The Annual Meeting at Cleveland

May 22, 1930



May 22, 1930 marked the 53rd Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council, Diocese of Ohio, which was held in Trinity Cathedral, Cleveland. The day began with a celebration of the Holy Communion, celebrated by the Rt. Rev. Warren L. Rogers, Coadjutor of the Diocese, who was assisted by the Ven. Gerard F. Patterson, the Very Rev. F. S. White and the Rev. Allen Jennings.

At the conclusion of this beautiful and impressive service, the delegates were called to order for business by the President, Mrs. Eliza J. Backus. The minutes of the last meeting were omitted as they are printed in the Year Book. A motion, covering this omission, was made by Mrs. E. S. Grauel and seconded by Mrs. F. H. Jewitt.

It was a great disappointment that Bishop Leonard was not able to be present as celebrant, and to give his gracious welcome to the Auxiliary women. The Bishop had had two strenuous days as Presiding Officer of the Diocesan Convention.

But we were fortunate in having the Rt. Rev. Warren L. Rogers, Bishop Coadjutor with us, who gave the entire day, and his gracious words and cheerfulness helped make the day so successful.

Following the report of the President, in which she reviewed the activities of the past year with a note of optimism and encouragement, the roll-call was taken to which 421 responded. This number was increased to nearly 450 before the end of the sessions.

Mrs. C. C. Cowin, Diocesan Treasurer, reported more money given last year than ever before. The \$10,000 pledged for St. Luke's Hospital, Tokio, has been raised. Referring to the small salary we are paying Mrs. Barrett at Glen Alpine, North Carolina, Mrs. Cowin asked for an increase. Mrs. Backus added the bit of interesting news that we had raised \$66,000 during the past ten years for different projects; this being over and above our regular pledges and the Corporate Gift.

Captain B. F. Mountford, of the Church Army, was introduced by Mrs. Backus, who is herself an associate member of the Army. Captain Mountford said it was a great privilege for him to address such a meeting as this, and that he would be willing to go a thousand miles to take part in a Woman's Auxiliary meeting. Continuing, the Captain went on, "The first \$2,000 received for our work in this country, came from a Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary in New Haven, Conn. But it is not money that brings me here; it is your fine spirit of service and devotion. We can only measure the spiritual contribution that women give on the hypothesis that if the Woman's Auxiliary withdrew, the prayer loss and spiritual loss would be incalculable. The men of the Church and of the household are learning to look for guidance in their lives of prayer and devotion. The Church Army has only one woman worker, Sister Horner, at Ft. Thompson, South Dakota."

Referring to the pin worn by the Daughters of the King, Captain Mountford explained what it would mean for the Auxiliary, were they to adopt the cross as their emblem, "The bottom is you—the top is God; and at the junction you meet Him in prayer and service. You work out to the right, which is educational, and you work out to the left, in service to the underprivileged. The Woman's Auxiliary exists almost entirely to minister to those on the left hand. The left hand includes the isolated, the mill hands, miners and lumbermen—people, who through no fault of their own, are numbered among the underprivileged.

"The Church Army stands ready to go with the message of the Church everywhere. The inception of the Church Army began in England, 48 years ago when a young clergyman, tired of preaching to wooden pews at the evening service, gathered about him a group of laymen who went out with him to take the message of the Church to the man on the street. Six thousand men have been trained in the Church Army, and there are now sixty departments to care for evangelistic and social service work, such as dispensaries, reformatories for girls and boys, and homes for tubercular patients and tired working mothers and motherless children."

Captain Mountford came to this country in 1925, at the invitation of Bishop Murray to do demonstration work, and Bishop Darst wrote him to come and help in the Bishops' Crusade. The Board of the Church Army, with headquarters at the training center in Providence, R. I., is made up of clergy and laymen. In the training center, more emphasis is placed on field work than on the school. Men serve in the field three years first. There are now thirty evangelists on the staff, all laymen.

Quoting figures as given in "Beyond City Limits," Captain Mountford made a stirring appeal for the thirty million people in the rural districts who are without the ministry of the Church. "Here is our opportunity," he said.

The Church Army in the United States is now two and a half years old. Preaching missions are held from time to time, aided by the gift of caravans given to them by the Woman's Auxiliary. Five mission stations have been established in California, but, unfortunately, clergymen cannot be found to keep them open.

Associates of the Church Army adopted a man to go into the lumber camps in upper West Virginia where no work was being done. This man lived the rough outdoor life of the people there, taught the children and the parents who came with them. The Church Army is ministering to railroad men in South Carolina who have no place to go.

Captain Mountford gave a demonstration service. "First," he said, "comes a sing-song; that is, we sing one verse of a song they all know. We don't preach to these people—we tell them stories, leading them to a point of contact from which we draw a moral lesson." "Give a place to the Church Army in your parish. Alaska is asking for a man for six months, at the end of which time he will bring back an Indian to be trained. This will take about \$1,000. The Church

Army will loan a man for Rural Work for \$600. God is interested in the isolated and underprivileged."

The Rev. Herman Sidener explained to the delegates the importance of the Gambier Summer Conference, to be held June 23rd to July 4th.

The date for the annual presentation of the United Thank Offering was announced by Mrs. Backus to be May 29th. "Pray," she urged, "when giving and thank God for the benefits He has given you."

According to the usual custom, Miss Lettie Brenneman, Diocesan Secretary, requested the delegates to stand in silence a few moments in memory of our members who have passed on during the year. Miss Brenneman urged upon all the necessity of making use of the Year Book.

Mrs. John G. Anderson, Diocesan Educational Secretary, called attention to a number of books and leaflets she had put on sale: "India on the March," and "Program of Advance Work." Also "Woman's Auxiliary Booklet, 20 cents.

Pledges for the Advance Work were taken and many parishes responded generously.

Immediately after luncheon, the speaker of the afternoon session was introduced as the Rev. Robert P. Frazier, Director of Advance Work in the Field Department of the National Council. Mr. Frazier began with the history of the Advance Work. "Before the Nation-Wide," he said, "a missionary bishop had to beg for money. He had to be away two months of each year. The Bishop with a good story and a fine personality could get anything he wanted. The other bishops fared poorly. When the Nation-Wide was put into effect, the bishops were told to stay at home and they would be given help. This was found, later, to be only a beautiful theory. During the first few years of the Nation-Wide, priorities were no obligation on the part of any diocese or individual. The mountain top has never been reached by the Nation-Wide. This is the first year we have not been obliged to cut in the mission field. The Convention of 1928 drew our attention to the neglected Advance Work. Bishops sent in requests amounting to \$3,000,000 to carry on extension work. After these requests were sifted by a committee, this amount was reduced to \$1,550,000. This will take care of 170 new pieces of equipment."

"The Diocese of Ohio, will carry its share, \$41,000, which cares for the needs of St. Luke's Hospital in Boise City, Idaho, Bishop Barnwell's work, \$35,000 and also the Church General Hospital in Wuchang, China, \$6,000."

"Fifty-six dioceses have taken part in the Advance Work. This means that this work is going to be done. Our people have always responded. Giving to the quota has been found less appealing than when the bishops talked. If you are interested, your whole group will be interested."

Mr. Frazier spent part of his ministry among the Indians of South Dakota. Said they have very poor places in which to meet for service. The Church asked the Government to stop the Indian dances, and when the authorities wanted to know what we had to offer as a substitute, we said we had nothing. There are 90 chapels on the Indian reservation. On account of no Advance Work among the Indians, we have nothing for them. This is a lack of the Church for organized work. Our missionaries are carrying on their work with the means of fifty years ago.

The Field Department is trying to raise \$1,550,000, and is paying \$25,000 to do it. The Advance Work is tools for the missionaries.

Mr. Frazier, speaking of the hospital in Boise City, said it was started 28 years ago with five beds in a rented house. Today, it is a modern institution with 110 beds. In connection with it is the Nurses' Training School where 42 women are being trained. Charity work is part of St. Luke's program. The central part of the institution is the chapel where daily services are held. Girls, who come to the Nurses' Training School, are from small towns where there is very little for them to do. When they graduate from St. Luke's, they amount to something. \$35,000 is needed to clear the indebtedness. A good hospital means everything to people in scattered regions.

Another guest speaker was Mrs. E. P. Miller, returned missionary from Wuchang, China. Speaking on the subject of the Church General Hospital, Mrs. Miller told of the splendid work done there, and of Ohio's interest because of the chapel erected in memory of our Mrs. Sarah L. Leonard. She also mentioned Dr. James, one of the hospital staff, who was born in Gambier. Ohio's gift of \$6,000, she said would cover much needed equipment, such as an X-ray machine, an electric light plant, a laboratory in the Nurses' Training School, and enlargement of the obstetrical department. The Church General Hospital was the only hospital not closed during the Chinese war. The Chinese thought the hospital was full of money and a money making institution. Through the intervention of Bishop Roots and Dr. James, the hospital was kept open. The soldiers who were quartered across the street were treated for dreadful diseases.

Mrs. Miller declared that were it not for the thought in the minds of the workers there in Wuchang, the thought of their friends back home praying for them, they never could have held out during the uprising of 1927. The Reds tried to get the nurses away from Dr. James, and, failing in that, they tried to coax the servants to leave. They did everything they could to close the hospital. Diplomatic authorities stepped in and advised Dr. James and foreigners to leave, which they did. A Chinese doctor kept things going. Christian influence pervades the hospital through the Chaplain, Father Wood.

In closing, Mrs. Miller related a number of interesting stories of how she visited former patients of the hospital and learned from them their reactions to the Christian way of life.

Bishop Leonard coming in at this time, extended a cordial welcome and greetings to the women, and expressed appreciation for their annual

gift of \$500 for the Missionary work in the diocese. He pledged \$500 for the Church General Hospital in Wuchang, China, in memory of his wife. While the Bishop only remained a short time, his presence was an inspiration.

A rising vote of thanks was called for by Mrs. Backus for the hospitality extended to the Woman's Auxiliary by the Cathedral.

After the singing of the Auxiliary hymn, Bishop Rogers announced that the same officers would remain in office for another year.

The Bishop then pronounced the benediction and the meeting was adjourned.

Report of Eliza J. Backus



From January 1st to October, 1930

At the request of Bishop Rogers I continued my work as President of the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary until October, 1930.

I have attended all Board Meetings during the entire year, and all Cleveland Regional Meetings, with the exception of two, when sickness prevented me. I have had many committee meetings at my own home; and at my invitation, the Regional Chairmen met with me at Emmanuel Church. I have attended, and addressed several Church Periodical Club meetings and Regional United Thank Offering meetings.

In January, at the request of the late Mr. Charles Bolton, I met with the trustees of the "Sarah L. Leonard Memorial Fund," which was raised so beautifully by Mrs. Bolton, and credited to the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary. The principal was placed by the trustees of this fund, with the trustees of the Diocese, the interest to be used for the tuition of some young woman at Harcourt Place School, recommended by the Bishop of the Diocese, and the President of the Woman's Auxiliary.

The Endowment Fund of \$16,000, the interest of which is to be used for the expenses of the Officers of the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary, was placed by me in the hands of the trustees of the Diocese, and will hereafter be known as the "Eliza J. During the year, I have visited Church of Our Saviour and St. Stephen's, Akron; St. Andrew's Church of the Holy Spirit, Ascension, Cleveland; and Christ Church, Kent.

I have retained my position as President of St. Paul's Woman's Auxiliary, and have been busy and happy in my work there. As soon as I heard of the death of our beloved Bishop Leonard, I sent a telegram to his niece, Miss Sullivan, expressing our sympathy, and our affection for him. I also sent to the Cathedral for his burial, a beautiful wreath, from our Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese.

I received a letter from Miss Sullivan, expressing her appreciation of our sympathy as expressed in wreath and telegram.

Dear women of the Auxiliary—your loyalty and affection have always been an inspiration to me; I have loved going among you; and the friends I have made, I know will be mine in the years to come.

On January 10th, the Epiphany Party consisted of a short service and business session, a talk by Bishop L. W. Burton, retired Bishop of Lexington, Ky., and the Diocesan President, Mrs. Backus. This was followed by a tableau depicting the manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles. The women then enjoyed a delightful social hour.

In February, at St. Paul's Church on the Heights, the speakers were: Mrs. John G. Anderson—subject, "Rural Work"; Rev. T. M. Baker, head of the Good-will Industries, telling of the origin of this work which existed for the most part to help people to help themselves. Besides the material aid given to the needy, chapel services are held every morning, and a Sunday School for the children in the neighborhood.

In April, at St. John's Church, the speakers were: the Ven. Gerard Patterson and Miss Lang, Secretary of the Diocesan Altar Guild. Mr. Patterson gave a review of the missionary work being accomplished among the deaf mutes, colored people and Italians, and in the rural districts. Miss Lang's subject was "Symbolism."

Other speakers were: the Rt. Rev. Middleton Barnwell, Bishop of Idaho, who talked on the Advance Work; the Rev. J. E. Carhartt who gave an illustrated lecture on the National Cathedral in Washington. "Social Service" was the theme of an address by the Rev. Almon R. Pepper, Diocesan Secretary. An interesting talk on "India" was given by Mrs. Harding. A very illuminating address was given by Miss Myra Chickering, using charts and figures to show the development and growth of the United Thank Offering which she termed one of the greatest works of the Auxiliary.

The Region also gave a Friendship Tea—the object to bring about a closer relationship with our foreign-born neighbors.

Our Quiet Days are the greatest spiritual help and inspiration.

Our Memorial Page contains the names of many of our dear friends and fellow workers whom God has called to the life eternal. In loving memory of their lives and work, may we stand in silence a moment.

May God inspire us to outdo the work of preceding years, and may the great watchword of us all be "Go Forward."

Report of the Fourth Vice-President Youngstown Region

The Quiet Day in St. John's Church, Youngstown, on April 10th, was conducted by the Reverend Phillip C. Pearson, rector of Trinity Church, New Castle. The need of faith and loyalty in our lives was dwelt upon as outstanding traits of Christian character, especially exemplified in the lives of Mary and Martha. It was indeed a day of much spiritual refreshment for the many women who were privileged to attend.

Reports of the Diocesan Convention, the Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, and the Church School Convention were made by Mrs. Schulz, of Warren and Mrs. Owen, of St. Andrew's, Youngstown. Mrs. Geiger, Educational Secretary of the Region, and Miss Mabel Higgs, Cuyahoga Falls, gave interesting reports of their work. Miss Higgs told of her visit to the school at Glen Alpine, North Carolina, and gave many suggestions that will prove helpful in the work of the C. P. C.

Mrs. Kistler, St. John's, Youngstown, gave a splendid review of the work done by the study class of St. John's women during Lent, "The Roads to the City of God" being the text book.

Miss Allen told of the constructive and interesting work for the women and children of St. Rocco's Italian mission, by means of the kindergarten, lunches, entertainments for old and young.

The fall meeting of the Region was held at St. John's Church, Youngstown, on October 15th. At the close of the service of Holy Communion, Bishop Barnwell of Idaho, the speaker of the day, gave a graphic account of the building of the beautiful hospital in Boise, and of his efforts to raise the sum needed to remove the indebtedness. Bishop Barnwell's plea was heard with great interest by the hundred and twenty-five women, and bore fruit later in Region and Parish.

Delightful music—a contralto solo, sung by Mrs. McMichael, accompanied by Mr. Fuller, organist of the church.

A Musicales and Tea was given on December 2nd, in St. John's new Parish House as an effort to help in the Idaho project, the hospital at Boise.

Miss Dennison, General Secretary of the Y. W. C. A., in Bombay, India, in costume, pictured the life of the women of India, exhibiting embroideries, costumes, brasses, and jewelry.

Delicious refreshments and oriental music, rendered by Mrs. E. S. Walton, soprano, and Mr. Frank E. Fuller, tenor, added to the joy of the occasion.

Mrs. Rupert Holland, our new Diocesan President, was with us, and in a few gracious words asked the continued loyalty and support of the women.

The practical results of the year are: Gifts of books to the Rev. Jas. R. Colby, of Geneva, and the Rev. Phillip C. Pearson, of New Castle, in grateful recognition of service rendered. A book, a memorial to the Rev. Edward J. Owen, of Sharon, who had conducted several Quiet Days. Gift of money for the Advance Work, St. Luke's Hospital, Boise and to the U. T. O. of the Region.

The spiritual results are hard to tabulate, but we know that the gatherings were much enjoyed, and all who attended felt that friendship had been deepened and renewed, and a broader vision of the Church's work, and a closer contact achieved, which would lead to greater efforts in our work for the extension of the Kingdom of God.

An outstanding event in the educational program of St. Paul's Church, Canton, deserves special mention. Mrs. Harry Frease, Educational Secretary of this parish, has found a way of interesting a large group of women in this part of the work.

On Tuesdays, during Lent, meetings were held at her home. The luncheon served at noon, followed by a period for study. The time, this year, being given to "The World Mission of Christianity." Then followed sewing by the group for community needs. At one of these meetings a splendid book review of Stanley Jones' "The Christ of Every Road" was given by Mrs. Frease. This took place at the home of Mrs. Charles W. Kaufholz, Hills and Dales, Canton, where a delightful tea was given. No charge was made for the luncheons at these meetings, and the women gladly contributed to silver offerings, which amounted to one hundred and fourteen dollars. The entire sum was used for the paying of pledges for the year. The average attendance was forty; the maximum was fifty-five.

The Annual Report of the Church Periodical Club

January, 1930 to January, 1931



It was the realization of a great opportunity that led the founder of the Church Periodical Club to conceive the idea of an organization to supply good reading matter where it was so much needed. So long as our rural and missionary clergy are shut off from libraries and unable to buy books, magazines and Church literature which they need so much in their work; so long as there are people whose minds are starving for good literature and recreational material, just so long will there be opportunity for the work of the Church Periodical Club.

The needs of the Church Periodical Club are becoming greater each year. Besides magazines and books, we need all kinds of recrea-

tional material such as games, puzzles, pictures and toys for children and shut-ins.

The Church Periodical Club furnishes an opportunity for every organization in the Church to work in the Five Fields of Service—the Parish, the Community, the Diocese, the Nation and the World. In many parishes the Kappa Beta Kappas and Girls' Friendly Societies are devoting part of their time to this work. One clergyman in Alaska expresses the wish that there might be a Men's Church Periodical Club so men may have the pleasure of reading more scientific magazines on mining, engineering, electricity, aviation and radio.

Another year of work for the Church Periodical Club is finished and more interest than usual has been taken by the Secretaries, which is, of course, most encouraging. It has been one of changes, too, for after Mrs. Conrey's resignation, Miss Anne L. Brown was appointed as her successor, and filled that position to the best of her ability until November. At that time she realized that she could not to justice as both Diocesan Director and Parish Secretary, so resigned and Mrs. George L. MacCracken of Akron, was appointed Diocesan Director and Miss Mabel Higgs of Cuyahoga Falls, Assistant Director and Treasurer.

Besides the regular work in the Diocese, a number of special needs have been filled during 1930. At Easter and Christmas several hundred individual boxes were sent to soldiers at the Veterans' Hospital at Chillicothe. These men are so grateful for these gifts. One soldier wrote to the Secretary who sent him a box at Christmas, "It is so good to be remembered on this Day of Days."

During the year we have worked for two "Specials" assigned to us, these being Boone Library at Wuchang, China and Du Bose School at Monteagle, Tennessee. Besides these Specials we have also worked for the rebuilding of Archdeacon Wyllie's library which was completely destroyed in the tornado at Santa Domingo. For these two specials, Boone Library, and Du Bose School, Ohio, sent \$235.50 and for Archdeacon Wyllie's library, the sum of \$54.50.

There were four Conferences, one of which was a farewell to our beloved Mrs. Conrey, at which a gift was presented to her in appreciation of her ten years of service as Diocesan Director. These conferences are steadily growing in importance and are very helpful and always enjoyable. The Church Periodical Club also had classes each day of the first week of the Gambier Conference in June.

Now a word about the work for the coming year. We are assigned St. Paul's University Library, Tokyo. The need there seems to be very great, so let us work hard to help make this a success.

The Church Periodical Club is growing steadily in its importance, and more and more is being expected of its members. It is a joyous labor of love and the many letters of thanks and appreciation constantly received from those who are aided, are sufficient reward for the time devoted to it. We ask for the continued help of all the Church organizations and all of our friends, both young and old, in this most worthwhile work.

Repaired stoles for clergy. Gave a set of linens, consisting of Fair Linen Cloth, Corporal, Pall and Veil to "St Agnes' Guild" of Salem, for Church of our Saviour.

Miss Lucile M. Lang gave a number of lectures on Symbolism. Gave a stole to one of the Bexley Students (ordination gift).

We received a gift of clerical suit, five stoles, two surplices from Mrs. Floyd Waite, and these were sent to the Rev. Nevel Joyner, Pine Ridge Agency, North Dakota, including a new set of linens from the Guild.

We have received gifts of money from Miss Linda Smith and from St. Faith's Chapter of St. John's Church, Youngstown. The Ohio Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary has as its representative in China, Miss Caroline Fullerton, "Our Own Missionary." She is principal of St. Mary's Hall, a school for girls in Shanghai, and we are responsible for her salary of nine hundred dollars a year. Please send gifts to Mrs. Clifford C. Cowin, Treasurer, 5007 Mayfield Road, South Euclid, Ohio.

Since the founding of St. Paul's Mission at Glen Alpine in the Blue Ridge Mountains we have had the honor of supporting it. Our successful missionary there is Mrs. Eva Joyner Barrett. The work has grown so much that we have now provided Mrs. Barrett with an assistant. The sum for which we pledge ourselves to Glen Alpine is seven hundred dollars.

The "Bishop Leonard Memorial Fund" is for use among the missions of Ohio, now to be used at the discretion of Bishop Rogers. We have pledged five hundred dollars to this fund.

The "Bishop Rogers Fund" will place in the hands of Bishop Rogers, a sum for use, as he thinks best, among missions in the Diocese.

The "Expense Fund" covers the cost of publishing the annual report, occasional circulars or leaflets and notices and postage in several departments. With the enlarged scope of the Supply Department, there are expenses for freight, express and postage. Each Branch is asked to contribute to this fund.

The "Contingent Fund" is available for all sorts of emergencies. It is the large feature in the work of the Supply Director. We ask the women of the Branches to give special thought to this work. An increase of pledges is earnestly solicited and will be carefully expended. All money and checks for this fund should be sent to the Diocesan Treasurer, Mrs. Clifford C. Cowin, 5007 Mayfield Road, South Euclid, Ohio.

The Bishop Bedell Scholarship and the Julia Bedell Scholarship pay for the education of native pupils in St. John's University, Shanghai, China. They require \$70 each per annum.

The Bishop Hare Scholarship in St. Elizabeth's School, South Dakota, pays for the education of an Indian pupil; it requires sixty dollars per year.

The Sarah L. Leonard Scholarship—St. Mark's School, Nenana, Alaska, \$200 per annum.

The Eliza J. Backus Scholarship—St. Mark's School, Nenana, Alaska, \$200 per annum.

Kuling School China, is a school for the education of the children of Missionaries and pledges are asked for its support.

The "Foreign Insurance Fund" provides insurance upon the lives of foreign missionaries for the benefit of their families. We, of the Ohio Branch, have for more than forty years contributed annually to this fund. Our pledge is one hundred dollars a year.

All pledges are payable to Mrs. Clifford C. Cowin, 5007 Mayfield Rd., South Euclid, Ohio. In the case of a "special" when a custodian is named, all money may be sent direct to the Collector, who later reports to Mrs. Cowin.
