PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT

My Dear Friends, the Women of the Diocese of Olympia:

Once again we are gathered together to consider the King's business, to present to Him what we have accomplished during the year that is past, and to plan with each other, and with Him, for the work which He has still for us to do. May each one of us, like Isaiah of old, have such a vision of Him, that we may answer as Isaiah did, "Here am I, send me."

The outstanding event of the year was the General Convention held in Portland. It was a joy to see so many of our women present. Not only did we have our full delegation, but many visitors who took advantage of its nearness to see and to meet the leaders of the Church, and to get the inspiration and the education which can only be gotten from such a great meeting. It truly was a great meeting, and, by concensus of opinion, the greatest in the history of the Church.

It will always be memorable in that it was the last convention to be attended by the grand old man of God, Bishop Tuttle, the Presiding Bishop of the Church. No one who was present at the opening service, or at the U. T. O. service, will ever forget the benediction of his presence. He has passed beyond the veil, and we are the poorer for his going, but the richer for his having lived.

An interesting event to us was the Provincial Breakfast, where over two hundred women, all of the Eighth Province, sat down together with our President, Mrs. Monteagle.

At another Provincial Meeting, Miss Magill of Los Angeles, was elected to represent us on the Executive Committee of the Women's Auxiliary. At the General Election Mrs. Monteagle of California and Mrs. Wilson Johnson of Portland, were also elected. So, of the sixteen women representing the Church Women of America, three are from the Province of the Pacific.

The new venture of the Women's Auxiliary, for the next three years, is the establishment of two houses for volunteers for missionary work, and for missionaries home on furlough needing special training. These two houses are to be the objects of our special gifts. One will be in Raleigh for colored workers, and the other in New York. Seventy-five thousand dollars is the minimum for these two houses. An able committee, with Miss Winston as chairman, has the planning of the financing in hand, and we shall soon hear of our part in this grand work.

Other resolutions of special interest are: That the W. A. support the development of an organization among the young people, and I express the hope that it may be related to the whole work of the Church. That the W. A. heartily support all movements for the raising of the atmosphere of moving pictures. That the plan for prayer partnership, used by the W. A. in Canada, be recommended heartily for use in our own Auxiliary.

That the Diocesan Auxiliary send to the Executive Secretary the names of all women missionaries who have gone out from their respective dioceses, and that a large silk service flag be made for display at the Triennial Women's Auxiliary.

Miss Lindley was re-elected as Executive Secretary, Mrs. Biller as Organizing Secretary, Miss Tilloston and Miss Boyer as Educational Secretaries, and Miss Wade as Supply Secretary, of the National Organization.

Turning to the work in our Diocese, I am glad to report progress along all lines. I have visited Mount Vernon, Bellingham, Vancouver, Olympia, Tacoma and Everett. We have not only grown in numbers, but there has been an increase in the number of Study Classes, and our United Thank Offering was almost three times greater in Portland than at the Triennial in Detroit.

Two very successful Deanery Meetings were held, but, as they were arranged for by the Vice-Presidents, they will be included in their reports.

Three new branches have been organized, at East Seattle, at Bremerton, and at St. Andrew's in Tacoma. We welcome them and ask for them your fellowship and your prayers.

We were most fortunate in having Miss Boyer in October to lead discussion groups in Tacoma, Kent, and in Seattle. She showed us what could be done to arouse interest, and she inspired us to greater efforts along educational lines.

In January Miss Cornwall Legh, our missionary among the lepers in Japan, addressed the Auxiliaries in Seattle. Her presence was a benefaction, and the report of her life and work among the lepers was most inspiring. A great deal of interest was manifested, and some help was given; and we hope for more in prayers and in money.

Two of our young women, Miss Kennicut of Chehalis, and Miss Eva Carr of St. Mark's Parish, Seattle, are representing us in the Diocese of Hankow, at Wuchang, the former in St. Hilda's School, and the latter in the Church General Hospital. Miss Powell of Tacoma is in Japan, and Miss Bertha Curtiss of St. Clements Parish, Seattle, represents us in Sagada, Philippine Islands.

Miss Haidee Spitz is preparing for the Foreign Field at the Deaconess Training School, Berkeley, California. I recommend these young women to your earnest sympathy and to your prayers. With a praying Church back of them what can they not accomplish for the advancement of the Kingdom.

I cannot bring my report to a close without expressing gratitude to my fellow workers, not only of the Executive Committee, but to every member of every Parish Branch, for their continued support and for their unwavering loyalty. To work with them was a joy. Whatever has been

accomplished has been because of their co-operation. Many the year before us bring forth still greater fruit because of the seed sown in the past. And now may the God of Peace who brought again from the dead the Great Shepherd of the Sheep, even our Lord Jesus Christ, make you perfect in every good thing to do His will, working in you that which is well-pleasing in His sight, through Jesus Christ, to whom be glory forever and ever. Amen.

MINUTES

The Thirty-first Annual Meeting of the Women's Auxiliary to the National Council, of the Diocese of Olympia was held in Trinity Church, Tacoma, on May 23rd and 24th, 1923.

Wednesday, May 23rd, Holy Communion was celebrated by the Right Reverend F. W. Keator, Bishop of the Diocese, assisted by the Rev. J. P. Anshutz and the Rev. C. S. Mook.

Bishop Keator preached the sermon from the text of St. John X, 10: "I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly."

The offering at the morning service was \$36.25.

Luncheon was served in the Parish House, after which the afternoon session was opened with prayers read by the Rev. Mr. Anshutz.

The meeting was presided over by the President, Mrs. T. W. Kydd. The first speaker was Dr. Byram, who told of his work in the Cowlitz-Wahkiakum Mission. He was followed by Mrs. Wakefield of Boone University, Wu Chang, who spoke briefly on conditions in China.

One hundred forty-seven delegates responded to roll call, representing 24 branches.

The reading of the minutes of the last annual meeting was dispensed with, as they had been printed in the year book. The reading of the report of the Corresponding Secretary was also dispensed with.

The reports of the Treasurer, First Vice-President, Second Vice-President, Third Vice-President, Supply Secretary, and Educational Secretary were read and accepted.

Mr. Matthews outlined the work to be done at the eighth annual conference at Seabeck.

Mrs. Edna Biller, National Organizing Secretary was the main speaker of the Convention and her talk on the general work of the Auxiliary was an education and inspiration to all who were privileged to hear it.

The afternoon session was closed with prayers by Bishop Keator.

THURSDAY, MAY 24TH

The morning session was opened with devotions led by Dr. Byram. The reports of the President and the United Thank Offering Treasurer were read and accepted.

The Supply Secretary recommended that at this meeting, the various Branches make pledges of money to provide for the usual Christmas "personal" Missionary box. Recommendation adopted.

The Educational Secretary recommended that the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Olympia create an office, and choose an officer whose work shall be to link isolated women with Auxiliary activities. Recommendation adopted.

The President read a letter of greeting from the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of New Westminster, B. C. It was voted to send our greetings to them by Mrs. Biller, who is to attend their meeting next week.

Under the head of New Business, Mrs. Keator presented amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws, as follows:

AMENDMENTS TO CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I.

The name of this organization shall be "The Olympia Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council."

ARTICLE IV.

SEC. 1. The officers of this organization shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Treasurer of the United Thank Offering, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Supply Secretary, Assistant Supply Secretary, Educational Secretary, and Rural Secretary, who shall constitute an Executive Committee. This committee shall fill all vacancies that may occur during the year between the annual meetings.

SEC. 2. The Treasurer of the United Thank Offering, the Corresponding Secretary, and the Assistant Supply Secretary shall be appointed by the President, but all other officers shall be elected at the annual meeting.

SEC. 3. At the first election after the adoption of this by-law one-third of the officers shall be elected to serve for one year, one-third for two years, and one-third for three years. Thereafter one-third of the full number shall be elected annually for a term of three years. Service as an officer shall be limited to two consecutive terms.

BY-LAWS

SEC. 2. Insert "Corresponding" before Secretary.

These amendments were adopted as read. It was moved and carried that the question of changing Article No. 3 be referred to a committee, and to be acted on at the next annual meeting.

Eighty responded to roll call, from 20 Branches. The offering was \$12.15.

The reports from the Branches were next in order and were full of interest.

Noonday prayers for Missions were read by the Rev. C. S. Mook. After luncheon, the Rev. R. J. Arney opened the afternoon session with prayers.

An appeal was made for pledges toward a heating plant for the hospital in Wu Chang, China, to which there were a number of responses.

At this time pledges were also made for the Bishop Barker Scholarship, Bishop Rowe Scholarship, the Jane Beaver Fund and the Christmas box.

The election of officers resulted as follows:

Educational Secretary (2-year term)—Mrs. Attila Norman, Kingston.

Rural Secretary (1-year term)—Mrs. T. W. Kydd, Seattle.

Delegates to the Provincial Synod at Fresno, California, were elected as follows: Mrs. F. W. Keator, Mrs. G. G. Ware, Mrs. D. J. Kinzie, Mrs. N. B. Coffman, Mrs. W. H. Bliss. Alternates, Mrs. R. J. Arney, Mrs. S. H. Morgan, Mrs. H. H. Hazeltine, Mrs. Horton, Mrs. Beagle.

It was moved and carried that a vote of thanks be extended to the Rev. and Mrs. Anshutz for the entertainment on Wednesday evening, to the young people who participated, and to the choir; also to the Tacoma newspapers for the interest manifested and the publicity given.

It was moved and carried that the Secretary send a letter of sympathy to Mrs. Morgan, Educational Secretary, and sympathy and flowers to Miss Jackson.

It was moved and carried that the balance in the Bishop Barker fund be applied toward the chapel at St. Mary's Hall, Shanghai.

Mrs. Biller spoke on "Auxiliary Problems" and answered questions carried over from the previous day.

Trinity Church, Seattle, extended an invitation for the next annual meeting, which was accepted.

The Rev. J. P. Anshutz closed the convention with a Quiet Hour.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

May 1922—May 1923

Madam President and Fellow Members of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council:

From Whitsuntide to Whitsuntide, this has been a year of privilege. It ought to have been a year of progress. And I believe it was.

The great educational opportunity of course was the General Convention and the Triennial meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary at Portland, with the conventions and conferences in our own Diocese which were its forerunners and its aftermath.

I have the names of twenty-four women from the Diocese of Olympia who had share in one or more of the training classes for Auxiliary leaders held during the Triennial.—I say "had share," because, while twenty-three of us were pupils, our President was leader of a class.

Our year's work at home began immediately after the great Convention, with conferences in this Diocese led by the Secretary of the Department of Religious Education, the Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Service and by that remarkable teacher, Miss Laura Boyer, Assistant Educational Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Your own Educational Secretary took the torch thus kindled into an unpracticed and rather trembling hand and, with the indispensable help of our President, conducted in Seattle an interparochial Training Class for Leaders of Discussion Groups, between All Saints Day and the third Sunday in Advent.

Later reports show that in other parts of the Diocese similar classes were held, about this time—in Hoquiam—shall I say "in Hoquiam, of course"?—and in other parishes and missions.

Your Secretary had also the pleasure of talking about the Church Mission from time to time not only with our own groups but also with our fellow Christians of other denominations; from whose zeal and excellent organization she learned no little.

At meetings of the Department of Religious Education in the Diocesan Council, I have had the honor of acting as liaison officer between that Department and the Educational Department of the Auxiliary.

A summary of the parish reports enables me to report distinct advance along various lines. The number of leaders has doubled. Discussion groups have multiplied. There is increased co-operation with our fellow Christians. Last year, no branch reported a play, pageant or impersonation, or the use of lantern slides; this year more than half the branches report that some use has been made of one or more of these aids. And tonight, here at Trinity, Tacoma, we shall see what we shall see.

It is a particularly healthful sign that the reports generally indicate increasing loyalty to the programme and plans of the General Church. The branches generally have followed the suggestions of the leaders from Headquarters, in studying first the Programme Presented, and then, Wanted Leaders, though the latter subject did not at first seem especially interesting or applicable to our situation.

I think no group that studied Bishop Bratton's book regretted its decision, even when the work was done under difficulties. And here and now, the Educational Department would like to express its gratitude for the unselfishness of the Box Workers who made a place on their crowded programme for interparochial classes in Wanted Leaders, during the all-day sewing meetings in Lent.

It is due more to the alert faithfulness of the Box Secretaries than to that of the Educational Secretary that I am able thankfully to report that we are really making headway in the matter of finding and forming ties with our isolated Churchwomen—and when one says Churchwoman, it is apt to mean a Church family.

So much progress has been made that, with this report and as part of it, I recommend to the Auxiliary of the Diocese of Olympia in Convention assembled the creation of an office, and the choice of an officer, whose function shall be to search out these scattered Churchwomen and link them with the Church's life and work.

It isn't fair to pick out only the plums in the pudding. Of course there is less palatable, though maybe not less wholesome, fare. Of course "there is a most unusual condition" in our parish, or mission, or home. There always is. That is what makes it our duty, and not somebody else's. And the Teacher who sets the task will help us "faithfully to fulfill the same."

A new Educational Secretary will come to you, I know, with plans for a full, useful, and stimulating year. But I cannot forbear leaving with you a few suggestions as to matters that do not change, though officers and programmes do.

First, in planning your programmes, don't make them too easy. As Miss Boyer says, "Let's present it big!" Youth especially is attracted not by what is easy, but by what is difficult and worth while. It is a bit of good news you will like to share with me that in one of our larger parishes the Young People's Society asked the leader of the Auxiliary Discussion Group on the Program Presented to lead them in a similar group, because "it sounded like the most interesting thing that was happening in the parish."

Second, in all our educational programmes, let us keep before the branches with which we work that no department of the National Council is outside the legitimate field of the Woman's Auxiliary, but that, on the contrary, whatever aids the work of the National Council is part of our

duty. For I sometimes think the chief function of an Educational Secretary is to make clear that we are not Auxiliary to the Church Missionary Society. We are part of the Church Missionary Society. We are Auxiliary to the National Council. If any one of us doubts that this is an august body, and that membership herein should make us humble and diligent, she should have heard Bishop Lloyd earnestly declare in General Convention: "The Woman's Auxiliary is the very most potent factor in the life of the American Church."

Third, another duty and privilege of the Educational Secretary is to co-operate with the Custodian of the United Thank Offering, in parish and mission and among the isolated Churchwomen, helping every Churchwoman to understand and bear in mind that the little blue box is not "that mite box Auxiliary women put a penny in," but the united thank offering of every daughter of this Church who wants to show her thankfulness to Almighty God by sharing His Unspeakable Gift with all His other children.

"What an outward and visible sign of an inward and spiritual grace it is," said the Presiding Bishop, when it was offered at Portland last year.

"This is woman's day," said that youngest spirit at the General Convention. "Thank God, I've lived to see it. They can be trusted with it." And when he presided, on a dangerously hot afternoon, at the presentation of the Children's Birthday Thank Offering, his invincible youth declared, "This is the most important day of this General Convention, because for the first time, the children have been given a day in General Convention."

When I tell you these things, I am not straying from my subject. Because the most important class of all was taught by the Presiding Bishop, who has just been promoted. There were no formal enrollments; and the teacher thought himself "the least of all the learners," always. But Daniel Sylvester Tuttle has just finished the course whose old-fashioned name Jeremy Taylor has taught us, long ago. It is called *Holy Living and Dying*. Let us remember it with "high praise and hearty thanks," when in the prayer for the Church Militant we look toward the Church Triumphant, saying:

"We also bless Thy name for all Thy servants departed this life in Thy faith and fear; beseeching Thee to give us grace so to follow their good examples that, with them, we may be partakers in Thy heavenly kingdom."

And sharers in its building, O Father, for Jesus Christ's sake. Amen.

REPORT OF THE FIRST VICE-PRESIDENT

To the President, Officers and Members of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Olympia:

In submitting this report of the office of the First Vice-President of the Diocese, it is my purpose to tell of the activities of the Tacoma Branches not incorporated in the Branch reports.

The duties of the First Vice-President are assigned by the President and seem to be those of a Liaison officer to the Tacoma Branches, connecting and co-ordinating the work, as far as possible, arranging joint meetings, giving out information from headquarters, answering inquiries and being "generally useful."

In carrying on this work it has been my pleasure and privilege to answer all letters from other Diocesan officers, to distribute literature, reports, etc., to the various branches, to assist in arranging for several joint meetings and to visit the branches and come in close contact with all the Auxiliary women of the city. I want to say here how grateful I am for the unfailing courtesy, consideration and loyalty shown by these dear women.

I have also served as a member of the Diocesan Department of Missions and the Diocesan Department of Religious Education and since January have served as President of St. Luke's Branch of the Women's Auxiliary.

In October, to bring about more effective co-operation, we organized a President's Council, to meet once a month for luncheon and an informal discussion of Auxiliary affairs. Each branch was asked to send its president or one other representative. Mrs. Keator and I attended as members at large.

This Council has seemed to fill a great need and we have all felt the benefit and blessing of the meetings which were held regularly in October, November and December.

In January our Supply Secretaries sent our allotment for St. Timothy's to me to be divided among the Tacoma Branches. I was very glad then to call a meeting of our Council and ask each President to bring her Supply Secretary. The allotment list (which had looked terrifyingly large to me) was divided up, each Branch selecting the thing their members could do best, and the reports will show how many additional articles were included in those splendid boxes that were sent to St. Timothy's Mission. During Lent we had no Council Meeting but in April met again to check over the allotment list and to rejoice together over the work.

The Educational work of the Tacoma Branches is incorporated in Mrs. Norman's report but I would like to say that each Branch has followed some definite program of study. One Branch, St. Luke's, followed closely the prescribed plan for this year, with a complete study of the

"Program Presented," in the fall, and Bishop Bratton's "Wanted Leaders" during Lent. Then educational work was given a splendid impetus by the visit of Miss Laura Boyer, one of our National Secretaries who was here for two days in September.

Miss Boyer's charming personality, her practical suggestions and workable plans aroused much interest and proved most helpful to Tacoma workers.

I had the joy of entertaining her for the Auxiliary.

Great interest too was created by those who came back from the Convention where the keynote of the Auxiliary work seemed to be Education.

In this connection I wish to report that all the branches here are represented in some way in the Church Schools, and Missionary information is being disseminated among our young people. A very definite piece of work was done this spring by a girls' class of St. Mark's Church, under the leadership of Mrs. H. H. Johnson, an Auxiliary member, when a number of dolls were dressed and sent to St. Timothy's Mission.

Another splendid work is being done in Trinity Parish Church School where the girls' classes under the leadership of Mrs. E. B. Judson, Mrs. Davis, Mrs. Leaver, Mrs. Avery, and Miss Luce, are caring for a child in Siberia, a former ward of Rev. and Mrs. Ramsauer.

Still following the lines of Educational work, our church has been represented through its Auxiliary members at the Semi-annual Inter-denominational Conferences. In October Mrs. Keator gave a splendid account of our work in the Japanese Mission in Seattle and in February, Mrs. H. H. Johnson of St. Mark's read a most beautifully prepared and comprehensive paper on our Alaska Missions. This work with the Missionary Federation seems very important to us here. A number of our women also took part in the Eastern College movement, making personal contributions to that fund.

Christian Social Service work is being done in various ways by all the Tacoma branches. No fixed rule or set of rules can be made to govern this "Applied Christianity." Our Lord said 'Inasmuch as ye shall do it unto the least of these,' and who shall say when, where or how we may find these "Little Ones" of His or how best we may minister unto them. Each branch, as well as each Auxiliary woman, is doing the Social Service work that come to its hand. Generally it is expedient to work through established agencies and so we find Auxiliary members here serving with the Y. W. C. A., the Girls' Reserves, Girl Scouts, and various other organizations.

There is a Social Service Department of the Auxiliary in St. Luke's Parish. For efficiency and intensive work it functions as a separate organization. The members are making a thorough study of Social Service meth-

ods, and work both in connection with the Social Agencies of the city and along the lines of friendly visiting and aid in the Parish. This Department is under the direct leadership of Mrs. McAllister Moore, and the members of St. Luke's Branch are thankfully proud of its efficient, thorough work.

GROWTH AND DEVELOPMENT

For many years St. Mark's and St. Andrew's Parishes as well as St. John's Mission have worked with St. Luke's Parish, the joint organization being called The Tacoma Branch. Last year it was decided that it would be better for each parish to have its own organization, so that each parish would feel a greater responsibility toward Auxiliary work. In January this year, St. Andrew's organized with a splendid membership and its report will show its work.

St. Mark's is not yet organized but its Guild did its work for St. Timothy's Mission and we are looking forward to a branch there.

Our Mission in South Tacoma, St. John's, found itself overwhelmed with responsibilities due to unsettled business conditions there, so did not feel able to keep up its branch this year, but a small group of its devoted women worked as associate members of St. Luke's Branch and we will hope for better conditions next year.

There has been a steady growth in interest and love for the Auxiliary work in Tacoma and a very definite growth in membership.

Two branches, St. Andrew's and St. Luke's, have more than doubled their Auxiliary membership.

There is every reason to feel that the work will grow—as we have the love and strong support of our Bishop and Clergy, the wisdom and advice of our older members and the youthful strength and enthusiasm of many new ones.

REPORT OF CORRESPONDING SECRETARY

May 23, 1922—May 23, 1923

Letters and notices written 273. Packages sent out 51. Compiled the annual report and distributed the same throughout the Diocese. Distributed 223 United Thank Offering Boxes. Received 72 letters and 12 packages. There are 27 organized Branches in the Diocese with 612 members.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I.

The name of this Organization shall be "The Olympia Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council."

ARTICLE II.

The object of this Organization shall be to pray daily for Missions, and by means of united and systematic effort, to diffuse missionary intelligence, to increase missionary activity among the women of this Diocese; to unite previously existing societies, and to encourage the formation of Branches where there are none.

ARTICLE III.

The Church itself is a Missionary Society, and every person by baptism becomes a member of this Organization therefore, every baptised woman in this Diocese is a member of this Auxiliary.

ARTICLE IV.

SEC. 1. The officers of this organization shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Treasurer of the United Thank Offering, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Supply Secretary, Assistant Supply Secetary, Educational Secretary, and Rural Secretary, who shall constitute an Executive Committee. This committee shall fill all vacancies that may occur during the year between the annual meetings.

SEC. 2. The Treasurer of the United Thank Offering, the Corresponding Secretary, and the Assistant Supply Secretary, shall be appointed by the President, but all other officers shall be elected at the annual meeting.

SEC. 3. At the first election after the adoption of this by-law one-third of the officers shall be elected to serve for one year, one-third for two years, and one-third for three years. Therafter one-third of the full number shall be elected annually for a term of three years. Service as an officer shall be limited to two consecutive terms.

ARTICLE V.

SEC. 1. The President, or in her absence, one of the Vice-Presidents, shall preside over all meetings of this Organization and of the Executive Committee, and shall call meetings at such time and place as in her judgment shall be necessary.

SEC. 2. The First Vice-President shall be elected at large, whose duty it shall be to assist the President in the upbuilding of the Woman's Auxiliary throughout the Diocese.

The Second Vice-President shall be elected from the Southern Deanery, and the Third Vice-President from the Northern Deanery. It shall be their duty to have general oversight of the Auxiliary in their respective Deaneries; to promote the formation of new branches, and help and strengthen those already existing.

They shall plan for semi-annual meetings with the help of the President and the Bishop of the Diocese.

SEC. 3. The duty of the Recording Secretary shall be to keep a record of the proceedings of each meeting of the Auxiliary, and read the same at the following meeting, and to prepare an abstract of the minutes for the annual report.

SEC. 4. The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the Auxiliary, send out notices, distribute information in regard to Missionary work, and prepare an annual report for circulation in the Diocese.

SEC. 5. The duty of the Treasurer shall be to receive all general and special funds, except as hereinafter provided; to disburse the former under the direction of the Executive Committee, and the latter as the donors may indicate, and to render an account of the same at the annual meeting.

SEC. 6. The Treasurer of the United Thank Offering shall keep an account of the mite boxes in use in the various Branches; shall collect the contents by September 15; shall invest the same each year, and conduct all necessary correspondence. The total amount, principal and interest, shall be ready for presentation at the triennial meeting of the Auxiliary.

ARTICLE VI.

All Societies that desire it will be considered members of this Auxiliary, and will send their report of money collected and work done to the Secretary. Delegates from all such Societies will be expected to attend the general meetings. The Secretaries of the Parochial Branches are required to correspond with the Diocesan officers, who alone correspond with the Secretaries of the Board of Missions, and transmit to them all moneys.

ARTICLE VII.

There shall be an annual meeting of the Society at such time and place as may be determined upon by the Society itself, and in absence of such determination by the Society, the President, upon consultation with the Bishop, shall appoint the time and place of the annual meeting.

ARTICLE VIII.

Regularly organized Branches are expected to pay annual dues of 25 cents per member, which, with the offering at the annual meeting, shall form a fund, out of which the Treasurer shall pay all Auxiliary expenses.

ARTICLE IX.

New branches in missions may report as Auxiliary work such Church furnishings and Sunday School supplies as they may provide for their own missions during the first two years of the Branch's organization.

ARTICLE X.

The fiscal year of the Society shall be from May 1st to May 1st.

ARTICLE XI.

This Constitution may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote at any annual meeting.

BY-LAWS

1. Officers shall be elected at the annual meeting. The President shall appoint a committee on nominations, and upon the coming in of their report, the meeting shall proceed to elect by ballot or *viva voce*. The choice of officers need not be confined to persons nominated by the committee.

2. Every local Branch shall forward to the Corresponding Secretary, on or before the first of May of each year, a full report of all missionary work done during the year.

3. The order of business at the meeting of the Society shall be as follows:

1. Prayer.
2. Calling of the Roll.
3. Reading of the Minutes.
4. Corresponding Secretary's Report.
5. Treasurer's Report.
6. Report of President of Junior Department.
7. Report of Supply Department.
8. Report of Custodian United Thank Offering.
9. Address of President.
10. Miscellaneous Business.

4. These By-Laws may be amended by a majority vote at any general meeting.
