REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Another year of work and responsibility is now closing, and it becomes the duty of the Executive Committee of the Pennsylvania Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to present its report.

Several parishes have formed new branches, and to them the Committee extends a cordial welcome.

Several members of the Committee have had the privilege of attending the summer schools at Cambridge and Silver Bay, and it is greatly to be desired that all members of the Auxiliary should bear these conferences in mind and make some effort to be present at either one or the other.

The annual meeting was held as usual at the Church of the Holy Trinity, to which parish the Auxiliary owes a deep debt of gratitude for the cordial welcome it always receives there. The attendance was rather larger than usual and special interest was expressed in the work of Bishop Thomas, of Wyoming, so lately the rector of the Church of the Holy Apostles. The other speakers were the Bishop of South Dakota, the Rev. Dr. Pott, of China, and the Rev. Mr. Bishop. Miss Emery addressed the conference in the Parish House.

At the Lenten meeting Bishop Rowe spoke of Indian and domestic missions in Alaska, and the Rev. Mr. Caley ably presented the needs of missions in this diocese. The Rev. Mr. Boyd told of educational work among the negroes.

Instead of the usual Epiphany meeting, the Foreign Committee, during that season, held a conference of diocesan officers and parish branches to discuss methods of rousing interest in foreign missions.

In the last report the Committee urged that a special effort be made to meet the apportionment as a tribute to the memory of Mr. George C. Thomas, and it is hoped that the end may be attained.

The meetings of the General Convention always bring renewed enthusiasm, and it is hoped that in Cincinnati the Auxiliary may be stirred up to greater zeal and holier consecration.

"Some are fallen asleep"

**Notes of a Sermon by Rev. Geo. L. Richardson, rector
of St. Mary's, preached at the service of the
annual presentation of the United Offering,
April 26, 1910.**

Romans xiv, 7: "None of us liveth to himself."

I ask you to notice that this is not stated as a theory, but as a fact. It is not "none of us ought to live to himself," but "none of us liveth"—actually does live—to himself. It might have been said with equal truth (and St. Paul does imply) that none of us can live to himself. God has so made and ordered His world that we must, whether we will or no, depend on one another, live for one another, and become our highest and best selves only through our relations with one another. We exist in relations. There never was a child born into the world who was or could be an isolated individual.

First of all, the child finds himself in the family. He has kinsfolk not of his own choice, but because he is born of a certain father and mother, and whether he likes it or not, there are those ties, made for him before he ever came into the world at all. As he grows, and goes out of the home circle, he finds other relations awaiting him. There are neighbors, schoolmates, fellow-citizens, among whom he must live and with whom he must deal, with increasing responsibility. By and bye the widening network takes in the nation, and through the nation even the obscurest of us touches somehow not only the whole world, but humanity, past, present and future. We may stop here, and for the moment leave out of consideration the widest and most permanent relationship of all, the bond that binds us to God Himself, who is above all and in all and through all. Enough has been said to show how true it is that none of us liveth to himself.

It is indeed true that vry rarely do we realize or try to fulfill all these relationships. On the contrary, with many of us the effort is constantly made, if not to deny and defy them, at any rate to limit them, to recognize them only so far as it suits our own convenience, to hedge ourselves about with barriers of class and caste, of restricted sympathy and selfish egotism, beyond which we will not go. But such action on our part does not destroy those relationships and the resulting duties. There they are and there they will remain, whether we try to fulfill them or not, and the more we consider the matter the more clearly we shall see that the ideal life would be one which made no differences nor

distinctions, but reached out through all the expanding circles, family, community, nation, the human race, and strove to be to each all that he ought to be. The ideal life would take account of all and be true to all.

But stop! Must we say "the ideal life would be" this? Is it mere speculation that constructs such an ideal for our guidance? Ah, no! The ideal life is no dream of poet or philosopher. For the Christian at any rate, it is a concrete fact. The ideal life has been lived, "leaving us an example that we should follow His steps." In Jesus Christ our Lord we see illustrated perfectly St. Paul's great saying that none of us liveth to himself, for in Him we see all relationships taken up, realized, fulfilled and glorified. In Him we see what man may be.

Whether we look at Him in the home at Nazareth, where He lived "subject to" His parents, and grew up "in favor with God and man"; or whether we note His high patriotism, which yearned over the nation to which He belonged "according to the flesh," until the very sight of Jerusalem moved Him to tears; or when at last we behold Him lifted up upon the cross, that He might "draw all men unto Him," we find Him striving to fulfill every relationship in the widest and fullest way, never narrowing His interest nor withholding His sympathy, but on the contrary stepping over and breaking down that "wall of partition" which the restricted ideas of His fellow-Israelites had built up between them and the rest of mankind.

Now the obligation to work for missions, at home and abroad, rests fundamentally upon this great principle which St. Paul here lays down, and which our Lord so perfectly exemplified in His pattern life. "None of us liveth to himself"—these relations in which we stand to our fellow men are the divinely ordered conditions of our very life! We did not make them, and we cannot abrogate them. To see them, acknowledge them, and so far as we can, live up to them is a primary duty of our humanity. Christ added nothing to that duty, but He illuminated it by showing us how it must be fulfilled, in Him and through Him. We no longer have to attempt the stupendous task alone. We are "workers together with" Him in the great process of the Kingdom of Heaven. How this revolutionizes the whole matter of our giving! I imagine that many persons, if they were asked why God wills that we should give our money to missions, would reply, "to save the heathen." But *we* are not needed to save the heathen. God can do that. He lets us give, not to save the heathen, but to save ourselves! To save us from the narrowness and selfishness of those who know no better than

to live unto themselves, from the failure that must be the portion of one who does not fulfill the purpose of his creation. In other words, the unselfish life, the Christ-life, is the *normal* life of man.

This whole service beautifully expresses, in concrete form, the great inspiring thought of the text. The purpose of the service is, in the first place, an *offering*. That means unselfishness, giving out, and not taking in, and if it be an offering in the highest sense, it implies that the material gift carries with it the spiritual dedication. We give our money as the pledge and symbol that we give ourselves.

Then secondly, it is an offering for *missions*. It reaches out to the farthest limit of our capacity to help our fellow-men. It takes in the widest relationship, and so acknowledges, in definite, practical acceptance of responsibility, that we do not live unto ourselves and do not want to live unto ourselves. We would be all that we can be, all that God wills us to be to those whose lives He has bound up with ours in the great family of the human race.

It is, in the third place, a *United Offering*. That is, we are doing this work, not as separate individuals, but working together, in the fellowship of the Church, which is above all other agencies the means which God has appointed for drawing men into the right relation to one another. Here we step out of our individual environment, out of parochial boundaries, and reach hand to hand to do a united work—a recognition of the fact that “none of us liveth to himself.”

And then, lastly, we do all this at the Holy Communion. We make our United Offering for Missions through Jesus Christ our Lord, commemorating and pleading that supreme “sacrifice, oblation and satisfaction for the sins of the whole world” in which is gathered up the whole wide purpose of God and the whole relation of man. As we kneel together at this altar and partake of the broken Body and the shed Blood, surely we must not only realize that in the divine plan “none of us liveth to himself,” but must feel ourselves drawn into the mighty, loving purpose of Him who came “to seek and to save that which was lost.”

CONSTITUTION

OF THE

Pennsylvania Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE I.

Name.

The name of this Association shall be the Pennsylvania Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE II.

Object.

The object of the Association shall be to carry out within the Diocese of Pennsylvania the purposes and work of the Woman's Auxiliary as approved by the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE III.

Organization.

To accomplish these various objects this Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary is organized into five standing Committees—Indians' Hope, Domestic, Foreign, Work among the Colored People, and the Diocesan. The Chairman of each Committee is to be appointed by the Bishop, with the exception of the Indians' Hope, which must follow its own constitution, as it antedates the formation of the Woman's Auxiliary.

ARTICLE IV.

Membership.

The Church itself is the Missionary Society. Every baptized person is a member of the Society; therefore, every baptized woman in the Diocese should be an active member of this Auxiliary.

ARTICLE V.

Officers.

The officers of this Association shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Secretary, an Assistant Secretary, a Treasurer, an Assistant Treasurer, a Treasurer for the United Offering and two officers of the Junior Department. These shall serve for one year and shall be eligible for renomination.

An Annual Meeting of the Executive Committee shall be held on the first Wednesday in May, when appointments by the Bishop shall be announced, nominations having been made by written ballot at the previous meeting.

ARTICLE VI.

Executive Committee.

The general management is entrusted to an Executive Board, composed of the Diocesan officers, the officers of the Standing Committees, the Chairman of the Mexican Work, the Chairman of the Cuban Work, the Assistant Treasurer of the United Offering, and the Librarian.

ARTICLE VII.

Duties of the President.

The President shall preside at all meetings of the Executive Committee. She shall appoint all members of committees necessary for the transacting of the work of the Executive Committee. She shall be ex-officio member of all committees. She shall visit Parish Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary when invited, and seek opportunity to establish branches in parishes where there are none and fill all other duties pertaining to her office.

ARTICLE VIII.

Duties of the Vice Presidents.

In the absence of the President a Vice-President shall preside at meetings of the Executive Committee and fill all duties belonging to the office.

ARTICLE IX.

Secretary.

The Secretary shall give notice of all meetings ordered by the Executive Committee. She shall keep a record of such meetings, and prepare and present Minutes at each meeting. She shall prepare an abstract of the Minutes of the year for the Annual Report. She shall send a copy of the Annual Report to every officer of the Executive Committee, to every Rector, Minister in Charge, and Missionary of the Diocese of Pennsylvania, to the General Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, and to the President of every Branch throughout the Church.

The Secretary shall advertise public meetings in such ways as seem best.

ARTICLE X.

Treasurer.

It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to take charge of the funds belonging to the Executive Committee, and to deposit them in such banking institution as has been selected by the Executive Committee of the Pennsylvania Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, to be drawn thence upon the cheque of the Treasurer or Assistant Treasurer, for the purpose of the Executive Committee, as ordered by that Committee. All bills sent to the Treasurer must be countersigned by the purchaser before payment. The Treasurer shall present an itemized report in writing at each stated meeting of the Executive Committee. She shall prepare a report of all funds in her charge for the Annual Meeting. Her books shall be audited by a Committee appointed by the President. It is recommended that the payments of each standing committee to the Annual Report Fund be made and the books closed by June first of each year.

ARTICLE XI.

Publication Committee.

The President shall appoint annually a Committee on the Publication of the Annual Report, said Committee to consist of the Treasurer and Secretary from each of the five Standing Committees, with a Chairman. This Committee shall receive all copy, typewritten, for the Annual Report and take entire charge of its publication. It shall be the duty of this Committee to estimate amount per page due the Annual Report Fund from each of the five Standing Committees, and the United Offering, after receiving bill from the printer.

The Current Expense Fund of the Executive Committee shall pay for the remaining pages of the Annual Report not belonging to any of the Standing Committees.

ARTICLE XII.

Amendment.

The Constitution can be amended at any regular meeting of the Committee by a two-thirds vote, provided the amendment was submitted in writing at the previous regular meeting.

ARTICLE XIV.

Missionary Services.

There shall be three missionary services during the year—

1. The all-day service on the Friday following the second Thursday in November.
2. The Epiphany service in behalf of Missions in the foreign field.
3. The Lenten service.

ARTICLE XV.

Annual Meeting.

The annual Business Meeting shall be held at noon on the Friday following the second Thursday in November.

United Offering of the Pennsylvania Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary

OBJECT OF THE OFFERING OF 1910.

RESOLVED:—That the United Offering of 1910 be given to the Board of Missions for Woman's Work in the Mission Field; including the training, sending and support of women workers; also the care of such workers when sick or disabled; but that a sum not exceeding \$15,000 be devoted to a building or buildings, approved by the Board of Missions on the recommendation of the General Secretary and the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Also, that to our united gifts there shall be added our united and earnest prayers that God will put it in to the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves to the work of the Master, in the Mission Field.

The Indians' Hope, in completing the forty-fourth year of its existence, looks back upon the year just closing with the feeling that the interest in work among the Indians has been maintained in all its departments. The gifts of money have been even more generous than those of a year ago, two new parishes have been added to our branch and new work has been started in some fields which up to this time have had but little of our support and interest. The attendance throughout the year has been good. October and Novem-

ber, January and February being the banner months, the number of delegates represented then ranging from 76 to 100. The specials received for the year amounted to a total of \$4622.57, as against the sum of \$2441.36 for the year 1908-1909. The value of boxes sent this year was \$3087.73, a sum \$600.50 greater than that of last year. The only decrease has been in the total received by the treasurer, the amount this year being \$2490.33 as against the sum of \$4132.23 given last year. Perhaps this loss is counter-balanced by the great increase in the specials of more than \$2000. Special mention should be made of the receipt of Miss Lewis' legacy of \$1000. We have had with us during the year just closing Bishop Johnson, of South Dakota; Bishop Thomas, of Wyoming, and the Bishops of Nevada and Oklahoma; Mr. Hunt, Government Agent at Spokane, and Mr. Prevost, who has told us of the pioneer work in Alaska. Frequent letters have kept us in touch with those isolated parts of the mission field from which the missionary seldom returns to tell his story to us face to face—and all show the work encouraging and the outlook hopeful for the future, from far-away Florida, where the missionaries have just won a hold on the hearts of the Indians of the Everglades, to Miss Thackara and Miss Dixon on the plains of Arizona and South Dakota and the splendid women workers in Alaska.

Among all these who have written or spoken to us, one pen and one voice, often heard and dearly listened to in the past, have been silent. The Indians' Hope has sustained a great loss in the death of Bishop Hare, whose devoted labors for the Indians and whose lovely Christian character have been such a source of inspiration to them for more than thirty years. We have missed his kindly presence from our meetings, but we know that he has gone to his reward and are sure that the work which he built up so wisely and with such loving care during his thirty-three years of labor among the Sioux, is going forward as he would have wished and will endure because it is of God. His mantle has fallen upon a very worthy successor, who deserves from the Indians' Hope the same loyal support which Bishop Hare received. A memorial to take the shape of a large endowment fund to All Saints' School has been planned in loving memory of Bishop Hare.

As the Sioux become grafted not only into the church, but into the body politic as well and show themselves ready to adopt the English language and to compete with the white man in the trades and professions, as many are doing today, shall not the Indians' Hope feel the call to labor for

those less fortunate Indian tribes upon whom the light of the Gospel has shown but dimly, if at all, and who have not had their advantages of mental and spiritual training? There are new fields opening up where the laborers are few and into which the missionary must go if the Indian is to be redeemed. The Shoshone in Wyoming, in spite of years of faithful Christian teaching on the part of a few isolated missionaries, is still practically unreached by the Gospel and remains a heathen in his ways. How he shall get the vision of Christ into his narrow life, lifting him out of ignorance and superstition, is an ever-present problem to Bishop Thomas and his fellow workers. How shall a bond of sympathy be established which shall break down the barriers of race and prejudice and make it possible for the light of the Gospel to shine in? For the first time the Indians' Hope is doing something definite for Wyoming by helping to send a woman missionary among these people.

There is need, too, of support for Bishop Brooke, of Oklahoma, where the work has been slow and discouraging for a long time, but is now making real progress in the hearts of the people.

For the first time, too, our attention has been turned to the great need of the Karoks and other California tribes who are almost entirely without Christian teaching. Shall we not press forward more and more to help in the spirit of Christian fellowship these outcast and oppressed peoples, counting it a blessed privilege if we may bring to them something of that knowledge of Christ and His love for mankind which has redeemed and blessed our own lives.

Thirty-fifth Annual Report

The close of another year of work causes us to review it, and with sorrow I have to tell you that we have not done so well as we did last year. One hundred and eleven boxes have been sent away valued at \$11,402.14; \$371.80 has gone in money in direct gifts to the missionaries, and the Treasurer reports the disbursement of \$5734.10, making a total of \$17,508.04. I would be more grieved at such a falling off in our gifts, did I not feel sure that our loss has been gain to the other committees, so that the Pennsylvania Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary will not seem to have forgotten its duty and its ideals.

We are still waiting and longing to enlist every parish and mission station in our blessed work, and it is with great pleasure I can welcome four more branches.

Our meetings have been well attended during the whole season, and we have never had so many interesting speakers. Bishops Brooke, Talbot, Griswold, Kinsman and Rob-

inson (I name them in the order of their visits) have each given us views of their fields, showing their needs and their opportunities, and I rejoice to say that they have not spoken in vain. We have also had, as visitors of the clergy, the Rev. F. M. Osborne, Rev. Malcolm Taylor, Fr. Hughson and Rev. George P. Mayo. Also Mrs. T. C. Wetmore, carrying on alone the work she and her husband did so well together, before he was called home. The committee has been very generous to them all, but in falling so far short of the salary of a missionary bishop was our greatest failure. You are tired of hearing me say, that this is the direct way of helping the Board in its appropriations and the Pennsylvania Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary in its apportionment of \$16,000. I do beg my dear delegates to see to it that in the fascination of specials we do not forget our first duty to the Board, whose auxiliary we call ourselves. It is responsible to the Missionaries, and we are to see to it that its supplies are abundant.

Praying that God will accept our offerings and help us to make them more abundant,

Report of the Foreign Branch of the Womans Auxiliary

"The secret of all co-operation lies not in the sphere of action or kind of activity, but in the spirit of service," and this spirit seems to have influenced the work of this committee in this, its thirty-sixth season. At all its nine meetings our faithful President has presided and brought to us interesting speakers and letters from those in the foreign field.

On September 20th we had our corporate Communion Service, with an earnest, helpful address from Rev. Mr. Turner. This was followed by our business meeting, when the Treasurer reported having sent, amongst other gifts, \$486.00 towards apportionment, and that over \$2000 had been sent direct from Germantown and Mt. Airy Churches and \$300 from Holy Trinity during the summer.

Rev. Dr. Correll then gave an address, noting the wonderful progress of civilization in Japan and pleading for men and women and money to bring about a similar wondrous miracle in Christianizing Japan. In October Miss Ridgley told of her settlement work in Liberia, and by curios showed many of the superstitions which made life hard for these African girls, and how she is training eighty of them possibly to make future wives for the Christian boys who are studying at Cape Mount School under Rev. Mr. Matthews and his assistants.

In December the committee appointed for St. Paul's College, Tokio, to raise \$200,000 reported having sent out thousands of letters to every Bishop and clergyman in the Church, asking them to observe St. Paul's day as one on which to pray for and to tell their congregations of St. Paul's College and its possibilities as a sphere of influence in the Orient. This report was followed by a spirited address from Mr. Walke, who felt that educated Christian leaders were the greatest need of Japan, and this educational side of missions should appeal to every business man. Superstition and ignorance are the two great hindrances in the way of civilization, and only by advancing and teaching the native can such hindrances be overcome, and he told us to listen to the message from Japan sent by Dr. Motoda, head master of St. Paul's College, Tokyo. "Tell the people in America that we have the biggest opportunity Japan ever presented. If you can show them that the opportunity is real and the money can be wisely expended, they will back you. Americans are too good business men to throw away their money; and they are right, too. But convince them of the wisdom and rightness of a cause and the world has never seen such generosity."

In January and February China was again reported upon. In January Miss Byerley's work, from a recent visitor, Miss Gibson, and through Miss Hubbard, who plead for Miss Wood's library at Wuchang, and in February Dr. Angie Myers told of hospital work in Shanghai, of the care and skill given to thousands of these poor Chinese women and children in a land where superstition and ignorance are rampant. She described the rather unromantic work the foreign doctor and nurses had to do at St. Elizabeth's. Managing an unruly stove in the kitchen, dressing sores, soothing the sick and dying. But she also told of the joy of service, the gratitude received and of the prayers she herself conducts in the wards of St. Elizabeth's Hospital, thus coming in close personal touch with each poor soul groping for the higher life, to take the place of the mere animal existence of most heathen women.

In March we had the Lenten meeting, when Rev. Arthur Sherman showed how by the spiritual side of our lives we too may have our share of the upbuilding of Christ's kingdom, and made us realize that even now two-thirds of the world are living without Christ.

In April Rev. Mr. Nichols plead for money to build a school for catechists in Shanghai, to train natives to do evangelistic work for which, after such schooling, they are so eminently fitted.

Miss Schott read a paper compiled from letters from seven workers in Mexico, describing the herculean work accomplished by Bishop Aves and his faithful but all-too-few assistants and making one feel how unneighborly we are to the harvests so near our border.

In May, Rev. R. C. Wilson, of Zangzok, near Soocherm, told of methods used to win heathen to Christ and how natives give many hints to foreign workers. He pleaded for a woman to join Mrs. Wilson in living at Zangzok.

Our scholarships were all paid by the April meeting and Mrs. Stroud has sent off several boxes, one to Anking, China, and one to Cape Palmas.

An organ was sent also to Harper, Liberia, and some \$155.00 for the famine sufferers in Mexico. Alas! several appeals such as those from Mayebaski, Japan, had to be passed over.

The Church Missionary Callendar was again issued by the R. L. M. Mission Study Class Alumnae, and profits from that which went through this branch of Auxiliary were \$275.00. As do also the salaries of two native priests in China supported by the Alumnae.

Several of our delegates have moved to other cities and we miss Mrs. Gunnell, Mrs. Gassaway, etc., but we hear of their good work in other dioceses. Mrs. Robertson, our faithful representative from Christ Church Hospital, has been called to higher service above.

At the annual meeting of the entire Auxiliary the address for this cause was made by Dr. Pott, from Shanghai, for money to add to the great St. John's College, with its wonderful opportunities.

Instead of the Epiphany missionary meeting, a conference was held of officers of parish Auxiliaries, the subject being "How to increase interest in Foreign Missions." This was ably treated by Mrs. Grice, who spoke on "Prayer"; Mrs. Pilsbry, on "Knowledge," and Mrs. Pancoast, on "Giving."

So our record closes, dull in contrast to the heroic work done by "those that go down to the battle," such as our missionaries in Hankow, who in four years have doubled their

work. It must be glorious, as Mr. Sherman tells us it is, to be there working, but in I Sam. 30:24-25, David writes:

"As his part is that goeth down to the battle, so shall his part be that standeth by the stuff."

In all God's work those who are kept at home and "tarry by the stuff," who by prayer, almsgiving, heart yearning are helping others to know the facts, to go and to plead and to give, shall have equal share in the final result.

We are, or ought to be, the line of communication kept up between the Church at home and the host abroad. Let us see that our supply wagons be heavy, not only with money to fill the many wants, but what is far more precious, the invisible contributions of love and community of interest, and how shall we do this?

Methinks by adding day by day to our prayer life, more knowledge, more intercession, living closer to Christ, who would say to each of us:

"O think not, if thou art not called
To work in mission field
Of some far distant clime,
That thine is no grand mission.
Every deed that comes to thee
In God's appointed time,
Is just the greatest deed that thine could be,
Since God's high will appointed it to thee."

Let us close this report by echoing the words of Bernard Lucas:

"The conception of the Church's responsibilities must deepen into something very much more than mere 'interest' in Foreign Missions. . . . It is not interest but passion, the passion that comes from deep living and high thinking that the Church needs."

Report for the Year

The work of the Committee on Colored Missions grows more interesting as time goes on, because we see each year the splendid results attained, in spite of obstacles, by the Missionaries in this field.

New churches, hospitals and schools are built, making centres of religious influence, extending out into the neighborhoods in which they have been established, and every year an increasing number of young men and women go out from these schools, prepared by the wise education they receive there, some to become the teachers and leaders of their people, and all, in a greater or less degree, fitted to make their living and lead a self-respecting life.

The discouraging side comes in view when we think of the opportunities lost for lack of funds.

The work done for the negroes is so out of proportion to their numbers, as, for instance, in one Southern diocese where the colored population outnumbered the white, there are only two chapels for negroes.

The Southern bishops are straining every nerve to bring these unfortunate sheep into the fold of the Church, but they need more help from the Church at large.

The superiority of Church training is observed everywhere. The negro churchman is a marked man in a community, and negro congregations of the Church invariably stand for law and order.

If results are not always all we could wish, it is not that the Church is unsuited to the negro, but because not enough effort is made to bring the Church to him.

The meetings of the Committee have been well attended this year and have been most interesting.

Addresses were made by Archdeacon Hildebrand, of Nashville; Archdeacon Bright, of Georgia; Rev. Mr. Hunter, Mrs. Hunter and others.

As regards the contributions to this cause, notwithstanding the continued admirable efforts of the Tuesday Missionary Bible Class, we have done about as well as last year, but no better—which is a matter for regret, as one would always like to make at least one step forward.

Especially in the apportionment have we fallen behind. It would be well if the parishes could increase their mid-winter contributions to the Board of Missions, as that is the time, to quote Miss Emery, that the Board "has to borrow money to meet salaries."

Another disappointment was the very small attendance at the meeting held last autumn in the interest of St. Paul's School, Lawrenceville, when Bishop Greer's very fine address on the subject of work among the negroes and especially that done at Lawrenceville was heard by scarcely more than a score of persons.

But discouragements must only urge us on, and we ask for God's continued blessing and for renewed efforts on our own part.

Report for the Year

The past year has in some ways been a hard one, while in others it has been most encouraging.

We began the year without a chairman, but in November we had the pleasure of welcoming Mrs. Henry McKnight Moore, whom the bishop had appointed our president.

The attendance has been excellent and we have added new parishes to our list. The money does not come in as we would like for what we call the Salary Fund; this is our one pledge, but amounts to \$1800 a year and represents the salaries of one deaconess and two parish workers. We feel sure that if the parishes knew the noble work these women are doing in the Kensington district, where there are so many thousands employed in the mills, that they would contribute more generously. The work is at our very door, and yet if we do not receive more help we cannot renew this pledge another year. Through prayer and special appeals we trust these self-sacrificing women may receive their salaries during the summer months, but the year has been one of deep anxiety on this account.

We have at each meeting one or two addresses, trying to select speakers from different parts of the city that we may know the needs of the diocese in all directions. For this reason we hope to have the deans of each convocation tell us from time to time, of the work and needs of their special fields. This year we have had the pleasure of hearing Rev. S. L. Gilberson, Dean of the Convocation of West Phil-

adelphia, who encouraged us by speaking of how much had been accomplished by the gifts received through the Diocesan Committee.

Rev. Jacob LeRoy, Dean of the Convocation of Germantown, also spoke to us. This address was of particular interest, as it is in this district that are situated the three missions of St. Ambrose's, St. George's and St. Nathaniel's, where our special parish visitors are doing such noble work.

One of the most interesting addresses of the winter was made by Mr. John Thomson, librarian of the Free Library of Philadelphia. Mr. Thomson spoke of the work being done for the promotion of church work among the blind, emphasizing that true missionary work can be done, and is greatly needed, among these afflicted people, 1000 of whom are in our own city. Think what it must mean to obtain middle age (for the majority go blind between twenty-one and forty) and then be shut up in a dark cell for ever, think of the years of solitude. This work may be helped by paying annual dues of \$2, which may be sent to Mr. Thomson.

We also had an address by Rev. H. L. Duhring, who spoke to us of the institutions under the City Mission which especially need our help.

Rev. Mr. D. T. McDuffy, of St. Augustine's Mission, which is doing such good work among the colored race, told us of the encouraging condition of this mission, being now in their new parish house instead of holding their services over a stable, as they did for so many years.

Rev. Mr. M. B. Nash also spoke of his mission, St. James, at Prospect Park, which needs help badly.

Rev. Mr. H. L. Phillips tells us of what is being done in the parish of the Crucifixion and especially of the wonderful work of the summer home, on the Chester Pike, where so many poor colored people are restored to health each year.

In April Rev. Mr. Weinstein made the address and awoke new interest in the work among the Jews in this city.

At our last meeting we had the pleasure of hearing a few words from each of our three parish workers, which made us still more anxious to continue these salaries.

Will the parishes not do all they can to help us in this work, and will not those parishes which are not represented in our committee send delegates to us that they may hear of the work being done in our own city and diocese? We cannot neglect this work, even if the cry from elsewhere is great, our own home city must always be our first responsibility.
