ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

The year 1921, under the leadership of our new president, Mrs. Scott, closes with a record which should be encouraging to us all.

Our Midwinter Missionary Meeting on February 14th, in Witherspoon Hall, demonstrated the possibility and desirability of an evening meeting where men may share with us in hearing of the work of the Church in all fields.

Dr. Patton presented the Negro—our opportunities to teach and train him—as only he can. Bishop Thomas made very real to us the need of the Church—our failures and our successes in the great West, while Bishop Tucker, with his usual statesmanlike presentation, took us to the Orient, and showed us how all eyes are on us in America as a nation and as a church; how they are realizing the necessity of a religion for every nation which is to endure, but are asking today if Christianity is the religion, and are awaiting our answer not only in words but in deeds.

The purchase of the new Church House at 202 South 19th Street has been of inestimable value to all our work, and we now feel we have, in truth, a suited and delightful home for our work.

The growth of our Auxiliary work has necessitated the establishment of an Executive office at the Church House with a salaried secretary. A Speakers' Bureau has been organized and the Woman's Auxiliary stands ready to help provide speakers from our fields for parish meetings.

Our "Flying Squadron" trips to several parishes last spring proved a great inspiration to us, and we hope were helpful to the parishes we visited. Most gracious hospitality was everywhere extended to us, and we hope to visit those parishes next spring.

In deference to numerous requests from delegates, beginning in September, all Auxiliary meetings are held on Wednesday mornings.

November 9th, the Autumn all-day Missionary Meeting was held at Holy Trinity when the work of every field was presented, and gave us fresh inspiration for our winter's work.

Another Triennial year is before us and at Portland will be revealed the loyalty with which the Church has responded to the call and vision of the great opportunity set before her in 1919.

May the Woman's Auxiliary of Pennsylvania press forward with renewed zeal, and may it be said of us we were "not disobedient to the heavenly vision."

ANNUAL REPORT

It is fitting before beginning our report for the year to note the loss of two faithful delegates to the Indians' Hope. In the death on March 15, 1921, of Mrs. Robert J. Thompson, of Grace Church, Mt. Airy, her parish lost a zealous worker and the Indian's Hope a delegate of over eight years' standing, so devoted to the Indian work that she was rarely absent from a meeting. On July 4, 1921, occurred the death of Miss Maud Harrison Smith, of St. Mary's Church, West Philadelphia. In spite of the handicap of ill health, Miss Smith was President of the Woman's Auxiliary of St. Mary's for twelve years and a faithful attendant and delegate at the meetings of the Indian's Hope for nineteen years. We give thanks to God for their example of faith well kept and work well done. May they rest in peace and may light perpetual shine upon them!

At our January meeting, owing to the new methods of administration of the Church's funds, the office of Special Treasurer of the Indians' Hope was abolished and it was decided that such special offerings as were made in the future could be handled easily by the regular Treasurer.

At our first meeting for the year in January we were very very much gratified to learn that in General Hugh Scott's report

on the Indian Reservations the statement was made by him that he had visited thirty-seven Reservations and that the work being done by Bishop Thomas, of Wyoming, at Wind River Reservation, was more in accord with the way work among Indians should be carried on than any he had yet encountered.

Bishop Burleson reported to us in person in February that the Niobrara Course of (five years) Instruction started by him and to which we have given financial support, and which is now in its third year, has been very successful. It is the only system of religious education of the Indians being carried on by any church. The Bishops of Nevada and Wyoming wish to use it and the Presbyterians and Congregationalists have asked permission to adapt it for their work among Indians. The Bishop also reported that the new translation of the Prayer-Book into the Dakotah tongue to which we gave a substantial sum has been accomplished and the Prayer-Book is already in use.

Early in the year we decided to continue the specials of one hundred dollars each to the six Bishops on our list and also the special of fifty dollars to Miss Carter's lace workers.

The rectory built by the Indians' Hope at the Karok Mission, Orleans, California, we learn from the Rev. Mr. Baker has proved very comfortable for the missionary and his family, and the larger rooms and storeroom give ample space to sort, label, wrap and distribute not only the Christmas presents for the Indian children, but also the goodly supply of clothing sent for distribution among the Indians by various parishes throughout the country under the Church's new "supply bureau" system.

In September we welcomed Mrs. G. H. A. Parkman, of Grace Church, Mt. Airy, as our new Registrar.

We contributed thirty-eight dollars to the fund for rebuilding the burned church at Oneida; two hundred and twenty-nine dollars toward an automobile for the use of the Rev. Mr. Baker in his work at the Karok Mission, Orleans, California, and over two hundred and fifty dollars to the Bishop Rowe Foundation Fund.

The only speaker from the Indian field this year was Bishop Burleson. Owing to the change in methods our report is somewhat shortened and a little different from the reports of past years. An itemized account of our contributions to the Indian work may be found in the Treasurer's report.

ANNUAL REPORT

The work of the Domestic Committee has been carried on throughout the year with a few changes here and there.

At the Annual Election the ticket presented was the same as last year's, with the exception of Assistant Treasurer's Office, which is now held by Miss Margaret Montgomery, who took Mrs. Tilden's office on the resignation of the latter.

Beginning in October the hour of meeting was changed to 10.30 A. M., and, of course, all meetings are now held in the new Church House, 202 South 19th Street.

The monthly meetings have been very large and we wish to thank the delegates for their co-operation in the work and their faithful attendance. The speakers have given us many different phases of Domestic Work, and we have traversed with them "mentally" many miles of country. Archdeacon Carson presented the Canal Zone and its work. Miss Wright made a strong appeal for the work at Point Hope, Alaska. Mr. Persons pointed out the difficulties of the Blue Ridge Mountain work. Mrs. Biller took us over a very extensive region—the Continental Missionary Districts. Mr. Ziegler, of Cordova, Alaska, gave us a vivid picture of his work there and at other Alaskan stations, and Mr. Corser gave an illustrated talk on Alaskan work. Archdeacon Claiborne spoke as the representative of the Domestic Committee at the All-Day Meeting and presented the needs of the du Bose School at Mont Eagle,

Tennessee, and Mr. Bartter, of the Philippine Islands, addressed us in December and told us of the House of the Holy Child for half-caste girls at Trozo.

Archdeacon Claiborne, in his talk, tried to bring home to each one of us what a responsibility is ours in the work of the Church today, when the world is in such a chaotic condition. Archdeacon Carson's text would be a useful one for every Christian to keep before him—"A great door and effectual is opened." He used this in connection with work in the Canal Zone, but surely we can all profit by its use in our daily lives.

The Supply Bureau reports that nine personal boxes and five institutional boxes have been sent into the Domestic Field, and gifts amounting to \$7,274.89 have gone to help ten districts of the twenty-three in the Domestic Field. What can we do next year to help all?

ANNUAL REPORT

It is with difficulty that the members of the Foreign Committee realize that another year has drawn to its close, another cycle of work is ended, and we pause to look back over the achievements. We see the results of our labors, not all we had hoped for, perhaps, but we feel the urge and incentive to begin again and do better in the new year just ahead.

The average attendance of the monthly meetings has been ninety, unfortunately there are still parishes which are not represented by delegates. We look hopefully forward to the day when every parish will have a share in the work; we need them and we are working towards that end.

The Committee assumed its regular pledges, and, in addition, gave to numerous specials. It is with a deep feeling of thankfulness that we closed the year with all pledges paid.

With deep regret the Foreign Committee accepted the resignation of Miss Hubbard, who was forced, owing to ill health, to relinquish the duties of secretary. She was appointed Honorary Secretary by Mrs. Pancoast in fitting appreciation of her interest and service in behalf of the work of this committee.

St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo, looms large on the horizon of our interest in 1921. Feeling deeply the vital need of helping Dr. Teusler at this time, Mrs. Pancoast presented the suggestion to the committee that the women of this Diocese give a ward, to be known as the Pennsylvania Ward, not only helping thereby to make the new St. Luke's a reality, but enabling us to have a continuing share in the blessings it is to bring to the Japanese people. It was accordingly decided to give this ward, which is to contain sixteen to twenty beds, at the cost of one thousand dollars a bed. The parishes have been working hard, and are giving beds in it, but as the report of the treasurer shows, the fund is not yet complete. It is the earnest hope that some who have as yet done nothing, will take their responsibility in this great work to heart, and urge their parish to put a bed in the Pennsylvania Ward of St. Luke's.

We have had the inspiration and pleasure of hearing some of the great messengers of Christ in foreign fields during the year. In January, Bishop Tucker, Kyoto, spoke in a very illuminating way of the problems in Japan and the church's methods in solving them. He told us the people there are looking for a religion and the question is being much discussed by the greatest men. The Buddhists are carrying on a great missionary work, a new sect had recently spent two thousand dollars in the purchase of a daily newspaper to spread their beliefs. One Christian only is there in every two hundred among the sixty millions of Japan!

Miss Ambler was with us and spoke of the work the kindergartens are doing in reaching the children at an early age, by weaving the story of God in the program of the kindergarten and planting the seeds of Christianity in the hearts of the pupils. We know the value of our medical missions. Dr. McCracken, dean of St. John's University, Shanghai, and surgeon at St. Luke's Hospital in that city, spoke of the needs of the hospitals in Shanghai. He made a strong appeal for women doctors and nurses on behalf of Dr. Fullerton, the head of St. Elizabeth's Hospital in that city, saying that if none were forthcoming she would be obliged to close the hospital.

In September the meetings of the Committee were resumed, with every one eager for work. Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Craighill, the only foreigners in Nanchang doing work among the Chinese, were with us, and made the request that we should help them open the gates of Nanchang. Nanchang is a city of 500,000 people, and is the only mission centre of our work in China where no modern church or school buildings have been

provided. They are trying to raise \$25,000 for a group of adequate buildings. To quote Mrs. Craighill: "We draw our plans on paper and build our castles in the air, for we know that a day is coming when the church at home will realize its chance to help in building up the church in this great centre, and will rejoice that there is the money for our buildings in Nanchang."

October brought us Bishop Overs, who impressed us with his grasp of the situation in Liberia, and his ability to meet it. Of course, he, too, needs help.

In November, Dr. Reifsnyder, of St. Paul's University, Tokyo, spoke in a very hopeful way of the outlook in Japan. Perhaps he surprised many when he told us that Japan was a peace-loving country, and explained that the militarist party has caused us to become suspicious and distrustful of her. The people themselves are not back of this party, but their influence has been small. The Liberals have been growing in power, and the nation has seen the economic waste of war. It is changing from an agricultural to an industrial nation, and all the Liberals ask is to exist economically. They have come to the Washington conference in order to procure the raw materials without which they cannot exist. These questions cannot be settled, however, in an atmosphere of mutual distrust. Dr. Reifsnyder very earnestly asked that the press of this country be restrained and that the Japanese delegates be met in a spirit of mutual confidence. The missionaries have been the emissaries of the Christians in the United States. They have been the source of the inspiration of the Liberals of Japan today. Should these delegates not find in this country the same atmosphere as that which was brought to them through the missionaries?

Mr. Littell came to us in December with his story of how rapidly events were moving in China. He said that the best thing that had come to China in a long time was her invitation to the Conference in Washington. There she stood to gain more than any other nation except the United States. In spite of the evils of the political system there is much hope. Among the Christian churches in China the work of our own stands out. A native church is established with roots deep in the ground, and work is being done in fifteen out of eighteen provinces. There is a Chinese bishop, many native priests and the two first Chinese deaconesses have just been set aside. Three of the delegates to the Conference are graduates of St. John's.

We have heard many appeals, yes, and we have in turn made many appeals, and we shall make many more. But what means have we of helping those who in the distant mission fields are doing the Master's work, except by our prayers and our gifts?

"And must I be giving again and again?"

"Oh, no," said the angel, piercing me through,

"Just give till the Master stops giving to you."

FOREWORD OF REPORT

The meetings of the past year have been very encouraging. We have frequently heard of the results of our Church schools for Negroes that the Federal Commission on Education and the State School Boards of the Southern States recognize the value of our educational system, and ask for our graduates for teachers in secular schools. Our visitors are not merely seeking our financial aid, but report to us as fellow-workers.

As visitors we have had Miss Boyer from New York, who conducted a model Mission Study Class; Archdeacon Baskervill from South Carolina, Rev. J. R. Logan from North Carolina, now for many years in charge of St. Simon the Cyrenian in Philadelphia, who characterized the training of our Church schools as being "sanctified common sense"; Mr. Hunt from Fort Valley, Ga., Mr. Franklin and Dean Davis of the "Presiding Bishop and Council" and Dr. Milton of the Nation-Wide Campaign. The last two speakers giving us the view of the white churchmen of the South, heartily endorsed the educational work, the results seen in good citizens; self-supporting, self-respecting, respecting the rights of their neighbors, loyal Americans. The schools under the American Church Institute are examples to the surrounding country in

intelligent farming. They give industrial training, Church training and the Catechism, character building being the essential scholarship for those who are able to receive it. We are educating more pupils than Tuskegee and Hampton Schools combined. Our opportunities are limited only by our means.

Archdeacon Russell brought to the Annual Missionary Meeting a Sextette from St. Paul's School, Lawrenceville, Va. Their singing in the Church and during the lunch hour was a very pleasant innovation in the customary routine of the day.

This Fall we are reaping the benefits of the work of the "Flying Squadron" of the Woman's Auxiliary who visited the country Parishes in the Spring and held model Auxiliary meetings on the spot. We are welcoming delegates from a number of Parishes that have not been in touch with us before.

At the end of the year we awoke to the fact that we had been confining our giving to routine support, and because we had had no extraordinary call we had made no extraordinary effort. We therefore made a final spurt, and with \$1000 as our goal raised over \$500 for a "Centennial building," a new dormitory at the Bishop Payne Divinity School.

While we welcome the new delegates, we record with sorrow the loss of three who worked most faithfully and efficiently with us during many years.

Miss Mary Truitt, of St. Andrew's, West Philadelphia, for over twenty years a delegate and at one time in charge of the purchasing and packing of our missionary boxes, was laid to rest in April.

Miss Maude Smith, of St. Mary's, West Philadelphia, for fifteen years most active and interested in missions to the Colored People. Although as President of her Parish Auxiliary and of many other Parish activities, she led a very full Church life until she was taken last Summer.

Mrs. Brewer, of St. Peter's, Germantown, was for twenty years an earnest, active member of this Committee. She was present at the meeting December 7th. Shortly before her death she expressed her anxiety at the difficulty in finding a young woman as her associate and successor in the work. Her Parish Auxiliary has sent \$125 for the Bishop Payne Divinity School Dormitory as a memorial to her.

Before going to press the Committee adopted the following resolution by a standing vote:

That the Committee on Colored Missions having learned with sorrow of the loss from their meetings of three valued members within the year, Miss Mary T. Truitt, Miss Maude H. Smith and Mrs. Paul C. Brewer, desire to show our appre-

ciation of their work with us by completing the sum of \$1000 for the Bishop Payne Divinity School Dormitory as a lasting Memorial that "their works may follow them."

ANNUAL REPORT

1920-1921

Again we feel we can record another year of good work and of meetings which grow more full of interest in and knowledge of the work being done in our own Diocese.

In reviewing the year, we ask ourselves if we have made the progress that the increase in attendance would indicate. We hope and pray we have.

A great effort, through hard and faithful work, has been made through the Flying Squadron, letters and personal visits to reach all the parishes in the Diocese and the result has proved that those far-away parishes long to have their share in the Missionary work of the Church and appreciate this interest in them. Several parishes have formed Auxiliaries for the first time and are sending delegates to our meetings.

The minutes of each meeting are now being sent to those parishes not able to send a delegate. These are read at the parish meetings and in this way the members know what is going on and is being done in the Diocese.

One of the most important works during the past year is that for the boys of the 26th Regiment, 1st Division, Regular

Army, stationed at Camp Dix, New Jersey. Chaplain C. B. Hill asked the Bishop if the Church would not mother these boys, very lonely and far away from their homes in the Southern Mountains. The Bishop spoke to Mrs. J. Willis Martin, who appointed a committee with Mrs. John D. Thomas as chairman. Too much cannot be said of the work of this committee under the faithful and self-sacrificing leadership of its chairman. Once a week since early Spring until January two large motor buses have carried from sixty to seventy girls and their chaperones to Camp Dix to take cheer to these boys. At Christmas 1,000 packages were sent, all carrying a message and personal touch. Chaplain Hill feels the morale of this regiment has been kept up through the Church being interested in the boys and this personal touch being given them.

The Diocesan Committee now takes charge of the Christmas stockings for our missions and institutions and about 1,000 were collected through the parishes and sent out. In this way, every needy child is now cared for and duplication avoided.

About \$1,000 worth of produce from the Church Farm School at Glen Loch has been sold by the Blue Post Shop connected with the Supply Bureau. The usual percentage for doing this is not kept by the Bureau but returned to the School. Motors of four members of the Diocesan Committee deliver these goods.

The work being done by the Church in the Diocese is covered as fully as possible through addresses during the winter, each month being given to one subject as follows: January, Social Service in its Different Forms; February, Labor Conditions in Kensington and the Needs of the City Mission; March, Women's Work in the Three Rural Convocations; April, Women's Work in the Two City Convocations; May, The Colored Work in the Diocese; June, Foreign Work, Polish, Roumanian, Italian, French, etc.; October, Hospitals and Homes; November, The Works of the Sisterhoods of the Church, and Church Training and Deaconess House; December, Work among our Foreign Children.

Our "out-of-door" meeting was held on May 25th at the Church Farm School, Glen Loch, and in spite of a rainy day there were about 125 present and each and every one felt fully repaid, as no one can visit this school without not only feeling a deep interest but great pride that our Church is privileged to do so much for our boys who need a chance, and that it has as its head master a man with such a love of boys and such a vision as Rev. Charles W. Shreiner.

Let us hope that the coming year may see each parish and mission in closer touch with the work of this, our own beloved Diocese.

Owing to the fact that the Diocesan Committee no longer carries the funds of the Work Room, the detailed account showing on our books this year is \$1,305.36 less than during the year 1920, but the total account of gifts to Diocesan Missions has been larger than usual.

The year before last the Diocesan Committee set itself to establish the usefulness of a Work Room and Supply Bureau, and it so far succeeded, after supporting it for one year, as to make that work a Diocesan activity of itself.

Last year the Diocesan Committee established the fact that a central office with an Executive Secretary was a necessary adjunct to the work of the Auxiliary, and it carried such an office for a year at its own expense. This again has now become a part of the general activity of the whole Auxiliary, and its expenses are borne by each of the Committees forming the Auxiliary, share and share alike.

This past year the Diocesan Committee has made itself responsible for the work of providing Christmas stockings for all the children in all the missions and hospitals of the Diocese, and for the soldiers stationed at Camp Dix, a total of nearly 2,000 substantial Christmas gifts.

By the Bishop's suggestion, the Diocesan Committee no longer pledges itself for the support of any one Diocesan activity, but it holds itself in readiness to be an emergency giver and as such is available for many special objects, both in the regular missions and hospitals, and for the city at large, and for activities in which the Church is asked to take a part in immediate aid.

FOREWORD OF REPORT

In October, 1920, the Supply Department opened its quarters at the Inasmuch Mission Building, and in June, 1921, closed for the season, having completed the allotment sent to the Diocese of Pennsylvania from the Church Missions House. This allotment included twenty-seven personal boxes (missionaries and their families) amounting in value to \$5,697.60, and requisitions from thirteen institutions (schools, hospitals and missions) of 12,745 articles of new clothing, household and hospital supplies amounting in value to \$11,309.39. This work carried our interest to Liberia, Japan, Honolulu and Porto Rico, and in this country to many of the states of the West and South.

The Supply Department also sent to the Institutions of this Diocese 3,462 articles of new clothing, household and hospital supplies at a value of \$3,351.42.

Mrs. R. Norris Williams alone purchased the materials in many varieties, as well as all other articles included in our allotment. Mrs. T. Mellor Tyson and Mrs. Lewis R. Benedict made 122 different patterns. The yardage of materials required was about 20,000 yards and was spread upon the cutting table by Miss Margaret Davis.

Mrs. Norman Ellison, assisted by Mrs. John W. Logan, Miss Edith Dallas, Mrs. Trevanion B. Dallas, Mrs. Frederick A. Packard, Mrs. A. H. Reeve and Mrs. R. Norris Williams with their splendid Committee assembled this large number of cut garments, each garment parcelled separately, and we owe our gratitude to Miss Katherine Reeve and Miss Evaline Taylor for the typewritten directions which accompanied each parcel.

The storage and shipment of garments have been successfully accomplished by Mrs. Edward Davis and her Committee.

The Knitting Department, directed by Mrs. Henry Brinton Cox, assisted by Mrs. McCouch, sent 751 knitted articles to the Mission Fields and the Diocesan Institutions.

The sewing has been done entirely by the women of the Diocese. Through the Supply Department, 135 Parishes have made garments for the Mission Fields, an increase over the preceding year of 61 Parishes sewing for Missions, and an

increase in money value of \$10,504.85. Again we take pleasure in thanking the Parishes for their support and their confidence in the new plan.

The Girls' Friendly Society, through the Supply Department, has provided every item of the requisition from the West Blue Ridge Mission at Yancey, Va., and has also provided in full the clothing needs of the House of the Holy Child and, through the Supply Department, the St. Barnabas Guild for Nurses assumed Pennsylvania's quota of hospital garments and surgical dressings for mission hospitals, both foreign and domestic.

All the bookkeeping, all records of yardage, all shipments have been kept by the Supply Department. Miss Lillie, through her willingness and wide experience, has made an efficient office, and has been most ably assisted by Miss Mary A. Thomas, who has made a wonderful gift of time in three full days a week.

Financially we have known much anxiety, and we express our deepest gratitude to the friends who, through their interest and generosity, gave the furnishings and full equipment to the Supply Department. Without their aid we could not have even started the work.

We have also been greatly assisted by the plan adopted by Miss Adeline W. Fisher and Miss Laura Reeve in asking the Parishes for contributions towards meeting the expenses of the office, boxing, freight, parcel post, etc. This fund has been of such importance that without it we could not have continued the work. We take the greatest pleasure in thanking all who have recognized our need and contributed to overhead expenses, which briefly means all expenses apart from the cost of materials for clothing.

I cannot close this foreword to our first annual report without a few words in regard to our present home at the new Church House. The new building for women's work has been made perfect for the purpose. In building it Bishop Rhineland showed his confidence in the women of his Diocese. We are eager to confirm it, and through our work to carry comfort and cheer to the Institutions of this Diocese and to the Mission Fields throughout the world.

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

January 1st, 1921—January 1st, 1922

The first responsibility of the Educational Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary is the preparation for and leading of Normal and Diocesan Classes to train leaders and speakers for Parishes throughout the Diocese.

From January 1st to October 1st, 1921. The subject of our Study was "The Church and Her Task." Textbook, the Survey. Watchword, Grace. Aim, To see the Task and Realize our need of Grace.

From 8 Normal Classes (4 led by the Educational Secretary, 1 by Miss Cushing, of the Prince of Peace; 1 by Miss Van Harlingen, of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Rosemont, Pa.) Twenty-six leaders led Classes in 79 Parishes; 4 other Classes led by men, with a membership of 2079. In connection with the Flying Squadron, 4 Classes were led, persons present, 342, representing 53 Parishes where there had been no Classes.

To all Leaders report blanks were sent. Among the questions asked was this: "What is the Church's task today as your Class saw it?" Without exception in some form or other the answer was "The Task of Education."

We asked to see the Task. We saw that the need of each individual is the need of the Knowledge of God, that in the words of the Bishop, the Church's Supreme Task is to make God known that He may be loved.

October, 1921, we began the second year's Study of the Survey under the subject, The Church in the Nations. Our Watchword Loyalty. Our Aim, "To Increase our Intelligent Loyalty to Christ." The Educational Secretary led 1 Normal Class, 1 Diocesan Training Class and a class at the Church Training and Deaconess House. Work outside our own Communion: 4 Classes on Christian Faith led at a Girls' School. Making a total for 1921, 87 Classes, 33 Leaders, 2,321 Members from 132 Parishes.

EDUCATIONAL EVENTS—January 20th, 1921, Diocesan Educational Day at the Pro-Cathedral of St. Mary's. Opening with the Holy Communion, followed by the Annual Diocesan Breakfast with the Bishop. Conferences and Classes filled the day.

Second Tuesday in Lent—Meeting of the R. L. M. Mission Study Class Alumnae. This organization meets three times a year.

April 19th, the Diocesan Session of all Mission Study Classes was held at Holy Trinity Parish House. It has been our custom to hold a Closing Session of all Mission Study Classes as soon after Easter as reports from Lenten Classes can be made. We find new opportunities and demands for Classes during the Spring and Summer, so the name of this special Meeting together has been changed to Diocesan Session. At this Meeting the gifts of Classes are received, reports made and resolutions adopted.

May 2nd, Tuesday, Educational Secretaries' Tea. Parish Educational Secretaries' regular meetings second Tuesday in each month.

October 6th, Thursday, the annual Retreat was held at the Pro-Cathedral under the auspices of the Prayer Guild for the Teaching Office of the Church. Conductor, Rev. Samuel B. Booth.

October 13, Corporate Communion and Conference of Educational Secretaries and Mission Study Class leaders.

NOTABLE FACTS—20 Interparochial Classes this year, 6 of these and 8 Parish Classes for men and women. Eleven Classes for young people, 4 of these for both boys and girls. Three evening Classes at the Church House, 1 for men, led by Rev. Franklin Joiner, 1 colored men and women, led by Mrs. Horner Smith, and 1 for young men and women led by Mrs. Pilsbry.

The Educational Secretary has been elected a member of the Department of Religious Education and so privileged to have the guidance and counsel of that Department and also to come in close contact with the Educational Work of the Church School Service League, resulting in the unifying of the Study of Seniors and Juniors.

Mrs. E. D. Crawford, of St. Thomas's, Whitemarsh, has been appointed Field Secretary of the Educational Department with the four Leaders who served in the Flying Squadron for her Committee.

The Sales section or Church Store for Educational and Ecclesiastical Supplies has been placed on a firmer financial basis by the subscription of a fund to be known as the Revolving Fund, and therefore no longer calls on the Auxiliary for financial aid. We take this occasion to sincerely thank the 60 Parishes who through their contributions made its existence and development possible.

Outside the Diocese, 1 Diocesan Class led in Delaware; 3 addresses in the Diocese of Easton by our Leaders; 18 Dio-

ceses, including Honolulu, represented in our Classes. A Parlor Class led at Beach Haven, N. J., composed of members from various parts of the country. One leader spent her Summer in the Southern Highlands and there had a series of informal talks on Personal Religion for the mountain people, who responded with eager interest and a thirst for further teaching, pleading with her to come back to them.

Through the publication of the Church Missionary Calendar the Subject of the Survey has reached every Diocese and Missionary District. The entire issue of 1921 was sold by January 1st of that year.

RESULTS. We have on our list 105 Parish Educational Secretaries. Among the results they reported the following should be quoted: New Mission Study Classes started; Missionary meetings gotten up; Special sessions held on the year's subject; "Missionary Calendars," "Church News," "Spirit of Missions," "Church at Work" and other literature sold or distributed. The Church porch, in one Parish, is a place of distribution, and the Rector's weekly letter and parish paper used as a channel of information.

Centennial addresses have been given and pageants presented. Teas and Luncheons given to promote discussion of and increase interest in Missionary subjects. The Study of the Survey has been taken up by several Auxiliaries at their regular meetings.

Stories giving the Survey information have been told to children in Sunday Schools and illustrated by lantern slides.

One Secretary reports arranging for a quiet morning of meditation and prayer on the Survey. One address was made on Intercession, to produce a better understanding of the use of the Church Service Prayer Leaflet; one on Housing, as well as on various Missionary subjects.

In one Parish the Survey information was brought before the vestry and Men's Club. Congregational meetings and meetings in private houses were held in various Parishes, to give the Survey information.

One Secretary reports arranging a Parish Educational Day, when the six sessions of the Survey course were given. The leaders, members and speakers all from the Parish and with the help and under the guidance of the Rector. A real family affair!

The work of the new Secretaries in urban Parishes, whose appointment was a result of the visit of the Flying Squadron, was particularly satisfactory. One of these new Secretaries came to the Normal Mission Study Class, took the information back to a group of young girls in her own parish, who were so

interested in the session on the "Southern Highlanders" that they prepared a missionary box (their first attempt), and by it provided their first Christmas tree for a group of mountain children. The same Secretary has now started a branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, and is planning a Mission Study Class for adults.

At the Diocesan Session of all the Mission Study Classes on the Survey, on April 19th, Mr. Reed Morgan, representing the Diocesan Class for men and women from 13 Germantown parishes, led by the Educational Secretary, offered this resolution:

Resolved, That a Church Hospitality Committee be formed from members of the various Mission Study Classes in the Diocese, the Committee to be divided into three sections: First, that of Religious Education, to express the Church's hospitality to students from foreign lands in schools or colleges here; second, that of Christian Social Service, to express the Church's hospitality to strangers, especially actors, people in apartment houses, factories and mills; third, that of Missions, to express the Church's hospitality to her missionaries visiting in the Diocese, to offer them the hospitality of our homes, motor cars, etc.

This resolution was handed over to Mrs. J. Alison Scott, President of the Woman's Auxiliary, who, in conjunction with the Educational Secretary, appointed the members for the three sections of this Committee. The Bishop appointed Mr. Reed Morgan, Chairman. This Committee is now at work.

Ninety-seven appointments for Missionaries to speak at Parish and Diocesan Meetings were made from January 1st, 1921, to November 1st, when the Woman's Auxiliary organized the Speakers' Bureau, with Miss Carryl in charge.

The Missionary Bishops, Priests and Lay-workers notify us of their coming, send mail and packages in our care, being sure of a warm welcome. They make the Educational Department their headquarters and write such appreciative letters afterward.

We have many calls for information on the Christian Nurture Church School Courses and now have one of the leaders in the office Mondays and Wednesdays from 10 A. M. to 4 P. M. who is competent to give information and order material for the courses.

Thousands of letters have been written. Since November 1st we have had a typewriter and a regular office assistant.

THE UNITED THANK OFFERING OF THE WOMEN OF THE CHURCH

1922

RESOLVED: That the United Thank Offering of 1922 be given to the Board of Missions or any organization which has succeeded, or may hereafter succeed to its functions, for women's work in the mission field, including the training, sending and support of women workers and the care of such workers when sick or disabled—provided that one-tenth of the offering be set aside as a permanent trust fund to be invested and administered by the Board of Missions, or any organization which has succeeded or may hereafter succeed to its functions, the income to be applied to the support of retired United Thank Offering workers—also provided that the sum of not less than \$10,000 be devoted to the erection, completion or renewal of a building or buildings approved by the Board of Missions on the recommendation of the President of the Board of Missions and the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary.

ALSO RESOLVED: That to our united gifts shall be added our united and earnest prayers that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves or of their substance to the work of the Master in the mission field.
