## PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT

To the Officers and Members of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Olympia:

It is just three years ago that I made my first annual report at our meeting held in Kent. Again we are in Kent. I consider it a great honor today to make my report in this beautiful new church. May the prayers that have made the church possible make our meeting one of inspiration and blessing.

The year that is past has been one of much joy, because it marks not so much the growth in numbers, as a steady deepening of interest in the work and responsibility for carrying it forward. This has made a deep impression upon me, as I have visited the different parishes. These visits have been made at Bellingham, Mount Vernon (twice), Everett, Olympia, Tacoma, Bremerton and to every branch in Seattle. Everywhere I have been received with the utmost kindness, and with a loyalty that means much to me and to our task.

In September, with Mrs. Keator, I represented our Diocese at the provincial meeting held in Salt Lake City. There were delegates present from almost all the dioceses and the meetings were most helpful. As there was a meeting of the Continental Missionary Bishops at the same time we had the privilege of having a number of them address our meetings. Also the presiding Bishop of the Council, Bishop Gailor, and Dr. John Wood, the Executive Secretary of the Department of Missions.

Very soon after our return we had the pleasure of having Miss Tillotson, our National Educational Secretary, in our Diocese. She held meetings in four centers—Bellingham, Seattle, Tacoma and Hoquiam. In this way she was able to meet a large number of women and hold the classes in educational work which we so much needed. As a result of her teaching greater interest has been aroused in this department of our work. Better programmes have resulted and more classes in mission study.

Mention must be made of the change in the policy of the Church. For the first time women have been given the vote in the Diocesan Convention. That they have accepted the trust in the right spirit was shown by the earnest and thoughtful way with which they accepted their new responsibility.

We have representatives also in the Department of Missions and in the Department of Religious Education.

After three years study of Social Service, a survey has been made by Mrs. Bliss, Seattle, who, with Mrs. Russell, is doing a splendid work among the girls released from the jails. In this work they have the co-operation and the sympathy of, and every help is extended to them by, the Judge of the Police Court.

Partial support is given by some of the Seattle churches. We hope that this is but a beginning of a much larger work to meet this great need. Mrs. Ware of Hoquiam has also made a beginning in Social Service which she will tell about in her report.

The Emery Fund, for which our Diocese was asked to give the sum of \$200, was over-subscribed almost \$100. The National amount, instead of the \$50,000 which was the goal set, reached over \$92,000. Already the missionaries on furlough are receiving the benefit of this fund.

During the year the woman who, humanly speaking, made our Auxiliary what it is today, entered into the fuller life. Miss Julia Emery was a woman of rare spiritual power, of unusual executive ability and had great intellectual gifts. Much has been written about her, many tributes have been paid her rare character and sweetness of soul, and yet we shall never fully know what she has accomplished until the Book of Life is opened. She rests from her labors but her works do follow her.

It gives me great pleasure to report that four young women of the Diocese have offered themselves for the work of the Church. Two to go to China, one to go to Japan, and one for the Deaconess training. Let us follow them with our sympathy and prayers that they may be worthy representatives of our Lord in His work.

We welcome to our Japanese mission Miss Shoji, who has come to assist her brother in his work. I would like to commend to your interest this splendid work, which they are doing at No. 1111 Yesler Way, Seattle. They are very much hampered for lack of room, and we hope that it will not be very long before they have the church they so sorely need.

I cannot close without a word of appreciation of the splendid work of the Executive Committee. Not only have they come from different parts of the Diocese (at their own expense) to the committee meetings, but each one has given much time and thought and effort to her own particular work during the year. I bespeak for them your gratitude and your loyal support. Let us all follow their example in renewed effort for the furtherance of our task that His will may be done and His Kingdom come on earth as in Heaven.

May I call your attention to the following points: It is the opinion of the members of the Committee—First, that the ideal of the Church Service League should be given every opportunity to develop; second, that the League should be developed in parishes either as an organization or federation; third, that beyond the parish, federation should be maintained; fourth, that the Auxiliary should continue as the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council, and care for the general work of Missions, Religious Education and Social Service; fifth, that other societies should continue their special work.

## MINUTES

The Thirtieth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council, was held in St. James' Church, Kent, on Tuesday and Wednesday, May 23 and 24, 1922.

Holy Communion was celebrated by the Right Reverend F. W. Keator, Bishop of the Diocese, assisted by the Rev. Rodney J. Arney and the Very Rev. Sidney T. James. Bishop Keator preached the sermon, taking for his text, "Jesus said I came forth from the Father and am come into the world. Again, I leave the world and go to the Father." St. John, XVI., 28.

Luncheon was served in the Parish House, after which the afternoon session was opened with prayer by the Rev. Frederick Luke of Centralia.

Upon motion properly seconded the reading of the minutes of the last Annual Meeting was dispensed with, as they were published in the report.

Miss Shoji, the new worker in the Japanese Mission, was introduced and, as she spoke no English, Miss Gertrude Sanders told of the work she was doing in Seattle.

Mrs. Attilla Norman spoke on the Near East and made an appeal for each parish to assume the responsibility for one child at five dollars (\$5.00) per month until the present emergency shall be past. Quite a number of Branches responded.

Miss Maynard spoke on the Bishop Barker Scholarship, explaining how it was started and the work it is doing. She also urged the observance of the "Octave of Prayer" for Church Unity during the eight days from May 28 to June 4. It was moved and carried that this convention request the clergy of the Diocese to keep the churches open for prayer during that period.

Mrs. D. J. Kinzie spoke on the Bishop Rowe Scholarship. She touched on the devoted work of Miss Farthing and Deaconess Sabine.

Mrs. Keator explained the purpose of the Jane Beaver Fund which is to furnish assistance in building rectories, and Mrs. Ellis explained the Central Fund. She also stated that the pledges to the Bishop Barker and the Bishop Rowe Scholarships should be paid by December 31st of each year, and the per capita tax by April 1st.

One hundred and twenty-six responded to roll call, representing twenty-five Parishes and Missions. The offering at the morning service was thirty-six dollars and thirty cents (\$36.30).

Pledges to the budget were next made and resulted as follows: Bishop Barker Scholarship, \$72.50; Bishop Rowe Scholarship, \$140; Jane Beaver Fund, \$33.

Mr. Walter McPherson, Convention Manager of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, was introduced and he gave an outline of the program of the Convention to be held in Seattle from August 30 to September 3.

Miss Knox, the superintendent of St. Luke's Hospital, Bellingham, told of the work being done there.

The Rev. C. S. Mook of Bremerton pronounced the benediction and the meeting adjourned until Wednesday morning at 10:30 o'clock.

#### WEDNESDAY, MAY 24

The morning session was opened with prayer by the Rev. W. B. Turrill of Bellingham, and singing "The Morning Light Is Breaking."

Mr. Matthews gave an outline of the work to be done at the Seabeck Conference, and urged all who could to attend.

The reports of the Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, Supply Secretary, Educational Secretary, United Thank Offering Treasurer, Vice-President of the Southern Deanery, Vice-President of the Northern Deanery, were read and accepted.

Election of officers was the next order of business and resulted as follows:

The President next gave her report and presented her policy for the coming year, as follows:

- 1—Emphasize religious education;
- 2—More loyal support of the parish;
- 3—Make a beginning in social service;
- 4—Make a greater effort to enlarge the membership of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Upon motion, properly seconded, this was adopted as read.

Election of delegates and alternates to the General Convention in Portland in September came next and the delegates chosen were: Mrs. T. W. Kydd, Mrs. George G. Ware, Mrs. N. B. Coffman, Mrs. R. Wilson and Mrs. Attilla Norman.

Alternates—Mrs. F. R. Bateman, Mrs. George J. Eastes, Mrs. J. D. McLauchlan, Mrs. J. P. Anshutz and Mrs. R. H. McGinnis.

Eighty members responded to roll call representing seventeen branches. The offering was nineteen dollars and five cents (\$19.05).

The session adjourned for luncheon, which was served in the Parish House, and reassembled again at 1:30.

The Rev. H. T. Oberholtzer, director of the Department of Religious Education, requested the election of two members of the Woman's Auxiliary to become members of the Department of Religious Education, and Mrs. George G. Ware and Mrs. Attilla Norman were chosen.

Mrs. Crooker, a visitor from the diocese of Rhode Island, was introduced and made a short talk.

Mrs. Ware led a discussion on "Auxiliary Problems," which brought out many new and interesting ideas.

A vote of thanks was extended to the Women's Guild of St. James Church for their hospitality, to the choir for their services, to the Daughters of the King for the beautiful flowers which adorned the church, and to the Rev. R. J. Arney for the efforts put forth, which helped to make this meeting one of the most successful ever held.

The meeting closed with a "Quiet Hour and Meditation," by the Rev. Cameron Morrison, from the text: "Let not your heart be troubled: ye believe in God, believe also in me. In my Father's house are many mansions: if it were not so, I would have told you. I go to prepare a place for you." St. John, XIV., 1.

During the year passed, I have written 218 letters and notices, sent out 42 packages, 2 telegrams, compiled the Annual Report of the Olympian Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, distributed 250 copies of the same, and distributed 314 United Thank Offering Boxes; received 98 letters, 12 packages, 2 telegrams.

There are 25 organized Branches in the Diocese, and 502 members.

## REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

May, 1921, to May, 1922

### METHODS

For our department, the outstanding event of the year was the visit of Miss Tillotson last fall, and the institutes she conducted. These were held at four places in the Diocese and gave to the educational work an impetus on which it is still going forward. Preparatory to this, though only part of it belonged to the Woman's Auxiliary was the visit to the Diocese of Dr. Gardner, Executive Secretary to the Department of Religious Education.

During the twelvemonth, the Diocesan Educational Secretary has addressed twelve meetings; sent a packet of leaflets to each parish branch; sent four circular letters, written at least one personal letter to each Educational Secretary whose name and address she knew or could find out; and sent report outlines to each parish. An effort to reach isolated Church people has been undertaken, unsuccessfully so far except where some *personal* contact could be established, unless indeed some lonely Church family is a bit cheered by knowing we *want* to reach them.

Incidentally your Educational Secretary has learned that the circular letters as a rule missed fire; that personal letters had returns beyond their deserving; and that the report-outlines have been returned with invaluable information and suggestions.

### ADVANCE

The things we can see for our encouragement are these:

More educational secretaries have been appointed or elected by the parish branches. There has been more co-operation with the Church (Sunday) Schools and more contact with the educational work of Christians of other denominations. There is closer contact between the guilds and the

Auxiliary branches in many parishes; in few these are merged into one, working sometimes as Auxiliary study groups, sometimes as sewing guilds. One branch has had a lesson from a leader of the Altar Guild.

At least one parish branch has had a pageant. This I think especially good news. Nearly three times as many Missionary Calendars have been sold in the Diocese this year as in any previous year.

More than twenty new leaders in educational work (with addresses of ten) have been reported to the Diocesan Educational Secretary.

The remarkable Christian Social Service work, emanating from Trinity, Seattle, will doubtless be reported under another division, but one is tempted to claim it as an Advance for this department since it had its inception at a Mission Study meeting of the Trinity Auxiliary and was undertaken by its Educational Society.

Certainly it is a thing we can all be thankful for.

And see now the Lord's arithmetic! This work, begun by the Educational Secretary in that Seattle parish, reported at a council meeting, was heard by an Auxiliary officer from Hoquiam, and as a result of the burden it laid upon her heart, we have the Bible Study Class reported from Hoquiam,—a morning week-day class, with fifty-three members, studying the Acts of the Apostles, that blessed Gospel of the Holy Ghost. Other groups in smaller places have sprung up around this one. For remember, the surest indication of growth, the best real Advance, is when a branch has vigor enough to establish branchlets.

#### SUGGESTIONS

*First:* Every Educational Secretary ought to know and be ready to hand on three addresses: 281 Fourth Avenue, New York, our General Headquarters and the address of the Spirit of Missions; 718 Cherry Street, Seattle, Church Supply Company, and 202 South Nineteenth Street, Philadelphia, for the Missionary Calendar and the Church Mission to the Jews.

*Second:* While we have urged and are delighted to know that the parish branches have appointed their Programme Committees in time to make a good beginning in the fall, I hope the programmes are so flexible, or the branches so hospitable to additional meetings, that we can get the full benefits of the Triennial and General Convention, and also make use of the new text book. Bishop Bratton's book about the Negro is sure to be interesting. When he talks on that subject he is a prayer and a flame.

A letter from Miss Tillotson says this:

"For the first time I believe in the history of the Church the plan now is to present to General Convention not a request for money but a programme of activities. \* \* \* If the Convention puts the seal of its approval upon this plan, Mr. Franklin hopes that the project will be made the subject of study throughout the Church. \* \* \* It will be a little like studying parts of the Survey only we will get it from the angle of a special task to be accomplished in certain mission fields. I think it will be thrilling to have

the whole Church thinking about St. Pauls, Tokyo, or St. Augustine, Raleigh, etc." Altogether, wouldn't it be glorious?

And since out of the treasure house of the Kingdom, we always may bring things old and new, when I come to see you can you spare a few minutes in your programme to let me talk about The Mission and the Book of Common Prayer.

Just here, Madam President, may I make a suggestion to the branch president, and those presidents ex-officio, the rectors: Give your Educational Secretaries responsibility. Let them make their own committees. Encourage them to take the initiative. They ought to be especially valuable as liaison officers, making connection with all the departments of parish life; religious education especially, and since "all learning" is, or ought to be "our province," the educational secretaries ought to be able to make helpful connection with the avid mind of youth.

In this, you could have no better example than your Diocesan President who eagerly encourages any symptom of independent thought or action in her Diocesan officers.

To return to our own duty, as Educational Secretary, I would suggest for this year especially that each branch try to have at least one pageant, pantomime or impersonation. Personally I believe the best opportunity the Educational Secretary has to be useful to the whole parish is by co-operating with the United Thank Offering Treasurer and having two fine general rallies, when the blue boxes are opened and their contents offered in March and in September. You can impress new workers into such a programme, because the United Thank Offering belongs to the whole parish, every woman and girl in it. It is a splendid time for a simple pageant. Get some young girls to impersonate the U. T. O. workers in the field, and let children, who love to dress up, be their flock, Japanese, Chinese, Liberian. Or try living pictures from the Children's Number of the Spirit of Missions. Good, simple plays may be had from 281 Fourth Avenue, but all that is really necessary is a little imagination and ingenuity—and quite limitless industry, and unselfishness. College girls are fine helpers in such undertakings. And if you run short of costumes, have a hospital scene.

Let's be alert, faithful, prayerful and fearless.

And finally, could we have a better collect for our work than this very Rogation Sunday collect: "O Lord from Whom all good things do come; grant to us Thy humble servants, that, by Thy holy inspiration we may think those things that are good, and by Thy merciful guiding may perform the same; through our Lord Jesus Christ. Amen."

## CONSTITUTION

### ARTICLE I.

The name of this Organization shall be "The Olympia Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council."

### ARTICLE II.

The object of this Organization shall be to pray daily for Missions, and by means of united and systematic effort, to diffuse missionary intelligence, to increase missionary activity among the women of this Diocese; to unite previously existing societies, and to encourage the formation of Branches where there are none.

### ARTICLE III.

The Church itself is a Missionary Society, and every person by baptism becomes a member of this Organization; therefore, every baptised woman in this Diocese is a member of this Auxiliary.

### ARTICLE IV.

The officers of this Organization shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Educational Secretary, Box Secretary, Treasurer and Custodian of the United Thank Offering, who shall also constitute an Executive Committee. This Committee shall fill all vacancies that may occur during the year between the annual meetings.

### ARTICLE V.

SECTION 1. The President, or in her absence, one of the Vice-Presidents, shall preside over all meetings of this Organization and of the Executive Committee, and shall call meetings at such time and place as in her judgment shall be necessary.

SEC. 2. The First Vice-President shall be elected at large, whose duty it shall be to assist the President in the upbuilding of the Woman's Auxiliary throughout the Diocese.

The Second Vice-President shall be elected from the Southern Deanery, and the Third Vice-President from the Northern Deanery. It shall be their duty to have general oversight of the Auxiliary in their respective Deaneries; to promote the formation of new branches, and help and strengthen those already existing.

They shall plan for semi-annual meetings with the help of the President and the Bishop of the Diocese.

SEC. 3. The duty of the Recording Secretary shall be to keep a record of the proceedings of each meeting of the Auxiliary, and read the same at the following meeting, and to prepare an abstract of the minutes for the annual report.

SEC. 4. The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the Auxiliary, send out notices, distribute information in regard to Missionary work, and prepare an annual report for circulation in the Diocese.

SEC. 5. The duty of the Treasurer shall be to receive all general and special funds, except as hereinafter provided; to disburse the former under the direction of the Executive Committee, and the latter as the donors may indicate, and to render an account of the same at the annual meeting.

SEC. 6. The Treasurer of the United Thank Offering shall keep an account of the mite boxes in use in the various Branches; shall collect the contents by September 15; shall invest the same each year, and conduct all necessary correspondence. The total amount, principal and interest, shall be ready for presentation at the triennial meeting of the Auxiliary.

#### ARTICLE VI.

All Societies that desire it will be considered members of this Auxiliary, and will send their report of money collected and work done to the Secretary. Delegates from all such Societies will be expected to attend the general meetings. The Secretaries of the Parochial Branches are required to correspond with the Diocesan officers, who alone correspond with the Secretaries of the Board of Missions, and transmit to them all moneys.

#### ARTICLE VII.

There shall be an annual meeting of the Society at such time and place as may be determined upon by the Society itself, and in absence of such determination by the Society, the President, upon consultation with the Bishop, shall appoint the time and place of the annual meeting.

#### ARTICLE VIII.

Regularly organized Branches are expected to pay annual dues of 25 cents per member, which, with the offering at the annual meeting, shall form a fund, out of which the Treasurer shall pay all Auxiliary expenses.

#### ARTICLE IX.

New branches in missions may report as Auxiliary work such Church furnishings and Sunday School supplies as they may provide for their own missions during the first two years of the Branch's organization.

#### ARTICLE X.

The fiscal year of the Society shall be from May 1st to May 1st.

#### ARTICLE XI.

This Constitution may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote at any annual meeting.

## BY-LAWS

1. Officers shall be elected at the annual meeting. The President shall appoint a committee on nominations, and upon the coming in of their report, the meeting shall proceed to elect by ballot or *viva voce*. The choice of officers need not be confined to persons nominated by the committee.

2. Every local Branch shall forward to the Secretary, on or before the first of May of each year, a full report of all missionary work done during the year.

3. The order of business at the meeting of the Society shall be as follows:

1. Prayer.
2. Calling of the Roll.
3. Reading of the Minutes.
4. Corresponding Secretary's Report.
5. Treasurer's Report.
6. Report of President of Junior Department.
7. Report of Supply Department.
8. Report of Custodian United Thank Offering.
9. Address of President.
10. Miscellaneous Business.

4. These By-Laws may be amended by a majority vote at any general meeting.
