The Annual Meeting at Cleveland

January 19, 1922

The Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council, in the Diocese of Ohio, held its Forty-Fourth Annual Convention on January 19th, 1922, in Trinity Cathedral, Cleveland.

The Rt. Rev. Wm. A. Leonard, Bishop of Ohio, celebrated the Holy Communion, assisted by The Rt. Rev. Frank DuMoulin, Bishop Co-adjutor of Ohio, Archdeacon Patterson and Cannon Abbott.

At the close of the service, the meeting was called to order by the First Vice-President, Mrs. Backus—our President, Mrs. Knapp, being absent in the far East.

After the Roll Call, it was moved and seconded, the reading of the minutes of the last Annual Meeting be dispensed with, as they are printed in the Year Book.

Bishop Leonard, after extending most cordial greetings to the women of the Auxiliary, gave his report in regard to the Bishop Leonard Fund.

Then followed Noon Day Prayer, after which Bishop DuMoulin expressed his grateful appreciation for the unstinted hospitality of the women of the Auxiliary, in his travels throughout the Diocese. He then gave his report, and bid us continue the great work of prayer and service, holding high our Standard, the Cross,—for through these we were helping the world to accomplish great things.

Mrs. Backus, as Acting President, gave her address, and also her report as First Vice-President.

She then read Miss Grace Lindley's annual letter in which she suggests that as three years ago, we called our Thank Offering—"The Victory Thank Offering,"—so this year we call it our "Peace Thank Offering."

The Executive Board resolved that the Auxiliary should observe March 3rd as a Day of Prayer for Missions, also suggests we send back by Madanu Yajima, a message of good will to the women of Japan.

This was followed by Mrs. Hart reading a delightful letter from our dear President, Mrs. Knapp, in which she tells of the good use she has made of the money given her by the women of the Diocese, for the work in our foreign mission field.

Letters of appreciation were also read, written by recipients of these gifts.

Mrs. C. C. Bolton being unable to be present, the report of the Harcourt Fund was given by Mrs. Norton.

A committee on resolutions of sympathy on the death of Miss Julia Emery was named by the Chair, consisting of Mrs. Norton, Miss Wright, Mrs. Savage.

Mrs. Marshall, our Secretary, then read her report—also that of our Treasurer, Mrs. Bates.

The meeting adjourned for luncheon and recess of an hour.

The afternoon session was opened by the Convention extending a vote of thanks to the women of Trinity for their kind hospitality and appreciation for which was expressed by a rising vote.

Mrs. Winsor then nominated Mrs. Marshall and Mrs. Anderson as delegates to the meeting of the Church Service League to be held January 20th in St. Paul's Church, Cleveland.

The report of St. Luke's Hospital Fund, Tokyo, was read by the Chairman, Mrs. Shields, of Toledo, and showed Ohio is being successful in fulfilling her pledge for this splendid work.

Mrs. Holland, Third Vice-President's report was received—also her report as Chairman of Kuling School Fund, in which she made a strong plea for us to stand behind our missionaries whom we have sent so far from home.

Much to our regret, illness prevented Miss Mather from being with us, and her reports as Diocesan Treasurer of the United Offering, Diocesan Chairman of the Emery Fund, Racine College Fund and China Famine Fund, were read by the Secretary.

Mrs. Cook not being able to be present, her report of The Provincial House of Church Women was read by the Secretary.

The Annual Report of The Church Periodical Club, by Mrs. Comrey, the Diocesan Correspondent, was followed by Mrs. Anderson, Educational Secretary, giving her report.

The speaker of the day was Archdeacon Wentworth, of Kentucky, who told of the brave battle being fought for the spread of Christ's Kingdom in this isolated mountainous region. He said: "There are about three hundred thousand people of Anglo Saxon and Scotch-Irish descent, who are 100 years behind in civilization—over two-thirds not able to read or write, and if the Church had only, years ago, seen the vision of what could be done through the Cumberland mountain schools—we would not have to turn away hundreds of children, as we have in the past.

"I sincerely ask you to give us your sympathy, give us your prayers, so that in the near future we can have churches and schools, and then,—more schools."

Pledges were taken for Archdeacon Wentworth's work in Kentucky.

Bishop Leonard read his appointment of officers for the coming year, and, there being no further business to transact, the meeting was adjourned.

Bishop Leonard said the closing prayer and gave the benediction.

Address of the Acting President

While we regret the absence of our President, we rejoice that she is able, for a little time, to lay down the burdens she has borne for so many years, and enjoy the rest and inspiration of new scenes.

For eight years she has carried on our Diocesan work with quiet efficiency, with wise judgment, and without ostentation. Gladly would she have gone, free and unhampered by any thought of duties that would await her on her return; although willing to give us of the inspiration she will receive in seeing the work, and knowing the workers who are extending Christ's Kingdom in foreign lands.

Our good Bishop remarked, on hearing of Mrs. Knapp's decision to travel for a few months, "What is a Vice-President for—if not to do the work, when the President has leave of absence?" So we have persuaded Mrs. Knapp to call this her "leave of absence," and deprecatingly and prayerfully your Vice-President is trying to do her work.

During the Jubilee Year of the Woman's Auxiliary, from October, 1920, through October, 1921, it has been my pleasure to visit twenty parishes in the interests of the Emery Fund, and to read a paper, which I had prepared, by request, on the History of the Woman's Auxiliary during the last fifty years.

I wish to express my appreciation of the pleasant hospitality I have received from the members of our Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary on these occasions.

There was a quick and generous response given to a letter, which I sent out, for the Bishop Rowe Foundation. Mrs. Bates reports receiving \$592.00 in answer to that appeal.

The Conferences in the Cleveland Region have been well attended. In the spring of 1921, Mrs. Herbert Wood was elected Chairman of the Region.

The admirable program, arranged by her and her able committee, has been sent each month to the Rectors of the Parishes of the Region, and to the Secretaries of the Branches. We ask your interest in these Conferences.

There was a Quiet-Day conducted by the Rev. Dr. Chalmers of St. Mark's, Toledo, which was of great spiritual help to all who attended.

In answer to many inquiries with regard to the Emergency Fund I have been asked to say that all monies given to that Fund will revert to the pledge, we have made, to continue for three years to the Kuling School, China.

The Gambier Conference brought us into contact with the great minds of the Church. The attendance was large; and it is hoped that many more, next year, will avail themselves of this splendid opportunity for growth, in all that makes our Church and Christian life worth while.

The Rev. Wyatt Brown, D.D., conducted each morning a Bible Conference. These conferences were so spiritually helpful, we have invited him to give us on March 3rd a "Quiet Day." We beg of you, as many as possible, to take advantage of this great opportunity. Notices will be sent to your Rectors, and we ask you to speak to one another of this privilege.

A telegram was received, last week, from Miss Lindley, announcing the death of our beloved Miss Emery. A telegram was sent in return, expressing our sorrow, and sympathy.

We rejoice she celebrated the 50th anniversary of the work, which she had done so much to buildup, and we rejoice that the response for the Emery Fund was so generous, that she could feel that our Missionaries, whose cares and burdens she had borne in her heart so long, could have the ministrations they needed.

And so she fell asleep.

I will ask all present to stand in reverent respect and love, for our departed leader.

We thank Thee, O Lord, for the good example of this Thy servant, who has finished her course in faith, and now rests from her labours; and may we, the members of this Woman's Auxillary so live our lives, and do our work, that we may, like her, receive our Master's commendation—

"Well done, good and faithful servants."

The President's Letter

Manila, P. I., December 1, 1921.

Dear Ohio Women:

For four months we have been travelling with minds as well as bodies. Impressions have crowded upon us with such kaleidoscopic rapidity we have wondered if we could retain them. I have tried to see many things with you in mind, and with your eyes.

It is out of the question to give you, in the space of a letter, more than the barest outline of some of the work in which we as Auxiliary women are especially interested, and to tell you the disposition I have made of your wonderful Good-bye Gift. I hope you have all had my thanks through the columns of *Church Life*.

We were in Honolulu in vacation-time and could not see the schools in session or other activities in full swing. Bishop Restarch was most kind in showing us the fine buildings and equipment he was able to compass in twenty devoted years. We were privileged to be present at the first service of the new Bishop, and it seemed to me we were representatives of the Church at home which must stand behind him in the tasks that lie ahead.

Tokyo brought our first entrance into foreign missions. Your thoughts fly at once to St. Luke's Hospital and to St. Paul's College Library. The old and crowded hospital tells its own story and we were delighted to know that the new building only awaits acceptance of the plans for work to be begun.

Not all the funds needed are available, but it is possible to make a beginning. Dr. Teusler has secured a very fine site, with a building on it which can be used for the training school.

In St. Paul's Library the first book I casually took from the shelves held a C. P. C. book-plate. The shelves are filling up, but there are many empty spaces, and we, in Ohio, must support Mrs. Conrey in her efforts to have us do our share.

In Kyoto we had reason to be thankful for the part we had five years ago in the new building for St. Agnes' School. It is well-equipped and substantial, and already filled to its capacity.

Two branches of work in the District of Kyoto captivated my heart, one, the kindergartens, and the other a Day Nursery, of which you may have read in one of the spring numbers of the "Spirit of Missions." We visited two kindergartens in the city of Kyoto and another at Koriyama, a little town outside of Nava. The latter is struggling along in a totally inadequate building, but has secured a fine plot of ground for a new house.

I was sure you would all have been as interested as I, so I gave Bishop Tucker \$200.00 from the Ohio W. A. for some special part in the new building, and \$50.00 for the Day Nursery. He feels that the latter

work will be an incentive and an example for the Japanese to follow in other centers. He sent his most grateful appreciation to you all. I wish you might have heard the heartfelt thanks of Miss Ambler, supervisor of the kindergartens, and read the letter from Miss Peck of the Crèche. They are both U. T. O. workers.

I must stop here to pay tribute to our fine body of women workers in both Japan and China, young women whom we may be proud to have there as representatives of the Church and American womanhood. I took pains to meet those working under the U. T. O., college women, refined and gentle, whose far-reaching influence we can none of us measure. Can we not send one of our own, of our best, to help and relieve them?

On our arrival in Shanghai we were privileged to spend two nights at St. John's University as guests of Dr. and Mrs. Pott and to see the daily life of the College and St. Mary's Hall. Those of you who have supported scholarships there for many years will be interested to know that four of the five men now representing China at the Washington Conference are alumni of St. John's, and another has been sent by the business men of Shanghai to be an unofficial adviser.

We had hoped to see the ground broken for the new St. Mary's, but the contractors were not ready.

After seeing the plans and visiting the new site, it seemed as if in imagination we could see the wall and the gate-house and the new buildings. I am so hoping to hear from Mrs. Bates that our gifts, made in response to the appeal a year ago, have reached a thousand dollars.

It was a great pleasure to meet Miss Fullerton, O. O. M., a lovely gentle woman.

I shall have to hurry you through China to Wuchang and there to the Church General Hospital and to the little Chapel, our memorial to our beloved Mrs. Leonard.

The hospital is considered a model for Central China and the Chapel is its heart. It is very satisfying in its beauty and dignity and does not seem an unfitting memorial to one who will always be dear to us. We were permitted to be there for a seven o'clock service on a Sunday, and you all, as well as our dear Bishop and Mrs. Leonard, were in my thoughts and prayers.

The hospital not only cares for the sick and suffering within its walls and free clinics, but Mrs. Bliss, wife of the physician in charge of the men's department, has instituted work for incurables.

In addition to her candy factory and decorative work, she has provided a simple hostel for them.

I found there was no heating plant and no running water in the hospital, because the funds gave out. The women in Wuchang (connected with the mission) have formed a Hospital Auxiliary and I promptly made the Ohio Branch a life member! The money (from your gift

to me) will enable them to install a boiler already purchased and by Christmas they expect to have the operating rooms heated and the steam sterilizer working.

I also added \$25.00 as a gift to the hostel from you.

On the way down the Yangste we stopped for twenty-four hours at Wuhu. The dear Sisters at St. Lioba's seem like our own because of the blessed work the Order is doing in Cleveland. Sister Constance, too, belonged in St. James' Parish.

They are doing a splendid work along varied lines. When we saw the poor diseased creatures to whom Sister Constance was tenderly ministering, we felt like Levites! You would want to help that dispensary, would you not? You have, with a gift of fifty dollars.

One of the most forlorn classes in China, where most classes are forlorn, are the rickshaw men. They touched Sister Edith's heart, and, on faith, she established a rest-house for them. You have given her twenty-five dollars for this and I am sending her gratitude to you in Ohio.

Another stop was made at Misih where the Central Theological School is temporarily located and where fine work is being done in other lines. Here we have a splendid young physician, Dr. Lee.

He was sent there when he was twenty-three to develop a medical work. He has succeeded in seventeen years in building a modern hospital and in carrying on a Free Clinic with a clientele of two hundred and fifty.

And it is supported, not by funds from home, but largely because he has turned into the work what he has earned from private practice. Expenses have mounted till we found there was danger of the Clinic being closed. You would not wish that to happen, so now the Ohio Branch will care for it for five months.

When I reach home I hope to find twelve branches who will each be responsible for one month's expense of ten dollars, and then Ohio will have her own free Clinic in China.

Your Good-bye Gift is far-reaching, is it not? You blessed me with it first, and now it is spreading out in these many ways. Please keep the recipients in your interest and prayers.

We have just reached Manilla and have yet to see the work here, but this must go in order to reach you when you are all together.

We shall probably be in India, but my thoughts and prayers will be with you on January 19th.

Report of the Third Vice-President

A. D. 1921

During the past year, five Regional Meetings have been held in Toledo.

On February 24, 1921, the members of this region were the guests of the Woman's Auxiliary of St. Andrew's Church. Mrs. D. W. Conrey, Diocesan Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club, was the speaker. Her address was a strong plea for books for the library at Tokio, Japan.

The celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in Trinity Church on October 14th. The Acting President, Mrs. Eliza Backus, honored this region with her presence. It is needless to say that the members of the region were delighted to have her here. Her topic was: "The Past and the Future of the Woman's Auxiliary."

On October 28th, the members of the region were again the guests of Trinity Woman's Auxiliary. At this meeting they had the pleasure of hearing Bishop Overs of Liberia. The Bishop made a strong appeal for our help among his people in Africa. A number of pledges were made, which showed that a strong interest had been aroused. Mrs. Charles H. Shields, of Toledo, spoke in behalf of St. Luke's Hospital Fund, and I believe she was made to feel that the women of the Auxiliaries would stand firmly behind her, and do their part to fill the quota.

On November 7th, the members of the region were the guests of St. Mark's Auxiliary. Luncheon was served by the women of the church. We were delighted to have with us Miss Mather, the United Offering Director of the Diocese. Miss Mather urged us to be more diligent in our education concerning and in our collection of the United Thank Offering for 1922. She also spoke of the Emery Fund. Deaconess Newell who has recently become one of the Staff at Hooker School, Mexico, gave a very comprehensive explanation of what a deaconess really is. Doctor Jean Turner Zimmerman, of Chicago, gave a very stirring address on China.

On November 28th, at St. Mark's Church, the region had as its speaker Doctor Charles Riefsneider of St. John's College at Tokio, Japan. The Doctor told of the great work being done by the staff at the College, and also paid tribute to the work being done at St. Luke's Hospital.

The members of this region owe a debt of gratitude which they never will be able to repay to the speakers who have come to them during the past year. Perhaps if they could realize the real missionary and christian spirit that they have aroused in the women who compose the Woman's Auxiliary of Toledo Region, they would feel amply repaid for their labors.

May I announce that the money given by the various organizations to whom Dr. Zimmerman spoke during her trip through the diocese has been given to the Gate Dispensary and School at Wuhu, China. The amount was \$181.00.

Annual Report of the Secretary

In commencing our second year under the reorganization of the work of the Woman's Auxiliary, we are glad to be able to congratulate the women of the different Branches of the Auxiliary on the wonderful spirit of co-operation that has been shown by all.

The broad field for service which has opened up under the new order of things has united our women in much progressive work this past year, and made them to feel forcibly their responsibility to the faithful trusts of the Church.

During the Lunch hour at the last annual meeting one dear woman said to me, "I have been sent as a delegate to this meeting: What shall I do?"

"I cannot carry back all those figures, what shall I tell them when I reach home?" It gave me a thought for the delegates, they had really come for something more than figures.

I asked her to forget the figures, but to listen to what the Educational Secretary had to say, and that Dr. Pott, the speaker of the day, would give her an opportunity to take home to her women much that would interest them, as he told of the good work they were doing for the spread of Christ's Kingdom in China and the Far East.

So, leaving figures aside for a few moments, I shall try to lay before you (so that you may be more familiar with them) some of the important points in connection with the Box Work and the Supply Department which is now established.

The slips, from which the allotments for boxes are made up, are sent to the missionaries and mission stations in the month of May of each year, to be filled out by them stating their needs and wants for the coming year.

After being carefully gone over and approved at the Church Missions House they are divided and allotted to the different Dioceses during the month of August. So many boxes for each Diocese which are received by the Diocesan Box Secretary to be distributed at that time among the different Branches, giving the officers of each Branch ample time to make their plans for assuming a portion of the responsibility which the Secretary has promised they will carry.

Provision has been made for the smaller Parishes, so that where willing workers are, the Contingent Fund will supply them with materials, and enable them to do their bit which in all cases has been most helpful to the cause; and the fine Missionary Spirit shown has been a most valuable asset to its Parish.

How splendid it would be if each branch of the Auxiliary would try to develop more and more this coming year the Missionary Spirit among

all of its women—what a wonderful year it would be. Shall we hope that it will be so? Let it be part of the life of the Parish—know our duty and do it.

In many cases the Branches have not yet adjusted themselves to the re-organization of the work, so that it has unintentionally resulted in disappointment to the Missionaries and Missions eagerly awaiting their help.

While the raising of money by many of the Branches is quite necessary to help them provide materials for sewing, it seems to me that some plan could be adopted whereby the autumn months would not be given up to Bazaars and Supper Sales. The best part of your working year, and the months also in which we are expected to provide as much as is possible for the personal Boxes. Think it out for yourselves. Why not sew for the Bazaars the last three months and be in readiness for the Sale in the autumn, thereby making every Parish which is enrolled in the Auxiliary, even the weakest, all working for the comfort of its missionaries.

The Supply Department will contain all articles sent in by the different Parishes to form a nucleus of stock, so that in an emergency the allotments can be filled quickly.

It can readily be seen that the Supply Department can be used as a means toward efficiency in caring for the allotments at once, if necessary. We are asked to do as much as is possible towards filling the personal boxes before Christmas and to have all completed by Easter time.

A number of the Branches have contributed generously to this Department, and we have by their efforts been enabled to help somewhat before the first of January. That being the time in which we are asked to do most. The valuation of supplies sent to the Store Room has reached the sum of \$625.37.

The number of Boxes completed during the year was 49 valued at \$11,916.66. Exceeding the value of last year's boxes by \$1,405.21.

May we seriously consider the service expected from us and by our interest to stimulate the Christ spirit in the hearts and minds of all Auxiliary women—all working from love of the Master that our influence may be felt throughout the whole world.

The Supply Department

The Supply Department is under the supervision of Miss Emma Dake, who makes all acknowledgments and is ably assisted by Mrs. E. W. Palmer, who looks after the distribution.

Report of the Treasurer

The total sum received from all sources by your Treasurer, during the year 1921, is \$7,744.70. The total sum disbursed, is \$6,746.97. The balance held in treasury is made up chiefly of funds contributed for Glen Alpine—where a fine Parish House is building, and in the Expense Fund—toward the publication of the Year Book next month.

This has been a year of great activity in the Auxiliary, notwithstanding the fact that it has been a year of financial depression everywhere and of real "hard times" for the most of us. I have the great pleasure of telling you that our Fund for St. Mary's Hall, Shanghai, has reached the sum of one thousand dollars. That was the figure we had set, in our dreams, but scarcely hoped for. All the various scholarships and the salaries pledged by Ohio Branch have been paid in full. Again, we have had the happiness of turning over to Bishop Leonard our usual \$500 for his work; and to Bishop DuMoulin \$317. That joyous special of the year—the Bishop Rowe Foundation—stands now at the goodly figure, \$592.

But beside the money which has passed through my hands, Miss Mather will tell us of the fine sums she has collected for the Emery Fund, and for the United Thank Offering; Mrs. Cooke will inform us of her collections for "Carry-on-Fund"; Mrs. Conrey, of the Church Periodical Club; Mrs. Bolton, of the Harcourt Scholarship; and from The Toledo boundaries, you will hear of generous sums for Kuling School, China, and St. Luke's Hospital, Tokio—collected by Mrs. Holland, and Mrs. Shields. And all the while these contributions were being gathered in, there at the center, has stood our never-weary Secretary, Mrs. Marshall, pushing the matter of the Missionary Boxes to values beyond anything ever attempted before! Thus, you will agree, in all material ways, the record has been most encouraging.

And the inner fire has not been neglected. Mrs. Anderson will tell us of the many study classes, of mission meetings and addresses, of Quiet Days, and the Gambier Conference for Church Workers.

It has been a good year. On all lines, we are marching forward. On all lines, there is ever increasing efficiency and expansion of interest. For all of this, we thank God, and take courage.

For the year to come, I beg that all the supporters of salaries and of scholarships will continue their pledges as heretofore. If any Branch must withdraw from these, I beg that I may be notified early in the year, in order that I may have a chance to try for others to take the vacant places. If any wish to increase the pledges, let it be for salary of "our own missionary." The salary is \$900, and the margin in our gifts is rather close. For twenty years, our Ohio Branch has taken to itself the privilege and

the happiness of supporting one whole missionary all by itself! This lady is now Miss Caroline Fullerton, Principal of St. Mary's School, Shanghai. Mrs. Knapp met her, last month, and was charmed with her personality. As we cannot go as missionaries ourselves (much as some of us might wish it), let us find great satisfaction in the thought that, day in, day out, we have our representative there.

Let us find great satisfaction, too, that in the Blue Ridge Mountain region of North Carolina, we have another representative, Mrs. Joyner, still carrying on her beneficent work. At Glen Alpine, this year, Mrs. Knapp has generously provided a new roof for the Chapel, and a porch for the Mission House. The Parish House, there, also a gift of Mr. and Mrs. Knapp, is now nearing completion.

There is one of our pledges, for which there should be a large increase—the Contingent Fund. That Fund provides the clergy-suits and overcoats, which very often a Society undertaking the Missionary Box is unable to provide. For, as you all know, these require very plump sums of cash! This Contingent Fund, *also*, should enable our Secretary to purchase bolts of material to be made up into garments, which she may turn over to the little groups of Churchwomen in the Mission Stations. In these, where people are as yet so few, that all the money raised is needed to maintain their own services, there will be found splendid women, willing and eager to give their labor. For more than twenty years, the Ohio Branch has pursued this plan; but, for the first time, this year, the Secretary has been compelled to decline such offers for want of money to buy the material. Do not let us allow this to happen again! Aside from the value of the made-up garments, this method has been of the utmost service in giving to these little Mission Stations an outlook beyond their own small boundaries, in building up the unusual and most happy solidarity of this Diocese, and in achieving greater interest in Missions.

So, we ask for increased pledges to the Contingent Fund. We ask generous gifts to Bishop Burton's work, about which Archdeacon Winchester will tell you. Doubtless, you will hear resounding appeals from Miss Mather; for this is the *climax year* of the United Thank Offering. You see, a good, full year of work stretches before us!

The first fifty years in the life of our Auxiliary are now ended. God alone knows all the loyalty and devotion that has gone into it! With 1922, we have already entered upon our second half-hundred years of labor. Probably, none of us who are here now, will be here when that fifty years is ended. It is *now, now* that we are having our chance! Let us each realize the responsibility of it, and the privilege of it. Let us each, *now*, while we have our chance, do all we can to bring to earth that Kingdom of Heaven for which we pray!

United Thank Offering

We are near the end of this triennial, for in September of this year the women of the church are to meet in Portland, Oregon, at the time of the General Convention, and at their opening service this United Thank Offering will be presented. This time it will not be from the Woman's Auxiliary, but from the women of the Church, and it is hoped it may reach a million dollars! The need for women workers is so great, every Missionary Bishop is calling for more helpers, and they must be trained and sent.

The women of the Church responded so nobly when the call came for the Jubilee Fund, surely if they can only realize how greatly each woman's mite is needed for this work of sending trained women, where "the Harvest truly is great, but the labourers few," not one million, but *two* would be the result.

I wish to call attention, and I want the message taken to each Parish in this Diocese, that *all* contributions must be collected this year in August, for I must have it not later than the first day of September.

The General Convention meeting in Portland, Oregon, a month earlier than usual. The Treasurer of the Presiding Bishop and Council has sent me his yearly statement of the United Thank Offering, in which he reports there are 104 workers in the Foreign fields and 66 in the Domestic, 14 retired, and 5 in training, and there is only enough money in the treasury to take care of those in service, no new appointments can be made until after the 1922 United Thank Offering. In 1921, 18 were appointed.

The Emery Fund

It is with great pleasure I can report the celebration of our Golden Jubilee the Fiftieth Anniversary of the Woman's Auxiliary.

On October 13th, 1921, a meeting of the Cleveland Region was held in Trinity and the program was devoted to a review of the Woman's Auxiliary, what it stood for and what it had accomplished. A letter was sent to all branches, asking for an observance of the Anniversary Day, Sunday, October 16th, by a Corporate Communion of the women of each parish, which were quite generally observed. I am proud to report that I received contributions from 62 branches in Ohio, and have sent to Mrs. Markrey, the National Treasurer, \$2,151.65. I should like to report that as Provincial Representative of this mid-west Province, comprising twelve Dioceses—that all twelve responded.

Southern Ohio being the banner Diocese, her contributions amounting to \$3,134.13; Ohio stands next with \$2,151.65, and Mrs. Markrey writes me that she has in bank over \$90,000.00. A wonderful tribute of what the women of the church can do when a big object is put before them. This fund, as you know, is to be a *trust* fund, given to the Presiding Bishop and Council, the interest to be used for the benefit of Missionaries at home on furlough. What a pleasure it must have been to Miss Julia Emery, who had so at heart the needs of the returned Missionaries for either medical care, study or recreation, to know that for all time there would be a fund for their benefit.

It seems fitting to express in this connection our deep appreciation and loving gratitude for the life of this sainted lady, Julia C. Emery, known throughout the length and breadth of this land, and in our foreign mission fields, where her thought and loving care has extended. She entered into Life Eternal in January, 1921.

To her sister and those associated with her at the Mission House, New York, we extend our sincere sympathy.

Saving of Racine College

Last year I made a plea for the saving of Racine College, and asked for your support of the pledge I had made for Ohio, of \$1,000.00.

Last February I attended a meeting of the Racine Commission, in Chicago, and learned that work had been started—the Taylor Hall, and Dr. DeKoven's house, all one building, had been re-roofed in a splendid manner, and much money had been expended in plumbing, putting all the buildings in a sanitary condition, for the Summer Conference, which was held there last summer, from July 12th to 22nd.

At present nothing is being done awaiting the decision of a lawsuit brought against the College by heirs who claim the property, as it is no longer a boys' school.

Money is still needed, and I will be very happy to receive contributions to add to the four I have already received during the year. One from the Woman's Auxiliary of Christ Church, Cleveland, the other three from individuals, one from St. Paul's, one from Emmanuel, and one from St. James' Churches, Cleveland; total \$35.00.

Report on the Provincial House of Church Women

The Provincial House of Church Women met in St. Paul's Church, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, on October 5th and 6th, with 32 delegates answering the roll call.

These delegates are elected from the twelve Dioceses in our Province of the Mid-West—five from each Diocese, and, if possible, to represent these five organizations: The Girls Friendly Society; Daughters of the King; Woman's Auxiliary; St. Barnabas' Guild for Nurses, and the Church Periodical Club. The delegates are elected by the Diocesan Church Service League, if there is one, if not by the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary. We should have had 60 delegates. You see how far we fell short.

Our own Diocese was represented by three: Mrs. Bolton, Miss Mather and Mrs. Cooke.

As this House is a part of the Provincial Synod, we always meet at the same time and place. The Synod met at the Cathedral, where both mornings the Holy Communion was celebrated at 7.30; and breakfast and luncheon were served there both days for both Houses.

On account of the absence of our President, Mrs. Knapp, our Vice-President, Mrs. Atkinson of Detroit, presided.

Our first business was to appoint a Committee to carry to the Synod word of our being organized and ready for work. The reports from our three Standing Committees were excellent, and showed that much investigation had been made throughout the year.

Missions—Mrs. Ivins, of Nashotali, Wis., Chairman.

Social Service—Deaconess Fuller, of Chicago, Chairman.

Religious Education—Mrs. Atkinson, of Detroit, Chairman.

A very remarkable report was given by our Provincial representative on the National Church Service League, Mrs. Sargent, of Grand Rapids, Michigan. The House voted to have this report printed for distribution. We also had a report from the Provincial Treasurer of the Emery Fund, Miss Mather.

A Nominating Committee was appointed, who brought in the following names to serve as officers for the ensuing year:

President, Mrs. Sargent of Grand Rapids, Michigan.

Vice-President, Mrs. Atkinson of Detroit, Michigan.

Secretary, Miss Francis Bussy, Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

Treasurer, Mrs. F. W. Bohl, Galesburg, Illinois.

The report was accepted, and these women unanimously elected.

We were invited to go in a body to the Synod, where the report of our deliberations was read by Deaconess Fuller, Chairman of the Committee to prepare such a report. We had the privilege of a very clear talk from Mrs. Wade, the Supply Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, from the Missions House, who was on her way East, also a very inspir-

ing address from Mrs. Biller, the Organizing Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, who was on her way West. These were both unexpected treats. The Treasurer reported \$419.00 in the Carry-on-Fund, of which Ohio gave \$143.75, a little more than a third, not that Ohio did her best, or nearly as well as she ought to have done, but that the other eleven Dioceses did less—if each Diocese had done even as well as Ohio, there would have been \$1,725.00 at our disposal instead of \$419.00. After consultation with Dean Long of Quincy, who is the Executive Secretary of the Synod, and very conversant with the needs in the Province, the House voted \$200.00 towards the money yet needed in the rebuilding the Church for the Oneida Indians, in Wisconsin, and \$200.00 for the work among the Deaf Mutes in the Province.

As I have charge of this Carry-on-Fund in Ohio, may I take this opportunity to plead that every Parish give at least a little something to this Fund—and to send it to me and not to Mrs. Bates. The Synod accepted an invitation to meet in Chicago next year. It has not usually met the year when the General Convention holds its great meeting, but 1922 is to be an exception to this earlier rule.

It seems to those of us who attend these meetings of the Provincial House of Church Women, that it certainly draws the Dioceses more closely together, we are more interested in the work of the other Dioceses, it enlarges our vision and helps to break down Parochialism and Diocesanism, and makes us feel we are privileged members of one great family, desiring to give ourselves in most loving service to the hastening of the coming of the Kingdom of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

Report of Educational Secretary

The object of Christian education is the winning of souls for Christ. Or as the accepted aim of all Mission Study tells us—"To know the Living Christ and to make Him known!"

The three-fold plan of the Woman's Auxiliary is Study, Prayer and Service—it needs them all to make the work complete.

We must first know of the need before we can give our prayers and service.

How can we know if we do not devote a portion of our time to the study of the field—be it in parish, community, diocese, nation or world?

A definite programme should be carried on in each parish and mission through an Educational Secretary.

Appoint one who has a deep interest in Missions and through her leadership will be developed a strong missionary spirit. In your programme make use of Discussion Groups, Missionary Plays, Pageants, Stereopticon Slides, Missionary Speakers, Bible Classes, Programme Meetings, use of Spirit of Missions and other Church papers and leaflets.

The Stereopticon Slides for use in this Province are stationed at Emmanuel Parish House, Cleveland, in care of Miss Ada Crary.

There are twenty-one sets on hand now with more to come within a few weeks.

The Diocesan Educational Committee composed of Mrs. Herbert Wood, Cleveland, and Mrs. Harold Booth, Lakewood, with Mrs. L. W. Stryker, of Youngstown, hold themselves ready to help in any way.

Owing to illness, Mrs. Walbridge, of Toledo, has been obliged to resign from this committee.

As the Gambier Summer Conference gave leaders an opportunity to prepare for their parish work it was thought unnecessary to hold the usual institute in the Fall. The days spent at Gambier were profitable and pleasant.

With Mrs. Backus and Mrs. Marshall I spent an interesting day with the women of the Church of the Redeemer, Lorain. They presented a fine programme, using the General Survey as a base.

The Educational work in the Diocese reported from thirty-three parishes was as follows:

Thirty-five Discussion Groups in twenty-two parishes.

Programme Meeting, 77 in thirteen parishes.

Missionary Address, 67.

Plays, 12.

Pageants, 2.

Bible Classes, 33.

Reading Circles 2.

Spirit of Missions in Public Institutions 26.

Stereopticon Slides used 119 times in Province.

Attendance from Ohio to Gambier Summer Conference 171.

Attendance from Ohio to Racine Summer Conference 2.

Attendance from Ohio to Wellesley Summer Conference 1.

The registrations for Gambier Summer Conference number 316.

As you study conditions in your parish you will find results in proportion to educational work accomplished.

Do not be satisfied unless there is a quickened spiritual life, increased interest in Missions, more active work, larger Missionary offerings, larger offerings through U. T. O. because:

Annal Report of the Church Periodical Club

January, 1921, to January, 1922

This is the day of big undertakings for the Church Periodical Club. Our regular work must go on, the forwarding of our books and magazines, as soon as read, to those who need them, the collecting of postals and pictures, Christmas and Easter cards, music, victrola records, games, toys, puzzles, etc., to be sent to our church schools, hospitals and mission centers.

But in connection with this work, the C. P. C. is asked more and more to take over large projects, that have to do with books and magazines. Our first united effort in the diocese began late in 1920, when the national C. P. C. was given the task of collecting \$15,000 for the purchase of books for the library of St. Paul's College, Tokyo, Japan. We were given until August, 1922, to complete this fund. We hope that all Parishes that have not contributed to this fund, will do so within the next six months. Those who heard Dr. Reifsneider, President of St. Paul's, tell of the far reaching good accomplished by this library, know that it is worthy of our best efforts.

We have already been asked this year to give a theological library to a missionary bishop for his workers in the isolated missions. The need for these libraries is urgent and the supply has never equalled the demand. Our workers in the missionary districts are far from large cities, no access to libraries, with incomes too limited to permit buying theological books that are absolutely necessary to properly carry on their work. It is the business of the Church Periodical Club to meet such demands as these.

Report of the China Famine Fund

SALE OF LIFE SAVING STAMPS

In February, Mrs. Knapp appointed a committee, Mrs. H. C. Wood of Trinity, Mrs. Jewitt of Christ Church, and Mrs. McClure of Emmanuel, to take charge of the sale of China Life Saving Stamps to aid the China Famine Fund. The Stamps were sold for three cents apiece.

Almost all Branches took part in the work and the Auxiliary of Grace Church, Cleveland, led in the number of stamps sold and the amount sent in.

All money was sent directly to the national treasurer Mr. Franklin, who cabled it to Bishop Graves of China.

Report of Chairman St. Luke's Hospital Fund

The women of the Diocese of Ohio have been asked to raise a minimum of \$1,000.00 towards the \$100,000.00 pledged to St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo, and in the spring of 1921 active steps were taken to raise this amount. A Chairman was appointed by Mrs. Knapp, and with her advice and assistance the work has made good progress.

The Ohio apportionment was divided between eight regions, and a Chairman appointed in each one, they in turn to secure a chairman in each parish.

As the \$1,000.00 asked for was a minimum amount, it was decided to suggest the following apportionment:

The River Region we have been unable to organize, and there has been no return from any parish. The response has been most gratifying and sometimes surprising. One mission station where there are only eight communicants and but five members in the Guild, sent \$5.00 with an apology that it was so small a gift.

Another treasurer wrote that their Guild had disbanded, but there was a small amount left in the treasury and she was glad to send that to help with the fund.

Out of the 112 or 114 organized parishes and missions in the Diocese, only thirty-three have responded up to date, but as the time has been extended to Easter the Chairman has great hopes of reaching many more parishes by that time.

Her thanks are specially due Mrs. Baker, Miss Mather, Mrs. Murdock, Mrs. Frank, Mrs. Davies, Mrs. Conner, Mrs. Baynton and Mrs. Howison for their loyal help and support.

Report of Chairman of Kuling School Fund 1921

The amount pledged for the year was \$300.00. The amount received and sent to Mr. Franklin was \$220.00. A few people sent money direct to Mr. Franklin, and up to the present time I have not received a statement of the amount.

May I tell you a little about the school? Kuling School was built especially for the education of the children of missionaries. It is situated in the hills and is both healthful and beautiful. It prevents the pitiful breaking up of families, almost universal in the past when children were sent home for school, and thus relieves missionary parents from what has been the source of more pain and anxiety than all other causes combined.

The school is now in its fifth year. It has a finely equipped faculty of ten members and had, last year, an enrollment of ninety pupils, coming from eleven different missions.

The chief need of the school is a supporting constituency to provide annually the money needed for the school's maintenance. The amount asked from Ohio is \$500.00 annually for three years.

A letter recently received by me from your president, Mrs. Knapp, says: "So many times while we were in China, I wished you might hear for yourself the expressions of the value and need of Kuling School. It is evidently adding tremendously to the efficiency and morale of our workers who have children. When the boys and girls are sent to Kuling, the parents know they are in beautiful surroundings, not too far from their homes, and are receiving an education equal to what they would secure at a good school in America. You can imagine what this means to ease of mind for the parents. The school originated in the mind of a gentleman who saw the need when he was visiting in China, and for several years he met the deficit, though he was not possessed of large means."

Now what are the women of the Diocese of Ohio going to do about this? The money given this year comes almost entirely from our Woman's Auxiliary Branches. I should be so pleased if I might have a few personal pledges, so that next year I might be able to report our quota filled, instead of \$200.00 short. We stood behind our boys who were fighting our battles in France. Let us stand just as firmly behind the soldiers whom we have sent to fight the battle of Christ in the mission field.

The support of Kuling School is the only thing that China missionaries are asking for themselves.

Report on the Harcourt Scholarship

It is with mingled feelings of satisfaction and disappointment that I make the report of the Sarah L. Leonard Fund for education at Harcourt School, Gambier. Satisfaction, that after the comparatively short space of time (three years), the sum of \$10,000.00 has been raised. Disappointment, that we have not seemed to find just the right girl to benefit by this help. We have had three beneficiaries in the three years time—one has proven disability by reason of ill health—and one promising young girl has been obliged to leave the School, having moved to the South. Our present beneficiary is a young daughter of the Rev. Mr. Tricket, of Newburgh, who came to us through recommendation of Bishop Leonard. I think if it were perhaps made more generally known throughout the Diocese, that this opportunity was offered to young girls, preferably the daughters of the Clergy of this Diocese, who were in need of help to obtain education, we should have plenty of applicants and I am asking you all to act as advertising agents in behalf of the School, making it known in your several parishes.

Miss Merwin, the principal, reports the School as doing well and the quality of the work good. Miss Gaither, an associate, was connected with Dobb's Ferry School and is a teacher of ability and inspiring person. With these combinations, together with the advantages offered through the proximity and affiliations with Kenyon College, it would seem a most desirable school for a girl to obtain an education.

Students from Harcourt are admitted on certificate to Wellsley, Vassar, Smith and Western Reserve. A high standard of scholarship is insisted upon, since provision is made for the leading colleges. The course may be completed in four (4) years, time being given for music and other electives. There are three courses of study:

1. A college preparatory course.
2. A general, or academic course.
3. An advance course for graduates on the preceding courses, or an accredited high standing who do not enter College.

The regular courses of study are for girls who have completed the Eighth Grade, but a limited number of younger pupils are received. There are no formal examinations, but a report of credits from former schools is required.

In so important a matter, as the selection of a school, it is desirable that those interested should visit it and examine for themselves its character and advantages. Such visitors are always welcome at Harcourt.

With the completion of this Fund, it has seemed advisable to place the management of this Fund into the hands of five (5) Trustees, the approval of such action to be presented later for your consideration.

The Ohio Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary has as its representative in China the principal of St. Mary's Hall, Shanghai. Her salary has been increased to nine hundred dollars a year on account of living costs. Please send generous gifts to Mrs. Cyrus Bates, Treasurer, 1621 West Adams St., Los Angeles, California.

Since the founding of St. Paul's Mission at Glen Alpine in the Blue Ridge Mountains, we have had the honor of paying the salary of our very successful missionary there, Mrs. James Joyner. The work has grown so much that we have now provided Mrs. Joyner with an assistant. The sum for which we pledge ourselves to Glen Alpine is \$800.

The "Bishop Leonard Fund" is for use among the missions of Ohio, when and where the Bishop thinks it best. We have pledged to him \$500.

The "Bishop DuMoulin Fund" will place in the hands of the co-adjutor a sum for use at his discretion among missions in the Diocese.

The "Expense Fund" covers the cost of publishing the annual report, occasional circulars or leaflets and notices, postage in several departments, traveling expenses in starting new Branches, and that of missionaries whom we invite to address us. To meet the demands on this fund it must be materially increased.

The "Contingent Fund" is available for all sorts of emergencies and is of great service. It is often expended for overcoats needed without delay, or for clerical suits; also for necessary articles of clothing not otherwise obtainable. Larger pledges to this fund are earnestly solicited.

The Bishop Bedell Scholarship and the Julia Bedell Scholarship pay for the education of native pupils in St. John's University, Shanghai, China. They require \$70 each per annum. The "Ohio Scholarship" in St. Elizabeth's—one of the Bishop Hare Schools in South Dakota—pays for the education of an Indian pupil; it requires \$60 per year.

Kuling School, China, is a school for the education of the children of Missionaries and must be subscribed to for yet two years.

The "Foreign Insurance Fund" provides insurance upon the lives of foreign missionaries for the benefit of their families. We of the Ohio Branch have for thirty years paid \$100.00 each year into this fund.
