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Bishop Leonard's Report



I am constrained to say to the Auxiliary that I do not believe they appreciate my estimation of their generosity and continued kindnesses. The years that have gone by, when multiplied by the amounts of money which have been given to me, will show that large sums have been expended through this kindness.

I received from Mrs. Bates, just prior to her death, the portion that was due at that time, and of course, a loving letter full of expressions of regard and good-will. I shall miss very much the correspondence which we have had.

I have expended the \$500 in gifts from you to the Rev. Mr. Salcini, of S. Rocco's Italian Mission in Youngstown; Rev. Dr. Ogburn of S. Augustine's Colored Mission in the same city; Rev. Dr. Bagnall of All Saints' Mission among the colored people in Toledo, and Rev. Collins S. Sawhill, minister in charge of S. Agnes' Mission for the deaf mutes in Cleveland.

The acknowledgements from these recipients have been very grateful, and I am glad in this way to have added to their meagre stipends. For a number of years you gave \$300 regularly to the stipend of the rector of S. Andrew's Church among the colored people in Cleveland. They have been so prosperous that they are now a self-supporting and independent parish and do not require our aid,—and I may say of the missions to which I have given your funds that they are all of them in very favorable and hopeful conditions.

Report of the President



This year our Diocesan Auxiliary has met with a great bereavement in the loss of one well-known and greatly beloved by all. For over thirty years, uncomplainingly, efficiently and faithfully, Mrs. Cyrus Bates has taken care of our finances. From the very beginning of this organization in our Diocese, she has held important offices.

The history of our missionary efforts is a history of her life work. Her splendid mind grasped with keenness each development that came to the National Woman's Auxiliary. In her own Parish of St. Paul's, Cleveland, her efforts were given to the carrying out of plans that came from headquarters; and upon her ideas all successive efforts have been founded.

As in the Parish, so in the Diocese. I remember well her interest and zeal to increase the United Thank Offering when the Diocese was new to this great task. It was she who took to her heart the pitiable condition of the Southern Mountaineers at Glen Alpine, North Carolina, and made it possible to establish, through the Ohio Woman's Auxiliary, a center of religious education. Bates Hall, built by Mr. and Mrs. Knapp, and named for her, stands as a memorial to her love and interest in that work.

Her tenderness and appreciation of what others did in the work, which was so near to her heart, is well known to those who, through these many years, have been receiving her beautiful and commending letters. They could not be excelled; they spurred one on to greater and more consecrated effort. No complaint was ever made to anyone, even her nearest and dearest friends, of weariness in the work; she spoke of the joy that she could do the work, shut in as she was and incapacitated by illness from much that she had otherwise the ability to do.

Blessed indeed has been the Ohio Woman's Auxiliary in the splendid work, from the very beginning, of those who have been called to be Saints in Paradise. Not only to these, but to the great company of noble-hearted women who never failed the leaders, has come the joy of saying to Him, whose faithful followers they have been, "I have fought the good fight; I have finished the course; I have kept the faith."

I suggest that, at the proper time, a resolution be passed, appointing Miss Mary Hanna, Mrs. D. Z. Norton and Miss Ella Wright, a committee to draft resolutions, expressing our sorrow over the loss of our late Treasurer, Mrs. Cyrus Bates, a copy to be sent to the members of her family and to our diocesan Church paper.

The gavel which is used at our Annual meetings has been presented by Mr. Knapp for the use of the Presidents of the Ohio Woman's Auxiliary. It is one given to our late President, Mrs. Knapp, by Mr. Knapp, and used by her at our meetings.

Mr. Knapp has had a silver marker put upon the gavel, with Mrs. Knapp's initials engraved upon it, together with the dates of her service as President. There is room for the same record of service of future presidents.

I have expressed our grateful appreciation to Mr. Knapp.

As your President, I have answered promptly every letter that came to me. These were many in number; and I have sent a receipt for each check given for any purpose or object.

I attended the Gambier Conference, and the Provincial Synod at Racine.

In response to the resolution passed by the National Woman's Auxiliary to aid in the program of the Church, I put my shoulder to the wheel to help with the Nation-Wide Campaign in our Diocese. With our efficient Religious Educational Secretary, who is now Field Secretary in the Diocese, I visited Lima, Conneaut, Youngstown, Massillon, Mansfield, Coshocton, and Steubenville. I have also visited different parochial branches in the city and attended all Regional Meetings but one. At the time of the Lorain tragedy, I appointed Mrs. Anderson and Mrs. Conrey to write you, that you might show your sympathy and friendliness to a sister organization in distress. You have received grateful acknowledgment from the Lorain Branch of our Woman's Auxiliary for clothing and money. Mrs. Anderson and I were happy to take your gift of \$400.00 to the saddened, but not discouraged, women of that Branch. We were happy also to send \$200.00 to Bishop Burleson of South Dakota, in answer to his appeal after the tornado in his Diocese.

Early in the year, Bishop Du Moulin asked the Auxiliary to provide the outfit for a young man about to be ordained to the Diaconate. We responded with \$80.00 for a clerical suit; Toledo generously sent, besides money, a surplice and stole; and our Diocesan Altar Guild, a second stole.

Mr. H. A. Hunt of Fort Valley School, Georgia, asked our help toward a required sum for a Dormitory, money being given him from the Rockefeller Foundation, if he raised a certain amount. One hundred dollars (\$100.00) was sent him from our Auxiliary.

I wish gratefully to acknowledge your response to these appeals. It means added effort to send these moneys, as you are already pledged to many other objects.

Praying that all the work accomplished may be to His glory, and that His Kingdom on earth may be enlarged through us, we go on with the work in His Name and with His help.

Report of the First Vice-President



In the Lake Region during 1924, there were two important meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary,—both well attended. In January, the hospitable doors of St. Peter's Parish House in Ashtabula, a new and handsome building, were thrown open to welcome a large gathering of women. Mrs. Backus, Mrs. Anderson and Mrs. Grauel were the speakers. In October, at Conneaut, there was an inspirational meeting addressed by Mrs. Backus and Mrs. Anderson in the interests of the Nation-Wide Campaign to which as churchwomen we each and all are pledged.

The year's work of the Cleveland Region started out gayly in January with an Epiphany Party at the Cathedral. This observance of the Twelfth Night, time of merriment, has become quite an established custom with us.

The monthly meetings at the different churches offered varied and interesting programs and were fairly well attended. The outstanding events of the year were the visits of Bishop Reifsnider, Dr. James and Miss Wood.

Bishop Reifsnider came to us soon after his consecration in California. As he had passed through the horrors of the earthquake in Japan, he brought an impressive story of the heroism of the Japanese Christians, of their unflinching faith and loyalty in a time which tried men's souls. His plea was for the Reconstruction Work. Only the material evidence of our church's work in Japan for the last fifty years was wiped out. That splendid corps of workers who represent us there were spared, and when we read of their heroic effort and zeal, what a little thing it seems to ask of us that we stand back of them with our money and our prayers!

Dr. Mary James, head of the Women's Department of the Church General Hospital at Wuchang, brought us a stirring message. During her furlough she was taking special surgical work in the hospitals of Philadelphia, and we were able to secure her as our speaker only because she made a hurried trip to her native town of Gambier.

Miss Wood of Boone Library delighted us with her zeal and ardor in the cause of libraries in China and of the splendid work accomplished.

September 29th, St. Michael's and All Angels' is the annual day of prayer for the Woman's Auxiliary and was observed by having a quiet morning at Emmanuel Church. Rev. Mr. O'Ferrall spoke of the joyousness in life that should be ours as Christians, of the oft-repeated words of Christ—"Be of good cheer."

Because the Woman's Auxiliary is the one organization in the Church that has most truly caught the vision of service in far-away fields, we are asked this year to promote in every possible way the circulation of the "**Spirit of Missions.**" This magazine compares favorably with the "**Geographic,**" in its illustrations and is the fore-

most missionary magazine of the day. The October number is always devoted to the United Thank Offering, and last year the sales for that month dropped from 50,000 copies to only 12,000.

A strange situation indeed with the Triennial so near! In order to overcome this lack of support, the President of each Branch is asked to name someone to take subscriptions in the parish—someone who will accept this as her "mission" for the extension of knowledge concerning the Kingdom. At the request of the Publicity Department at Church Missions House, Mrs. D. W. Conrey, 1895 E. 81st Street, Cleveland, has been appointed the Diocesan Correspondent to whom you may write for any information with regard to this splendid missionary magazine.

We are very happy over the choice of the memorial for our late beloved president, Mrs. Knapp, who while in Japan, was much impressed by the splendid work of our Church in Kyoto, and it is here at St. Agnes' School that a dormitory for college girls has been named in her memory. By a strange coincidence, it stands near a dormitory for younger girls, erected by the Woman's Auxiliary of Virginia in memory of their president, Miss Sallie Stuart.

Miss Williams, the principal, writes that it is a large, fine building of which we may well be proud. Its rooms are small, accomodating two girls in stead of the larger rooms for four or five; and she adds, "the windows are real glass instead of paper."

Before making this decision, there was much correspondence and a careful survey of the field. Dr. John Wood, who had recently returned from the Orient, wrote that the most outstanding and vital need in the foreign field was that of St. Agnes' School. His letter stated that Miss Williams had reviewed with the clearness of the trained educator and with irrefutable argument the situation at Kyoto, and had given him his most uncomfortable moments when she asked, "What will the Church at home do about it?"

Mrs. Pancoast, our speaker of last year, you will remember, had also emphasized the crisis there—the need for a dormitory to take care of the increasing number of girls ready for their college work who would be lost to us if we were not ready for the expansion that the occasion demanded.

Because of Mrs. Knapp's deep spirituality and consecration, it seemed fitting that we should erect a chapel in her name, and this was the opportunity we sought. But we felt that if she were here she would say, "St. Agnes' presents the greatest need; let us meet it."

Most grateful acknowledgment is hereby made for the many loving gifts to this fund by individuals as well as Branches. Without Mr. Knapp's most generous assistance, this memorial would not have been possible. The rate of exchange has been so favorable that the eight thousand dollars paid in October amounted to about twenty thousand yen. With the completion of the entire amount of fifteen thousand dollars, this memorial fund constitutes the Auxiliary's largest contribution to our diocesan quota. Your continued interest is

asked for another year that the amount given by the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary may be a fair proportion of the cost of the memorial.

A bronze tablet, cast in Japan, where this work is so wonderfully well done, bears this inscription:—"To the glory of God, and in loving memory of Fannie Tillotson Knapp, President of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Ohio, 1913-1923, the beauty of whose life and character led many into the joy of service for our Lord and Master. Given to St. Agnes' School by the Woman's Auxiliary of Ohio, and by her husband, Homer P. Knapp.

Report of the Second Vice-President

At the afternoon session, the women had the pleasure of hearing Bishop Burleson, who spoke on his work among the Indians in South Dakota.

May the 12th, Memorial Service was held for our dear Mrs. Knapp, who had been an inspiration to the women of the Church for so many years. This service was held in Trinity Chapel, Toledo. Bishop DuMoulin was the Celebrant, assisted by Rev. Mr. Talmadge, Rector of Trinity Church.

Mrs. Backus, our Division President, gave a brief talk on the life and work of Mrs. Knapp; and Bishop DuMoulin closed the meeting with a short address, and a prayer that all might go forward in "His Name."

On October 9th, in Trinity Chapel, The Reverend Kirk O'Ferrall of Emmanuel Church, Cleveland, conducted a Quiet Morning for the Women of the Church. These Quiet Mornings are greatly appreciated by the women and they all receive the inspiration necessary to go on with "His" work.

On October 29th, at Grace Church, Toledo, an afternoon meeting was held and the audience had the pleasure of hearing Mrs. Wade, of New York, on the box work; also of hearing Mrs. Rose Conrey, of Cleveland, on the needs of the Church Periodical Club. Every woman in the audience, after hearing the addresses of these two women, felt that she must go forward with greater zeal.

On December 11th, the closing service of the year was held in St. Alban's Church. Miss Katherine L. Mather, of Cleveland, spoke on the United Thank Offering; following her address, Miss Elise Backus, of Toledo, presented the playlet, "The U. T. O. Boxes Con-

vention." This playlet was beautifully presented by nine young girls and was very much enjoyed by everyone present.

This has been an unusual year for the women of Toledo Region. Each woman has seemed to realize and to appreciate her responsibility. I should like to express my appreciation to Mrs. Harrison, Miss Backus and Mrs. Crosby for the valuable help they have given in the region. The great effort has been to arouse the women of the Church to the necessity of united effort, and in many ways it seems to have been successful.

One of the big things I have to report is that there have been organized this year two new Woman's Auxiliary Branches, one at St. Alban's Church, and one in West Toledo at the Mission of the Holy Spirit. The report of these two branches means that every Parish and Mission in Toledo Region has a branch of the Woman's Auxiliary. Education and prayer has been the motto of the Region, and, please God, we will go forward to better and greater things in His Name.

Report of the Secretary



This has been an eventful year and one of great activity for the Woman's Auxiliary in Ohio.

For the Secretary, there are always the many letters to write, notices and appeals to send out. But the busy days start in the Fall when the Year Book is being planned, blanks prepared to be sent out the last week in November, the pages for each parish alphabetically arranged for the reports as the blanks are returned. And may I take this opportunity to thank most cordially the secretaries whose reports are sent in so promptly? It is the greatest help in hastening the work of the Secretary. It requires several months of strenuous effort to compile the Year Book, and place it in your hands. But it is interesting work, and as a matter of preserving the records and giving information, very necessary. Would it seem presuming for me to suggest that you read it from cover to cover? You then would be in touch with the Diocesan and Branch Officers, and every phase of the work of the Auxiliary in your Diocese.

We are often asked for what purpose, and where the different funds are used. On the Information page all these questions are

answered. The Year Book is now ready and can be had free, after the luncheon.

I love to copy and classify your reports, and it is with keen pleasure that I note a United Thank Offering gift, large or small, showing that the women of the parish appreciate the many blessings God has given them, and that their vision extends beyond the borders of their own small field, into the field of the whole world.

The very interesting and profitable Summer Conference for Church Workers was held at Gambier, beginning the last week in June, and was attended by most of the Diocesan Officers. I would like to stress the importance of this Conference to the Women of the Church, for it is so worth while.

During the conference came the sad news of the Lorain disaster with the attending evils following in its wake: loss of life, property, and in some cases suffering for the necessities of life. The sympathy of the whole county was aroused. At once, our president called a meeting of the Board to arrange for the Woman's Auxiliary to aid our church people there. Their immediate needs were clothing and bedding.

As Secretary, I was requested to send a letter to every Branch in the Diocese. This was planned with some misgiving, as most of the organizations disband for the summer, and many people are away from home. However, to my great joy, the response was prompt and generous. Almost by return mail the replies came, offering to send boxes at once. In many cases where a Branch could not send a box, a check was sent. Especially were many of the small Branches to be congratulated for their generosity.

Next came a call from Bishop Burleson, asking for aid, following a tornado in his Diocese. To this need also there was a prompt response.

In speaking of the activities of the past year, I cannot pass on without paying tribute to our President, Mrs. Backus, and Mrs. Anderson, Educational Secretary, who have visited and taken a message to many of the parishes all over the Diocese. They were never too busy to answer a call to speak or read a paper. They seemed never to be weary in well-doing.

Again, on our Memorial page we record the names of our fellow workers whom God has called to the Life Eternal. In memory of their lives and work, let us stand in silence a moment. Of the number, one was our Diocesan officer, Verna S. Bates. In her last report to the Women of the Auxiliary, she said, "Year after year, for thirty years now, you have given me this pleasure." How lovingly and efficiently she fulfilled her mission. As it has been said, how wonderfully blest this Ohio Branch has been in its leadership of consecrated women; and again, we see God's hand in the choice of Mrs. Bates' successor.

And may every Diocesan and Branch officer, yes, and every member of the Auxiliary, feel that it is a privilege to have a part in God's work, as did Mrs. Bates.

To do the most efficient work, the co-operation of all the members is necessary, and there is nothing that brings the members together and holds their interest, as some work in common.

Co-operation is the touchstone of modern civilization. Its highest form is renunciation, working for the saving of humanity, with no thought of personal aggrandizement. In Persia there is a legend of a bird, which beautifully interprets co-operation. "In place of a wing, on one side the male bird has a hook, and the female a ring. When they are fastened together, and **only** when they are fastened together, can the birds fly." This legend well portrays humanity, for only when men are united and strive together, can true progress be made.

Let us together go forward with an earnest desire to fulfill our mission, so that, at our next Annual Meeting, our achievements may be greater than ever before. And if at times our tasks seem too difficult, let us remember the promise—"As thy day, so shall thy strength be."

Report of the Treasurer



Through the pages of the Year Book your new treasurer sends you her greeting and asks your help and support in the work of the coming year.

The death of Mrs. Laverna Bates in Los Angeles, California, on July the fourth, brought to a close thirty years of faithful, loving and painstaking service for the Auxiliary as its treasurer.

Mrs. Bates knew the Diocese of Ohio as one knows her own household. The Branches were as her children. She knew the large and the small, the rich and the poor, the prompt and the slow, the willing and the hesitant and so adjusted the work in a way which her successor can hardly hope to imitate.

It was therefore with humility of spirit and much hesitation, but with an earnest desire to carry on with like faithfulness that your new treasurer opened in September the books so suddenly closed in July.

The end of the year brought to her the joy of announcing pledges paid and of knowing that again as throughout Mrs. Bates' long treasurership the Ohio women had met their promised obligations and

that, while a somewhat smaller sum had passed through the treasurer's hands during the year because of special funds handled by special chairmen, the total of \$10,751.77 was most gratifying.

For a number of years, in order to save time, it has been the custom to omit the taking of pledges at the annual meeting and to assume that the old pledges would be continued.

Because of this custom and because changes in needs and conditions have necessitated changes in pledges some of our most important funds have been found lacking.

Mrs. Bates knew upon which of you to call for help. I cannot know so well as she and it becomes necessary for me to ask for some additional pledges for our two exclusively Ohio Funds—Miss Caroline Fullerton, our own missionary in China, to whom we are pledged for nine hundred dollars and Mrs. Eva D. Joyner whose salary with that of her assistant, is seven hundred dollars.

Miss Fullerton is the representative of the Ohio Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary in China, where she is the principal of St. Mary's Hall, Shanghai.

Mrs. Joyner is our very successful missionary at Glen Alpine in the Blue Ridge Mountains, where she is in charge of St. Paul's Mission which the Ohio Branch has supported from its beginning. Both are underpledged.

Miss Fullerton's work needs an additional \$133.00; Mrs. Joyner's requires \$111.00.

With an increase in your pledges toward these funds, we can enter upon our work together with the prospect of obligations met and good work done at the year's close. One may hesitate to press too strongly the money side of our undertakings, but through our money gifts we can best transmute our love, our faith and our strength into actual helpfulness in the Christian cause, which we are organized to promote.

Report of the Director of the Supply Department



The year 1924 has shown a marked increase in interest, work and the number of parishes taking some kind of box work. One of the most encouraging things being the 18 new names on the director's book.

The allotment for 1924 was as follows: 13 personal, 3 of these being colored and 2 Indian; 3 Catechists, 4 missions, 1 school, 1 hospital and 12 Christmas boxes for women missionaries.

The value of all boxes sent out from January 1st, 1924, to January 1st, 1925, is as follows:

I am sorry to report that there are 56 parishes or mission stations with whom I am not in touch, not being able to procure a Custodian at any of them, though I am in correspondence with seventy-two.

We have only till October, 1925—nine months this year, in which to make Ohio's U. T. O what it should be. Don't you all feel that we ought to make a big advance each Triennial? And we will, if **every** church woman gives something. It is not large single amounts that are asked for, but the little daily Thank Offerings, which would surprise us, if all joined in it!

Report of Educational Secretary



January 1st, 1924, to January 1st, 1925

Believing that knowledge of the mission of the Church is essential in carrying on its work, we study and pray for the increase of knowledge regarding the Church, what it is, what it stands for, and what it is accomplishing at home and abroad.

The organization through which the system of adult education is carried on, consists of National Diocesan, Regional, and Parish Educational secretaries and committees.

A Diocesan committee composed of a leader in each Region carries out our program of education, and to them I am grateful for loyal support.

It is necessary to have in each Parish an Educational Secretary to plan definitely for the year's work, and to arrange for its being carried on.

Through Prayer and Discussion Groups and the reading of Church papers, much information can be given to many people.

Of course Educational Groups form the intensive way in instructing in the mission of the Church. To this method used by the Woman's Auxiliary for many years, must be added the conduct of Program Meetings, Reading and Prayer Circles, Bible Classes, Plays, Pageants and Stereopticon Lectures, and when possible, the use of missionaries from the field, as they, the living links, connect workers at home with those on the firing line.

Then the Normal classes — Institutes and Summer Conferences for the training of leaders for the accomplishment of all these educational plans.

As to the Stereopticon Slides stationed for this Province (the Fifth) at No. 8614 Euclid Avenue, Cleveland, Ohio, in care of Miss Ada Crary. It is strange they are not more widely used in this Diocese — instead they go all over the Province and in one instance, traveled to the Diocese of Texas. They are also being used and appreciated by Churches connected with the Federation in Cleveland.

Again, we co-operated with this body in presenting a series of lectures on World Problems, closing with a Pageant, "Heroes of World Friendship."

We also had a share in making a success of the Mission Study Class conducted in the seven Regions into which the City is divided. The following tells of plans for advancing the educational program of the year:

In January, Miss Boyer, of New York City, conducted four institutes, in Cleveland, Toledo, Sandusky and Mansfield Regions closing with the Fifth in Stubenville in the Ohio River Region.

"Creative Forces in Japan" was the book to arouse our interest in these people in the Orient, and to recognize their need of Christ and His Gospel of Love.

Thirty-four Parishes were represented with a registration **two hundred and sixty-five**.

One Normal Class for the West Side, of which I was the leader.

The Gambier Conference was well attended by our women, and all were well pleased with the Study Class. Under Miss Tillotson's leadership, much interest was aroused in "China's Real Revolution," the textbook for next year's study.

The many meetings and conferences make many heavy demands on time and strength, as the following will show:

Federated Churches, 14. Federated Cabinet, 15. Board Meetings, Woman's Auxiliary, 12. Department of Religious Education, 4. Conferences, 9. Miscellaneous, 52. Church Service League, 3. House of Church Women, Racine, Wisconsin, three days. Pieces of mail sent out, 523. Institutes on "China's Real Revolution," 6. Led by Miss Boyer, 5. Led by Mrs. E. S. Grauel, 1. For the Lake Region,

Institutes on "My Father's Business," 2. Led by Mrs. E. S. Grauel, and Mrs. Rupert Holland, Toledo Region.

Regional Meetings visited, Ashtabula, Fremont, Akron. Parishes visited in Diocese, Toledo, Painesville, Lorain. Parishes in Cleveland, Trinity, St. Paul's E. C., Emmanuel and St. John's.

Suggested Programs for use in Parish Groups were sent out early in the Fall. The Nation-Wide Campaign material, "My Father's Business" and "China's Real Revolution," were the books used in arranging the Program.

In September, plans were made for our part in arousing interest in the Nation-Wide Campaign.

Mrs. Backus and I were asked to represent the Woman's Auxiliary, and our work was to visit as many Groups as possible to tell of the Program of the Church. Mrs. Backus giving the Inspirational, missionary view of the program; my part, as always, the informational, definite side of the work.

Urging the study of the Program of the Church, the Program Presented and the book on the World Problems and Personal Responsibility, "My Father's Business." This book was well received, and almost five hundred copies were sent out through the Diocese.

It is interesting to know that the Nation-Wide Campaign among women caused the use of this book in twenty-six of the Parishes reporting to this Department.

Five Study Classes, many lectures, sermons, book reviews and a wide use of it as a good book to read and study.

Some reported plans for the use of it in next year's Program. We visited in Cleveland, Emmanuel, Church Service League Council, The Local Assembly of the Daughters of the King, Trinity Cathedral, St. Luke's, St. Paul's and St. John's.

Regional meetings, Lima, Conneaut, Youngstown, Mansfield, Massillon and Cleveland.

Meetings in Diocese, Toledo, Akron (Our Savior), Oberlin, Coshocton, Steubenville, Akron (St. Paul).

Reports from forty-three Parishes tell of work done through Program Meetings, 147. Bible and Prayer Groups, 15. Reading Circles, 3. Stereopticon Lectures, 102. Plays and Pageants, 14. Discussion Groups, Japan, 34. Discussion Group N. W. C., 5.

If, as we follow the Nation-Wide Campaign, plan and study the whole work of the Church in the world during that time and use the book telling of the need in a special field in the other seasons of Epiphany and Lent, we will prove ourselves a power for good to our Church and Her Mission.

And now closing the book for this year, let us have as our aim in the coming year, "A Program for study in each Parish," in the

Diocese, that through information so obtained we may better understand our share and responsibility as members of the Church, "HIS BODY."

Not forgetting the purpose of all Mission Study, "To know HIM and make HIM KNOWN!"

The Annual Report of the Church Periodical Club In the Diocese of Ohio



January 1st, 1924, to January 1st, 1925

The year of 1924 has been marked by the beginning of Diocesan Conferences of the Parish Librarians in the Church Periodical work. Such conferences have been held in stronger Dioceses in the East for many years, and now Ohio is already realizing that much interest is added to the work by these meetings where there is an opportunity for interchange of ideas and methods.

Three such conferences have been held—in March, in June and in September.

At the two latter meetings we had the good fortune to have fine speakers. In June, Miss Mary E. Wood of Wuchang, China, head and mother of the Boone University Library, came to Cleveland to tell of her work in China.

As Boone University is the Special for which Ohio has worked for two years, every one was interested in hearing of the struggle to make this Library an adequate and suitable one for a University.

In September, Miss Mary E. Thomas, our National Executive Secretary, came to meet the Librarians of the Diocese and to give them the benefit of a real conference of questions and answers.

The work has gone along in all the regular lines of supplying reading and recreational matter to our missions and missionaries, to shut-ins and to isolated churchmen.

Outside of the routine work, Ohio sent to Dr. Teusler of St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo, \$102.50, in money for books, besides hundreds of medical magazines to help refurnish the library destroyed in the earthquake. Dr. Teusler says that he has already a library superior to the one destroyed and that the new one is used by all the hospitals in Tokyo.

In addition to the work for Tokyo, we sent \$350.00 in money for books as well as many fine books to Boone Library, Wuchang, China, —this being our Special for the year.

At the urgent request of Miss Wood, backed up by the wish of the New York office of the Church Periodical Club, Ohio will give one more year's effort to this interesting work in China.

Librarians are supplied with book-plates, on which names of donors of books may be signed, to be placed afterwards in the gift.

At the present time not more than half of the Parishes in the Diocese have working Branches of the Church Periodical Club.

We must not rest till we have a Branch in every Parish—a Branch that will carry on. We want all our missionaries and Church workers to feel that the Church Periodical Club stands behind them for Christian education and recreation.

Information



The Ohio Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary has as its representative in China, the principal of St. Mary's Hall, Shanghai. Her salary has been increased to nine hundred dollars a year on account of living costs. Please send generous gifts to Mrs. H. R. Collacott, Treasurer.

Since the founding of St. Paul's Mission at Glen Alpine in the Blue Ridge Mountains, we have had the honor of supporting it. Our very successful missionary there is Mrs. James Joyner. The work has grown so much that we have now provided Mrs. Joyner with an assistant. The sum for which we pledge ourselves to Glen Alpine is seven hundred dollars.

The "Bishop Leonard Fund" is for use among the missions of Ohio, when and where the Bishop thinks it best. We have pledged to him five hundred dollars.

The "Bishop Rogers Fund" will place in the hands of the Bishop Coadjutor, a sum for use at his discretion among missions in the Diocese.

The "Expense Fund" covers the cost of publishing the annual report, occasional circulars or leaflets and notices, postage in several departments, traveling expenses in starting new Branches, and that of missionaries whom we invite to address us. With the enlarged scope of the Supply Department, there are expenses for freight, express and postage. To meet the demands on this fund it must be materially increased.

The Educational Committee has opportunities for advance work, if the necessary money can be applied.

The "Contingent Fund" is available for all sorts of emergencies and is of great service. It is often expended for overcoats needed without delay, or for clerical suits; also for necessary articles of clothing not otherwise obtainable. Larger pledges to this fund are earnestly solicited.

The Bishop Bedell Scholarship and the Julia Bedell Scholarship pay for the education of native pupils in St. John's University, Shanghai, China. They require \$70 each per annum. The "Ohio Scholarship" in St. Elizabeth's—one of the Bishop Hare Schools in South Dakota—pays for the education of an Indian pupil; it requires sixty dollars per year.

Kuling School, China, is a school for the education of the children of Missionaries and pledges are asked for its support.

The "Foreign Insurance Fund" provides insurance upon the lives of foreign missionaries for the benefit of their families. We, of the Ohio Branch, have for more than forty years contributed annually to this fund. Our pledge is one hundred dollars a year.

All pledges are payable to Mrs. H. R. Collacott, 412 S. State Street, Painesville, Ohio. In the case of a "special" when a custodian

is named, all money may be sent direct to the collector, who later reports to Mrs. Collacott.
