REPORT.

We present to our contributors, and to all interested in mission work among the Indians, our Fourteenth Annual Report. In these fourteen years, the Indian Hope Association has grown, from a small number of workers meeting in a private house, struggling to arouse the conscience and enlist the sympathies of the Church for her neglected Indian children, to an association of 119 members, representing 53 parishes. And our list of subscribers shows how general is the interest and how generous the assistance which our cause now commands. Let those who have faithfully worked all these years through much discouragement often, looking at the difference, "thank God and take courage."

The contributions in the last year amount to \$4,179.38, as shown by the Treasurer's report. The value of boxes sent to different parts of the Indian field is \$1,424.00.

But these two sums do not show all that has been done. The answers to special needs have been, as always, prompt and generous, the sum contributed in this way reaching \$590.20. The chief of these special objects was the enlargement of St. Paul's School, Yankton, which has now been achieved, and of which Bishop Hare writes :

"Through the generosity of friends, the boys, instead of being huddled together in a dingy basement dining-room, now take their meals in a bright airy room on the first floor ; they have a first-rate lavatory and school-room, and shops will soon be completed."

It is very desirable to call the attention of each delegate to the resolution by which every box sent from every parish

to the Indian field is to be reported to the box committee, so that every box and its value may appear in the annual report. It is believed that the reports of this branch of our work have heretofore been very incomplete.

We cannot better conclude our report than with the words of a recent letter from Bishop Hare: "God bless the Indian Hope, and grant that the interest it has called out may increase," to which assuredly every member and subscriber will say, Amen.

SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

Domestic Committee of the Pennsylvania Branch

OF THE

Woman's Auxiliary.

We have before us once more the duty of making our Annual Report of the work done by this committee.

We are glad to be able to tell of labors more abundant, and that we have assumed new responsibilities. Hitherto our chief work has been to prepare and to send, by the hands of our members in the branch societies, boxes that are filled, so as to comfort and cheer and clothe the missionaries and their families in their lives of toil and need; but now we have begun to attain our hearts' desire, to have in the field itself substitutes for us, who, while we are doing the easier part of the Lord's work, are enjoying the comforts and blessings of our homes. The first of these workers is already in the field.

Just one year ago, a letter from the good bishop of Oregon was read at our meeting, which told of his great need for funds to supply to the Hospital of the Good Samaritan, at Portland, Oregon, a matron. \$240 was the annual stipend named, and it was pledged. This, the bishop thought, would ensure the continuance of the benefactions of the hospital,—the only one on the Pacific coast not in the hands of the Romanists.

Several scholarships in the schools of our missionary bishops have also been supported by offerings made through us; and one of the dormitories at Wolfe Hall has been furnished, according to the suggestion of the Bishop of Colorado at our meeting last November. Ninety-four boxes have been sent by thirty parish societies, valued at \$11,674.89, which, with the cash contribution (\$567.29) make a total of

\$12,242.18, which far exceeds what has been given in any previous year. We feel most grateful for this increase, and, while we hope to press forward to still higher possibilities, we desire to record our fullest appreciation of what has been done by many of our parishes. A year ago, when the effort was begun to secure the salary for the support of the matron of whom we have spoken, some of our delegates feared that we were overestimating our ability, but the result has proved that they did not realize it. Parish after parish has assented to the proposition of contributing a small yearly stipend for the purpose, until the whole sum was easily secured; and this without, in one single instance, diminishing their other missionary work. It is but another of the many lessons that the dear Lord teaches us, and yet we remain so faithless. If we but go forth to our work in His strength, we cannot fail.

We are happy to say that several more parishes have joined our band of workers, and to notice much help that has been extended outside the home precincts of the missionary. In one instance, a noble parish sent a cabinet organ for the little church, as well as the laden box for the family. Several surplices and a Communion service have been sent by the liberality of one lady, who merges it all into the name of the Diocesan Committee. One parish that had just enrolled its name among our branches, timidly took the missionary letter to do what it could towards supplying the needs of the wife and children; but, beginning the work in faith, it ended by supplying not only every family need, but the longed-for Communion service, and books of great value too. Another and still another begin their work in doubt as to what they can accomplish, and end it surprising themselves, and by entirely filling the whole list of needs.

We have had a delightful new feature in our work this season, and that is in the interest shown by our young people. We find, in our appended list, contributions both in money and boxes from several Bible classes of young ladies. This is something to be hailed with joy. How is the work to grow and prosper, but by recruits from the young to fill the places of those who are falling one by one, having finished their

earthly journey? We welcome very heartily all these dear young people, and we pray that each year may increase our list of such contributors.

We cannot omit to notice the aid received, in response to our applications in behalf of the missionaries, from the "Episcopal Female Tract Society," from the two Prayer-Book societies, from the Bishop White Parish Library Association, and from the Altar Society of St. Mark's Church, Philadelphia. All this tells of the care for the souls of the men and of those under their charge, and of care of sacred places, too, which has been too little heeded in the days that are gone. Through the aid of these societies several mission stations have been supplied with prayer-books and hymnals; more than two hundred tracts have been sent; in nine desert places have been sent, for the rectors' use, twenty-five books of sterling theological value, and altar linen has been sent to five churches where there was none. The money value of these gifts is not known to us, and will, of course, be accredited to the societies who have through us made the gifts; but, as they were made in response to applications from us, it seems only gracious that we should name them here, and in behalf of these invaluable societies, and in token of our thankfulness to them, let us see that they be not forgotten in our benefactions, and that we, in our turn, shall individually strengthen their hands and replenish their scanty treasuries.

We have in our appended list the brief record of the work of our parishes. In some cases it would seem as if the parish has fallen behind its last year's record; but upon inquiry we generally find that it has only withdrawn somewhat from us to increase its labors in other directions.

Two of the missionaries, whose names are on our list, have ceased from their labors, and have entered into rest. What must be the happiness of those parishes who have soothed and comforted their last days upon earth! The son of one whose needs were very tenderly and promptly supplied, and were rapidly sent forward as they were made ready, had already passed away when the final box reached the home that had been desolated.

Such instances of the brevity and uncertainty of human life ought to make us very earnest and zealous in our daily work. The review of the past must only stimulate us to greater exertions in the future in the service of our dear Master, remembering always that "the night cometh in which no man can work."

The work of the Foreign Committee, during the past year, has been chiefly the support of the Bishop Stevens' Divinity Scholarship in St. John's College, Shanghai, China; the raising of a portion of Miss Eddy's salary, Japan; and the collection of funds to assist in furnishing the new chapel in Wuchang, China. Ecclesiastical embroidery and communion linen have also been promised for the chapel.

Last May we sent to the Foreign Hospital in Havana, Cuba, four boxes filled, partly by this Committee, partly by various parishes, with clothing, wine and food for the sick. Miss Scott, formerly of the African mission, was present at one of our monthly meetings, and Mr. Kimber at another. Both gave us interesting information concerning the work of Foreign Missions.

It is with great pleasure that we report an increase of membership. In September, 1880, there were twenty-nine names on our roll; we have now thirty-four names; a gain of five in the year. But we are not yet satisfied, and shall not be until we have at least one representative from every parish in the diocese. Of the ninety-two parishes and missions within the limits of the city of Philadelphia, seventy-one have no representative in the Foreign Committee. Why? Let every churchwoman ask herself the question.

In conclusion we would say a word in behalf of the "Spirit of Missions," and urge upon all, particularly every member of the Auxiliary, to subscribe to it, to read it carefully, and to distribute it. It is full of news from every portion of the missionary field occupied by our church ; and the burning zeal manifested in the letters from missionaries cannot fail to awaken some degree of interest, even in the hearts of the most indifferent. We cannot doubt but that the officers of the other committees of the Auxiliary will, like those of the Foreign Committee, gladly receive and forward subscriptions to this valuable periodical.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE

ON

Work for Freedmen.

It is with a feeling of slight encouragement that the Committee on Work for Freedmen present their report for the past year. If we have not gained much, at least we have lost nothing. But it is most earnestly hoped that those interested in mission work, and who eagerly scan the pages of this joint report, will be impressed by the melancholy disproportion which the interest in the Freedmen bears towards that felt in the three other branches, as testified to by these pages. Spite of the earnest efforts of the devoted few who have, since the inception of this work, struggled to increase, and indeed to maintain, the slight interest felt in the benighted millions at our door,—millions crying for bread and receiving not even a stone, but that indifference which is harder and colder than any stone,—comparatively nothing has been accomplished; nothing as compared to the sums generously and readily subscribed to other objects. Where are those who, during the war, were so eager for the emancipation of the slave? The emancipation became an accomplished fact, but the slave, being freed, was thrown upon the great wide world, a poor, helpless, childlike creature. Accustomed to care and guidance, or at least to being provided for, and taking no thought for the future, he cries in vain to those who brought about his present state of glorious freedom, to hold out a helping hand, to teach him to make use of his liberty, to raise himself above the level of the brute creation, where he has so long grovelled, and, at the very least, to help him to provide for his physical necessities, while putting within his reach that Bread of life without which his soul perisheth. Brethren, let it not be said through fault of ours that the last state of the slave is worse than the first.

The slight encouragement alluded to above, is based upon the facts that three more parishes now send delegates to the Committee,—though many of our large parishes still remain unrepresented,—and that there is an increase in our money receipts of about one hundred dollars, and in the value of boxes sent of about \$319.00.

THIRD ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

Philadelphia Branch of the Mexican League.

1880-81.

With grateful pleasure we present to the members and friends of the Philadelphia Branch of the Mexican League our Third Annual Report.

We feel greatly encouraged on all sides. A glance at the minutes for the year reveals a larger average attendance of our members.

The Secretary deeply regrets her absence from her post at various times, for which sickness is her only plea; and she would gratefully acknowledge the kindness of those who have represented her. The principal work accomplished during the year has been the provision of the "Bishop Stevens Scholarship" for the support of a theological student. (The name of the young man who will be supported has not yet been given to us.)

The sending to the city of Mexico—the Rev. C. E. Butler and family—we deem our most important effort; and we thank God that, through the kind and generous co-operation of a few friends, we have been permitted to see the accomplishment of our long desire, that those who have given such proof of their singular fitness for work in Mexico will soon be in their new field of labor, and by their counsel and personal aid will strengthen the little band of faithful workers who wait to greet them with open arms. They carry with them our prayers and best wishes for an abundant blessing upon their work in that part of the Master's vineyard to which they go.

Presuming that "The Envoy" of January (and which we consider the *best* yet issued) as containing clear and concise

statements of the work as it now is, of what was accomplished by the Rt. Rev. Bishop Riley during his long but necessary absence, as given in his most excellent sermon, preached in the Church of the Holy Trinity, New York, November 28, 1880, has been read by the majority of our members, it is unnecessary to tax our friends with a recapitulation. A few extracts from a recent report of the Corresponding Secretary, and also from an exceedingly interesting private letter from a member of the Central Board, now visiting Mexico, may prove of interest.

"There are now fifty-four organized congregations of the "Mexican Branch of the Church," and many small groups of believers, some of whom have recently sent in their acts of adhesion to the central authorities. Many of the country congregations are self-supporting, but the movement towards restoration in Mexico, like all previous religious reformations, begins in the hearts of the poor and lowly, who are more ready than the rich to accept the truth in love and humility. Of their spiritual guides, those who know them speak in the highest terms. The Rev. Senor Hernandez, bishop-elect of Cuernavaca, is a pure Aztec, who received the little church as a sacred charge from Manuel Agnas, and, with his whole family, is devoted to the work; he is wise, prudent, and steadfast as a rock. Rev. Senor Maruri is a faithful and reliable man, with the fine discipline of a soldier; while the younger clergy have good abilities, and are gifted with the eloquence of the Spanish race. With deep regret we learn the Rev. Senor Valdespino is hopelessly ill. The young men in the Theological Seminary are being carefully educated, the more advanced of them doing valuable missionary service on Sundays among the scattered congregations of the valley. Mrs. Hooker, with the patient love of a mother, is training the seventy girls of the Orphanage, of which a lady has written: "If this was the *only* work in Mexico, it is of sufficient importance to call forth our most earnest efforts." Mrs. Hooker writes, "Compared with my family of five years ago I am greatly encouraged." Seventeen of the girls are being taught English, and have made good progress.

The Boys' High School and Orphanage is also well cared for by competent teachers, and the various societies connected with the church are active and helpful, and none more faithful than Miss Anna Grut, in her self-sacrificing ministrations as Bible-reader and visitor to the sick and poor.

With all we have to encourage us, we must not forget that there are many adversaries, and that the Church of Jesus is like a small bark in the midst of a stormy sea, and has many difficulties to contend with. The Romanists through the Church Press attack it in various ways; the Infidels strive to undermine it, and its extreme poverty exposes it to many temptations, but, notwithstanding, *the work* prospers, and is worthy our earnest prayers and generous support. The Secretary would like to add a few words in regard to Bishop Riley's visit abroad. A letter from the secretary of the Spanish and Portuguese Aid Association in England is significant: "By this post I send you a packet of papers relating to Bishop Riley's effort in this country. From them you will learn of the Bishop's visit to Spain, of the constitution of the Spanish and Lusitanian churches, the election of the Rev. J. B. Cabrera as Bishop of Madrid, the approaching nomination of a bishop-elect for Lisbon, and of the appeal made by the Spanish Church that the Episcopate should be transmitted. Bishop Riley has simply been indefatigable in his efforts on behalf of the cause of Christ in the beautiful land in which you live; yet such is the largeness of his heart that the moments one might reasonably expect him to devote to leisure, he has employed in promoting Christian effort in this and other lands."

A word now respecting the Liturgy. The Mexican Church, being an independent and national one, desires a Liturgy of her own, based upon that of the Primitive Church in Spain. Such a one is now being matured under the supervision of the bishops of the "Mexican Commission," and the General Synod of the Mexican Branch of the Church. This synod could not meet during the absence of Bishop Riley, and hence the delay; but, before very long, we hope to present it to the church at large, when we trust that those who are "waiting" for this light may no longer withhold the right hand

of Christian fellowship and aid from the members of the Church in Mexico, who are most grateful for the sympathy and support of the "faithful few" who have ministered to her necessities. "The kindness and love of God our Saviour toward man" having appeared unto us, with his blessing let us not fail in manifesting it in works and labors of love toward our weaker brethren, who are hungering and thirsting after righteousness. Thanking *all* who have aided by their prayers, their labor, their gifts, the work in Mexico, this report is respectfully submitted.
