The Annual Meeting at Cleveland

May 3, 1928



The Fifty-first Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council, in the Diocese of Ohio, convened in St. Paul's new parish house, Cleveland, on Thursday, May 3, 1928. The Holy Communion was celebrated at ten o'clock with the Rt. Rev. William A. Leonard, Bishop of Ohio, as celebrant, assisted by the Rt. Rev. Warren L. Rogers, Bishop Coadjutor, the Rev. Dr. Walter R. Breed, rector of St. Paul's and the Rev. Frederic Adams.

At the conclusion of this impressive service, it was the pleasure of Bishop Leonard to name the diocesan officers who were to serve for the ensuing year.

The Bishop then submitted his annual report in which he congratulated the Auxiliary for their splendid support of the work being carried on among the colored people, the foreign-born and the deaf mutes of the Diocese. The watchword which the Bishop left with the delegates for the coming year was "Dedication."

After the singing of our Auxiliary hymn, Dr. Breed gave a cordial welcome to the delegates. Following this, the President, Mrs. E. J. Backus, called the meeting to order for business. A motion was made and carried to omit the reading of the Minutes of the previous meeting as they are printed in the Year Book. The roll call, which always elicits enthusiasm as the delegates rise when each Branch is called, revealed an attendance of 483, but that number was increased to over 500 before the lunch hour.

Mrs. Backus then read her ^{fine} final annual report, which, she said, dealt with beginnings and not results. The follow-up work of the Bishops' Crusade, Regional meetings, Fellowship teas for the foreign-born, and Christian social service were some of the many activities.

The report of the diocesan secretary, Miss Brenneman, dealt largely with the compiling of the Year Book. She expressed her grateful thanks to all the secretaries for their splendid co-operation.

At the moment of twelve o'clock all business was suspended for the noonday prayers, led by Bishop Rogers.

The diocesan treasurer, Mrs. H. R. Collacott, told of having sent pledge cards to the ninety-five Branches and only received a response from forty-one. Mrs. Collacott then called attention to four things: the Contingent Fund, to which she asked an increase if possible; One Hundred Dollars towards a fund to be raised for a mission in the Philippines; a new dormitory for the boys at the Fort Valley High and Industrial School, Fort Valley, Ga.; and the Bishop Rowe Foundation, raised in commemoration of Bishop Rowe's twenty-fifth anniversary in the work of the Alaskan mission. When the pledges were taken it was found \$115 was raised for the Philippines. This pledge will go on from year to year. The pledge for Fort Valley is for this year only, as also the one for Bishop Rowe Foundation, which is ex-

pected to be completed by the Triennium. For Fort Valley \$230 was pledged and for the Bishop Rowe Foundation, \$465.

Mrs. Backus announced the good news that the Endowment Fund had been increased by \$1000, given by the children of the late Mr. and Mrs. D. Z. Norton, which brings the total amount to date \$14,000.

Because the Woman's Auxiliary is an aid to the National Council, it is expected they will help in every department of that body. Mrs. John G. Anderson, diocesan educational secretary, was appointed chairman of the woman's division of the Nation-Wide.

The following delegates were appointed to attend the Triennial to be held in October in Washington, D. C. Each diocese sends five delegates and five alternates. The delegates were: Mrs. E. J. Backus, Mrs. H. R. Collacott, Mrs. C. C. Bubb, Mrs. W. H. Bingham and Mrs. L. W. S. Stryker. The alternates were: Mrs. Goodbody, Mrs. Dawson, Mrs. Anderson, Mrs. R. R. Bowman and Miss Lettie Brenneman.

Bishop Rogers expressed his gratitude to the Auxiliary for their gift of \$400 which helped him care for emergencies on account of illness of clergy or members of clergymen's families.

The meeting then adjourned for luncheon and recess of an hour. The afternoon session began promptly at two o'clock.

In the absence of Miss Katherine Mather, treasurer of the United Thank Offering, Mrs. Backus urged that every effort be made to make the Offering as large as possible. Mrs. W. H. Bingham, director of the Supply Department, gave a most encouraging report, and thanked the members for their loyal support. Mrs. Bingham said the value of all boxes sent out for the year, beginning January 1, 1927, was \$7,804.06.

The speaker of the day was the Rt. Rev. Walter Overs, retired Bishop of the missionary district of Liberia. The Bishop delighted his hearers with many stories of his experiences while in Liberia. He told of the great need for more doctors and nurses, more schools and more hospitals for the two million people who live there. The Bishop paid a splendid tribute to the noble work of Miss Margaret Ridgley, who is head of the Bethany School for girls and has served for twenty-two years. Such schools, he said, are the only hope for the girls of Africa, who have nothing to look forward to but a life of slavery and drudgery.

The closing address was given by Bishop Rogers who talked on the subject of "Peace." The Bishop mentioned the Centennial anniversary of the American Peace Society about to be celebrated in Cleveland the following week. Prayer, service and giving, he said, were the strong factors in our work toward peace.

With a vote of thanks to the women of St. Paul's for their generous hospitality, and the benediction by Bishop Rogers, this very interesting meeting closed.

Report of the President



As your President, I attended the great Triennial at Washington; and I have tried since then to tell you of the inspiration received from the great mass meetings, and of the many obligations, we who were delegates have taken upon ourselves through resolutions passed. Through the vote of the majority of the delegates present our relations continue to the National Council: we are Auxiliary to it in its six departments of service.

Therefore we are pledged to work not only for the Department of Missions, but also for Christian Social Service, Religious Education, Finance (especially in the interest of the Nation-Wide Campaign,)

Publicity by adding subscribers for the Spirit of Missions and Church papers. In the Field Department, at present, we are committed to advance the cause of Personal Religion and Evangelism. All of these interests are included in what we now call the Church's Mission, which is the World Mission of Christianity. Therefore efforts have been made by your Diocesan Board of officers to reach out in helpfulness, perhaps often in a small way, in accordance with suggestions made at the Triennial.

Our Diocesan Treasurer and our Diocesan Box Secretary show, in their reports, an increase of interest expressed through the money and boxes given in fulfillment of our missionary pledges, there being a substantial increase in money and value of boxes.

We chose our quota towards the Corporate Gift of the last three years, namely the hospital, so much needed in Liberia. We exceeded the amount asked of us, and had something towards the new Corporate Gift, the Church at Santo Domingo, of which Mrs. Collacott has written you. She has written many letters to you of this Corporate Gift, and has taken a great load off my mind, as we pledged that our quota should be paid by Easter next.

For Christian Social Service, in which we include our friendly relations with the Foreign Language Churches, we have made some efforts. Through the invitation of Bishop Rogers and the Rev. Donald Wonders, Chairman of the Social Service Commission of the Diocese, the Cleveland Region had a splendid address on the subject of how the Auxiliary could help in this department, by the Rev. Dr. Frank Nelson of Christ Church, Cincinnati. I have suggested that the Regions have a speaker on this subject, at one of their Regional meetings. The Diocesan Board gave a tea to the Social Workers in the city who are identified with our Church. We found that there were fifty-five such workers; and they expressed appreciation of our friendliness.

In October last, St. Michael's Russian Church invited the Cleveland Region of the Woman's Auxiliary to a service of song, rendered by their choir, without the organ. Many of our Church people responded to the invitation besides the Woman's Auxiliary; and the occasion was one of reciprocal pleasure and understanding. The women of our Churches nearest to the Greek, Roumanian and Russian Churches have been asked to attend a service at those Churches, to show friendliness and a desire to appreciate the other's point of view. The reports from the women visitors have been most gratifying. I also have attended services at several of the Foreign Language Churches, receiving great pleasure and helpfulness.

Your President was invited by the Roumanians to attend a banquet at the Hotel Cleveland, in commemoration of the tenth anniversary of the union of Roumania with the Provinces which are a part of that nation. It was a most interesting and enjoyable occasion. The ability to do this work with other peoples in our city comes through our Board member on Foreign Language interests, Mrs. Ledbetter, of whom we are very proud.

Letters were sent to the Presidents of the Branches through the Diocese, suggesting that they ask their rectors to have a Communion Service at the time of the great United Thank Offering meeting in Washington; also that a day of intercession be planned in every parish for the work of the Woman's Auxiliary at the Triennial. I know a number of the parishes responded; and this gave me great happiness.

Mrs. H. L. Wallau sent out letters to the Presidents asking that interest in the Spirit of Missions be increased. Please write her that you have appointed one who will work in the interests of that magazine.

Mrs. O. H. Stafford of Boardman has been made happy by receiving from isolated Churchwomen some answers to her letters. Because of a letter in the Spirit of Missions from Bishop Fox's Diocese in Montana, we wrote to him and he gave us several names of really isolated Churchwomen. This has been of great interest to Mrs. Stafford and myself.

With Mrs. Grauel, first Vice-President, I attended in May a Conference for Auxiliary Officers at Racine. As I was East at the time of the Wellesley Summer Conference, I took great pleasure in attending it. I was, however, sorry to miss the Gambier Conference.

As a delegate to the Home Missions Council in January, 1928, I had the pleasure of meeting the delegate to this Council from New York Headquarters, Mrs. A. J. Gammack. I was offered her services in the Diocese, as she is a United Thank Offering Field Worker. I gladly took advantage of this offer for the Diocese. In February she was my guest; and plans were made and carried, to visit, together with the Regional Chairman of Akron, Mrs. R. R. Bowman, Akron, Barberton, Ravenna and Medina. She also visited New Philadelphia and Ashtabula, and made an address at a morning service at St. James', Painesville. Together we visited St. Paul's and St. Philip's, Cleveland.

The Board of Officers of the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary have a meeting the second Tuesday of each month. I have attended all such meetings and many conferences and committee meetings, and all the Cleveland Regional meetings and Quiet Days.

With some of the officers I have visited Akron, Church of Our Saviour; Lima; Akron, St. Peter's; Toledo, St. Mark's; Diocesan Institute in Toledo; Mu Ta Alpha Branch, Toledo; Defiance; St. Paul's, St. Philip's and Incarnation, Cleveland; Hudson; St. Martin's, Cleveland; Norwalk; Sandusky; North Madison; West Park; Steubenville, St. Paul's; Wellsville; Steubenville, St. Stephen's and East Liverpool; Youngstown; Boardman; Ashtabula; Wooster; St. Andrew's, Cleveland; Emmanuel, Cleveland; and Put-in-Bay.

We have had, in our Cleveland Region, Bishop Overs, Bishop Campbell, Bishop Rowe, Canon Mallett; Dr. Tompkins for a Quiet Day; Dean White for a Quiet Morning; and Dr. Nelson of Cincinnati. Through the Regions as reported in the Year Book, there have been many more speakers in our Diocese.

In February of this year I called together the nine Regional Chairmen. Stress was laid upon their responsibility to lead the women of

the Church in Personal Evangelism. Personal Evangelism as defined by the Executive Secretary of the St. Andrew's Brotherhood, is "any effort by an individual to bring another individual nearer to Christ through His Church." The activities in this direction will be reported next year.

All your delegates came from the Triennial in Washington with the feeling that the Woman's Auxiliary is willing to do great things for God and His Church. I quote from Miss Lindley's New Year's Quarterly Letter, "We want our Lord to ask great things of us. I am tempted to believe that one of the greatest things He can ask is, what may not appear so great, the quiet adding, almost one by one, of those women who do not yet have a share in the Church's work to the list of those who have learned to love the whole work of the whole Church." There are many women in our Diocese who are not with us. Go out and seek them; you will surely find them. It will increase our work four times.

Before closing this report, I wish to express my great personal loss in the retirement of Miss Mather as our United Thank Offering Treasurer. Many of you are much attached to her; and I know you voice with me our great appreciation of her long years of service with us, and for us. Her work and her manner of doing it have been an example of consecration that we should follow. Mrs. Samuel Strong of Gates Mill has consented to follow her; and I ask your consideration and co-operation with her.

Let us go to our tasks full of courage. "We have a cause that is invincible; a Lord who overcomes all difficulties." Let us consider the Church's Mission our Crusade for Him; and not only sing the "World for Christ," but give Him to the world through every effort of our lives.

Report of the Secretary



At the close of the year 1928, a review of the activities of the Woman's Auxiliary shows improvement in most of the departments of our work. Interest in the United Thank Offering has increased during the past few years. Many parishes have given **more** this year than ever before, and it is gratifying that **more** Branches are giving, and some from the weak, smaller parishes.

When I read your annual reports and note the gifts, large and small, in money and the labor that went into the filling of those splendid boxes that have been sent to our mission fields, at home and abroad, to gladden the hearts of faithful and needy missionaries, I know that this is only the outward expression of your labor; that back of it all is the spirit of Him who prompted the effort and sacrifice.

More interest in study classes and the reading of Church papers are evidenced by the report of the Educational Secretary. And in passing, may I recommend the Spirit of Missions to every Church family. The magazine contains news of our missionaries to whom our gifts are sent, and the work our Church is doing all over the world.

Then, we have our Summer Conference for Church workers at Gambier, which is so worth while, and fortunate are those who are privileged to attend.

The object of the report of a secretary, after a word of greeting, is to render an account of her stewardship. It has been said that

the duties of a secretary resemble those of a housekeeper, which is, doing the same things over and over again, day after day. However, if the work at times is monotonous, it is none the less important. The writing of letters is a duty which continues throughout the year; letters of commendation, of sympathy, of information and business. Notices of monthly Board meetings, taking notes, writing reports, notices of Annual meeting which must be sent to all the Branches, and many letters must be written to arrange for this meeting. The foregoing are the simple duties of a secretary. The real task starts in the fall when the Year Book is compiled. From the beginning of the work until the books are finished by the printer, three months have passed and sometimes longer. The reason for this is that the reports from all of the Branches must be in my hands, also the reports of the diocesan officers and regional chairmen, before much can be accomplished. I want, at this time, to thank the secretaries who sent in their reports promptly, and your personal notes were much appreciated. There were more reports sent in on time than ever before, but there are always quite a number who do not respond, which means a letter, and sometimes two, before a reply comes. This delay makes the work of the secretary somewhat trying. The books are now ready, and three will be given free to each Branch after the luncheon. If extra copies are wanted, there will be a charge of 25 cents per copy. From the report of the treasurer, you will learn that the printing of the Year Book is very expensive. So we urge you to make good use of these records. If I may, I will again suggest that at your first gathering after this Annual meeting have the president or some other member read aloud, beginning at the first page. And if there is not time to finish at the first meeting, you cannot spend the second in a more advantageous way than to finish the reading of the book. There is not time at the Annual meeting for the diocesan officers to read their reports; it seems best to give the time to our missionary speakers, and these reports are messages to you. I would call your attention to the Information pages. Recently a good churchwoman, and the president of a Branch, said to me, "It is difficult to fill out those blanks, to know where to place our gifts; as for instance, the Sarah L. Leonard Scholarship." I referred her to the Information page in her Year Book. Hence, you will pardon my insistence in urging the reading of the Year Book.

We are happy to welcome to our ranks five new Branches of the Women's Auxiliary: Barbarton, St. Andrew's Mission; Kent, Christ Church; Wooster, St. James' Church; Lakewood, Advent Mission; North Madison, All Saints' Mission.

It is with sadness that we record the names of many of our co-workers whom God has called to the life eternal. In memory of their lives and work may we stand in silence a moment.

A phase of the work, which most of us neglect and one that is the foundation of our interest, is the education of ourselves. We cannot be interested without knowing. To know, we must read and study. Let us take as the keynote for the work during the coming

year, the re-consecration of ourselves to the work of the Church, and the effort to know and appreciate the scope of the great work she is striving to do in the world.

She talked of the National Peace Conference which she had attended in Washington, and of Peace as a habit of daily thought and action. Meeting adjourned at 3 p. m. to meet on November 9th at St. Paul's, Akron.

The Fall Regional was held November 9th and had an attendance of 136 women. The Holy Communion was administered at 10:30 a. m. after which came the usual business meeting. There were short talks by those women who had attended the General Convention in Washington during October.

Luncheon was served by the women of St. Paul's parish and during this period Mr. Keeler of Akron and Canon Stalker of Massillon, both spoke briefly of the General Convention.

At the afternoon meeting Bishop Campbell of Liberia, was the speaker. He gave a most interesting and inspiring talk of his work in Liberia and with the colored people. He helped create new interest in the mission study for the year "The New Africa."

Meeting adjourned at 3 p. m. to meet April 26, 1929 at St. Peter's, Akron.

Report of the Cleveland Region

On January 13, 1928, we held an Epiphany Party at St. Paul's Church, East Cleveland, with an attendance of 262 guests, Bishop Rogers being our chief speaker, and following his talk on the Lausanne Conference, a most enjoyable time was given to all present.

The next meeting, held February 10th at St. Philip's Church, we heard the Rev. Kirk B. O'Ferrall, Rector of Emmanuel Church, on the subject "Characters Along Life's Highway," St. Francis of Assisi being chosen on this occasion. Mrs. Gammick, Field Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, spoke on the Thank Offering and work of the organization. A most instructive and interesting day.

On February 17th, we had a most helpful and inspiring Quiet Day at Emmanuel Church, with the Rev. Floyd W. Tomkins, D. D. of Holy Trinity Church, Philadelphia. His meditations on "The Personal Religious Life" were helpful and uplifting.

The Diocesan and Regional officers feel greatly elated over the success of the Fellowship teas which they have been giving in honor of their foreign language neighbors who live in Cleveland. The third of the series, took place in St. John's Church on Friday, March 9th, when the Russian and Greek churches of the West Side were very well represented.

On April 13th a luncheon meeting, at the Church of the Ascension, Lakewood. The speaker was Mrs. Dorothy D. Henry, Director of the Woman's Bureau of the Police Department, who gave us an insight into the great work done in our community.

On September 29th, at Trinity Cathedral, we had a most beautiful service and meditations given by Dean White, at which time the United Thank Offering was presented. About 500 women attended the service. A most cordial invitation was extended to all present from Miss Katherine Mather to luncheon after the service. The beautiful home and grounds were thrown open to our women, and a most charming afternoon was enjoyed by all.

On November 9th, at St. Peter's Church, Lakewood, we were entertained with luncheon, and the reports of the General Convention given by the delegates from our diocese.

December 14th, owing to the most disagreeable weather we had, a very small meeting at the Church of the Holy Spirit. All those present thoroughly enjoyed a most instructive talk on India, illustrated by lantern slides, given by Mrs. J. J. Tracy of Cleveland.

The region is growing in strength and our numbers are increasing at each meeting. I feel sure that the next year will be encouraged by our efforts in the past to keep up the good work and pleasant fellowship.

A Word from the Treasurer



As treasurer of the Woman's Auxiliary, I present to you in this Year Book my fifth report and it may be of interest to you, as it is to me, to see the growth of the work during the five years. This has not been the result of any particular drive or campaign except in the case of the Gold and Silver offering.

In 1925 we had the first amounts on the Endowment Fund, in 1926 the final collection of the Knapp Memorial and in 1927 the total of the Gold and Silver offering so we were agreed that our total this year must of necessity fall a little behind the results of the preceding ones, but for some reason we were to be disappointed in this expectation for when the figures were added, the amount from the Branches had increased and the most generous sum which Miss Mather had collected for the United Offering during 1928 brought our total to \$4639.91 more than in 1927. The totals for the past five years are as follows:

Report of Educational Secretary



So much thought is being given to Adult Education in secular, religious, and missionary lines, that our Church, wishing to emphasize Christian Education, prepared and offered a splendid program for the training of leaders who had educational work to carry on in diocese and parish. It was gratifying to see the hundreds who availed themselves of this opportunity. You will be interested in the following quotation from Hilda Jacka's book, "A Mind for the Kingdom,"—"Christian Education, therefore, is not a special education, but the most general education imaginable; it is a whole view of the world in the light of a belief in God, an equipment in vision and a knowledge for the true service of God and man for His sake, and it is in this, and no smaller sense that Christian Education is more needed than anything else all over the world."

So we must know more of conditions everywhere beyond our own parishes, and learn in what way the Gospel is giving to people the best and fullest way of life. We can learn through reading, study, and in joining with others to talk and discuss the problems and needs of those we wish to help.

Through the General Church Program, the windows are opened to the whole work in the whole world, and, as we read and study it, we can see just how our Church functions in its world-wide mission through its man and money power. Through the study of a special field each year, we get in close touch with the people of that land, and as we know, we are interested and want to serve. In 1927-28, "A Church Awake" held our attention, and many people now know more about the principles and teachings of their Church, and their responsibility for her success in the world. For 1928-29, the field of Africa was opened to us, and material and publicity has stimulated interest in this land of mystery. This, we hope will lead us to have a share in the bringing of these millions of people to Christ in God's good time. The text book, "The New Africa" by Donald Fraser, is being used by all communions, in England, Canada and the United States.

The regional plan is at last coming into its own in this department, where the leaders feel their responsibility, prepare to shoulder it, and, in parishes under their care, see to it that this work is kept to the front, as is its right, by the following: Mrs. E. S. Grauel, Lake Region; Mrs. Harry Frease, Akron; Mrs. Ralph Evans, Cleveland; Mrs. B. H. Leavenworth, Toledo and Lima; Mrs. F. L. Geiger, Youngstown; Miss Maud Gorham, Mansfield; Mrs. E. M. Irish, Ohio River; and Mrs. E. C. Loofbourrow.

Report blanks sometimes get no farther than the waste basket, and are most elusive things, but, in spite of the fact that they never all come back, we know that education of some sort is going on in all organized parishes and missions in the diocese.

It is not easy to give a true report in figures, but the following tells of what has been done in more than forty parishes that returned questionnaires: 207 Program Meetings, 44 Book Reviews, 2 Plays, 9 Pageants, 8 Bible Classes, 3 Prayer Groups, 20 Days of Intercession, 3 Reading Circles, 32 Discussion Groups, 132 Stereopticons in West and Mid-West, 23 at Summer Conferences. Three clergymen used "A Church Awake" as a basis for a series of five sermons. One clergyman gave a series of six lectures on the same book.

Some groups study the General Church Program throughout the year; this should be done in every parish and mission. The book reviews showed a wide choice of subjects; A Church Awake, Message of the Episcopal Church, Christ of the Indian Road, A Straight Way to Tomorrow, The Inner Chamber, Mother India, The Impatience of a Parson, The Golden Stool, Porgy, God's Stepchildren, The Adventure of the Church, The Old Book in the New World, The Divine Commission, The Book Nobody Knows, and The Search for Peace.

On January 30th and 31st an institute was held for the Lima and Toledo Regions under my direction. Lead classes during Lent in St. Paul's and Church of the Ascension parishes, where no leaders as yet have been developed. Held a diocesan conference on November 13th at St. Paul's, Cleveland Heights' for regional and parish leaders. Prepared and sent out the usual "Suggested Programs for Study and Reading" which people say they find useful. Visited 42 parishes, and attended 13 regional meetings, 50 miscellaneous meetings, 9 Woman's Auxiliary Board meetings and 5 Diocesan Religious Educational meetings.

Correspondence is heavy—675 pieces of mail, and the selling and mailing of 300 copies of text books for use in the diocese.

Will you please remember the location of the Lantern Slide Bureau for the West and Mid-West, which is 8614 Euclid Avenue, Cleveland, Ohio, care of Miss Ada Crary.

It was a great privilege to attend the General Convention in Washington, D. C. It kept me busy from its close to mid-December visiting groups to share with them some of my experiences of those days, and to tell them of the Church Program for this Triennium.

A busy year for leaders and groups interested in this work for education.

Our reports do not tell of results in dollars and cents, but we can show increased interest, praying, giving and serving by the women of our diocese, and rejoice in their continued efforts to bring that for which we pray and work—Thy Kingdom come.

The Annual Report of the Church Periodical Club

January, 1928 to January, 1929



If the Diocesan Directors could have brought home to the Librarians of the Church Periodical Club the spirit and enthusiasm of the conferences in Washington, our work would increase ten-fold. We met there the C. P. C. workers from all over the country, the ones whom we had known only through their reports. The conferences and discussions taught us much, and gave us fresh inspiration, and we came home with the determination to make the C. P. C. grow every day in every way.

This year gave us a patron saint, Mrs. Wiggs having been named for that position. Some one discovered that she had the true spirit of the C. P. C. In the book, "Mrs. Wiggs of the Cabbage Patch," she is made to say that "nothing seemed to belong to her till she had passed it on to some one else." This is our underlying principle, to share what we have with others, to pass on our own good reading matter, to those who need it. One of our recipients calls the C. P. C. an endless chain of good work.

The annual report shows an increase in some items, but an unfortunate decrease in others. We must still emphasize the fact that the sending of our own magazines regularly, is the most important duty that we owe the C. P. C. The postal rates have been reduced and we urge those who formerly were generous in sending magazines, to resume the forwarding of these gifts, and we also ask for many volunteers to pass on good reading matter. Those who do not have this personal contact with our missionary clergy, with the isolated churchmen, and the shut-ins, miss half the fun and joy of the work.

In the recreational line, many parishes gave generously. During the year, chiefly at Christmas and Easter, 700 boxes were sent to disabled soldiers at Chillicothe. These boxes were given to the men who have no outside friends to remember them at holiday times. One parish gave a good billiard table to the Marine Hospital, a much appreciated gift.

Our Special for 1929 is the library at St. John's University at Shanghai, China, Dr. Hawks Pott, President. During the revolution, this college was closed, but is now open, though with fewer pupils and lessened income. Dr. Pott writes that students are hungry for the news of the world, and its work, but that there are so few books to give them. They search the catalogues, and have to turn away disappointed. They are counting on the C. P. C. to help them this year. We ask for money for this St. John's library, the great need being technical and reference books. We can have the pleasant feeling that our money will provide exactly what will help the students the most. Graduates of St. John's have held important positions in the Government. Two have been ministers to the U. S., one being Mr. Sze, now in Washington, one to Great Britain and one to the Netherlands.

One plea that came to us in Washington, was from Archdeacon Wyllie, for books, and all kinds of good reading matter, for Santo Domingo. He went to that island thirteen years ago, and he and his wife, by their untiring zeal, have built up a fine mission. They tell us that the books that reach the people of the mission, travel all over the island, till they are worn out.

We ask for the interest, the enthusiasm and the support of the young people in the diocese. The Kappa Beta Kappas of St. Paul's appointed two officers from their members, to take charge of the C. P. C. work. They have reported a good work in passing on many magazines and in sending generous boxes to the disabled soldiers at Christmas.

We are having to say good-bye to several of our faithful and splendid workers, ones who have laid good foundations for the new Librarians who follow, to take up the task of carrying on this beloved work.

The Director has given 36 talks on C. P. C. work in the diocese, and one in the diocese of Springfield, Ill.

We have 66 active Branches, which is far from our goal of one hundred percent. We ask for many more to take part in the various activities of the C. P. C. The statistics are as follows:

Information



The Ohio Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary has as its representative in China, Miss Caroline Fullerton, "Our Own Missionary." She is principal of St. Mary's Hall, a school for girls in Shanghai, and we are responsible for her salary of nine hundred dollars a year. Please send gifts to Mrs. H. R. Collacott, Treasurer.

Since the founding of St. Paul's Mission at Glen Alpine in the Blue Ridge Mountains we have had the honor of supporting it. Our successful missionary there is Mrs. Eva Joyner Barrett. The work has grown so much that we have now provided Mrs. Barrett with an assistant. The sum for which we pledge ourselves to Glen Alpine is seven hundred dollars.

The "Bishop Leonard Fund" is for use among the missions of Ohio, when and where the Bishop thinks best. We have pledged to him five hundred dollars.

The "Bishop Rogers Fund" will place in the hands of the Bishop Coadjutor, a sum for use at his discretion among missions in the Diocese.

The "Expense Fund" covers the cost of publishing the annual report, occasional circulars or leaflets and notices, postage in several departments, traveling expenses in starting new Branches, and that of missionaries whom we invite to address us. With the enlarged scope of the Supply Department, there are expenses for freight, express and postage. Each Branch is asked to contribute to this fund.

The "Contingent Fund" is available for all sorts of emergencies. It is the large feature in the work of the Supply Director. We ask the women of the Branches to give special thought to this work. An increase of pledges is earnestly solicited and will be carefully expended. All money and checks for this fund should be sent to the Diocesan Treasurer, Mrs. H. R. Collacott, 246 South State Street, Painesville, Ohio.

The Bishop Bedell Scholarship and the Julia Bedell Scholarship pay for the education of native pupils in St. John's University, Shanghai, China. They require \$70 each per annum.

The Bishop Hare Scholarship in St. Elizabeth's School, South Dakota, pays for the education of an Indian pupil; it requires sixty dollars per year.

The Sarah L. Leonard Scholarship—St. Mark's School, Nenana, Alaska, \$200 per annum.

Kuling School China, is a school for the education of the children of Missionaries and pledges are asked for its support.

The "Foreign Insurance Fund" provides insurance upon the lives of foreign missionaries for the benefit of their families. We, of the

Ohio Branch, have for more than forty years contributed annually to this fund. Our pledge is one hundred dollars a year.

All pledges are payable to Mrs. H. R. Collacott, 246 S. State Street, Painesville, Ohio. In the case of a "special" when a custodian is named, all money may be sent direct to the Collector, who later reports to Mrs. Collacott.
