ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

In submitting this report for 1922 it is unnecessary to touch upon the work accomplished by those departments of the Auxiliary whose individual detailed reports follow, but the Executive Board wishes to express its deep appreciation for the close co-operation and efficient teamwork of all the departments of the Auxiliary and its faith that through this the mission work of the whole Church will be strengthened and blessed.

The Educational work for Missions has always been a part of the Woman's Auxiliary work, but the Social Service Department became necessary under the reorganized Council and is being developed in this Diocese. The Hospitality Department has three Committees working. One, among foreign-born students in the University of Pennsylvania and in the Social Service work of the students at the Church of the Transfiguration. Another extends hospitality to many in the Diocese through tickets to the Philadelphia Orchestra concerts, motor rides and other friendly services. The third Committee entertains missionaries and those in the Diocese under the Speakers' Bureau.

The Speakers' Bureau makes all appointments for missionary speakers, both men and women, and is in constant communication with the Speakers' Bureau at the Church Missions House in New York. It makes pulpit appointments besides furnishing speakers for Parish Meetings. The travelling expenses of these speakers are a part of the Budget of the Auxiliary, so no further expense is entailed in the Parish through use of the Speakers' Bureau.

The publicity of the Auxiliary is cared for by the Auxiliary pages in the Church News. This new department is bringing the knowledge of the various activities of the Auxiliary to many people who previously have had only a vague idea of them and its value is beyond question.

During the past year the Executive Board arranged for three large Missionary Meetings. The Epiphany Meeting was held on January 23rd in the evening when Dr. William J. Sturgis, of the Board of Religious Education in New York, gave a thrilling address on his trip to all the Church's mission fields.

The Rev. Wyatt Brown, of Baltimore, conducted a most helpful Devotional Meeting on March 15 consisting of hymns, short addresses and silences. At the All-Day Missionary Meeting on November 9th work in the mission fields was

presented by Dr. Chapman, Bishop Jett, Bishop Bennett and Judge Buffington. The work of the Church in General Convention and the Program of the National Council with its challenge to the whole Church was given by Bishop Garland and Mr. Lewis B. Franklin.

The Hospitality Committee furnished a supper to the clergy and delegates to the Diocesan Convention in May and also entertained the women of the Diocese at tea after an address made by Bishop MacInness, the English Bishop in Jerusalem.

The Executive Board wishes to express its appreciation of the hospitality and courtesy shown its work by Holy Trinity Church. Both the Church and Parish House are freely given for all meetings, and the Rector's cordial welcome is most gratifying.

The Plan for raising the Budget for the overhead charges of the Auxiliary comprising the Supply Bureau, the Speakers' Bureau, the overhead expenses of the Executive Office and of the United Thank Offering and the travel fund of Triennial Convention delegates was presented to the Parish representatives at the Annual meeting on October 25th and accepted by them. It consists in each Parish contributing a flat sum based on its ability to give, and so far, though a new method, is working fairly well. No doubt when the Parish branches fully realize all that is covered by the Budget they will be glad to give it their hearty endorsement.

The policy of the Auxiliary for the coming year is: That it may prove of greater service to the National Council through conscientious study and loyal support of the Program, concentrating its gifts on the needs there set forth. To be of greater service to the Diocese by doing all in its power to help the Diocese raise its quota. To be of greater service to the Parish by helping the Rectors raise their Parish quotas.

This is the vision. To this end the Auxiliary is striving. Will every woman in the Diocese do her part that the message of the love of God may be carried throughout the world?

ANNUAL REPORT

During the year the Indians' Hope has lost four faithful friends: Miss Anne Pearsall, an earnest and devoted member since the founding of the Indians' Hope; Mrs. John Miller, Jr., of Trinity Church, Ambler; Miss Martha Pancoast, of St. Michael's Church, Germantown, and Miss Elizabeth Carryl, of St. Peter's Church, Philadelphia; of all of whose devoted services we wish to make special mention in beginning our Annual Report. May they rest in peace and may light perpetual shine upon them!

Bishop Rowe addressed our January meeting, reviewing all the Church's work in Alaska and telling us of new needs, one of which was his desire to build a new "Pelican" to take the place of the old boat of the same name. The money for

this has since been contributed and the "Pelican 2nd" is giving fine service to the great satisfaction of Bishop Rowe.

The Indians' Hope decided to take as its big special for the year the raising of five thousand dollars (\$5000) towards the completing of the Bishop Rowe Foundation Fund, and we are happy to report at the end of the year that this sum was exceeded, as we raised \$5745.90 towards this object.

We learned with regret of the burning down for the third time of St. Mary's Mission School for Girls on the Rosebud Reservation in South Dakota on April 23. The chapel and a small quantity of the furnishings of the school were saved. Four of the five members of the staff lost practically all their belongings.

The meetings for the winter were preceded by a Corporate Communion at the opening meeting in September, the Rev. Nathaniel B. Groton, of St. Thomas' Church, Whitemarsh, was the celebrant.

Mrs. Parkman resigned as Registrar of the Indians' Hope in September and Miss Elizabeth Howland was appointed to the office.

Bishop Hunting, of Nevada, spoke at our November meeting, also the Rev. William A. Thomas, of St. Thomas' Mission, Point Hope, Alaska.

Many letters from missionaries were read at the meetings during the year and contributions were sent for various objects, some being regular yearly pledges and other contributions being in answer to special appeals. We also raised our usual contribution of thirty-five dollars (\$35) for the Christmas candy sent to Rosebud, South Dakota.

An itemized account of our total contributions to our Indian missions may be found in the Treasurer's Report.

ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE DOMESTIC COMMITTEE

In reporting the work done in the Domestic Committee during the year there is much beside figures that goes to make the story complete, for without information and inspiration that is brought to us by the workers themselves our gifts would mean less.

At our January meeting Dr. John Wood, speaking for Porto Rico, told us a great deal about the Church there, its opportunities for industrial and educational work in the country districts, which the Roman Catholic Church had neglected for work in the towns. In February Mrs. Hughson, Morgan-
ton, N. C., brought before us one of the hospitals which care for the mountain people in the South. In March, Dean Zeigler, Albuquerque, N. M., laid before us an immediate appeal to help him make possible something really worth while for the

large tubercular population there—St. John's Sanatorium. In April a devotional speaker, the Rev. Benjamin Bird, our meeting falling in Holy Week. In November, Rev. Paul Huntingdon told us of an unusual opportunity open to the Church in a coal mining town, Norton, Va., for a Parish House adjoining his Church there, to be a community centre for social work as well as for Parish activities hitherto impossible; the same day Dr. John W. Chapman, with delightful lantern slides, took us to many of our mission stations in Alaska, particularly his own station Anvik, the Indian centre on the lower Yukon. In December Rev. Frank Persons, Yancy, Va., who is doing a splendid work through the mountains, showed us how much can be done for the young people and how eagerly they respond to any opportunity given them. The fact of the great deficit in our Diocesan quota for the year 1922 having been brought to the attention of our delegates they feel (as members of the Auxiliary, which we must remember is *Auxiliary to the National Council*) that it is just as much the responsibility of our Committee as any Parish or individual to try to meet our quota next year, so they have adopted the recommendation of the Bishop that we confine our gifts and appeals only to such items as count on the Budget until such time as our Diocesan quota has been met. Our Treasurer reports \$9743.00 expended during the year, \$3500.00 only, roughly speaking, of which has gone toward items on the Budget; \$6000.00 to Specials, which is a significant fact to those of us who feel the obligation of a promised support which under the present arrangement has not been fulfilled.

ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE FOREIGN COMMITTEE

We wish every one could have heard them—the men who have come to us, month by month during this past year, with a story and a message that thrilled and stirred you and made you long to go right back with each one of them to have a share in the work.

In January it was Bishop Brown telling us the wonderful tale of how they laid the foundations and built the Church in Brazil. Does it seem firm and sound to you when you hear that the Brazilian Church gives \$30,000 annually? This means the sum of \$200 per communicant!

In February Dr. Teusler gave us a vivid picture of St. Luke's. In March Dr. Wyatt Brown conducted our Lenten devotional meeting in Holy Trinity Church. Dr. and Mrs. Gilman were with us in April and we heard of the splendid

work that is being done by Boone University, and the Committee pledged \$3500 towards the purchase of land upon which to build the much needed science building. Through the courtesy of Mrs. Charles Henry the May meeting was held at her home at St. Martin's. Miss Mary Baily, of St. Mary's School, Shanghai, and Mr. John Wood were the speakers. In September we listened with interest to what Miss McGrath, a teacher at St. Agnes School, told of the work in that school. October brought us Bishop Roots, November, Bishop Tucker. In December Bishop Kinsolving came to us in the closing days of the year with a message full of hope and trust, saying: "The world outlook seems dark enough indeed, but as at Christmas a new hope is to be born again, so every cradle holds a hope. Some child, who for the first time this year will hear the Christmas bells, may be the one to lead the world out of chaos."

We have had much to make us rejoice, and we have had one great blow—the resignation of Miss Blakiston as Treasurer of the Foreign Committee. It was accepted with much regret and with a due sense of the loss it meant. The resignation took effect December 31, 1922. Upon motion a resolution was written into the minutes "expressing the thanks and appreciation of the officers and members of the Foreign Committee for the many years of unfailing interest that Miss Blakiston has given as Treasurer of this Committee and for the spirit and accuracy that have at all times marked her work." We feel, however, that we shall continue to claim her interest and we expect to have her with us at our meetings.

We take pride in the fact that Pennsylvania has never stood for just money; but money is an outward and visible sign of an active interest in missions, and so we are glad that we closed the year with all the pledges in 1922 paid and a balance of some seventy odd dollars on the books. (We realize it was a fifteen-month year!) We hope many will be interested to read the Treasurer's Report and learn to what objects we have contributed.

Many parishes, city and country, are not represented at our meetings. The average attendance was 90, but we need the help of every parish or we will not be doing what we should be able to. Those parishes unrepresented are holding back the work of the Church in the foreign fields—a grave responsibility to take unto one's self.

To the delegates belongs the credit due for work accomplished, for it is only through the interest and inspiration that grows out of the messages of the speakers as taken back

to the parish branches by the delegates that results are achieved.

Every parish and mission represented at every meeting—
this is our goal.

FOREWORD

The closing year of the first Triennium working under the National Council finds us with more definite ideas and plans in regard to our responsibilities toward the Church's mission. During the past year Mrs. Hunt reported to us in January on Fort Valley School, Georgia, and spoke with great appreciation of the boxes sent by the Supply Department.

In February Archdeacon Baskerville was with us and pleaded for the Parochial Schools in South Carolina. In March Miss Bowden reported for the work of St. Philip's School for Girls in San Antonio. April brought us Dr. Patton, who explained the work of the American Church Institute. In May Mrs. Pilsbry conducted a model missionary study class on the negro work. In October a very wonderful and inspiring group of delegates to the Conference of Colored Church Workers, which was holding its Triennial in Philadelphia, came to our meeting. Among those who spoke were Bishop Delaney, the Rev. E. E. Miller, of Petersburg, Va.; Rev. Alvin Russell, of St. Paul's School; Mrs. Baskerville, Mrs. King and other

women delegates who told of the work they were doing in various parts of the South, and last but not least, Archdeacon Russell gave a brief but most interesting account of his trip to Liberia.

At our November meeting Mrs. Scott and Mrs. Pharo reported on the work accomplished by the Auxiliary at the Triennial in Portland, the most important fact being that the Women's Auxiliary pledged itself to support the Program of the national Council.

December found us with all pledges paid and a strong purpose to do all in our power to help the National Council meet its appropriations both for maintenance and forward work. This will demand some sacrifice on our part, a sturdy determination not to be diverted by attractive and interesting "Specials" while the missionary work of the Church is suffering for lack of the promised support. To accomplish this we need the interest and co-operation of every Parish in the Diocese to see that at least one delegate is sent to the monthly meetings of this Committee, the present average now being about 60 delegates each month, which is not enough.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN COMMITTEE.

The following is a condensed report of the work of the Diocesan Committee before which has been brought many needs as well as many opportunities to serve the Diocese.

A "News Letter" is now sent to all Parishes not able to send a delegate to the Meetings that the women may know of the work being done here at home.

The Camp Dix Committee gave cheer and comfort to the 26th Regiment until they were removed in March to other camps.

The Church Farm School products sold in the Supply Bureau every Wednesday morning are now in charge of Mrs. F. Eugene Newbold and Mrs. Alexander Yarnall under the Diocesan Committee.

More than 2000 Christmas stockings were sent to hospitals, institutions and missions through Mrs. Joseph Sims and her committee, an increase of 1100 over last year.

The meetings have been very well attended and the interest increasing. We have had addresses by the Rev. Mr. Zacker for the Jews, the Rev. Mr. Malan for the French, Mr. Clinton Rogers Woodruff for the Social Service Department of the Executive Council. Mrs. Frederick Howland, Mrs. John D. Thomas and Miss Canning for the City Mission, Mrs. George for the Auxiliary Budget, Miss Marian Grant for the Church Committee of the Junior League, Mrs. Neill for the Social Service of the Philadelphia General Hospital, Miss Deane for the Co-operative Shop, Mrs. Matthey Randall for the Church Farm School, Rev. Robert Tabb on the Triennial Conference of the Colored Race held at the Church of the Crucifixion. Mrs. Frederic Gardiner for the Social Service Conference at Whitford, R. I., and Mrs. Druitt Crawford for the Church Conference held at Wellesley College. We also had two interesting meetings, one on "How to Report at Parish Meetings," and one on suggestions for both Parish and Diocesan Meetings. On Saturday, May 13th, the Committee had the pleasure, through the kindness of Mrs. George Woodward, of entertaining the Church Social Workers in her most beautiful gardens. The Bishop presided. Addresses were made by Mrs. Martin and Brother Mark and the music was in charge of Miss Martha Barry. Tea was served and every one felt that it was the beginning of a closer touch between the Committee and the Church workers in the Diocese.

The most helpful meeting of the year was our April one, when our Bishop spoke to us on "Woman's Work in the Diocese." Taking as his text Ephesians 3, 14-20, showing us so clearly the four dimensions of Christ's work, breadth, length, depth and height and leaving with us the knowledge that we, the delegates to this Committee, are members of Christ's body, being His hands, working for and through Him in and for the Diocese.

DIOCESAN COMMITTEE TREASURER'S STATEMENT

Last year the total subscriptions amounted to \$5299.94, this year the total subscriptions are \$2844.73. The difference of \$2455.21 seems like a very large falling off in our contri-

butions, and indeed the figures cannot be analyzed in any way to make our gift as generous as it was in the previous year. I can only account for the fact that the Parishes gave less through the Diocesan Committee this year by hazarding a guess that they gave more to Diocesan Missions directly through their Parish treasuries. In other words, it looks as though less special gifts had been donated because there was more conscientious giving in the Parishes to make up the Parish quota. The Diocesan Committee has been very careful this year to lay stress on the obligation all Parishes should feel to make up those Parish quotas before being generous in the matter of extra gifts and almost all the pleas that have been made at the Diocesan Meetings have been for objects which counted on the quota. There has been no one large request such as there was made in former years for special objects, such as the Deaconess Salary, the Supply Bureau, or the Salary of the Executive Secretary, consequently we have not perhaps been so exigent for funds as in former years, and if our meetings have made the delegates more intelligent and more eager to help in the matter of missions of the Diocese thy will have fulfilled their first purpose. If the delegates have in their turn aroused a feeling of intelligent responsibility for the maintenance of the missions among their fellow-parishioners the actual money returns to the funds of the Diocese will more than cover the difference for this year which is made apparent by the following report:

ANNUAL REPORT

Eighty-one volunteers every week, from twenty-four Parishes, accomplished the work of the Supply Department during the winter of 1921-1922.

To the Mission Fields:

15,599 articles of new clothing, household supplies and dispensary articles;
728 knitted articles;
11,249 surgical dressings;
59 medicines.

At a value of\$18,422.63

To Diocesan Institutions:

3,614 articles of new clothing and household supplies;
586 knitted articles.

At a value of\$4,449.72

This work required:

179 different patterns with a sample garment for each pattern;
31,519½ yards of materials were used;
12,987 cut garments were assembled;
11,091 directions for making the garments were typed;
42,394 notions were enclosed in the assembled garments;
4,751 yards of ribbons and embroideries were used as trimmings;
5,336 yards of bias were cut by hand.

The women of the Diocese have done all the sewing and knitting which in itself is a large contribution to Missions.

Mrs. Henry B. Coxe in the past year has doubled the work of the Knitting Department. Mrs. McCouch, Assistant to Mrs. Coxe, helps us all through her kindness and interest.

Mrs. R. Norris Williams, as Associate Chairman, shares the responsibility of the Supply Department and estimates the quantity, selects and purchases the materials and household supplies.

Miss Mary A. Thomas keeps the card catalogues, makes out all allotment sheets and bills and calculates the "values" for making.

Miss Margaret Davis and her Committee of young ladies have spread upon the cutting table the thousands of yards of materials with the skill of professionals.

Mrs. Francis E. MacGrath and her Committee have shipped to the Parishes the cut garments and have packed for final distribution the finished articles of clothing.

Miss Adeline W. Fisher and Miss Laura Reeve gave important assistance toward meeting the expenses of the Supply Department through their personal work. (See detailed report.)

Mrs. Frederick W. English opened the Supply Shop in December, 1921, with most gratifying results. (See detailed report.)

I cannot close this report without a few words of warm appreciation of our Executive Secretary. We all turn to her —Miss Lillie.

The Diocese of Pennsylvania met its allotment and in addition sent to St. Mary's School, Mission, S. D., a large quantity of new clothing after their loss by fire.

REPORT OF DIOCESAN EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

January 1, 1922—January 1, 1923

“Go ye therefore, and teach all nations.” “He that keepeth my commandments, he it is that loveth me.” It is with intention of direct obedience to this command that the Mission Study classes in this diocese exist. Into them we come to learn more of the Church, her mission, our Lord himself, and his most holy will. In them we experience the loving, intimate fellowship of the Church. From them we go to *tell*, by our gifts, our prayers and our service, to the uttermost ends of the earth, beginning here, in our own Diocese.

CLASSES—From January 1, 1922, to October 1st the subject of our study, “The Church in the Nations”; textbook, The Survey; watchword, Loyalty; aim, to increase our intelligent loyalty to Christ.

Thirty leaders trained in 6 normal classes led 89 classes with 1760 members. Of these 10 were Diocesan classes, 25 interparochial, 9 especially for young people, 13 for men and women; 8 were led by the Diocesan Educational Secretary. In addition to these, Parish Educational Secretaries report nine other classes and leaders, studying “The Church’s Life,” by Dr. Sturgis; “How Can We Know the Way?” by Dr. Jefferys; “Attention,” “Foreigners or Friends,” “Christian Character and Conduct” and “The Religion of the Church,” by Bishop Gore; making a total of 98 classes, 39 leaders, 1938 members.

Did the classes consider the aim attained? This was asked on the questionnaire sent to leaders and was unanimously answered in the affirmative. The next question, what evidence? brought the answer: “intelligent discussion and enthusiasm, a desire to get up and go to work, strong desire shown for the work of meditation, compelling incentive to pray, much greater interest in missionaries.” One class decided to support a native worker in the field. One man said he had had a wonderful winter and loved his Bible much more because of the mission study class. Offers of service, gifts of money, witness to the increased loyalty. One member said, “I have had many interests in my life, the Church among others; from now on, it is undivided service.”

We greatly appreciate the class led by Dr. Sturgis Tuesday evenings in Lent.

October, 1922, we began the course on "The American Mission of the Church," studying the many nationalities composing our population. Our textbooks are, "Foreigners or Friends," published by the Division of Foreign-Born of the Department of Missions of the National Council, and "Wanted Leaders," a study of the development of the Negro, by Bishop Bratton. Watchward, Unity. Perhaps unity must be an experiment before it can become an experience. Our aim, "to make an experiment in unity, in the hope that our experience may add to the sum of the unity of the Church and Nation"; to pray and work for family unity, parish unity, diocesan unity, National unity. The Educational Secretary has led one normal class of 32 members on the subject, to prepare Parish leaders, and a class at the Church Training and Deaconess House.

At the Diocesan Session, held at Holy Trinity Parish House in April, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Fully agreeing with Bishop Rhinelander's statement that the present great need is *education* rather than exhortation, this Committee recommends, as the results of this year's mission study classes, that there be formed, as part of the regular work of the Educational Department, a Diocesan Class for Bible Study, with special reference to the Missionary Message of the Bible.

In accordance with this resolution the Educational Secretary held a Diocesan Bible class on Wednesday afternoons beginning November 8th, 1922, to continue until after Easter; subject, The Missionary Message of the Bible.

Mrs. E. D. Crawford, our Field Secretary, appointed in January, 1922, has not only written hundreds of letters, made addresses, interested many parishes to form classes for the first time, but has herself led five mission study classes most successfully. She teaches four Bible classes in two secular schools, and is leading a Bible class for the Y. W. C. A. once a week.

One leader and Parish Educational Secretary has volunteered and has been accepted for work in Japan.

The gifts of time, study, prayer, love, these cannot be recorded; but the letters of thanks which come from our missionaries take count of them, also. One writes, "How can I express my gratitude to the Mission Study classes for their splendid and sterling effort! Such things bring inspiration to a heart that needs it. The message here will be that of the classes—love. Aggressive love will overpower all evil and faint-heartedness. To my mind, the most aggressive action of our Lord was the ascent of the Cross—"crucify me, but I love you, and for that great love, give, that you may—*love*.' Our Christian heritage, wonderful if we use it, terrific if we neglect its use. Pray for us."

COLORED PARISHES.—The interest and success of mission study among our colored members is very hopeful. A Diocesan class was held at the Church House during Epiphany, for men and women, led by Mrs. Horner Smith. Three colored leaders led classes at Phillips Brooks Memorial, St. Mary's Mission and St. Simon the Cyrenian. One class desired to continue the study indefinitely, feeling that we cannot learn too much about our duty to the whole Church. Their leader reports that she felt that she must do something worth while to demonstrate that she was saturated with the subject of Loyalty. The second leader reported that the work stimulated so much interest that a league was organized and pledged, first, to raise \$50 per year for the Holy Cross Mission in Liberia; second, to keep in touch with the work; third,

to devote at least 10 minutes a day to prayerful thought about the work. The Rector of the third parish wrote a personal letter of appreciation to the Educational Department. Three colored priests served as Intercessors. I believe the colored members of our classes will be a great asset to the work, and that together we shall attain the vision one colored woman had of ever-increasing love and service, till the last and least of the black people have had the message of God's love.

Other methods used were: addresses, 36 reported; 14 pageants; 13 programme meetings. One parish, where a new branch of the Auxiliary for younger women had been started by the Educational Secretary with 28 enthusiastic members, planned to do all programme work through them. Eight Educational Secretaries arranged for lectures, which were a great success; two of them were on English and American Church History, by Dr. Caley. Teas and luncheons have been given to promote discussion and interest. Other Secretaries secured subscriptions to the Spirit of Missions and Church papers, sold Church Missionary Calendars, distributed United Offering boxes and literature, reporting this a sure method of interesting people not accustomed to make regular missionary offerings, and overcoming parochialism by getting more members into the Auxiliary. Boys from our classes held services at the Somerset St. Mission for Italians. One Educational Secretary arranged a Chinese afternoon in the junior department of the Sunday School, decorating the room as a Chinese street, four children in costume making addresses.

A new project which succeeded well was the circulating of missionary books through parishes. Educational secretaries report 14 different books in circulation. A closer connection with the Periodical Club is a pleasant feature of this year's work. Mrs. Kempton, a member of our Normal class, secured the funds for a traveling Mission Study Class Library for the missions in Bucks County.

EDUCATIONAL EVENTS. — *January*, Educational Secretaries' New Year's Tea. January 19th, Diocesan Educational Day, opening with Holy Communion, followed by the annual Diocesan breakfast with the Bishop, then conferences and classes, and closing in the afternoon with a pageant of the year's course, written by Miss Elsie Douglass, which proved to those present not only instructive, but a real experience in Church life and loyalty.

Second Tuesday in Lent, meeting of the R. L. M. Mission Study Class Alumnae. This organization meets three times a year, supports a native priest and catechist in China. The

members correspond with individual missionaries, whose letters are read at our meetings. Through them 45 missionaries have received letters and gifts.

April.—The Diocesan Session of all Mission Study classes. At this time gifts are received, reports read and recommendations acted upon.

October.—Corporate Communion and Conference of Educational Secretaries and Mission Study class leaders.

November.—A special meeting of Educational Secretaries to meet Miss Tillotson, followed by a tea served by the Hospitality Committee.

The Educational Secretaries meet regularly three times a year. Twenty-seven new Educational Secretaries were appointed in 1922, 11 to fill the places of secretaries resigning; 16 in parishes hitherto having none. The Council of the Educational Department meets the third Tuesday in each month, excepting the months from June to October.

December 7.—A day of prayer, under the auspices of the Prayer Guild for the Teaching Offices of the Church, held at St. James' Church, conducted by Dr. Mockridge, whose meditations were greatly appreciated by those attending.

INTERCESSORS.—22 priests have done the work of intercession for the Mission Study classes, presenting the names of the members of the classes, week by week, at the altar, for the altar is the center of all our work, and prayer its power. Five women and one layman have also been regular intercessors.

On the questionnaire sent to Mission Study class leaders—from whose answers this report was compiled—the question was asked, “Do you consider the mission study class a direct means of obeying the missionary command?” Answer, “Yes, absolutely. When we impart we become saturated with the missionary spirit. It is the most inspiring and wonderful way possible at home. It is our chance to teach and publish, to influence others to obey.”

Dr. William Jefferys writes: “A Christian who follows Christ’s leadership, and then practices it in mission study, is a missionary, and a direct line disciple. It’s the real thing, in exactly the sense that a missionary to China is the real thing.” And this chance is open to every man and woman in the Diocese.
