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A Bit of History



National Auxiliary

In the Episcopal Church in the United States there are seven organizations among women that are national in scope. These are: The Woman's Auxiliary, the Church Periodical Club, Daughters of the King, Church Mission of Help, St. Barnabas' Guild for Nurses, and the League for Patriotic Service. Of these, the Woman's Auxiliary is the oldest and the largest.

The Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions came into being October 16, 1871. In January, 1872, headquarters were established in a rented room in the Bible House, New York, with Miss M. A. Emery as the first secretary. The Mission Board assisted the Auxiliary in every way possible in getting its object known and its work established in the dioceses all over the country. The secretary obtained the approval of one bishop after another and one priest after another and they established diocesan and parochial branches, until, in 1919, 3,678 parishes were enrolled in the Woman's Auxiliary, and diocesan branches stretched from Hankow to Texas and Porto Rico to New York.

In 1919, at the great Detroit Triennial Convention, great changes took place in the organization of the Church. Up to this time, the work of the general Church was carried on by three boards—Board of Missions, Board of Religious Education, and Board of Christian Social Service. For nearly fifty years the Woman's Auxiliary had worked as an auxiliary to the Board of Missions. At this time, however, the Presiding Bishop and Council was created, and the work of the Church divided among six departments, of which the Department of Missions is one. At this convention the question arose as to whether the Woman's Auxiliary should become an auxiliary to one department or to the National Council. The convention decided that it was an organization too large and too important to become an auxiliary to the Department of Missions, so the Woman's Auxiliary was asked to become an Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council, which means that we now share in all phases of the Church's work.

The Annual Meeting at Cleveland



May 12, 1932

The fifty-fifth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council, Diocese of Ohio, convened in St. Paul's Church, Cleveland Heights, on Thursday, May 12, 1932.

The Holy Communion was celebrated at ten o'clock, with the Rt. Rev. Warren L. Rogers, Bishop of Ohio, as the celebrant, assisted by the Venerable Gerard F. Patterson, the Rev. Walter R. Breed, D.D., and the Rev. Frederic Adams.

More than four hundred delegates made their communion. After this most impressive service, the meeting was called to order for business by the President, Mrs. Rupert Holland. The rector of St. Paul's, Dr. Breed, extended to the conference a cordial welcome in which every member of the parish shared.

Mrs. Holland called upon the Honorary President for a word of greeting. Mrs. Backus responded in her usual happy vein. She thanked the women for the Alaska Scholarship, pledged in her name, and also expressed grateful appreciation for the cablegram she received from them while in China last year. In words of high praise, Mrs. Backus paid tribute to Mrs. Holland for all the good work she had accomplished during her first year as president.

Mrs. Backus told of the origin and object of the Endowment Fund, and asked for sums, large or small, in memory of dear ones who have been called to the Paradise life. She brought the Book of Remembrance with her to show it to anyone interested.

Mrs. Holland sounded the keynote for the year, before reading her annual report, when she said, "We are going forward in the work of Christ's Church. Go on and be ready to put your hand to the wheel." She also thanked Mrs. Backus and the Diocesan Board for their co-operation in carrying on the splendid work to which the Auxiliary is pledged. The report indicated a very busy year, with many problems to cope with and overcome.

To the roll-call, 425 responded, but this number was considerably increased later in the day. It was a pleasure to hear the response of the Mu Tau Alpha Branch of Trinity Church, Toledo; five from the senior and seventeen from the junior Branch. The latter were asked to come forward and were presented to the Conference.

A motion was made and carried to omit the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting, as they are printed in the Year Book.

Bishop Rogers then gave his report of funds given him by the Auxiliary. He said he was proud of the Auxiliary; that they had done a splendid work in spite of many drawbacks. The Bishop told of the meeting of the House of Bishops, in Garden City, New York; of the serious problems confronting the Church today, and said every member of the Church should feel a responsibility in meeting the

deficit, in order to carry on our missionary work. The Bishop's talk was most enlightening.

The women of the diocese deeply appreciate the Bishop's presence and encouragement at their annual meetings.

Noonday prayers were led by the Bishop, after which he read the names of the diocesan officers appointed to serve on the Board of Managers.

The new officers were then introduced by Mrs. Holland. They were: Mrs. Harry A. Hoffman, Director of Religious Education, and Miss Elise McD. Backus, Director of the Supply Department.

In the secretary's report, Miss Brenneman gave a brief review of her activities during the year, and explained the changes made in the Year Book. As usual, she urged the women to read every page of the book. In memory of those co-workers who were called to the Paradise life within the past year, Miss Brenneman requested all to stand in silence for a few moments.

Mrs. E. S. Grauel, chairman of the committee to amend the constitution of the Woman's Auxiliary, was called upon for her report. Before offering the proposed amendment to the delegates for their consideration, Mrs. Grauel made some explanations. At the last Annual Meeting in May, 1931, an announcement was made that the constitution of the Woman's Auxiliary would be issued in pamphlet form and distributed to the Branches. Before putting it in this more permanent form, a committee was appointed to go over the constitution and suggest changes that would bring it up to date, conforming to more recent legislation enacted by the Woman's Auxiliary at the General Convention. It was found that the article relating to the Board of Managers and its membership would have to be revised to meet present conditions. For many years the Auxiliary has been devoted to the interests and welfare of the Church Periodical Club in our diocese, and a member of that organization has served on this Board.

With a view to extending the same privilege, when the necessity arises, to other national organizations of church-women, it has been proposed and will be submitted to your vote that representatives of any or all other national organizations in our diocese, at the discretion of the Board, may be asked to serve on this Board.

If we make these changes, it becomes necessary to define the status of such representatives, due to the fact that the Woman's Auxiliary has an Endowment Fund, the interest of which is to be used for the expenses of the officers of the Woman's Auxiliary only.

Therefore, it is proposed to make representatives from other national organizations of churchwomen, members ex-officio of this Board.

Each Branch is entitled to one vote, and a majority of two-thirds of the votes of the Branches present is necessary to carry the amendment.

After a brief discussion on the subject, the amendment was voted upon and accepted as follows:

"The officers of this association shall be a president, four vice-presidents, a secretary, a treasurer, an educational secretary, a director of the Supply Department, and a custodian of the United Thank Offering. Other offices on the Board may be created as the need arises, or the work of any department may be divided and the proper officers appointed thereto.

"If desired, an honorary president may be appointed. These officers shall constitute a Board of Managers and Trustees of this association and shall be appointed by the Bishop.

The same person may hold two or more offices if, in the judgment of the Board of Managers, the best interests of the work require it.

"Representatives of other national organizations of the women of the Church may be invited to serve on this Board as members ex-officio, with power to vote on all questions except those concerning the finances of the Woman's Auxiliary."

At one o'clock, the meeting adjourned for luncheon.

Before introducing the guest speaker for the afternoon session, the Rev. A. A. Hastings, missionary to the Indians at Ethete, Wyoming, Mrs. Holland announced that \$2000 of the Emergency Fund would be given for his work.

Mr. Hastings said he was happy to come and tell the women about their work in Wyoming among the Arapahoes, and expressed his appreciation for the gracious hospitality afforded him throughout the diocese.

Before beginning his story, Mr. Hastings asked the delegates to sing Hymn 483, "God is working His purpose out, as year succeeds to year." This hymn, he said, is a favorite of the Indian boys and girls, and they sing it with vigor.

The government reservations are used to protect the white man from the Indian, and the Indian from the white man. However, there would be a sad and unhappy outlook for the Indian were it not for the Church.

The mission at Ethete (an Indian word for something good) is laid out in a circle a quarter of a mile around. In the center is the chapel which they call "Our Father's House." Above the altar in this "House," which is built of logs, is a plate glass window. The cross, as it stands on the altar before this window, is silhouetted against the Rocky Mountains seen in the distance. "You all have helped to place it there and keep it there."

The whole work of the mission centers and ends in religious education. Secondary to this, manual training is given to the boys

to teach them self-support, and the girls take part in the dairy work and nursing.

In regard to the medical work, much has been done by the Church and the government to raise the standard of health through prevention and cure. Since beginning medical work among the Indians, the percentage of those suffering from trachoma has been greatly reduced, and infant mortality lowered to a normal rate.

One of the newest buildings of the mission, containing the gymnasium and recreation rooms, is known as Faith Hall, because the girls and boys believed God would grant an answer to their prayers for a gymnasium.

Mr. Hastings closed by saying that missions are wonderful things, more for the giver than the receiver, and asked his hearers to take a loving interest in missions to save other souls. "What can we do to work God's work? We all know, there is no doubt."

The following resolutions, drawn up by Mrs. Backus and Mrs. Grauel, were then read:

"Be it resolved, That the Woman's Auxiliary, in convention assembled, extend its sympathy to Mrs. William H. Bingham in her recent bereavement, and voice its deep appreciation of her splendid service to the diocese as Director of the Supply Department. She has given most generously of her time, talents and of herself in the extension of the work of her department.

"The cordial relations existing between the National Organization and this diocese, and between the parish Branches and the Diocesan Director are a result of her wise administration and genial personality.

"Be it resolved, That a copy of this resolution be sent to Mrs. Bingham and be spread upon the minutes of the Woman's Auxiliary."

Mrs. Clifford C. Cowin, Diocesan Treasurer, reported on the Advance Work and the Emergency Fund. Pledges were then taken for the Emergency Fund.

A rising vote of thanks was extended to the women of St. Paul's Church for their gracious hospitality. Five hundred guests sat down to the delicious luncheon which they so bountifully served.

With prayers and the benediction by Bishop Rogers, the meeting came to a close.

Report of the President



The year of 1932 has ended with its story of unrest and disappointments, of discouragement and sorrow but it also has a story to tell of love and charity, of unselfishness and joy in the giving of self that others might have life and have it more abundantly. Our hearts have ached for those around us who were in trouble and need, and our sympathies have gone out to the missionaries in the field, know-

ing that they, too, are meeting the same sort of difficulties that we are meeting at home. At times we have felt that perhaps they have gone forward more courageously.

During the year I have visited fifty-six (56) parishes in the Diocese, attended twelve (12) Regional Meetings and the Provincial Officers' Conference in Chicago, from which I received much help and inspiration. I also attended the Gambier Conference for church workers. I wish I might be able to interest more of the women of the Church in this Conference. They would receive a great deal of inspiration and pleasure from it. In November, with the help of the Director of Religious Education, Mrs. Harry Hoffman, I re-organized the Ohio River Region and I am happy to say the work in that Region is going along splendidly under the leadership of Mrs. Charlotte Nixon.

The Board was sorry to have to accept the resignation of Miss Lettie Brenneman as Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese. She has given nine years of her life to this work. We shall miss her ready smile and co-operation, and her bright and inspiring letters.

The Board was also sorry to learn of the resignation of Mrs. John G. Anderson as Field Secretary. Mrs. Anderson, as you all know, gave many years of study and patient and helpful work as Educational and Field Secretary so that we might become better acquainted with the work of the Church all over the world. To these two women we owe much that cannot be repaid. I am sure, you will join with me in praying that God's richest blessing may rest upon them.

Following your decision at the last Annual Meeting, we invited the Girls' Friendly organization and the Daughters of the King to appoint one of their members to serve on our Board. They have co-operated by sending Mrs. Frank Ginn, Diocesan President of the Girls' Friendly, and Miss Brenneman, Secretary of the Daughters of the King.

Report of the New Secretary



Since my appointment as your new secretary occurred last October, a report of my activities must of necessity be very brief. Outside of attending the regular meetings of the Auxiliary Board and discharging duties attendant upon routine business, I began to make preparations in December for that most important work—the compila-

tion of the Year Book for 1932. To each Branch secretary in the Diocese, I sent the new-form report blanks, and from the reports turned in, I now take pleasure in giving you the story of your splendid efforts and worthwhile achievements.

I shall not bother you with dry and dusty figures in this story, excepting when it is most necessary. You will be interested, I am sure, to know of our numerical strength—there are 3000 of us enrolled as members of this great organization, the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council, to which we are all proud to belong. Sad to relate, our records reveal the fact that only one-half of the total enrollment is carrying on the work in the various Branches. In other words, each active member is doing the work of two women. We all agree this is unfair, but what can we do about it?

May I suggest a survey—everybody is doing it—to find out just where the difficulty lies. A committee of investigation will find some of the absentees to be ill, some caring for the very young or aged, a few there will be who are disgruntled and others, in greater numbers, just anemic. It is obvious that all will not respond to the same kind of treatment, but a plan or program might be arranged by which new life can be injected into the group with which you are having difficulty. Ascertain, if possible, what kind of work these nominal members prefer, and then give them plenty of it. Keep your members busy!

Perhaps, in your parish, you work on the Auxiliary-Guild plan, with the accent on the Guild. In some places where the members of the Guild are members of the Auxiliary, there is no partiality shown and all goes well. After all, a member of the Woman's Auxiliary may make herself useful in any department of the Church's work, whether in the parish or some distant place beyond the sea. The Guild's work, it seems to me, should be the Auxiliary's work and vice versa. In your round-up of old members, be on the lookout for new ones as well.

It is most gratifying to note that a majority of the Branches are making use of the Year Book in their meetings. Miss Brenneman will be happy to learn that her frequent appeals on this point were not made in vain.

Considering the economic depression, through which we have been passing, the Box Work for missions compares most favorably with the value of work done last year. The value of boxes this year approximates \$5000.

Along with this splendid showing, your response to the call of the needy in your own communities has been most generous. A total value of more than \$6000 has been placed to your credit in the Social Service column.

Your keen interest in the Church Periodical Club work deserves a word of commendation. When one considers that \$5000 worth of reading matter and useful articles were distributed, through this organization, to the lonely, the shut-ins and the sick, it makes us happy

to feel we have been privileged to share our comforts and joys with others less fortunate than ourselves.

During the past year, forty-eight of our fellow-workers were called to the life eternal. According to our usual custom, may we show our love and respect to the memory of these dear departed ones by standing in silence for a moment.

I have taken note of the many changes of officers in the Branches. In the name of the Board of Officers, may I extend grateful thanks to those who have served so well in their appointed places, and welcome the new officers. And right here, may I remind you to please notify me at once whenever a change takes place in your staff of officers.

This so-called report would be incomplete were I to close without a testimonial in favor of my predecessor, Miss Lettie Brenneman. For nine years she gave the best of her strength and talents in the office of secretary. She put joy into her work and from it derived a dividend of a host of friends. For the past five years it was my privilege to assist Miss Brenneman in the work of compiling the Year Book. During this time of intimate relationship with her, I discovered a rare soul, endowed with the spirit of kindness and patience, a charming personality and one who loves her Master and His Holy Church. She has bequeathed to her successor a standard of high quality, but in my humble way and by God's help, I give you my word, dear fellow-members that I shall aim to maintain her leadership and do everything to assist you whenever possible to do so.

Albright reported on the United Thank Offering. Mrs. Frank Carpenter talked of special service work among girls. Mrs. Harry Frease told of several unique ways in which the women of St. Paul's, Canton, had made money to replace lost or frozen assets. Mrs. Newton S. Noble explained special need for more Red Cross workers. Mrs. Rupert Holland, Diocesan President, and Miss Elizabeth Matthews, President of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Midwest Province, were guest speakers.

The fourth annual Missionary Tea was held June 9th at the home of Mrs. S. F. Ziliox. Miss Helen Skiles, missionary from Kyoto, Japan, was the speaker. About three hundred were present.

The Fall meeting was held at St. John's Church, Cuyahoga Falls. The Rev. Mr. McIlwain paid a tribute to the memory of Dr. George Parkin Atwater. Mrs. George MacCracken and Miss Mabel Higgs spoke on the work of the C. P. C. and Mrs. P. G. Albright gave an address on the United Thank Offering.

Having been appointed Diocesan Educational Secretary by Bishop Rogers at the May meeting of the Diocese, I resigned as Chairman of the Akron Region, and Mrs. J. V. Blake of the Church of Our Saviour, Akron, was elected.

Mrs. R. R. Bowman, fourth vice-president of the Diocese, talked about the Contingent Fund. Mrs. Noble displayed garments made by Red Cross workers, and asked for more volunteers. Mrs. Durr, Regional Educational Secretary, gave an outline of the study work for this year. The guest speakers were Miss Milred James, Chairman of Commission on the Service Program, and the Rev. Walter Tunks of St. Paul's, Akron.

Visited the following parishes during the year and gave brief talks: St. Paul's, Church of Our Saviour, and St. Peter's, Akron; Grace, Ravenna; Christ Church, Kent; St. John's, Cuyahoga Falls; St. Andrew's, Barberton; Christ Church, Hudson; St. Timothy's, Massillon; and St. Paul's, Canton. Pepper, Executive Secretary, Department of Social Service of the Diocese, and Mrs. Rupert Holland, President of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese.

The fifth meeting was the Quiet Morning at Emmanuel Church, September 29th, conducted by the Rev. Andrew S. Gill, Rector, Emmanuel Church, Cleveland.

The sixth meeting held in St. Mark's Church on October 14th. Speakers—Mrs. H. A. Hoffman, Akron, Educational Secretary of the Diocese; Mrs. G. L. MacCracken, Akron, Diocesan Correspondent of Church Periodical Club; Mrs. R. R. Bowman, Akron, Fourth Vice-President of the Woman's Auxiliary of this Diocese, and Miss Mabel M. Higgs, Cuyahoga Falls, Assistant and Treasurer of the Church Periodical Club of the Diocese.

The seventh meeting was held in St. Mary's Church, November 11, 1932. Speakers—Sister from St. John's Home for Girls, Painesville; Miss Linskey, Matron of Holy Cross House; Mrs. C. H. Lang, Diocesan Altar Guild, and Mrs. Gerald C. Clarke, Daughters of the King.

The eighth and last meeting of the year was of very great importance. It was held in St. Philip's Church, December 9, 1932. A Christmas Shower of clothing, books, toys and canned goods was given by the women of the Region as a gift at the Christmas season to the Holy Cross House for Handicapped Children; St. John's Home for Girls; The Church Home, and the Church Mission work under the direction of the Rev. William Edwards of Trinity Cathedral House. This was a new venture, to have our women give a can of corn or a glass of home-made jelly or some towels, toys and even clothing as a personal gift to these institutions of our Church at the time of the year which is so close to our hearts—the anniversary of the birth of Christ. Over 175 cans and glasses of food were received by the committee, as well as dolls of different sizes, books, pictures, games of many kinds, supplies for linen shelves, such as pillow cases and towels, sweaters, dresses and stockings. Much credit is due to the very capable committee which took charge of enumeration, distribution and delivery of these gifts. The guest speakers at this meeting were Miss Helen Skiles, missionary from Kyoto, Japan, and the Rev. William Edwards, Episcopal City Missions.

Twenty-two churches represented at meetings throughout the year. Total recorded attendance, 725.

Report of Diocesan Educational Secretary



In these days of deficits and low production, a dividend is a source of joy. Such a dividend came to me in the shape of splendid reports from parish and regional educational secretaries. Many of these reports showed such good work done and such excellent programs arranged, that I regret there is not space to print them. Fifty parishes report as follows:

Program Meetings, 21; Prepared Papers, 19; Book Reviews, 16; Bible Classes, 4; Prayer Groups, 4; Missionary Speakers, 10; Discussion Groups, 19; Lectures, 19; Printed Programs, 10. Twenty-four reported study programs throughout the year, one during Advent and the rest during Lent with weekly meetings. The average number attending classes was 32. The majority of classes were conducted by leaders from their own groups with discussion following. Groups studying "Building a Christian Nation" in some instances brought heirlooms to display, while the "China" and "American Indian" study groups are exhibiting rare pieces from the Orient and blankets, baskets and moccasins made by the Indians.

Twelve parishes reported lending libraries, and nearly all report the use of church papers and magazines. Eleven delegates were sent to the Gambier Summer Conference and one to Wellesley.

Other groups carrying on a study program were Daughters of the King, Girls' Friendly, Men's Bible Class, Men's Club, Daughters of the Church, Mu Tau Alpha, St. Hilda's Guild and several classes in Personal Religion and Teacher Training.

Eight groups studied the "General Church Program;" 25 studied "Building a Christian Nation;" 20 are studying "China;" 26 "The American Indian" and 5 "The Kingdoms of Our Lord." A program worthy of special mention was one given by Miss Jane Richardson, Miss Dorothy Thompson, Miss Edith Jewitt and Mrs. Collins of St. Paul's, Cleveland Heights. "China" was the subject with an impersonation of Olan of "Good Earth."

Text-books used—"Building a Christian Nation;" "The Challenge of Change;" with "Epic of America;" "Beyond City Limits;" "Our Expanding Church;" and many books of pioneer life. Text-books—"Facing the Future in Indian Missions;" "Indian Americans," with "Indian Tribes and Missions;" "Story of the Red Man;" "The Enchanted Desert;" "Life and Labors of Bishop Hare" and books of fiction. Text-books—"Living Issues in China" and "As It Looks to Young China," with "Twenty Years of the Chinese Republic;" "A Faith for the World;" "Lady Fourth Daughter of China;" "The Young Revolutionist;" "China's Challenge to Christianity" and many books of history and fiction. "History of the Episcopal Church;" "A Practical Faith."

May, 1932 to January 1, 1933

At the Diocesan Meeting in Cleveland on May 12th, Bishop Rogers appointed me to the office of Diocesan Educational Secretary to succeed Miss Maud Gorham, resigned, and it is my earnest hope that the work will grow and prosper.

Attended 40 classes at the Gambier Summer Conference—took the examinations and received credit cards. Compiled "Findings" on the "China" class which were mailed to all young people taking the course for credit, as well as to every region in the diocese.

Planned programs for four courses of study, namely: "General Church Program;" "China;" "The American Indian" and "Kingdoms of Our Lord." Sent out 275 of these programs.

Attended Regional meetings at Youngstown, Niles, Steubenville, Sandusky, Cleveland, Painesville, Cuyahoga Falls, Akron, speaking at all of them.

Held Institutes at Elyria, Cleveland and Toledo.

Presented "China" to the women of St. Paul's, Canton, and St. Paul's, Cleveland.

Talked on the "Gambier Summer Conference" at the Church of Our Saviour, Akron.

Met with the Senior Mu Tau Alpha group at Toledo, and gave a general educational talk.

Representing Churchwomen, I was a member of a Round Table discussion group on "World Affairs." Addressed an open meeting on December 13th, on "The League of Nations."

Have had conferences with leaders in several denominations and furnished material for study.

Have kept no record of letters written or books and literature sent out. Suffice it to say, that the amount has been enormous.

Attended Board Meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary—5.

Department of Religious Education—3.

Department of Adult Education—1.

Was a delegate to the Provincial Meeting at Cleveland, October 19th and 20th.

Spent a few days at the Presbyterian Assembly grounds at Montreat, N. C., having in mind that the more I can learn—the more I can grow in spirit, the more I can humbly give.

Miss Maud Gorham, who resigned as Diocesan Educational Secretary, early in March, has asked me to make her report for the first six weeks of 1932. On account of sickness and death in her family, she has had many burdens and our sympathy has been with her. She reports as follows: "Attended one meeting of the Board of the Woman's Auxiliary. One meeting of the Department of Religious Education. Addressed eight parish meetings on the subject of 'Building a Christian Nation.'"

Reports of Regional Educational Secretaries



Mrs. A. W. Durr—Akron Region

January 1, 1932 to January 1, 1933

Briefly may I outline what I have done and where I have been during the past year:

Visited in Akron, St. Paul's Church, St. Peter's Church, and Church of Our Saviour; Grace Church, Ravenna; Christ Church, Kent; St. John's, Cuyahoga Falls; Christ Church, Hudson; and St. Timothy's Church, Massillon. Presented subjects for study courses at the spring and fall meetings. On April 22nd, at Medina, gave a resumé of work accomplished, and on October 28th, outlined the study of the "General Church Program," "Kingdoms of Our Lord," "China," and "The American Indian."

Held conferences and sent out a great deal of literature. Spoke on the subject of Building a Christian Nation at all of the meetings up to October.

Mrs. Ralph M. Evans—Cleveland Region

January 1, 1932 to January 1, 1933

Presented "Building a Christian Nation" to the Auxiliaries of St. Mark's Church, Emmanuel Church, and St. James', Painesville. Reviewed first chapter of same book and started a study course at St. Alban's Church. At one of the Educational Teas, given by St. Paul's Church on the Heights, told the story of "The First Americans." At another Educational Tea at St. Paul's, reviewed the chapter on "Family Life" from the "Kingdoms of Our Lord."

Gave a brief review of the book, "Living Issues in China," to the Virgil Boyer Circle, Church of the Incarnation.

Arranged for the Institute for educational secretaries of the Cleveland Region. At this meeting, Mrs. Harry A. Hoffman presented both study books for the year—"Living Issues in China," and "The American Indian."

Miss Dorothy Ball—Lake Region

October 1932 to January 1, 1933

I was sent as a delegate to the Gambier Summer Conference from Lake Region, and, at a meeting of the region in Painesville in October, was made Regional Educational Secretary, succeeding Mrs. Tyler of Perry. At that meeting I gave a report of the Gambier Conference.

On October 19th, presented "The American Indian" to the Woman's Auxiliary at Ashtabula. Talked also in Ashtabula to the Daughters of St. Peter's Church on both "China," and "The American Indian," during October. Attended a meeting of the Sandusky Region December 8th.

Sent out literature, letters and report blanks over the Region. Mrs. J. F. Tyler sent out notices and material up to the time of her resignation.

Mrs. S. William Baker—Lima Region

Material has been procured and a study class started on "China" at Christ Church, Lima.

Miss Margaret Hamilton—Ohio River Region

November, 1932 to January, 1933

I was appointed to the office of Regional Educational Secretary at the Fall Regional Meeting at Steubenville. Mrs. Harry Hoffman spoke on "China" and "The American Indian" and also suggested the study of "The Kingdom of Our Lord" and the "General Church Program."

Distributed educational material throughout the region.

Conferred with a Queen Esther Group of the Methodist Church on a study program.

Talked to the G. F. S. group on the "Title Page of the Prayer Book."

Talked to Woman's Auxiliary group in Wellsville on the educational work, also U. T. O. and Blue Box.

Attended conference at Jackson's Mill, W. Va.

Miss Maud Gorham—Mansfield Region

On account of illness, Miss Gorham's report blank for the Mansfield Region was sent to Mrs. Alex. E. Hawke of St. Paul's Church, Mount Vernon, who reports as follows:

"At the Fall Regional meeting, Mrs. Eliza Backus was the speaker, telling of her trip to our mission stations.

"Each parish reported that educational material has been received and most of them expect to carry on the study classes during Lent."

Mrs. C. A. Dowell—Sandusky Region

Mrs. E. C. Loofbourrow—Sandusky Region

In the Sandusky Region, the great distance between parishes constitutes one of the difficulties in carrying on regional work. However, the work is going forward and gratifying results are being obtained. A conference for parish educational leaders was held at St. Andrew's Church, Elyria, on September 22nd, with representatives from five parishes in attendance. Mrs. Harry Hoffman, Diocesan Educational Secretary, reviewed the text-books, "Living Issues in China" and "Facing the Future in Indian Missions" and offered many helpful suggestions, pertaining to the educational work. Mrs. Bubb, Regional Chairman, presented Mrs. C. A. Dowell, who gave a report of the Gambier Summer Conference which she attended as a representative

of the Sandusky Region. Mrs. Hoffman assigned the regional leadership of study classes on "China" to Mrs. C. A. Dowell and to Mrs. Loofbourrow, those groups wishing to study "The American Indian." Notices of this conference were mailed to each of the eleven parishes in the region by Mrs. Loofbourrow, together with "Program Outlines" prepared by Mrs. Hoffman, and leaflets pertaining to them.

At a regional meeting in Calvary Church, Sandusky, December 8th, the educational work was featured in a brief talk by Mrs. Hoffman. Mrs. Dowell and Mrs. Loofbourrow were presented at this meeting and it was announced that they would be available to any parish desirous of help in promoting mission study. Report blanks for 1932, sent to the eleven parishes in the region were responded to by five. May we urge a more general interest in 1933 in the propagation of mission study; a plant of steady growth, very susceptible to heat, cold and moisture, but blooming profusely and spreading rapidly under favorable conditions.

Mrs. Ida Colburn—Toledo Region

January 1, 1932 to October 12, 1932

Out of nine parishes in the region, five are now actually engaged in educational programs. A lending library was established and copies of the text-book, "Building a Christian Nation," were made available to any parish desiring them.

Early in September, books needed for the study of "The American Indian" and "China" were also placed at the disposal of all study groups. Several books of prescribed fiction were also made available as collateral reading.

The new regional educational secretary took office on October 12th and we have made direct contact with every parish and 1933 promises to be most successful, and we are sure that at least seven out of the nine parishes will have well organized study groups.

Mrs. Alice Shaner Van Allen—Toledo Region

October 12

Was appointed educational secretary of the Region at a Regional Meeting held at Trinity Church on October 12th. Miss Elizabeth Matthews was the speaker, presenting "The United Thank Offering."

December 7th—Attended a Regional Meeting at St. Andrew's Church—Speaker, Miss Helen Skiles—Missionary from Japan.

An Educational Institute is planned for January 12th with Mrs. Harry Hoffman as leader.

November 2nd—Visited All Saints' Church and presented the study of "The American Indian."

December 1st—Grace Church, presented "The American Indian." Of the nine parishes in the region, all but one have now planned a study group for the year. In addition to these, there are three branches of

young people who have accepted the course of study. The books "Facing the Future in Indian Missions," and "Living Issues in China" have been placed in nearly every parish.

Mrs. Edgar Tricker—Youngstown Region.

Did not take office until October 27th, so have not much to report. I succeeded Mrs. F. L. Geiger, who resigned on account of illness. Have sent out literature twice to six Auxiliaries in the Region. Have also corresponded with two of the educational secretaries and accepted an invitation to review chapters one and two of "Living Issues in China," at Christ Church, Warren.

Attended the Gambier Summer Conference.

Report of the Field Secretary



Visited St. Philip's to help in the re-organization of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Redeemer Mission—St. Matthew's—St. Mark's—all of the Cleveland Region.

Attended an Inter-racial Conference, and meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary Board.

The World Day of Prayer for Missions—Conferences on Cleveland Regional Plans.

Meetings of the Presidents of the Cleveland Region.

Through correspondence and conferences, advised Mrs. H. A. Hoffman as to plans under her leadership as Diocesan Educational Secretary. This, with letters, telephone calls and personal conferences, comprises my report as Field Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary. Because of illness in my home, it was impossible to do more constructive work during this time.

The Annual Report of the Church Periodical Club



January, 1932 to January, 1933

Another year has passed and it has been a profitable one for the C. P. C. in spite of, or should I say, because of the depression, for the C. P. C. uses the things you are ready to throw away or give to the rag man. One of our mottoes is, "The waste material in your home means joy and happiness in the hands of the Church Periodical Club."

The **need** for the C. P. C. increases steadily, magazines are more difficult to get and therefore are more valuable. Our rural clergy and missionaries are apt to be far from libraries, and there are many Church people who are starving for reading matter.

One missionary writes, "Books, magazines, pictures for the walls, Sunday supplements, anything that appeals to the eye, is a help." It is to supply these needs which are greater this year than ever before, that the C. P. C. carries on.

Just recently a letter came from one of our missionaries at Shanghai, China. She writes, "I wonder if the C. P. C. can visualize all books meant to us in this part of the world. We wander through the bookshops in Shanghai with a vain hope that perhaps we will satisfy a desire to own a new book, but we usually change our minds. Let me tell you why. I pick the books at random from the morning's list in the paper; "Ellen Terry's Memoirs"—\$18.75, "The Letters

of D. H. Lawrence"—\$25.00, "Bernard Shaw"—\$37.50, "Death in the Afternoon" by Ernest Hemingway—\$17.50. You see why we so appreciate the club. Perhaps missionaries should not have copies of "Vanity Fair," but I especially wanted to see the December issue on account of an article on what America is doing about the economic questions of unemployment. It cost me \$2.20 for one copy of one small magazine."

The C. P. C. **does** realize what it means to these missionaries but what we want is for the **whole Church** to catch the vision that we may have a branch in every parish.

During the year several new branches were organized. Miss Higgs and I have been busy responding to calls of various kinds and from numerous places. We have visited six Regions: Toledo, Sandusky, Cleveland, Lake, Youngstown, and Akron. Have been in seventeen parishes, some of them several times, and have made thirty-two talks, displaying and giving away samples of recreational material. I presented the work of the C. P. C. on Thursday at the morning session of the Provincial Synod at Trinity, Cleveland, in October. We have held three conferences—January, May and September. The first on January 27th at Emmanuel Church, Cleveland, when Bishop Rogers was present and celebrated the Holy Communion. This was the first Corporate Communion of the C. P. C. and there were some seventy or eighty women present.

We responded to an appeal for books and magazines in Southern Ohio and the Rev. Mr. Lever is very grateful for the help we are giving him.

We had as our "Special" for 1932 the General Library Fund, but for 1933 we are requested to take "St. John's University Library, Shanghai, China" for our "Special."

The need for recreational material is greater this year than ever before, so let us pass on our jig-saw puzzles, games, toys, dolls, etc., to those unfortunate ones in our own community, the shut-ins and isolated.

We ask for the continued help and interest of all the Church organizations and of our friends, both old and young in this fine work.

"Our Own Missionary," who is Miss Caroline Fullerton, represents the Ohio Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, in China. She is principal of St. Mary's Hall, a school for girls, and we are responsible for the payment of her salary. Please send gifts to Mrs. Clifford C. Cowin, Treasurer, 2241 Prospect Ave., Cleveland, Ohio.

The Bishop Leonard Memorial Fund is for use among the missions of Ohio, now to be used at the discretion of Bishop Rogers. We have pledged \$500.00 to this fund.

The Bishop Rogers Fund will place in the hands of Bishop Rogers, a sum for use, as he thinks best, among missions in the diocese.

The Expense Fund covers the cost of publishing the annual report, occasional circulars or leaflets and notices in several departments. With the enlarged scope of the Supply Department, there are expenses for freight, express and postage. Each Branch is asked to contribute to this fund.

The Contingent Fund is available for all sorts of emergencies. It is the large feature in the work of the Supply Director. We ask the women of the Branches to give special thought to this work. An increase of pledges is earnestly solicited and will be carefully expended. All money and checks for this fund should be sent to the Diocesan Treasurer, Mrs. Clifford C. Cowin, 2241 Prospect Avenue, Cleveland, Ohio.

The Bishop Bedell Scholarship and the Julia Bedell Scholarship pay for the education of native pupils in St. John's University, Shanghai, China. They require \$70.00 each per annum.

The Bishop Hare Scholarship in St. Elizabeth's School, South Dakota, pays for the education of an Indian pupil; it requires \$60.00 per year.

The Sarah L. Leonard Scholarship—St. Mark's School, Nenana, Alaska, \$200.00 per annum.
