United Thank Offering



These three words, so full of deep meaning, represent a part of the life of the women of the Church, so appealing, so personal and so sacred, as to be very dear to their hearts. The United Thank Offering is an offering from the thankful hearts of women everywhere.

It was a woman, Mrs. Richard Soule, who thought and suggested a definite Thank Offering to be used for one purpose. Miss Julia Emery, who was secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, was asked to suggest such an offering for the General Convention to be held in 1889.

Miss Emery suggested a church building with furnishings for Anvik, Alaska, and the outfit, traveling expenses, and a year's salary for a missionary teacher needed in Japan. The amount asked for each was about \$1,000 and this plan was published in "The Spirit of Missions" a month before the meeting.

When the offering was taken it was only \$400, but during the day \$600 was collected, and a friend gave \$1,000. Once such a plan was started it could not be given up, and the small amount has grown to over a million.

If we look at it as an additional opportunity to express our thanks for many blessings, and if all Church women join in giving, no parish treasurer will need to fear for the harvest from her church, and the missionary work all over the world need not pause for money.

It is estimated that if every baptized woman of the Episcopal Church would put a penny a day into her little Blue Box, the Offering every three years would exceed \$6,000,000. It is the little from the many that accomplishes so much.

At the end of the three years the whole Offering is taken to the Triennial and there placed on the golden alms basin at the great "Service of United Praise," where women gather from the ends of the earth, Alaska, Africa, Indian villages, and the Orient.

It is very important that even a greater number of women should be told about the United Thank Offering and given an opportunity to share in it.

The thought of what this Offering might be with the whole force of the women of the Church behind it kindles the imagination.

The Annual Meeting at Cleveland

May 9, 1934



The fifty-seventh Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council, Diocese of Ohio, was held in Trinity Cathedral, Cleveland, on Wednesday, May 9, 1934.

Bishop Warren L. Rogers celebrated the service of Holy Communion at ten o'clock, assisted by the Venerable Gerard F. Patterson, Dean Chester B. Emerson and the Rev. Allen D. Jennings.

Delegates were present from all parts of the Diocese, numbering well over 500 persons.

After a hearty welcome by the President, Mrs. Rupert Holland, the meeting was called to order for business. Mrs. Holland's report indicated a very busy year attending to the duties of office and fulfilling many speaking engagements throughout the Diocese.

Bishop Rogers then gave his annual address after greeting the delegates in his usual happy manner. He expressed his grateful thanks to all who helped in the refurbishing of Kokosing to make it habitable for his residence during the summer months.

In words of warm appreciation he praised the Diocesan Officers and Branches for their helpfulness to him during the past year, and especially at the time of the Bishop's Diocesan Conference, May 7th, when they pledged their support in raising Ohio's quota of the National Church Deficit. As a keynote for the coming year the Bishop called upon the women of the Auxiliary to regale themselves with spiritual welfare to go on with their work. Bishop Rogers then read the list of officers, appointed by him to serve during the coming year.

Mrs. Eliza J. Backus, Honorary President, was then called upon to give her annual address of welcome. With the thought of world missions in mind, Mrs. Backus pointed out that we, as women of the Auxiliary, are trying to build the Kingdom of God on earth. To do this, we must crusade for the enlistment of women everywhere in the mission of the Church. "The time has come," she said, "when all must sacrifice to keep the Cross and the Church's flag in the foreign field. Our Lord is our changeless friend and will give us the strength to do it."

The secretary's report was read by Mrs. F. H. Jewitt, followed by Mrs. C. C. Cowin, who gave an interesting account of the Auxiliary's finances.

Mrs. Holland then read the names of delegates appointed to represent Ohio at the Triennial, Atlantic City; Mrs. E. J. Backus, Miss Elise Backus, Mrs. R. R. Bowman, Mrs. Harry A. Hoffman, Mrs. Rupert Holland. The alternates were: Mrs. C. C. Bubb, Mrs. T. P. Goodbody, Mrs. J. V. Blake, Mrs. F. H. Jewitt, and Mrs. G. F. Patterson.

In welcoming the delegates, Dean Emerson expressed his great joy in having the Auxiliary come to the Cathedral, "the place for the

homecoming of your hearts." "The Church that loses its interest in missions," he said, "is on the road to death. The whole world is for Christ and not for our own dooryard. The Church will not die so long as it believes in the command of Christ, 'Go ye into all the world.'"

Mrs. Holland then made an urgent appeal for the National Church Deficit. In making pledges for this fund, Mrs. Holland announced that the \$900.00, still due on the pledge for Church General Hospital at Wuchang, would have to wait until a later time.

After the pledges were taken, it was found that \$1,278 had been raised, a sum far in excess of all expectation. In gratitude for so splendid a response, Mrs. Holland asked the delegates to rise and sing the Doxology.

The Rev. W. G. Studwell, Chairman of the Gambier Summer Conference, presented the Conference program which he termed a "challenging one." He extended a cordial invitation to all the women of the Auxiliary to come to Gambier to partake of the courses especially designed for them.

Mrs. W. G. Mather, Chairman of the Christian Social Service Department, read interesting reports from those Branches that responded to the questionnaire she sent throughout the Diocese. Mrs. Mather pointed out that there is much the Church can find to do in the community. In other words, she asks the women of the Auxiliary to become social service minded.

The meeting adjourned at one o'clock for luncheon.

Promptly at two o'clock the afternoon session opened with the singing of the Auxiliary hymn, which was followed by roll-call.

Mrs. R. R. Bowman, Director of the United Thank Offering appealed most earnestly to the women of the Church to study and learn more about the United Thank Offering. Looking forward to the Triennial at Atlantic City, Mrs. Bowman pointed out that it would be the small offerings from the many which would mean more than large amounts given by a few.

Miss Grace Lindley, the speaker of the day, was introduced by Mrs. Holland.

Miss Lindley, who is the Executive Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, took as the theme of her message, "Today and the Woman's Auxiliary." "It is a great joy to be here," she said, "for we have met together with our Lord at His table."

In answer to the question, "What is it that inspires us most in the work of the Church today?" Miss Lindley pointed out that if we are to find satisfaction in our work there are five things we must realize:

First, that God is, and has a plan for the world. There is a mind and a power behind it all. We call him Father. When we are sure of that, we can plant our feet on the ground.

"Second, that it is probable we are in a very early state of the earth's history. There is a long history ahead. Cruelty and crude-

ness are happening today as in the barbarous days. This is also the age of pioneering and we have a chance to work near the beginning.

"Third, that the world is in a fluid state — a state of transition. This gives us a chance to mould things today. When we say the Creed, we can think of being creators to make this world a place the Father wants it to be.

"Fourth, that when we worry and doubt as to whether we have the knowledge of the Incarnate God within us, we must realize the necessity of having this knowledge; we must be filled with that life or we cannot give it to others.

"Fifth, that we must be interested beyond material things, and keep on seeking knowledge of the spiritual life. Are we really in earnest about our work for God and His Kingdom?

"The Woman's Auxiliary is the instrument fitted to fill all these inspirations. The things that are worthwhile, they can look at in a big way, and in a small way they look at details. In the movement of the 20th century, we must take our part. We can make it possible for the men to say, 'There is no Deficit.'"

In closing, Miss Lindley outlined the program for the Woman's Auxiliary to be given at the Triennial in Atlantic City.

After a rising vote of thanks to the women of the Cathedral for the fine luncheon, and to all others who participated in making the day a happy one for the Auxiliary, the meeting adjourned with the benediction.

Report of the President



There is but one word with which to begin today, and that is Thankfulness. With so much that is discouraging all around us, our work has gone steadily on. Naturally, we have been obliged to curtail our gifts, not through our own desires, but because of the existing conditions in the various parishes and missions. With cheerfulness and much self-sacrifice, however, the women of the Diocese of Ohio have gone forward in the effort to spread Christ's Kingdom throughout the world.

I believe that our Quiet Day and Days of Intercession have been of much value and help to us all during the past year.

Since last Spring I have made two trips through the Diocese — first, presenting to you Mrs. E. J. Righter, who represented the American Church Institute for Negroes and later, in October, I made the second trip, presenting Miss Ruth Osgood, Field Secretary of Spokane, Washington, and in these two trips I covered 3,000 miles. I have also visited many individual parishes and missions. These visits have given me much cheer and inspiration to carry on the work.

Early in October, our church held its Triennial Convention at Atlantic City and I was happy to be one of your representatives there. Miss Lindley suggested to us five means of testing our work for measuring its efficiency in relation to present-day conditions. They were: Unity, Cooperation, Training, Spiritual Growth, and Building on the Foundation "If ye be His disciples."

I had the honor to be placed on the nominating committee which, for the first time in the history of our church, placed four women on the National Council. The women elected to this honor were Miss

Elizabeth Mathews, of Glendale, Ohio; Miss Eva Cory, of Massachusetts; Miss Rebekah Hibbard, of California, and Mrs. James R. Cain, of South Carolina.

This convention gave to all women present, information and inspiration to go forward in the work.

Irma L. Walbridge of Toledo, who was a third vice-president on your Diocesan Board for many years, and resigned through illness, coming on to the board later as chairman of Isolated Church-Women, passed to her reward during the summer. Mrs. Walbridge had been a great help and inspiration to me during the last twenty years and I personally felt her loss very deeply.

The Board was also very sorry to be obliged to accept the resignation of Mrs. Maud W. Jewitt as Diocesan Secretary. Mrs. Jewitt will be greatly missed, and to her we extend our thanks for all she has done since accepting the office of secretary.

I believe I have told you of our failure in interest in the United Thank Offering. I know there are many reasons perhaps why the gifts to this offering have fallen; and yet, I am sure, that you have many things to be thankful for. I do feel, however, that your prayers are going up to God asking His guidance in the work of the Church. And I feel sure that during this coming year you will put forward your best efforts in the matter of the Thank Offering and the general upkeep of the Church's work.

Won't you make it your objective for the coming year to interest more women in the Auxiliary, especially seeking out the younger women in your parishes? This will be one of the finest pieces of work which you may do and will mean much, not only to your own parish, but to our church at large. And then, too, you will be following out the great command, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature."

While we are listening to the reports of work accomplished in the year just closed, let us each compare the amount of time and money we have given to missions with what we have spent on our own pleasures, and then with humility of heart and earnestness of purpose, dedicate ourselves to a greater effort, ever keeping in mind, "If we be His disciples."

Report of the Secretary



Had I been permitted to give a subtitle to the "Year Book" this year, I might have borrowed the slogan used by the Everyman's Offering, "Hold the Line," changing it to read, "Holding the Line." After reading your splendid reports, I came to the conclusion that you had done just that—"held the line."

When one stops to consider the failure of the world about us to stand up under the stress and strain of past years, may we not turn to God, Our Heavenly Father, the giver of all good things, and devoutly thank Him for the blessings poured out upon the Woman's Auxiliary, enabling us to carry on through thick and thin.

While some of our Branches have endured hardships during 1934, the majority have come through with flying colors.

We are cheered by the good news that a number of our Branches have been reorganized with a determination to start working again with renewed enthusiasm. New Branches have been formed in Clyde, Conneaut, Findlay and Galion. Young women and girls are taking a greater interest than ever before in the cause of missions.

The value of the Box Work, considered in dollars and cents fell somewhat below that of the previous year, but we feel quite sure that the joy given to the recipients more than compensated for the shortage.

The report of work accomplished for Christian Social service is one of which we may be justly proud. Clothing and food, valued at \$4,000, were distributed to the needy throughout the Diocese. Many of the Branches found time to sew for hospitals and the Red Cross. No estimate of the value of such service could be made.

According to the report of the Church Periodical Club work, there is no lack of interest on the part of our women in this cheer-giving enterprise. Nearly \$9,000 worth of magazines, books, cards and other reading matter was distributed far and near to those unable to procure them in any other way.

Some of the outstanding speakers who came to visit our Diocese included the Rt. Rev. Edward M. Cross, Missionary Bishop of Spokane; Miss Grace Lindley, Executive Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary; and Mrs. E. J. Righter, Field Secretary of the American Church Institute for Negroes. Their messages were most helpful and inspiring.

The Gambier Summer Conference, which was held from June 5th to July 7th, was the largest, in point of numbers, it has been for a number of years. It was my privilege to be a delegate, and I can truly say that I came away feeling enriched both mentally and spiritually. It is a well-known fact to us all that leaders in all phases of church work are wanting. If every Branch in this Diocese were to send at least one delegate to Gambier to be trained in leadership, I

venture to predict that the machinery of our great organization would run along more smoothly than it does now, and more work would be accomplished.

During the past year seven meetings of the Board were held, all of which I attended. The editing of the "Year Book" covered a period of three months, during which time report blanks were mailed to each Branch Secretary, reports compiled and manuscripts made ready for the printer. A word of thanks here, my dear secretaries, for your fine response to my request of last year that you be more prompt in sending in your reports. There were only a few stragglers this year.

And now let us turn our thoughts on those of our fellow-workers who have passed away during the year just closed. Let us remember these dear ones as we stand in silence a moment, praying that they are now in the light of God's own presence, and that we may follow their good examples as disciples of our Lord and Master, Jesus Christ.

In closing, may I quote from the report of Miss Grace Lindley to the Auxiliary assembled at the Triennial last fall, "If ever there were a time when the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council should measure itself against needs and opportunities, that time is now. Current conditions and trends are testing and measuring the value of the Auxiliary as never before."

May God continue to pour His blessings on our work begun, continued and ended in His name. Amen.

Report of the Akron Region

The five hundred dollars (\$500) is to be sent to our Diocesan Treasurer, Mrs. C. C. Cowin, 2241 Prospect Ave., Cleveland, Ohio, and will be mailed to the China Mission to be spent for hospital supplies, such as bed linen, hospital garments, gauze dressings, etc. It is strictly **supply work**, being sent in cash to avoid duty.

The two new Personal Boxes will be divided among the various Branches in the Diocese.

Report of Diocesan Educational Secretary



Last year 58 report blanks were returned to me, and this year there were only 50. May I stress the importance of your returning these blanks, which I send out around the first of December each year. Even though you have done nothing along educational lines, I should like to know it. In this way some effort can be made to interest the women. I have had three or four letters from discouraged women who reported that it seemed impossible to have a study class in their group and I want to impress upon you the fact that it is not at all necessary to have a "class." Invite your Regional Educational Secretary once a year—every region has one—and, of course, I always am glad to visit one of your meetings and either talk to you or give you help and information as to just what it means to promote religious and missionary education among our women—old and young. If you have only two speakers during the year that is something to report—tell me about it. Do not be discouraged because you cannot do the big things that some of the Auxiliaries are doing.

While there were a few less report blanks returned to me this year, the number of groups taking part in some kind of religious education is considerably larger. Besides the Woman's Auxiliary groups, there are several Men's Classes, quite a number of groups composed of young women; Kappa Beta Kappa; Girl's Friendly; Mu Tau Alpha; Daughters of the King; and several adult Church School classes reported splendid work. Reports were made as follows: Program Meetings, 22; Discussion Groups, 26; Bible Classes, 8; Reading Clubs, 11; Lending Libraries, 10; Seventeen Auxiliaries are using *The Spirit of Missions*. There were 12 delegates to The Gambier Summer Conference. Many reported book reviews; talks by Missionaries, not only from our own Church, but other denominations. Several Auxiliaries are studying Church history, others Symbolism and a number have frequent Current Events meetings where news pertinent to the activities of the Church at home and abroad are given.

Mar. 1st—Addressed The Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Societies of the Church of Christ, Akron, on "The Effect of the Great Commission on World Peace."

Mar. 22nd—Talked on the subject, "Re-thinking" at St. Timothy's, Massillon.

Mar. 23d—Addressed The Woman's Association of the First Congregational Church, Akron, on "Re-thinking."

Mar. 27th—Addressed the Community Study Class of Akron, on "Europe and Her Divisions."

April 18th—Addressed The Home and Foreign Missionary Societies of The First Methodist Church, Akron, on "Re-thinking."

May 1st—Presented my talk "Re-thinking" to the women of Redeemer Church, Lorain.

May 8th—Held a Diocesan Conference with general discussion regarding the promotion of greater interest in Religious and Missionary Education among the women. Trinity Cathedral, Cleveland.

May 9th—Attended the Diocesan Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, Trinity Cathedral, Cleveland.

May 15th—Talked about The Gambier Summer Conference to The Atwater Memorial Auxiliary, Church of Our Saviour, Akron.

May 22d—Addressed a Convocational Meeting in the Diocese of Indianapolis, at Bloomington, Indiana—Subject, "Re-thinking."

June 25th—July 6th—Attended The Gambier Summer Conference—taking the courses for credit.

Sept. 24th—Talked to the women of St. Paul's Medina on "Re-thinking."

Oct. 5th—On Organization Day at The Church of Our Saviour, Akron, gave my talk, "Re-thinking."

Oct. 10th-20th—Was a delegate to The General Convention at Atlantic City.

Beginning Oct. 29th and extending over a period of five weeks, I was an Instructor in a Normal School sponsored by The Youngstown Region. I taught The Church's Program—having two fifty minute periods each night.

Akron Region—Mrs. Harry Frease

This was the fifth season that the Educational Secretary held a series of Lenten Study Classes at her home. They began on February 20th, 1934. Classes commenced with luncheon at 12:30; devotions and sewing for the Red Cross. The speakers included Mrs. Harry Hoffman, Diocesan Educational Secretary; Dr. Herman S. Sidener, giving "The Great Chalice of Antioch." Other speakers were Mrs. J. V. Blake, President of the Akron Region, Mr. R. R. Bowman, Diocesan Custodian of the United Thank Offering; Mrs. T. S. Cobbey, President of the Woman's Auxiliary of St. Paul's, Canton and Miss Higgs, Assistant Diocesan Correspondent of Church Periodical Club. The Educational Secretary's review of Bishop Creighton's book "Our Heritage," and the Rev. Cannon John R. Stalker, D. D., of Massillon, on "Spiritual Shadow Boxing." Average attendance between forty-five and fifty.

Attended the Triennial Meeting at Atlantic City—remaining nine days. Gave a report of the General Convention on November 6th for the women of St. Paul's, Canton.

Nov. 20th—Gave a book review of "A Daughter of the Samurai" to the Trinity League of Holy Trinity Church, Alliance.

Nov. 21st—Gave a book review of "A Daughter of the Samurai," Canton.

Nov. 24th—The Church of Our Saviour, Akron, gave a book review, "A Daughter of the Samurai," to the Woman's Auxiliary.

Nov. 25th—Attended the Regional Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary at St. Paul's, Akron.

Nov. 26th—St. Paul's Church, Medina. Gave review of "A Daughter of the Samurai."

Dec. 8th—Grace Church, Ravenna. Gave a review of "A Daughter of the Samurai."

Jan. 5th, 1935—For the Woman's Auxiliary of St. Peter's Church, Akron, gave a review of "A Daughter of the Samurai."

Jan. 15th—Gave a review of "A Daughter of the Samurai" to the Atwater Memorial Auxiliary of the Church of Our Saviour, Akron.

Jan. 30th—Gave a review of "A Daughter of the Samurai" to the Woman's Auxiliary of St. Timothy's Church, Massillon.

March 1—At Kent, Ohio, for the Woman's Auxiliary—review of "A Daughter of the Samurai."

April 9th—At my own home, for the Woman's Auxiliary of St. Paul's Church, Canton, a talk on Japan.

Cleveland Region—Mrs. Jean Crowell Hodges

At the beginning of the season, I wrote to all of the churches in the Cleveland Region offering to help them in any way I could and saying that I would be glad to come to any of their meetings to tell

them about the educational program. I made the same announcement when I spoke at the Regional Meeting. The response has not been particularly large. Several of the educational secretaries have been down to the Public Library to see me and discuss the work. Spoke to the women of Grace Church and Trinity and have been invited to speak to several others at a later date. Material has been sent out to each Auxiliary in the region.

Lake Region—Mrs. Annette Fitch Nelson

After serving eight years as Educational Secretary for the Woman's Auxiliary of St. Peter's Church, Ashtabula, I was appointed January, 1934, to the position of Educational Secretary of the Lake Region. I immediately wrote to each Parish of my region, offering aid and a talk on "The Never Failing Light."

March 14th—Spoke to the women of Grace Church, Willoughby, on "The Never Failing Light." Plans were formulated for a Woman's Auxiliary study class.

April 13th—I spoke to sixty women of different denominations on "The Never Failing Light," at Ashtabula.

April 19th—Attended a Regional Meeting at St. James' Church, Painesville.

June 25th-July 6th—Was a delegate to the Gambier Summer Conference and took courses, receiving credits. Upon my return home, I wrote to all Parishes in my Region, offering talks about the Conference.

July 18th—Attended the summer picnic of the Woman's Auxiliary of St. Peter's, Ashtabula, and told them about the Recreation Program of the Gambier Summer Conference.

Aug. 7th—Drove to Perry-on-the-Lake and told the women of St. Anne's in the Field, about the Gambier Summer Conference.

Nov. 21st—Attended an Auxiliary Meeting of St. Peter's, Ashtabula, the speaker of the afternoon being the Diocesan Educational Secretary, Mrs. Harry Hoffman.

Dec. 4th—Spoke in Jefferson on "The Never Failing Light."

In December, sent report blanks covering the educational work done in each Parish by the Woman's Auxiliary.

Lima Region—Mrs. S. William Baker

During Lent, we took up the work among the Kentucky mountaineers, particularly "Nurses on Horseback," and sent a large box to a mountain Mission.

There has been renewed interest in the Woman's Auxiliary, and we have had a Chinese Tea preparatory to taking up the study of Orientals in the United States.

Mansfield Region—Miss Maud Shethar Gorham

Corresponded with the Region previous to Lent and urged the holding of study classes during that period. Several parishes responded and reported that programs on the theme of "Christ and the Modern World" were being planned.

In the Fall, mailed out the program and information concerning the study this year. In November met with the Woman's Auxiliary in Marion, and presented the study outline for the year and gave a brief review of the work of the Church in Japan and the possibilities of future development.

When mailing out the annual report blanks in December, I sent a letter suggesting methods of carrying on the study program and begging each group to make some attempt to do the work.

Ohio River Region—Miss Margaret Hamilton

I contacted all the groups in the Region and distributed literature about the study topics. Made a talk on the study program to the Woman's Auxiliary of Trinity Church, New Philadelphia. Coached various leaders in the use of the study manual, "Orientals in American Life" for a young woman's missionary group of the La Bell View M. E. Church, Steubenville. Planned and carried out the program of study on "Orientals in American Life" for the Woman's Auxiliary of St. Paul's Church, Steubenville. I outlined a course of study on "The Book of Common Prayer," and Music in the Church, for the Round Table Club of St. Paul's Church, Steubenville. These courses were conducted by the Rector and Choir Master. With a special committee, I read pageants and selected "The Soldier of Bethlehem," to be given by the Round Table Club. I also sent out Lenten letters suggesting various educational activities for Lent, and will do the same for the Gambier Summer Conference.

Sandusky Region—Mrs. Hiram M. Greene

I have spoken to all the auxiliaries in the fourteen parishes composing my Region with the exception of Put-in-Bay, Elyria, and Monroeville. At all of these, my talks were on educational study classes, and Japan, and Orientals in American Life. The Daughters of St. Andrew's in Elyria, asked me to speak before their group, and the newly formed auxiliary in Findlay, desired information regarding the obligations of an auxiliary and the forming of a study group. I was delighted to meet with them. The Missionary Society of the Methodist Church in Fremont, asked for a short talk on Orientals, and the Young People's Society of St. Paul's Church, Fremont, asked me to talk before them on Japan.

Mrs. Hoffman asked me to share the program with her at a Toledo Regional Meeting and at the Sandusky Regional Meeting in Norwalk. Mrs. Hoffman spoke on Japan and I had Orientals. After my talk, Mrs. Hoffman appeared in Japanese costume and we gave a dialogue between an American and Japanese school girl. Mrs. Holland had me substitute for Mrs. Hoffman when she visited the Auxiliary-Guild at Trinity Church, New Philadelphia. My subject was Japan and Orientals. Also attended the Auxiliary Tea given by the colored women of All Saints' Church, Toledo, where Mrs. Holland held a Lenten Class. The interest and spirit of the women and the men attending that class was indeed inspirational.

I am grateful to my Region for sending me to the Gambier Summer Conference and I received credit for the three courses given there.

In October, it was my privilege to attend our Convention in Atlantic City with Mrs. Holland, Mrs. Hoffman, Mrs. Backus, Mrs. Bowman, and Mrs. Greening of Toledo. To be associated with such women for ten days was in itself inspirational.

Our Regional President, Mrs. Charles C. Bubbs, accompanied me on all of my parish visits, and I desire to thank her for her constant cooperation without which I could not have gone forward. Everywhere I have spoken I have received infinitely more than I could ever give.

Toledo Region—Mrs. Alice Van Allen

There are ten active study groups in the Toledo Region, three of which are young people. During the year I have been invited to speak to six groups.

On Jan. 12th—An Educational Institute was held in Trinity Church with Mrs. Harry Hoffman as leader.

The Region has been very fortunate this year in having the following speakers at the various Regional meetings: Bishop Cross of Spokane; Bishop Rogers of Ohio; Miss Florence Sprague of Toledo, who spoke on the Cause and Cure of War; Mrs. E. J. Righter, Mrs. Rupert Holland and Miss Elise Backus, who spoke on the General Convention at Atlantic City. Two quiet days were observed during the year—March 22nd and November 12th.

On Nov. 21st—A Quiet Hour was held at Trinity Church, sponsored by the two younger groups, with the Rev. Donald Wonders of Sandusky as speaker.

I have mailed educational material to all the clergy and auxiliaries in my region and have kept in touch with all auxiliaries during the year.

June 26th to July 7th—Attended the Gambier Summer Conference and during that period arranged for Mrs. Harry Hoffman, Diocesan Educational Secretary, to be leader of the Church's Program at a Normal School to be held at St. John's Church, Youngstown, during October.

Sept. 30th—Gave a lecture on the Prayer Book to Ladies' Class at St. Luke's, Niles.

Oct. 7th—Gave second lecture on the Prayer Book, St. Luke's, Niles.

Oct. 14th—Gave third lecture on the Prayer Book, St. Luke's, Niles.

October—Spoke at the Regional Meeting at Our Savior Parish, Salem.

Oct. 21st—Gave fourth lecture on the Prayer Book, St. Luke's, Niles.

Oct. 25th—Gave fifth lecture on the Prayer Book, St. Luke's, Niles.

Oct. 29th, Nov. 5th, Nov. 12th, Nov. 19th and Nov. 26th—Attended the Normal School at St. John's, Youngstown.

During the year I have sent out material and written many letters to the various parishes. In giving up the work as Regional Educational Secretary, I shall miss the contacts, but the friendships I have made will always remain with me and I wish for my successor, Mrs. David Hughes, the splendid cooperation and courtesy which I found in every parish.



The Annual Report of the Church Periodical Club



The year 1934 has been uneventful in the Church Periodical Club, although the good work goes on quietly and steadily. Your directors have responded to all calls for assistance and stand ready to do so at any time.

In October, Mrs. MacCracken went to the Convention at Atlantic City and brought back considerable enthusiasm to our fall conference. Last June Miss Higgs visited one of the mountain schools in southeastern Kentucky, and saw the needs and the necessities of the mountain people who so greatly appreciate the work of the Church Periodical Club. If there are any parishes in the Diocese who would like to have a visit from either of the Church Periodical Club directors we shall be glad to have you write us.

As prosperity returns, there should be more and more material available for our work. Let us not forget that the waste material in our homes means joy and happiness in the hands of the Church Periodical Club. What seems to us of so little value will bring great joy to the children in the Missions. Last Christmas many thousands of these children were forgotten by Santa Claus because we did not send him gifts for his pack. Is there anything as pitiful as a little child who is forgotten at Christmas? Let us renew our efforts and give unselfishly of our time to this splendid work.

We are glad to report that the young people in Toledo, Akron, Youngstown, Canton, Alliance, Cuyahoga Falls, and Ashtabula, are becoming more interested in our work. We had an interesting display of **recreational material** at Atlantic City, which was very well commented on, some of the samples being taken home by delegates from Chicago and other places.

While this has been an uneventful year in the Diocese, the Church Periodical Club **generally** has had a most eventful one. At Atlantic City a representative of the Church Periodical Club was appointed on the National Woman's Auxiliary Board. This is the first time the Church Periodical Club has been recognized on the board and we are very happy to have such recognition and look for a broader understanding of what the Church Periodical Club means to the whole church.

We have had three Conferences in Cleveland at Emmanuel Church, and St. Paul's on the Heights. We have visited a number of Parishes and attended several Regional meetings.
