REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

1917-1918

Perhaps the most important action taken by the Auxiliary this year has been the adoption of our new constitution, which is printed in full in this report. As there are a number of changes it will be of interest for all to read it in detail.

It was our privilege to have the Provincial Synod meet in Philadelphia early in November and it proved a splendid inspiration and stimulus for our winter's work.

Our Autumn Devotional meeting was held at St. James' on November 15th, when Dr. Drury of St. Paul's Concord gave most helpful addresses. The regular Conference followed in the afternoon, when the Chairman of each committee gave a report and told of work planned for the coming year.

Our Epiphany meeting was held at St. Simeon's Church on January 24th, Bishop Garland presiding. The speakers of the day were, The Rev. John Logan, who spoke of our responsibility for general work among colored people; Rev. Mr. Balcom, who told of Bishop Thomas' new plan for work among the Arapahoe Indians and Bishop Burleson, who gave us his first impressions of South Dakota as its Bishop.

At the lunch hour Dr. Mary James told of her work at the Wuchang General Hospital in China. The speakers in the afternoon were, Archdeacon Philipps, who made us feel we have a great work to do among the colored people in our own diocese, and Bishop Touret the new Bishop of Colorado who made a strong plea for the weak Church of the West, reminding us that St. Paul's statement, "We that are strong must bear the infirmities of the weak," is absolutely basic in Christianity.

Our spring conference, held in Holy Trinity Parish House, on April 8th was on "Co-operation." Representatives from the G. F. S. Daughters of the King, St. Barnabas' guild for nurses and C. P. C. all told of their work for missions and it was felt that there would be closer co-operation if each organization was represented at the executive meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary. A motion to this effect was carried.

It is with deep regret that we note the resignation of Mrs. Hodge as chairman of the committee for work among colored people. She has given many years of devoted service. While regretting we must lose Mrs. Hodge, we welcome Mrs. Pharo, her successor, as one already interested in the work.

The visit of The Archbishop of York, is one never to be forgotten and those privileged to hear him will long remember his stirring addresses.

As we close our year's work we usually feel we have a few months rest before resuming our autumn work, but this year our Woman's Auxiliary war work or Advent Call bids us all take our part in preparation for this great task, the greatest the Woman's Auxiliary has ever undertaken—the mobilization of all Church women for united prayer, that God will release the power, which shall "win for the world, that freedom and peace which shall enable all nations to bring their glory and honor into His kingdom." This is the work before us.

ANNUAL REPORT

A short summary of the year's work of the Indian's Hope Association is herewith given:

The Treasurer has received during the year a total of one thousand, two hundred ninety-six dollars and sixty-four cents (\$1296.64).

The Treasurer of Specials has received three thousand four hundred ninety dollars and ninety-seven cents (\$3490.97).

The Box Committee reports that the total valuation of boxes sent to mission schools and stations, hospitals, missionaries and their families is one thousand seven hundred ninety-four dollars and forty-four cents (\$1794.44).

Our first meeting for the year was held on September 24th and was preceded by a Corporate Communion in the Chapel of the Church House. The Rev. Elliot White of St. Mark's Church was the celebrant.

Among the letters read at the September meeting was one from Bishop Funsten of Idaho asking our help in securing one thousand dollars (\$1000) to build a much needed residence for the missionary at the Fort Hall Indian Mission, and at our October meeting we decided to undertake for our largest special this year the raising of one thousand dollars for this purpose.

At our November meeting the resignation of Miss Dana Hazelton as Registrar of the Indian's Hope was announced and accepted with regret and Miss Isabel Howell was appointed as the new Registrar.

Bishop Morrison of Duluth addressed this meeting and asked our help for several pressing needs, among them two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250.00) to put water into the little home of Miss Pauline Colby, director of his lace workers, and we have raised some money for this purpose.

In December Bishop Morrison reported in person the burning of the Mission House at Fort Hall, and as in rebuilding the Bishop hopes to include the missionary's residence under the same roof as the Mission House, the Indian's Hope decided to still undertake as its special the raising of the one thousand dollars for the missionary's house, the money to go into the rebuilding fund. A new Mission House will cost twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000). There was an insurance of four thousand dollars (\$4000) on the old House.

An extra special was also sent to the Rev. Mr. Balcom for his work at St. Michael's Mission, Wind River, Wyoming, about which he told us in January.

Money was also contributed towards a new prayer-book in the Dakotah tongue which Bishop Burleson earnestly desires to have printed, and about which he told us in February. The Dakotah language is still the speech of four-fifths of the Sioux, and the prayer-book they are using was translated by Bishop Hare in 1874.

Miss Cady of the Navajo Mission Hospital, Fort Defiance, Arizona, spoke to us in March, and money was contributed for a gasoline saw for that institution.

Many letters were received from other of our missionaries unable to speak to us in person. Bishop Rowe of Alaska wrote of being exhausted mentally, physically, spiritually and financially at the needs, sorrows and sickness among his Indians.

Our faith in the North American Indians for whom we labor in Christ has been strengthened from time to time by the tribute paid to their faithfulness and zeal by the missionary Bishops in whose keeping the Church has placed them. We have also been moved by the splendid answer they have made to the Nation's call, in giving money and sending their sons to aid in the Great War for righteousness and freedom.

Let us increase our zeal that all our Indians may be brought into Christ's Kingdom—the Church.

ANNUAL REPORT

Few of us realize the great extent and consequent opportunities of the Domestic Field. Besides Alaska, Honolulu, the Philippines and Porto Rico, there are nineteen Missionary Districts, not to mention the innumerable missions in the other Dioceses which are not considered missionary districts. We are very grateful to the following Missionaries who during the past season gave us most interesting accounts of their work, to Mr. Mayo of the Blue Ridge Industrial School, Virginia, to Father Harrison of St. Andrew's School, Tennessee, to Miss Williamson of the Mission of St. John the Baptist, Virginia, to Deaconess Williams of Dante, Virginia, and to Bishop Howden of New Mexico.

At our March meeting Bishop Beecher of Western Nebraska gave us an incentive to do better work in a fine spiritual address. In April, Mr. John Wood told us of his trip last summer through Alaska and so vivid were his descriptions that we felt as if we too had visited the different Mission Stations. Bishop Rhinelander was kind enough to come to talk to us at two of our meetings and we cannot fail to have been encouraged to do greater things in the future if we caught the vision as he presented it to us.

We are again thankful to report that we fulfilled the pledge of \$3000 for the Missionary Bishop's salary, and the pledge of \$200 for Bishop Thurston's Hospital at Macalester, also the \$50 pledge for the Chaplain's salary at Mont Alto.

We sent 79 boxes valued at \$7296.52.

Our Treasurer received \$9643.48, \$1108 was reported as sent direct, making a total of \$18,048.00 sent through the Domestic Committee this season.

ANNUAL REPORT

1917-1918

Again we can record another year of vitally interesting meetings for our Committee, under the guidance of our loved Chairman, Mrs. Knorr. We wish to thank Bishop Rhinelander for his gracious hospitality for the two meetings held at his house.

We have met all our pledges and given \$1560.20 more to St. Agnes School, Kyoto, and \$717.00 to Bishop Hulse.

Miss Littell, Deaconess Hart, Mr. Tyng and Mr. Goddard told us about our work in China; of the wonderful opportunities there and alas how slow our Church has been in her response, and so of the unsanitary and unfit buildings her soldiers are working in. A Chinese student returning to

Wuchang from America and seeing the dilapidated building our women doctors and nurses call a hospital, asks, "Why does your Church allow the sick Chinese such equipment as this?" Deaconess Hart, like Jacob, had to serve seven years to at last get a proper building for the Training School in Hankow where she is training six Bible women, four Deaconesses and a number of the wives of our native clergy whom she is helping to become real helpmates. Mr. Tyng who works for us in the great city of Changsha, with its ten million inhabitants, plead for a new school building, our Church only giving him enough for the maintenance of his work—no progress.

Mr. Goddard's description of a cellar-like room with plank boards for pews as the only place our Church has provided for divine service was pitiful; and his description of the impression on the Chinese of the Christian burial of a baby girl, most impressive of the opportunities open to us.

From Deaconess Newbold, and the Rev. Messrs. Welbourne and Chapman came the same story of the Church's marvelous opportunities in Japan, and of their need of proper equipment for her work. Especially needed is equipment for Sunday-schools, better buildings and materials; for the little children of Japan will flock there and into Christ's arms if our Church will listen and respond to their need of Christianity. Japan's leadership in the East is a settled fact, and our opportunity for helping her pattern that leadership after Christian ideals is open to us at home now, if we will but answer the appeal of many of her leading men and little children for Christian teaching.

Mr. Thomas told us of his splendid school "The Southern Cross" for boys in Porto Alegre, and his story of the building of his school was a most romantic adventure of faith. He spoke of the great need of the moral uplift of Brazilian boys who are surrounded by such terrible moral conditions that many of them go to perdition.

At our May meeting Mr. Wood said, "Bishop Lloyd found our work in Liberia distinctly encouraging, but our equipment perfectly inadequate."

From each speaker we heard the same story—the opportunities open to our Church and her lack of response in giving her soldiers proper equipment. Mrs. Lane at one of our meetings quoted Mr. Pepper, who said, "He asked some of our soldiers going to France, if they had sufficient clothing,

money, etc., and their answer was, 'Certainly, for we have Uncle Sam and our women back of us.'" The cry of the children in Belgium has touched our hearts. Why is it that the cry of just as greatly needed help from the children of China, Japan, Brazil and Mexico doesn't awaken an equally loyal response from Church men and women?

I judge the most important thing our Committee did this year was our resolution: "That as an outcome of the Pilgrimage of Prayer, we will set apart the first week in Advent for prayer for the Church and her Mission." Let us not only pray but work to arouse our Church men and women to be as loyal to Christ's cause, as we are to our countries in the great World War. Only through really loyal whole-hearted response to Christ's commission will our Church be fit to receive back our loyal men, who are ready to give *all*, that here on God's earth, His children can live by the Christ's ideals.

Let us remember Dr. Mockridge closing words in his wonderful address to us last February: "In these days especially I must give myself to spread the Truth where they do not know it, for to go back on doing this is to go back on Him."

FOREWORD OF REPORT

It is with mingled feelings of regret and hope that I have consented to write for the last time the Foreword of our Report. Regret for the lost opportunities of the past, and hopefulness for the opportunities of the future, which cannot fail to come to you under the earnest and able management of your new leaders.

In reviewing the past I ask myself whether we have really made the substantial progress which would seem to be indicated by the large increase in the attendance of our members at the monthly meetings—beginning as it did some forty years ago with an average of eight or nine ladies painfully culled from some of our larger parishes—and having increased to the fairly regular attendance of from sixty to eighty members, representing about ninety parishes. I fear that the answer must be in the negative. The world has grown so much larger, the boundaries of our city have so extended, the number of inhabitants so greatly increased, that I fear that we cannot attribute the gain in attendance to a corresponding enthusiasm for the work—judging by the results.

The sense of responsibility towards the colored race has never been felt in due proportion to that manifested for the other fields of Mission work. This is the more remarkable as that potent factor in the enterprises of men, self-interest, is so

inextricably interwoven with the uplift of the negro race. This obvious fact, however, is either not recognized, or ignored. Hence it follows that the Committee on Colored Missions has had a struggling existence, dependent upon the interest and devotion of the few who could be prevailed upon to undertake the work; and must not be judged by the standard of other committees as to results.

However, when we think of those splendid schools, monuments to such magnificent self-effacement and devotion—St. Paul's, Lawrenceville, which has had so beneficial an effect upon all within the radius of its influence, and whose Principal has so recently given the culminating proof of his devotion to his life's work by foregoing the honors of the Episcopate; and St. Augustine's, Raleigh, that lasting memorial of the beautiful lives of loving and cheerful self-sacrifice of the Principals, whose wise management has resulted in such widespread benefit to the race for whose welfare they have labored for more than a quarter of a century—we cannot but be thankful that there have been those capable of such great achievement. When, too, we recall the salaries of teachers paid, and the Missionary boxes sent to gladden the hearts and lighten the burdens of those who are doing our work in the Mission field, we feel that we have something to show for these years of our existence as a Committee, though far less than we might and should have had.

I cannot but feel that the future holds for us all, vast opportunity for self-effacement and heroism hitherto undreamed of, which the stern discipline of the World War will surely have fitted us to grapple with. May we none of us be found wanting when the bugle sounds the reveille.

Before bidding you farewell, let me recall in loving remembrance those who have labored with us in the past, and who now rest from their labors. Of whom the most lately gone from us are our beloved and faithful Secretary of so many years, Miss Virginia F. Campbell and the wife of our Archdeacon, Mrs. Henry D. Phillips—May we strive to follow their good examples!

In conclusion I have only to thank you for the kindness and forbearance you have shown to me in the past, and exhort you to uphold the hands and sustain the heart of your new executive by a ready response to her appeals for sympathy and help in the good works in which you will engage together.

ANNUAL REPORT

1917-1918

At our first meeting on September 26th, 1917, the matter of changing the order of the meetings was discussed; heretofore we have had two or three speakers all pleading for totally different Diocesan objects, the result being that the delegates had difficulty in knowing just where to give their money, then too they often gave their full parish apportionment, say for the Italian work to the first speaker not knowing that later in the year they would hear of another part of the Italian work from another speaker. After some discussion it was decided to draw up a regular programme, which was done as follows:

Only one exception was made to this programme, at our February meeting, when, at the Bishop's request, we had the pleasure of hearing Rev. Dr. John Mockridge speak to us of the work of the Church being done in the camps and what the Church War Commission has undertaken to do for the Army and Navy.

The new plan has met with encouraging results, the work being better systematized and the delegates getting a better understanding of the work of the Church in the Diocese.

The meetings have not been as well attended as in the past, owing, no doubt, to war conditions. We regret this and hope that our delegates will realize that being faithful to our Lord's work through the Church is sometimes greater Red Cross work than going to headquarters to sew or even making surgical dressings. The building up and strengthening of the Church today is what our country will need more than anything else when the war is over and reconstruction begins. Every boy must come back to find the Church spiritually so strong that it will meet all his needs.

The world has never been so ripe to receive the Gospel as today and if we can only translate our belief into our prayers, into our service and into our gifts, God will then bless our labors and they will bear fruit. Let us then pray earnestly, work diligently and give generously.

REPORT OF THE BISHOP'S BRICK FUND

1917-1918

MISS EMELYN S. McCLELLAN, *Chairman*

The Committee of the Bishop's Brick Fund wishes to thank the Woman's Auxiliary and the Diocesan Committee for their interest and kind co-operation.

This testing year has shown the work to be firmly established in the Diocese. Seven new parishes have entered into the work—St. Luke's, Kensington; St. George's, West Philadelphia; D. Michael's and All Angels, West Philadelphia; The Incarnation, Philadelphia; Chapel of The Incarnation, Drexel Hill; St. Mary's Chapel of St. Mark's Parish. These have joined with the many others in the work of church extension by the giving of small sums from many sources.

A new feature this year was a reception to the Bishop given in St. Clement's Parish Hall. The children and older members came from all parts of the Diocese, including the children from the Polish Sunday-school, and forty-five parishes were represented. The boys from St. Barnabas', Germantown, presented a beautiful allegory—"The Church and the Light." All the children had the opportunity of meeting the Bishop personally.

Through the exhibition of this work at the meeting of the Synod the idea was introduced into the Dioceses of Pittsburgh and Delaware. Miss Emily Warren of New York became interested and has written of the great interest shown in building the actual little "Churches" by the children in her parish from models purchased from the Committee. The annual presentation service was held on the eve of Whitsunday in St. Luke's, Germantown. The Church was crowded and the children presented fourteen beautiful little models of churches which they had built—each church typifying the amount gathered by the Sunday-school or Junior Auxiliary. The Women's Auxiliaries were also well presented at the service. One of the most beautiful of these models was sent to Japan by the request of Deaconess Newbold for use in her work there.

The Banner Church this year was Grace Church, Mt. Airy, with an offering of \$47.10, while St. Asaph's, Bala, came within one dollar of this amount. The total offering was a little more than other years and \$700.00 was presented to the Bishop at the service.

The Church Calendar is issued each year to pay the expenses and one thousand were sold this year through the Women's Auxiliaries and the Educational Department.

Again extending our thanks—the Committee wishes to end with these words of praise from the Bishop, which were deeply appreciated:

"It is a very beautiful and fruitful work. It will have greater and better results than you can imagine, not only in building churches, but in uniting the Diocese and giving it a sense of its own meaning."

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

1917-1918

On October 3, 1917, the Educational Secretaries and Mission Study Class leaders began the work of the year by making a Corporate Communion as a definite preparation in Fellowship for the study of the "Gospel of the Kingdom." A Conference followed with an address by the Bishop, the author of the text-book, stating as the motive of the book, to give the clue to the Study of the Bible, the goal of missionary work.

PRAYER GUILD. On the first Wednesday in October, "The Prayer Guild for the Teaching Office of the Church" made their Annual Retreat at All Saints' Church, the Rev. Charles Townsend, conductor. This Guild is a result of the Mission Study Classes of 1915-1916, and witnesses to our thankfulness for the fuller knowledge of the Christian faith gained in the classes, and our desire that the Church exercise her teaching function more fully, for her own membership and all the world.

THE SYNOD OF THE PROVINCE OF WASHINGTON meeting in this Diocese in November, Study Classes and a missionary exhibit were arranged by the Educational Department. Miss Hart led a class of 27 members on the "Gospel of the Kingdom." Mrs. Hayes represented Mission Study at the joint session, Miss Avery was Chairman for the exhibit.

CLASSES.—In this Diocese there have been 77 classes on the "Gospel of the Kingdom," with 1244 members under 42 leaders. A new work undertaken this year is the correspondence course through which 9 leaders for classes were trained—3 in this Diocese, 2 in Diocese of Easton, 1 in Diocese of Washington, 1 in Western Nebraska, 1 in Mississippi and 1 in Florida. The course was sent to one isolated church woman in Pennsylvania. Text-book and papers given to our priest in this Diocese. Our very grateful thanks are due to Mrs. Walter Pharo of the Church of the Redeemer, Bryn Mawr, for the preparation of these papers and the faithful and efficient work of correspondence and distribution.

CLASS ON PEDAGOGY.—We are so fortunate as to be able to arrange for a class on Pedagogy by Dr. Fred. Gowing, Principal of the Girls' High School. Those who attended felt it to be very practical and valuable. The representative from St. Paul's, Chestnut Hill, arranged for Dr. Gowing to hold a meeting with the Sunday-school teachers of that Parish.

EDUCATIONAL DAY was observed January 19th. Classes and conferences were held throughout the day. The capacity of the Church House was filled to overflowing.

REPORTS.—In March a Report Blank was sent to leaders and educational secretaries, the responses furnished the statistics of this Report and gave among the results of classes “new members for the Woman’s Auxiliary,” “Rector and people wonderfully impressed with this study of the Bible under the guidance of the Bishop’s Book,” “Textbook used for Adult Sunday-school Classes,” “Basis of talk for the Girls’ Friendly,” “most successfully for a Junior Auxiliary 10 to 12 years of age.”

A Dancing Class of 35 young people, boys and girls, became a Mission Study Class in Lent. Being convinced by the course of the responsibility to work for Fellowship through the Church, they decided to continue a permanent class of five committees, Foreign, Domestic, Indian, Colored and Diocesan, to meet and learn and talk and work. Correspondence with missionaries had won their real co-operation.

Special mention should be made of St. Mathias Parish where three classes were led on “The Gospel of the Kingdom”—two for men and women and one for women. At the final session of the classes for men and women it was decided by the members they must do some personal and immediate service for the King, which resulted in an organization for neighborhood missionary work. The first service of admission was arranged by the Rector for a Wednesday evening at the regular Church service. Twenty men and women and a few young girls were admitted as missionaries. We have found the Mission Study Class this year not only a training camp but a public school not only for the members of our own communion but Roman Catholics, Presbyterians, Baptists, Lutherans, Christian Science and New Thought have come to school to study the Bible under the guidance of the textbook “The Gospel of the Kingdom” and in the bonds of Christian fellowship, that most thrilling of all human relationship—fellowship by and with the King. Five hundred of the Pennsylvania assignments for the study of the text-book have been sold outside of Normal Classes with a net profit to the department of \$50.00.

THE WAR COMMISSION.—Dr. James Allen Montgomery met the members of the study classes who represent the War Commission, in the Educational Room, and gave an illuminating and informal address on the work and origin of the

Commission. On March 13th, he took a number of the class through the Navy Yard, and proposes later visits to Camp Dix and Camp Meade.

CLOSING SESSION.—The closing session of the Mission Study Classes was held April 17th in the Assembly Room at the Church House. Reports from Senior and Junior Classes were heard.

The Bishop, author of the text-book, spoke of the book as a sign-post, pointed in the right direction, showing the way to go. We who have studied it and loved it know that our hearts burned within us when we walked that way.

Mrs. Samuel Matlack, chairman of the Extension Committee, announced a "Spring Drive," especially in the rural districts, for Mission Study classes, for the conservation of the faith, for the study of God's Word, using as a guide our text-book, the Gospel of the Kingdom. So, for the first time, in this Diocese, the classes refused to be closed by the closing session.

THE EDUCATIONAL ROOM.—While this Room was dedicated and set apart for the use of Mission Study Classes—a Mission Study Class naturally leads to action. Members must express themselves in parish activities, missionary interests, in service—so the Room opened its door wide to whomever it might serve.

During the past year many hundreds of people have come, for many different purposes, both clergy and laity. The clergy call upon us for speakers, for church workers and help in various parish activities. Members of parish branches of the Woman's Auxiliary come to us for help to organize, for speakers for their meetings, for information about missionaries for whom they are preparing boxes or sending gifts. Sunday-school teachers, Girls' Friendly, and Junior Auxiliaries ask for missions that will specially interest children, and what they could make to send to them. Missionaries from Japan, China, Philippines, Alaska, Indians, mountaineers of the South and our own Diocese ask us to sell articles made in their missions.

From June 15th to September 15th the Room is closed for visitors. The principal work of the summer is connected with the various summer conferences, each one involved considerable correspondence, packing and billing the books. The preparation of the Church Missionary Calendar is done during the summer. In this Room since May, 1917, we have taken in for sales of books and mission articles, \$1465.81: for sales of Church Missionary Calendars, \$1921.08, making a total of \$3386.89. Of this amount \$315.00 cleared for missions, \$275 cleared on books, an average of 25 per cent., \$300.00 cleared on Church Mission Calendar, sent to Board of Mission. Total profits, \$890.00.

"Immediately after the war was declared the Church Periodical Club determined to extend to all chaplains in the Army and Navy the same service that was already given to a few.

When the Church War Commission called together the representatives of all Church organizations, engaged in war work, the Church Periodical Club offered their services to assist in providing some equipments for the various chaplains called to serve in the camps and for services in France."

Such services are being used and extended and in co-operation with the Brotherhood of St. Andrew also. The Secretaries turn over all the appeals for reading matter to the Periodical Club. This work has been of very great benefit to the many chaplains in the Base Hospitals, Red Cross, and Military Hospitals of the U. S. Army as well as to those connected with the Navy.

The Correspondent takes great pleasure in calling attention to the fact, that after making the appeal for this work abroad, so many of the different parishes in the Diocese came at once to her assistance and now there are about 350 magazines going each week and month wrapped and sent by mail for the use of the various chaplains to distribute as they think best for the use of the men in the Hospitals scattered over the various camps in France.

The following report of the eighty-nine parishes in the Diocese shows what progress has been made both in the mission field and in the war zone for the year of 1917-1918. It

is earnestly hoped that with the encouragement we have had in this work with the great co-operation with the Woman's Auxiliary, that those parishes in the Diocese which have not yet contributed, may now during this coming winter be able also to co-operate in this great and growing work that we have still before us.

Constitution of the PENNSYLVANIA BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of this Association shall be the Pennsylvania Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE II

Object

The object of the Association shall be to carry out within the Diocese of Pennsylvania the purpose and work of the Woman's Auxiliary as approved by the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE III

Membership

The Church itself is the Missionary Society. Every baptized person is a member of the Society; therefore, every baptized woman in the Diocese should be an active member of this Auxiliary.

ARTICLE IV

Organization

The Officers of this Association shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Secretary, an Assistant Secretary, an Educational Secretary, a Treasurer, Treasurer of the United Offering and the Junior Office. These officers shall serve for three years and they shall be eligible for one more term.

The President shall appoint a nominating committee which will prepare the ballot. The nominations shall then be submitted to the Bishop for his approval, after which they will be sent to each parish one month in advance of the annual meeting in April, when the election shall be held.

The Board shall have power to fill all vacancies which may occur during the period before the next election.

ARTICLE V

Standing Committees

This Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary shall be organized into five Standing Committees—Indians' Hope, Domestic, Foreign, Work Among the Colored People, and the Diocesan.

At the Annual Meeting of each Standing Committee its officers for the ensuing year shall be elected by the delegates from a ticket

presented by a nominating committee appointed by the Chairman at the March meeting, said ticket having been approved by the Bishop.

Each standing committee shall pay a due proportion of the expense of the Executive Board.

ARTICLE VI

Executive Board

The general management is entrusted to an Executive Board composed of the Diocesan officers and the officers of the standing committees.

Representation of the Girls' Friendly Society, the Church Periodical Club, Daughters of the King, and St. Barnabas Guild shall also be members of the Executive Board without power to vote.

The stated meetings of the Executive Board shall be held before and after the general meetings.

The annual meeting of the Executive Board shall be held in April.

ARTICLE VII

President

The President shall preside at all meetings of the Executive Board. She shall appoint all members of committees necessary for the transacting of the work of the Executive Board. She shall be *ex-officio* member of all committees. She shall visit Parish Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary and seek opportunity to establish branches in parishes where there are none, and fill all other duties pertaining to her office.

ARTICLE VIII

Vice-Presidents

In the absence of the President, a Vice-President shall preside at meetings of the Executive Board and fill all duties belonging to the office.

ARTICLE IX

Secretary

The Secretary shall give notice of all meetings ordered by the Executive Board. She shall keep a record of such meetings, and prepare and present Minutes at each meeting. She shall prepare an abstract of the Minutes of the year for the Annual Report. She shall send a copy of the Annual Report to every officer of the Executive Board, to every Rector, Minister in Charge, and Missionary of the Diocese of Pennsylvania, to the General Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, and to the President of every Branch in the Province.

The Secretary shall advertise public meetings in such ways as seem best.

ARTICLE X

Treasurer

The Treasurer shall receive, record, disburse and keep account of all funds of the Executive Board. She shall present an itemized statement in writing at each stated meeting of the Board and prepare a report for publication at the end of the fiscal year. Her books shall be audited by a committee appointed by the President.

ARTICLE XI

Publication Committee

The President shall appoint annually a Committee on the Publication of the Annual Report, said committee to consist of the Treasurer and Secretary from each of the five standing committees, with a Chairman. This committee shall receive all copy, typewritten, for the Annual Report and take entire charge of all its publications. It shall be the duty of this committee to estimate the cost of the Annual Report, charging each of the five standing committees, the United Offering and the Church Periodical Club, *pro rata*, for space used. The Executive Committee shall pay the balance from the Expense Fund.

ARTICLE XII

Amendment

The Constitution can be amended at any regular meeting of the Board by a two-thirds vote, provided the amendment was submitted in writing at the previous regular meeting.
