## IN MEMORIAM

### MRS. THOMAS NEILSON

In the death of Mrs. Thomas Neilson the whole Diocese of Pennsylvania has sustained an irreparable loss. During a long life, extending over a period of more than ninety years, she had been interested in many kinds of Christian work—but her heart went out *especially* to Missionary Work, to which she devoted herself with a burning zeal—and an enthusiasm which was contagious.

For forty-three years she was Chairman of the Domestic Committee of the Woman's Auxiliary in our Diocese, and was in constant and personal touch with all our Missionary Bishops—to whose many and oft-times pathetic appeals she had always responded with the warmest sympathy.

During a term of ten years she served faithfully and conscientiously as President of the whole Auxiliary, and to this work she gave herself with a wonderful whole-heartedness, until obliged to resign the important position on account of physical weakness.

She was a loving wife, a devoted mother and a staunch, loyal-hearted friend. To her surviving children and relatives the heart of the whole Diocese goes out in tenderest sympathy. Amid the galaxy of noble women whom our Diocese has produced, the name of Mrs. Thomas Neilson will always shine out as among the noblest and truest, and to those who were privileged to be admitted into the inner circle of her love and friendship, her memory will ever be an inspiration and stimulus to all high ideals of Christian living and thinking. May light perpetual shine upon her.

## REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

1918-1919

The change in the Church fiscal year to correspond with the calendar year makes this report cover sixteen months.

The summer of 1918 was given to preparation for our Advent Call. Dean Rousmaniere, of St. Paul's Cathedral, Boston, conducted our autumn devotional meeting on November 15th, at St. James' Church, Twenty-second and Walnut Streets, and gave us a very clear vision of the part women must take in these reconstruction days.

At the conference, in the afternoon, the same note was stressed.

The value of the Advent Call cannot be estimated by reports. That it was the needed preparation for the greater work, which has since opened before us, there can be no doubt.

Our Epiphany meeting was held at the Church of the Saviour, West Philadelphia, on January 9, 1919, Bishop Garland presiding.

Bishop Lloyd first gave a graphic description of the work in Liberia, as he had so recently seen it, and told of our great opportunity *today*—not some tomorrow after Mohammedanism has swept in.

Next Bishop Sage gave a pathetic picture of the needs in Western Kansas, where we have been giving .01 per capita per year for the work. The Bishop was called home in the prime of life before he knew that the Church today has set herself the task to remedy such conditions.

Bishop Rhinelander spoke for our Diocesan work and of the importance of our "Demonstration Stations," such as St. Martha's House and similar institutions.

The Rev. Everard Daniell pleaded for work among the colored people and begged that we adequately support our Church institutions, which alone can train the leaders to work among their own people.

The Rev. Mr. Creasey brought a bit of the far West and Indian life very vividly before us, clearly showing that the work being done by our church is not paternalism, but the only logical way to train the Indian for citizenship.

The spring conference was held at the Church House on April 30th, when representatives from the Girls' Friendly

Society, Daughters of the King, St. Barnabas' Guild, Church Mission of Help and the Church Periodical Club all reported on work done in their organizations during the year.

Miss Tillottson then outlined the plan of the Nation-Wide Campaign and spoke of it as the most hopeful sign of our times. The adoption of the plan by the whole Church at the General Convention marks the beginning, we believe, of a new era. While the Nation-Wide Campaign in our diocese is still unfinished, we already know what it has done for individuals, for parishes, for the diocese and the Church at large.

The creation of the Church Service League at the triennial and the federation of all national organizations for women's work is a great step forward in co-operation.

The autumn devotional meeting was held at the Church of the Holy Apostles on November 19th, and was conducted by Bishop Tucker, of Kyoto, Japan. He made very clear that the only power which can influence the world today is a *vital* religion. A *demonstrated* Christianity. "Ye are my witnesses" is as true today as when spoken 1900 years ago. We may have great leaders and wonderful plans and machinery for carrying out our plans, but we must remember that "efficiency does not consist in cold knowledge or bald skill. At the helm must stand motive, while aloft, trimming the sails, must be purpose, sentiment and sympathy."

With the goal of "World Service Through the Church" before us may all our work bear this stamp of true efficiency.

## ANNUAL REPORT

Owing to the changing this year of the Church's fiscal year to January, the following report of the work of the Indians' Hope Association will include all of 1919 as well as September, October, November and December of 1918.

The Treasurer received during this period a total of two thousand eight hundred sixty-six dollars and fifty cents (\$2866.50).

The Treasurer of Specials received a total of four thousand five hundred ninety-two dollars (\$4592.00).

The Box Committee reports that the total valuation of the missionary boxes for the sixteen months is two thousand

four hundred twenty-nine dollars and twenty-six cents (\$2429.26).

The meetings for last winter began on September 30, 1918, with a corporate communion in the Chapel of the Church House. The Rev. Llewellyn Caley, of St. Jude and the Nativity, was the celebrant.

The Rev. Augustus H. Hoare, Point Hope, Alaska, told us of the work among the Eskimo Indians in his district of fifteen hundred miles. Mr. Hoare is endeavoring to train a native ministry as being best fitted to cope with their own racial characteristics and habits of thought. We raised sixty dollars for this object, which was paid through the Domestic Committee, under whose offices his district is placed.

The Rev. Sidney W. Creasey, of Fort Hall, Idaho, reported in person the finishing of the new Mission House there, to the building of which we contributed last year. There is a mortgage on the Mission House, and Mr. Creasey wanted to raise the money to pay this off. We contributed two hundred forty-eight dollars and twenty-five cents (\$248.25) to this object.

We noted with regret last winter the loss of two dear friends: Bishop Brooke, of Oklahoma, and Bishop Funsten, of Idaho.

Bishop Thomas and Bishop Burleson came to tell us of the progress of the work in their districts and outlined work they hoped to do in the coming months. The Niobrara Course of Instruction for the Indians of South Dakota, which is intended to thoroughly instruct a native people, being one of Bishop Burleson's plans to which he hopes to give a five years' trial, and to which we contributed one thousand one dollars and fifty cents. We also contributed this year about three hundred dollars to the new translation of the prayer-book for the Indians of South Dakota.

We endeavored last winter to raise the money to pay our many special pledges so as to finish them before our meetings for the winter ended, and with such success that the money was in hand one month before our last session.

We began our meetings for this winter on September 29, 1919, with a corporate communion. The Rev. Mr. Creasey, formerly of Fort Hall, Idaho, now of the Church of the Atonement, Morton, Pa., was the celebrant, and made an address. Afterwards Mrs. J. Willis Martin spoke to us about the necessity for the work of the Nation-Wide Campaign.

The glowing reports in October of the wonderful outpour-

ing of the Holy Spirit at the Convention in Detroit was a source of great inspiration to many of us.

Last winter Bishop Moreland, of Sacramento, kept us in touch with the work among the Karok Indians of the Klamath Valley, California. This mission was established by the Indians' Hope Association, who paid the salary of the priest in charge until the Board of Missions assumed the care of the work. There is a beautiful little church at this mission, built by the prayers and gifts of many friends in the East, and the only church within forty or fifty miles. A service flag over the altar with twenty-two stars, one turned to gold, tells of the young Indian churchmen in the service of their country. In October, 1919, the Rev. Mr. Baker, missionary to the Karoks, came to tell us in person of the progress of the work there, and of the great need for a rectory and community hall. We voted to raise in the coming year two thousand dollars towards the rectory.

In response to a telegram sent to the Board of Missions, we raised one hundred twenty-seven dollars towards buying food for the Indians along the Yukon River, in Alaska, who are starving on account of the failure of the salmon catch, owing to the establishment of a cannery, by permission of the Government, at the mouth of the Yukon River. Bishop Rowe has been in Washington trying to have this permission rescinded. Archdeacon Stuck, in December, gave us details of this latest of the long list of outrages and iniquities perpetrated against the Indians of this country. It is one thing to erect canneries on small mountain streams, but quite another to establish one on a great river twenty-two hundred miles long with about six hundred miles of tributaries covering an area as large as Texas. Four thousand Indians are affected directly by the loss of the winter's supply of salmon and will starve unless aid is forthcoming immediately, and will lose all of their dogs, whose sole food is salmon. About thirty thousand Indians are affected indirectly. Archdeacon Stuck will also go to Washington and try with others to right this great wrong.

We have answered many appeals made by letter, and contributed to different objects duly noted in the Treasurer's and Special Treasurer's reports. Miss Elizabeth B. Murphy, who has been serving since the resignation of Miss Howell, was elected our new Registrar at our annual meeting in May.

## ANNUAL REPORT

We must begin our report with the statement that the size of the figures and totals with which we will close are the result of reporting for sixteen months instead of our usual report of one year's work.

During the past sixteen months we have had the benefit of several deepening influences to strengthen us spiritually. First came the influenza in October. Then our November meeting in 1918 took place on November 11th, the memorable day of the armistice. Bishop Rhinelander was our speaker that morning, and he told us that "the victory achieved by our soldiers and allies was simply to release the power for the operation of spiritual force." Shortly after this came the Advent Call to prayer, and recently we had the arousing of the Church in the Nation-Wide Campaign.

At our monthly meetings we have had the pleasure and educational advantage of hearing the following persons tell of the work in the domestic field. Dr. Francis White, who is Domestic Secretary to the Department of Missions, gave us a most interesting bird's-eye view of the whole field. Mrs. Hughson, of Morganton, N. C., told us of the growth of Grace Hospital since its beginning twelve years ago, especially of its social service work. Mrs. Wetmore gave us an account of the patriotism of Christ School, Arden, N. C., during the war, in spite of the German propaganda which was rife all through the mountains of the Southern States. Archdeacon

Rich, of Southwest Virginia, spoke to us for the first time of the Church's work in the mining towns in that district. Our address during Lent of 1919 was given by Bishop Howden, of New Mexico, who told us that it was "the most solemn Lent that had ever come to us, a great cataclysm has gone over us and left us to gather together the pieces. He said that the great purpose of life is the consecration of it to a great ideal, and what could be a greater ideal than the Kingdom of God. In April Rev. Charles Hale, of Kingsport, Tenn., gave us a most inspiring account of the new work he had undertaken in the upper corner of Tennessee and of the rapid growth of his Sunday-school, whose pupils are the very best Americans, 99 per cent. pure stock. This fall we had a vision of the nation-wide campaign from Rev. Samuel Booth, of our own Diocesan Church of St. Mary, calling upon the Woman's Auxiliary to do its share in the work of the Campaign, and showing us our individual responsibility in the matter. In November Bishop Page, of Spokane, came to us as a representative of all the Domestic Missionary Dioceses and told us, most generously, more about the needs of the other dioceses than of his own. He said the great failure of the Church is with the children, that there should be much more attention given to their religious education.

Several times during the past season, at our request, Bishop Rhinelander has given us unsparingly of his time, and through his wise counsel and helpful instruction we have received our best incentive for greater effort in the future.

The Domestic Committee, in common with all the other committees of the Woman's Auxiliary, is wondering what our part will be in the reconstruction of the work of the Church. Will our help be required in the new budget arranged by the Domestic Missionary Bishops? Will our financial support be needed in just the same way that we have always given it, or can we be of more use in some other way? Who will show us the best means of procedure for the greatest possible field of usefulness in the future?

We fulfilled all of our pledges in 1919 and were especially thankful that we were enabled to pay the Missionary Bishop's salary, which was increased to \$3600.

We sent sixty-nine boxes in the sixteen months, amounting to \$10,262.32 in value.

Our Treasurer reports that she paid out \$9651.82, and it has been reported to us by several parishes that \$475.00 was sent by them direct to different parts of the domestic field, making a total of \$20,389.14.

## ANNUAL REPORT

September, 1918—December, 1919

It is almost an impossibility to make our report brief, as it must cover sixteen months, for from now on it is to accord with the calendar year. Remember, not only have we heard thrilling talks from our men and women, home from the Church's work overseas, but two most stupendous events have occurred. The great war came to an end and because of that, and following close on it, has come the world's challenge to our Church: Are you of value at this crisis? Will you do your part in helping to establish in the world those ideals for which so many men gave their lives? Will you as a whole Church, every individual in it, "carry on"? All through those months we heard this repeated call to service.

As a committee we have much to be thankful for in the generous response through our delegates of money; also gifts

to our boxes, and especially for the continual gracious leadership of our President, Mrs. Knorr. Last May this committee had the pleasure, for the first time, of electing Mrs. Knorr. According to the new constitution, all our officers were nominated by an appointed committee, and being approved by the Bishop, were re-elected by ballot for the ensuing year. We owe a vote of thanks to Miss Blakiston. The new system she worked out of dividing our annual pledges into definite ones for each month has met with the heartiest approval

It is hoped every delegate will inform herself about the objects of the coming month's pledges, and so be able to interest her parish Branch in them, and that as far as possible each Branch will promise through her a definite monthly amount. It is a joyful fact that our pledges for the past year were all met. We wish to thank Mrs. Bonsall for her untiring work about our boxes, and we hope every parish will respond to her appeal for our 1920 boxes. No parish would fail to contribute if they knew the pleasure and great help the boxes mean as described by Miss Seaman, from Liberia.

Thrilling appeals came through our men from China, "our daughter over the sea," as Mr. Tong, of Wusih, here at our Divinity School, called her. Dr. Taylor told us that the Rockefeller Institute, after investigating our hospital, St. James, Anking, had generously offered to give \$30,000, provided our Church would raise \$10,000 more, to make a total of \$40,000, which amount they thought necessary to properly equip the present building and for needed additional buildings. Dr. Taylor, our one foreign doctor for eight years for that hospital, in a great city of many millions, felt he must return, and could not remain here in America to try to raise the extra \$10,000. Our committee therefore decided to make an effort to raise it, and Mrs. Knorr appointed Mrs. Pepper chairman of a small committee to appeal to the Church for it. We wish to thank Mrs. Pepper and her committee and to report that the Board has \$10,100 in hand, of which Pennsylvania gave \$4,579.33. Dr. Taylor in a recent letter of thanks to Mrs. Pepper writes that owing to the present depleted rate of exchange, he does need more money and will be most gratified for any additional gifts. But his great plea is for our earnest prayers, that some of our young church men and women will give their lives to the work at St. James, now so pitifully undermanned.

Miss Word told us about her new training school for librarians in connection with Boone College, Wuchang. To equip herself for this new school she spent most of her short furlough at home, taking a librarian course at Simmons

College, Boston, to help meet the expense of which our committee sold some Chinese embroideries she brought home. It is to meet just such extra expense and needs of our missionaries during their vacations that the fund of \$50,000 (a memorial to the Misses Emery for their many years of faithful service) is to be given.

Miss Word told us of Mr. Tong's wonderful opportunity to give lectures in some of China's great cities as a trained librarian, and said with Mr. Hu's return from Columbia, in June, they would now make a staff of three teachers for the new school, for which seven students are already enrolled. She asked for pledges of \$25 annually for five years towards the support of the school.

Rev. Edmund Lee asked us to give our share of \$2000 needed for the annual support of a school at Kuling, China, for missionaries' children. This school is greatly needed, so that the missionaries will no longer have to fear the hardship of separation from their children by sending them home to schools when they are only twelve years old. Mrs. Ely made a most eloquent plea for the much needed new buildings for St. Mary's, Shanghai. She told us of the wonderful Christian influence St. Mary's girls had throughout China, as teachers in government schools, and in their homes.

Rev. Roger Walke gave a most interesting account of the effect the war had on Japan. In the beginning the Japanese were inclined to be pro-German, because of their great admiration for Germany's military strength and efficiency. Gradually this admiration turned towards us, as she realized our strength as a military power and that we entered the war for ideals and not for sport. She now looks to us for Christian ideals, and because of this fact our Church is facing a crisis of using another God-given opportunity to make her influence felt in Japan, or of again missing it as she has in the past. "Keep Japan intimately on your hearts, and pray that our Church will give the greatly needed gifts and lives for her work there."

The reports of what Dr. Teusler and Bishop Tucker and other missionaries did in Siberia under the Red Cross made us justly proud of those splendid representatives of our Church. Through their work during the terrible typhus epidemic, 500 miles in the interior, a great many lives were saved. St. Luke's, Tokio, served as a basis for many wounded Czecko-Slovaks.

Miss Seaman told us how handicapped our work in Liberia has been, from the fact that they have had no white clergyman there since Mr. Matthews left five years ago. Bishop Lloyd's visit was the greatest help to all the stations,

where he baptized many natives and confirmed seven hundred. She spoke of the great need for workers. Miss Ridgely was our only white worker in Liberia last winter, Miss Conway having to be away because of illness.

Of our work in Latin-America we heard very interesting accounts. Bishop Hulse's most touching appeal for help in Cuba moved our committee deeply. He made us realize again that oft-repeated fact that our Church accepts just such a splendid man's gifts of his life to our work, and then fails to give him the absolutely necessary support to carry forward that work, into which he has put his whole heart and mind and strength. The overcrowded housing conditions in Cuba, similar to ours here, had raised rents far beyond all money the Bishop had received, and he told us unless the Church put up buildings our work would be literally squeezed out. Our committee unanimously passed a resolution to raise \$3000 towards the \$8000 necessary to put up the first floor for a girl's school at Guantanamo, of which Miss Ashhurst, from our own city, is the head. The Bishop, counting on our promise, has started the building, and Miss Blakiston reports \$2,014.50 on hand.

In September, Mr. Walke again made the address, this time of the Nation-Wide Campaign, "The Why of It?" "Because we love the Lord Jesus Christ and want to bring the world to Him." He spoke of the obstacles we would be sure to meet, and our absolute need to turn to Christ in prayer for strength and guidance. Dr. White, our Domestic Secretary, echoed this by saying, "No amount of organization can make this campaign a success unless we as a Church are on our knees." Not one of us will ever forget Bishop Kinsolving's heart-burning words. His soul and ours were stirred to the very depths as he told us to pray that our Church will awake and realize her present grave crisis and by God's grace and Holy Spirit be enabled to answer her great challenge. He said, "Our Church is bankrupt financially, bankrupt in her education, but worst of all, bankrupt in her ministry. Go home and pray about this. Consecrate your cradles. Our Church is not giving clergy. In all these twenty-five years of my work in Brazil amongst twenty-three million people, our Church has given me just four men. We now have twenty clergy, that is, each of the four men has multiplied himself by five native clergymen, a 500 per cent. increase. Tell this fact to your husbands and sons who say foreign missions don't pay! The great need of our Church is democratization. Our laymen are not interested. Every individual must be interested to do his part. The whole Church for the whole world. It is

your business to pray for the success of this campaign, for you are the "Vanguard of Christ's Kingdom in this Diocese."

Are we, each member of this committee, living up to this title? Each month we heard the same story, how sadly un-equipped and pitifully undermanned our Church work is everywhere overseas. Are we giving our lives, asking our sons and daughters to give their lives to the spread of Christ's Kingdom everywhere? Will we each one do our full part to help our Church meet her present opportunities and obligations, so that she will prove more than worthy of the world's challenge, by proving worthy of her Lord Jesus Christ?

## FOREWORD OF REPORT

During the past sixteen months which this report covers, the Committee on Colored Missions has not escaped the changes which have taken place in many of our organizations, and comes before you, for the first time in its history, with entirely new officers.

After forty-two years of most persevering and devoted service as President, Mrs. Hodge resigned from office in this committee. During these years the small group of women organized to assist the Board of Missions in this department of its work has grown into a large committee representing most of the parishes in the diocese, and as a fitting tribute to Mrs. Hodge and in grateful appreciation of her example, gave in the past year to the endowment fund of St. Agnes's Hospital, Raleigh, N. C., one thousand dollars to support the hospital for two days and nights each year, naming them "The Mary deV. Hodge Days."

The purposes of the committee are to support only those missions and institutions for which the Church is responsible, and to put before the delegates by speakers representing those institutions, the plans and methods adopted by the Church to develop the work in the South.

Miss Lindley addressed us on the general work of the Auxiliary; Dr. Patton on the educational work as a whole, while Archdeacon Russell, of St. Paul's School, Lawrenceville; Archdeacon Baskerville, representing the parish and rural schools of South Carolina; Miss Bowden, a United Offering

worker, principal of St. Philip's School for Girls, in San Antonio, and Mrs. Demby, of Hoffman St. Mary's School for Girls, Keeling, Tenn., all gave us most interesting accounts of the satisfactory work they were doing.

Mrs. Hunter pleaded for the endowment of St. Agnes's Hospital with its training school for nurses; and Bishop Demby put before us the tremendous need in the Southwest for every kind of mission work, evangelical, educational and social, if we would train the millions of negroes in this land to become useful Christian citizens.

The Box Committee reports that a large number of clergy and institutions have been supplied with clothing; and the Treasurer's report shows that, besides paying the pledges for salaries and scholarships, we have given substantial aid to the various speakers.

One gratifying evidence of an increased interest in our committee has been the request to have the work presented at different parish Auxiliary meetings. This is a most practical method of bringing information to those who rarely attend the large diocesan meetings, and we welcome all such opportunities and invitations.

We do not know what changes in our methods and work may be put before us by the new council; but of this we may be very sure: that greater effort, more consecrated and intelligent service, more heartfelt prayers and a firmer faith in the abiding Presence of the Holy Spirit will alone fit us for the enlarged work that the Church is preparing to put before us in the near future.

## ANNUAL REPORT

Year 1918-1919

This report covers a period of sixteen months. From September, 1918, to May, 1919, the program of the previous year was followed in method:

OCTOBER—*Missions.* St. Gabriel's, St. George's.

NOVEMBER—*Colored Work.* Archdeacon Phillips, etc.

DECEMBER—*Foreign.* Rev. Elliot White on Polish and Rev. J. L. Zacker on Jewish work.

JANUARY—*Rural.* Rev. Messrs. Cresson, Sanford and Emhardt.

FEBRUARY—*City Missions and Deaconess House.* Dr. Jeffreys and Deaconess Carter.

MARCH—*Social Service and Church Farm School.* Rev. C. W. Shreiner, Deaconess Morris for St. Agnes' House, Mrs. Stewart for Chapel of the Transfiguration.

APRIL—*Institutional.* Galilee Mission, Home of St. Michael and All Angels'.

MAY—*Social Meeting.* Picnic to Valley Forge. Annual Reports and Elections.

At the May meeting, Mrs. Randall caused consternation to her devoted committee by her resignation. Bishop Rhinelander in a touching tribute to her splendid service and unselfish spirit, showed the reason for the change. Mrs. Randall was to remain on the committee as First Vice-President, to work as before, with all her heart, the committee being greatly strengthened by the efficient chairmanship of Mrs. J. Willis Martin, head of the Emergency Aid of Pennsylvania.

During the summer, Mrs. Martin made a study of the diocese. She attended the triennial convention at Detroit in October, was the able Chairman of the Women's Committee of the Nation-Wide Campaign for Pennsylvania, and is working out many reforms and plans for greater efficiency in the Diocesan Committee. Among other things, the Executive Board meets weekly, sub-committees are being formed, a diocesan office is to be organized, which will be open daily all the year, and a sewing room on Red Cross lines is soon to become a place of preparing and distributing work for our diocesan institutions.

The Church Service Recruiting Bureau, under Mrs. Frederick Howland, is a new and growing aid to the diocese. It fits the worker to the work and provides a clearing house for teachers, social service workers, friendly visitors, secretaries, etc.

Social Service and Americanization loom large in opportunity and interest. St. John's Settlement House, Third and Brown Streets, and St. Agnes's, Kensington, are growing rapidly and could do much more with greater means and facilities. The work among the Jews must be pushed and our earnest missionary, Rev. John L. Zacker, aided in his zeal to bring our Lord's own people to know and love their Messiah.

St. George's Kensington, has dedicated its new building and organ and is thriving wonderfully under Rev. A. J. Arkin, Beneath its hospitable roof a Polish and an Italian congregation also hold the services of the Church.

The Nation-Wide Campaign has shown us our work. We must do better and bigger things in our own diocese. "The light that shines farthest, shines brightest at home." Accept, O Lord, the little we have done, as done for Thee and by Thee, and purify and increase it to Thy glory.

## REPORT OF THE BISHOP'S BRICKS FUND, 1918-1919

This, our seventh year, has been our most prosperous time, in many respects. There have been new features and interest still increasing. We have received larger amounts from the parishes and *four* of them were in hot contest for the Bishop's Banner, namely, St. Martin's-in-the-Fields, the Church of the Covenant, All Souls' Church for the Deaf, and St. Peter's, Germantown. This was the second occasion when this coveted honor has been won by this parish. The first time in 1913-1914.

We have at last reached the thousand-dollar offering hoped for, and as we have not yet embraced one-third of all the parishes, all the institutions or all the individuals in this great Diocese of Pennsylvania, we hope to put forth greater efforts and that we may perhaps double that sum.

The Church Calendar, issued to cover necessary expenses, is increasingly popular.

## THE UNITED THANK OFFERING OF THE WOMEN OF THE CHURCH

### Object of the Offering of 1922

By resolution, the United Thank Offering of 1922 is to be used for women's work in the mission field, including the training, sending and support of the women workers and the care of such workers when sick or disabled, provided that one-tenth of the offering be set aside as a permanent trust fund, the income to be applied to the support of retired United Thank Offering workers; also provided that the sum of not less than \$10,000 be devoted to building purposes.

## REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

April, 1918—January, 1920

*A Spring Drive.* At the closing session of the Study Classes, April, 1918, the Chairman of the Extension Committee announced a spring drive, especially in rural districts, for the study of the Bible, using as a guide our text-book, "The Gospel of the Kingdom;" and so the classes refused to be closed with the "closing session." As a result, thirty-nine clergymen were personally approached, two sample classes were held in nine places, representing twenty-five parishes. From these ten classes were organized for the full course.

*Prayer Guild.* On the first Wednesday in October the Prayer Guild for the teaching office of the Church made its annual retreat at St. Mark's, Rev. Earl Tiedeman, conductor. This guild is a result of the mission study classes of 1915-1916.

*The Advent Call.* During the fall and early winter the work of the Educational Department was given in answer to the Advent Call. A normal class of thirty members trained leaders for forty-six group classes, three to seven parishes represented in each group. Fifteen hundred in classes.

*Epiphany Normal Classes* opened January 13, 1919. Subject, "Christian Citizenship." Watchword, "Service." Motto, "On the King's Service." Text-book, "Our Church and Our Country."

*Educational Day*, observed January 22d, opened with Holy Communion at 8.30, the Bishop, celebrant. This was followed by a diocesan breakfast in the Church club room, about sixty men and women present. The general subject for Educational Day was "Results and Opportunities of the Advent Call." Subject for the afternoon session, "Recruits Needed for the Church's Service to the City." This resulted in the Church Service Recruiting Office, Mrs. Frederick H. Howland, Recruiting Officer.

*Lenten Classes.* A diocesan class at the Church House. Parish classes daily during Lent. A class for men and women opened Shrove Tuesday night. Fifty-seven parish classes; five group classes, with 1183 members, under twenty-nine leaders.

*Outside the Diocese.* Five leaders were trained for New Jersey in our normal classes. Classes were led in Washington, West Virginia and Massachusetts. Pennsylvania assignments for class work were used successfully in various other dioceses.

*Reports.* In March a report blank was sent to leaders and educational secretaries, the replies furnishing the statistics for this report. Among results a class of eight high school girls, colored, most interested and faithful. The Educational Secretary of St. Martin's-in-the-Fields reports a class of twenty men and women on the Every Member canvass, led by Dr. Jefferys. One leader reports that most of her class joined a "ward" of St. Andrew's, Tennessee; also the Church Extension Fund of this diocese. One class on the Gospel of the Kingdom reports four Quakers baptized, and two more considering baptism.

*Closing Session.* The closing session of the Mission Study Classes was held March 29, 1919. Reports from Junior and Senior classes, the Spring Drive and Church Service Recruiting Office were read. The message of the year's course on Christian Citizenship was given by ten members of the classes. The Bishop received and presented the gifts of the classes, made a short address, offered our prayers and thanksgiving, and dismissed us with the blessing.

Perhaps at the beginning of the year we were tempted to fear that the Advent Call would interfere with study class work by delaying it, but with "Service" for our watchword, "On the King's Service" our motto, we find the *unity* of *Christian* service in *Christ*.

On the second Wednesday in October, 1919, the Prayer Guild made its annual retreat at the Diocesan Church of St. Mary.

*The Mission Study Class's subject for 1919 and 1920* is the Church's mission to the immigrant. Text-book, "Neighbors." Watchword, "Reconciliation." The Educational Secretary led the first class on this subject at Wellesley, Massachusetts, June, 1919, with thirty-four members from fourteen dioceses. A class at the General Convention on the Nation-Wide Campaign with seventy-five members from forty dioceses. Diocesan classes on the Church's mission to the immigrant

were held Monday afternoons and Tuesday mornings, from October 28th to December 17th, with a membership of thirty-nine, representing thirty-six parishes. Four classes on the Nation-Wide Campaign, with a membership of one hundred. Four classes on the Bible in a girls' school.

April, 1918-January, 1920. Thirty-two classes led by the Educational Secretary, with a membership of 1045.

*The Educational Room.* Though dedicated and set apart for Mission Study Classes, various other meetings are held in the room, speakers supplied, information given, leaflets distributed, Christmas and Easter cards sold, books and missionary goods.

Miss Elizabeth Fisher has been added to the staff as Librarian, proving not only of great assistance to the Educational Secretary, but to those consulting the department concerning books for various purposes and occasions.

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Constitution of the  
PENNSYLVANIA BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S  
AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS

ARTICLE I

*Name*

The name of this Association shall be the Pennsylvania Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE II

*Object*

The object of the Association shall be to carry out within the Diocese of Pennsylvania the purpose and work of the Woman's Auxiliary as approved by the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE III

*Membership*

The Church itself is the Missionary Society. Every baptized person is a member of the Society; therefore, every baptized woman in the Diocese should be an active member of this Auxiliary.

ARTICLE IV

*Organization*

The Officers of this Association shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Secretary, an Assistant Secretary, an Educational Secretary, a Treasurer, Treasurer of the United Offering and the Junior Office. These officers shall serve for three years and they shall be eligible for one more term.

The President shall appoint a nominating committee which will prepare the ballot. The nominations shall then be submitted to the Bishop for his approval, after which they will be sent to each parish one month in advance of the annual meeting in April, when the election shall be held.

The Board shall have power to fill all vacancies which may occur during the period before the next election.

ARTICLE V

*Standing Committees*

This Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary shall be organized into five Standing Committees—Indians' Hope, Domestic, Foreign, Work Among the Colored People, and the Diocesan.

At the Annual Meeting of each Standing Committee its officers for the ensuing year shall be elected by the delegates from a ticket

presented by a nominating committee appointed by the Chairman at the March meeting, said ticket having been approved by the Bishop.

Each standing committee shall pay a due proportion of the expense of the Executive Board.

## ARTICLE VI

### *Executive Board*

The general management is entrusted to an Executive Board composed of the Diocesan officers and the officers of the standing committees.

Representation of the Girls' Friendly Society, the Church Periodical Club, Daughters of the King, and St. Barnabas Guild shall also be members of the Executive Board without power to vote.

The stated meetings of the Executive Board shall be held before and after the general meetings.

The annual meeting of the Executive Board shall be held in April.

## ARTICLE VII

### *President*

The President shall preside at all meetings of the Executive Board. She shall appoint all members of committees necessary for the transacting of the work of the Executive Board. She shall be *ex-officio* member of all committees. She shall visit Parish Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary and seek opportunity to establish branches in parishes where there are none, and fill all other duties pertaining to her office.

## ARTICLE VIII

### *Vice-Presidents*

In the absence of the President, a Vice-President shall preside at meetings of the Executive Board and fill all duties belonging to the office.

## ARTICLE IX

### *Secretary*

The Secretary shall give notice of all meetings ordered by the Executive Board. She shall keep a record of such meetings, and prepare and present Minutes at each meeting. She shall prepare an abstract of the Minutes of the year for the Annual Report. She shall send a copy of the Annual Report to every officer of the Executive Board, to every Rector, Minister in Charge, and Missionary of the Diocese of Pennsylvania, to the General Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, and to the President of every Branch in the Province.

The Secretary shall advertise public meetings in such ways as seem best.

## ARTICLE X

### *Treasurer*

The Treasurer shall receive, record, disburse and keep account of all funds of the Executive Board. She shall present an itemized statement in writing at each stated meeting of the Board and prepare a report for publication at the end of the fiscal year. Her books shall be audited by a committee appointed by the President.

## ARTICLE XI

### *Publication Committee*

The President shall appoint annually a Committee on the Publication of the Annual Report, said committee to consist of the Treasurer and Secretary from each of the five standing committees, with a Chairman. This committee shall receive all copy, typewritten, for the Annual Report and take entire charge of all its publications. It shall be the duty of this committee to estimate the cost of the Annual Report, charging each of the five standing committees, the United Offering and the Church Periodical Club, *pro rata*, for space used. The Executive Committee shall pay the balance from the Expense Fund.

## ARTICLE XII

### *Amendment*

The Constitution can be amended at any regular meeting of the Board by a two-thirds vote, provided the amendment was submitted in writing at the previous regular meeting.

## ARTICLE XIV

### *Delegates to Synods and General Conventions*

There shall be three general meetings during the year.
