ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

Perhaps no single year in the history of the Woman's Auxiliary has so tested the strength of our organization nor proved more clearly our fellowship and unity of purpose, for we, with all the world, are passing through a period of adjustment. As the Church entered upon her new plan it was fitting that at our Epiphany meeting we should see the whole work of the Church as set forth in the Survey.

Bishop Denby, of Arkansas, first gave a vivid picture of the work to be done among the negroes and begged us to know the facts about the situation.

Bishop Burleson said for the first time he came before us as an "enthusiastic informant, and not a supplicating mendicant," and urged us to uphold the Budget plan as adopted, as it meant new life to both work and workers. He pledged that the Indians would do their part and they have.

Speaking for the diocesan work, its varied phases and opportunities, Bishop Garland reminded us that when we boast of democracy, we must remember that righteousness is the only safe basis of democracy and religion the only safe basis of righteousness. Education without religion is worse than an ignorant democracy. From the diocese, Mr. Ancell took us to China, that land soon to be the center of commercial development, especially so as her mineral wealth is practically untouched. Barriers and superstitions are broken down, but it is of vital importance that Christian ideals permeate China as well as commercial ideas.

Opportunities to go to many new places await men, women and means to answer the call.

Our last speaker was Archdeacon Stuck and we are thankful to have had him with us. He who pleaded so for protection and help for his people in Alaska has since been called home leaving a record of faithful service all may well emulate.

The spring conference and election of officers was held at the Church House on April 15th, when reports on the work of the several committees, the Educational work, United Thank Offering, Girls' Friendly, Church Periodical Club, Church Mission of Help, Daughters of the King, and St. Barnabas' Guild were heard. As the organizations in the Church Service League are now to report

through the League, this was our last conference under the Woman's Auxiliary. Following the reports, Mrs. Markoe called for the report of the nominating committee and gave us her farewell message as president. As our Hon. President we shall still depend upon her for her counsel and help. Mrs. Scott was warmly welcomed as our new president.

Our devotional meeting was held on December 2d, at Holy Trinity, Dr. McComb being the speaker. Those of us privileged to hear his addresses on prayer gained not only inspiration but many helpful suggestions for daily use.

The change of our day of meeting from Monday mornings to Wednesday afternoons was voted as an experiment for this year. The sale of the Church House compels us to change our place of meeting and after February 1st, all Woman's Auxiliary meetings will be held at the In-as-Much Mission, 1011 Locust Street, where our supply work rooms are located.

Although proper mention is made elsewhere, your secretary can not close this report without speaking of the loss the Auxiliary has sustained in the death of Miss Mary Coles, who for many years was secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary and to whom we all owe so much. Her life demonstrated what true service means and we who have been privileged to be with her have added responsibilities because of that privilege.

The world today demands demonstration of our profession and we hear across the ages the words, "Ye are my witnesses." "Go"—"send" to the uttermost parts of the world. This is the task to which the Woman's Auxiliary is committed.

ANNUAL REPORT

The following is a condensed report of the work of the Indians' Hope Association for the year:

The Treasurer received during the year a total of one thousand five hundred eighty-six dollars and thirty-five cents (\$1586.35).

The Treasurer of Specials received a total of five thousand seven hundred nine dollars and nineteen cents (\$5709.19).

The Box Committee reports that the total valuation of the missionary boxes is one thousand three hundred ninety-nine dollars and one cent (\$1399.01).

At the beginning of the year we were much concerned over the fact that there was no resident physician at the Hupa Indian Reservation in California. Continued appeals were made to the Government by us as an association and

individually as well as by other friends of these Indians and a physician was finally appointed.

Our only missionary speaker this year was Miss Wright from Nenana, Alaska, who addressed the December meeting and gave us an interesting account of the work at that mission.

In answer to an appeal we assisted others in raising the sum of eighty dollars (\$80.00), for a bell at St. Timothy's Mission, Tanana Crossing, Alaska.

The special work we undertook this year was the raising of the money for the building of the rectory at Orleans, California. Through a misunderstanding of our vote "to raise a part if not the whole," the priest-in-charge of the work among the Karok Indians at Orleans, the Rev. Charles Baker, thought we had promised the whole sum needed, namely four thousand instead of two thousand dollars and so informed us in a letter which was read at our May meeting. This meeting, usually our last until September, was poorly attended owing to the day being a holiday, so we were obliged to call a special meeting for June 14th, to consider how we could raise the extra two thousand dollars. At this meeting and during the summer we worked and were successful in raising the large extra sum needed.

At present writing the rectory, a six-room bungalow with a sleeping porch, is not quite finished owing to delays in delivery of material; but the missionary and his family are able to occupy it and are adequately and comfortably housed.

Mr. Baker who has kept us closely in touch with the work at Orleans and the Klamath Valley and the progress of the building of the rectory, through very interesting letters, recently sent us some photographs of the rectory and has expressed the grateful thanks of himself and family to the Indians' Hope Association for making possible so lovely a home.

In May we received the tragic news of the murder at Point Hope, Alaska, on April 27th, of the Rev. Augustus R. Hoare, by the young teacher who had offered to assist him in the work of the mission, James McGuire, who is believed to be insane.

During the year we noted with regret the death of Mrs. Edward Coles, sister of our beloved president, Mrs. Markoe; Mr. Arthur Newbold, brother of our second vice-president, Mrs. Taylor; Miss Mary Coles, to whose zeal

we owe the founding of the Church Training and Deaconess' House, and Archdeacon Stuck, of Alaska, the last months of whose life were saddened by the Government's failure to pass the Yukon Canneries Bill. May they rest in peace and may light perpetual shine upon them.

The special meeting in June marked Mrs. Hollingsworth's last appearance as our Special Treasurer, she having resigned to become Diocesan Treasurer of the United Offering to which new work she goes with our best wishes and our grateful thanks for her many years of faithful and efficient service as an officer of the Indians' Hope Association.

Mrs. E. S. W. Farnum has been appointed our new Special Treasurer and Miss Lorraine Disston our new Registrar.

We have received this year several letters in the nature of reports from some of the Indian Missions. We have also given attention to written appeals and have, of course, our usual number of regular yearly pledges for which at present writing and for the first time, the money is not all in hand, due no doubt to the time, energy and money needed for the very large gift for the rectory at Orleans, California; but we hope to finish these pledges as soon as possible, before the new year brings new work and responsibilities.

ANNUAL REPORT

The annual election brought several changes in the Officers of the Committee. Mrs. Cheston, who had been president for a number of years, resigned, and we shall miss her earnest sincerity in the work.

During the year we have had several speakers who have set forth the new plan for the work of the Woman's Auxiliary to the presiding bishop and council, and explained to us the changes brought about by the nation-wide campaign. Among them have been Mrs. George Wharton Pepper, Mr. Reynolds Brown, Mrs. J. Willis Martin and Dr. John W. Wood, of the Board in New York. Mrs. F. Eugene Newbold addressed the meeting this fall and explained the work of the Supply Bureau and the arrangements for distribution of work. The changes brought about by the nation-wide campaign have been so numerous that it will take some time for us to assimilate all the facts that have been presented to us.

Our other speakers have been Mrs. Hibbert, of the Ragged Mountains of Virginia, who told most interestingly of existing conditions there; the Rev. Frederick Seymour, who gave a very helpful and inspiring talk on Lent, and Bishop Morris, of the Panama Canal Zone. This was a district that had never been presented to the Domestic Committee before and Bishop Morris gave a graphic description of his work and life there.

Bishop Rhinelander has addressed the meeting several times and given us his time and help in our work.

It was with deep regret that the Committee learned of the death of Archdeacon Stuck. As our work includes the Alaskan field, many of us who have met him will miss him and the Committee will keenly feel the loss of his inspiring and unfailing help in our work.

We fulfilled all of our pledges in 1921 including \$3600 for the missionary bishop's salary. The salary was raised to \$4200, but as we had pledged ourselves to only \$3600, we felt it incumbent upon us to fulfill the other pledges we had undertaken, and as this was a very large pledge, and it was always difficult to raise the amount, we felt that we were unable to assume the new pledge of \$4200, and the Committee voted to undertake more pledges of smaller amounts and not to take up the salary again. In this way it was thought the work would prove more varied and of more interest to the parishes.

We trust that the coming year will prove a successful one for this Committee. The officers feel a little new in the work, but we hope the meetings will be full of interest for the delegates, and we trust through their offerings and by earnest prayer to fulfill those pledges we undertake and to help with the extension of the Kingdom.

The Treasurer reports that during the past twelve months she has payed out \$7988.76, and during that time twenty-seven boxes have been sent, valued at \$4204.69.

ANNUAL REPORT

The year 1920 has brought before the Foreign Committee many opportunities and many needs and the response has shown wide and increasing interest in world needs.

In January, Mr. Peterson brought us the story of Mr. Tai's long waiting for his church in Japan. As a layman he had taken up the plea for him and we had the honor and privilege of completing the fund, and "hope deferred" became hope fulfilled.

In February, Dr. Ancell, of Yangchow, brought us the latest news of China. Mahan school has doubled its students in the past eight years and now has 125 students. There is no limit to our opportunities if we provide the men and the means to go forward. Dr. Ancell said the

each work.

While we felt obliged to accept Mrs. Knorr's resignation as chairman, we are still to have her as our honored and honorary chairman and will have her counsel and advice. The new officers were loyally and warmly welcomed.

Perhaps one of the most remarkable addresses ever given before the Foreign Committee was the story of his life and conversion as told by the Rev. P. K. Goto, of Japan. We felt the power of a truly converted life and the story might well compare with the account of conversions in the early Church.

Our September meeting was largely given to routine work and many interesting letters were read. The Committee assumed their regular pledges and each month they have been presented by different young women, Miss

Gladys Williams, Miss Elizabeth Packard, Mrs. Robert McLean, Miss Frances Scott and Mrs. Frazier, who have made them of living interest to us. Owing to an unexpected operation, Bishop Overs was unable to come to us before sailing for Liberia. Reports through letters told us of the growth of our work in Brazil, the splendid position St. Agnes, Kioto, now holds. It is considered such a model school the government now sends to inspect its plan so they may copy it. The new nurses' training school at St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo, opened in October and had over 1000 girls apply for admission. We could only take fifty. "When is the new St. Luke's to be built?" is the question constantly being asked by the Japanese? As this goes to press we are able to report definite action taken by the presiding bishop and council at the December meeting, and they appeal to the whole Church to respond at once.

We have lost two devoted members of our Committee, Mrs. Edward A. Stone, a delegate from the Auxiliary of St. Matthew, Francisville, and Miss Emma Maull, from Christ Church Chapel, whose legacy of \$100 will start the endowment of the "Blind Beggar Girl's Bed" in Wuchang Hospital.

The opportunity and responsibility of the Foreign Committee to extend the Kingdom throughout the world increases every year, but let us always remember that God never calls us to a task for which He does not provide power to fulfill it.

FOREWORD OF REPORT

The past year, with its achievements, while readjusting our work to accord with the new plans of the Church, has been both an interesting experience and an education.

Archdeacon Baskerville, Mrs. Demby, Archdeacon Russell and Dr. Grice brought us urgent appeals to do our utmost to send the money necessary to keep their work open until the "Presiding Bishop and Council" should be able to support them according to the plans of the "Survey." And the Department of Missions has begged us to continue for one year at least to raise the money for the scholarships and salaries and support of those Missions that have previously looked to Pennsylvania for a certain sum each year.

Besides our routine work we have succeeded in raising \$2500 to build a chapel in Forest City, Ark., named by us, at Bishop Demby's request, Christ Church. As it is reckoned as one of the buildings asked for in the Survey, it is most satisfactory to Bishop Demby and to us.

The Treasurer's Report shows a decided advance this year. The report for 1918-1919, comprising sixteen months, shows a total of \$6204.36. In the twelve months of 1920 we report \$7835.07 received.

The final report of the Box Committee is most gratifying—\$2333.76. To the retiring Chairman, Mrs. Stafford, we extend hearty thanks for her efficient handling of a troublesome job.

An important part of our work has been the visiting of Parish meetings in order to present a survey of Colored Missions. This year one or another of our officers has visited St.

Paul's, Chestnut Hill; Epiphany, Germantown; St. Mary's, Wayne, and the Montgomery Country School for Boys at Wynnewood.

We need the intelligent, sympathetic co-operation of every Parish in the Diocese, and we find that the best way to obtain this is to give them the knowledge of what has been accomplished, in order that all may realize the importance and the value of Colored Missions to the whole country.

ANNUAL REPORT

1919-1920

The past year might almost be called, like a recent book, "The Wonderful Year."

Beginning as it did with Mrs. J. Willis Martin as our President, and advancing by strides under her able leadership to a point where we have not only accomplished much hoped for in the past, but have a most encouraging future before us. The Committee is alive and under her chairmanship will remain so.

The changes in the Woman's Auxiliary made at the general convention in October, 1919, have of necessity made the year a hard one, and it has been difficult to understand just where we stand; changes always take time to adjust themselves, but we feel that before many months all will be clear sailing.

The order of our meeting was somewhat changed, members of the Committee taking them in charge rather than the former way of addresses being made by speakers invited by the Chairman. This new plan has proved most satisfactory. We have had interesting accounts given of the work among the foreigners in the diocese, the social and settlement work,

The May meeting, 1922, was held at the home of Mrs. J. Franklin McFadden at Rosemont. The business meeting was held during the morning, after which lunch was served in the garden, and the delegates had the pleasure of wandering through one of the most beautiful gardens in the diocese. The afternoon meeting was held on the terrace and consisted of music led by Miss Barry and a Devotional Hour with the Bishop, altogether one of the most helpful and beautiful meetings the Committee has ever had.

The work of the executive board was continued through the summer; an effort being made to get in touch with all those parishes not now represented on the Committee, so that every parish in the Diocese may have at least one delegate on our list.

During the early part of the year a news letter was sent to the rural parishes having no representative at the meeting, but later this letter was printed in the *Church News* and this was sent instead.

The year has been a good one and our hope for the future is that we may catch a broader vision of the great work to be done by the women of the Auxiliary for this, their beloved diocese.

Owing to the fact that the Diocesan Committee carried the work room until November 1, 1920, the financial report of that organization is included under general gifts to the Diocesan Committee for the first nine months of its existence. Owing also to the fact that a new system of bookkeeping has been inaugurated in the finance department of the Diocesan Committee, which began November 1, 1920, our books for the year closed November 1st. From that date all money, except for office expenses and special objects not included in the budget of the Diocese of Pennsylvania, are paid by the Treasurer of the Diocesan Committee to the Treasurer of the Diocese, who then distributes the stipulated amounts to the various Diocesan Missions, crediting each parish with the amount of its individual gift so that its apportionment may have the benefit of any sum, except those noted above, paid by Diocesan delegates into the Treasury of the Diocesan Committee of the Woman's Auxiliary of Pennsylvania.

It will be noted that some parishes have sent gifts direct to special objects and have notified the Treasurer of these gifts. These sums cannot be included in the sum total received by the Diocesan Committee, but are noted under the name of the parish under a special caption.

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

January 25, 1920—January 25, 1921

The work of the Educational Department is divided into four sections: Mission Study Classes (training parish leaders and speakers), Information, Publication and Sales.

MISSION STUDY CLASSES. January to May, 1920, the subject for classes was the Church's mission to the immigrant. Text-book, Neighbors. Watchword, Reconciliation. Aim, To see the multitude, to care, to know the means of reconciliation.

In Epiphany the Educational Secretary led two Normal classes and a class at the Church Training and Deaconess House. In Lent one Normal and two Diocesan classes; one session at Atlantic City, four Bible classes of twenty-seven sessions each at a girls' school, one Bible class at the University of Pennsylvania of ten sessions. From the Normal classes thirty-four leaders led classes touching 102 parishes. On Fridays in Lent seven different women went to the Gynecean Hospital with the message of meditation she had used in the study classes.

The closing session of this course was held April 13, 1920. Reports were heard from Juniors and Seniors. The Bryn Mawr Community Class, being convinced that we must not forget what we have learned, made the following motion: That a permanent Study Class Committee be formed to help the Church's work among the foreign-born. It was proposed to divide the work under four sub-committees, to report to the Diocesan Committee, under which they will work.

At the May meeting of the Diocesan Committee of the Woman's Auxiliary, the Educational Secretary presented this committee of 100 women, chairman, Mrs. Arthur Van Harlingen; chairman for sub-committee on Poles, Mrs. J. Alison Scott; Jews, Mrs. John D. Samuel; Roumanians, Mrs. Samuel Porcher; Italians, Miss Eleanor Deane. These committees have raised \$2380. The Italian Chapel of St. Mary of the Annunciation, in Richmond, stands as a visible result of their work.

During the summer months the Educational Secretary edited the Church Missionary Calendar for 1921, and prepared, under the Bishop's direction, the Pennsylvania Mission Study Class

course on the Survey. Assignments and class prayers were printed. Literature of the Department was sent to five summer conferences.

In October the Annual Retreat was held at the Diocesan Church, under the auspices of the Prayer Guild for the Teaching Office of the Church. The Corporate Communion and Conference of the Educational Secretaries and Mission Study Class Leaders was held on the 13th of October. Opening of the Normal classes, subject, The Church's Task. Text-book, The Survey. Watchword, Grace. Aim, to see the task, and realize our need of Grace. The Educational Secretary led two classes in the Department, and one in the Church Training and Deaconess House. One class on the Church Service League, to prepare speakers, and four classes in a girls' school on the Christian Faith.

January 20, 1921, Diocesan Educational Day, at the Diocesan Church, opening with the Holy Communion, followed by the annual breakfast with the Bishop. Classes and conferences filled the day, closing with a report on the Survey, given by members of the Normal class, assisted by thirty children, under the title, "What the Church Saw."

The Council of the Educational Department meets the second Tuesday of each month. The Parish Educational Secretaries meet with the Diocesan Secretary the second Thursday of each month, from October to June.

The Community Class has become a special feature of this year's work, held at ten centers, representing from three to seventeen parishes each. Also classes for men and women.

OUTSIDE THE DIOCESE. Leaders trained in Pennsylvania classes have led in five other dioceses. One of our most valued leaders is loaned, we hope not given, to Bishop Berry for the present, and reports Normal classes providing leaders for various towns.

The class assignments prepared for this diocese have been applied for from places as distant as Texas and Arizona, and

have been supplied to these and many other dioceses, carrying the Bishop's message of Reconciliation and Grace.

INFORMATION. This has been the busiest year we have had; more demands for information than ever before, from clergy, from women of the Auxiliary, Sunday-school teachers, study class leaders and members, missionaries on furlough, from visitors to the city asking information on the Church's work, her workers and materials. Dr. John Wood notifies the Department in advance of missionaries visiting the diocese, and the Business Secretary arranges a program that as little time be wasted as possible.

Several thousand letters have been written, mostly by hand, as we have no typewriter, and the Business Secretary has a regular assistant only three days a week during the winter months.

PUBLICATIONS of the current year:

Prayer for Presiding Bishop and Council by permission of Rev. John Mockridge, D.D.

4000 letter slips were printed advertising these and other publications of the department.

SALES. Books, pamphlets, leaflets, Church periodicals, calendars of various kinds, Christian Nurture S. S. supplies, Easter and Christmas cards, mission goods and other articles.

The Diocesan Executive Council appointed the Educational Department headquarters for the sale of the New Church Hymnal in the diocese. This has made a large increase in correspondence, packing, billings, etc. Many of the clergy have availed themselves of the lower rates, and have expressed appreciation of the service.

Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

What Can Busy Women do for Missions?

HERE must be, in the minds of many, a latent conviction that work for missions can be done only by the idle, else the prevailing idea that one is "too busy" for it could never have gained ground. When our dear Lord entrusted the evangelization of the world to human hands, He did not select His agents from the leisure class. And it seems to me that, in His bountiful goodness, He could never have denied to any of us the gracious errand. Not that we can all literally *go* in our own persons, but we can all go by aiding those who are willing and able to go, and by cheering and encouraging with substantial help those who are already in the field. There was never a command given that it is not possible to obey, at least in its spirit.

Some years ago, a new rector, filled with zeal and enthusiasm, came to an old parish. He proceeded at once to form a woman's guild, with its various chapters, and his friends began to look for its officers among the well-to-do women of the parish, who certainly did not seem to be "busy." A lady, much interested in the new enterprise, presently suggested for the president one who, she said, "lived in apartments, was very rich, had no children, absolutely no distracting cares, so that her time was her own." Said the wise rector: "She will not do at all. People have nothing to do because they want to do nothing. I am looking for a busy woman, and then I know I shall have an efficient one." And so he chose one with a large family, not overloaded with wealth, with many cares outside of her own household; and without neglect of any of her home duties, she served acceptably in her new sphere, and the society grew and prospered, and its chief work was for missions. We shall find this rector's experience everywhere the same.

I venture to say that there cannot be found a busier company than those of whom the diocesan and parish branches of the Woman's Auxiliary are composed, so that the excuse sometimes made to avoid entering into the work, "I have no time," might more correctly be rendered, "I have no inclination."

If we are to care for anything, we must not be ignorant of it. It has been wisely said: "Knowledge comes before zeal; there can be no intelligent interest in missions without it." It is surely our duty, then, to inform ourselves as to what the Church is doing in our own land, and throughout the world, and if we know of the work and its needs, it will be hard, indeed, to remain indifferent. We shall realize that the men and the women doing valiant service in the field are like ourselves; that they and their children can suffer for lack of food and raiment, just as we would; that they can enjoy comforts and luxuries as much as we. And yet, as we read the letters from the bare homes, because of the scanty stipend, no word of complaint can be found. I know your hearts would prompt you to stretch out helping hands if you knew of half the privations endured by those who are helping to carry the message of salvation in our missionary fields.

Do you ask, "How shall we gain this knowledge?" I answer, "By adding one more magazine to your list—THE SPIRIT OF MISSIONS. Read it, and you will soon find that it is the most valuable of them all, for they treat only of the evanescent things of time. It belongs to eternity."

After reading THE SPIRIT OF MISSIONS you will, as a natural sequence, enroll yourself as a member of the Woman's Auxiliary. Every department of it is so beautifully systematized that no time need be wasted in wondering what can be done. In every well-ordered parish, almost, there is a branch of it. It calls for one in every parish in the land. There is a great diversity of gifts among us, and, therefore, there is a great variety of work. There are those who can bestow much money, and theirs is the earnest service, after they have tasted of the joy of giving; there are those who have good executive ability, and that is needed; and there are those who have only their time to offer, and they are giving just what is the most precious in God's sight. Do you not see what a beautiful whole these various parts will make? Every parish is a law unto itself, and therefore, I can offer no suggestions as to organization, but I can beg those who belong to it to become active members of the parish branch, I care not how busy they are. Of time it may be said, as truly as of money, "There is that scattereth, and yet increaseth; there is that withholdeth more than is meet, but it tendeth to poverty." Believe me, the time that is given to God can be taken from the busiest life without loss.

I would like to warn you against heeding a device of Satan, employed to hinder or to discourage your work, viz., that you are expending too much time and strength upon it.

Mothers are often cautioned against permitting their daughters to do so, and are warned of the fearful penalty in loss of health, etc. I have often heard this; but in the words of the Psalmist, "I have been young, and now am old," yet I have never heard a caution uttered in regard to the gay young butterflies, who turn night into day, and day into night, as they partake of a round of fashion's gaieties. I grant that it must be difficult, aye, well nigh impossible, for any to spend their lives after this model and find

any time for God. But is this our duty here? Are we not hastening to eternity? Shall we never hear the question, "What hast thou gleaned to-day?"

Lord Chesterfield has said: "There is time enough in the course of the day for everything, if you do but one thing at a time, but there is not time enough in the year, if you will do two things at a time." Let the women who say they "have not time" ponder this and find how true it is. When the busy women have studied the mission field, and helped to supply its needs, they have still a most important duty to perform. And that is to "tell it out." We are all quite too reticent on the subject of missions; it will be well when we are less fearful of speaking of them and of our brave missionaries by name. Above all, don't forget to give to the rising generation all that is most delightful of the gathered knowledge, that they, too, may learn to love missions. The dear children are so tender, so true, and so confiding, that it is easy to make them feel for others, and long to do them service. Their indifference to the cause is often the fault of those who present it. Don't talk of missions as an abstract science, but carry our young friends from country to country, and show them the blessed work that is being done for little children in the schools and orphanages, for the sick and suffering in the hospitals, and for those that are "sitting in darkness and the shadow of death" in hearing the precious message of salvation, and I know that their young hearts will be thrilled at the story. Above all, let them see that you love it, that you believe in it, and that you are helping the cause to the utmost of your ability.

Our Sunday-school children should be especial objects of our care. Their Lenten Offering has grown almost to shame that of their seniors, but it would be largely increased if in every one of our parishes and mission stations one woman would tell them where and how the money is needed, and why it is, and above all, impress upon them that during Lent, as members of the great body of the Church Catholic, every personal preference and choice should be forgotten, and as with one heart and mind, all of their gifts should be sent to the one grand body of men, our Board of Managers, who so faithfully will dispense them. . . .

There is too little attention paid among us to small sums. The United Offering of the Woman's Auxiliary proclaims their power. A large part of the strength of the Church of Rome lies here. While so vast a percentage of our parishes are weak, we must encourage their people to give their mites. . . .

But what more "can busy women do for missions"? Besides their example, they can use their influence for them. Every one of us, high or low, rich or poor, strong or weak, busy or idle, exerts, all unconsciously, an influence that we cannot control either in its weight or radius. "Our shadow selves, our influence, may fall where we can never be." Of what vital importance is it, then, that it shall be for good. It is given as the fragrance, or the noxious odor, of the blossom. "Men do not gather grapes of thorns

or figs of thistles." Goulburn says: "It is ours to trim the lamp within us, and then let it shine." If the Gospel message is not precious to us, it will not be strange that we care not that it be carried to others, but if is our very life, we shall not be able to endure the thought that any may live without it.

Finally, no busy woman can refuse to do the best service for missions by praying for them. Pray for the missionaries by name, recite, if possible, their special needs. The words, "Thy Kingdom come," are often on our lips; does the petition come from our hearts? Pause and think of it. Alas! for the poor foreign missionary whose reply to her friend's question, "What do you need most?" answered "Prayers. If you are praying for us, you will not forget our weakness and our trials." Is it not pitiful that any should feel the need of asking for what all can so readily give?

Canon Liddon has said: "The wish to spread the knowledge of the love of Jesus Christ is a strong, over-mastering impulse in every man, and in every woman, who really knows and loves Him. The absence of any anxiety for the spread of the truth implies spiritual paralysis, if it does not imply actual spiritual death. The man who knows the happiness of peace with God, through our Lord Jesus Christ, cannot but desire that other men should share it, and this desire in its higher, its stronger, its more heroic form, is one of the greatest gifts of God to His Church. Churches are generally living Churches, in exact ratio of their missionary activity." Busy women, take courage, then; we serve not a hard Master, we can all help in the blessed work of missions. "If there be first a willing mind, it is accepted according to what a man hath, and not according to what he hath not."
