the Board of Missions to send women workers to the missionary fields, it surely should be the wish of every member to have a share in this glorious offering. It is the small sums from the many that is wanted, and for that purpose the little Blue Box is urged to be used.

Half of the three years is over, and what a wonderful result would be had, if, during the remaining year and a half, every woman and girl calling herself a member of our church, felt the need of sharing in this offering, to show her thankfulness, then indeed would the ideal be realized, a *United Thank Offering from women for women.*

The Church Periodical Club

The Church Periodical Club has had a slowly encouraging growth this year; but shall not have achieved an ideal until every parish takes an active part in the work, however small.

In the fall letters were written to the Rectors or Librarians, asking the privilege of sending, or reading myself, when possible, a little paper prepared for the Cleveland Conference after the Triennial Convention of 1913, containing the main facts and some points of interest of the C. P. C.; for we believe that a larger knowledge of a subject must be an inspiration. The "Chapin Memorial Melting Pot," the money from which forms an endowment for the work, bespeaks your attention; for one box of old gold and silver articles collected from three churches in the city, and sent to New York, added \$78.35 to that fund.

May the inspiration of these words from Bishop Lloyd, President of the Board of Missions, goad us to greater activity in this branch of the Auxiliary Work the coming year. He says, "We must try to keep our work Christian rather than religious. Christianity is the lifting up of the world unto God, and every little package of printed matter we send is really a message from the Father, though he uses human beings to send it. So we must not feel that all our packages must contain something pious. Even a copy of "Vogue" might be a blessing from God, and I know men who have been started on the right path (again), through reading "Life" or "Puck," just because it makes them remember that human life is the same everywhere, and that touch of kinship with other lives gives them fresh courage to try again.

"When I think of the men in Alaska and other lonely places and then see my Sunday papers going to waste, I feel that it is a witness against me. If we can make any addition to the serious reading of the Missionaries we are really adding to the strength of the nations. The Missionaries have done, and are doing tremendous things for civili-

zation. So if we do our work in the right spirit it is lifted up almost to the level of a sacrament, the visible sign, the printed page, and the spiritual grace, the longing to send our thought out to our brothers, a longing that shows that we are driven by the Holy Spirit of God."

The Annual Pledges

The largest one of our pledges is made to the Board of Missions for the annual salary of a lady missionary in China. The amount is \$750. Miss Elwin, who is thus "our own missionary," is in charge of St. Mary's Orphanage, Shanghai, a post of much responsibility and importance.

Since the founding of St. Paul's Mission at Glen Alpine in the Blue Ridge Mountains, we have had the honor of paying the salary of our very successful missionary there, Mrs. James Joyner. The work has grown so much that we have now provided Mrs. Joyner with an assistant. The sum for which we pledge ourselves to Glen Alpine is \$550.

The "Bishop Leonard Fund" is for use among the missions of Ohio, when and where the Bishop thinks it best. We have pledged to him \$500; he has been accustomed to pay \$300 of this amount to the support of the Colored Mission in Cleveland, and \$200 to the salary of the Archdeacon.

The "Bishop DuMoulin Fund," newly undertaken, will place in the hands of the co-adjutor a sum for use at his discretion among missions in the Diocese. The amount thus far subscribed is \$215.

The "Expense Fund" covers the cost of publishing the annual report, occasional circulars or leaflets and notices, postage in several departments, traveling expenses in starting new Branches, and that of missionaries whom we invite to address us. It is hoped that each society will contribute \$1 at least, during the year, and that the stronger societies will contribute considerably more.

The "Contingent Fund" is available for all sorts of emergencies and is of great service. Most often it has been expended for overcoats needed without delay, or for clerical suits not otherwise obtainable. The Honorary Membership fees are allotted to this fund. Our list of Honorary Members should be largely increased.

Varying sums are pledged each year to Bishop Rowe's work in Alaska, General Missions, to the Districts of Oklahoma, Nevada, Asheville, the Philippines, and others.

The Bishop Bedell Scholarship and the Julia Bedell Scholarship pay for the education of native pupils in St. John's University, Shanghai, China. They require \$70 each per annum. The "Ohio Scholarship" in St. Elizabeth's—one of the Bishop Hare Schools in South Dakota—pays for the education of an Indian pupil; it requires \$60 per year. Several other scholarships are maintained by individual Parishes, and by the Juniors. The "Foreign Insurance Fund" provides insurance upon the lives of foreign missionaries for the benefit of their families. We of the Ohio Branch have for thirty years paid \$50 each year into this fund; we have now increased the amount to \$100. It is a fund which should particularly appeal to us.

Those of our pledges which help the Board of Missions to meet its appropriations (and which therefore count toward the "apportionment" of our Parishes) have been this year as follows: Salary of our missionary in China, General Missions (that is to say, Foreign and Domestic Missions); Missions in the Districts of Alaska, W. Nebraska, Oklahoma, East Oklahoma, East Oregon, the Philippines and Nevada, Juniors' Fund for Day School in China; Japan; School at Cape Palmas, Africa; Julia and Bishop Bedell Scholarships, China; "Sandusky Scholarship," China; "Julia McGrew Scholarship," St. Hilda's, China; and "Ohio Scholarship" in St. Elizabeth's, South Dakota. Also this year an Emergency Fund for General Missions.

Notes

All contributions for the United Offering are to be sent to the Director and Treasurer of that fund, Miss K. L. Mather; other sums are to be sent to the General Treasurer, Mrs. C. S. Bates. All "pledges" are to be paid to Mrs. Bates. If you send money direct to Church Missions House, New York, do not fail to say that it is to be credited to the Woman's Auxiliary, and also state whether it is to be a "special" or may be assigned to the appropriations of the Board.

PLEASE NOTE that packages sent to Mrs. Savage for distribution in missionary boxes should be addressed, *not* to her residence, but to *St. Paul's Parish House, 4108 Euclid Ave., Cleveland*. It is there that the packing is done. The janitor resides in the house and packages are always cared for. All articles received will be assorted by the Secretary, or the Junior Director, and sent out again according to need and the particular sizes desired. But if you have enough to fill a barrel or over fifty-pound box there is no economy in sending to Mrs. Savage at all; in that case please send direct to the Mission for which it is intended. Before sending a box or barrel be very sure that you have the correct address. Write the name of the State in full. Put your own address, also, on the outside. This is often important for purposes of identification, and it will enable the receiver to acknowledge the gift at once. It is always best, also, to mail the freight receipt to your missionary; he will then be able to secure the box without trouble.

Diocesan Constitution

ARTICLE I—Name.

The name of this association shall be The Ohio Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE II—Object.

Its object shall be to work in connection with the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, the field being co-extensive with the Church, diocesan and general. The methods by which the ends of this organization can be promoted are: the raising of money for the support of Missionaries and Teachers, for the education of those who may be preparing for the work, and for other benevolent purposes connected with Missions; the making, collecting and transfer of clothing, and other material aid, and the circulation of papers and leaflets that may serve to stir up a public interest in the Missions of the Church.

ARTICLE III—Membership.

Section 1.—Any Parish Auxiliary (Senior or Junior) may become a member of this association by a written announcement of its organization to the Diocesan Secretary.

Sec. 2.—The officers of Parish branches shall send to the Diocesan Treasurer all pledges and money given for other than local purposes, and shall report to the Diocesan Secretary by May 1st each year all work done, with value of boxes and money given. Each Parish branch shall be entitled to but one vote in the annual Diocesan meetings, but may send any number of delegates, one of whom shall be authorized to cast the vote and assume pledges for specific work undertaken by the Diocesan branch.

ARTICLE IV—Officers.

The officers of this association shall be a President, four Vice-Presidents, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and Directors of Junior Auxiliary and Auxiliary Daughters, of Little Helpers, and of United Offering, an Educational Secretary, and a Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club, to be appointed by the Bishop, these with the other officers shall constitute a Board of Managers and trustees of the association. It shall be competent for the same person to hold two or more offices if in the judgment of the Board of Managers the best interests of the work require it.

The Board of Managers shall also have power to divide the work of any department when they deem it expedient, and the proper officers thereto shall be appointed as herein-before stated. If desired, an Honorary President may be appointed.

ARTICLE V—Duties of Officers.

Section 1.—The President shall preside, and in her absence one of the Vice-Presidents, in Convocation order. She shall call meetings and perform such duties as pertain to her office; and shall make every effort, through the Vice-Presidents and otherwise, to direct the work of the Parish branches in raising money for the support of some one or more of the departments of missionary work, and shall form new Parish auxiliaries wherever practicable.

Sec. 2.—It shall be the duty of the first, second and third Vice-President in addition to the customary assistance to the President, to take general charge of the missionary work in her own Convocation and she may arrange for one meeting of representatives from the Parishes in the Convocation, held annually in the Autumn, and shall in every way strive to arouse and maintain active interest in all departments of the work. The especial duty of the fourth Vice-President shall be to assist the President, and she may also be assigned to duty in any part of the Diocese where such assistance is desired.

Sec. 3.—The Secretary shall correspond with the General Secretary and the missionaries and find out where help is needed, and of what kind; shall inform the Parish secretaries and arrange about their work, so that a general oversight may be kept by one person. She shall keep a correct list of all Diocesan officers, Parish secretaries and clergymen in the Diocese, with addresses of the same. She shall take the minutes of all meetings and prepare an annual report for circulation in the Diocese. The Treasurer shall receive and forward all money offerings, and shall pay out money only as voted by the Diocesan branch or Board of Managers, except money received for a definite purpose may be paid for that purpose without a formal vote; shall keep an account of all money contributed for missionary and other purposes by the Parish branches, or individuals; and shall, after the accounts and vouchers are audited, embody a full account in the annual report.

Sec. 4.—An Auditing Committee of two persons, to be appointed by the President, shall examine the accounts and vouchers of the Diocesan Treasurer, and report result.

ARTICLE VI—Amendments.

The Constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual meeting of the association; provided, that notice of the proposed change has been given with the call for a meeting.

By-Laws

I.

The Annual Meeting of this Association shall be held on Thursday following the Diocesan Convention; but, for good reason, the Board of Officers may appoint the meeting upon some other date.

The place of meeting may be determined upon by vote at an annual meeting, or, failing this, shall be arranged by the Board of Officers.

II.

In case of vacancy in any office the same may be filled at a stated or called meeting of the Board of Managers, and any one appointed by them shall continue in office until the next annual meeting.

III.

Special meetings may be called by the President at such time and place as she may designate, for the purpose of stimulating interest in the work.

IV.

The stated meetings of the Board of Managers, with the President as Chairman, shall be held in May at any place designated, and at these meetings any number present may constitute a quorum.

V.

It is expected that each parish Branch shall contribute not less than one dollar (\$1.00) to the expense fund.

VI.

These by-laws may be amended at any annual meeting by vote of majority present.

VII.

The order of services and of business at the annual meeting shall be as follows:

- Holy Communion.
- Bishop's Address.
- Roll Call.
- Reading of Minutes of Last Meeting.
- Reports of Officers and Committees.
- Statement of Future Work—Receiving Pledges.
- Unfinished Business.
- Miscellaneous.
- Addresses or Papers.
- Adjournment.
