The United Thank Offering



These three words, so full of deep meaning, represent a part of the life of the women of the Church, so appealing, so personal and so sacred, as to be very dear to their hearts. The United Thank Offering is an offering from the thankful hearts of women everywhere.

It was a woman, Mrs. Richard Soule, who thought and suggested a definite Thank Offering to be used for one purpose. Miss Julia Emery, who was secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, was asked to suggest such an offering for the General Convention to be held in 1889.

Miss Emery suggested a church building with furnishings for Anvik, Alaska, and the outfit, traveling expenses, and a year's salary for a missionary teacher needed in Japan. The amount asked for each was about \$1000.00 and this plan was published in *The Spirit of Missions* a month before the meeting.

When the offering was taken it was only \$400.00, but during the day \$600.00 was collected, and a friend gave \$1000.00. Once such a plan was started it could not be given up, and the small amount has grown to over a million.

If we look at it as an additional opportunity to express our thanks for many blessings, and if all Church women join in giving, no parish treasurer will need to fear for the harvest from her church, and the missionary work all over the world need not pause for money.

It is estimated that if every baptized woman of the Episcopal Church would put a penny a day into her little Blue Box, the Offering every three years would exceed \$6,000,000! It is the little from the many that accomplishes so much.

At the end of the three years the whole Offering is taken to the Triennial and there placed on the golden alms basin at the great "Service of United Praise," where women gather from the ends of the earth, Alaska, Africa, Indian villages, and the Orient.

It is very important that even a greater number of women should be told about the United Thank Offering and given an opportunity to share in it.

The thought of what this Offering might be with the whole force of the women of the Church behind it kindles the imagination.

The Annual Meeting in Lakewood



The fifty-sixth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council, Diocese of Ohio, took place in the Church of the Ascension, Lakewood, on Thursday, May 11, 1933.

At the hour of ten there was a celebration of the Holy Communion by the Rt. Rev. Warren L. Rogers, Bishop of the Diocese. In the chancel assisting were, the Rev. Gerard Patterson and the Rev. Wm. Studwell.

Immediately following this most inspiring service, Mrs. Rupert Holland, Diocesan President, with gavel in hand, rapped for order and the business session of the fifty-sixth convention of the Ohio Auxiliary began.

After a brief word of welcome to all present, Mrs. Holland read her report as printed in the Year Book.

Mrs. Eliza J. Backus, Honorary President, was then called upon for a word of greeting, and, as always, she responded with a cheerful message. "Christianity," she said, "is not a power to do good work when we choose and which we want to do, but it is doing the work we are chosen to do, and the more we do it the more we love to do it."

The appointment of officers to serve for the ensuing year was then made by the Bishop, who characterized his task as a delightful custom. In a short address he expressed his pleasure at seeing so large a number present, and his grateful appreciation to the women of the Auxiliary for all they mean to him and the Church. To the staff of officers, he paid a glowing tribute of praise because of their loyalty and diligence.

Miss Lettie Brenneman, who resigned as Diocesan Secretary last May, presented her final report up to October, having carried on until the appointment of her successor.

The report of the new secretary, Mrs. Frank H. Jewitt, was then heard. Both reports were accepted as read.

A motion was then offered by Mrs. Backus that acknowledgment of the splendid services rendered by Mrs. John G. Anderson, who resigned as Diocesan Educational Secretary, and Miss Lettie Brenneman, should be set forth in an appropriate resolution.

The motion was duly carried and the following were appointed by Mrs. Holland as a committee on resolutions: Mrs. E. S. Grauel, Mrs. Gerald Clarke and Mrs. Fred White.

Instead of reading her report, Mrs. C. C. Cowin, Diocesan Treasurer, reviewed the financial situation of the Auxiliary in a few words. In spite of the bank holidays, she said, we have only \$2,000 less than last year. She announced there would be no new pledges taken, but instead, she asked the Branches to do the best they could in the payment of back pledges as well as those for this year. Any special money left will be applied on the Deficit.

The roll-call revealed an attendance of 541. Included in this number were delegates from two new Junior Branches; one from St. Mark's Church, Toledo, and the other from the Church of Our Saviour, Akron. Mrs. Holland hopes to see more of our young women in the Auxiliary,

and to that end made an urgent appeal to the delegates for their help in this project.

Mrs. Eugene Grasselli, Chairman of the Committee on redecorating the Bishop's house at Kokosing, Gambier, told of the urgent need for bedding, silver, rugs and household linen to replace those removed by the niece of the late Bishop Leonard. In meeting this need, she said, we are showing our love to the Bishop who has been so much to us.

Mrs. Gordon Rieley made a strong appeal to the women of the Church when she pointed out the importance of having *The Spirit of Missions* in the home of every churchman. She also asked that each parish have a representative for this magazine to care for and promote subscriptions.

Mrs. Holland then introduced new officers on the Auxiliary Board—Miss Elise McD. Backus, Supply Director; Mrs. Harry A. Hoffman, Educational Secretary; Mrs. Frank H. Jewitt, Secretary; Mrs. C. H. Lang, Diocesan Altar Guild; Mrs. W. G. Mather, Chairman of Christian Social Service; Miss Lettie Brenneman, representative for Daughters of the King; Mrs. F. H. Ginn, representing the Girls' Friendly Society, was unable to be present.

The report of the Chairman for Isolated Churchwomen was read by Mrs. E. S. Grauel in the absence of Mrs. T. H. Walbridge. Mrs. Walbridge is desirous of obtaining names of any of our Churchwomen who are lonely. Cheery letters will be sent to them which will make them feel they are not forgotten.

Mrs. H. A. Hoffman gave a brief outline of her educational plans for the coming year. The subject for study will be Christ and the Modern World.

The Rev. Wm. Studwell, rector of the Church of the Ascension, announced the date of the Gambier Summer Conference, June 26th to July 7th, and asked for a large attendance. He then extended a warm welcome to all present and invited them to partake of the luncheon prepared for them in the new parish house.

The afternoon session was opened with the singing of the Auxiliary Hymn.

The report of the United Thank Offering was read by Miss Mary Shanklin, Director pro-tem in the absence of Mrs. Samuel Strong.

Miss Josephine Smith, representing St. Barnabas' Guild, told of the benefits received by nurses through this organization. She appealed to the women of the Auxiliary to help in this work through membership, and by patronizing the Opportunity Shop.

The following resolution was read and adopted by a standing vote:

Whereas: The Board of Officers of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Ohio has received and accepted with regret the resignations of two of its most faithful and efficient members, Mrs. John G. Anderson and Miss Lettie Brenneman,

Be it Resolved: That we, the women of the Auxiliary in annual convention assembled, assure these retiring officers of our lasting appreciation of the fine work accomplished in this Diocese under their inspiring leadership; of our gratitude for their high

standard of Christian womanhood and for their example of devotion and loyalty to the Cause we love so well.

Be it Resolved: That we extend to these officers our congratulations upon their achievements and express our hope and belief that the reward of work well done will be theirs in heaped-up and running-over measure.

Be it Resolved: That this resolution be spread upon the minutes of this meeting and published in the Year Book, and that a copy be sent to Mrs. Anderson and to Miss Brenneman.

Committee on Resolutions.

Our guest speaker, Mrs. Harper Sibley, was then introduced by Mrs. Holland. Mrs. Sibley, who was a member of the Laymen's Foreign Missions Inquiry, presented as her subject, "The Women of the Orient," in a most fascinating and interesting manner.

The high lights of her address are quoted: "Religious truth belongs to the world as much as scientific truth, and missionary enterprises, changed to meet changing conditions in the East, are needed today as much as ever.

"In the presentation of the Christian message to the women of the East, there is need for a basic change in appeal. Christianity can no longer center its emphasis on the social handicaps of non-Christian faiths, since non-Christian leaders are undergoing a process of social reform from within, slowly accommodating themselves to the idea of freedom for women. The foreign worker must recognize this change in environment, and welcome the Eastern women into larger responsibility.

"The primary task for the future, in all phases of mission effort for women, consists in the training of leaders in all lines affecting women. Oriental women are just beginning to extend the range of their interests and have a growing desire for international friendship.

"The Oriental women, especially the women of India, are looking to the future, and are demanding an approach to their problems on the basis of scientific truth, and if we as Christians are to help them, we must be able to tell why the Christian Way of Life has a validity of meaning."

In closing Mrs. Sibley said, "I am pleading for a new understanding and appreciation of the greatness of Oriental people by the Church. We will support them and help them, and then turn the work over to them, for it is their problem, their country, and their Christ."

Miss Sarah MacDonald, principal of Harcourt School for Girls, Gambier, appealed to the women of the Diocese for their sympathy and co-operation in the school, and asked them to interest their friends.

A rising vote of thanks was then offered to the rector and women of the Church of the Ascension for their very cordial hospitality, and also the feast of good things at luncheon time.

The meeting adjourned after the blessing pronounced by the Rev. Mr. Studwell.

Annual Report of the Bishop's Fund



I am happy to give the report of the offerings which the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Ohio have made to my Discretionary Fund since your last meeting in May, 1933. The receipts from your Treasurer have been as follows:

June 8, 1933.....	\$100.00
Aug. 1, 1933.....	250.00
Jan. 15, 1934.....	250.00

Making a total of \$600.00, of which I understand \$275.00 was for the Bishop Leonard Memorial Fund and \$325.00 for my Discretionary Fund.

The Auxiliary has been exceedingly gracious in remembering the needs during these days and all of this money has been spent in giving aid to clergy in the diocese, and their families. In many cases it has meant a supplement to their stipends, which were greatly in arrears because of trying conditions that some of our parishes and missions have had to face. I may assure you that in every case it has been well merited, and has brought relief for which the clergyman was most appreciative.

May I also report to you the offerings which came through the inspiration of the Auxiliary and of individuals in the diocese in connection with the refurnishing and redecoration of the Bishop's House, Kokosing, in Gambier. At your last annual meeting in the Church of the Ascension in Lakewood Mrs. Grasselli presented the matter, and many of the women of the Church responded to the suggestion then made. As a result I received the following: Through Mrs. Frank Ginn, and friends who responded to her invitation, \$100.00; through Mrs. Grasselli and her friends, \$155.40; from the Church Club of the Diocese, \$50.00; making a total of \$305.40. The total cost of the work, which was cared for by these funds, was \$349.00, so you see that practically the entire bill for the redecoration of Kokosing was cared for through the kind auspices of the Auxiliary and their friends. I am deeply grateful for your remembrances and help.

Furthermore, I felt like a June Bride for most of the summer and fall because of the many gifts that came from different Branches of the Auxiliary, sending me linens, dishes, bedding and all sorts of things for our comfort at Kokosing. During the summer and early fall there was not a week that some "Missionary Box" did not arrive, extending the

greetings of various parishes and missions, and contributing something for the upkeep of the house. I have no idea of the values of these gifts but I am sure that they would represent a few hundreds of dollars. For all of this I give hearty thanks and have had much joy in thinking of the devotion and helpfulness of the Auxiliary, and of the women of the Diocese.

Report of the Secretary



My report as Diocesan Secretary consists of two parts; first, an accounting of my own activities, and secondly, a summary of work done by the Auxiliary as shown on the report blanks for the Year Book.

I attended the eight meetings of the Auxiliary Board; the Educational Institute, held by Mrs. Hoffman at Trinity Cathedral; all meetings of the Cleveland Region; the Foreign Missions Conference; a dinner at St. Andrew's Church where I was invited to be a guest speaker with Mrs. Backus and Miss Brenneman; and presided at a conference for Branch Secretaries at Emmanuel Church, prior to the Annual Meeting last May.

During the months of February and March I devoted most of my time to the editing of the Year Book. This work could be done in less than half the time it takes now were I to receive all reports within the allotted time. Investigation of the causes of delay reveals, in many cases, a lack of responsibility. The paragraph, entitled "Changes of Officers" on the "Information" page of the Year Book, seems to have been quite overlooked by most of the Branches where changes were made. As a consequence, report blanks were either lost or mislaid, causing unnecessary delay. You will assist me greatly, and I will appreciate it if, when a change is made in your staff of officers, you will send me a card at once with that information.

On the whole, your achievements for the year 1933 stand out pre-eminently as one of the best years we have ever had. I speak not from a financial standpoint, for after all any organization can do well when times are prosperous. Your reports indicate that you have made the most of what you had to work with, under trying conditions, and God blessed your efforts. As a prophetess, I see our work in the coming years greatly enlarged, if, with the same spirit, we continue to make use of that inward power with which God has so richly endowed each one of us.

The total membership of all Branches reported shows a decrease over that of last year while the average attendance at meetings was comparatively greater. Let us make another effort to interest more women in the Auxiliary.

You will be pleased to learn that four new Branches have come into our family; St. Matthew's Auxiliary, and the Daughters of St. Matthew's, Toledo, the Junior Auxiliary of Grace Church (South), Cleveland, and Holy Trinity, Alliance. We extend to them a hearty welcome.

In four parishes, St. Paul's Church, Akron; Trinity Cathedral, Cleveland; St. Paul's Church, Medina; and Grace Church, Willoughby, the guilds and Auxiliary Branches have merged into one organization.

The Box Work for our own institutions measures up about the same as for last year, amounting to nearly \$5000. Added to this is the splendid response to those in need, cared for by the Department of Christian Social Service. Estimates show a valuation of clothing and food to be \$7200.

The Church Periodical Club is growing steadily in the majority of parishes. What a blessing it is for us to be able to share, through this wonderful organization, our joys with others less fortunate than ourselves.

It was our privilege and pleasure to have a number of guest speakers from afar for our Regional meetings, among them being the Rt. Rev. Elmer N. Schmuck, Missionary Bishop of Wyoming, and the Rev. Vincent H. Gowen of Besao, Philippine Islands. Their inspiring messages will long be remembered by those who heard them.

You will note we have an Honor Roll this year, listing the names of Auxiliary Branch officers who have served ten or more years. In the name of the Auxiliary Board, I congratulate you for your long and faithful service. For special mention we name two officers from St. Paul's Church on the Heights, Cleveland; Mrs. F. E. Bunts who has served 37 years, and Mrs. E. J. Backus, 35 years, also Mrs. Mary K. Gates of St. Timothy's Church, Massillon, 29 years.

Our Honorary President, Mrs. E. J. Backus, has written a message for us in which she draws attention to the Call of our Presiding Bishop. May I suggest that you read this most helpful presentation of the way to a better and higher life, not once only, but several times as you hold your meetings during the year.

You have just heard our President's report in which she spoke of visiting many parishes and regions. During the early days of our Diocese, Bishops Chase and McIlvaine traveled many thousands of miles on horseback on their visitations to scattered parishes and missions. Mrs. Holland carries out the same tradition of these worthy pioneers as she travels about, not on horseback, but driving her own car to the remotest parts of the Diocese. With her fingers on the pulse of each Auxiliary Branch, she keeps in close touch with the needs of the Diocese, helping wherever she can with words of comfort and cheer. It is not difficult to imagine she draws heavily on her time and strength doing her duty as she sees it. During the month of October alone she spent twenty-six days on the road. Let us not forget to remember our President in our devotions that God will give her during the coming year, the strength and courage she needs to carry on in the service of our Lord and Saviour, for whom our labor is not in vain.

The year 1933 saw the passing of 59 of our Auxiliary members into the Life Eternal. According to our usual custom, may we stand in silence a moment as we remember our loved ones who have entered into their everlasting and heavenly habitation.

Today you will receive the new Year Book. Each Branch is entitled to three copies and I trust that those Branches represented here at this meeting will call for them before leaving this afternoon.

Report of the Akron Region

The seventh meeting held in Emmanuel Church, November 10th. Speakers, Mrs. John G. Anderson and the Rev. Paul R. Savanack, who gave a splendid talk on the United Thank Offering.

The eighth meeting held in The Church of the Incarnation December 8th was the Christmas Shower for Our Church Institutions. An effort was made to have the Diocesan Board create interest in the other Regions to help this work, as the need is very great and under the present economic conditions our help is much needed and appreciated. No roll call is taken at Quiet Days. Twenty-one Churches and Missions were represented at meetings during the year with a total recorded attendance of 793.

The Day of Prayer was sponsored by the Region. It was held in the parishes and missions. Some 1500 Prayer Cards were distributed

in the Region, and reports showed that the day was observed by meditation and intercession by almost every Branch.

It has been a great privilege to have served the Region and to do our little bit towards carrying forward the work of the Extension of the Kingdom of God. The Secretary and I wish to express our gratitude to all who have been so helpful and co-operative during the past year.

Report of Diocesan Educational Secretary



I heard one of the officers of The National Council say that dearth of religious education is pathetic and deplorable and, while I must admit that there is room for improvement, the greatly increased interest shown from year to year will necessitate a qualifying of the above statement, at least in the Diocese of Ohio.

All nine regions report study classes, and the parish where no attempt is made to study the Church and its work all over the world is becoming rare.

Reports from 58 groups showed the following: Program meetings, 24. Prepared papers, 13. Book reviews, 18. Discussion groups, 18. Missionary speakers, 15. Lectures, 11. Bible classes, 4. Prayer groups, 6. Printed programs, 22. Thirty-six reported study programs throughout the year and fourteen during Lent. A few reported no regular study class but said they had had talks given on Missions and the Mission study topics, which is a start in the right direction. The numbers attending classes ranged from 6 to 55.

Twelve groups reported classes conducted by leaders from their own number with discussion following; 11 groups reported their rector as leader; 7 had a guest speaker for each meeting. There were a number of Chinese teas and displays of Chinese articles. There were programs of Indian music with Indian artcraft displays. Warren had something different in the shape of 6 lectures with stereopticon views during Lent. St. John's, Youngstown, reports five organizations of their church as having studied China. Three groups have taken up the study of biographies.

Other groups carrying on a study program were: Adult Bible Classes; Daughters of the King; Girls' Friendly; Kappa Beta Kappa; Mu Tau Alpha; Junior Auxiliaries; Adult classes for men and women studying The Life of Christ and classes on Personal Religion.

Six groups studied the General Church Program; 9, the Kingdoms of Our Lord; 16, China; 23, The American Indian. Nearly all report blanks returned indicate that our subject for this year, "Christ and the Modern World," is being taken up with much earnestness and enthusiasm. Nine groups reported Lending Libraries; 17 provide church papers for distribution and 6 report using The Spirit of Missions. I hope many more are using this valuable magazine, who failed to report it. There were seventeen delegates to The Gambier Summer Conference.

Books used in classes: Living Issues in China, As It Looks to Young China, Lady Fourth Daughter, Twenty Years of the Chinese Republic, with many books of fiction and history, The Crisis in the Far East, etc., Facing the Future in Indian Missions, Indian Americans, Indian Tribes and Missions, Re-Thinking Missions, Our Heritage, The Never Failing Light, Craftsmen All, Builders of a New World, Today's Youth and Tomorrow's World, Eastern Women—Today and Tomorrow, The Challenge of Europe, biographies of Kagawa, Albert Schweitzer, Sir Wilfred Grenfell, C. F. Andrews, Bishop Brent. The above list of books were quite generally used.

January 1, 1933, to January 1, 1934

The work of the Educational Secretary is actually from January 1st of one year to January 1st of the next, for the summer must be spent in conference, reading, planning and getting out programs and collecting and sorting out material for Institutes.

May I stress the importance of attendance at the Regional Institutes? At such a session all the material for study for the coming winter is presented and discussed. It is a great help to leaders, prospective leaders and presidents of groups, and it promotes a general interest in having some sort of study in your various organizations. These Institutes are not just for leaders, but for anyone interested in the Missionary work of the Church.

During the last year the following Institutes were held:

Jan. 11th—Toledo Region at Trinity Church, Toledo

Sept. 26th—Sandusky Region at St. Paul's, Norwalk

Nov. 21st—Cleveland Region at Trinity, Cleveland

Dec. 13th—Lake Region at St. Peter's, Ashtabula

Jan 11th—Spoke to the Mu Tau Alphas at Toledo.

Jan. 26th—Addressed an organization meeting of the Auxiliary-Guild of St. Thomas' Church at Berea.

Mar. 6th—Gave an address on China to the Guild and Auxiliary of St. Peter's, Akron.

Mar. 21st—Spoke to the Young People's Tuesday Evening Group on China and Her Problems, Church of Our Saviour, Akron.

April 22nd—Spoke to The Ladies' Library Club at Port Huron, Michigan.

May 2nd—Gave an address on China at the Mother and Daughter banquet at Grace Church, Port Huron, Michigan.

May 3rd—Talked to the Ladies' Aid Society of Grace Church, Port Huron, Michigan, on "What is the Department of Religious Education, and why have one?"

May 10th—Had a conference of all Educational Secretaries—Parish and Regional, at Emmanuel Church, Cleveland.

May 11th—Spoke briefly on our subject for study, "Christ and the Modern World," at the Diocesan Meeting at Ascension Church, Cleveland.

May 23rd—I was the speaker at a banquet given in the Parish House of Grace Church, Port Huron, Michigan—my subject was India.

From June 26th to July 7th, I attended 40 classes at the Gambier Summer Conference and took the examinations for credit cards.

In August I sent out over the Diocese 300 Outline Programs—to the clergy and to every woman's group. In this program I outlined two courses of study, using as the general theme "Christ and the Modern World"—one course for adults and one for younger groups.

Sept. 14th—Spoke on Christ and the Modern World at St. Paul's, Put-in-Bay.

Oct. 6th—Reviewed the Gambier Conference for the Woman's Auxiliary of The Church of Our Saviour, Akron.

Oct. 10th—Attended the meeting of the Federation of Churches in Cleveland.

Oct. 11th—Attended a meeting of the Mansfield Region at Wooster and presented our Mission Study Topic—Christ and the Modern World.

Oct. 17, 18, 19—was a delegate to the Provincial meeting at South Bend, Indiana—attended a conference of Educational Secretaries and acted as secretary—sending out Findings to those unable to be present.

Oct. 27th—Attended a meeting of the Akron Region at Hudson and urged the study of our topic—Christ and the Modern World.

Nov. 3rd—Talked on The Never Failing Light to the Woman's Guild of St. Paul's, Akron—also visited their Study Class and talked briefly on Educational Work.

Nov. 8th—Presented the subject, Christ and the Modern World, to the women of Grace Church, Mansfield.

Nov. 14th—Talked on The Never Failing Light to the Atwater Memorial Auxiliary of The Church of Our Saviour, Akron.

Nov. 16th—Attended a meeting of the Ohio River Region at East Liverpool and talked on the general theme, Christ and the Modern World.

Was present at Board meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary—4; Department of Religious Education—3.

Have had conferences with members of other denominations and have supplied some of them with study books.

Am the Church Women's representative at the Round Table Discussion group, taking up International Relations.

With my busy schedule, I have made no attempt to keep an accurate account of the amount of material sent out, or the great number of letters written.

I want to take this occasion to publicly thank the Regional Educational Secretaries for their splendid co-operation.

January 1, 1933, to May 1, 1933

From that time on, until the first of the year, I was busy planning programs and holding conferences with parish secretaries.

January 9th, I spoke at St. Peter's, Akron. Later in the month I spoke again on The Oxford Movement.

February 7th, I spoke on The Indians at St. Paul's, Canton.

March 1st, St. John's, Cuyahoga Falls; March 9th, St. Andrew's Barberton.

With sincere regret and a deep appreciation of the loyalty and support of the women of the Akron Region, I was obliged to resign as your educational secretary at the spring regional, but was happy in the knowledge that the work would "carry on" under the able leadership of Mrs. Harry Frease of Canton.

Mrs. Harry Frease—Akron Region

Appointed Regional Educational Secretary at the May meeting held in St. Timothy's Church, Massillon.

Attended the Gambier Conference for church workers from June 26th to July 7th, taking complete courses under Dr. Reinheimer on The Church's Program; Canon Symons on Some Great Christian Ideas; and Miss Beardsley on Christ and the Modern World.

Oct. 3rd—Presented to the women of St. Paul's, Canton, The Church's Program; The Never Failing Light; and Craftsmen All. 60 women were present.

Oct. 24th—Reviewed the book, As the Earth Turns, at the Atwater Memorial Auxiliary meeting, The Church of Our Saviour, Akron.

Oct. 26th — Attended the Regional Auxiliary meeting at Christ Church, Hudson, and spoke of the study work for the year.

Nov. 6th—Presented The Church's Program; Craftsmen All; and The Never Failing Light to the Woman's Auxiliary of St. Peter's, Akron.

Nov. 8th—At Ravenna, Grace Church, Woman's Auxiliary. Presented The Church's Program; The Never Failing Light; and Craftsmen All.

Nov. 16th—At St. Timothy's Woman's Auxiliary, Massillon. Presented The Church's Program; Craftsmen All; and The Never Failing Light.

Nov. 17th—Church of Our Saviour, Akron. Reviewed Our Heritage by Bishop Creighton at a meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Nov. 22nd—To the Girls of Trinity Guild of Alliance, presented The Never Failing Light; Craftsmen All—part of Our Heritage and some of the Church's Program.

Nov. 23rd—Christ Church, Hudson—Presented to the Woman's Guild The Church's Program, The Never Failing Light and Craftsmen All.

Nov. 24th—Presented to the women of Christ Church, Kent, parts of The Church's Program, The Never Failing Light and Our Heritage.

Dec. 8th—To the women of the Auxiliary of St. John's Parish, Cuyahoga Falls—The Church's Program; Craftsmen All and parts of Our Heritage.

Have arranged for six weekly meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary of St. Paul's, Canton, for Lent of 1934, with speakers who are trained in their subjects. These meetings are to be held at the home of the Educational Secretary, Mrs. Harry Frease. This is the fourth year that these meetings have been held, beginning with a luncheon, with an average attendance of between 45 and 50.

Mrs. Ralph M. Evans—Cleveland Region

January 1, 1933, to January 1, 1934

Started the Lenten Study Class at St. John's Church by giving review of chapter on The First Americans—from Building a Christian Nation.

At St. Peter's Church, reviewed the chapter—Inter-racial Contacts from The Kingdoms of Our Lord and later outlined the policies followed, and service rendered, by the Federated Churches of our city and its women's council.

At St. Alban's reviewed the chapter—The Family, from The Kingdoms of Our Lord.

Was sent as a delegate from the Cleveland Region to the Gambier Conference, and on my return gave a brief report to the Virgil Boyer Circle of Incarnation Church and a more detailed one at the Regional Meeting held at St. John's Church in October.

At Emmanuel Church urged the need of religious education in the Auxiliary and other organizations and suggested program to be followed.

Promoted the attendance of Episcopal women at the Foreign Missionary conference held in Cleveland under the auspices of the Federated Churches and with the help of Mrs. McMichael promoted the luncheon given at Trinity Cathedral in honor of Bishop Roots of China.

Met with the committee of St. Paul's Church to plan educational work for the year, and presided as chairman at one of their educational teas.

Attended the meeting of the Provincial Synod at South Bend, Ind., and reported same at the Regional Meeting held at Emmanuel Church.

Arranged for the annual institute of the educational secretaries of the Cleveland Region, at which time Mrs. Harry Hoffman presented the study course, Christ and the Modern World.

Miss Dorothy Ball—Lake Region

January 1, 1933, to January 1, 1934

Made one out of town visit to Painesville Regional Meeting in Fall

of 1932, at which time gave talk on Gambier Summer Conference and the study for coming year.

Was invited to Lorain to meeting of Sandusky Region to give talk on "The Religions of China" but was unable to attend on account of being employed, so sent a paper, which was very well received.

Gave talk to Women's Auxiliary of St. Peter's, Ashtabula, on "The American Indian" and outlined the study for them. Gave the same talk to the Daughters of the Church and a talk on "The New China." Outlined their study program for last year's Lenten Study Classes. Gave an illustrated talk on the Indian at another meeting of the Daughters with pictures, Indian handicraft and music.

Material was sent out over the region and an Educational Institute was held on December 13th at St. Peter's, Ashtabula.

Upon the resignation of Miss Ball, Mrs. Annette Fitch Nelson of Jefferson was appointed as Educational Secretary of the Region. As she has just taken office—there is no report.

Mrs. S. William Baker—Lima Region

January 1, 1933, to January 1, 1934

The only church reporting any Educational work in the Lima region is Christ Church, of Lima. Weekly meetings are to be held during Lent and the future looks bright.

Miss Margaret Hamilton—Ohio River Region

January 1, 1933, to January 1, 1934

Sent out materials to the various branches of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Region.

Addressed the Round Table Club on The Program of the Church.

Helped plan an educational program for the young people of St. Paul's parish and the Girls' Friendly Society.

Attended the Summer Conference for Church Workers at Gambier—June 26th to July 7th.

Miss Maud Gorham—Mansfield Region

January 1, 1933, to January 1, 1934

The Outline Programs for two courses of study of the theme, Christ and the Modern World, were mailed to parishes of the region in the Fall.

At the Fall regional meeting in Wooster, Mrs. Harry A. Hoffman was present and gave an inspirational talk concerning the study subjects for this year.

In nearly all of the parishes of the Region there will be some form of educational program during the year.

Mrs. C. A. Dowell—Sandusky Region

Mrs. E. C. Loofbourrow—Sandusky Region

January 1, 1933, to Spring

Mrs. Dowell—The leadership has been divided between two of us—the correspondence and presentation of one subject of study was in charge of Mrs. Loofbourrow. I attended the classes studying the current subjects for Mission Study at the Gambier Conference, and presented China, during the year.

Attended Regional meetings at Calvary, Sandusky, and at St. Paul's, Norwalk, and presented the subjects of study.

During Lent, I visited the Branch at Norwalk and presented China as a subject for study.

The Lorain Branch used Living Issues in China, and Facing the Future in Indian Missions throughout the year.

The rector at Grace Church, Sandusky, addressed the women during Lent, using the current subjects for study.

At the Regional meeting at Norwalk in May, I suggested that on account of the size of the region and the distance from east to west, two educational leaders be appointed—one for the eastern section and one for the western and these positions have been taken by Mrs. Hiram Greene of Fremont and Mrs. George Klumb of Norwalk.

Mrs. E. C. Loofbourrow

In preparation for the year's work, parish leaders of religious education assembled in St. Andrew's Church, Elyria, for a regional conference, and Mrs. Hoffman, Diocesan Educational Secretary, gave brief reviews of the text books, Living Issues in China, and Facing the Future in Indian Missions and led a discussion. At this meeting the sending out of material and taking care of correspondence was assigned to me and also the presentation of the subject—The American Indian.

Feb. 2nd—Met with the Woman's Auxiliary of Fremont and gave a talk on the Indian and the agencies co-operating for his care.

A meeting with the Woman's Auxiliary, Christ Church, Oberlin, for a discussion of the text book on the Indian was arranged but had to be cancelled on account of illness in the parish.

Presented Mrs. Rupert Holland as speaker, to the Redeemer Auxiliary on March 17th.

Had as speaker for a meeting of the Auxiliary of Redeemer, Lorain, Mrs. Bonell, who gave a talk on the Indian, illustrated with a choice collection of curios. Mrs. Bonell is a former resident of the Southwest.

Oct. 26th, Redeemer Auxiliary, Lorain, was hostess to the region. Speakers were Bishop Schmuck of Wyoming and Mrs. Robert Happ of South Bend, Ind.

A pageant, The All Embracing Choice, featuring Religious Education finding expression through Christian service in the lives of our young women of today, was presented by young women of Redeemer Parish under the direction of Mrs. Dowell and Mrs. Loofbourrow.

In giving up the work as Regional Educational Secretary, I shall miss the contacts, but friendships formed with many women of the Region

and Diocese will ever be a cherished memory. It is my hope and prayer that my many years of pioneering in this scattered Region in an effort to promote mission study classes may bear fruit in the work of my successor.

Mrs. Hiram M. Greene—Western Part of Sandusky Region

My work in the Region is only two months old and I have not accomplished anything which is apparent. In the eight parishes, the educational work is well organized in all but three. We are striving to have those three enthused enough so that by Lent, at least they will start a program of study or a discussion group which will stimulate their interest to do worth while work along educational lines.

Mrs. George A. Klumb—Eastern Part of Sandusky Region

Inasmuch as I have just started the work in this Region, I am unable to make a report. So far I have visited the Monroeville and Norwalk Auxiliary meetings and presented the work for the year.

Mrs. Alice Shaner Van Allen—Toledo Region

The Annual Report of the Church Periodical Club



January, 1933, to January, 1934

During the past year the Church Periodical work in this Diocese has been increasing, and in spite of hard times and lack of funds to carry out all our plans, we have visited twelve parishes in five regions, giving twenty-four talks. A number of the organizations of younger women and girls are taking up the work and have done splendidly.

Our secretary at Calvary Parish, Sandusky, has made a reputation for herself and the C. P. C. with the large number of "Ann Coe" dolls she has made and sent out to the mission children, and has been written up in the newspapers of her city. Our secretaries at St. Paul's, East Cleveland, have made a record for their outstanding work in forwarding magazines to individuals, and they have also been featured in the newspapers. Our secretary at Emmanuel Church, Cleveland, now over eighty years old, continues to carry on the wonderful work she has been doing for a great many years, her latest achievement being to broadcast the work of the C. P. C. over the radio.

The Akron and Cuyahoga Falls papers have also given us considerable publicity, telling of the miracles we performed in making attractive gifts of waste material. "*IT PAYS TO ADVERTISE*" and we suggest that all our secretaries get as much help in this way as possible. Many people, both in our parishes and outside, are glad to help when the work is explained to them.

Never have we had more appreciative letters from the missionaries than this year, saying that every single thing we have sent has been put to the very best use. So, like the little girl in one of our mountain missions who says "N. R. A. stands for 'no rest allowed,'" we continue to push forward and carry happiness and cheer into barren lives.

We are deeply grateful to the Diocesan Board of the Woman's Auxiliary for the financial aid they have given us this year, our balance of \$64.33 from 1932 being frozen in the bank. We hope some day to have at least a part of this money, until then we will have to forget it.

We ask the continued help of all our friends in carrying on OUR part of the Church's work at home and abroad.

The Bishop Leonard Memorial Fund is for use among the missions of Ohio, now to be used at the discretion of Bishop Rogers. We have pledged \$500.00 to this fund.
