The Annual Meeting at Cleveland

May 15th, 1919

The Forty-Second Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese was held in Emmanuel Church, Cleveland, on Thursday, May 15th.

A Communion Service was held at half past ten o'clock with the Bishop of Ohio as the Celebrant, assisted by the Rt. Rev. Hugh L. Burleson, Missionary Bishop of South Dakota, who was also the visiting speaker of the day, the Rt. Rev. Frank DuMoulin, Bishop Coadjutor of Ohio, and the Rev. R. W. Woodrooffe, Rector of Emmanuel Church. Bishop Leonard made a brief talk on the general work of the Auxiliary, speaking particularly on the future of the General Hospital of Wuchang, China. He thanked the Auxiliary for their interest in the "Chapel of our Blessed Saviour," and spoke of the expectation of a Nurses Home being built there as an added memorial to Mrs. Leonard.

After the Service, the Meeting was called to order by our President, Mrs. Knapp.

It was moved and seconded that the reading of the minutes of the last Annual Meeting be omitted as they are printed in the Year Book—to save time this is our usual custom.

Bishop Leonard then read his report, stating how the money furnished to him by the Auxiliary had been distributed. Bishop DuMoulin followed telling of his work among the weaker Churches in the Diocese and how, with the sum of about \$300.00, furnished him through the Woman's Auxiliary, he was able to help five Churches that had been struggling to pay a debt.

Miss Mather read her report of the United Offering. She urged the women to make their offering as large as possible, when the final amount should be gathered for the Triennial at Detroit.

Mrs. George Gunnell read a motion of the "House of Church Women," in which five women were to represent our Diocese in the different departments of Church work. Mrs. James Garfield was selected as Chairman and is expected to represent the work on Social Service. The other delegates appointed were Mrs. Knapp, for the Woman's Auxiliary; Mrs. Gunnell of Toledo, Educational work; Miss Ada Crary of Cleveland, the "Girls' Friendly Society;" Mrs. Parsons of Youngstown, the "Daughters of the King." It was moved and seconded that the delegates select their alternates, if any should fail to attend the meeting to be held in Detroit on October sixth and seventh. It was also moved and seconded that our treasurer be authorized to pay five dollars as our annual dues to the "House of Church Women."

Mrs. Cooke, our First Vice President, spoke of a Conference of Church Workers to be held in Racine from July eighth to the eighteenth, at which time Miss Lindley would talk on the new mission of the Woman's Auxiliary, which is really a continuation of the Advent Call.

Noon-day Prayer was then read and shortly after the women adjourned for luncheon to the Parish Hall, the recess lasting one hour. The afternoon session being called to order, Mrs. C. C. Bolton spoke briefly regarding the Sarah L. Leonard Scholarship for Harcourt School, Gambier. She asked that Branches and individuals remember the fund. The amount aimed for is ten thousand dollars, this sum to be used as a permanent endowment. Up to the present time \$6,519.81 has been raised.

Bishop Burleson, the visiting speaker, was then introduced to the women and spoke at length concerning his work among the Indians, only making a brief reference to the work among the white inhabitants in his diocese.

He prefaced his talk by saying his father and mother were missionaries and that he had four brothers in the ministry, consequently he knew much of the problems which confront the missionary, as well as the compensations which the life affords. In the early days, his father had charge of fourteen counties and often drove fifty miles on Sundays to hold services in different localities. He spoke quite feelingly about continuing the missionary boxes, which some Auxiliaries had wished to discontinue. Of the pleasure and satisfaction they give to every household, adding to remember and send something that was not necessary to gladden, for example—the heart of the small boy, who was longing to possess a "jack-knife." Furthermore he added the Missionary Box furnished an opportunity to develop Christian interest, love and service to one another.

Regarding his work he said in part: "Practically fifty percent of the Indians in South Dakota are baptized members of the Episcopal

Church and there are five thousand Indian communicants. Bishop Hare did great pioneer work among them and they revered and loved him. In the Indian Reservation there are ninety Churches and Chapels. These are widely scattered and traveling is most difficult. The nearest Chapel to the railroad is two and one half miles and the farthest one hundred and sixty-five miles. It takes five days sometimes to reach this distant point, depending upon the condition of the roads." The new Suffragan Bishop, the Rt. Rev. William P. Remington, is helping Bishop Burleson in this work and is the right man in the right place. The Indian is naturally the most religious being he knows of and according to his ability, gives about three times as much money as the white man. There are about three thousand white men and women communicants in South Dakota. Something more than two years ago Bishop Burleson went out as Missionary Bishop. At once he saw the need of educating the Indian people in simple things. The work is greatly retarded for want of teachers and clergymen. Last year three-fourths of all the services were held by laymen and carried on by laymen, except for once a month, when a Minister comes to administer the Holy Communion. When an Indian is confirmed, he receives a metal cross instead of a Confirmation Certificate. This is because many of the Indians cannot read and the cross hung about the neck is a constant reminder of the vow they have taken. This custom was started by Bishop Hare in the early days of his work among the Indians. There are three orders of Laymen—juniors and seniors and those who are qualified to wear the cassock and cotta.

There are six or seven Priests in South Dakota and ninety-six Chapels. Most of the work, therefore, is done by laymen. In most Chapels no sermon is preached, but instead a leaflet is printed and translated into the Dakota language and each Sunday the congregation is taught like one big Sunday School. They are taught things they can take home to their children or about the care of their children, because all Indians have an intense love for their children and their families. It will cost about fifteen hundred dollars a year for the next five years to get out these lessons. In this way valuable information can be carried to ten thousand people every Sunday.

After five years, the lessons will be a system and in such shape that they will not have to be renewed. Bishop Burleson spoke of All Saints School for girls, which Miss Helen Peabody established under Bishop Hare. The school has been made self-supporting under Bishop Burleson and up to last year about eight thousand children had attended school there. The Bishop is anxious to establish a fund of one hundred thousand dollars in the name of Miss Peabody, to enlarge the work. There being a number of enterprises for which the Bishop was desirous of

securing help, our President suggested that the Auxiliary give their entire pledge without stipulating any particular object, and allow it to be used in whatever direction Bishop Burleson saw fit to direct it. The pledges were then taken amounting to about six hundred dollars.

Following Bishop Burleson's talk, the women of St. Paul's Church extended an invitation to the Auxiliary to meet with them for the next Annual Meeting, which invitation was accepted.

A vote of thanks was then given the Women of Emmanuel for their hospitality, appreciation for which was shown by a rising vote from the Auxiliary.

There being no further business to transact, this successful Annual Meeting came to an end. Bishop Leonard closed the day with a prayer and benediction, invoking God's Blessing upon all departments of the work of the Auxiliary.

Note:

The next Annual Meeting of the Ohio Branch of the Auxiliary will be held (D. V.) in St. Paul's Church, Cleveland, on the Thursday in May following the Diocesan Convention. Ample notification of the exact date will be given.

Address of the President

Last September the Synod of the Province of the Mid-West met in Gambier and at the same time the Provincial Organization of the Woman's Auxiliary held its eighth annual meeting. At the request of the Bishop the following delegates from the Diocese were appointed, Mrs. Savage and Mrs. Sheadle of Cleveland, Mrs. Gunnell of Toledo, Mrs. West of Perry and Mrs. Knapp of Painesville. As your president it was my privilege to be the presiding officer.

In obedience to a resolution passed by the Synod at its previous meeting the Provincial Organization of the Woman's Auxiliary passed out of existence and in its place was organized a Provincial House of Church-women, the first in the country.

According to Regulation Number 1, "The House of Churchwomen, representing the Diocese within the Province, shall meet at the same time and place as the Provincial Synod, with power to make regulations for the conduct of women's work in connection with the Province and to act in a consultative capacity with the Provincial Synod upon matters referred to it by the Synod."

There is not time here to tell of the proposed work of the House, but the great aim is to bring together representatives of all the woman's organizations in the Church, so that in the realization that our aims are one, the forwarding of Christ's Kingdom, we may co-operate and not consider ourselves in any degree as rivals.

It was a great honor to be elected the first President of the House of Churchwomen, an honor conferred upon me because I was the President of the Ohio Branch, the hostess on that memorable occasion,—so it belongs to all of you, too.

Today, according to the rules of the House, we must elect five delegates to the next meeting which will be held in Detroit, October 6th and 7th, immediately preceding the General Convention.

These delegates should represent not only the Woman's Auxiliary, but the Girls' Friendly Society, the Daughters of the King and such work as Religious Education and Social Service.

You all know that the Triennial gathering of the Woman's Auxiliary comes in October also. The committee on the program is asking that the prevailing thought shall be "The Spirit of Service for Christ's sake."

Our intercessions are asked for all who are now planning for the Triennial, and all who will share in its deliberations and decisions, with the many suggestions offered by the committees appointed three years ago and the big plans for advance work put forward by the Board of Missions, much wisdom will be required. It is the kind of wisdom that only the Holy Spirit of God can supply. Let us all seek it as never before, that in these after-war days the Church may use its rightful leadership.

A year that included fevered preparations for war, the signing of an armistice and the approach of peace in national affairs, an Advent Call for the women of the Church, a Lenten Call to prayer and service, and which foreshadows an even greater movement, cannot help but be notable.

In spite of all that has been accomplished we women of the Auxiliary should look upon it as a preparatory year. The last four years have been testing us; this that ends today may be considered as one of intensive training. Surely the Advent Call was that! The weeks of prayer and study preceding it, Advent week itself, when we talked with one another of the things of God, the Bible readings, daily Communions, intercessions, was it not time well spent, if we think of it only selfishly? We needed the preparation. Our work is increased by the coming of peace, there can be no demobilization in our army.

We have learned many things of late. As in the days of war it was the "pulling together" that was needed, so now it is our united gifts, our united prayers, our united service which will win our war for Christ.

Last year you gave up the extra lump of sugar, a pat of butter a day. You didn't use your machine on gasolineless Sundays. It wasn't much, was it? It couldn't even be called real sacrifice. But with thousands of others doing the same, what was the result? So with the mite you and I drop into our little blue boxes. It isn't much, but if the fifteen thousand women communicants in this Diocese would each do, not her "bit" but her "best," we would have a worthy offering from the Ohio Branch to be presented at Detroit.

How much this year has brought to make us thankful. Did we all remember the United Offering when the Armistice came? Will we when peace is concluded?

A recent writer claims that propaganda was the most effective of all weapons used in winning the war. It was that which strengthened the morale of the Allies and weakened that of the enemy. It is time for the women of the Church to put forth our own propaganda. In season and out we must make it known that the only hope of the world is Christ and that the extension of His kingdom is the thing that will make for righteousness and peace.

Annual Report of the Secretary

(Annual Meeting, Emmanuel Church, Cleveland, May 15th, 1919.)

We have reached the close of another year of Auxiliary work, and find ourselves gathered together in Cleveland as has been our usual custom, accepting the invitation offered at our last meeting to be the guests of the Women of Emmanuel Church. As our Auxiliary has grown and the attendance at our Annual meeting largely increased, most of us realize the work necessary to offer this ever gracious hospitality.

The thought through the past summer and autumn with some of us Diocesan Officers was largely in forming plans to engage the attention of our Auxiliary women to the approaching Advent Call. Let us bear in mind that much planning and earnest thought must be given to carry out such a large undertaking. In September our President called a two day Institute to be held in the Cathedral, to which officers of the Diocesan branches were particularly invited. At this time, suggestions were offered as to the course to pursue in the effort to reach Church women.

The first Cleveland Conference was appointed to be held at St. Paul's early in December, chiefly with this object in mind, but the rapid spread of Influenza put a ban upon all united effort. Similar disappointment occurred in other parts of the Diocese. Though our zeal was diminished, the attempt had been made and some good results must

follow. Do we not know that success in any undertaking is seldom gained without hindrance and disappointment, and that unlooked for obstacles are often sent to test our resolution to carry out a great task?

This is a task which calls for all the thought we who are the active workers in the Auxiliary can give of our time and our effort, linked with this never flagging determination and faith. With these convictions ever before us, we know God will, in His own way, hear our earnest prayers and make possible the realization of them.

Let us remember the Feast of St. Michael and All Angels, September 29th. It is the Annual Day of Prayer of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Ohio Branch. It is of great consequence that this day should not be neglected. We must begin the year aright. This is the first and most important step toward securing the desired co-operation of our women in all departments of Auxiliary work.

The pledges of the year have been met almost without exception. A few branches have been a little slow, seeming not to understand that our Auxiliary year closed with the first of May. The treasurer always finds some interested woman ready to make up any deficiency, so that our pledges, always considered binding, are never allowed to fall short.

The Emergency Call, which we started at our Annual Meeting a year ago, met with a ready response from most of the branches. Its object, as the name indicates, was to help, from time to time, unlooked for conditions in any part of the domestic missionary field.

The creation of this fund has proved a boon to the officers in particular, who were frequently called upon to aid, as well as help establish some important undertaking, for which no extra money is available. It fills a long felt need in our resources and will prove good seed scattered far and wide by our Auxiliary women.

Another pledge, made through our President, was for one hundred dollars to be given annually, through a period of five years, towards paying a policy upon the life insurance of Bishop Thomas, to be used after his death in the interests of his Diocese, the Missionary District of Wyoming. This pledge also interested our women, so the required sum was easily raised. It has been our pleasure to promise the benches, eighteen in number, at a cost of twenty-three dollars apiece, for the Chapel of the General Hospital, at Wuchang. These with the gifts from close friends have made this memorial quite complete, a fitting tribute to our beloved Honorary President. Distance has been so overcome in late years, that it may be the good fortune of some of our Auxiliary women to visit this consecrated spot. All of us can journey thither in thought and offer thanks for the opportunity afforded us to have a share in this appropriate and hallowed memorial.

Last year we transferred our allegiance from Miss Elwin to Miss Margaret Bates, an American woman from New Jersey, who had been Miss Elwin's able assistant. Miss Bates has somewhat recently married a professor in St. John's College, Shanghai, and is now Mrs. Porterfield. She is not, however, lost to the Mission, but is going on with some of her excellent work at St. Mary's Hall, although her salary as a worker is discontinued.

We have been asked by the Board of Missions to transfer our support to Miss Caroline Fullerton. She is on the staff of St. Mary's Hall and is doing most excellent work there, especially in the English department, where the question had been raised about the ability of Chinese girls to acquire English. During this discussion a Chinese educator stood up and said this was a mistake because he knew St. Mary's had been doing for several years just what had been declared impossible. By way of introduction, I will say, Miss Fullerton came from Vermont, but her last home was in Minneapolis, where she was a teacher in the Public School. With testimonials, such as these, it is certain the Woman's Auxiliary of Ohio will accord their hearty support to Miss Fullerton, as they have loyally done to her predecessors. We congratulate the Board of Missions, as well as ourselves, upon the good fortune of securing so able a woman to fill this important place.

It is with keen regret that we note through this year, filled with so many unusual and sore trials, the passing to the higher life of a large number of our Auxiliary women, many of them our most interested and earnest workers. Should we not feel that they are still with us in all our good works, watching with enlarged vision the tasks we have set ourselves to do? Especially each branch that has sustained this loss should find others to take the vacant places. This loss usually falls most seriously on the small or weaker branches and is sometimes the excuse for lack of interest. It is rather the reason for greater effort in order not to fall below the mark set by these interested women.

It is most fitting that particular mention be made of the passing away of the Second Secretary of our Ohio Branch, Mrs. A. C. Armstrong, who, before taking this position, was always a leader in all good works and, I may say, the founder of Auxiliary work in her own Parish. Her service continued through three years from 1881 to 1884 and was discontinued only because of removal from the Diocese. Interest in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary was ever uppermost in her mind and her efforts directed towards its growth and extension. Finally when the burden of years made it necessary for her to lay aside active work, her youthful and enthusiastic nature was ever alive to the possibilities for extending this part of the work of the Church. The Ohio Branch may well honor

the memory of such an untiring worker. May her influence and example stimulate the women workers of today.

It is hardly necessary to add that during the year, Red Cross Work, as well as the epidemic of Influenza, interfered quite seriously with all Auxiliary work. Some of our Mission Schools and stations missed the usual donations of money to meet current expenses and compensate teachers for their services, so after fighting against increasingly unfavorable conditions, were obliged to close for a longer or shorter time. To shut down a Mission School worked not only a real loss to the children, but was a hardship as well to the older folk, depriving them not alone of the improvement and recreation so necessary to relieve the tiresome routine of daily life, but the spiritual help and comfort to encourage the weary hearts.

Two schools have asked our help because of heavy loss through fire. This is always a most unfortunate and discouraging happening, since it involves the repetition of another struggle. When we take into account the high price of all materials used in our boxes and the diversity of interests that have taken the attention of our women, we have every reason to feel satisfied with the result of our year's work. True the boxes and packages may have fallen below the usual supply, but they have filled a real need and may be more appreciated than before, when the recipients compare their situation with the suffering and want endured in other parts of the world.

Our endeavor through the year has been to arouse our Auxiliary women to the necessity for United effort. In the months to follow our desire is to increase this effort and interest all who appear indifferent to the advancement of the Church. May we consider with seriousness the service expected from us and help by our work, our word and by our example to stimulate the constant forward progress of the Christ Spirit in the hearts of all Church women, that our influence and example may be felt not alone in our Ohio Branch, but throughout the whole world.

The Auxiliary Daughters and The Junior Auxiliary

An unusual year for the Auxiliary Daughters and for the Juniors—a year in which is recorded the loss in leadership of one who, developing—not so many years since—from an earnest, enthusiastic Junior herself; became Director of this department. Miss Atwood's resignation in January brought genuine sorrow to the branches under her charge, and many were the good wishes which followed her in her work overseas.

The after effects of the epidemic entailing longer hours in school, Saturday even, in some cases, being no longer a holiday, brought consternation to the heart of many a Director, who thought of pledges unpaid, and of Christmas and Lenten boxes to be filled.

But the pledges have all been paid! Letters from Mrs. Joyner at Glen Alpine say that they never have had a happier Christmas than the last one. The Arapahoe children, even though their quarantine was not lifted until Christmas Eve, were made glad by the gifts of Ohio Juniors. Two hundred gifts in addition were provided and the money for the Christmas candy came in as usual.

The Lenten boxes were a joy to see and hear about. They all found their way South—to St. Paul's Mission, Lawrenceville, Va., to All Saints' Mission, Linville, N. C., and to St. Paul's Associate Mission, Graniteville, S. C. Space does not permit the enumeration of many other places which have been remembered by the Juniors.

In addition to this, many branches have undertaken various kinds of work in their own parishes. As the reports came in, and I learned of the difficulties met and overcome, I feel that special commendation is due to a large number of branches for their "bravery under fire." The one receiving the citation in the form of the Junior banner for general excellence in work, in gifts and in the large number enrolled in study classes is the Junior Auxiliary of St. Peter's, Ashtabula.

There were several missionary plays given, but the study classes did not quite come up to the number of the previous year. To the Directors, I here make a special appeal that they enroll in the Normal classes to be held during the coming year. The joy to be found in our Master's service is very real when it is a response to a need known and understood.

We are glad to welcome two new branches of Auxiliary Daughters, one at Trinity, Toledo, and one at Emmanuel, Cleveland; also a new Junior branch at St. John's, Youngstown. The coming year will be a good time to strengthen the work of the Auxiliary Daughters. If the society

in your Church has become inactive, will you not encourage the young women, many of whom are proficient through their Red Cross training, to take up the making of bandages, surgical dressings, etc., for our Church hospitals?

During my few months of service I have been in closer touch with the work of the Cleveland Region, and this has brought a strong realization of the stimulus and enthusiasm created by the working together of a number of societies.

Let us hope that each Region will form a strong central organization.

Two splendid meetings were held at Trinity Cathedral, and the second one is worthy of special mention, this Triennial year, for it was a United Offering meeting. After a program by the Juniors, Bishop Leonard, who was the speaker, presented at the altar the thank-offerings.

What a wonderful thing it would be if *every* Junior in Ohio could have a share in this gift of thanks to be presented in Detroit next October, and which Bishop Lloyd calls "the beautifulest gift of all!" There is still time and opportunity! Let us avail ourselves of the privilege!

For use during Lent, Miss Withers' excellently prepared "Call to Service" was put into the hands of Junior Directors. During the coming year, a clear, clarion call to service will sound for the children of the Church. May we rise to the best that is in us and with love and loyalty for the Cause of Christ answer, "Here am I, Lord, send me."

Educational Department

Looking forward to our work in 1918-1919 the task appeared almost too great to be undertaken. As we look back over the year we feel that so little has been done to hasten the coming of His Kingdom.

Very early in the year we were told of the Advent Call and the Summer and Fall were given over to preparing ourselves for carrying out this plan.

A number of our women attended Summer Conferences at Gambier, Racine and Geneva, and in classes there were fitted for the training of Messengers and Intercessors.

On September 18-19 an Institute for Parish Leaders was held at Trinity Cathedral, opening each day with a celebration of the Holy Communion.

Sixty-four women representing twenty-seven parishes were in attendance. Many meetings and visits and a number of one and two day Institutes were given up because of the prevailing epidemics. Report of all work along these lines in Diocese is based on returned questionnaires from thirty-five parishes.

The Advent Call was carried out in thirty-five parishes—Messengers, 341, Intercessors, 300. Women Visited, 4130. As to specific results, they cannot be stated for they are so largely spiritual, and will only be shown by increased zeal, and interest in larger work to be undertaken.

We feared to take up this work, but as we entered into it we found it a wonderful experience and felt well repaid for time and strength expended.

The co-operation of all women was an inspiration. Ready to go at the call at any cost.

Following the Advent Call, which we felt should have precedence over all other work, came the Mission Study Classes for Leaders, held during the Epiphany Season.

Almost all parish classes were held through Lent.

Mission Study Classes were held in twenty-nine parishes. The text book used was Bishop Burleson's "Our Church and Our Country."

Three Normal Classes—one two day Institute.

Number in all classes—four hundred and sixty.

Programme Meetings—twenty-seven.

Two parishes held monthly programme meetings.

One parish held weekly programme meetings.

Stereopticon Lectures—seventy-two in Province.

Bible Classes, six; Missionary Plays, four; Speakers, twenty-four.

The report of "Spirit of Missions" is not good—we need more active agents to bring about a greater use of this educational magazine. It has been placed in thirty-eight public institutions and six hundred Lenten copies sold. Stir up your solicitors!

Call to Service leaflets were distributed in seventeen parishes. Many parishes using free leaflets from Church Mission's House.

During the year I conducted three Mission Study classes—three Institutes—one for Advent Call for two days—one for one day and one for two days for Mission Study.

I am glad to say there is a growing interest in Summer Conferences and the coming year promises a larger attendance than last year.

Also visited the parishes of Christ Church, St. Mary's, St. Paul's and Cathedral. Busy days and happy ones. There has been a falling off in use of stereopticon slides. Make more use of them. Get in touch with the Rev. Mr. Woodrooffe of Emmanuel Church, he will tell you of many ways by which they are made helpful.

The Junior Educational Secretary, Mrs. E. S. Grauel, has been called to the higher position of Junior Director. I can but wish her God Speed in her new work, and thank her for training Mrs. Ralph Evans of Christ Church to enter the work in her place.

The following is the report of Junior Educational Secretary, Mrs. Grauel.

A good start means everything, and looking back upon the year's work the memory of the Conference at Gambier in June seems to have proved the beginning of activities. It was just a two days' Conference but much of inspiration and help was crowded into its sessions.

The educational work in our Diocese rose to its climax in the Advent Call. In the days of preparation before the first week in Advent, I visited or conducted classes for the Advent Call in Clyde, Massillon, Willoughby, Painesville, Ashtabula, in Emmanuel and St. Mary's, Cleveland. In January a two days' Institute was planned for Junior Leaders of Mission Study Classes. So few were able to come that this class was merged into that of Mrs. Anderson.

The later class for Cleveland leaders proved a success and for six weeks the meetings were held regularly. The Junior text book this year, "His Star in the West," was based upon Bishop Burleson's book and so our young people were studying in simpler form the same problems that were engaging the thoughts of their elders. Important work? Most emphatically so, for boys and girls of today, the men and women of tomorrow will be called upon for the solution of these great questions which confront our Church and State.

During Lent I conducted a Mission Study Class at the Church of the Holy Spirit.

Truly an important year educationally, and yet only a preparation, only steps, lifting us higher that we may have new vision and fresh courage under the banner of the Christ!

During the year twelve Junior Study classes were held, five Missionary plays, one stereopticon lecture, one hundred and forty-six were in classes outside the Sunday School.

Have you an Educational Secretary in your parish? If not will you not see that one is appointed to do this part of our Church's work?

Through her efforts you will obtain an increased interest in Missions—a sense of greater responsibility, stronger organization, larger gifts—a live, active Church!

The year just passed has been filled with the spirit of helpfulness—may the coming days draw us still closer in our work for Him.

“The Little Helpers”

The past year is marked by the saddest event that could have occurred in the Little Helpers Society, the death of Miss Mary E. Hart, its founder. Not since the death of its original member, the dear little baby boy of three years, Gaylord Hart Mitchell, whose sweet childish desire to help his aunt in her work for Missions, and which inspired her to start a Baby's Branch, has the society sustained such a loss. After a long illness Miss Mary Hart was called to rest on August first, 1918, at her home in Rochester, N. Y. For 27 years, ever since its inception, her heart and thoughts had been given to the “Little Helpers” everywhere, for the tiny band composed at first of Gaylord's playmates had grown till its circle included almost every Diocese and even the foreign lands. The children have now lost their dearest friend and the organization its rare, gifted leader and guide.

Our own Little Helpers in Ohio have done their work sweetly and quietly this year, giving in pennies one hundred and forty dollars and sixty-nine cents. This amount comes from sixteen branches, representing about three hundred little ones, and is given as usual to carry on the work of General Missions and to continue the scholarship for Annie May at Glen Alpine.

Our wish for the coming year is, that new leaders may be found to take up this important training of children in the Christian precepts; that the old directors may be inspired afresh with His loving power; and that each Little Helper may grow in grace and in favor with God and Man.

Report of the Third Vice-President

The work of the Women's Auxiliary of the Toledo Region was opened on October 10th, by Bishop DuMoulin, who presided at an all day meeting, held at Trinity Church, Toledo, Ohio. There was a celebration of the Holy Communion at ten o'clock, with the Bishop as Celebrant and Preacher, presenting the Advent Call, making a strong plea to the women of the Church to answer the call of prayer. At noon lunch was served at the Parish House. At the afternoon session the Bishop presided and presented as the speaker of the afternoon, our president Mrs. Knapp, who presented the Advent Call; her address had such an effect on those present that it aroused both the patriotism to their country and the loyalty to their Church. This was also plainly shown in the work accomplished during the first week of Advent.

On December 10th, Dr. Fox of St. John's Church, Detroit, kindly conducted a quiet afternoon in St. Mark's Church, Toledo.

On January 13th, Miss Seaman of Liberia, spoke at a Regional meeting held in St. Mark's Church and made a strong plea for her work in Liberia.

On March 10th, we had with us Chaplain Bell, who conducted a quiet morning for the Women's Auxiliary of the Region. The service was held at St. Mark's Church with Rev. Dr. Chalmers as Celebrant at the Holy Communion, assisted by Chaplain Bell. At the close of the Celebration, the Chaplain gave a special address to the women, on their responsibility to the Church and State, making a strong plea to the women to wake up and accept and exercise their responsibility to the Church and Nation.

On May 8th we accepted the invitation of the Rector of St. Paul's Church, Maumee. At this meeting we had the pleasure of hearing Mrs. Stephens, President of the Women's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Michigan, who gave us a very interesting account of the provision made for the Triennial, which is to be held in Detroit, and extending a kindly invitation to all the women to attend.

We also had at this meeting Bishop DuMoulin, who opened the services and welcomed the women of the Region to Maumee. The Bishop gave his usual inspiring address, and in closing the year's work made the women feel that it had been a year well spent, and a good foundation laid for the special work which we shall be called upon to do, during the coming year.

The United Offering

The United Offering is a thank offering given every three years by the women of the Church, and used to train and support women workers in the home and foreign fields. Our last Triennial United Offering was presented on October 12th, 1916, in Christ Church Cathedral, St. Louis. The amount was \$353,619.76, from more than one hundred Dioceses and Missionary Districts. Ohio's share being \$11,507.09. Should not the United Offering of 1919, which will be presented at Detroit this coming October, at least reach the half million mark? Why not make it a great Victory Offering?

The war is over, peace is coming, "our boys" returning, what rejoicing! But our Soldiers of the Cross are not returning; they are still at the front, fighting against the powers of darkness; and they look to us, as did the Soldiers under the Flag, for love and sympathy, for prayers and gifts. If this world is to be made better, as the result of all this awful war and heroic sacrifices, how can it become so, unless it is made Christian? Christ's Kingdom must prevail. But, "How shall they believe in Him of whom they have not heard? And how shall they hear without a preacher? And how shall they preach except they be sent? As it is written 'How beautiful are the feet of them that preach the gospel of peace, and bring glad tidings of good things!'"

The vision has been given us—our United Offering could easily provide five millions every three years, for the missionary work of the Church, if every woman communicant gave weekly a small offering. Think of the wonderful possibilities that lie before us! I am almost ashamed to say that my Treasurer's book shows:

Bishop Leonard's Report

The five hundred dollars, you so generously grant for my disbursement, is given to the development of one of the important and successful ventures of the Diocese. Your money is expended for work among the colored people of Cleveland, Toledo and Youngstown and I may assure you that it is wisely and well granted by your graciousness. Of the total amount, three hundred were paid the Rev. W. B. Suthern, Jr., missionary at St. Andrew's Church in this city, one hundred were paid to Sister Anna May for her labors among the colored women and girls, and fifty dollars each were paid Rev. Wm. Bagnall of All Saints Mission, Toledo, and to Rev. Dr. Ogburn, of St. Augustine's Mission, Youngstown.

A few statistics from the Journal of 1917-1918 will interest you. St. Andrew's, Cleveland, presented twenty-five candidates for Confirmation; report fifteen baptisms, one hundred and seventeen Sunday School scholars and teachers. All Saints, Toledo, presented eighteen for Confirmation, four for baptism, and has sixty members of the Sunday School. Each of these Missions have Churches. Two have Rectors, and two have parish buildings.

Your gifts are good and of great value and I thank you for your continued help.

The Annual Pledges

The largest one of our pledges is made to the Board of Missions for the annual salary of a lady missionary in China. The amount is \$750. Miss Caroline Fullerton has recently succeeded Miss Margaret Bates, is thus "our own missionary," in Shanghai, a post of much responsibility and importance.

Since the founding of St. Paul's Mission at Glen Alpine in the Blue Ridge Mountains, we have had the honor of paying the salary of our very successful missionary there, Mrs. James Joyner. The work has grown so much that we have now provided Mrs. Joyner with an assistant. We have also, during the past few years, paid a scholarship besides contributing extra sums for the comfort and well being of the Mission. The sum for which we pledge ourselves to Glen Alpine is \$800.

The "Bishop Leonard Fund" is for use among the missions of Ohio, when and where the Bishop thinks it best. We have pledged to him \$500; he has been accustomed to pay \$300 of this amount to the support of the Colored Mission in Cleveland, the remaining \$200 has been expended, this year, to add to the stipend of three other Colored Missionaries in the Diocese.

The "Bishop DuMoulin Fund" will place in the hands of the coadjutor a sum for use at his discretion among missions in the Diocese. The amount thus far subscribed is something over \$300.

The "Expense Fund" covers the cost of publishing the annual report, occasional circulars or leaflets and notices, postage in several departments, traveling expenses in starting new Branches, and that of missionaries whom we invite to address us. It is hoped that each society will contribute \$1 at least, during the year, and that the stronger societies will contribute considerably more.

The "Contingent Fund" is available for all sorts of emergencies and is of great service. Most often it is expended for materials sent to small or weak Parishes to be made into garments; also for necessary articles of clothing not otherwise obtainable. It is sometimes expended for overcoats needed without delay, or for clerical suits.

Varying sums are pledged each year to Bishop Rowe's work in Alaska to General Missions, to the Districts of Oklahoma, Nevada, Asheville, the Philippines and others.

The Bishop Bedell Scholarship and the Julia Bedell Scholarship pay for the education of native pupils in St. John's University, Shanghai, China. They require \$70 each per annum. The "Ohio Scholarship" in St. Elizabeth's—one of the Bishop Hare Schools in South Dakota—pays for the education of an Indian pupil; it requires \$60 per year. Several other scholarships are maintained by individual Parishes, and by the Juniors. The "Foreign Insurance Fund" provides insurance upon the lives of foreign missionaries for the benefit of their families. We of the Ohio Branch have for thirty years paid \$50 each year into this fund;

we have now increased the amount to \$100. It is a fund which should particularly appeal to us.

Those of our pledges which help the Board of Missions to meet its appropriations (and which therefore count toward the "apportionment" of our Parishes) have been this year as follows: Salary of our missionary in China; General Missions (that is to say, Foreign and Domestic Missions); Missions in the Districts of Alaska, W. Nebraska, Oklahoma, East Oklahoma, Wyoming, Utah, the Philippines and Nevada; Japan; School at Cape Palmas, Africa; Julia and Bishop Bedell Scholarships, China; "Sandusky Scholarship," China; "Julia McGrew Scholarship," St. Hilda's, China; and "Ohio Scholarship" in St. Elizabeth's, South Dakota.

Notes

All contributions for the United Offering are to be sent to the Director and Treasurer of that fund, Miss K. L. Mather; other sums are to be sent to the General Treasurer, Mrs. C. S. Bates. All "pledges" are to be paid to Mrs. Bates. If you send money direct to Church Missions House, New York, do not fail to say that it is to be credited to the Woman's Auxiliary, and also state whether it is to be a "special" or may be assigned to the appropriations of the Board.

PLEASE NOTE that packages sent to Mrs. Savage for distribution in missionary boxes should be addressed, *not* to her residence, but to *St. Paul's Parish House, 4108 Euclid Ave., Cleveland*. It is there that the packing is done. The janitor resides in the house and packages are always cared for. All articles received will be assorted by the Secretary, and sent out again according to need and the particular sizes desired. But if you have enough to fill a barrel or box weighing fifty to one hundred pounds or more there is no economy in sending to Mrs. Savage at all; in that case please send direct to the Mission for which it is intended. Before sending a box or barrel or a package by parcels post, be very sure that you have the correct address. Write the name of the State in full. Put your own address, also, on the outside. This is often important for purposes of identification, and it will enable the receiver to acknowledge the gift at once. It is always best, also, to mail the freight receipt to your missionary; he will then be able to secure the box without trouble.

A package weighing fifty pounds or less can be sent by parcels post to all Mission Stations. This is a quick and safe mode of transportation, since freight conditions are so unreliable, and less expensive than by express for isolated places located off a direct route.

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The Secretary requests that she be notified of all changes of Officers in the Auxiliary and Junior Branches as soon as they take place, that the lists in the Year Book may be as nearly correct as possible.

Please take notice also that the number of members in each Society should be given upon the Annual Blank.
