A Bit of History



National Auxiliary

In the Episcopal Church in the United States there are seven organizations among women that are national in scope. These are: The Woman's Auxiliary, the Church Periodical Club, Daughters of the King, Church Mission of Help, St. Barnabas' Guild for Nurses, and the League for Patriotic Service. Of these, the Woman's Auxiliary is the oldest and the largest.

The Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions came into being October 16, 1871. In January, 1872, headquarters were established in a rented room in the Bible House, New York, with Miss M. A. Emery as the first Secretary. The Mission Board assisted the Auxiliary in every way possible in getting its object known and its work established in the Diocese all over the country. The Secretary obtained the approval of one bishop after another and one priest after another and they established diocesan and parochial branches, until, in 1919, 3,678 parishes were enrolled in the Woman's Auxiliary, and diocesan branches stretched from Hankow to Texas and Porto Rico to New York.

In 1919, at the great Detroit Triennial Convention, great changes took place in the organization of the Church. Up to this time, the work of the general Church was carried on by three boards—Board of Missions, Board of Religious Education, and Board of Christian Social Service. For nearly fifty years the Woman's Auxiliary had worked as an auxiliary to the Board of Missions. At this time, however, the Presiding Bishop and Council was created, and the work of the Church divided among six departments, of which the Department of Missions is one. At this convention the question arose as to whether the Woman's Auxiliary should become an auxiliary to one department or to the National Council. The convention decided that it was an organization too large and too important to become an auxiliary to the Department of Missions, so the Woman's Auxiliary was asked to become an Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council, which means that we now share in all phases of the Church's work.

The Annual Meeting at Cleveland



May 7, 1931

At St. Peter's Church, Lakewood, the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council, Diocese of Ohio, held its Annual Meeting, Thursday, May 7, 1931.

The day began with a service of the Holy Communion, celebrated by the Bishop of Ohio, the Rt. Rev. Warren L. Rogers, who was assisted by the Rev. John R. Stalker of Massillon, the Rev. E. B. Redhead of Elyria, the Rev. D. LeB. Goodwin, rector of St. Peter's, and the Rev. Charles Hughes.

The business session opened with a word of welcome by Mr. Goodwin, after which Mrs. Rupert Holland, newly elected President, called the meeting to order.

By a unanimous vote, the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting and all other reports were omitted, as they are printed in the Year-Book.

In her introductory remarks, Mrs. Holland paid tribute to those splendid leaders who had preceded her—Mrs. Backus, Mrs. Knapp and Mrs. Leonard. "They are still with us," she said, "and are still leading and helping us. Because of our love of the work, we will go on together."

The delegates listened with interest as Mrs. Holland read a newsy letter from Mrs. Backus, who was at that time visiting our mission stations in the Orient.

The following resolutions, drawn up in honor of Mrs. Backus, by Mrs. Collacott, were then read by Mrs. E. S. Grauel:

Whereas: Our beloved President, Mrs. Eliza J. Backus, has tendered her resignation after ten years of active service as executive officer of the Woman's Auxiliary,

Resolved: that we, the women of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Ohio express in this resolution our appreciation of the untiring labor which Mrs. Backus has devoted to the good of the Auxiliary; of the spirit of friendliness, hopefulness and good cheer, which she has infused into the organization; of the self-sacrifice and Christ-spirit which have been hers.

Resolved: that we would give thanks for the enthusiasm she has kindled in us and for the blessing that has been ours through contact with her strong and beautiful character; that we pray that the future may bring her the rich reward that is her due for work well done.

Resolved: that these resolutions be spread upon the minutes and published in the Year-Book of 1931.

I move the adoption of these resolutions.

Mrs. H. B. A. Keiser introduced a motion, which was unanimously adopted, that a cablegram be sent to Mrs. Backus, assuring her of our love and appreciation of her ten years given in service to the Woman's Auxiliary.

Bishop Rogers presented his annual report of money given him through the fund which bears his name. He expressed his grateful thanks to the women for their assistance in his work caring for the sick clergy and their families.

Following the beautiful custom established by Bishop Leonard, Bishop Rogers announced the names of officers to serve during the ensuing year.

As a matter of information, the Bishop explained that the Euclid Avenue residence in which Bishop and Mrs. Leonard lived would be used by the Holy Cross House for Crippled Children, until such time as the Diocesan Council sees fit to dispose of it.

In regard to the Advance Work, the Bishop spoke encouragingly of the efforts put forth by the whole Diocese in behalf of this noble object. The pledge for the Church General Hospital, Wuchang, China, he said, was to be taken over by the women of the Diocese as their Corporate Gift.

A proposed amendment to the Constitution of the Woman's Auxiliary, Diocese of Ohio, was offered by Mrs. E. S. Grauel. The change refers to privileges accorded to members of other organizations affiliated with the Woman's Auxiliary. A vote on the proposed amendment will be taken by the Branches at the next Annual Meeting.

Delegates named to attend the General Convention in Denver during September 1931 were: Mrs. Rupert Holland, Mrs. Samuel Strong, Mrs. Goodbody, Mrs. W. H. Bingham and Miss Lettie Brenneman. Alternates: Mrs. C. C. Bubb, Mrs. John G. Anderson, Mrs. C. C. Cowin, Mrs. L. W. S. Stryker and Mrs. E. S. Grauel.

The interest and moral support of the Woman's Auxiliary were asked for two note-worthy objects: Harcourt School for Girls, Gambier, and The National Cathedral in Washington, D. C. Miss Sarah McDonald, principal of Harcourt, gave a short talk in which she told of the aims of the school, and in closing requested the delegates to remember them in their prayers. A plea for small sums from the many was made by Mrs. Grasselli who is a member of the committee for Ohio to raise funds to carry on the building of the National Cathedral.

Mrs. Samuel Strong, Diocesan Director of the United Thank Offering made a special plea for a greater offering at the Triennial.

Dr. John W. Wood, Executive Secretary of Foreign Missions, was guest speaker of the day. Paying high tribute to the work of the Woman's Auxiliary, Dr. Wood declared the Auxiliary to be the only agency of the Church capable of having a world outlook.

The world today, he said, is bound together for good or ill. As the world's life becomes more closely knit, there is more or less friction; friction develops heat; heat, temper; temper—then war. Lubrication for this state is the spirit of brotherhood which is found in the life and teaching of our Lord.

The Orient today is conscious of new stirrings in its sluggish life and they are molding its future. The East is not asleep. She is applying theories of the West. These theories are dangerous if the spirit is not for the good of all, rather than the good of a few.

Dr. Wood briefly told of the Church's work being carried on by our representative in China, Japan, the Philippines and Hawaii. To these people the Church gives of her best to educate, relieve pain, and sets the ideal of a good life that the Christ gave.

Mrs. Ralph M. Evans was called upon to explain the Advance Work for the year. We have been given the quota of \$3,500.00, to be raised for the Church General Hospital in Wuchang, China. This sum will be used for equipment in the obstetrical department.

Pledges were then taken and the appeal met with a generous response from the branches represented.

This interesting meeting adjourned after prayers and benediction by the Rev. D. LeB. Goodwin.

Report of the Honorary President



I am happy to be with you once more, dear women of the Diocesan Auxiliary.

It is a pleasure for me to see how your interest, as shown in the attendance at your meetings, and in the payment of pledges, has gone on during this last year, when carrying-on has not been easy.

I congratulate you on your President. Through her fine leadership the work has grown. I felt sure she would win your affection and loyalty.

All through my six months of absence from the Diocese, my thoughts were with you. I wanted to bring you something of the pleasure I was receiving, in seeing new places and people. I have been among you telling of these institutions. Since my return, I have visited Fremont; the Church of Our Saviour and St. Paul's, Akron; in Cleveland, St. John's, St. Paul's, Grace Church, South, Ascension, Lakewood; and St. James', Painesville. I have also addressed the Church Periodical Club at its Annual Meeting.

I was very much touched and pleased by the cablegram you sent me, which I received at Hongkong. When I read "Auxiliary Greetings" from the women at the Annual Meeting, I determined more than ever to share with you some of the pleasure I was having.

Report of the Secretary



Notwithstanding the fact that the year 1931 has been one of financial concern to most of us, yet the Woman's Auxiliary of our Diocese has been able to carry out most of its projects. This has meant extra effort and sacrifice, and the highest commendation is due the women.

The reports in the Year Book will tell of your achievements. However, we must turn our thoughts to the optimistic side, which speaks of the privileges that have been ours.

The outstanding event was our wonderful Triennial Convention, held in Denver. Those who were privileged to attend, received not only practical help along every line of Church work, but the great spiritual uplift to inspire us with fresh zeal so that we were ready for any tasks. The women who did not have the good fortune to go to the Convention, received their information from our fine Church papers. And our good President has been untiring in visiting many of the parishes and regional meetings, giving a graphic picture of the Convention. Many other of the Diocesan Officers have taken helpful messages to parish branches. Our Honorary President, Mrs. E. J. Backus, has also gone about the Diocese when called upon, to tell of her experience with our missionaries in the Orient.

These helps, given in Christ's name, have aided so much in carrying out the Church's Program for God's work in the Diocese, and far beyond, out into the world.

As your Secretary, I have had a busy year, but an interesting one, doing worthwhile tasks. Besides the regular duties assigned to me, my annual important task is collecting and compiling material for the Year Book. There are two ways in which the branch secretaries can be of the greatest help. First, notify me at once when there is a change of officers in your branch. So often when notices are sent to branches, they are not received, because I do not have the names and addresses of the new officers. This accounts for many branches not sending in their reports. Secondly, please send in YOUR report for the Year Book on time. I want to thank the secretaries who always respond promptly with accurate and legible reports. Your notes enclosed give a personal touch which is greatly appreciated.

The Diocesan Board has made some changes in our 1931 Year Book, which they think makes for more accuracy and easier comparison with what other branches are doing. And another important advantage is that the parish reports do not require as many pages, thus reducing the price of printing.

Each of the branches will receive three copies of the Year Book free. If any of the larger branches wish more, there will be a charge of twenty cents a copy. We would like to give every woman a copy, but as this is impossible, we urge the branch president to have the book read at their meetings. During the summer pass the book around so that all can read it.

It seems impossible to be an active Auxiliary worker and not be informed in regard to the work in our Diocese. There are three institutions that need the help of every branch—St. John's Home for Girls, Holy Cross House, Home for Crippled Children and Church Home for Sick and Friendless. Besides, there are the Missions that are the recipients of our gifts. This, and many other important items, you will find on the Information pages.

Our Memorial page contains the names of many of our dear friends and fellow-workers who God has called to higher service; among this number, Mrs. Alice Marshall, a former Diocesan Secretary. In loving memory of their lives and work, may we stand in silence a moment.

God calls US to be fellow-workers in the great task which He has initiated, and which He sustains, and for each of US, He has an honorable part to play. May each of us be found ready and willing for her part.

Report of the Lake Region

The Annual Report of the Church Periodical Club



January, 1931 to January, 1932

The needs of the Church Periodical Club cover all kinds of good reading matter—not only Church magazines, religious books and Church School material, but all good literature and recreational material such as games, puzzles, scrap book pictures, Christmas and Easter cards, etc. These recreational materials are very much needed in our Missions and are continually asked for.

The past year has been an eventful one with the inspiring Convention in Denver where Directors from many Dioceses over the United States met to exchange ideas and legislate to further the cause of the C. P. C. Miss Mary Thomas, our Executive Secretary, and Mrs. Otto Heinigke, our President, of New York, were both with us and they are a constant inspiration to us all, particularly Miss Thomas whom we all know so intimately through the many letters we have from her.

Four things were stressed: first, that the C. P. C. has a definite effect on the growth of the general missionary interests and that, therefore, we are justified in making appeals for money in a Diocese that does not pay its full quota to the General Church; second, the importance of building up the Endowment and Library Funds; third, the necessity of cooperation in the Rural Work by supplying religious and secular material for educational and recreational purposes to the isolated; fourth, the value of Parish Secretaries and Diocesan Directors having a committee to assist them regularly and to be ready to carry on in the event of the Secretary or Director having to give up the work, either temporarily or permanently.

It is needless to report that I returned from this Denver Convention full of enthusiasm for the C. P. C. Bishop Rowe of Alaska spoke to a large Church Periodical Club mass meeting at which time he said "the C. P. C. is the biggest missionary agency in the Church. Wherever the postage stamp goes, there you will find the C. P. C." This is inspiring and should stimulate and encourage us to go on in spite of handicaps and failures. In fact, our work should have an especial appeal in the "hard times" because a dollar goes farther and makes more people happy in the C. P. C. than in any other organization. In one parish where about \$500.00 worth of work was sent out, only about \$20.00 was expended.

From the Southern mountains comes the question, "Air you all aiming to git us pretties this air Christmas?" From Alaska we hear of men in great need of good reading matter. Dr. Grafton Burke of Hudson Stuck Memorial Hosiptal at Fort Yukon, Alaska, told us at Denver of two men who came hundreds of miles over the snow in their sleds for supplies, medicines, etc., and the first thing they asked for was some of that "Periodical Club Stuff," and how one of them waited a week for the mail to come in that he might have the bundles of magazines to take back with him on the trail. Dr. Burke had assured him the magazines would be there in the mail—but we can all imagine how badly Dr. Burke would have felt had we C. P. C. workers failed him. He said he knew we would **not** fail him.

It is encouraging to note the interest being taken by the young people in so many parishes in the C. P. C. The work of the C. P. C. is especially interesting to the young people and gives them an opportunity to work in the Five Fields of Service.

Several new Secretaries have been added this year and the work has been revived in other places where it had lapsed. The reports are all inspiring.

Miss Higgs and I have visited five of the Regions—Cleveland, Lima, Mansfield, Youngstown and Akron—and we are hoping to attend Regional Meetings in the other four Regions the coming year. In all we have visited fifteen parishes and attended four Regional meetings.

There were three Conferences at Emmanuel Parish House, Cleveland, all of which were well attended and are a great inspiration. It is always interesting and helpful to hear the experiences of the Secretaries and exchange ideas.

Financially we have had some setbacks. The N. W. C. Fund which has for a number of years been given to us had to be discontinued on account of the depression and our treasury was left practically empty until the Woman's Auxiliary Diocesan Board came forward and contributed \$75.00 to our support. The annual dues of \$2.00 from each branch will be retained in the Diocese to help defray expenses instead of being sent to New York office as heretofore.

The Diocesan Board of the Woman's Auxiliary has also voted to support us this coming year to the same extent that the N. W. C. Fund had, namely \$125.00. This has greatly relieved our worry and anxiety as to how to carry on the work and to get over the Diocese visiting the various parishes. We are very grateful to the Board for this assistance.

Our "Special" for 1931 was St. Paul's Library, Tokio, for which we sent \$127.00. For 1932 our "Special" will be the Library Fund in general, to be used by Miss Thomas in the most needed places in the libraries in various parts of the world. We are doing this on account of conditions in China and Japan. We urge the use of the Book Plate in getting money for this fund. A Memorial Book instead of flowers when a member of the Parish passes away, or a gift of a book for a birthday, etc. Finally we urge the use of the C. P. C. prayer regularly at your meetings and in private devotions as well as at the Holy Communion.

We ask for the continued help of all the Church organizations and all of our friends both old and young in this most worth-while work.

Isolated Church Women



Several years ago, Mrs. Backus, then the Diocesan President of the Woman's Auxiliary, conceived the idea of getting in touch with the isolated and shut-ins.

She wrote to several clergymen to send names and addresses of the isolated and shut-ins of their parish.

Here in Ohio in these days of good roads and automobiles a Church is nearly always within easy distance, but, there are many shut-ins in the homes and hospitals to which a cheerful letter or card is much appreciated.

Mrs. Backus also wrote to Bishop Fox of Montana, where conditions are quite different, the distances are great and churches are few and far between. He sent names of women on ranches, with whom I have kept up a correspondence. One of these women writes that she got her training for confirmation by correspondence, the literature being sent her by Miss Edna Eastwood of Church Missions House of New York.

She writes that she is too far from a Church to attend, but that the Bishop comes to her and others so isolated.

She also says that the Episcopal Church is the only one of which she knows that takes thought for the isolated.

In Ohio the letters sent out are mostly to the shut-ins, many of them are alone and some of them ill. In nearly every instance these letters are answered, and they express deep appreciation for letters received and ask that they be not forgotten in the future.

Information



The Ohio Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary has as its representative in China, Miss Caroline Fullerton, "Our Own Missionary." She is principal of St. Mary's Hall, a school for girls in Shanghai, and we are responsible for her salary of nine hundred dollars a year. Please send gifts to Mrs. Clifford C. Cowin, Treasurer, R. F. D. No. 2, Grayton Road, Berea, Ohio.

Since the founding of St. Paul's Mission at Glen Alpine in the Blue Ridge Mountains we have had the honor of supporting it. Our successful missionary there is Mrs. Eva Joyner Barrett. The work has grown so much that we have now provided Mrs. Barrett with an assistant. The sum for which we pledge ourselves to Glen Alpine is seven hundred dollars.

The "Bishop Leonard Memorial Fund" is for use among the missions of Ohio, now to be used at the discretion of Bishop Rogers. We have pledged five hundred dollars to this fund.

The "Bishop Rogers Fund" will place in the hands of Bishop Rogers, a sum for use, as he thinks best, among missions in the Diocese.

The "Expense Fund" covers the cost of publishing the annual report, occasional circulars or leaflets and notices and postage in several departments. With the enlarged scope of the Supply Department, there are expenses for freight, express and postage. Each Branch is asked to contribute to this fund.

The "Contingent Fund" is available for all sorts of emergencies. It is the large feature in the work of the Supply Director. We ask the women of the Branches to give special thought to this work. An increase of pledges is earnestly solicited and will be carefully expended. All money and checks for this fund should be sent to the Diocesan Treasurer, Mrs. Clifford C. Cowin, R. F. D. No. 2, Grayton Road, Berea, Ohio.

The Bishop Bedell Scholarship and the Julia Bedell Scholarship pay for the education of native pupils in St. John's University, Shanghai, China. They require \$70 each per annum.

The Bishop Hare Scholarship in St. Elizabeth's School, South Dakota, pays for the education of an Indian pupil; it requires sixty dollars per year.

The Sarah L. Leonard Scholarship—St. Mark's School, Nenana, Alaska, \$200 per annum.

The Eliza J. Backus Scholarship—St. Mark's School, Nenana, Alaska, \$200 per annum.

The "Foreign Insurance Fund" provides insurance upon the lives of foreign missionaries for the benefit of their families. We, of the

Ohio Branch, have for more than forty years contributed annually to this fund. Our pledge is one hundred dollars a year.

All pledges are payable to Mrs. Clifford C. Cowin, 2241 Prospect Avenue, Cleveland, Ohio. In the case of a "special" when a custodian is named, all money may be sent direct to the Collector, who later reports to Mrs. Cowin.
