REPORT.

Owing to the alteration in the time of the Annual Meeting, it is but a partial statement that we now lay before our subscribers and not strictly an Annual Report. Perhaps it would be as well to state the Society's reasons for making this change.

Heretofore the Annual Meeting has been held in September, a season when it is very difficult to secure a full attendance of our members. During the summer the officers and members are scattered, and the work is at a standstill for several months. Under these circumstances it was difficult to arouse or feel the same interest, difficult even to collect an accurate statement of the work. The only reason for holding the meeting at that time was that the Annual Report might be ready for insertion in the General Report of the Woman's Auxiliary. But the ladies felt that after the first year, the Report might be made as fully and correctly from May to May, as from one September to another.

The present Report therefore only covers a period of eight months, but as the summer is always a period of inaction, it really represents more than two-thirds of a year's work.

The Treasurer's receipts since September amount to \$2862.07. The Box Committee reports 13 boxes, valued at \$1041, a fair showing for the incomplete season's work.

The specials for the year have been the usual collection for a Christmas box for the School at Carlisle and doubling

the stipends (\$120 each per annum) of two Missionary ladies in Dakota, who were among the overworked, underpaid servants of the Church in the Indian field.

It must be a great pleasure to every member of the Association to feel, what no Report can show, that it has been an acknowledged comfort and consolation to Bishop Hare in his sore trials, to feel that he might depend upon the confidence, support and sympathy of every member of the "Indian Hope."

In conclusion we again ask for the sympathy, support and prayers of our subscribers, begging them to join us in the petition, that at this Whitsuntide, the Holy Ghost will give to all our Missionaries "boldness and fervent zeal constantly to preach the Gospel unto all nations."

EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
Domestic Committee of the Pennsylvania Branch
OF THE
Woman's Auxiliary.

It gives us great pleasure to come to our friends with this Annual Report, for although by the change in the time for holding our Meeting, the period is unusually brief since our last, it shows a better record than ever before, and gives assurance that as this Committee grows in years, it aims by God's gracious help to grow stronger and more useful in doing His blessed work. We have often said that no bare list of what has been done by the Branch Societies can convey any adequate idea of the value of the work to our beneficiaries; have we ever thought of its value to ourselves? In fancy we can sketch the home brighter, and its inmates happier by our gifts, but the dear Lord has said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive," and so we know, that *we* are the ones to be filled with deepest thankfulness; that in His great goodness He has put it into our hearts to receive such blessedness.

We are gratified to note substantial help in this season's work from two of our large city Parishes whom we welcome as new Branches.

The Reports from our Branch Societies tell that 117 boxes have been sent away, the value of 11 of which could not be ascertained, leaves the value of 106, \$12,876.57, a much larger sum than that of any previous year.

In cash contributions, as shown by our Treasurer's Report,

we have made considerable advance. In addition to the pledged support of the Sisters in charge of the Hospital of the Good Samaritan, Portland, Oregon, we have received \$400 from St. Peter's, Germantown, for a Chapel in Dakota, and \$600 is reported through us, as given by St. James' Missionary Society, for a Chapel for Bishop Howe. The friends of the Educational Home for Boys also report that \$600 has been raised by them towards the building of a Chapel at Meade Farm, Dakota, and an annual subscription of \$300 towards paying the stipend of a missionary there. All this is glad news, and it is most encouraging too. It crowns the hopes, with which we began the year, with their happy fulfillment, and leads us to venture the prophecy, that the year upon which we enter to-day, will furnish reports of still larger usefulness. Fitting out and filling the Missionary Boxes, is perhaps the fascinating part of our work, but collecting funds to pass from our hands, as we gather them, is not our pleasantest duty, and therefore we felt the greater pride in telling how much of it has been done.

We cannot close without recalling the loss we have sustained by the resignation of our faithful Secretary and Treasurer, it was made imperative on account of ill health. She had, for so long a time, ably discharged the duties of her important part, that it seemed hard to give her up, but we have been most fortunate in having so happily filled her offices.

At the Regular Monthly Meeting of the Foreign Committee held in April, 1882, it was resolved that hereafter the Annual meeting should be held in May, and the Secretary was directed to present her Report at that time instead of at the September Meeting as formerly, consequently the following Report is the record of only eight months' work.

The Annual Subscriptions, \$2.00 from each member, have been devoted as usual to the Fund for insuring the lives of Foreign Missionaries; the support of two Divinity Scholarships in St. John's College, Shanghai, China, has been continued. They are called the Bishop Stevens and the St. John's. The money for the latter, \$100, is given entirely by members of the P. E. Hospital Mission.

In response to an appeal from Africa, two boxes of clothing and material for clothing, have been sent to Bishop Penick's Schools; one box from this Committee and the other from the Girls' Friendly Society of St. Mary's Church, West Philadelphia.

The new work undertaken is a Scholarship in one of

Bishop Penick's Schools, and we have given it the name of the esteemed Secretary of the Auxiliary, Miss J. C. Emery. We have also pledged ourselves to raise, for one year, about two-thirds of the salary of a lady missionary in Japan. It is extremely desirable that we continue this pledge for a longer period and we trust that some of the readers of this Report will, by their liberality, help us to do so.

At present there seems to be a widespread impression that the Board of Missions has been supplied by bequest with ample funds for Foreign work. This opinion is erroneous, for although certain large bequests have been made, it is likely that several years will elapse before any of the money reaches the Mission Treasury. It will be seen therefore that this is not the time to relax our efforts on behalf of the Church's work in heathen lands. We must, on the contrary, exert ourselves more vigorously. It would certainly defeat the purpose of the testators if, by reason of their bequests, contributions were stopped or diminished. The work demands great enlargement.

We have again the pleasure of reporting an increase of membership, several new names having been added to our roll since we resumed work last autumn.

In conclusion we would state that the meetings of this Committee are not intended only for its members, but that any lady wishing to attend will be heartily welcomed.

The time and place of meeting are to be found on the second page of the cover.

For the first time since its organization, the Committee on Work for Freedmen presents its report with a grateful consciousness of steady progress during the past year.

There has been a large increase both in money receipts and in the value of boxes sent to missionaries working among the colored people, for themselves and for their schools. Not only have several new parishes sent delegates to the monthly meetings, but all the delegates, both old and new, appear at last to take an active interest in this branch of Mission work. Individuals not connected with the Committee as delegates from any parish, but yet sufficiently interested in the colored people to give of their substance, have also recognized the propriety of making their contributions through the medium of this Committee, encouraging and strengthening it by so doing and supporting, moreover, the principle that organized work is sure to be more efficient than single and desultory efforts, however well directed.

Among the objects specially interesting those connected with this work, has been the endeavor to answer the appeal made by Mrs. Buford, during her visit to this city last au-

tumn, for funds to build and furnish a hospital, much needed by the colored population of her neighborhood. This hospital has been originated by Mrs. Buford, and is to be under her supervision, and will doubtless accomplish a vast amount of good.

Much personal interest has been felt in some of the Missionaries. In one case some young ladies of the city, connected with the Committee, and others, exerted themselves most successfully to save some valued personal property of a Southern lady, whose life is devoted to work among the colored people, from being sold at a great sacrifice. It is earnestly hoped that those already more or less interested in this vitally important work will become more thoroughly and actively so, and by their examples stimulate those who, through ignorance or indifference, have hitherto turned deaf ears to the urgent appeals made to them by their colored brethren of the South, and by those devoted ones laboring among them.

With a grateful sense of the Lord's goodness, in bringing us to the threshold of a new year, we present to the members and friends of the Philadelphia Branch of the Mexican League, our Fourth Annual Report.

The regular monthly meetings have been held, in this our accustomed place, on the first Friday of each month—and it is, with pleasurable satisfaction, we are able to state, a larger average attendance than in the preceding years. While we have not added to our membership, the fidelity of those associated in the work since our organization, in 1878, has been sufficient to encourage us to go on, for we can but feel, that the Lord *has* prospered, and will continue to prosper, our undertaking. To the list of our officers has been added the name of Mrs. Jennie G. Lounsberry, who was unanimously elected our Recording Secretary in October. Indisposition has deprived us of the presence of our Treasurer at our last two meetings, but we hope to welcome her, in renewed health, upon her return in April. At our meeting

one year ago to-day, we expressed the desire that the urgent call for more laborers in the work in Mexico might meet with a favorable response, and to-day, we can announce the consummation of our hopes.

In April, the Rev. C. E. Butler and family, bearing the highest testimonials from Bishops Vail and Stevens, and clergymen of this and other Dioceses, departed for their new field of labor, for which they had given ample proof of their singular fitness. In November, Mrs. Maria Lever (so well known to the League), after an impressive farewell service at the Church of the Holy Communion, in New York City, where, after the celebration of the Holy Communion, she met the greater part of the congregation in the Sunday School room, addressing them in her own peculiarly earnest manner; speaking of her personal conversion from spiritual darkness, urging her hearers to a more simple trust in Christ; bade adieu to many warm Christian friends, whose prayers and best wishes followed her in her return to her native land—where, we believe, she will be largely instrumental in bringing souls to the knowledge of “the truth as it is in Jesus.”

The share the Philadelphia Branch League enjoyed in sending these our fellow-laborers “strong in the faith,” to the Church in Mexico, we deem our most important work accomplished during the year.

We have also had the pleasure of sending to the Orphanage for Girls, under the care of Mrs. Hooker, a *silent helper*, in the form of a sewing machine, which we hope will serve materially to lighten her labors.

Trusting that *The Envoy* for December, the supplement to the *Spirit of Missions*, for January (so *satisfactory* to the friends of this work), the letter by the Rev. Tomas Valdespino, published by “The League in Aid of the Mexican Branch of the Church,” has received the attention each paper merits, we will not trespass by a repetition of the articles.

Important questions having been sent to the Secretary of the Philadelphia Branch, in the early winter, have been, we feel, most satisfactorily answered by the Rt. Rev. Bishop

Riley, who authorized the Rev. C. E. Butler, Presbyterian of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Pennsylvania, now laboring in Mexico, to send the answers to the Secretary of the Philadelphia Branch of the Mexican League.

MEXICO, Mexico, Dec. 28, 1881.

In answer to the following questions, the undersigned has been authorized by the Rt. Rev. H. C. Riley, D.D., to reply as follows :

1st. "As it regards the building or buildings, under what circumstances did they come into the possession of the Bishop of the Valley of Mexico?"

Ans. When the monastic orders were abolished in Mexico, the buildings formerly occupied by them, about three hundred in number, fell into the hands of the government by confiscation, and were offered for sale. *San José de Gracia* was bought by Bishop Riley individually, who spent from his own funds several thousand dollars in repairs. Bishop Riley, assisted by his father and a few friends, purchased *San Francisco* from parties who had bought it from the government. The Foreign Committee of the Board of Missions subsequently contributed \$6000 to wipe off a claim which was unexpectedly brought against one of these Churches. The Bishop has invested money in these buildings, which, with the addition of interest and increased value, would amount to over one hundred thousand dollars. These buildings and their grounds are worth to-day *four hundred and fifty thousand dollars*.

2d. "What is the Liturgy now in use? With what form is the Sacrament of Holy Baptism administered? With what form of words is the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper consecrated?"

Ans. In the Mexican Commission of the House of Bishops, Bishop Whittingham insisted that only the Offices for Holy Baptism and the Holy Communion should be discussed by that body; leaving an independent Church to adapt its daily services to its needs. The Offices for the Sacraments of Holy Baptism and the Holy Communion in use in the

Mexican Church, are those which were fully discussed and agreed upon by the Mexican Commission of the Protestant Episcopal Church, authorized to take final action, and the authorities of the Mexican Church; the latter hope, with the consent of the Mexican Commission, to improve and modify said Offices.

3d. "Have any persons been admitted to Holy Orders, and how were they made deacons or ordained priests?"

Ans. The first ordination was by the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of Delaware, when seven were ordained. The second in July last, when Bishop Riley ordained five deacons and presbyters. The third in the present month, when four were ordained deacons, and three of these, on the following week, presbyters. The forms used by Bishop Riley on these occasions are those found in the Prayer Book of the Church in Spain, which are almost wholly Spanish versions of the same forms in the Book of Common Prayer of the Protestant Episcopal Church. Two former Roman Catholic priests have also been admitted as ministers of the Mexican Branch of the Church.

4th. "Have laymen been allowed or permitted or authorized to celebrate the Lord's Supper?"

Ans. The ecclesiastical authority of the Mexican Branch of the Church of Jesus has never allowed, permitted, or authorized laymen to celebrate the Lord's Supper.

C. ENRIQUE BUTLER,

Enquirers as to the exact wording of any of the services are referred to our Right Reverend Fathers composing the Mexican Commission.

We do most earnestly hope that those who are still withholding their sympathy, their coöperation in carrying on one of the grandest fields for missionary effort that the Lord has ever given us, will find in these replies all that is necessary to dispel their doubts and give us the opportunity of extending to them the right hand of Christian fellowship and welcome them as colaborers. "Time is too brief, Christ too near, the work to be done too solemn" for us to neglect so great an

opportunity of "proclaiming the peaceable fruits of righteousness." At that most interesting Missionary meeting of the Sunday School teachers of the P. E. Church in Philadelphia, held February 5th, some excellent things were said—one or two of which we would like to quote in our concluding lines, as we do feel the need of a *deeper* interest in the hearts of the Church people of this Diocese in behalf of the Church in Mexico, which only lacks the *means* to meet the demands for the extension of it. It was said, at the meeting above referred to, "To create an interest, three things are necessary—*First*. If we are to have an interest in missions, we must have faith in missions. *Secondly*. We must pray for the success of missions, and, thirdly, we must show our faith, and superadd to our prayers by our work—we must do what we can."

And again, in the words of our beloved Bishop, "To be filled with a missionary spirit, we must learn *the value* of the soul, and *the value* of the death of Christ."

That we may be more faithful "in labors more abundant" for Christ's sake this report is respectfully submitted.
