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The Annual Meeting at Cleveland

January 24, 1924



The Forty-sixth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council, in the Diocese of Ohio, convened in the Church of the Ascension, Lakewood, on Thursday, January 24, 1924.

The Holy Communion was celebrated at ten o'clock, with the Rt. Rev. Wm. A. Leonard, Bishop of Ohio, as the celebrant, assisted by the Bishop Coadjutor, Archdeacon Patterson and the Rev. Wallace M. Gordon.

After the service, Bishop Leonard, in his dignified and gracious manner, extended cordial greetings and words of encouragement to the women of the Auxiliary. He chose for his theme "Consecration" and appealed for more women to enter the mission field. The Bishop then gave his report of the Bishop Leonard Fund.

Immediately after this, our President, Mrs. E. J. Backus, called the meeting to order for business.

Three hundred and fifty (350) women responded to roll call. Upon motion seconded and carried, the reading of the minutes of the last meeting was omitted, the same having been printed in Year Book.

In Mrs. Backus' fine report, two important points were stressed—the Bishop Tuttle memorial, and the memorial to our late president, Mrs. Knapp.

Mrs. Backus asked for a vote on her resolution to send a letter of sympathy to Mr. Knapp. The chair appointed Mrs. C. C. Bolton, Mrs. Walbridge and Mrs. F. R. White to draft such a resolution.

The Secretary, Mrs. E. S. Grauel, read an interesting report of her year's work. She reported more than \$5,000 given to Japanese Emergency Fund. She also read Mrs. Bates' report, after which a motion carried to send cordial greetings to Mrs. Bates for her faithful and efficient service.

Bishop DuMoulin gave his report of the Fund given him by the Woman's Auxiliary. After which he led in the noonday prayers.

Mrs. Shields, Box Secretary, in her report said that boxes valued at more than \$9,000 had been sent out during the year.

This was followed by a most helpful and interesting talk by Mrs. G. B. Wade, National Secretary of the Supply Department. Mrs. Wade explained just how the allotments are made up. Boxes valued at \$285,000 were sent out in 1922. She made an appeal for both old and new Altar supplies for chapels in Missouri, and churches that cannot afford them. Mrs. Wade's talk was followed by many questions.

The Rev. Mr. Stalker, of Massillon, now Dean of the Gambier Summer Conference, asked the women of the Auxiliary to aid in every way to make the conference a success. To accomplish this, every woman must stress this in her parish and to her rector.

The meeting then adjourned for luncheon and recess of an hour.

At the opening of the afternoon session, the Rev. Mr. Bubb, of Fremont, brought this message from the Standing Committee—that at the Diocesan Convention, a motion duly seconded and carried, that the date of the Annual Convention be changed from January to May. The result of the vote taken was the majority in favor of May. When the women who were in favor of May for their annual meeting were asked to stand, almost the entire house arose.

Miss Mather gave her report of the United Thank Offering. She has over \$3,000 toward the next Triennial Offering.

Mrs. C. A. Dowell, Chairman of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial Fund, reported having received \$700 in pledges toward the \$1,000 we hope to raise.

Mrs. Backus gave a beautiful tribute to our late beloved President, Mrs. Knapp.

Mrs. Collacott, of Painesville, read a letter from Mrs. Ely, of St. Mary's School, Shanghai, in which she told of Mrs. Knapp's visit and interest in the school. Mrs. Ely paid loving tribute to this saintly woman.

It was decided to raise \$15,000, to be used for a suitable memorial to Mrs. Knapp. Miss Mather, as custodian for the fund, reported on the memorial, after which pledges were taken.

The speaker for the afternoon was Mrs. Pancoast of Philadelphia, who has recently returned from the Orient. She gave a vivid picture of her trip, of our missionaries, schools and hospitals. She said much had been accomplished and the foundation well laid for the great task before the church today.

In China, it is not China's problem, but our problem. The church must rise to her glorious opportunity!

It was a privilege to hear Mrs. Pancoast.

Mrs. J. G. Anderson, the Educational Secretary, gave an interesting report of her work. This was followed by the Church Periodical Club Correspondent, Mrs. D. W. Conrey. She made an appeal for books for Boone University Library, Wuchang, China, and St. Luke's Hospital, Japan.

The Bishop's appointment of officers for the year, was read by Mrs. Backus.

A rising vote of thanks was extended to the women and Rector of the Church of the Ascension for their cordial hospitality.

The Rev. Mr. Gordon closed the convention with Prayers and the Benediction.

Report of the President



This has been a busy year for all the Officers of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese. It is a story of a year of many letters written, many parishes visited, old work revivified, and new work accomplished.

Through it all has been the interest of our late President, to inspire and cheer by her counsel and appreciation.

"To His own the Saviour giveth daily strength." So with her. Notwithstanding weakness and suffering, she carried the work in her heart; and not being able to do active work herself, she cheered and encouraged others to do the work she would so love to have done.

Miss Lindley, our Executive Secretary at the Church Missions House, writes, "I have known Mrs. Knapp a great many years, first when we were Junior Officers; and I have always loved and admired her. Only a few weeks ago, she sent me a check for my Discretionary Fund for my trip, and made the most thoughtful suggestions for my personal comfort. I know what her going means to the Ohio Woman's Auxiliary, at least I know it as well as any one on the outside can; and in a way, I almost feel as if I were not on the outside."

As Vice-President I have visited most of the parishes in Cleveland; and I have attended meetings, some of them regional, in Youngstown, Akron, Massillon, Wellsville, Steubenville, Port Clinton, and Marion; and but for an unfortunate accident, I should have visited Fremont and Lorain.

By attending these meetings, I have been able to meet women from all the Branches in the Diocese. I think I can safely say that I have written over three hundred letters.

We have been happy to invite the Cleveland Region to several meetings besides the regular scheduled meetings.

Bishop Thomas, of Wyoming, gave us a delightful hour. Dr. Bliss of the Church General Hospital at Wuchang, carried us with great interest through his daily tasks at the Hospital. Dr. Patton talked in an inspiring, and we hope effectual, way to us one afternoon upon the Nation-Wide Campaign.

The regular meetings, with Mrs. Herbert Wood, the Chairman, and Mrs. Clarence Gail, the Secretary, have been well attended.

Deaconess Bedell of St. Stephen's Mission, Alaska, told of her most interesting work among the Indians; afterwards telling her story at the Cathedral House to the young people. An itinerary was arranged for her throughout the Diocese; and she wrote me that her reception everywhere was most cordial and heartening.

Mrs. Hunt, of Fort Valley School, Georgia, told of her work among her own people in the black belt of the South, at one of the all-day meetings of the Region. She also visited many of the Branches through the Diocese during the month of November.

At the request of Dean White, letters were sent to the Clergy of the Diocese, asking them to hold a day of intercession for the Nation-Wide Campaign, that God would bless the work of Dr. Patton in the Diocese. Mrs. Paysant of St. Paul's, East Cleveland, kindly wrote and sent the letters at my request.

The Bishop Rowe Foundation Fund has been brought to the amount that was thought to be the quota of the Diocesan Auxiliary, namely \$1,000.00.

I wish to bring before the Branches of the Auxiliary, the Diocesan Altar Guild, which meets every Monday afternoon, at two o'clock, at the Cathedral, under the chairmanship of Mrs. C. H. Lang, 2041 East 93rd Street. Please write her, or come to the meetings, for any information or help you may require. An offering of money would be a great help to this fine work.

At the Triennial in Portland, a resolution was presented that we, like our fellow Church women in Canada, have a Partnership of Prayer. This is a partnership between a missionary in the field, and some individual or branch of the Auxiliary at home. The missionary will ask for definite help in prayer and the home partner will work with her through prayer. Mrs. H. B. A. Keiser, Stanwood Road, East Cleveland, has been appointed Chairman in this Diocese. She has written to the President of each Branch, and the response has been very satisfactory.

The terrible affliction that has befallen Japan, received the Church's instant attention. A letter of appeal came immediately from Miss Lindley to the women of the Auxiliary, saying that \$100,000

had been pledged for the women to raise towards the \$500,000 pledged by the National Council. It was hoped \$5,000 might be given by our Ohio Woman's Auxiliary. To the glory of every Branch more than \$5,100 has been sent. The response that has come from every Branch of the Diocese, with hardly an exception, has been an inspiration and a joy. For each check I have written a receipt; and the small written "thank you," could not express to you my appreciation, as your custodian of this fund.

There are many tasks now before us. The Auxiliary Special awaits our attention. The Memorial for our late President, Mrs. Knapp, in appreciation of her ten years of faithful service to our Auxiliary, will be an undertaking, claiming our ready and zealous energy. There may be many demands upon your treasury. Bishop Gailor writes that the Japanese emergency should not detract from, nor interfere with, your pledges for the regular systematic support of the Church's work.

"The world stands out on either side
No wider than the heart is wide;
Above the world is stretched the sky,—
No higher than the soul is high.
The heart can push the sea and land
Farther away on either hand;
The soul can split the sky in two,
And let the face of God shine through."

I know it is the wish of all present that resolutions expressing our great sorrow over the loss of our President, Mrs. Knapp, be sent to her husband, expressing also our deep sympathy for him, and for the members of her family, and that these resolutions be sent to the Church papers. I would like a motion to that effect, asking also that the Chairman nominate a committee to draft these resolutions.

The above motion being duly made and carried, the Chair appoints the following committee: Mrs. C. C. Bolton, Mrs. T. H. Walbridge and Mrs. F. R. White.

Report of the Third Vice-President

Dr. Joshi, of Bombay, was the speaker of the afternoon. He spoke strongly of the missionary work in India, and asked for help for their school where they are training their own people for the ministry and thus preparing to establish a native church.

On April 5th, the members of the Region were again the guests of Trinity Woman's Auxiliary. This was an afternoon meeting and Deaconess Bedell, of Alaska, was the speaker. She told of her work in the far North in a most interesting manner.

The next meeting was held at Port Clinton, and about seventy-five Toledoans responded to roll call; also nice delegations were present from Sandusky, and from Fremont,

The women of St. Thomas' Church served luncheon and were most gracious and kind.

Archdeacon Patterson was the first speaker of the afternoon, his subject being the "Nation-Wide Campaign."

Mrs. Hunt of Fort Valley, Georgia, told of the work in the High and Industrial School for colored people in that part of the South.

The Women of Toledo Region are always glad to have with them their Diocesan President, Mrs. Backus, who was the third speaker of the afternoon. Her plea was for the Bishop Tuttle Memorial.

Mrs. Anderson, our Educational Secretary, was our last speaker. She made a strong plea for educational work among the women of the Church.

We owe a debt of gratitude to the men and women who have taken the time and trouble to come to us this year. They gave us of their best knowledge and experience and were a great help to the women of the Region. We extend to them our best thanks, and pray that God may bless their efforts to extend his Kingdom.

Report of the Fourth Vice-President



A good attendance is reported from each of the Regional meetings held in the Canton and Youngstown Region the past year, which shows an ever-increasing interest in the Regional plan.

The Canton Region reports a meeting held in April, opening with a celebration of the Holy Communion followed by luncheon. Deaconess Bedell, of Alaska, was the speaker of the day. She spoke of the great need of a recreation building, the natives would do the work of building if only the lumber could be furnished. Two hundred dollars was contributed for this purpose by the Canton Region. Arrangements were made for a meeting to be held in October, Archdeacon Reynolds of Erie to be the speaker, but owing to illness he was not able to keep his appointment, and the meeting was postponed until January.

The first meeting of the Youngstown Region was held at Niles, in May. Bishop DuMoulin, the "Father of the Regional plan," was the first speaker and told of how, when convalescing from a serious illness, he worked out the plan of dividing the Diocese into Districts or Regions, to simplify and strengthen the work. The next speaker was the Rev. S. H. Bishop, who is doing a fine work among the negroes, and he took for his subject, "The Church and the Negro." Professor Marcus McEvoy spoke on "Moral Education and the Public School. Miss Mary Wagstaff led a very interesting discussion of the "Girl Problem." Supper was served after which a joint meeting was held with the men's organization.

The second meeting of the Youngstown Region was held in Christ Church, Warren, in October. Mrs. John Anderson reviewed the new study book, "Creative Forces in Japan," in an interesting and illuminative way. Dr. R. W. Patton made a short and inspiring address. Supper was served, and in the evening a great mass meeting was held, Archdeacon Patterson and Dr. R. W. Patton being the speakers.

Deaconess Bedell was a most delightful speaker, enjoyed by many of the Youngstown Region. Mrs. Hunt, wife of the head of the Fort Valley Industrial School, Georgia, brought an interesting account of the splendid work done by that institution.

Mrs. L. W. Stryker, a member of the Diocesan Educational Committee, called a meeting of all the leaders of the study classes of the Region, at which time she explained the study books and materials to be used this year. Mrs. Fred Jones reviewed the study class work outlined by Miss Tillotson, at the Gambier Conference.

The success of Bishop DuMoulin's Regional plan is very evident and proves we are advancing from the old parochial idea and with the steady increase of information and education we are receiving through the Women's Auxiliary, the Nation-Wide Campaign, and

other agencies of the Church, we have caught a world-wide vision of what the Church can accomplish, and each year, with greater gifts of service and money, we can more truthfully say, "Like a Mighty Army moves the Church of God."

Report of the Secretary



I wonder how I can make interesting the report of a Corresponding Secretary! Would it be dull if I told you of scores of letters received and written each month, of notices and report blanks and Year Books, by the hundreds, annually mailed to the Auxiliary Branches in this great Diocese of ours? The figures excite but a passing thought, but the very fact that all these are necessary in order that we may keep in touch with one another and with our officers at Church Missions House, that is the great and vital thing.

If I were to make a graph or line drawing for you, the work of the secretary would be indicated by a low mark in the summer months, the trend is upward during September and October, still higher in December, and in January it reaches its crest for at this time comes the annual meeting, a great gathering of earnest women from far and near, to hear the reports of the year's work. That these may become a matter of record, they are issued later in the form of a Year Book.

The days preceding and following the annual meeting are busy ones for the secretary, for then it is that the "copy" is being made ready for the printer. This is an opportune time to thank the parish secretaries, whose reports are always on time. You cannot imagine what a tremendous help it is!

Last year Bishop Leonard said there was much worth-while reading in our Year Books, so we take courage and commend them to every member of the Auxiliary. It would be a great encouragement to your diocesan officers if you would consult the Year Book when in need of information. For instance, when you want to know what pledges apply on your parish quota, the name of the new secretary, or the address of a Regional chairman, just look in your Year Book and there it is. No Boy Scout would think of getting along without his Handbook. Our Year Book is the Auxiliary Handbook, containing all sorts of information for your Branch. It will be sent free to your Branches this year.

Splendid results have been accomplished in every line of endeavor. I will cite only one, the raising of the Japanese Emergency Relief of over five thousand dollars in about two months. Some of the small parishes have given so generously! We are more than proud of their fine spirit and effort. Indeed, the women of the entire Diocese are to be congratulated upon their loving response to this great need.

The pledges, as you know, are paid to Mrs. Bates, our treasurer—the only exception being in the case of a “special” when a custodian of the fund is named, then to expedite matters, money for that purpose is sent directly to the collector who later reports to the treasurer.

As I copy and classify your reports, I find myself grieving when no United Thank Offering comes from a parish, for I realize then that the women have not learned about the Little Blue Box and the opportunity it affords of giving from an overflowing heart, an offering, however small, that shall express a song of thanksgiving for the many blessings that are ours—the shelter of home, the safety and well-being of loved ones, and for the friendships that make life so well worth while.

It is a joy to go through the Diocese and find the younger women catching the vision of service of the Woman’s Auxiliary. I rather love this definition—do you know it? “An Auxiliary Branch is composed of women whose vision of service has developed beyond parish lines and who appreciate a call for service anywhere in the world.” Let us do all in our power to win these younger women that we may learn anew with them the meaning of consecration and devotion to the work which God has put into our hands.

Our memorial page this year contains the names of so many of our fellow-workers who have entered into the Paradise life. In loving memory of their lives and work, may we not stand in silence for a moment? Of the number, two have been your Diocesan Officers, Margery Ware Hart, and Fanny Tillotson Knapp.

Mrs. Hart carried on for many years, with her characteristic zeal and devotion the work of the Church Periodical Club. Later she became the efficient secretary of the Diocesan Board. In daily life she was ever mindful of the “little kindnesses which most leave undone or forget.” Full of the vigor and beauty of life, she was suddenly called to the Father’s House. Today we sadly miss her from her accustomed place in our midst.

It was my privilege to be very close to our beloved president during the many months of her illness. How high and strong her hope was that she could again be among us and share with us the experience of her visits to our Mission Stations and to our splendid corps of workers!

I want to voice today, Mrs. Knapp’s appreciation of your splendid effort in every line of Auxiliary work. I have never known anyone who was more beloved than she, yet withal so sincere and unaffected; when your messages came, they awakened surprise that she should even deserve such tributes from you. In the latter months in one of our quiet talks, she told me that she used to think of her share in the Auxiliary work as “my work,” later on it became “our work,” but in the last years it was ever in her mind as “His work.”

My work—identifying self with a work worth while; our work—a larger vision of service wherein is the spirit of friendship and cooperation; His work—the knowledge that we are the instruments through

which He works; that He needs each one of us in the building of His kingdom here on earth.

How wonderfully blest this Ohio Branch has been in its leadership of consecrated women—Mrs. Knapp, Mrs. Leonard, and those who preceded them and laid the strong, firm foundations! May we not also think of the work entrusted to us as **His work**, going forward without fear into the Great Adventure for and with God, “our help in ages past, our hope for years to come”?

Report of the Treasurer



It is an unfailing joy to me to announce at these annual meetings, that all the pledges of our Ohio Branch have been paid. Year after year, for thirty years now, you have been giving me this pleasure! It has come to be a tradition among us, (a most honorable tradition), that anything which our Ohio women promise to do, will surely be done.

During this year, \$7,186.48 has passed through my hands. This has covered all the regular pledges for salaries and scholarships, etc., as well as many miscellaneous gifts in our far-flung mission field. I trust that these may all be as generously given in the year to come. They will all be needed.

Besides the money thus paid through the Treasury, Mrs. Backus has collected that \$5,000—your most memorable gift to the Emergency Fund for Japan—and there have been numerous other contributions handled by the Directors of our various projects. Then, of course, there has been the wonderful outpouring of “missionary boxes.” Altogether it has been a good year, though shadowed by most bitter bereavement.

Words would fail me to express how great is our loss in the death of dear Mrs. Knapp, and how deeply we feel it. As we tell over her virtues now and again, it can only be that we may try to emulate them,—her world-wide sympathy, her broad-mindedness and vision, her willingness to undergo any labor or sacrifice, and more than all, her true consecration to the service of the Master. When at last, that brave soul was released from intolerable suffering, we can but think how glorious was her welcome at that home-coming to the Father’s House. “Eye hath not seen, nor ear heard, nor have entered the heart of man, the things which God hath prepared for them that love Him.”

It is a glorious company of splendid women that our Ohio Branch has been sending over there, these many years.

Someone has said, “Every great institution is but the lengthened shadow of some one mind.” But the Woman’s Auxiliary is the

lengthened shadow of many minds. It was born of a desire on the part of many God-loving women to effectually correlate their devotion into real, practical service. What any one of us can do is so small, so pitifully small, against the dark mass of the world's great needs. But by organization, by joining each one her little to the littles of many, many others, very much can be accomplished. Co-operation is the magic word;—co-operation, having love for its motive force and backed by large, unfailing faith.

Report of the Director of the Supply Department



With a new Director in charge of this Department, the work has not moved as quickly as it has in past years, but it has still gone forward, thanks to the help and co-operation of many women of the Diocese.

The allotments sent for 1923, are as follows: 11 personal, 3 catechists, 2 mission, 1 school, 1 hospital and 12 Christmas boxes for women missionaries.

Of the personal, 9 were taken by parishes, leaving 2 to be cared for by the Director. One of these was provided entirely from the Contingent Fund and the other was divided, the two personal clothing sheets being sent to a Parish and the clerical suit and household supplies purchased from the Contingent Fund.

The value of all boxes sent from January 1, 1923, to January 1, 1924, is: Diocesan \$1,299.39, Domestic \$7,385.33 and Foreign \$653.18, or a total of \$9,337.90.

The United Thank Offering



The first year of the 1925 Triennial has just passed. As that name is said, what a vision rises before one—**United**,—that means that the aim is to have **every** Church woman join in this wonderful gift from all over the world,—not only in the United States, but in far-away Alaska, China, Japan, Liberia, the Philippines—wherever our Church is doing mission work. **Thank**—that means that it should be a joyous gift, an expression of our grateful, loving hearts, for our daily mercies, an offering over and above all other gifts, to show our thankfulness. Every parish and mission station should have a United Thank Offering custodian, who should have assistants, according to the size of the parish—for it is no longer confined only to members of the Woman's Auxiliary, but every woman should be given an opportunity of joining in this U. T. O. In large parishes where the group plan is carried out, I should like to suggest that the Group Leaders should be the authorized solicitors for this fund, under the parish U. T. O.

Custodian. As Diocesan Treasurer, I should like to have reports every spring and fall, say May and October. In Ohio there are 128 parishes and mission stations, of those there are 63 where I have no custodian, and so cannot get in touch with them.

I am in correspondence with 65, of whom 57 have reported this year. The total from Ohio for the 1922 Triennial, in Portland, was \$16,109.66. The first year of this Triennial (which is just passed), is only \$3,567.48, which if multiplied by three would make only \$10,703.44! Oh women of the Church, don't you feel the necessity of our trying to reach all members so that in 1925, when we meet in New Orleans, the United Thank Offering will be equal to the great need? The report that came from New York, January 1, 1924, is:

Report of Educational Secretary



In undertaking worthwhile work of any kind, it is necessary to have a definite plan for its accomplishment, and because a knowledge of missions is essential in doing the work of our Church, we should include education in our program. As you know, the three-fold plan of the Woman's Auxiliary is Prayer, Study and Service, and for many years ours was the only organization that gave to education its proper place.

Now all members of the church and her organizations, are asked to inform themselves as to her program which includes Missions, Religious Education and Christian Social Service.

With this task before us, we realize the need of studying "The Story of the Program," "The Program Presented," and "The World, My Neighbor," because we must first know of the need before we can give Christ's message to the world.

The best way to present this required information is through the Group Plan which if put into action in each parish would quickly advance the cause of missions and all members would be prepared for an intelligent Every-Member Canvas.

Following the plan suggested by the Field Department, the time for this intensive study should be during the months of October and November, of each year. This same Group Plan could be used for

Bible Study, and Discussion Groups, and for keeping the parish in touch with its own program.

Other periods chosen for the study of Missions are the Epiphany and Lenten seasons, at which time we use a text-book which tells of the need in a special field.

This year the book "Wanted—Leaders" told of the negro problem, and all communions studied about the same people, but did not use the same text-book.

Next year, nineteen twenty-four, all communions in Great Britain, Canada, and the United States, are to unite in the study of "Creative Forces in Japan."

Since the earthquake, the need of Japan has been made known to the entire world, and we should inform ourselves as to conditions in that country, if, as a Christian nation, we want to help in the up-building of its religious life. "Japan needs Christ, Christ needs Japan!"

Now, more than ever we should be neighbors to the people of Japan. If you cannot have a Discussion Class on Japan, you will find the stereopticon lectures or a play or pageant, useful in showing your people something of the situation in that land.

From reports that have come to me, I find the "Spirit of Missions," our missionary magazine, and other church literature, being generally used, but better results will come through appointing a representative in each parish, whose special work should be the securing of subscriptions and attending to renewals.

The forming of Bible Classes and the training of leaders for them is urged, together with the use of the "Kalendar of Daily Bible Readings."

It is not possible to carry on all forms of educational work in a parish, but the following suggestions are offered from which you can select the plan best adapted for your use.

Discussion Groups, Program Meetings, Stereopticon Lectures, Reading Circles, Bible Classes, Plays, Pageants, and Church Magazines.

Normal Classes—Institutes and Summer Conferences are planned for the training of leaders, and delegates from every parish should take advantage of these opportunities, as they are offered throughout the year.

It is none too soon to plan for the attendance at the Summer Conference, at Gambier.

The registration there this year reached four hundred and twenty-five.

The educational value of the stereopticon slides is not appreciated, and again, I suggest your getting in touch with Miss Ada Crary, 8614 Euclid Avenue, Cleveland, for information about them.

This year the Federated Churches called for our cooperation in arranging for an Institute, on October 1-2, and preparing and presenting a pageant on December 11, "America's Unfinished Battles."

On December 7, the parish educational secretaries of the Cleveland Region, met at a luncheon conference, held at Trinity Cathedral, where problems were discussed and plans were made for the work in the coming year.

On February 22, began a series of Regional Meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary, to which I was invited and given the privilege of telling these groups of my work:

Massillon—February 22

Steubenville—May 8

Fremont—May 15

Lorain—May 24

Warren—September 26

Port Clinton—November 15

Marion—December 3

All were well attended and the interest shown promises well for advance along educational lines.

During the year, I also visited eight other parishes in the Diocese, and twelve in the Cleveland Region.

Other work done throughout the year includes:

Woman's Auxiliary Board Meetings, 10.

Church Service League Board Meetings, 4.

Miscellaneous Meetings, 70.

Conducted one Study Class—sent out 313 pieces of mail.

Conducted one Institute.

Meeting of the House of Church Women, three days in Toledo.

Met with the Department of Religious Education three times at Gambier, Toledo and Cleveland.

Six Institutes were conducted during the year.

The following statistics tell of educational work in 38 parishes:

Discussion Groups, 37.

Program Meetings, 178.

Reading Circles, 7

Stereopticon Lectures, 20 and 140 in the Province of the Midwest.

Bible Classes, 14.

Plays and Pageants, 26.

Those who serve on the Diocesan Educational Committee, deserve great credit for their loyalty and perseverance in the work.

In their respective regions they are doing constructive work and through their efforts the coming year promises decided growth.

The Annual Report of the Church Periodical Club In the Diocese of Ohio

January 1, 1923, to January 1, 1924



During 1923, the rectors of three parishes, where Church Periodical work had never been done, appointed Librarians and new Branches were formed for this work. In three parishes where the work had lapsed, new Librarians were appointed and the work revived.

At Easter and Christmas, many parishes remembered the tubercular soldiers at Oteen, North Carolina, with splendid boxes of candies, fruits and cakes, as well as pictures, magazines and books. Some of the Librarians take care of soldiers right through the year, with gifts and letters.

During the summer, the Diocese met two extra calls for reading-matter, with the usual generosity. Hundreds of packages of books and magazines were sent to various missions in Alaska. In August, from Camp Knox, Kentucky, where companies of the National Guard were to be in training, came an S. O. S. call for reading and recreational matter, since the Government had made no appropriation for such. Magazines and books were quickly dispatched from about twenty parishes.

The special work for the coming year will be the continuation of our special for this year, books, and money to buy books for Boone University Library, at Wuchang, China. We have had ten memorials given to this Library and the money sent was \$350.00. This is more than double our quota. Miss Elizabeth Wood, head of this Library, has asked that Ohio take up the annual pledge of \$25, that has been given by Mrs. Homer Knapp. Miss Wood calls the regular donors of this annual pledge, her "pillars." In agreeing to this suggestion, we will make a permanent memorial to our dear Mrs. Knapp, and the Ohio Church Periodical Club, becomes one of the "pillars" of the Boone University Library.

The work of our organization is increased and broadened as we gradually come to realize the many needs that we can supply.

The Church erects hospitals, schools, community centers, mission houses, etc., and it is our work to supply the literature, in specialized lines for these places. The hospitals must have medical libraries and magazines for the nurses and doctors. All kinds of text-books and technical books are asked for in our schools and colleges. Theological magazines for the clergy, and general reading matter for community centers. The demand for children's books and for technical books is always greater than the supply. Let us unite in meeting as many of these needs as we can during the coming year.

The correspondent has given Church Periodical talks in eight parishes, and is always happy to accept invitations to any parish wanting to learn more of the work.

Woman's Auxiliary Special 1923-1925



In Loving Memory of Bishop Tuttle

Early in the fall of 1923, plans were made to raise Ohio's share of the \$75,000 Special, which is to be a memorial to the sainted Bishop Tuttle.

Following a plan used in several other Dioceses, a letter was sent out to each parish, also leaflets explaining the purpose of the Special and a program to be carried out, which included a sketch of the life and work of Bishop Tuttle.

A letter was sent to each Regional President, asking that she cooperate by appointing some one in her Region to prepare a paper on the life of Bishop Tuttle, who would visit any Branch not able to provide one for themselves, and that she present the subject at Regional Meetings.

All letters have offered the use of Bishop Tuttle's book, "Reminiscenses of a Missionary Bishop." Five parishes have used the copy offered by the chairman of the fund.

Wherever the program is carried out there is a generous response. We have been moved to our best efforts by our beloved President, Mrs. Knapp, who till the end, as was always her way, encouraged us by messages of interest and approval.

We are very grateful to our First Vice-President, Mrs. Backus, who has presented the subject whenever possible, besides preparing a paper on the life of Bishop Tuttle, for use through the Diocese.

Information



The Ohio Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary has as its representative in China, the principal of St. Mary's Hall, Shanghai. Her salary has been increased to nine hundred dollars a year on account of living costs. Please send generous gifts to Mrs. Cyrus Bates, Treasurer.

Since the founding of **St. Paul's Mission at Glen Alpine in the Blue Ridge Mountains**, we have had the honor of supporting it. Our very successful missionary there is Mrs. James Joyner. The work has grown so much that we have now provided Mrs. Joyner with an assistant. The sum for which we pledge ourselves to Glen Alpine is seven hundred dollars.

The "Bishop Leonard Fund" is for use among the missions of Ohio, when and where the Bishop thinks it best. We have pledged to him five hundred dollars.

The "Bishop DuMoulin Fund" will place in the hands of the Bishop Coadjutor, a sum for use at his discretion among missions in the Diocese.

The "Expense Fund" covers the cost of publishing the annual report, occasional circulars or leaflets and notices, postage in several departments, traveling expenses in starting new Branches, and that of missionaries whom we invite to address us. With the enlarged scope of the Supply Department, there are expenses for freight, express and postage. To meet the demands on this fund it must be materially increased.

The Educational Committee has opportunities for advance work, if the necessary money can be applied.

The "Contingent Fund" is available for all sorts of emergencies and is of great service. It is often expended for overcoats needed without delay, or for clerical suits; also for necessary articles of clothing not otherwise obtainable. Larger pledges to this fund are earnestly solicited.

The Bishop Bedell Scholarship and the Julia Bedell Scholarship pay for the education of native pupils in St. John's University, Shanghai, China. They require \$70 each per annum. The "Ohio Scholarship" in St. Elizabeth's—one of the Bishop Hare Schools in South Dakota—pays for the education of an Indian pupil; it requires sixty dollars per year.

Kuling School, China, is a school for the education of the children of Missionaries and pledges are asked for its support.

The "Foreign Insurance Fund" provides insurance upon the lives of foreign missionaries for the benefit of their families. We, of the Ohio Branch, have for more than forty years contributed annually to this fund. Our pledge is one hundred dollars a year.

All pledges are payable to Mrs. Verna S. Bates, 1621 West Adams Street, Los Angeles, California. (Note change of address after March

15th.) In the case of a "special" when a custodian is named, all money may be sent direct to the collector, who later reports to Mrs. Bates.

A Tribute



We say of certain ones who seem to guide others, and make of work a joy and success, she is a "born leader." Such a one by her personality, by her consecration to the work in which she is engaged, by her wisdom and foresight, by her silence as well as her speech; inspires those about her with a confidence in her decisions, that gladly they follow when she points the way.

Such a leader was our late President, Fannie T. Knapp, by which name she is affectionately called in our hearts.

To every call she responded with a fine quickness of perception of what was the best and wisest thing to do.

Blessed with the material ability to help, with ready generosity, she answered the manifold appeals that came to her notice. This was done without ostentation, with the quiet modesty that was one of the most endearing qualities of her nature.

At the Toledo Synod, a lady came to me and said: "I have just heard of the death of Mrs. Knapp—what a loss she is to your Diocese; to what great development she has lead you!" Then she went on to tell me how she first met Mrs. Knapp, at one of the Provincial Synods. She sat next to her at the luncheon table, and she afterwards asked who that quiet retiring woman was, and she was told that the quiet, little woman was Mrs. Knapp of the Ohio Diocese; and knowing of her ability in leadership, and of her many generous gifts to the missionary efforts, her unassuming manner left an indelible picture on her memory.

In a letter just received from our Treasurer, Mrs. Bates, she writes: "Mrs. Knapp always wrote me she would make up any deficit that I found at the end of the year; there never has been one, but how it helped to feel that there was someone behind me to help when help was needed!"

It would not be possible in this short tribute, to tell you of the manifold appeals which she answered generously. I have only heard of them by chance, in letters of sympathy sent to me as your representative, or from some of the Branches I have visited.

Our Diocesan Auxiliary made her a dispenser of a small fund when she started on her trip, the trip to which she looked forward with bright anticipations; that gift was to be given where she felt such a gift was most needed. I have heard how wisely she distributed our money, and what a fragrant memory her visits left wherever she went. It was like the alabaster box of precious ointment, the aroma of which lingers through the years.

Mrs. Knapp was most loyal to our National Officers, and was much admired and appreciated by them. Miss Lindley, our Executive Secretary, at the Church Missions House, writes: "I have known Mrs. Knapp a great many years, first when we were Junior Officers, and I have always loved and admired her. Only a few weeks ago,

she sent me a check for my Discretionary Fund on my trip, and made the most thoughtful suggestions for my personal comfort. I know what her going means to the Ohio Woman's Auxiliary. At least, I know it as well as anyone on the outside can; and, in a way, I almost feel as if I were not on the outside."

I have said our late President was a natural leader, and her sincere devotion, and her humble spirit made her life a constant inspiration to her fellow-workers.

God gave her great ability, and wide opportunity for service, and He also permitted her to learn the lessons of weakness and suffering, until in due time He called her to His higher service in Paradise.

She is not gone, for the memory of her consecrated life remains with all our Diocesan Auxiliary, to inspire and cheer our efforts.

And so in "God's gracious keeping,
Leave we now His servant sleeping."

Extracts from Mrs. Ely's Letter



Shanghai, January, 1924.

I had not heard of the death of Mrs. Knapp, until your letter arrived two days ago.

As often as I pass through the pretty gate, past the Gate House, I think of her enthusiasm and her keen joy in the school, and how she caught the vision of the buildings, all up and full of happy girls, when she went over there with me to see "the land," during her never-to-be-forgotten visit in 1922.

When we broke ground in April, 1922, we all hoped she would be back in Shanghai, and attend the breaking, so that we might have a representative from America present, linking with a more personal tie the very close one between women of America and women of China, but she was not able to get back in time, much to our regret and hers.

I can well appreciate your feelings of loss and loneliness, for you have had the good fortune to know her and work with her a long time, while I have had only a few hours, but it was long enough for me to know she was a **real** friend and to make all of us spurt up to come somewhere near her ideals.

And she was so human—she "got" everyone of us teachers at St. Mary's by sending us an up-to-date novel to read, saying, she'd let some one else send us the pious reading.

It is a wonderful and unusual thing for tourists to take time off from sight seeing, so called, to go and look at Mission Work; so that when she and Mr. Knapp came and wished to "see everything," we all cheered up and arranged to act as guides. I know Mr. Nichols

took them to see the new church in French-town, and on to the native city to see Grace Church, and when I saw him later he remarked, "There's no doubting where her interests lie."

I had the fun of taking them to see our woman's hospital, St. Elizabeth's, and the men's, St. Luke's, and way over to Hongken to the self-supporting Church of our Saviour, where the new boys' school was just being finished, and did I have to hurry, hurry, hurry, so as not to take too much of their time? Not a bit of it. Her interest was just as keen as my own, and I just loved her for it. Then too, her satisfaction in the bigness and dignity of St. John's University, as a worthy representative of her church and country; and her pleasure in knowing as she went through the old St. Mary's very inadequate buildings, that it was only for another year, was almost as though she herself was one of those lucky school girls. Not once, but several times this fall, has Miss Fullerton, ("our own missionary"), in China, said to me, "I think Mrs. Knapp would just love this Gate House; I'm sure it would please her." I answered, "Well, I am sure she will come out and see it for herself," and that is what we all hoped and moreover, I believe she has. I know one of my first thoughts after reading your letter, was the thought, "Well, Mrs. Knapp can come out now and see it whenever she pleases." And really she was most truly with us Saturday, December 8th, at the formal opening. As I sat on the platform my mind kept sailing away to all you dear women in America, and I prayed that you might be repaid by Him for all the work and time and money you have put in to get this, so glorious place, built; that some of the joy you have given to these girls of China, some of the beauty of Christian homes in a pagan land, some of the uplift that this school will give out, may be yours in a way that will help you most, and surely, most surely, it will be, I know.

All our buildings are up except the church, the plans for which are still with the architect. It is to be called the Letcher Memorial, as Mr. Letcher gave \$10,000, the largest single gift, in memory of his wife, a real Virginian churchwoman.

Dr. Lincoln, of St. John's University, gave the pews in memory of his wife, who came out to China, to teach in St. Mary's. The altar is a thank-offering from Mr. and Mrs. Pancoast, of Philadelphia, who stayed here at St. John's last January. Central New York gives the chancel in memory of Bishop Olmstead's wife. My dear aunt left money for the choir stalls. The brass lectern is already on its way out, sent by the women of the Harrisburg Diocese, in memory of a splendid Auxiliary worker, living in Williamsport. Mr. Daniel Pierce, of East Greensport, R. I., gave \$3,000 in memory of his dear wife, and I believe the tower will be named for her. The Communion set, silver, made out here, is a memorial from the foreign faculty of St. Mary's, to Miss Wong, a dear teacher, who died very suddenly, a year ago. She was one of the most perfect Christians it has been my privilege to know, and my dearest Chinese friend.

There are many other memorials, so it will be a hallowed spot, just filled with the beautiful love of women, who having learned what Christ meant to them, obeyed His command and strove to their uttermost to spread the Good News, SO GOOD, to pagan women, that none but those who have lived in heathen lands, can begin to realize HOW GOOD.

And the love in the Church will be a comfort and strength to many, many girls here in China, where school girls have problems that do not touch the lives of our school girls at home; questions relating to marriages arranged by parents, the grave question of becoming a Christian, the difficulties that arise when a Christian girl is summoned home to attend heathen rites, the temptation to become a second wife in a rich family, and countless others, all of them needing the Quiet, the great big Quiet and Peace, such as a Church and a Church alone can give; where the girl can talk it all out with God and get help that no one of us mortals, no matter how much we love them, can give.

The heart of St. Mary's will be visible when the Church building is finished with its doors ever open and the Love of all the Ages ever present, for the entire building is because **Love is**, and where Love is, there is Christ, and with Him is strength and peace.

Don't think me fanciful, when I tell you that you can feel the result of all your loving work and labor the minute you step inside the gates. People, strangers who came to the opening last Saturday, remarked on the peacefulness of the place; they felt it. And all the students and faculty feel it. I know that I, personally, am twice as kind as when I was teaching in the dark, inadequate rooms of the last ten years, and teaching seems easier and more fun than ever before.
