The Annual Meeting at Toledo

May 21st, 1918

The Forty-first Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese was held in Trinity Church, Toledo, Tuesday, May 21st, 1918. A Communion Service was celebrated at half past ten o'clock, with the Bishop of Ohio as the Celebrant, assisted by the Bishop Co-adjutor, Rev. George Gunnell, Rector of Trinity Parish; Rev. R. S. Chalmers, of St. Mark's; Rev. J. Earnest Carhartt, and Rev. Chas. P. Burgoon.

In Bishop Leonard's Address he emphasized the point that now is the time for women to re-consecrate themselves for the work of the Church. They are showing the world what they can do for the Red Cross, and it is indeed an excellent piece of work, and most necessary in these times

of war. He asked the women to serve first things first, and surely the Church comes first. If all these good women would do as much for the Kingdom of God and his work in the Church as they are doing for the Red Cross, how great would be the result! Don't neglect Red Cross, but do as much, if not more, for the Church, was the Bishop's message.

Rev. Mr. Gunnell then gave a brief word of welcome to the women. Trinity Church is a beautiful old structure, with a commodious and well arranged Parish House, equipped to entertain a large gathering.

Two hundred and seventeen answered to the roll call, and a few came in later. This is not so large a number as would have been present had the meeting been held in Cleveland, but it gave the women in the western portion of the Diocese an opportunity of attending an Annual Meeting, which, otherwise, they might not have had.

Upon motion, the minutes of the last annual meeting were dispensed with, the same having been printed in the Year Book. Bishop DuMoulin was asked to lead in the Noon Day Prayer for Missions, he then spoke briefly of his work in the Diocese, and gratefully acknowledged the help which the Woman's Auxiliary has given him. He has been able to build four new churches, three rectories and two parish houses this year, in which the Auxiliary has had a share.

Bishop Leonard read his report giving an account of the money given him. He used the entire sum in the work among the colored people, the larger portion of the fund being given to help the work of St. Andrew's Church, Cleveland.

The reading of the Annual Reports was again dispensed with. It is necessary to do this to save time.

Mrs. Rupert Holland, of Toledo, 3rd Vice-President, presented a paper for the founding of an Emergency Fund, to be used for the many important and deserving calls which are constantly being made, especially during these war days. This Fund will be used at the discretion of the Special Committee. It is the present plan to make "calls" on this Fund, not to exceed five times during the year, as the appeals seem worthy of help. For example, a pledge of one dollar means that amount for each call, making a total of five dollars. About forty-eight dollars was pledged for this Fund.

Mrs. Knapp read a letter from a Tennessee Medical worker in a mission hospital where they were caring for fifteen hundred patients. Many of their doctors and helpers had enlisted in the cause of the Great War and many of their substantial supporters were also gone. The work is most important and he begged for a little help. It would be most gratifying to answer some of these calls, and for this the new Fund is started.

Mrs. C. C. Bolton, of Cleveland, spoke interestingly about the Sarah L. Leonard Scholarship at Harcourt School, which was started last year. Five hundred dollars covers such a scholarship. It is desired to obtain an Endowment Fund which will take care of this amount annually. That is what Mrs. Bolton hopes and is working for.

The Rev. George P. Mayo was the speaker for the afternoon. Several years ago Mr. Mayo spoke to our Auxiliary at an Annual Meeting, asking that each Branch buy a foot or more of land that he might start his work among the poor people living in the Blue Ridge Mountains of Virginia. This beginning being made, he has been able, with further aid, to build a substantial school building, including a chapel. His territory covers about one hundred and twenty-five square miles. The work is along educational lines.

These poor people had absolutely nothing that was uplifting or educational until the Rev. Mr. Mayo came to them, and they were eager for it. Recently they have suffered the loss of their main building by fire. That is why he came to us again to ask for our help to maintain this important work. They want to build a new school building. Before any religious training was given these people they spent their time in operating distilleries, many being intoxicated much of the time. Now they have prohibition and they either crate their apples, or make vinegar, or can the fruit for the market, thus having a little industry of their own. The people are progressive and desirous of getting acquainted with the world and its work and appreciate all that is done for them. Many have been graduated from this school and have gone forth as teachers and doctors, and all have become better citizens from the training which they have received at this Mission. When they first opened this school eight years ago, they had fifteen pupils at the boarding school for boys and girls, now they have one hundred and fifteen. Mr. Mayo is anxious to build a ten thousand dollar building which will include office rooms, class rooms, laundry, cannery and a large hall. Most of the labor will be contributed by the people and much of the lumber and stone can be obtained near the school and at a minimum cost. Mr. Mayo promised to do something definite with the money which the women of Ohio would give, either a class room, the cannery, or something else according to the amount pledged. His appeal was earnest and his stories of the school life most interesting.

A vote of appreciation of the courtesy and hospitality of the Toledo ladies, especially of Trinity Church, was given. The delightful reception given the out-of-town guests the evening before the meeting, and the delicious luncheon at noon was all that could be desired, and made the Annual Meeting a most pleasant affair. An invitation from Emmanuel

Parish, Cleveland, to meet with them next year, was unanimously accepted.

Rev. Dr. Gunnell closed the meeting with prayer and benediction.

Address of the President

My fellow-officers have asked me to be their spokesman today, and to express our united appreciation of your faithfulness this past year, and our pleasure in accepting the hospitality of the Toledo Parishes. Several of us have made official visits to this part of the Diocese, but it is the first time so many officers and members have been privileged to be here together.

When we met for our annual meeting last May, in spite of the sorrow that had come to us as a Branch, and the national causes for anxiety, we were happy because all our pledges had been met and such substantial gifts made in response to special appeals. In our hearts, though, was the disquieting fear that another year might find us less fortunate. Our lack of faith now shames us! You have done so splendidly again! Our pledges are not only met, but some have gone "over the top." The new pledge of last year, the Scholarship at Harcourt School, in memory of our dear Mrs. Leonard, was not wholly completed, but we shall learn of that later. We all want it to be an endowed and so a perpetual fund, and must bend our energies to that end. This week, all over the land, comes the pressing call of the Red Cross and kindred organizations.

We are being told of the needs in France and Belgium, of Serbia and Armenia, as well as for the relief of our own. These are largely physical needs. Are the spiritual wants of the women and children of China and Japan less real? Do not our young people of the southern mountains have their claims too? We are steeped in the idea of democracy and are continually reminded that for that the world must be made safe. It *must* be, but unless it be a Christian democracy it may prove to be a house of cards. For a year we have felt the conflict of duties. We have been tempted to neglect the usual channels of service and gifts, in Church

and philanthropy, to respond to the patriotic appeal that seemed especially pressing because so immediate. Should it not be our part to do the one and yet not leave the other undone?

For us women of the Auxiliary there is a definite call. We have seen a Vision, a vision of a world that has become the Kingdom of our Lord. We can only demonstrate its truth by faithfulness in ourselves, by the sacrifice of our own time and pleasures that none of the Kingdom's work fall behind, while we still give ourselves unsparingly to our country's service. Bishop Brent, now giving himself to work under General Pershing, has recently written from the vantage point, Missions being supernatural and built on the secure foundations of Christ's largest principles and promises, "glisten like jewels." We have a responsibility to see that their brightness is not dimmed. We, as an Auxiliary, are to have a War Work all our own. Last year we were sharers in the "Pilgrimage of Prayer," and now a way of further spiritual service has been shown us. There is not time to explain it here, but when you learn of it from appointed committees, you will respond to that call no less heartily than to those for financial help. It has been, as we said in the beginning, a good year, because the opportunity for service was ours, and we have welcomed it. This coming year may, and must be better.

Our young men are "investing" their lives for the future welfare of the world. We can do no less. Let us give ours to hasten the coming of the Kingdom, only asking God to show us the way.

Annual Report of the Secretary

(Annual Meeting, Trinity Church, Toledo, May 21st, 1918.)

It was with feelings of pleasure and anticipation that we accepted the invitation of the Woman's Auxiliary of Trinity Church, Toledo, to be with them today for our Annual Meeting. Indeed it seemed a most desirable innovation from our long established habit of meeting in Cleveland. We hope the change for this year will prove of benefit to our Diocesan Branch as a whole, inasmuch as it should bring to our meeting the Auxiliary women who find it inconvenient to go as far from home as Cleveland.

It is at the annual gatherings that the needs of the mission field are impressed upon us most forcibly, and each parochial branch represented can better understand the plan marked out for the work of the coming year.

Notwithstanding the pressing necessities of the times, our Auxiliary Branch, as a whole, has not forgotten its duty to the Church. Some few,

without stopping to weigh the matter well, have felt the work of the Red Cross was of prime importance, and have allowed their interest to go largely in that direction, but for the coming year I feel quite sure their viewpoint will be changed.

For example, we can readily see the great harm that will result in a community if, for lack of proper support, our mission schools are closed for the period of the War. Those living in isolated sections of our country are making sacrifices as great for them as those we must bear. They look to us, and we can do more now than we have ever done to cheer the sadness and monotony of their lives. Not only is the freedom of the world in danger, but the principles which Christ's life and suffering came to teach, so it is not necessary to define the spirit which should guide the heart of every Auxiliary woman.

Our first fall meeting, with an informal luncheon, took place in the guild rooms of the Cathedral, on September twentieth, attended by the parochial officers of the Cleveland Region. The plan of work for the year was talked over, and the women reminded of the usual annual day of Prayer held by the Woman's Auxiliary of the Ohio Branch on St. Michael's and All Souls Day, September twenty-ninth.

The Conferences for the Regions met with more or less frequency, as the Regional Chairmen could arrange. The Cleveland Region holding five meetings through the year, with results which were most satisfactory. November twenty-fifth closed the Pilgrimage of Prayer, which, beginning in the State of Maine, has been observed systematically through every diocese and mission section where our Church is planted throughout the world.

When we consider the many distractions which war conditions have brought into the lives of our women, we have reason to be thankful that our pledges have been so well met, and that we have not failed to supply many missionary boxes and packages, although the difficulties in transportation have been often disappointing, or impossible to overcome.

Glen-Alpine, which we look upon as our special Mission, because it was founded through the effort of our beloved Treasurer, has received the usual amount of attention both in money and boxes. We have also raised a special sum; about one hundred and fifty dollars above our usual pledges, for providing a water supply for the Mission house, but the completion of the work has been retarded. For the same reason, Bates Hall, which should have been finished a year ago, is still incomplete.

Materials for its construction, although close at hand, are not to be obtained for lack of workmen. Thus we realize that War conditions are felt in the mountains as well as in other parts of our country. This small community of mountaineers have contributed their share towards win-

ning the War, although they have no money with which to purchase Liberty Bonds, the service banner in the little church tells of six of their number gone to the fighting line, either in the army or navy. One of the girls is in a hospital training to be a nurse, another has charge of a department in the Industrial School at Valle Crucis, North Carolina, and a third is helping Mrs. Joyner by teaching the younger children in the mission school. They have caught the spirit of progress, and are striving to have a share in the world's betterment. A letter received by our Treasurer, from Mr. John W. Wood, expresses to her and the Woman's Auxiliary in Ohio sincere thanks for their loyal and continued help in the mission work of the Church, also the gratitude of the Board of Missions for the same. Perhaps all of our women do not know that Miss Elwin, "our own missionary" in China, for so many years in charge of St. Mary's Orphanage in Shanghai, resigned her position about a year ago, and returned to England in answer to the call of her country.

Miss Margaret Bates, an American woman, from New Jersey, and Miss Elwin's trained helper, has taken her place. Beyond doubt we will give her the interest and support we have shown Miss Elwin in years past. We congratulate the Board of Missions, as well as ourselves, that the work in Shanghai has been carried on without interruption.

Inasmuch as the pledge made to La Grange at our Annual Meeting last year was the largest ever made to a visiting speaker, seven hundred and fifteen dollars, it may be of interest to read the following from the Rev. Robert T. Phillips:

"I can scarcely express to you and through you to the Ohio Branch the very great appreciation I feel for your generous help. As I have told you before, it was a great encouragement to us and to the people in going forward with our program of church building. You will be interested to know that we have been able to let contracts for two church buildings. Your generosity and that of other friends enabled us to secure the co-operation of the mill corporations, among whose people our work is done, so that they gave dollar for dollar the gifts received from Church sources. Upon the completion of the buildings the Church will have two splendid chapels, well built and adapted for their work. Of course the letting of the contract does not mean that we have completely satisfied all our needs as both the churches will have to be furnished. I would greatly appreciate any further contributions towards the furnishing of the churches that it is possible for your Branch to make to us."

We should not omit to express to Mrs. Bolton our gratitude for the interest she has taken in the Memorial Scholarship for Mrs. Leonard, at Harcourt School, Gambier. Let us assure her that we are not unmindful of the time and effort she has given to make the

success of this large undertaking possible, by doing our part as Auxiliary Branches. It affords not only an opportunity for helping towards the education of some clergyman's daughter, in our own diocese, but gives us the satisfaction of knowing we are promoting a work in which our beloved Honorary President was so deeply interested, the growth and successful progress of Harcourt School.

Every thoughtful woman feels desirous of doing her part toward relieving the manifold suffering and ignorance of the world; how much more earnestly should she desire by the deeper consecration of the life, through prayer, to do a larger part for the steady, onward march of Christ's Kingdom, that brotherly love may rule the hearts of men, and the Cross, the emblem of peace, be forever victorious.

The Auxiliary Daughters and The Junior Auxiliary

The Auxiliary Daughters and the Junior Auxiliary have had a successful year. I trust we have seen the larger joy made possible to some of "the least of His children," by our prayers, gifts and work. In these days of crisis, it is as necessary to renew the spirit of self-sacrifice in His work as it is in the work at the battle front. We, who have hope and faith and a knowledge of God and His Purposes, must give so our spiritual reserve can increase.

Several large Junior meetings were held during the year. In November, the Juniors of the Sandusky Region were organized at a meeting held in Calvary Church, Sandusky. In February, the Juniors of the Akron Region met in St. Paul's Church, Akron. The Cleveland Juniors held several splendid meetings during the year at the Cathedral, Emmanuel and St. Paul's. We hope, during the coming year, to have all of the Juniors in the Diocese organize as Regional units.

Our pledges were all paid, and barrels, boxes and packages sent to the following Missions: St. Paul's, Glen Alpine, N. C.; Arapahoe Indian Mission, Wind River, Wy.; All Saint's Indian Mission, Winnebago, Neb.; St. John's Mission, High Shoals, N. C.; St. Peter's on the Mt., Calaway, Va.; Rutherfordton, N. C.; La Grange, Ga.; Laurenceville, Va.; Rev. Mr. Bullock, Greenboro, N. C.; Holy Cross Home, St. John's Orphanage, Cleveland; Church Periodical Club. Many helped in Red Cross and Civilian Relief Work.

The Banners this year were awarded to the Juniors of the Church of Our Saviour, Akron, and the Church of Our Saviour, Salem. Mention is made of the splendid work accomplished by the Juniors of St. Paul's, Canton; St. Luke's, St. Paul's, St. Agnes' Guild, Trinity, Cleveland.

Several Mystery Plays were given in the Diocese, and many Mission Study Classes were held. Every year sees an increase along this line. We cannot expect interested and intelligent prayer or giving until our young people know why, where and how they are working and giving. It is an opportunity to broaden our knowledge and interest, and I am thankful that many leaders are taking advantage of Summer Conferences.

Our ideal is that every girl have a share in the United Offering. No life amounts to anything until it becomes absorbed in some aim which carries it out of and beyond itself. The United Offering gives us the privilege of giving above and beyond all else. We are happy to report that one young woman from Ohio is now in training at St. Faith's, New York, expecting to give her life to His work in the Foreign Field.

We try to increase and develop the Prayer and Spiritual Life of our young people. Christ's Prayers were missionary prayers and in them we see visions of what the Missionary Spirit must have been in His Life. We want others to have His Vision.

The Junior work is of great importance and should not be left to the Junior officers and leaders. Each one should feel a responsibility for the New Junior Plan. It is, we believe, an important and far-reaching movement, but it needs the co-operation of the Clergy and Laity to make it succeed. Information concerning it will gladly be given at any time. We are glad to report some are using it in part. Where it is impossible to use it in full, much can be accomplished in a small way. Four boys in one Parish succeeded in getting fifty-six new subscribers to the Spirit of Missions during Lent; they thus helped in the Coming of His Kingdom.

In the coming year, I ask for greater effort, greater sacrifice. Religion that costs nothing, that demands no sacrifice, is worth little. Religion which costs the all, making the Cross the central figure, dominating the life, becomes a force in the Kingdom of God. May God give us Christ's vision of the spiritual value of mankind so we may have His desire to help and save others.

Educational Department

Upon a foundation laid through the earnest efforts in the past of those who love the Educational work, it has been my privilege to add a little to the building up of this most important part of our Church's Mission. That through increased knowledge of Him and His command "Go ye into all the world and preach and teach His Gospel," we might feel a greater responsibility and desire for service and sacrifice in His name. The plan of appointing Educational leaders in the Regions of our diocese has proved successful where such leaders could be found. Not all Regions are organized as yet, but we hope for better results another year.

At this time I wish to express my sincere appreciation of the good work and hearty co-operation of these Regional leaders and of those leaders who carried on the work in their own and other parishes in the city. Through the Fall three Normal Classes were held for East and West Sides and for Regional Leaders. Some parishes held their Study Classes during Epiphany season, but the larger number were conducted during Lent.

The study course this year, "Missions according to the Bible," using the Bible as the text-book, proved to be one that appealed to many, who, in these days of trial and great unrest, wanted to know more of the Bible and its comforting message and through its teaching better learn our mission in the world.

One result from this course has been the growth of permanent Bible classes in many parishes. Another source of help to the cause of Missions was "The World in Cleveland," in which our church took an active part—through exhibits from all lands, conferences, talks by missionaries, and noted speakers, and a splendid pageant, we all felt the inspiration and unity of purpose of Protestant Churches in our city. The "Pilgrimage of Prayer," in which we of this diocese had our special week in May, closed the last of November. It proved a great spiritual help.

During the year I visited the Parishes of St. James', Painesville; St. Peter's, Lakewood; St. Thomas', Berea; Church of the Incarnation, Cleveland; and told them of the Educational side of the work.

Each year we are told of splendid opportunities offered by Summer Conferences for Church workers. It was my privilege to attend two, one at Gambier, and the larger one at Geneva, N. Y. Now one is established at Racine, Wisconsin, for the Province of the Mid-West. May we send larger numbers each year!

The following report is in accord with the returned questionnaires, but does not include all parishes. I find but little Missionary education has been given in the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, the Girls' Friendly

Society or Auxiliary Daughters', except occasional lectures or discussions of missionary topics. During the year 1917-1918 there were held thirty-six Mission Study Classes in thirty-one parishes. Sixty-five program meetings in eleven parishes; eighteen stereopticon lectures in six parishes; twenty Bible classes in fourteen parishes; sixty visiting speakers in fifteen parishes; four Missionary plays were given. Many parishes do not know of the stereopticon slides at Emmanuel Church, in care of Mrs. Woodroof; they have been stationed there since February, 1918, and have been used forty-seven times throughout this Province. The use of the Spirit of Missions grows slowly, this year one hundred and six new subscribers have been reported. Until each parish has its agent, who will devote time and effort in obtaining subscribers and users of this magazine, which ranks among the best, we cannot hope for a large increase. This magazine is now placed in seventeen public institutions.

Realizing the importance of giving to our Juniors a more thorough knowledge of the Mission of our Church, and that they might receive it through one who feels a deep interest in this work, we were glad when Mrs. E. S. Grauel consented to take this responsibility. During the past year her untiring efforts, her earnestness and loyalty have been a source of continual encouragement.

The following is the report of Educational Work with the Juniors under Mrs. E. S. Grauel's leadership:

Educational work in the Junior Auxiliary of our diocese has been faithfully carried on year by year by many of our Branches. Each year, with a deepening realization of the vast importance of this work, leaders have tried to extend and broaden its scope. This year, following the example of the Woman's Auxiliary, Junior Educational leaders have been appointed in seven of the Regions of our diocese.

A two days' conference for these Regional leaders was held in Cleveland last November. It was a time not only for the study of the two Junior text books, but an opportunity to become acquainted, and to gain inspiration and enthusiasm from contact with fellow workers. As a result of the good work done by these leaders, mission study has been introduced into many parishes where it was unknown before.

A conference, similar in character, consisting of six weekly meetings, was held for the Junior leaders of Cleveland, in November; also two additional meetings in January. The Junior Auxiliary directors of Cleveland have a strong organization working under their president, Miss Grace Mickey. To this group of faithful young women appreciation is here expressed for their hearty co-operation and zeal in the furtherance of the work of this department. How splendid it would be if in the coming year an organization of Junior Directors could be perfected in

every Region! How splendid if each parish could add to its list of officers an Educational Secretary! Missionary plays and stereopticon lectures have had an important place in the year's work.

The Junior Educational Secretary has taught several classes of boys and girls in different churches, and visited a number of branches with the view of introducing Mission Study. As we read the messages that come to us from camp and front-line trench, we realize that men, more and more, are turning to religion for strength and courage—that faith in a Good and All-Wise Father is growing among them. Our boys and girls must be prepared against the time of the home coming of our men! The men and women of tomorrow must not be weighed and found wanting!

Our crying need is for more leaders. No organization of the Church has the missionary knowledge that the Woman's Auxiliary has, and it is to Auxiliary women that we must look for those who will "carry on." What nobler work can fall to the lot of any woman than the training of our young people for the work which Church and State will demand of them in the near future?

We pray that many of our Auxiliary women may see their way to give larger service next year in this part of their Master's work.

"The Little Helpers"

With children the passing of time is a thing unnoted, but with us, who have been watching them, the past year has been full of varied interest. Our best news is the organization of three new branches: one in St. Peter's Church, Ashtabula; one in Grace Church (South), Cleveland, and one in Ascension Church, Lakewood. A hearty welcome we give each one, congratulating the parishes which recognize the value and beauty of incorporating the "Little Helpers" in their work for the Master. There are, unfortunately, four branches without directors, which means that nothing is being done in those places; for the children once enrolled with no one to give out or collect the mite boxes soon forget all about their promises. If the young women only realized how sweet and simple is the task of leading Christ's little ones, there would be no difficulty in filling these vacant offices. The money received this year amounts to two hundred and twenty-three dollars and sixty-six cents, from sixteen branches. Of this sum one hundred and two dollars was given to the Annie May Scholarship at Glen Alpine.

It is a pleasure to hear that the "Little Helpers" of one parish have adopted a French orphan, and are saving to buy a Liberty Bond; while in another they are making scrap books for Indian boys and girls; while others are knitting squares to make trench quilts for our soldiers.

The speaker for the first conference of the Woman's Auxiliary, held in St. Paul's Church, on November the fourteenth, was chosen for the sake of this, its youngest department. Those who heard Mrs. Cooper, of Geneseo, N. Y., explain the meaning and the possibilities of the work of the "Little Helpers," received not only a deepened and quickened sense of responsibility, but a keen desire and new inspiration to do their part for these Babies of the Kingdom.

Report of the Third Vice-President

At the close of a year wherein humanity, collectively and individually, has been burdened with the greatest of efforts and of sacrifices, it is my privilege to again report on the work accomplished in the Toledo Region of the Woman's Auxiliary.

In November, 1917, the Annual Regional Meeting was held in St. Mark's Church. Dr. Gunnell, Rector of Trinity Church, was the celebrant at the service of Holy Communion, assisted by Rev. John Carthart, Rector of St. Andrew's Church. After this service, Dr. Gunnell delivered an address on the position the church hoped and expected the women who compose the Woman's Auxiliary will take in view of the conditions now facing the country. It was, that while we should and must help in every possible way in the conduct of the war, still we are an auxiliary to the board of missions, that this is a crisis in the church's history, and that we must "carry on." His address had such an effect on those present that it aroused both their patriotism to their country and their loyalty to their church. At noon lunch was served in the parish house. At the afternoon session, the Rev. Mr. Thomas, of Brazil, spoke of his work there in the School of the Holy Cross.

The January, 1918, meeting was held in Grace Church. The Rev. Robert Bagnall, Rector of All Saint's Church, was the speaker, and told of the work the church is doing among the negroes of the middle west.

In February, Bishop DuMoulin conducted a "Quiet Morning" in Trinity Church. This was a wonderful service. There was a celebration of Holy Communion at 9.00 o'clock, Bishop DuMoulin, celebrant, assisted by Dr. Gunnell, after which the Bishop made an address. His subject was "Answered and Unanswered Prayer." The several addresses were a splendid preparation for the Lenten season, and later, in March, they were supplemented by four Bible classes which met in St. Mark's Church. The Bishop conducted these and took for his subject, "Missions in the Bible." These addresses, before the classes, were wonderful. The hearers were inspired to greater activity in their church work and were drawn nearer to the presence of Our Saviour.

On April 30th, the last meeting of the season was held in St. Mark's Church. Rev. Mr. Banks, of Maumee, addressed the meeting, his subject being, "The Needs of the Church in Nebraska."

Though the war is upon us and we are doing our utmost for the rights and liberties of mankind, we must bear in mind that as we develop and strengthen the weaker portions of humanity in the mission fields, we thereby add that much to the forces for the overthrow of the evil that threatens the world. It is because we realize this, that, in addition to our direct assistance in the war activities, there is a growing interest shown in the work of the church, and a desire to do all that can be done to help along the work for suffering and oppressed humanity and the work for the upbuilding of Christ's Kingdom here on earth.

The United Offering

The United Offering stands by itself in the activities of the Woman's Auxiliary. It is a gift made once in three years, at the time and place of meeting of the General Convention, when the Woman's Auxiliary gathers for its Triennial Corporate Communion. It is something in addition to all that the Auxiliary gathers, and sends year by year to the treasury of the Board of Missions, and is meant not to interfere with the regular yearly increase of those gifts. It is not an offering of branches, but of *individuals*, not of active members of the Auxiliary only, but of every woman who can be reached. How is it obtained? The Diocesan Director and Treasurer begins by trying to secure a helper in every parish branch. The idea is that in one way or another, as many women as possible may share in this gift. In large parishes it is well to have a chairman and a number of authorized solicitors, to whom are given the names

of every woman in the parish, so that all can be told and given an opportunity to help make it truly what its name implies, a *United Offering*.

Twice a year, October and April, Mite boxes should be opened and contents gathered and sent to the Diocesan Treasurer, and by her deposited in some bank, where it can be drawing interest. After the Triennial Meeting this United Offering goes directly into the treasury of the Board of Missions. It is placed at once at interest, and is drawn from as needed, month by month, for the "training, sending and support of women for mission work at home and abroad"—until principal and interest both are used. By that time the next Offering is looked for to continue the work.

Ohio's total gift to the United Offering, of 1916, was \$11,507.09, what it will become in 1919 will depend upon us all. How we make known its needs and secure the interest and co-operation of *every* church woman and girl in the Diocese—will you not *all* help? Our prayers and our gifts are both needed.

The Annual Pledges

The largest one of our pledges is made to the Board of Missions for the annual salary of a lady missionary in China. The amount is \$750. Miss Margaret Bates, who is the successor of Miss Elwin, is thus "our own missionary," in Shanghai, a post of much responsibility and importance.

Since the founding of St. Paul's Mission at Glen Alpine in the Blue Ridge Mountains, we have had the honor of paying the salary of our very successful missionary there, Mrs. James Joyner. The work has grown so much that we have now provided Mrs. Joyner with an assistant. We have also, during the past few years, paid a scholarship for a little girl, besides contributing extra sums for the comfort and well being of the Mission. The sum for which we pledge ourselves to Glen Alpine is \$600.

The "Bishop Leonard Fund" is for use among the missions of Ohio, when and where the Bishop thinks it best. We have pledged to him \$500; he has been accustomed to pay \$300 of this amount to the support of the Colored Mission in Cleveland, the remaining \$200 has been expended, this year, to add to the stipend of three other Colored Missionaries in the Diocese.

The "Bishop DuMoulin Fund," newly undertaken, will place in the hands of the co-adjutor a sum for use at his discretion among missions in the Diocese. The amount thus far subscribed is something over \$300.

The "Expense Fund" covers the cost of publishing the annual report, occasional circulars or leaflets and notices, postage in several departments, traveling expenses in starting new Branches, and that of missionaries whom we invite to address us. It is hoped that each society will contribute \$1 at least, during the year, and that the stronger societies will contribute considerably more.

The "Contingent Fund" is available for all sorts of emergencies and is of great service. Most often it is expended for materials sent to small or weak Parishes to be made into garments; also for necessary articles of clothing not otherwise obtainable. It is sometimes expended for over-coats needed without delay, or for clerical suits.

Varying sums are pledged each year to Bishop Rowe's work in Alaska to General Missions, to the Districts of Oklahoma, Nevada, Asheville, the Philippines and others.

The Bishop Bedell Scholarship and the Julia Bedell Scholarship pay for the education of native pupils in St. John's University, Shanghai, China. They require \$70 each per annum. The "Ohio Scholarship" in St. Elizabeth's—one of the Bishop Hare Schools in South Dakota—pays for the education of an Indian pupil; it requires \$60 per year. Several other scholarships are maintained by individual Parishes, and by the Juniors. The "Foreign Insurance Fund" provides insurance upon the lives of foreign missionaries for the benefit of their families. We of the Ohio Branch have for thirty years paid \$50 each year into this fund;

we have now increased the amount to \$100. It is a fund which should particularly appeal to us.

Those of our pledges which help the Board of Missions to meet its appropriations (and which therefore count toward the "apportionment" of our Parishes) have been this year as follows: Salary of our missionary in China, General Missions (that is to say, Foreign and Domestic Missions); Missions in the Districts of Alaska, W. Nebraska, Oklahoma, East Oklahoma, Wyoming, Utah, the Philippines and Nevada; Japan; School at Cape Palmas, Africa; Julia and Bishop Bedell Scholarships, China; "Sandusky Scholarship," China, "Julia McGrew Scholarship," St. Hilda's, China; and "Ohio Scholarship" in St. Elizabeth's, South Dakota.

Notes

All contributions for the United Offering are to be sent to the Director and Treasurer of that fund, Miss K. L. Mather; other sums are to be sent to the General Treasurer, Mrs. C. S. Bates. All "pledges" are to be paid to Mrs. Bates. If you send money direct to Church Missions House, New York, do not fail to say that it is to be credited to the Woman's Auxiliary, and also state whether it is to be a "special" or may be assigned to the appropriations of the Board.

PLEASE NOTE that packages sent to Mrs. Savage for distribution in missionary boxes should be addressed, *not* to her residence, but to *St. Paul's Parish House, 4108 Euclid Ave., Cleveland*. It is there that the packing is done. The janitor resides in the house and packages are always cared for. All articles received will be assorted by the Secretary, and sent out again according to need and the particular sizes desired. But if you have enough to fill a barrel or box weighing fifty to one hundred pounds or more there is no economy in sending to Mrs. Savage at all; in that case please send direct to the Mission for which it is intended. Before sending a box or barrel be very sure that you have the correct address. Write the name of the State in full. Put your own address, also, on the outside. This is often important for purposes of identification, and it will enable the receiver to acknowledge the gift at once. It is always best, also, to mail the freight receipt to your missionary; he will then be able to secure the box without trouble.

A package weighing fifty pounds or less can be sent by parcels post to all Mission Stations. This is a quick and safe mode of transportation, since War restrictions make the transportation of barrels and boxes so uncertain, and less expensive than by express for isolated places located off a direct route.
