THE UNITED THANK OFFERING

A Spiritual force in the life of the women of the Church

In October, 1889, Mrs. Richard Soule of Brookline, Mass., started the United Thank Offering.

"The idea which developed into the United Thank Offering was born in 1886 out of Mrs. Soule's divine discontent and disappointment when the offering at the Auxiliary triennial service in Chicago that year amounted to less than \$100.00."

Mrs. Soule was convinced that the offering would be larger if the women planned for it in advance and knew that it was to be used for a definite purpose.

Next October will be the 50th anniversary of this offering and women of the Church are planning special observances which it is hoped every parish and mission will follow.

Mrs. Soule celebrated her ninetieth birthday on February 17th and has an article "How the United Thank Offering Began" in preparation.

It was first called the United Thank Offering in 1919 at which time all women in the Church were asked to share in it instead of only the delegates to the Triennial as heretofore.

The total offering in 1889 was \$2,188.64; in 1937 it was \$861,693.07; the total of the 17 Triennial meetings, 1889-1937, is well over \$7,000,000, but when one remembers that there are more than 500,000 women in the Church a thank offering of only a cent a day from each woman would amount to \$5,475,000 in three years.

More than 400 women have served the Church under the United Thank Offering.

These missionaries are doctors, nurses, teachers, social workers, secretaries, evangelists, student workers and field secretaries.

At the present time there are 194 women who give much more than any of us who give money only, those 194 give themselves for service.

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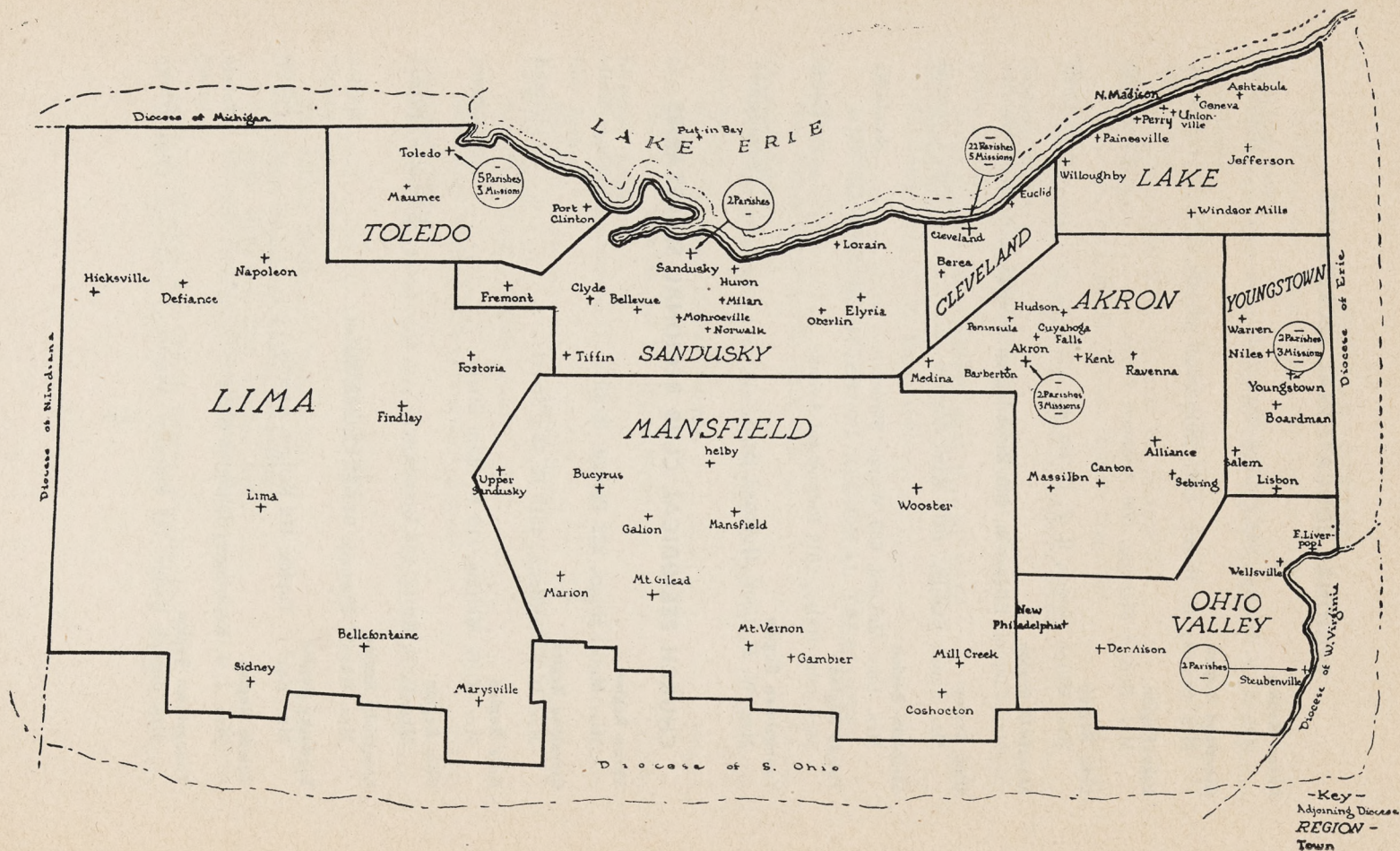

REPORT OF THE ANNUAL MEETING WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

May 11-12, 1938

The Sixty-first Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary Diocese of Ohio was held May 11-12, 1938, in St. Mark's Church, Toledo, Ohio. The two-day meeting began Wednesday at 1 P.M., with hymns and prayers by the rector, the Rev. Geo. R. Selway. Bishop Warren L. Rogers greeted the women of the Diocese and spoke briefly of the program for the two-day conference.

The President, Mrs. Rupert Holland, welcomed the women to St. Mark's, and expressed a hope they would be very comfortable and happy in their surroundings and would benefit greatly from the program planned for them.

A motion by Miss Elise Mc. Backus "To omit reading of the minutes of the last annual meeting" seconded and carried.

The Treasurer, Mrs. C. C. Cowin, made a detailed report which was accepted as read.

Roll Call of the Parish Branches with about 300 responding for the first day.

The Secretary read a letter of greeting from Mrs. J. V. Blake of Akron, the Provincial Representative on the National Board.

Mrs. Eliza J. Backus, the Honorary President, spoke briefly to women of the Diocese, and called attention to the "Book of Remembrance."

Mrs. Rupert Holland presented the Diocesan officers.

Announcement by the Rev. Malcolm Ward of the Summer Conference in Gambier June 20—July 1st.

Mrs. Theodora K. Wade, National Supply Director, gave a brief history of the Supply Department and stressed need for all parishes to help in any way possible. She praised Diocese of Ohio for its good work and willingness to accept allotments. Mrs. Wade, in her talk, gave the women a better understanding of the problems of people less fortunate than themselves.

Dinner was served at 6:30 P.M. by the women of St. Mark's Church.

The Rev. Henry A. McNulty spoke of the conditions and needs of people of China. An offering was taken to help in this work, amounting to \$104.

Thursday, May 12, convention continued with celebration of the Holy Communion.

Business meeting followed. Bishop Rogers appointed the Diocesan officers for the next year. The officers of last year were re-appointed. Mrs. W. G. Mussun chosen as Secretary to fill vacancy left upon resignation of Mrs. H. Greene.

Roll call of parishes with response from about 350 women.

Mrs. E. J. Backus presented a resolution in memory of Mrs. Louise W. Grauel, who died November 6, 1937; said resolution to be printed in Year Book.

Resolution, also presented by Mrs. Backus, relative to Sarah Leonard Scholarship Fund, that "The interest of this fund be given to the Woman's Auxiliary to be used for the Education of a rector's daughter." A rising vote approved this resolution, which is to be sent to Trustees of Fund.

Mrs. C. C. Cowin, appointed by Mrs. Holland as chairman of the Constitution Committee, presented to the convention the proposed amendments to the constitution, and informed the women that copies of the amendments would be sent to each parish President.

Mrs. R. R. Bowman, Diocesan Treasurer of the United Thank Offering, spoke briefly, appealing to the women for continued co-operation and larger gifts when possible.

Miss Elise Backus, Diocesan Supply Director, spoke of her delight in having Mrs. Theodore Wade, the National Director, with the women of Ohio.

Mrs. C. C. Cowin, Diocesan Treasurer, emphasized need of pledges.

The Rev. Vine Deloria, working in the Corn Creek Mission in South Dakota, gave a splendid talk picturing the problems and needs of his people, the Indians. Mr. Deloria has some splendid plans which he hopes with our help, both spiritual and financial, he may be able to accomplish.

Luncheon was served at 1 P.M. by the women of St. Mark's Church.

Bishop Lewis Bliss Whittemore of Western Michigan spoke on "Women and Church Work." Bishop Whittemore emphasized the need of an objective, then the necessity of proper organization; and spoke of the greatest step in Christian Unity as being "unity within ourselves." Bishop Whittemore stressed need of women being conscious of the fact that they are auxiliary to every department of work in the Church. The Bishop paid tribute to women for the splendid work they have done in the past and suggests study of Women's Auxiliary books and packet on Triennial Convention to promote interest of the women for future work.

Mrs. Holland commented upon the splendid talks and expressed a hope that the women had gained inspiration and courage to go forward.

A motion was made for a rising vote of thanks to the women of Toledo for the hospitality enjoyed by all guests to the Annual Meeting.

The meeting closed with the benediction by Bishop Rogers.

BISHOP'S MESSAGE

My dear Friends:

As your bishop I am happy to send a message of greeting and of gratitude to the members of our Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary. In the first year of my Episcopate I have been made conscious not only of the splendid work you have been accomplishing, but of the great reserve of strength that the Auxiliary has yet to exert in the future for the development of the Missionary Spirit and Program in our diocese.

May I call your attention to the fact which your name bears out, namely, that your organization is primarily designed to be an instrument in relating the program of our Diocese to that of the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America. While it is essential to the fulfilment of your purpose that strong branches of the Woman's Auxiliary should be organized in every parish in the Diocese, yet the motive of those parochial branches is to stir a vision and to create an interest that will inspire the members of the parish to think and to act in terms of the nation-wide and world-wide mission of the Church. The primary aim of the Woman's Auxiliary is not to raise money for perpetuating the routine of a parish, important as that may be, but to awaken the members of a parish to a sense of their world-citizenship as Christians.

As your bishop I am convinced that the Diocese of Ohio needs to assume a larger share in the Program of the National Council than at present we are doing. In order to stimulate the sense of this need and to effect the means for assuming our task in greater measure, our Diocesan Field Board is planning a series of meetings in the various regions of the Diocese during the month of October. The Rt. Rev. John B. Bentley, D.D., Bishop-Suffragan of Alaska, will spend the month of October in our Diocese and take part with your own bishop and representatives of the Field Board in those several meetings. I know that I can count upon the members of the Woman's Auxiliary to lend their support in stressing the importance of this fall campaign of inspiration and information.

In conclusion, I want to express my appreciation to Mrs. Rupert Holland, our Diocesan President, for the devoted and untiring leadership that she has given to the cause. I have greatly enjoyed meeting with the Diocesan officers and the Executive Committee. The annual convention, held at the Cathedral in May, was most encouraging to me as evidence of the enthusiasm and of the will to serve on the part of the women of our diocese.

I pray for God's blessing upon each and every one of you and assure you of my gratitude for your loyalty and service to Christ and the Church.

REPORTS OF EDUCATIONAL SECRETARIES

In January, 1938, the Educational Secretary attended the annual meeting of the Ohio Council of Churches and came back with much inspiration to carry the educational message through our own diocese. Though asked by the auxiliaries to speak on other subjects, such as the United Thank Offering, Church Periodical Club, and Federated Church activities, I always presented some part of the study books—"This Moslem World" and "The Church in Rural America"—and stressed the need of an educational program in every parish. During the year the parishes visited were Cleveland—Trinity Cathedral, Incarnation, Emmanuel, St. Albans, Advent Mission; St. Paul's, East Cleveland; St. John's, Cuyahoga Falls; Grace, Mansfield; Redeemer, Lorain.

With Mrs. Rupert Holland, Diocesan President, I attended four regional meetings—Lima, Mansfield, Ohio Valley, and Akron. At the annual convention in Toledo, I led a conference for parish and regional educational secretaries, where a lively interest was taken in the discussion of the study program. Gave two reports on this excellent convention during the summer.

In September Mrs. E. J. Randall, the provincial Educational Secretary, called a conference of diocesan Educational Secretaries in Chicago, held at the same time as the Institute for Interdenominational leaders. Both Institute and conference were most helpful in formulating an outline program for the courses of study on "The American City and Its Church" and "Moving Millions."

With the assistance of Mrs. F. H. Jewitt and Mrs. Stanley Brown, this program was compiled and 300 distributed throughout the diocese.

In October I was sent as delegate to the Provincial Synod in Flint, Mich. On my return led the conference for educational secretaries of the Cleveland region, using the textbook on the city church.

Report blanks were sent to 116 branches; 68 were returned and all but three of these reported some educational programs, 39 reported observance of the World Day of Prayer for Peace, and 28 reported the use of Church Papers.

To these may I express my appreciation. To those who did not reply—may the Educational Secretary expect more co-operation another year. It is only through an intelligent study of the Church's problems that we will be better equipped for effective service.

AKRON REGION—Mrs. E. V. Hughes

During my fourth year as Educational Secretary of Akron Region I made eight parish visits and helped many of my groups to secure material and arrange programs. I also visited the Woman's Auxiliary and St. Elizabeth's Guild at Christ Church, Warren, and

the Woman's Auxiliary of St. Thomas', Berea; addressed the Girls' Friendly Convention of the Diocese at Emmanuel, Cleveland, the Y.W.C.A. Membership Dinner at Massillon and many interdenominational groups; conducted a conference on "Religion in the Home" for the Flint area Episcopal Churches at All Saints, Pontiac, Michigan, the study of "India" for the Massillon Federation of Church Women and the study of "Missions in the Church School" for the Massillon Sunday School Training School; and gave four lectures at the Cranbrook Summer Conference at Cranbrook School, Bloomfield Hills, Michigan.

I attended the Church Women's Conference at Columbus and the Woman's Auxiliary Convention at Toledo.

There are fourteen Auxiliary groups in the Akron Region. Ten of these groups have reported active study departments. During the early part of the year they studied "The Church in Rural America" and "The Moslem World" and are now studying "The American City and Its Church," "India," "Church Unity," and other subjects of interest to church women.

CLEVELAND REGION—Mrs. Stanley G. Brown

Most of the parishes of the Cleveland region have had some sort of adult educational work. Some of them have outside speakers at their meetings, while others carry on the work under leadership of members in their own group. Last spring I spoke at several parishes on "The Moslem World," also on "Rural America." I conducted the study classes in my own parish during Lent.

In May the Regional officers met with the Presidents of the various Auxiliaries to plan the activities for the coming year. I also attended a meeting of the Regional officers with the program committee to set up the Regional program for the year.

In October we had our regular conferences for leaders. These were two all-day meetings at the Cathedral, beginning with Holy Communion. The first morning was given over to a round-table discussion on various problems of study groups. In the afternoon I gave the background work on "India."

The next week at the morning session Mrs. Gordon Reiley gave a review of the study book "Moving Millions" and in the afternoon Mrs. Evans a review of "The American City and Its Church."

On both days we had the privilege of listening to Dean Emerson's lectures.

Ten parishes were represented.

This fall I spoke in several places on "India."

LAKE REGION—Mrs. Maltbie

During the year we have tried to interest our group by purchasing the United Thank Offering number of the Spirit of Missions and presenting them to members of the groups in our church. We were fortunate in having two young missionaries from India visit

us.. They were home on furlough. They dressed in native costume and displayed many articles made by the natives in Madras. The suggested study books were used and during Lent the Bible was used for study at each meeting.

LIMA REGION—Mrs. Milton Downs

The Educational program for Lima has been limited to a Lenten study class this year, but we hope to accomplish very much more in the near future. Educational programs have been distributed and suggestions given to members of parishes in this region.

MANSFIELD REGION—Frances F. Ellsworth

The women of the Mansfield region's several Women's Auxiliaries heard twice from their regional secretary during the year at their two regular meetings. In the spring the talk centered on the high spots of interest to be found in the study of Mohammedanism; in the fall, the emphasis was upon the study of the city church. At the fall meeting the suggested study outlines were distributed to each group present. The secretary hopes to have the opportunity of visiting several of the auxiliaries during the spring months as the members find it convenient to have her come.

SANDUSKY REGION—Mrs. John McLeod

Educational program slowly materializing. Looking forward to a more successful year.

TOLEDO REGION—Mrs. John K. Haley

The Toledo Region has been fortunate the past year in hearing some interesting speakers.

Capt. Estabrook, of the Church Army.

Miss Thora Johnson, of Kyoto, Japan.

Mrs. Beck, a missionary of the Reformed Church and intimately acquainted with Kuling School.

Mrs. D. D. Taber of New York.

Miss Mary L. Pardee of the National Board.

The topics Rural America and The Moslem World were well received and we had at least one study group in each parish.

March 2—I spoke at St. Matthew's on the Migrants.

March 4—took part in the World Day of Prayer program of the Toledo Council of Women's Missionary Societies.

March 8—Reviewed Rural America for the G.F.S. of St. Mark's, also helped them prepare mission study for their regional meeting.

March 10—Reviewed Rural America for the Auxiliary at St. Alban's.

May—Served as Finance Chairman for the Annual Diocesan Convention held in Toledo—and arranged Educational Exhibit for same.

June-July—Attended Gambier Summer Conference.

October 18-20—Attended Provincial Synod at Flint, Michigan, as one of the delegates from Ohio.

November—Reviewed Mecca and Beyond for the Alpha Mu Tau Alpha of Trinity Church.

November—Attended Institute of Toledo Council of Women's Missionary Societies.

Last summer I was appointed to serve on the Gambier Publicity Commission with the Reverend Glenn Lewis, the Reverend Arthur Hargate, and Mrs. G. Russell Hargate. Our aim is to have the clergy, one or more Auxiliary members, and several young people from each parish at the conference this year.

YOUNGSTOWN REGION—Mrs. W. H. Cook

The Educational Program pamphlets have been distributed to parishes in my region. I have given reviews of the study book "The Moslem World," and a brief outline of the "Rural Church"; also have arranged a course for Lenten study of "India." Am looking forward to a year of more interest in the educational work of the region.

REPORT OF CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

The year 1938 marked the fiftieth anniversary of the Church Periodical Club. Fifty years of growth and service, beginning with an organization of eight members started by Mrs. Mortimer Fargo of Wells-Fargo fame.

The Endowment Fund, which was started with \$40.00, has grown slowly and steadily until now it is over \$50,000. The income from it is used for the establishing and replenishing of libraries in the mission field in various parts of the world.

The Church Periodical Club has always followed the leadership of the Woman's Auxiliary, supplementing and completing its work by furnishing books and magazines for churches, schools and hospitals. Libraries have been started in many out of the way places of the world; reading material has been furnished to hundreds of institutions where the inmates would otherwise have nothing to read; thousands and hundreds of thousands of children in the missions have received Christmas gifts; all sorts of material has been salvaged and made useful to give joy and happiness to the underprivileged.

The Church Periodical Club has woven its gifts and its service into the lives of millions of people like the beautiful colors of a great tapestry.

We ask the continued help of all our *friends* in carrying on *our* part of the Church's work at home and abroad.

During the past year Miss Higgs gave Church Periodical talks in the Cleveland Region and the Akron Region. Reports were made in each Region by the Regional Secretary. We held three conferences during the year; in February at Emmanuel Parish House in Cleveland; on May 11th at St. Mark's in Toledo, and on October 8th at Emmanuel Parish House in Cleveland.

There are twenty-two active Junior Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese this year. Three new branches are in the process of being formed. One at St. Stephen's, Steubenville, under the leadership of Miss Edna Irwin, one at Clyde and one at St. Alban's, Toledo.

The past year, in company with Mrs. Holland, I visited eight of the regions in the Diocese. At each of the meetings I told of the work being done by the Junior Branches and urged the women to try and find consecrated leaders for these groups of girls.

Ohio is signally honored this year in having the Reverend G. Russell Hargate, of Port Clinton, as a delegate to the World Youth Conference to be held in Amsterdam. Mr. Hargate is also the provincial chairman for Young People's Work.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Beginning this fall, five departments of our work are being established, and your co-operation, suggestions and criticisms will be welcomed.

The Department of Missions and Church Extension is a new department with a rather broad scope of activity, furthering interest in the work of the General Church in diocesan and outside missions, as well as promoting devotional life.

The Department of Christian Education will devote its efforts not only towards the "study book" and Lenten classes, but to widespread information about the Church as a whole, and to encouragement and co-operation with young people's organizations.

The Department of Christian Social Relations, formerly Social Service, will seek to spread information about needs in various communities in the diocese, work with established social agencies, and do whatever it can to apply Christian principles in the interest of social justice and peace.

The Department of Publicity will be the distributing center of news and information about Auxiliary activities.

The Department of Finance will plan the budget, issue statements and pledge cards.

All departments will work with the diocesan departments and under the direction of the President of the Auxiliary and the Bishop of the Diocese.

Diocesan Institutions. St. John's Home for Girls at Painesville will welcome gifts of clothing, canned goods, books, magazines and supplies for the linen closet. Address Sister-in-Charge, Painesville, Ohio.

PLEDGES OF THE DIOCESAN AUXILIARY

1. *For Diocesan Purposes*

The Bishop's Discretionary Fund is used by Bishop Tucker in many emergencies that arise among the diocesan family.

The Expense Fund takes care of the Year Book, printing, post-

age and stationery. *Note:* Yearbooks will not be sent to branches who have not contributed to this fund.

The Supply Fund helps the Supply Secretary with unfilled assignments.

The Missionary Education Fund is being built up for the use of an Ohio girl's training for the mission field.

2. *For the General Church on the Quota of the Diocese*

The Bishop Hare Fund pays the salary of two Indian catechists on the Corn Creek Mission of South Dakota—Edgar Brown Bear and Raymond Cut. \$120.

Money for the Philippines and Alaska goes to the General Church for those fields.

Our own missionary is Miss Elizabeth Rogers, formerly of Youngstown, who is at St. Agnes' School in Kyoto. We pay \$600 of her salary.

The Bishop and Julia Bedell Scholarships, \$70 each, go to St. John's University, Shanghai, which carries on in spite of war.

Foreign Insurance provides insurance on the lives of foreign missionaries for the benefit of their families. The Ohio branch has contributed annually to this fund for more than forty years.

The pledge to Kah-O-Sed Indian School in the Diocese of Duluth, Minnesota, pays a small part of the salary of the head of that school.

3. *Permanent Special Funds* not applying on General Church Quota.

Money for Kuling School is needed in spite of war conditions. The School, for children of our own and Anglican and other denominational missionaries in China, carries on in various changing places.

The Sarah Leonard and Eliza Backus Scholarships provide scholarships for Indian children at St. Mark's School, Nenana, Alaska. \$125 each annually.

Money for Negro Work aids various institutions for negroes—the American Church Institute, St. Philip's Junior College in San Antonio, Texas, as well as helping in our own diocese.

The Library Fund goes toward the purchase of new books for the diocesan clergy library maintained at diocesan headquarters.

4. *Our Special for 1939-1940*

The Rev. Vine V. Deloria, young Sioux clergyman working in the Corn Creek Mission of the Pine Ridge Reservation in South Dakota, is planning several Community Houses in his district that can serve as clean hospitals in time of need, as well as centers of instruction in hygiene, handcraft, etc. We want to do as much as we can for this project, and hope to hear more about it in the fall when Mr. Deloria will be back in Ohio again.

FORM OF REQUEST

♦ ♦

I give, devise and bequeath to the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, to be expended under the suggestion of the Ohio Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.

The Financial Plan, and other practical suggestions for the work of the Southern Ohio Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, along the lines of making it more and more^{an} educational and inspirational influence in the missionary work of the Church.

1. The members of the Parish Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, are to use every effort to see that their parish apportionments are paid in full and are to give through the treasurers of their parishes, at least as much as much as they have heretofore given through the Auxiliary Treasurer for this purpose.

2. Every member of the Woman's Auxiliary is asked to pay weekly dues of a stated amount decided upon by herself, according to her individual ability from one cent up, these dues to be paid quarterly to the treasurer of her parish branch.

3. These dues are to be applied as follows:

(a) One fifth of the whole amount shall be sent to the Diocesan Treasurer of the Southern Ohio Branch for the discretionary fund.

(b) From the remaining four fifths the running expenses of the branch shall be met, which expenses do not include money for boxes or the United Offering.

(c) The balance, in whole or in part, as need shall be paid^{be} as a contribution from the parish branch to the treasurer of the parish, to be applied on the parish apportionment. On the completion of that apportionment any remaining surplus shall go to the discretionary fund of the Southern Ohio Branch.

4. In branches where the money has been raised in some other way than through these weekly dues, as by special offerings, work, etc, the balance that is left after deducting the expenses of the parochial branch is to be paid into the discretionary fund of the diocesan branch.

5. In cases where the duplex envelope plan is used and the entire apportionment raised in that way, the Auxiliary shall raise, by work, special pledges, or some other plan, as much as they can, to be sent quarterly or annually to the treasurer of the diocesan branch for the discretionary fund, the necessary amount for expenses of the parish branch first having been deducted from the same.

6. This Discretionary Fund is to be used:

1st. For the central expenses of the diocesan branch, such as travelling expenses of the diocesan officers and missionary speakers, literature, printing, stationery, etc, and one or more scholarships for missionary conferences as shall be voted at an annual meeting. The balance shall be applied to complete the diocesan apportionment of the diocese, or, if that apportionment has been already met, for general missions, in order to make up the apportionment of the Church at large, or for a special recommended by the Board of Missions. One of these objects should be chosen by vote at the annual meeting, the claims of each being presented by a member of the Executive Board, or someone appointed by them.

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
