A ANNUAL MEETING OF WOMAN'S AUXILIARY  
OF THE  
DIOCESE OF OLYMPIA.

The 22nd Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Olympia was held at St. Paul's Church, Seattle, May 27, 1914. The Holy Communion was celebrated at eleven o'clock by Bishop Keator, assisted by Archdeacon Hilton, Rev. Sydney Morgan and Rev. A.P.S. Hyde. A splendid sermon was preached by the Rev. Mr. Hyde from the text 1. Thess. 5-21, "Prove all things, hold fast that which is good". Offering at Morning Service was \$16.80. At the close of the service a bountiful luncheon was served by the ladies of St. Paul's, and a social hour enjoyed.

The President called the meeting to order at two o'clock. The Bishop leading in the usual prayers. Roll call showed 122 present from 17 parishes and missions.

As the Bishop was obliged to leave very early in the afternoon, his address preceeded the routine business. He explained particularly the difference between the House of Church Women, and the Woman's Auxiliary; the House of Church Women being purely Diocesan, while the Woman's Auxiliary was auxiliary to the Board of Missions in New York. Also said that in the future the annual meeting of the Auxiliary would follow immediately after the Diocesan Convention, which according to the Diocesan Canons, convenes on the third Tuesday in May. The Bishop spoke very touchingly of Bishop Scadding, of Oregon, whose death had just taken place.

Minutes of the Semi-Annual Meeting were read, and with one correction, accepted.

Report of the Corresponding Secretary was read and accepted. It showed many letters and cards written, leaflets and tracts distributed. A letter was read from Mrs. Cooper, our First Vice-President, and letters from Miss Jackson of Ft. Yukon, Alaska.

Report of Treasurer of United Offering read and accepted.. \$1062.53 being presented in New York at the General Convention, and amount raised to date for the first six months \$215.02.

The President then read her Annual Message. Four new branches of the Auxiliary have been formed this year, St. Paul's, Bremerton; Epiphany, Chehalis; St. John's, Olympia; Epiphany, Seattle.

The 22nd Semi-annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Olympia was held in Trinity Church, Tacoma, Oct. 16, 1914. Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop of the Diocese, assisted by Rev. Mr. Grimes. The sermon was preached by Bishop Keator from the 96th Psalm, 10th verse; "Say among the heathen that the Lord reigneth; the world also shall be established, that it shall not be moved; He shall judge the people righteously." He said the "heathen" were those who knew not God, or knowing Him, refuse to serve Him, and that we are called upon to witness by our lives to the truth "The Lord is King". He also read a part of the Pastoral Letter issued by the House of Bishops when in session is Minneapolis.

The offering at the Morning Service was \$13.65.

Luncheon was served at the close of the service by the ladies of Trinity Church, and a social hour enjoyed.

The President called the meeting to order at 2 o'clock, the Bishop leading in the opening prayers.

Roll call showed 97 present from 16 parishes and missions.

Minutes of Annual meeting were read and approved.

The Treasurer's report showed a balance on hand of \$

Treasurer of the United Offering reported a balance of \$282.26, and having sent out 87 mite boxes.

The Corresponding Secretary read letters from Bishop Rowe, and Mrs. Cooper. A letter from Miss Emery in regard to work for the coming year, and especially for Rev. Wm. Loola and family, also a letter from Rev. Wm. Loola in regard to his work at Ft. Yukon. Miss Jackson wrote from Stevens Village, Alaska, acknowledging box of school supplies and stated that the Indians had already started to build a little church on their own account. Miss Maynard also reported that Dr. and Mrs. Murphy had gone to Ft. Yukon to take the place of Dr. and Mrs. Burke.

The Bishop in speaking of the Provincial Synod which was to have been held at this time, said it had seemed best for many reasons that the same be postponed, and it would probably be held a year from this fall.

Archdeacon spoke of the increased interest in missions in the Diocese of Olympia, and of the new church at East Seattle.

The principal address of the meeting was made by Miss Grace Lindley, Associate Secretary, of New York. She spoke of the "practical" side of the Auxiliary, and of the spirit of sacrifice and reality. Said that this was the time to increase the Woman's Auxiliary, "extensively and intensively"; that we must not be satisfied with the growth of the Auxiliary, nor blinded by success. Spoke of Study Classes, especially "Discussion" method, and suggested that classes be held that would include the men as well as the women, and the importance of the Junior Auxiliary.

A rising vote of thanks was extended the ladies of Trinity Church for their hospitality.

Motion was made and carried that a letter of sympathy be sent Rev. Mr. and Mrs. Grimes, for Mrs. Grimes illness, and hope for her speedy recovery.

The 32nd Semi-annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Olympia was held in Trinity Church, Tacoma, Oct. 15, 1914. Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop of the Diocese, assisted by Rev. Mr. Grimes. The sermon was preached by Bishop Keiser from the 86th Psalm, 10th verse; "Say among the heathen that the Lord reigneth; the world also shall be established, that it shall not be moved; No shall judge the people righteously." He said the "heathen" were those who knew not God, or knowing him, refuse to serve him, and that we are called upon to witness by our lives to the truth "The Lord is King". He also read a part of the Pastoral Letter issued by the House of Bishops when in session at Minneapolis. The offering for the coming service was \$11.55. Luncheon was served at the close of the service by the ladies of Trinity Church, and a social hour enjoyed. The President called the meeting to order at 2 o'clock, the ladies singing the opening hymns. Roll call showed 37 present from 13 parishes and missions. Minutes of August meeting were read and approved. The Treasurer's report showed a balance on hand of \$28.80, and having sent out 37 nice boxes. The Corresponding Secretary read letters from Bishop Rowe, and Mrs. Cooper. A letter from Miss Henry in regard to work for the coming year, and especially for Rev. Mr. Book and family, also a letter from Rev. Mr. Book in regard to his work at St. John's. Miss Jackson wrote from Stevens Village, Alaska, acknowledging box of school supplies and stating that the Indians had already started to build a little church on their own account. Miss Maynard also reported that Dr. and Mrs. Murphy had gone to St. John to take the place of Dr. and Mrs. Burke. The Bishop in speaking of the Provincial Synod which was to have been held at this time, said it had seemed best for many reasons that the same be postponed, and it would probably be held a year from this fall. Archbishop spoke of the increased interest in missions in the Diocese of Alaska, and the work now being done by Miss Grace. The principal address of the meeting was made by Miss Grace kindly, Associate Secretary, of New York. She spoke of the "practical side of the Auxiliary", and of the spirit of activities and reality. She said that this was the time to increase the Woman's Auxiliary, "extensively and intensively"; that we must not be satisfied with the growth of the Auxiliary, not blinded by success. Spoke of Study Classes, especially "Discussion" method, and suggested that classes be held that would include the men as well as the women, and the importance of the Junior Auxiliary. A rising vote of thanks was rendered the ladies of Trinity Church for their hospitality. Motion was made and carried that a letter of sympathy be sent Rev. Mr. and Mrs. Grimes for Mrs. Grimes' illness, and hope for her speedy recovery. Meeting was closed with benediction by the Bishop of the Diocese.
