EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Report

It has been the privilege of the Executive Committee this year to arrange for three missionary services. At the Annual Meeting in the Church of the Holy Trinity the Bishop Coadjutor presided and Bishop Knight, Bishop Webb, Archdeacons Smith and Russell and the Rev. E. J. Lee spoke.

The Epiphany meeting was held in the Church of the Holy Apostles, when Dr. Correll, of Japan, and the Rev. Nathaniel Thomas made most interesting addresses.

The Lenten meeting was a laymen's missionary rally under the auspices of the Church Club and the Auxiliary, in Witherspoon Hall, when Mr. George C. Thomas presided and Mr. Butler, of Mauch Chunk, and Mr. George Wharton Pepper made stirring appeals for domestic and diocesan missions. As these meetings are of vital importance, we would like to explain in detail how we try to reach the members of the Auxiliary so that every one may know when and where they are held. Notices are sent to the Parish and Church papers and the religious columns of the daily press. Each rector receives a card to be read to his congregation on the Sunday previous to the meeting, and to the parochial presidents cards are sent to be distributed among their delegates. The next Annual Missionary Service will be held on Friday, November 19th.

With the approbation and consent of both Bishops, the Babies' Branch has been transferred from the Sunday School Auxiliary, and we are glad to welcome it as a department of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Since the last report Mrs. Whitaker, our President for seventeen years, died after a long and painful illness, and in October it was decided to endow a scholarship in the Church Training and Deaconess House to educate women for service in the missionary field, and a tablet has been placed in the Chapel of the Deaconess House commemorating the Julia C. Whitaker Scholarship.

Mrs. William Bacon Stevens has also entered into rest. She was the first president of the Foreign Committee, and we gratefully recall her gracious interest and the service she rendered to the Auxiliary when it most needed help.

When Mr. George C. Thomas kindly consented to preside at the Missionary Rally, we did not realize it would be his last public service for us, and as we remember his earnest account of the finances of the Board of Missions and the emphasis he laid upon the necessity of paying the apportionment, would not the best practical tribute we could give to his memory be to meet our share of this obligation now and every year?

Because these our friends have served Thee, O God, in holiness and righteousness all the days of their life, "we bless Thy holy Name for all Thy servants departed this life in Thy faith and fear; beseeching Thee to give us grace so to follow their good examples, that with them we may be partakers of Thy heavenly kingdom."

CONSTITUTION
OF THE
**Pennsylvania Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the
Board of Missions**

ARTICLE I.

Name.

The name of this Association shall be the Pennsylvania Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE II.

Object.

The object of the Association shall be to carry out within the Diocese of Pennsylvania the purposes and work of the Woman's Auxiliary as approved by the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE III.

Organization.

To accomplish these various objects this Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary is organized into five standing Committees—Indians' Hope, Domestic, Foreign, Work among the Colored People, and the Diocesan. The Chairman of each Committee is to be appointed by the Bishop, with the exception of the Indians' Hope, which must follow its own constitution, as it antedates the formation of the Woman's Auxiliary.

ARTICLE IV.

Membership.

The Church itself is the Missionary Society. Every baptized person is a member of the Society; therefore, every baptized woman in the Diocese should be an active member of this Auxiliary.

ARTICLE V.

Officers.

The officers of this Association shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Secretary, an Assistant Secretary, a Treasurer, an Assistant Treasurer, a Treasurer for the United Offering and two officers of the Junior Department. These shall serve for one year and shall be eligible for renomination.

An Annual Meeting of the Executive Committee shall be held on the first Wednesday in May, when appointments by the Bishop shall be announced, nominations having been made by written ballot at the previous meeting.

ARTICLE VI.

Executive Committee.

The general management is entrusted to an Executive Board, composed of the Diocesan officers, the officers of the Standing Committees, the Chairman of the Mexican Work, the Chairman of the Cuban Work, the Assistant Treasurer of the United Offering, and the Librarian.

ARTICLE VII.

Duties of the President.

The President shall preside at all meetings of the Executive Committee. She shall appoint all members of committees necessary for the transacting of the work of the Executive Committee. She shall be ex-officio member of all committees. She shall visit Parish Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary when invited, and seek opportunity to establish branches in parishes where there are none, and fill all other duties pertaining to her office.

ARTICLE VIII.

Duties of the Vice Presidents.

In the absence of the President a Vice-President shall preside at meetings of the Executive Committee and fill all duties belonging to the office.

ARTICLE IX.

Secretary.

The Secretary shall give notice of all meetings ordered by the Executive Committee. She shall keep a record of such meetings, and prepare and present Minutes at each meeting. She shall prepare an abstract of the Minutes of the year for the Annual Report. She shall send a copy of the Annual Report to every officer of the Executive Committee to every Rector, Minister in Charge, and Missionary of the Diocese of Pennsylvania, to the General Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, and to the President of every Branch throughout the Church.

The Secretary shall advertise public meetings in such ways as seem best.

ARTICLE X.

Treasurer.

It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to take charge of the funds belonging to the Executive Committee, and to deposit them in such banking institution as has been selected by the Executive Committee of the Pennsylvania Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, to be drawn thence upon the cheque of the Treasurer or Assistant Treasurer, for the purpose of the Executive Committee, as ordered by that Committee. All bills sent to the Treasurer must be countersigned by the purchaser before payment. The treasurer shall present an itemized report in writing at each stated meeting of the Executive Committee. She shall prepare a report of all funds in her charge for the Annual Meeting. Her books shall be audited by a Committee appointed by the President. It is recommended that the payments of each standing committee to the Annual Report Fund be made and the books closed by June first of each year.

ARTICLE XI.

Publication Committee.

The President shall appoint annually a Committee on the publication of the Annual Report, said Committee to consist of the Treasurer and Secretary from each of the five Standing Committees, with a Chairman. This Committee shall receive all copy, typewritten, for the Annual Report and take entire charge of its publication. It shall be the duty of this Committee to estimate amount per page due the Annual Report Fund from each of the five Standing Committees, and the United Offering, after receiving bill from the printer.

The Current Expense Fund of the Executive Committee shall pay for the remaining pages of the Annual Report not belonging to any of the Standing Committees.

ARTICLE XII.

Amendment.

The Constitution can be amended at any regular meeting of the Committee by a two-thirds vote, provided the amendment was submitted in writing at the previous regular meeting.

Order of Business.

ARTICLE XIV.

Missionary Services.

There shall be three missionary services during the year—

1. The all-day service on the Friday following the second Thursday in November.
2. The Epiphany service in behalf of Missions in the foreign field.
3. The Lenten service.

ARTICLE XV.

Annual Meeting.

The annual Business Meeting shall be held at noon on the Friday following the second Thursday in November.

UNITED OFFERING

OF THE

Pennsylvania Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary

OBJECT OF THE OFFERING OF 1910.

Resolved, That the United Offering of 1910 be given to the Board of Missions for Woman's Work in the Mission Field; including the training, sending and support of women workers; also the care of such workers when sick or disabled; but that a sum not exceeding \$15,000 be devoted to a building, or buildings, approved by the Board of Missions on the recommendation of the General Secretary and the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Also, that to our united gifts there shall be added our united and earnest prayers, that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves to the work of the Master, in the Mission Field.

SUGGESTIONS FOR JUNIOR MISSION STUDY

Let three things be granted at the outset: First, that Junior Study takes all the time you can spare and a good deal that you can't spare; second, that it is very difficult either to do it as you want to or accomplish what you hope for; third, that it is, if not the most important part of the Junior threefold duty, at least one side of an equilateral triangle, and absolutely necessary, and, in spite of the first two parts, well worth while.

It takes time because, owing to the necessity for condensing many important facts into small space, text-books are apt to be dry and statistical; and one must do a great deal of reading up—current and classical—to have a good grip on the subject and present the facts as we want the Juniors to have them. It isn't often possible for Juniors to have text-books; and with all the homework the schools demand, you cannot often ask them to look up things or write papers.

Perhaps other Juniors meet as mine do, after the long day in school, when wriggling and jumping are very necessary for them, and much more to their taste than sitting still. Great application is out of the question, and yet the work must be done.

Not long ago, in England, I heard a missionary from Australia make an address, and in the beginning he laid down two facts: first, that Australia is not New Zealand; second, that the people are not black. And yet it is safe to say that more than one British matron, feeling in her pocket for the smallest coin available for the contribution, gave it in pity for those "poor black heathen savages," and in twenty-four hours was hazy as to whether she had contributed her mite to New Zealand, or Australia, or the Society Islands.

Our Juniors come from many kinds

of homes and opportunities, and in their turn will spread the interest among people of varied degrees of intelligence and culture, so that to-day, with our mission study classes and Junior-text books, a missionary should need no such preface.

To-day, we are just amused at the delicious New England old lady in Anne Warner's last quaint little story, who scolds "at sending so much good money out of the country, to teach heathen Chinese to wear clothes"; yet there have been times and places when to lots of people there would have been nothing funny in it. They would not know but what that was the paramount object of missions in China. And our Juniors are going to be the audience at missionary meetings, and bear on their shoulders the problems of helping the firing line in the very near future.

Sometimes the Juniors' ideas of geography are rather hazy and difficult to come at. This is no reflection on the splendid work of their hard-working teachers. Half of it is, perhaps, the diffidence of a child to advance an opinion before a grown-up. The other half—well—it isn't too long ago for most of us to remember how, having once scrambled through a recitation and answered our questions without disgrace, we promptly forgot all about it. So the hazy ideas must be cleared up, for facts of climate and surroundings, isolation or accessibility, customs and traditions, give the key to the people's needs. It is not enough to know that mittens go to Alaska and summer clothing down South. There are cold mountains in Tennessee, and there are rainy seasons in Africa. If we do not know about a country, how shall we know what the people most want, and how can we intelligently supply their needs? I have put the giving first, but it doesn't belong there. If our study has

fulfilled its object, giving the Juniors a real and living picture of the people and conditions, so as to enable them to put themselves in their place, they will know what to pray for, what are the difficulties of the missionaries and the needs of the people, that demand the Juniors' prayers as much as their work.

Can anyone be interested in a thing she does not know about; and do we ever pray for a thing we are not interested in? We may *say* prayers, but that is quite another thing. One must make the Juniors realize so deeply and bring the facts so close home to them, by comparison with the children of the far countries, that they will feel it is not an abstract question for missionary meetings and grown-ups, but very much their own business to see what they can do about it.

But we only half study missions when we study them without the Bible. There are our marching orders. Have you ever tried to get missionary verses from your Juniors? I know there are no brighter or better Juniors anywhere than St. John's Juniors, yet when I first asked for such verses, it was like dropping a bomb—except for the silence which followed. I think it is only that they had not read the Bible from that point of view. They went home to hunt, with more or less success.

But one Junior came back sorrowful, having found there were no missionary verses in the Bible. So we gathered round our table (for it is so much easier to talk things over sitting comfortably around a table with your elbows on it), and we decided that, if there was nothing about missions in the Bible, there was no need for the big Auxiliary, and we needn't put in our time every fortnight finding out where the Light of the Gospel is needed and how to help get it there; because our Captain's orders for us, His soldiers and servants, are in that Book, and if He doesn't care about missions, we needn't. You know that, with a little help, it didn't take those Juniors long to find that the Bible was uncomfortably full of missionary verses; uncomfortably,

that is, for the many who, instead of praying, "Lord, I will go unless the door is shut," say, "Lord, I will stay unless I am pushed."

AFRICA, FOR EXAMPLE

At this time we are listening to the great cry of Africa, and endeavoring to understand it. Geography, and its Siamese twin, History, we must have, trying, on the one hand, to have enough to make Africa real to us, and, on the other, not to turn our hour into a geography lesson for the lesson-weary Juniors.

"A pear-shaped continent where the people wear no clothes" was the average idea on the subject; so we talked about Egypt, which had only the pyramids to recommend it to most of the children. But when we gathered by degrees the wonderful stories of Moses and the slave-drivers; the tragedy of the Passover; the horror of thick darkness; the beautiful story of Joseph; and, more than all, followed the flight of the Blessed Virgin and Holy Babe, with some of the lovely legends thereon, those Juniors realized that there was a good deal about Africa in the Bible, and thought it was a very lovely thing that the Saviour's Feet had pressed the very soil of this saddest, darkest country. And when we hunted up "Ethiopia shall soon stretch out her hands unto God," they wriggled into their seats, and prepared to go at the study of Africa with all their might.

But two weeks is a long time, even supposing there are no storms or sickness among the Juniors to make it longer, so your flashlights and facts must be very telling and terse and rememberable.

We spoke of the statues of the four Continents at the first World's Fair, noticing that Europe, Asia and America stood strong and fair and erect, while Africa crouched hopeless and cast-down. The next thing was to bring out the reason why she was so represented, and what we could do about it.

We followed the early explorers with our ears, and with our pencils on the outline maps, partly because it was interesting to watch Necho's hired sailors, when provisions ran out, get off and plant their corn and wait for it to grow; partly because Prince Henry was the first missionary to Africa, and principally because the difficulties of exploration give the reason why Africa has not had the Gospel Light long ago.

We spent an hour with Mohammed, because, where Juniors will wriggle at classifications and boundaries, they sit up and take notice of the story of the great white stone which fell from Heaven and turned black with the kisses of sinners. They like to watch the sweep of that army, with its ready swords and its "Think as I do, or die!" (like that most persuasive missionary, Clovis), marching across Africa and Spain, making history; and of great Charles the Hammer. This was to give them an idea of this religion of the sword, whose 50,000,000 followers make one of the tremendous difficulties of the Church's work in Africa. They should have a practical knowledge of just how things are, and not picture a missionary, hymn-book in one hand and Bible in the other, arriving to find rows of kneeling natives begging for the Gospel.

We have talked about the coast swamps and jungles and tableland, because fever and cataracts and deserts all have to do with the deadly difficulty of missionary work. We know a few mountains, partly because of the part they play in the African's superstitious imagination, partly to save our face if our diocesan secretary should ever question us about Africa. We have written a few rivers and lakes on our memories and maps, because some of the noblest stories of missionary heroism belong to those lakes and rivers, and they make all the difference in the world to our missionaries in opening up the country for Christ and reaching the people. We are interested in railroads, proposed and actual, for the bearing they will have on the question. We stop along the way

for glimpses of the wonderful strange country, for the better you know a thing the more interested you are in it.

And there we have stopped for the present. Historically and geographically there is enough of interest to study in Africa to last for months. But we have to be careful not to lose sight of our objective point in the fascinating details, and that point is the uplift of the people and our part in it. So far, we have taken up the different peoples in Africa with their uncomfortable little homes; the way they attend to their work; their unsanitary way of burying the dead in the house; the housekeeping and food and dress; and, more than all, the babies and children. And if you do it well, you will see in the Junior's eye that she is comparing her own home and way of living with the little African.

At a working meeting, when they sew for their sale and Christmas work, they are encouraged to tell what they remember about each thing; and for the next meeting one Junior will write a very little story about an African home, or pretend she is an African girl and tell her story, or tell about the babies. It is hard to find a Junior without a baby brother or sister, generally several, and every Junior is a baby worshipper; so it is easy to arouse their interest and sympathy in the story of the woolly-haired babies, carefully revised from "Daybreak in the Dark Continent." When they think, What if it was their own little baby brother or sister! they are glad to realize that the pennies from their Easter sale are going to send people to take care of the little babies, and to teach them of the Christ who took little children up in His arms and blessed them.

WHY SEND OUR MONEY AWAY?

At the meeting just before Christmas a question arose which made it seem wise to side-track Africa for the hour. We had planned to do some Santa Clausing among some of our very poor in this city, and when I described the

families and what they needed, one Junior asked if it wouldn't be better to spend our money and do our work right here at home instead of sending it away. (Doesn't that have a familiar sound to your ears?) So we sat round our table again, and talked it over with that invaluable first chapter of the "Why and How" in mind. We found that, though it was a very right thing for us to do to help our own poor—and Christ would want us to do it; yet in this city there are the Associated Charities, the Salvation Army, and ever so many other organizations, every church (one to every few blocks), standing ready to help all who need and give a Christmas to everyone.

And every few hundred people here have a church and a good pastor, while "over there" there are thousands and thousands who never have a chance. Three thousand three hundred places to help and feed and uplift in New York alone—and in China cities of 300,000 people, without one such place, or one voice to speak of Christ or Christmas! For every ninety-six cents we spend at home, we send four cents abroad, and as small a proportion of teachers and preachers; so we want to help where help is most badly needed.

Then we took our Bibles and found the beautiful Christmas prophecies in the Old Testament: "Behold a Virgin shall conceive"; "For unto us a Child is born"; "Gentiles shall come to Thy light," etc., and their answering verses in the New Testament. (We wondered, in passing, if Herod's wise men had as much trouble in finding Malachi as we had when we wanted "And thou, Bethlehem, Ephratah"!) Then we turned to "Arise, shine, for thy Light is come," and then read the Story of the Shepherds and the *Gloria in Excelsis*. Every time you read that, if you are ever so old, there is something new and more beautiful about it, and I know the Juniors found it so.

Then they were asked to find the great missionary verse in that chapter, and there was much hunting and cogitation. But at last it came: "Tidings of great joy . . . to all people." Then, "Will Christmas Day make any difference to these children in Africa?" Why, no! When we are all having such a happy time at our church and at home, they will be having the same hard, stupid day, scared to death by the same unkind spirits, nothing to make them happy, no one to tell them of the great Love that came into the world to live for them and die for them, and Who has them continually in His loving keeping.

"Well, haven't they any business with Christmas? Wasn't it meant for them?" "Good tidings—unto all people—why haven't they any Christmas-tree?" "Because no one has told them." "Didn't Christ want them told?" "Preach the Gospel to every creature." "How long ago was that? Perhaps there hasn't been time." "Nearly two thousand years ago, and if the President of the United States or the King of England wanted a message sent all over the world, it would be done in eighteen hours." "Did Christ expect us to do anything about it?" "Go ye."

Then, while it was hot in our minds, we prayed that in our Christmas joy we might remember and pray for those who knew no Christmas, and those who have left home and friends to tell them about it, and that before another Christmas our prayers and our pennies might bring Christmas to at least one little child.

For the great point seems to me, in all the more or less fussy details of work and study, never to lose the great objective aim—that sewing, and studying, and praying are all to help the great work of Christ and His Church, "to give Light to them that sit in darkness, and to guide their feet unto the Way of Peace."

Forty-third Annual Report.

Another milestone has been passed and the work of the Indians' Hope completed for the forty-third year of its existence. While our activities have confined themselves largely to the old and established channels of usefulness, the interest in the mission work in the various Indian fields has been well sustained and the attendance good, in mid-winter reaching ninety and one hundred, except in the Christmas season.

All the boxes, valued at 2497.72, asked for were supplied and the girls at Saint Mary's School have been helped by

gifts of clothing or other needed articles. The Indian scholarship was also maintained. The Treasurer's total receipts were \$4132 23, rather more than the amount given last year. All the specials have been filled, the amount given for the year being \$2,441.36. While the specials have been met and the amount given does not differ materially from that of 1908, there has been greater difficulty in getting the money in and some anxiety felt as to whether the Indians' Hope would meet its obligations. It is earnestly hoped that gifts may be larger and more generous in the coming year.

The progress made in Alaska, as well as its present needs, have been brought before us in a very vivid and interesting way by Mr. Chapman and Miss Woods, who have been present at our meetings to tell us of the work being done in that far-off portion of our country. Deaconess Sabine, too, has been with us describing the difficulties and dangers which confront the missionaries and the devotion and self-sacrifice of Mr. Chapman. All agree that the future of the church in Alaska depends largely upon the children, and plead for funds to provide schools where they may be trained and educated.

Bishop Hare and Mr. Clark have brought us report of the progress made in the missionary field of South Dakota. Through the presentation of their needs by the bishop, the boarding schools at Chamberlain and Rapid City were added to our specials. It is pleasant to know that the Dakotas are becoming good carpenters, able to build or repair their own churches without outside help. Much sorrow has been felt by our members over the failing health of Bishop Hare, and prayers have been offered for his relief from pain.

At one of the mid-winter meetings Archdeacon Smith gave us an account of the conditions in Oklahoma and plead for increased interest in helping to build some of the few mission stations in that vast territory of 40,000 square miles, where, until now, the church has been able to do so little. It is encouraging to know that Christian work is gaining a hold in the hearts of these Indians, though progress is made but slowly, owing to their disaffection to the government. Report has come by letter from the missions in Utah and Florida, and from Miss Dickson, in her far-away post on the plains of South Dakota.

The Indians' Hope regrets the loss of Miss Sibyl Carter, in whom all Indian women have lost a devoted friend; also the removal by death of Miss Mary Lewis, one of our oldest and most faithful members.

Attention has been called in our meetings to the need of

broadening the interest in Indian missions by trying to increase the number of parishes sending delegates to this branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, and some discussion has taken place as to the best means of interesting young girls out of school in the work of the Indians' Hope. The fields are already white unto the harvest; should we not all try this coming year to gather in more laborers that all may have some share in the work of His vineyard and perhaps hear at the end the Master's voice saying for him the words of praise, "Well done, good and faithful servant! Enter thou into the joy of thy Lord!"

Thirty-fourth Annual Report.

The end of our year of work calls us to gather the account of what has been done. Our meetings grow in size and the many voices from the field have added interest to them.

We have heard of Nevada from its new Bishop, from far away Alaska, from Rev. I. W. Chapman and from Porto Rico from its Bishop and of the work among our long neglected mountain people from Fr. Lobdell in North Carolina and Fr. Hughson in Tennessee—who are so faithful working among them now—and the widow of North Carolina's Archdeacon Hughson has been with us to tell of the need and the value of the hospital work. The striking thing is that no note of discouragement reaches our ears. Every-

where the Church is welcomed and her progress is only halted for lack of means. While so many are certainly giving both time and money, there yet remain scores of our fellow churchmen and women still deaf to hear and blind to see the needs. To the members of this committee this seems impossible.

The year's reports are creditable and clearly show that at least some of us "have done what we could."

One hundred and twenty-four boxes valued at \$12,477.48 have been given to cheer and comfort needy ones. Parishes have sent money direct to the sum of \$1,188, the Treasurer shows her receipts to be \$8,446.97, making a total of \$22,132.45. The one painful thing in the review of this year's work of the Pennsylvania Branch of the Women's Auxiliary is that we have failed to meet our apportionment. This is sad. This Committee has again paid the salary of one Missionary Bishop, and this year owing to the splendid gift of one of our delegates we have even overrun the \$3,000 and added the \$300 for his travelling expenses which the Board always adds.

It may interest you to state, that in examining the records of this branch of the Woman's Auxiliary since 1879, I find that to date, the gifts of this Committee in money are \$167,282.66 and the valuation of the boxes sent is \$591,606.41, a total of \$758,889.07. Let us thank God that we have been so helpful in carrying on the blessed work of "making His way known on earth."

Since our last annual meeting dear Mrs. Whitaker has entered into rest. On another page will be found the action taken by our Executive Committee. I may add that the proposed memorial was gladly given at a cost of \$5,000 and a suitable tablet in brass in the chapel of the Church Training and Deaconess' House records it.

Two of our delegates have been claimed by death during the year, Mrs. Thomas Bell, wife of the Rector of St. Stephen's, Clifton Heights, a new branch, and Miss Elizabeth Morris, delegate from the Chapel of the Prince of Peace, always devoted and beloved. Another loss has fallen upon us with the whole Church, in the death of Mr. George C. Thomas. The minute adopted by this Committee is appended to this report. The warning thus comes to us to "work while it is day, for the night cometh in which no man can work."

Once more with grateful thanks to you all for your faithful help, I submit my report.

Report for the Year.

Our Branch has held its nine regular meetings with all its officers in their places and the delegates quite regular in their attendance. Our September meeting was preceded by a Corporate Communion Service, to which, by the courtesy of the President, the members of the Mission Study Classes were invited. About fifty people listened with interest to the earnest address by Rev. J. T. Cole on the Gospel for the day, the Call of St. Matthew; which call "to leave all and follow Christ" was very real to us when after our business meeting Mr. Stokes, the son of one of our delegates, told of his work amongst the plague-stricken sufferers in India. He asked for our prayers and interest only.

In October the Rev. Mr. Matthews, who is the only white

priest in Liberia, told us of his work and of the need of an Industrial School in that country.

In November Miss Mann described her pioneer life in Japan and bespoke our earnest prayers and interest in her life in her new station, Ytsunomuya. Again, in April, Rev. St. George Tucker made his earnest and logical appeal for progressive and enlarging educational efforts in that wonderful country.

In December we had an appeal from Mr. Millidge P. Walker for funds to enlarge St. John's University, Shanghai. At present they are obliged to refuse about three of four times as many students as they can accommodate. In January our efficient and faithful worker, Rev. F. A. Huntington, at our most distant China Station, Ichang, pleaded for buildings in which to carry on the great work there.

In February Miss Schott thrilled and shamed us by a paper showing the opportunities and our shameful neglect of them in Mexico.

Our Lenten meeting was, as usual, on the spiritual aspect of Auxiliary work, and was addressed by Rev. A. Van Meter. In May China is to be brought again to us by Miss Porter and Rev. Mr. MacRae.

Many letters of thanks have been received and read and many requests granted. The most notable was \$1,200 sent to complete the Catechetical School under Rev. Mr. Littell and the completion of the \$800 fund for land in Wuchang promised to Rev. Mr. Wood. A fine sum was raised for Ankin as a thank offering for the escape of our missionaries there during the recent riots. Nice boxes have been sent to Japan, China and Africa, with books and Christmas gifts.

The pledges were all paid by April, leaving us the hope that the committee appointed to raise a thank offering for Japan may be successful in sending a large amount to celebrate our half century of progressive work there. This story of Japan was told us at our Epiphany meeting, held on a Sunday afternoon, at the Church of the Holy Apostles, by the Rev. Mr. Correll and the Bishop of Wyoming, Rt. Rev. Nathaniel Thomas.

Although we can report few new parish branches who are sending delegates to our branch, we hear that in two auxiliaries they have undertaken to pay the expenses of a missionary worker at a foreign field.

Also that through the R. L. M. Mission Study Class Alumnae a native priest and his Catechist at Ichang, China, are being supported.

Through the delegates from the Alumnae the profits from the Church Missionary Calendar, \$360, have been given for the support of native priests in foreign lands.

These gifts will go toward the \$16,000 which Miss Emery asks from us to meet the appropriation of the Board.

On February 25th we co-operated with other church workers in an all-day Institute to demonstrate Educational Missionary Methods.

Such, in brief, is the record of the year, but we cannot close without a word of sorrow for the faithful delegates whose work on earth is over and whose place it is impossible to fill; such as Mrs. Bell, Mrs. Davis, Miss Field and many others. We must take ours and their share and, as has been said, "there must be fewer shirkers," those who stand at the edge of the church and do nothing, fewer jerkers, those whose activities are spasmodic, and more workers—those who never lose their vision of the world-wide enterprise.

In twenty words Moffat gave Livingstone his life's vision when he said: "I have sometimes seen in the morning sun the smoke of a thousand villages where no missionary has ever been." Should not the messages these modern Moffats, fresh from the field, have brought us of opportunities and responsibility give us a new vision, for surely God has revealed His purpose that the Gospel shall be preached in some places at all times and in all places at some time. Shall it be our beautiful liturgy and through our dear church?

Report for the Year.

Once more we are called upon to present our report of work accomplished by our committee during the past year.

We note with gratitude that our receipts have been greatly in excess of former years; but this is owing to the splendid and most successful efforts of the Tuesday Missionary Bible Class, who have been doing a great work for that most excellent and deserving institution, St. Augustine's School, Raleigh, N. C.

Two of the members of the class visited the school at the time of the fire which destroyed St. Agnes' Hospital, and were moved to such enthusiasm by what they saw that upon their return they were able by their untiring efforts to interest many others outside of the class and even of the Diocese, and to raise nearly \$6,000 for rebuilding the hospital. This shows what can be accomplished by whole-souled devotion and zeal on behalf of a worthy cause. We trust that many will follow so good an example.

A step in the right direction will be to respond to the appeal of the Rev. Dr. Lloyd, that each member of the Woman's Auxiliary should this summer endeavor to raise \$50, which would indeed go far towards lightening the burden borne by the Board of Missions, to which we claim to be "auxiliary." During the past year, in addition to the salaries

and scholarships renewed, we have sent many valuable boxes of clothing to missionaries and their families, including an artificial leg to a missionary who could not otherwise have accomplished the work to which he desired to consecrate his life.

Whatever our efforts may have been, however, there is much left to be done, far more than we can hope to accomplish unless church people and philanthropists will rouse themselves to a greater interest in this branch of mission work, and to give at least as liberally to their colored brethren as to those who have been cast in a red or yellow mould. To this end a most interesting expedition was made towards the end of May by a party who went on a special car as guests of the American Church Institute for Negroes, to be present at the dedication of the new St. Agnes' Hospital, Raleigh, N. C., and the commencement exercises at St. Paul's School, Lawrenceville, Va.

To quote from a letter written by one of our officers, who was of the party: "I wish that more people could have gone on the trip, for everything was above my expectations at both schools, and it seems only necessary to see the work for people to be enthusiastic about it."

It is purposed to hold a meeting about the middle of November, in the interest of the American Church Institute and of St. Paul's School, Lawrenceville, Va., at which Bishop Greer, of New York, and other noted speakers will endeavor to present this vital question of our duty towards the Negro, in its true light, and it is earnestly hoped that the attendance will be large and the outcome fruitful in enthusiasm and good work, and, more than all, that it will do much to promote an understanding of the situation which cannot fail to arouse the brotherly love of those who desire to follow in the steps of the Master, who is no respecter of persons and who ever preached the brotherhood of man.

I cannot close these remarks without alluding to the irreparable loss which we, in common with all the other committees, have sustained in the death of Mr. Thomas. Well may there be mourning throughout the land. Where shall his like be found again? What, we ask ourselves, is to become of the widow, the fatherless, the poor, the struggling of whatever class—whether individuals, churches or institutions who looked to his hand and never looked in vain. May God have mercy on them all and on him may light perpetual shine.

Report for the Year

The meetings during the past year have been full of encouragement. Never before has the Diocesan Committee had so large an attendance nor has the number of boxes been so great. The financial condition, too, has improved.

Mrs. Silvester, our late president, having passed into life eternal on March 14th, 1908, the Bishop appointed Mrs. Nathaniel S. Thomas to fill her place and Mrs. Matthew Randall to take the place of Mrs. Thomas as Secretary.

The first address of the year was made by Rev. J. J. D. Hall, the new President of Galilee Mission, who spoke most enthusiastically of the work being done in this mission among the very lowest of God's creatures.

At the October meeting we had the pleasure of hearing Dr. Perry who spoke to us of the Church Training and Deaconess' House, giving us a very clear insight into the work of this institution, both past and present, and urging us all to avail ourselves of the privileges of the classes and lectures, open to everyone.

Addresses were also made by Miss Falkner on the Italian Mission and its needs, by Rev. Mr. McDuffy of St. Augustine's Mission, who made a strong appeal for a suitable building in which to hold divine services as at present their only room is over a stable. Mr. Fleming-James told us of the work at St. Anna's Mission in West Philadelphia, where the prospects are most encouraging.

Rev. Mr. Bakewell-Green spoke of the Beloved Disciple, giving an outline of the struggle for life that it has undergone since its organization more than twenty-five years ago. It is now, however, on a solid basis and is doing excellent work.

Rev. Mr. Phillips told of his work, not only in his parish of the Crucifixion, but of his Summer Home on the West Chester Pike, where he says almost miracles are worked in restoring health to sick babies and mothers. Two hundred people (colored), were cared for at this home during the past summer.

The address at the March meeting was made by Rev. Mr. Provost of St. Ambrose Mission which is now out of debt and the work going on in a most encouraging way.

Mrs. Grice told us of the Vacation Bible Schools, making a strong appeal for helpers. There were fifty-four men and women engaged in this work last summer but many more are needed.

We also had an address by Rev. Mr. Miller of St. Nathaniel's who urged us to make every effort towards helping to build a suitable church, one being greatly needed in that section.

At our April meeting we had the pleasure of short addresses from our three parish workers, Deaconess Albyn-Jones of St. Nathaniel's, Miss Brown of St. George's and Miss Whit-house of St. Ambrose. They all made us feel it a privilege to have our share in the work being done in these missions.

During the year we have lost by death two of our delegates, Mrs. Bell, of St. Stephens, Clifton Heights and Mrs. de Long, of St. Martins-in-the-Fields, St. Martins. We also mourn the loss of Mrs. Ozi W. Whitaker and Mrs. William B. Stevens, so dear to the hearts of all the members of the Woman's Auxiliary.

One hundred and thirty-seven boxes have been sent to various objects of Diocesan interest as well as a piano to St. George's Mission from the Tuesday Missionary Bible Class.

It is deeply hoped that the rectors and parish presidents of the Woman's Auxiliary of all our parishes will appreciate the need of sending delegates to our meetings; the work is at our very door, and it is within the power of every church to help. We need clothing of all kinds, furniture, etc., and we feel sure if those parishes not represented at present would send delegates that they would find the work most interesting.

The committee is deeply grieved at the thought of losing their dear president, Mrs. N. S. Thomas, and our prayers go up for her and Bishop Thomas that they may be blessed in their new field and be filled with the encouragement which comes to all missionaries who have the privilege of carrying light and hope to those who need God's help.

Report of the Secretary, 1908-1909

The officers of the Pennsylvania Junior Auxiliary again report for the Auxiliary a year of growth and of increasingly effective aid given to the Board of Missions, and thus to the many mission fields of the Church.

The gift from all the Juniors of the Diocese was made this year (according to the vote of its leaders) for General Missions—Missions all over the world. Our apportionment was raised from \$1,000 to \$1,400 which the Treasurer's report shows has been more than made up. The increase in our giving is not wholly due to the assistance of new branches, for on account of the absence or illness of their leaders several old branches have been obliged to give up work for this year. Our increase in membership is therefore only five. (Seventy-two active branches as against sixty-seven last year). We hope that next year the old branches will begin work again, and that many more new ones will join us. The Junior Department of the Diocese will not have reached the limit of its growth until all the younger members of the Diocese are engaged in active work for Missions.

Two Normal Classes have been conducted by the Junior Educational Secretary, one for leaders of the older and one for leaders of the younger Juniors. The membership was thirty-two in both classes.

BABIES' BRANCH

This organization has existed in our diocese as well as in others for some years, having first been started in the Diocese of New York. During the past year it has been made a department of the Woman's Auxiliary.

This is a more important department of woman's work than the name would indicate. Many a young woman who brings a precious child to holy baptism has received her first inspiration, to give to missions, through this branch. The small box is provided (if the mother be willing to accept it) in which to drop one cent each Sunday for the baby, uttering the prayer found printed on the box that "God bless all the missionaries and all the little helpers." When old enough the little one is taught the prayer, the cent is dropped into the box, and the first interest in missions is awakened in the young child's heart.

After Easter of each year the boxes are collected and the contents sent by check to the Treasurer and forwarded to increase the sum given for General Missions. From a small beginning the work increases rapidly. The Branch Secretary learns through the baptisms recorded the names and addresses of the baptized children and brings the matter to the attention of the mothers.

If some earnest woman in each parish would call her Rector's attention to this branch of the Woman's Auxiliary we might have a larger growth and stronger—for that Rector would then appoint a Branch Secretary to represent his parish—and this gentle and beautiful branch would be a real and substantial aid to the Woman's Auxiliary.
