REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

So quietly have the eight Missionary Districts become Provinces, perhaps few realize that the Diocese of Pennsylvania is now in the Province of Washington, which territorially includes the States of Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia and the District of Columbia. The Dioceses of Easton and West Virginia have not yet joined the Province.

The Primary Synod met in Pittsburgh in November to organize and plan for missionary, educational and social service work. At the same time delegates from the ten diocesan branches of the Woman's Auxiliary met and drafted a Provincial Constitution, attended study classes, discussed methods and pledged enthusiastic support of the \$1,000,000 resolution adopted by the Synod. Everyone felt that the meetings so ably conducted by Mrs. Adams and the gracious hospitality of the Pittsburgh Branch united us in closer fellowship and greater responsibility in our work.

During this past year there have been several changes in the Executive Committee. In September our faithful Second Vice-President, Mrs. Thomas K Conrad, died. Before the annual election of officers, Mrs. Neilson declined renomination as President, Mrs. Thomas Roberts as Treasurer, and Mrs. G. W. B. Roberts as Assistant Treasurer; and, although realizing our loss, we felt their decision must be respected, and the Bishop appointed Mrs. John Markoe as President, Mrs. George F. Knorr as Second Vice-President, Miss Blakiston, Treasurer, and Miss Letitia Scott as Assistant Secretary. The Educational Secretary of the Diocese, Mrs. H. A. Pilsbury, has been made a member of the Executive Committee, and her annual report will be found on another page.

Our all-day missionary meeting was held on November 13th in the Church of the Holy Trinity, when the Bishop presided, and interesting reports of work in different parts of the field were made. At the Bishop's suggestion, the Offertory

was sent to England to the "Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts," as an expression of sympathy in this time of war.

The Epiphany meeting in St. Stephen's Church was in the interest of foreign missions, and at the Lenten meeting in the Church of the Holy Trinity, in addition to addresses on work in the domestic field, the Bishop Suffragan gave an encouraging account of our diocesan missions.

Two conferences have been held, one to discuss and adopt the Provincial Constitution and the other for consultation with the retiring officers.

Instead of the three missionary meetings there will be a devotional one in the autumn, an all-day missionary meeting in the Epiphany season, and a conference after Easter to report on the winter's work and plan for the next year.

A list of questions and blanks for names and addresses of parish officers and delegates were sent to every branch, but at least twenty-five did not reply. We are most anxious to have an accurate list on file at the Church House, and if all changes are sent to the Secretary, corrections will be made.

Under this new Provincial system, and with new, untried Diocesan officers, we seem to be taking a fresh start. Let us try for greater numbers, larger offerings, wider effort and, above all, for deeper and more heartfelt prayers for the work.

CONSTITUTION
OF THE
Pennsylvania Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the
Board of Missions.

ARTICLE I.

Name.

The name of this Association shall be the Pennsylvania Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE II.

Object.

The object of the Association shall be to carry out within the Diocese of Pennsylvania the purposes and work of the Woman's Auxiliary as approved by the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE III.

Organization.

To accomplish these various objects this Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary is organized into five standing Committees—Indians' Hope, Domestic, Foreign, Work Among the Colored People, and the Diocesan. The Chairman of each Committee is to be appointed by the Bishop, with the exception of the Indians' Hope, which must follow its own constitution, as it antedates the formation of the Woman's Auxiliary.

ARTICLE IV.

Membership.

The Church itself is the Missionary Society. Every baptized person is a member of the Society; therefore, every baptized woman in the Diocese should be an active member of this Auxiliary.

ARTICLE V.

Officers.

The officers of this Association shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Secretary, an Assistant Secretary, a Treasurer, an Assistant Treasurer, a Treasurer for the United Offering, five officers of the Junior Department. These shall serve for one year and shall be eligible for renomination. The Board shall have power to fill all vacancies which may occur during the year for the unexpired term.

An Annual Meeting of the Executive Committee shall be held on the last Wednesday in April, when appointments by the Bishops shall be announced, nominations having been made by written ballot at the previous meeting.

ARTICLE VI.
Executive Committee.

The general management is entrusted to an Executive Board,

composed of the Diocesan officers, the officers of the Standing Committees, the Chairman of the work in Mexico and Brazil, the Chairman of the work in Cuba, the Assistant Treasurer of the United Offering, and the Librarian.

ARTICLE VII.

Duties of the President.

The President shall preside at all meetings of the Executive Committee. She shall appoint all members of committees necessary for the transacting of the work of the Executive Committee. She shall be ex-officio member of all committees. She shall visit Parish Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary when invited, and seek opportunity to establish branches in parishes where there are none and fill all other duties pertaining to her office.

ARTICLE VIII.

Duties of the Vice-Presidents.

In the absence of the President, a Vice-President shall preside at meetings of the Executive Committee and fill all duties belonging to the office.

ARTICLE IX.

Secretary.

The Secretary shall give notice of all meetings ordered by the Executive Committee. She shall keep a record of such meetings, and prepare and present Minutes at each meeting. She shall prepare an abstract of the Minutes of the year for the Annual Report. She shall send a copy of the Annual Report to every officer of the Executive Committee, to every Rector, Minister in Charge, and Missionary of the Diocese of Pennsylvania, to the General Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, and to the President of every Branch throughout the Church.

The Secretary shall advertise public meetings in such ways as seem best.

ARTICLE X.

Treasurer.

It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to take charge of the funds belonging to the Executive Committee, and to deposit them in such banking institution as has been selected by the Executive Committee of the Pennsylvania Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, to be drawn thence upon the cheque of the Treasurer or Assistant Treasurer, for the purpose of the Executive Committee, as ordered by that Committee. All bills sent to the Treasurer must be countersigned by the purchaser before payment. The Treasurer shall present an itemized report in writing at each stated meeting of the Executive Committee. She shall prepare a report of all funds in her charge for the Annual Meeting. Her books shall be audited by a Committee appointed by the President. It is recommended that the payments of each standing committee to the Annual Report Fund be made and the books closed by June first of each year.

ARTICLE XI.

Publication Committee.

The President shall appoint annually a Committee on the Publi-

cation of the Annual Report, said Committee to consist of the Treasurer and Secretary from each of the five Standing Committees, with a Chairman. This Committee shall receive all copy, typewritten, for the Annual Report, and take entire charge of its publication. It shall be the duty of this Committee to estimate amount per page due the Annual Report Fund from each of the five Standing Committees, and the United Offering, after receiving bill from the printer.

The Current Expense Fund of the Executive Committee shall pay for the remaining pages of the Annual Report not belonging to any of the Standing Committees.

ARTICLE XII.

Amendment.

The Constitution can be amended at any regular meeting of the Committee by a two-thirds vote, provided the amendment was submitted in writing at the previous regular meeting.

ARTICLE XIV.

Missionary Services.

There shall be three missionary services during the year—

1. The all-day service on the Friday following the second Thursday in November.

2. The Epiphany service in behalf of Missions in the foreign field.

3. The Lenten service.

ARTICLE XV.

Annual Meeting.

The annual Business Meeting shall be held at noon on the Friday following the second Thursday in November.

THE UNITED OFFERING OF THE PENNSYLVANIA BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

Object of the Offering of 1916.

Resolved, That the United Offering of 1916 be given to the Board of Missions to be devoted entirely to the training, testing, sending and support of women for Mission Work at home and abroad, and to the care of such as are sick or disabled. Also, that to our united gifts shall be added our united and earnest prayers that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves to the work of the Master in the Mission Field; or, if they cannot go themselves, to give of their substance gladly, as the Lord hath prospered them.

DIOCESE OF PENNSYLVANIA.

Report of the Educational Secretary, 1914-1915.

October 13, 1914. The Parish Educational Secretaries and Mission Study Class Leaders made their Corporate Communion at the Church House, Rev. H. B. Wright, celebrant. The service was followed immediately by a conference, at which time the first Educational Secretary, Mrs. J. Nicholas Mitchell, resigned on account of ill health. The Bishop appointed Mrs. H. A. Pilsbry to the office. The text-book for the year was Social Aspects of Foreign Missions, by Professor Faunce. In this Diocese the subject was enlarged to embrace the Church's social service at home and abroad. Assignments prepared and submitted to the Bishop were used in men's and women's classes.

October 27th. A Normal Mission Study Class for women was organized at the Church House, led by the Educational Secretary. This class resulted in five Diocesan classes, each holding seven sessions; one led by Miss Lydia West, four by the Educational Secretary. Also, Normal Classes in three other Dioceses—Harrisburg, New Jersey, Delaware—one led by the Educational Secretary, two by Mrs. Arthur Van Harlingen. Virginia and Kansas were reached by correspondence.

Fifty-three Parish Classes led in this Diocese, with a membership of 700. Dr. W. H. Jefferys reports 148 men in classes. Miss Hubbard reports 641 Juniors; making a total of 1,487 in Study Classes in this Diocese.

January 10, 1915, was observed as Diocesan Educational Day, beginning with celebration of the Holy Communion at 9 A. M. Classes and conferences were held throughout the day. Three hundred and eighteen registered, 63 parishes of this Diocese were represented, and guests from the Dioceses of Bethlehem, New Jersey, New York, Wyoming, Missouri and Cape Palmas, Africa. The presence of the Bishop and Bishop Suffragan added much to the value of the day, the

purpose being to increase the Diocesan spirit of fellowship and illustrate how the educational work can be introduced into all departments of parish life.

March 8th. An open Mission Study Class was held on the Social Service of the Church in Philadelphia. Five-minute reports were heard from members of the class on the Church's ministry to men, women and children, the blind, halt, deaf, dumb, the hungry, thirsty, strangers, naked, sick, prisoners. "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto Me."

The Educational Secretary addressed the members of the Germantown and Chestnut Hill Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary on Bishop's Day, November 5, 1914. In this group of ten parishes three Educational Secretaries were appointed; previous appointments, four; total, seven. Membership in the Epiphany Class was valuably increased. Bishop's Day, January 8th, at Emmanuel Church, Holmesburg; 22 parishes and missions. Six Educational Secretaries appointed; five previous appointments; total, eleven. Local assembly of Daughters of the King, February 9th. Three of the Order attended the Lenten Diocesan class. The Acting President proposed forming Study Classes within the Order next year.

The following parishes were visited: St. Barnabas, Kensington; St. Peter's, Germantown; St. Mary's Ardmore; Christ Church Chapel, St. Andrew's Mission, Manayunk; St. Elizabeth's, Philadelphia. Other parishes were visited by members of the Normal Classes.

It is the present policy of the Educational Department to send leaders, upon application, to parishes where classes are formed and no leader trained. Eight leaders took charge of out classes in addition to their parish classes. Special mention is due Miss Lydia West, who led classes in seven parishes during Lent.

Resignations have been received from eight Parish Educational Secretaries. Four appointments have been made to fill these vacancies, and sixteen additional appointments.

In March the Educational Secretary sent lists of ques-

tions to Parish Secretaries. Their replies furnished the following report:

Eighty Parish Educational Secretaries; 109 missionaries addressing said parishes; 31 illustrated lectures; 84 per cent. paid their apportionments, with a growing desire and plan to exceed it. Educational work finding its place in all parish organizations. Visiting between parishes for conference found distinctly worth while. Abundant testimony to the value of the year's course on social service.

One Study Class leader, in the work for the first this year, suffices to voice the witness of many: "My whole outlook on life is different. I feel as though the class had placed in my hand the key to the Scriptures, the service and the sermons, as well as to life."

April 13th a closing session of all Mission Study classes, senior and junior, was held at the Church House. The topic, Thanksgiving. Reports were heard from classes. Addresses by the Rev. H. B. Wright, Dr. W. H. Jefferys and the Bishop, who dismissed the class with his blessing.

To the forty-three leaders for their love and loyalty and steadfast adherence to the one aim of the Educational Department. Above all, to Almighty God, who has given to us men and women, in the fellowship of mission study, to receive in the knowledge of Christ a more abundant life and love, that desires above all things

The following report of our year's work varies but little from that of other years in its general characteristics.

Many letters have reached us—letters reporting progress, thanking us for help rendered, or asking aid. Almost every field has been heard from either by letter or in the persons of representatives of the various missions; to all of whom we have given attention, and in many cases substantial assistance. While the sum total of the work is encouraging, there is room for further growth and improvement.

The Treasurer has received this year a total of one thousand five hundred seventy-two dollars and sixty-nine cents (\$1,572.69). This includes a balance of twenty dollars and seventy-six cents (\$20.76) from last year.

The Treasurer of Specials has received five thousand seven dollars and forty-four cents (\$5,007.44). Of this sum, two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) was pledged by the Indians' Hope towards the four thousand dollars needed to sink the artesian well at St. Elizabeth's School, and the remainder is for our usual pledges.

The scholarships were all completed. Three of the boxes were not taken, and the Indians' Hope will endeavor to collect enough money to buy supplies and send these boxes early in the summer. The boxes form a very real part of the living of our missionaries. Without them it would be impossible for these poorly paid servants of the Church to get along. While we must all deplore the necessity for sending boxes, we must endeavor another year to see that they are all taken, and that none go a-begging.

The total valuation of the missionary boxes sent this year is two thousand one hundred eighty-nine dollars and sixty-six cents (\$2,189.66).

Our Treasurer, Mrs. Ashbridge, resigned her office in November, but was able to return to us some months later, and was re-elected by a rising vote.

The Indians' Hope began its meetings in September with a Corporate Communion in the Chapel of the Church House. The Rev. Charles Hutchinson, rector of St. Clement's Church, was the celebrant.

At this meeting a letter was read from Bishop Moreland, of the Diocese of Sacramento, giving an encouraging report of the Church's work among the Karok Indians. Bishop Moreland wrote of the missionary-in-charge, the Rev. Mr. Shea: "He is a saint and a pioneer, and God has blessed his labors." The Karok Mission was started about three years ago, and was supported for two years by the Indians' Hope. It is now under the Board of Missions.

In October Mr. Hall, a Y. M. C. A. worker among the Indians throughout the West, addressed the meeting. Mr. Hall told us that 95 per cent. of the fifty-seven thousand Indian youth being educated in the Government schools receive no religious training. In his opinion, trained religious workers from Indian mission schools would be the most efficient kind of teachers and have the most influence in reaching their own race, especially at Carlisle, where the opportunity is very great.

In November Mr. Betticher told us of improved conditions in the Tanana Valley, Alaska, a district covering six hundred miles, where he has been laboring with other missionaries for ten years. He said we should not be discouraged at the slow progress of the Indian, as we are asking him to step from one civilization to another in one generation; he is trying his best to do this, and some cases are modern miracles.

In December, Bishop Biller told us that the greatest need in South Dakota is for good nurses, not only for nursing, but to teach sanitation. Another pressing need is for an artesian well at St. Elizabeth's School, Standing Rock Reservation, as every drop of water for all purposes has to be carried four miles in many degrees below zero winter weather and under burning summer suns. The Indians' Hope at this meeting pledged itself to raise twenty-five hundred dollars towards the four thousand dollars needed to sink this well.

St. Elizabeth's School has been highly commended by Mr. Cato Sells, the Indian Commissioner, who said that the only way to educate children is to give them also religious training, as St. Elizabeth's is doing. Education without religion is not enough.

Bishop Thomas spoke to us in January, and gave us the cheering news that this has been a year of fruitage in his district. More people have been confirmed than ever before, some classes containing forty members. There are many needs, however, in Wyoming, one of which is a new school building for the Arapahoes, costing about fifteen hundred dollars. The old one built twenty years ago is worn out.

In February, Bishop Howden, of New Mexico, told us

that there was little or no work among the Indians in his district at present, although he hopes to start a mission before long, and as a beginning the Rev. Carl Williams is living at Farmington, near the line of the Ship Rock Agency of the Navajos. The three tribes in the State are Pueblos, Apaches and Navajos. The Pueblos have a crude form of Christianity; the Apaches are mostly pagan, and are the most crafty and cruel of all the Indian tribes; the Navajos are one of the finest of the Indian tribes. There are about forty thousand Indians in New Mexico, and the only workers among them are the Roman Catholics and the Methodists.

In March, Miss Carryl read a report of the expenditure of the income derived from the five thousand-dollar scholarship given to the Church Training and Deaconess House by the Woman's Auxiliary, including the Indians' Hope Association, in 1908, and which is devoted to the education of missionaries. Miss Carryl said that the Deaconess House is a diocesan institution, whose courses of study on the Prayer Book, Old and New Testament, etc., are open and free to all.

In April, Mr. Chapman, of Alaska, spoke of his work there. He said that the Church was engaged in an endeavor to preserve the native races. Since the last census epidemics of typhoid, diphtheria, etc., have caused a 20 per cent. decrease in the population.

Mr. Chapman made an appeal for five thousand dollars for a school building, also for one-hundred-dollar scholarships. He said that the work was sometimes discouraging, but that here and there fine examples of the results of Christian training among the Indians gave them renewed encouragement.

In a winter of stress and strain, when all over the world "men's hearts are failing them for fear and for looking after those things which are coming 'on the earth,'" we have tried to work faithfully in our little corner of the vineyard. Let us continue to endeavor to fulfill our obligations, so that those whose hands we uphold will feel no diminution of our interest or our aid, that the coming of Christ's Kingdom on earth will

be hastened and the rule of righteousness and peace, good will to man may indeed be not afar off.

It is with sadness that I write my Annual Report, for it tells that less has been given and less done for Domestic Missions than last year. We have anticipated this, however, for in the flood of generosity to the sufferers by the war in Europe much that might have been given to the cause of the Prince of Peace has been swept from it.

This committee records 117 boxes, valued at \$9,882.68, sent to our missions and missionaries. Parishes have given direct \$2,428; the Treasurer has received \$6,335.98, making a total of \$18,645.66. So that we hope that we "have done what we could."

In addition to the many boxes given to the missionaries and their families, I am very happy to note that a goodly number have gone to our Mission Schools, which could not exist without them; for poverty is so great about them that the children can scarcely be clothed, and that hospitals and

homes have not been forgotten, either, and these boarding homes for students in our educational centers are thus converted into boarding schools, leaving to the State the privilege of paying the teachers.

It may not be seemly for me to say how interesting our meetings have been, but with such an array of speakers as have come to us we may well be proud of them. Bishops Griswold, Atwood, Wells, Capers and Brewer (I name them in the order of their visits), Fr. Lobdell, Mrs. Hughson, Mrs. Baird and Mrs. Clark. Our interest has been awakened and widespread by them.

The interesting story of the London bootblack who was found polishing his own shoes, that he might attend a large foreign missionary meeting at Exeter Hall, explained to a surprised passer-by, that a year before he had given one penny to the cause of foreign missions, and he purposed informing himself as to the uses to which his money had been put. And I have thought that, like the little boy, we might wish to do the same thing. So, at the risk of being tedious, I have culled some items from the reports of our twenty-three Domestic Missionary Bishops:

Alaska. Bishop Rowe tells us that "The new Alaska is not a gold hunters' or adventurers' paradise. Not until the railroad is built, the towns improved and industries started will Alaska know the real boom; a boom that will prove worth all the years of waiting." We are thankful for any encouragement that we have given.

Arizona. Bishop Atwood says, "The note that I would sound in my Annual Report is one of encouragement and gratitude. Last year our percentage of increase was 17 per cent. larger than was made in any Diocese or Missionary District within the limits of the United States. We need more workers; we hope they will come. We need more money to carry on the work; we are hopeful for the future." In the new hospital this committee has furnished a room in memory of Bishop Whitaker.

Asheville. Bishop Horner says: "The educational side of

our mountain work continues to be of the greatest importance. We can make more impression upon the children of the mountains than upon the older people. The Mission Schools and the Sunday Schools require the most careful handling, and produce the most satisfactory results. The Specials for the year amount only to about half what they were last year." I must say here how thankful I am for the interest taken in these North Carolina schools. More than twenty excellent boxes were sent to them, and some money besides, from this committee.

Eastern Oklahoma. Bishop Thurston reports that in the matter of self-support the contributions have increased quite 35 per cent. On our apportionment of \$966 we have given \$1,394, and at the Convocation in April the District formally asked that its apportionment be raised to \$1,200 for the coming year. I know of no greater power for helpfully making our Church known than our hospital." Here let me say that, learning from Miss Emery of its great need of blankets, the committee responded quickly by sending twenty pair of excellent blankets, so that the Superintendent was quite overcome with gratitude.

Honolulu. Bishop Restarick says: "The increase of Church property within the year reaches a value of \$33,000, which brings its total to \$610,000. The Church people of the islands gave to missions last year a total of \$6,400, besides what was given to ourselves. Of this, \$1,800 was given by the Woman's Auxiliary. This makes our missionary offering through our Treasurer \$4.75 per capita."

Idaho. Bishop Funston tells us that: "The population of Idaho is increasing, but the people who are coming to us are mainly of small means, and are coming to build up their homes through their own frugality and sturdy labor. St. Margaret's School for Girls is the only Church school for girls within five hundred miles. We do not want to close such an institution and turn away hundreds of young girls who need just the training given. We are not prejudiced nor bigoted, but when a young girl comes from a ranch or a mining town and says to us, 'Please help me to have a Christian education and a pure

Christian womanhood,' we cannot say to her, 'You must go to the Roman Catholic school, or you must get your parents to send you to the Mormon school.' Surely we must keep St. Margaret's open." A chapel, where the girls may be taught the beauty of the Christian faith, is sorely needed at the school. How lovely if we could supply the means to build it!

Nevada. Twice bereaved in one year, has now Bishop Hunting for its head, and so it will no longer suffer. In the brief time that Bishop Spalding was there he recorded his joy at its growth in the six years of his absence from it.

New Mexico. Bishop Howden tells us that its chief need for some time to come will be a larger body of clergy. Eight missions have been revived by the missionary in charge, who has reached them by train, bicycle, horseback, buggy and on foot. At Mesilla Park is the State Agricultural College, St. James' Church being to a considerable extent a college chapel. The music of the Sunday service is rendered by a large choir of students.

North Dakota. Bishop Tyler reminds us that North Dakota ranks first as the grain-producing State of the Union, and its 44,000,000 acres of land are the basis on which its great material prosperity rests. Its children exceeded in their Lenten Offering last year the high-water mark, once more showing themselves to be the largest per capita givers in the Church. The District again exceeds its apportionment by \$500.

North Texas. Bishop Temple says the most discouraging thing in the work of North Texas is that we were not there at work when there was a great influx of population. Consequently, the people sought and found aid elsewhere. On the whole, the work has progressed very well and steadily, and we are all working very hopefully.

Oklahoma. From Bishop Brooke we hear that the only additions to equipment of importance have been a small building bought and fitted up and furnished for a chapel at Mangum, and the enlarged and improved home for women, King Hall, at the University. Here we have spent nearly \$7,000. Here we can now house twenty-eight young women, instead of eleven. This special help was sent me chiefly by individuals

and the Woman's Auxiliary. As I speak of this I want to record our thanks for and hearty approval of the help that is given by the Woman's Auxiliary and the Juniors in the boxes for the families of the clergy, the Indian Mission and for King Hall. Their value in the past year has been over \$1,000 in money; the help they gave, far beyond that. The Domestic Committee may accept some of these thanks, as we helped with King Hall.

Philippines. Bishop Brent says there are two spheres in this Missionary District where our Communion may render the Catholic Church a large service—the Pagan and the Mohammedan. We began our work among the Igorots eleven years ago. There have been during that time 2,450 baptisms, 900 confirmations, and there are today 634 communicants, converts from heathenism. There are more Pagans in the Mountain Province than the total population of Alaska and the Hawaiian Islands together. The Moro is fittingly described as a Pagan Mohammedan. The storm of hate and murder, under the name of patriotism and war, which is sweeping over Christian Europe, is going to make the work of Christian Missions among the Mohammedans ten-fold more difficult. But we who believe that the Saviour is the Prince of Peace may not desist on this account. More than ever before, Christian Missions are the hope of the world.

Porto Rico. Bishop Colmore says there is need at once of two American priests. We should also have several Porto Rican evangelist workers. The men here will be glad to receive the training; but we must have funds to meet expenses.

Salina. From Bishop Griswold we hear that one of the greatest difficulties with which he has to contend is the lack of stability of parishes and missions. As the Bishop of Oklahoma has said, "It is a procession preaching to another procession." "The year at the Cathedral has been one of steady advance," however.

San Joaquin. California has always been popularly regarded as El Dorado. The tremendous production of gold in early days was responsible for the resolution of the General Convention that California should no longer be treated as

missionary ground. Our people wish to lean upon missionary aid as little as possible, but if the Church at large invests little in this section, it must be satisfied with relatively small results.

South Dakota. It seems worthy of note that the large work carried on by Messrs. Roberts and Walker has been entirely supported within the District—very largely by the Woman's Auxiliary. No appropriation has been asked from the Board. It is an old story, this need of men, but it loses none of its serious moment with age. It bears most heavily upon the mind and heart of the Missionary Bishop.

Southern Florida. Bishop Mann records with thankfulness that the Missionary Apportionment of the District was largely overpaid by \$247.25. This was largely due to the children's offering, which was the best that they had ever made. "The first Bishop of Southern Florida was a layer of foundations, and when in future years it shall stand strong, and rich, and stately, the chief memorial tablet in the edifice must bear the name of William Crane Gray."

Spokane. Bishop Wells says: "The Woman's Auxiliary of many Dioceses and parishes have rendered most valuable help in time of need. I gratefully acknowledge it. Last year I made an earnest plea to have an aggressive man settled at Pasco. I also spoke of about fourteen towns of over 1,000 inhabitants with eight closed churches, having no services, or only an occasional one; of seventeen places with over 500 inhabitants having but rare services, and only on week days; I also instanced fifty-two places untouched by us and growing rapidly."

Utah. Bishop Jones places a new St. Mark's Hospital as his most pressing need. He says we must in the near future either have a new building or go out of business. St. Mark's is as much needed today as it ever was needed.

Western Colorado. From Bishop Brewster we learn that his communicants show an increase of over 5 per cent. over last year. He says we have now twenty-three places of worship. Western Colorado is very much alive, and it behooves us to lengthen the cords and strengthen the stakes, for the spiritual help and strength of the people.

Western Nebraska. Bishop Beecher tells us that in the last thirty years the population has nearly doubled. It is practically impossible, he says, to give a detailed report of the improvements of the past year, but he tells us that he has found all the Church property in excellent repair, and, with but one exception, free of debt.

Wyoming. Bishop Thomas says notable achievements are to be recorded from Laramie and Cheyenne. In Laramie more than \$5,000 has been expended in repairs and improvements upon the Cathedral, and much other good work has been done elsewhere in the District.

Panama Mission. At the Atlantic end of the Isthmus we have a beautiful church at Colon. It is not to be expected that the work in the future, year by year, will be as it has been in the past, when such a large army was engaged in the work of the canal.

Here, then, in brief is the budget from all the Districts where we are interested, save one, Eastern Oregon; and we fear that the illness of Bishop Paddock prevented his making his report. We are most grateful to all of our good helpers for what has been done for our beloved Country, and we fondly hope that the needs we have detailed will create a new enthusiasm in our helpfulness. So, with earnest thanks to our helpers, and abiding faith that they will never fail us, we face the work of another year with confidence.

When our season's work began in September the hope was expressed that this terrible war situation might recall the Church to the sacrificial principle of missions.

Mrs. Biddle brought a message from the Church Missions House that sacrifice in giving would be necessary. Mrs. Pan-coast brought the challenge of Japan: "Behold, I stand at the door and knock." Our own missionaries, Miss Dodson and others, told how willingly they were giving out of their

small salaries to share in this same spirit, and, again, we have heard how the little heathen girls at Cape Mount, and at St. Mary's School, at Shanghai, willingly gave up their meals weekly to be able to help those in need. So we can say that the keynote for the season is "sacrifice" in our work, and that we realize that we have no warrant in times of such distress for making Christ and His cause suffer. The summons comes to each of us who accept Christ at our baptism as "the Christ of the Cross," to accept *now* "the Cross of Christ."

Our faithful President and other officers have been regular and supplied us with news by direct witness from the various fields. We have heard from all the three Dioceses of China,—Dr. and Mrs. E. J. Lee telling of twelve years of faithful work, especially speaking of the visible unifying work of the Spirit, wielding in this wonderful Chinese nation a Christian impress, and of the great need of leaders. The force in the Diocese of Anking should be doubled; the situation is temporary. Shall China be a blessing instead of a menace? Last year three hundred boys had to be refused at St. John's University.

Miss Higgins, formerly with Dr. Glenton, at Hankow, told of their experiences during the Chinese rebellion, and of the opportunities that they had to show their kind services, which were appreciated by the Emperor, who sent each a decoration.

Deaconess Ridgley, from the same Diocese of Hankow, came with her hopeful news of the fine work done at Ichang, and how eager the Chinese women are to earn money by doing cross-stitch in order to earn money to educate their children. Also, the wonderful work done by Deaconess Clark, educated at our own Training School, in forming a Junior Auxiliary. The Deaconess' appeal, "Brethren, pray for us," was most touching, when we realize how many thousand of miles she lives from her old home.

Miss Graham, of the English Church at Fukien, also told of her work in the far south, where foot-binding was still the rule.

Miss Dodson is celebrating her twenty-fifth year of continued work in the St. Mary's School, at Shanghai, and her account of the change in the attitude of the women was very amusing, and showed how dangerous it would be if we in the home country did not send ample means to help to educate these clever, self-sacrificing girls.

We are hoping to pay off the Bishop Stevens Scholarship at St. John's College by each person who was confirmed by that beloved Bishop paying \$1 each.

From Japan we had Miss Meade, from her lonely station in Tamageta, surrounded by eighty temples. She told of her needs in the kindergarten work, and of the clever children she was teaching to love Jesus, the friend of little children. Miss Boyd told of her settlement work and boarding home at Tokio. To the former we gave \$25 for some ground adjoining her school, and to the latter a picture roll.

Above all was the earnest and vivid description given by Mrs. Pancoast, who told us of the needs of that western beauty-loving nation and of the shabby little buildings our workers are occupying, and of the generosity of the Emperor and the immediate need of our money for the great International Hospital at Tokio.

From Africa we heard from Mrs. Moort, of the Girls' School at Brierly, and the need of a dispensary and training school for nurses; if only the Church at home would give more scholarships, price \$50 a year; for there is room in the school for twice the number of girls. She wanted money for a clock, and we gave it to her.

Miss Conway, home for a brief furlough, told of her work at Cape Mount in the school, and how the girls there willingly did without their dinner on Fridays for the sake of missions. She told of many excursions to adjoining country, where her medical services are so acceptable. We are sending several (5) boxes through the Auxiliary Box Committee to Liberia, full of Christmas gifts and hospital supplies, as well as some things for hospital at Anking.

Mrs. Lane has kept us in touch with the work in Brazil, where the boys' school at Porto Allegro is working wonders in that country, which is larger than the whole United States.

Of Mexico, we heard of Bishop Aves' having been robbed, and of Rev. Mr. Mellen's danger in getting back to his work in Mexico City, and also of progress at the Hooker's Girls' School. The need of agricultural work at Guadalagra brought the money to purchase a cow and some chickens.

From Cuba, the Rev. Mr. Snively brought his grateful appreciation of our gifts to his work at La Gloria, Cuba, and of money for a bazaar. He spoke also of receiving money for building a vestry room and paying the salary of a young teacher who was conducting a school for forty girls at Matanzas; also of our giving a memorial altar. The Rev. Mr. Achley brought a strong appeal for a people "who raise nothing they eat, and eat nothing that they raise," and who are politically so immoral. He spoke of the need of just such workers as our Miss Ashurst. Our meetings were closed by a stirring address by

the new Bishop of Cuba, the Rt. Rev. H. R. Hulse, who made us realize how many are the needs of that island.

At our meeting in Lent we were privileged to hear our Bishop talk on the "Missionary Ideal," of what Christ does for us, and can do, and how we can share this with others, showing that at present two-thirds of the Church does nothing, and cares less; that it is our duty to get them interested, and that the surest way is to make over our own lives in Jesus Christ, by faith, by personal recognition of our Lord. The more we know of Him as our Lord, the more we will want to make Him the Lord of other people.

The Annual Meeting in November gave us a vivid word picture of the Orient and its needs, by the Rev. Arthur Gray. At the Epiphany Meeting we heard a clarion call from Bishop Lloyd and the Rev. Mr. Mellen, from Mexico.

We have heard with pleasure of various inter-parochial meetings, which are bringing about unity and have given to us delegates from several (5) new branches of the Woman's Auxiliary. Miss Douglas has taken charge of the monthly enrollment and card catalogue, which, we hope, will remedy our very faulty list of delegates.

We have had many letters of thanks from our missionaries: Bishop Aves, Miss Mann, Rev. Mr. Snively, Miss Boyd, Miss Meade; also from the clergy in Haiti for Christmas boxes.

Of appeals, we had them from Rev. and Mrs. Ancell; Miss Richmond, for scholarships in her new school at Soochow, and for more scholarships in Brazil, and for the Leper Hospital at Kumamoto; also for books for the Boone Library, at Wuchang.

The Treasurer of the United Offering has brought to us monthly news of the blue box offerings, and at the Annual Presentation Meeting, in April, was rewarded for all the work she has done by giving illustrated lectures all over the city, by finding that the amount collected during the last six months was nearly \$8,000.

Reports of the various pledges of our Branch of the Auxiliary were presented at the November meeting, and we hope that all our debts will be paid for the year. The entire collection at the Annual Meeting was sent, at the suggestion of the Bishop, to England, as a love offering to the S. P. G. He also appealed to us to double all gifts of the past year, and later that we all give "one day's income tax," which was especially done by members of the Mission Study Classes.

Miss Sinkler told of the privileges offered us at the Church Training and Deaconess Home, and Miss Wright appealed to us for the support of the Tract Society.

We have to record the death of several of our delegates: Miss Vaux, Mrs. Breed, Mrs. Shee, Miss Ringwald and others. We miss them greatly, and find in our dull road their shining torch.

The splendid work of the Mission Study Classes has been brought to us by the Educational Secretary, whose report, we hope, will be added to this.

The great call from our Assistant Treasurer that we raise money from this branch of the Auxiliary to build an entire ward for St. Luke's Hospital is still unanswered. Surely that is not to be left unheeded!

Thus have messages been brought to us from all our foreign fields; messages showing us that the only hope of the world is in the Christianizing of men, and that our duty is for the more sacrificial support, by giving knowledge, money, and, above all, *ourselves*. Men are pouring out money and blood like water that their country may win. Cannot we do something sacrificial to show *our* appreciation for our peace and good will? Let us make our offering to our God for the Foreign Missions of His Church in such a way that we shall not be ashamed "To stand before the Son of Man" and be judged in the light of His Death and of God's Love to the world.

The work of the Colored Committee is continuous and we hope always increasing in its efforts to improve the condition, material and spiritual, of these helpless people who have been committed to our care.

Though it is all most interesting, we have not, at the end of the year, any wonderful tales to tell of great deeds accomplished—only a report of steady careful work done all over the South, by faithful Missionaries, men and women, priests and laymen, in parishes, schools and hospitals, and in scattered Mission Stations. Gathering the people together here and there, to teach them of God and the Church, and how to lead a moral and a Christian life.

In many places there are discouragements, then, again, by the Grace of God, the success is wonderful; especially when we consider the lack of money and equipment in some places.

It is a very hopeful fact that some of the most successful workers among the colored people, now, belong to their own race, educated in our Church schools, and entering well prepared and with great zeal, upon the work of redeeming their people from lives of ignorance and vice.

In particular a number of the graduates of St. Paul's and St. Augustine's Schools are doing valuable work, and it is all done in spite of many difficulties, the chief being lack of funds, for we are not very generous to our Missionaries.

Last winter the Committee was addressed by a very intelligent young colored man, A. Myron Cochran, a graduate of one of our schools, who had started, and very successfully carried on St. Michael's Parochial and Industrial School, Charlotte, N. C. He had been promised by a contributor, interested in the school, three hundred dollars a year for three years, to aid in paying the salaries of his teachers. Unfortunately after the first year the contributor died, as he had already engaged his teachers and made his arrangements for the coming year, he had no way of making up the loss. The Committee did what it could for him at the time, and it made us realize how many and great are the trials of a Missionary.

We are glad to report that the attendance at our meetings was unusually good last winter, but we regret to say our Treasurer informs us that our contributions in boxes and cash amount to over nine hundred dollars less than the previous year. This is a deplorable backward step and we must go forward. We therefore urge upon the members of the Committee more aggressive work for the coming year.

The work is always growing, the needs are greater, and our efforts should surely be in proportion. Is it not possible for each delegate to do a little more next year. To work a little more, to give a little more, to pray a little more?

Then with God's blessing we may be able to accomplish greater results.

It is with deep gratitude to our Heavenly Father that we are able to report a year filled with encouragement and a deeper sense of the pleasure of giving, for, in spite of the overwhelming demands and the heartfelt desire to help our Emergency Aid for those suffering at home and abroad, yet the work of the Diocesan Committee has been even more faithfully done than in former years.

The Spirit of Christ has entered our hearts, through suffering and want, in a way we have never felt it before. May the lesson that we have been learning through the past year stay with us always, teaching us to more fully realize the needs of others and the true joy of giving even to the extent of self-sacrifice.

With this thought in our minds, Rev. George S. Gastner's work at the Seaman's Mission has deeply appealed to us. Never before has there been such distress among the sailors coming to this port. The war has so interfered with the shipping that large numbers of seamen are ashore, who are absolutely unable to secure employment; sober Christian men who through no fault of their own find themselves destitute, strangers in a strange land.

The distress at the Immigrant Station has also been great, and we all listened with intense interest to Mr. Frank H. Longshore's address at the February meeting.

We had brought before us this winter, for the first time, the Social Service Department of the Episcopal Hospital. Miss Smiley interested us greatly in the work done by the four social workers there, each doing true Christian service, helping the patients while in the hospital, making it possible for many to enter, by caring for their families during their absence; placing those who need it in convalescent homes until they are able to return to work; securing braces for those unable to buy them; bringing children to the clinics, and in all cases caring for the soul as well as the body.

Rev. John M. Chattin gave us an account of his work at Emmanuel Church, Quakertown, Bucks County, a district utterly neglected for the past fifteen years, but where, under his able leadership, the people are becoming interested and the future is most encouraging.

Rev. James B. Halsey made a strong appeal for the work among the Jews in this Diocese, which is at last well organized. The Jewish Mission is to be placed in the Church of L'Emmanuello, Tenth and Christian Streets; the Italian Mission to be moved to the Church of the Evangelist, Seventh and Christian Streets.

We also had most interesting addresses from Mr. John Thomson on the Church work among the blind; Rev. H. M. G. Huff, on the conditions at St. James', Perkiomen; Rev. E. L. Tabb, on the Summer Home of the Church of the Crucifixion; Mrs. Ralph North, on the United Offering; Mrs. John D. Thomas, on the Bishop's Bricks Fund; Miss Elizabeth Carryl, on the Julia C. Whitaker Scholarship at the Church Training and Deaconess House; Miss M. Rumney, on the needs of St. Barnabas Mission, Germantown; Miss Wright, on the Tract Society; Deaconess Adams, on the work for colored people being carried on at St. Paul's, Chester; Deaconess Camp, of St. Ambrose Mission, and Miss Bispham, of St. George's Mission.

Will not all the Parish Auxiliaries help us with their prayers and gifts, that the Diocesan Committee may be enabled to do more each year towards helping our own people to know Christ and to live Christ?
