ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

The past year has been a very busy one for the Auxiliary. Much has been attempted, something accomplished and many things still remain to be done. We can feel gratified that putting the finances of the Executive Board on a firm foundation has proved on the whole successful, not entirely so, but certainly the increasing confidence between the Parish Branches and the Central office and the formation of new Auxiliaries will ultimately result in solving this vexing problem.

Then the Speakers' Bureau, for some time more or less of an experiment, has settled down to be a permanent and most useful part of our office work, entailing as it does a closer knowledge of the workers in the field and the opportunity for a more personal contact between them and the Auxiliaries. Also we are beginning to develop in our own Diocese speakers who are a great help in filling in time when it is impossible to get missionaries themselves, who have proved successful and valuable in their work.

The very sad failure of our Lenten Devotional Meeting in point of numbers last March led us, as such things often do, to question where we had made our mistake and to the establishing of a better system of publicity, with the result that our November All-Day Missionary Meeting was the best attended for several years and to lead us to hope much for the future.

Two specific plans have been put before us this year from the National Executive Board, one the Woman's Auxiliary Special, now to be called the Bishop Tuttle Memorial, and which consists of the building of a house for the training of colored women workers on the grounds of St. Augustine's School, Raleigh, and the founding in New York of a house where women missionaries can stay while on furlough or during special training, under Church influences and in close touch with the Church Missions House. We are fortunate to have obtained for our Diocesan Representative, Miss Helen Semple. This plan must be taken up seriously this coming year by the Auxiliary so that we may do our share before the next Triennial Convention.

The other plan, the Prayer Partnership, is at present without a Chairman; Miss Elizabeth Smith, who so ably started it here, has been obliged by stress of work to resign, but we are hoping soon to find the right person to take it in charge and to

make it what Miss Smith hopes for it, a great power in Auxiliary work.

The Conference Luncheons every Wednesday in the Church House open to any or all officers of the five Committees and members of the Executive Board, have proved a most valuable help in the informal discussion of the difficulties and questions constantly arising and, while started tentatively, bid fair to become a permanent institution.

I cannot close this short statement without mentioning what is at the root of all our work, and this is the effort to promote the carrying out in our Diocese of the Church's Program. That the deficit in the Maintenance Budget for general missionary work should be the large sum of over \$100,000 is proof in itself of the failure on our part to have done this successfully. The adopting by the Executive Council of the Diocese of the suggestion of the Auxiliary of a Sacrifice Week, to be held in January, the proceeds of which will be used to discharge this obligation, led us to hope not only that this sum will be materially decreased, but that steps will be taken to insure that such a situation shall not occur again.

Thus though the year closes with the record of many mistakes still the accomplishments give us encouragement to push on to greater endeavor.

Following is the report of the meetings and the work of the Indians' Hope for the past year:

At the January meeting Bishop Remington addressed us, speaking first of the greatest work that has ever been done for Indians, that of Bishop Hare in South Dakota. The fiftieth anniversary of Bishop Hare's beginning of this work was celebrated April 29th of this year. Bishop Remington then spoke of Eastern Oregon, his new field, the only unorganized district in the Church; a territory of 60,000 square miles. In speaking of the opportunities and needs of this vast field the Bishop said he should have \$40,000; but is allowed \$30,000, which he has to get himself.

Miss Ella Deloria, daughter of the Rev. Philip Deloria, also spoke to us at the January meeting; she is doing fine work as Recreational Secretary of the Y. W. C. A. in the Government Indian schools.

It was voted at this meeting that we take for our "big special" for the next three years Priority No. 5, the raising of \$2240 to increase the salaries of five workers under Bishop Bennett in the Duluth Indian Field.

In February Bishop Burleson reported to us on the work in South Dakota and told us that a "Continuation Committee" has been formed of members of the four missionary bodies working among the Sioux in South Dakota: Presbyterians, Roman Catholics, Congregationalists and Episcopalians, who will consult together with the Government over the various Indian problems.

In March we reviewed the Indian work of our Church in North Dakota; it is a big field and we hope to do more to help there in the future. A stove was sent this year to Miss Bennett, St. James's Mission, Cannon Ball, North Dakota.

We had no speakers in April and May and devoted these sessions to regular business and consideration of appeals; in answer to one of the latter we sent a Corona typewriter to the Rev. Levi M. Rouillard whom Bishop Burleson describes as "a most progressive young Indian priest." Mr. Rouillard has the religious supervision of our Church's Indian children in the reservation and non-reservation schools, principally at Rapid City, Pierre and Flandreau, South Dakota.

We opened our September meeting by a Corporate Communion in the chapel of the Church House. Rev. Dr. Mockridge, of St. James's Church, was the celebrant, and later addressed the meeting on faith in and loyalty to God. Two of our young members, Miss Lillie Cheston and Miss Elizabeth Howland, gave their summer holiday to work in South Dakota, and at our September meeting Miss Howland gave an interesting description of their experiences.

Rev. Charles Baker, our missionary to the Karok Indians, addressed us in October, and spoke of the comfort and usefulness of the new rectory built by the Indians' Hope in 1920, and then gave us a report of the work at Orleans and along the Klamath River. The Government is not able to have a resident physician stationed in this district and so Mr. Baker is called upon to attend the sick; fortunately he is a graduate pharmacist and has also studied medicine.

November and December were devoted to regular business and the reading of letters from our missionaries of which many have been received during the year.

We have made further contributions this year to the Bishop Rowe Foundation Fund, and we learned at the December meeting that this fund now totals \$80,000. The fund is to be kept open until the goal of \$100,000 is reached.

The Treasurer's report contains an itemized account of our total contributions to Indian missions in pledges and gifts.

FOREWORD

During the year two changes have been made in the officers of the Domestic Committee: Mrs. Andrew W. Porter succeeding Miss Mary Howland as Secretary, and Miss Charlotte Cheston becoming Assistant Treasurer in place of Mrs. Bradford Fraley.

In January Mrs. Philip Chase spoke on the work in Porto Rico, giving us a very vivid picture of the need in that country and our opportunity to help there. We also had Mrs. Edmondson from Tennessee who made a strong appeal for a Social Service worker in her rural district.

The February meeting falling on Ash Wednesday, we had a very wonderful talk by Dr. William H. Jefferys.

In March we were privileged to have with us Dr. Grafton Burke, of Fort Yukon, Alaska. He told us of the beautiful work done at the Hudson Stuck Memorial Hospital, telling us that it was the only hospital in the world inside the Arctic Circle. His stories of men with frozen hands, feet and faces coming from literally hundreds of miles for treatment, brought before us the wonder of his work. There is a beauty of holiness about Dr. Burke that fills us with pride that we should have such a representative at that far-off post.

In April Dean Davis, Executive Secretary for the Domestic Field, came to tell us of the Church's work in Nevada

and the splendid opportunity we have there. He touched on numerous fields in our different missions and expressed his great hope of the Church meeting the Budget and the Priorities.

In May our last spring meeting was held and an earnest request made to the delegates that we give to the Budget.

In October the Rev. Loaring Clarke, from the Field Department of the Church Missions House in New York, was with us. He spoke of the Church's work as divided into the following: Department of Missions (preach), Department of Religious Education (teach), and the Department of Christian Social Service (serve).

In November Mrs. Biller, in her gentle forceful way, told us of some of the problems of the Western Missions—the great loneliness and immense distances.

In December, our speaker being suddenly recalled to New York, we had a very wonderful letter from Bishop Beecher read aloud, giving us detailed accounts of various little missions and asking us if possible to provide a Ford car for his daughter's use. She is his Educational Secretary. The car would enable her to visit many of the little out of the way towns and come in touch with the young people there. I am glad to say that we were able to do this.

This Annual Report of the Domestic Committee is presented with a great feeling of thankfulness. The increasing interest and knowledge of the work is shown by the delegates in their attendance and co-operation, and surely He who has put into our minds good desires is by His continual help bringing the same to good effect.

In September, 1922, at the close of the Convention in Portland, Oregon, Mr. and Mrs. Pancoast left for a trip through the Orient for the purpose of visiting as many as possible of the missions of the Church in China, Japan and the Philippines. The Foreign Committee feels it was doing the Church at home a real service in sparing Mrs. Pancoast, knowing she would return with beautiful slides and with so much to tell which would quicken interest and enthusiasm in the cause of Foreign Missions.

However, much as we missed Mrs. Pancoast, the Committee was most fortunate and happy in having Mrs. Haines as Acting Chairman from September, 1922, through May, 1923. Through her inspiration and guidance the work was carried on with telling results.

All the regular pledges were met, and in addition to these, three objects particularly claimed our attention and interest. The first, a pledge for \$1000, made to Mr. Littell for land in Hankow, which has been fully paid. The second was a pledge of \$3500, for the land upon which the new Science Building so much needed at Boone University, Wuchang, is to be erected. Unfortunately this has not been as yet entirely completed. The third pledge for \$5000 was made in 1916. At that time a new building was contemplated for the Preparatory School at St. John's University, Shanghai. The building was to cost \$25,000, \$5000 of this sum was enthusiastically pledged by the officers

and delegates of the Committee for a wing. This wing was to be a dining hall and it was voted that it should be called the Philip Mercer Rhinelander Hall after the Bishop of Pennsylvania. The war, however, stopped all building in China, and it was not until this year that we were called upon to redeem this pledge. Miss Blakiston assumed the responsibility of raising this money, and it is due to her untiring efforts that she has been successful.

It is hard to express in the few words of this report all that has been done by the Foreign Committee during the year just past. The meetings have been held, appeals made, and the figures of the Treasurer's report show the sums that have been given. But we hope that more than this has been accomplished. We hope that the cause of foreign missions has been strengthened. It hardly seems possible that the lives of all those who came to the meetings should not have been influenced by the splendid men who told their story month by month. Each delegate as she went back to her parish has perhaps shared something of this inspiration with those in the parish, and so we feel it is not possible to tabulate the gains of the year. One great tragedy occurred which at first seemed so overwhelming, namely, the great earthquake and fire in Japan. So much has been written that I shall not make further comment, except that this Committee stands ready to help to the best of its ability in the reconstruction work, confident that nothing done for Christ in Japan can really have perished.

Report of Fund for the "Philip Mercer Rhinelander" Hall
in the Preparatory School of St. John's University,
Shanghai

On February 21, 1916, Dr. Pott, President of St. John's University, Shanghai, spoke before the Foreign Committee, making a strong plea for the Preparatory School, which has taken over the buildings of St. Mary's Hall, when that institution moved to its new building. With enthusiasm the members pledged \$5000 to be used for a hall to be named the Philip Mercer Rhinelander Hall. Pledges were made by various parishes and over \$1000 was collected when building was stopped by the war. In 1923 when St. Mary's Hall was completed and the scholars had moved into the new building, Dr. Pott asked that we complete our pledge, which has been done, as the following account shows. And we thank most heartily all the friends who have so promptly and generously contributed.

FOREWORD

COMMITTEE ON COLORED MISSIONS

At the beginning of the year 1923, the Committee on Colored Missions passed a resolution to devote all its energy toward raising the Budget for the Negro Mission work of the National Council.

This action necessitated cutting out all appeals for "Specials" and "Priorities," as it would not be fair to the Speakers to make no response to their appeals, nor to the Parish Delegates, to whom the Committee had pledged itself to present only such appeals as would count on the Parish and Diocesan quotas.

To Make the Quota Interesting.—This has been our aim at all our monthly meetings, and the result at the close of the year's effort encourages us to continue the method during another year.

An appropriation of \$100 was made for each Southern Diocese receiving aid for Negro Missions from the National Council, and sums ranging from \$50 to \$500 were appropriated to the schools under the American Church Institute for Negroes. Each month had its definite object and amount assigned to it. Whenever it was possible a representative of that school or Diocese for which the money was to be raised, presented its claims on our loyalty and support. When no speakers were available members of the Committee gathered information from reports and by correspondence, which would put us in personal touch with some one in that Diocese or school for which we were working, and make our giving both interested and intelligent.

Miss Boyer gave us a most interesting talk on the "Modern Negro" as she had studied him in business, politics, education,

religion and the Negro press, urging us to a similar and sympathetic study.

Archdeacon Baskervill made an appeal for the rural schools in South Carolina.

At the April meeting we had the great pleasure of hearing John Randolph Brooke give an account of his school life at St. Paul's School, Lawrenceville, Va., and express his thanks to the Committee for the scholarship given him for seven years. The young man graduated in June, a credit to his school and to all who have helped to educate him.

Mrs. Carter, Secretary of the American Church Institute for Negroes, who has visited many of the schools, made a report on the Fort Valley High and Industrial School at Fort Valley, Ga. We had heard about this school from both Mr. and Mrs. Hunt who are in charge of it, but Mrs. Carter's account of her visit increased our interest. Later in the year Mrs. Markoe told us of her satisfaction in visiting this same school.

These speakers from the outside, with Bishop Garland and the Rev. John R. Logan, of our own Diocese, Mrs. Meigs, Mrs. Stafford, Mrs. Jacobs, Mrs. Bechnell, Mrs. Breed, Mrs. Mann and Mrs. Dillard, of the Committee, all contributed toward carrying out the plan of making the Budget a living thing, with the result that many of the items were over-subscribed and the Committee has ventured to increase the appropriations for 1924.

In case there are those who wonder if suffering has been caused by dropping the former "Pledges," it may be well to state that the salary pledges were not given up until the Bishops had had time to arrange for their care; and the scholarships for St. Paul's and the Bishop Payne Divinity School are being cared for by individuals until the National Council can provide for them.

While regretting the loss of Mrs. Stafford and Miss Jackson, and recording here our appreciation of their years of loving service on this Committee, it is with a feeling of greatest encouragement that we welcome the new officers elected at the October meeting.

Let us look forward with confidence to the steady growth and influence of this Committee, devoted to the study and sympathetic understanding of the Negro race, realizing fully the responsibilities and opportunities in this great work which has been committed to us in the Name and Service of our Lord Jesus Christ.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN COMMITTEE

It is impossible to begin our Annual Report without first speaking of the great loss and deep grief the Diocesan Committee had in the resignation of our dear Bishop, Philip Mercer Rhineland, under whom we had served for twelve years as his own Special Committee and who had been a true father, guiding and helping us with loving interest, always ready to hear our problems and to give us his time and advice. May we be blessed with the same loving interest by his successor and may we prove worthy by our work for and devotion to our Diocese.

We have also to record our great loss in the death of Mrs. James Cheston, Jr., not only a most faithful delegate for many years but one who held office as Chairman, Vice-Chairman and Secretary and was ever ready to help in any way asked of her. We thank God for her faithful service and example. May she rest in peace and let light perpetually shine upon her.

The following is a condensed report of the work of the Diocesan Committee for the past year. The order of the meetings has been the same as the previous year, the attendance has been good, which we hope indicates progress as well as an increase in Diocesan work. Each month the minutes have been sent in the form of a news-letter to all parishes not represented at the meeting, keeping the Auxiliaries informed in this way of the work being done in the Diocese.

The speakers at our January meeting were Archdeacon White, who gave us a clear and comprehensive account of the work being done among "The foreign born," mentioning the three centres for Polish work, two for Italian, one for Rou-

manian, two for Hungarian and one for French; also Deaconess Carol Smith, who told us of the work being done among foreigners at the Pro-Cathedral.

In February, Rev. G. E. Pember told us of the work being done by Deaconess Morris and Deaconess Kaighn at Zeigler-ville; also Miss McLaughlin, social worker at the Church of the Transfiguration, gave us an account of the community work being done in that neighborhood.

In March, Mrs. Llewellyn N. Caley spoke to us for The Sheltering Arms, and Mrs. Thomas Reath and Miss Dixon for the Altar Guild of the Diocese.

In April we heard of the Seaman's Church Institute from Rev. Percy Stockman; St. Barnabas Guild for Nurses from Mrs. Leaf, and the Missionary work of the Convocation of North Philadelphia by Dean Levis.

In May, the colored work of the Diocese was brought to us by Archdeacon Phillips, Rev. E. S. Thomas, of St. Barnabas, Germantown, and Rev. E. E. Durant, of St. Cyril's, Coatesville.

In October, the speaker was Mrs. John H. Neill, President of the Guild of All Souls Chapel of the Philadelphia General Hospital, working under Rev. Mr. Millett, our Chaplain there. No meeting was held in November, the date being the same as the All-Day Missionary Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary.

In December, Rev. Fred. B. Halsey, Rector of St. Ambrose Mission, gave us an account of his work there, as well as that being done by his able Parish worker, Miss Hornor.

At our October meeting, \$145 was subscribed to be given to the Foreign Committee to be sent to St. Luke's Hospital, Tokio, for nurses' clothing.

The Pocket Testament Guild is now working under Mrs. Gibson Bell, Chairman of that Committee.

In June, the Committee again had the privilege and pleasure of a "Quiet Service in a Garden," this year Mrs. J. Willis Martin being our hostess. Our dear Bishop presided and made his last address to us. The speaker of the afternoon was Mrs. Ballington Booth, who gave an account of her work among prisoners. The music was in charge of Miss Martha Barry.

The opportunity and responsibility of our Committee increases each year and we need the sympathetic co-operation of every Parish that we may catch a broader vision of the work to be done in this our own Diocese.

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

JANUARY 1, 1923, TO JANUARY 1, 1924

Mission Study Classes:

From January 1, 1923 to October 1, the subject of our study was "The American Mission of the Church;" Textbook, "Foreigners or Friends?"; Watchword, "Unity;" Aim, to make an experiment in Unity with the hope that our experience might add to the unity of the Church and the nation, praying that all men might be gathered into the fellowship of the Church and there find in our Lord Himself unity and peace.

Into this study of and experiment in unity were gathered 2,245 persons; thirty-eight leaders, three of whom were men, led seventy-eight classes, six of which were for men and women, eleven for young people, eleven Community Classes. Membership in these 1,250, from eighty-four Parishes; twenty-five single sessions were given, touching sixteen other Parishes. Total: 102 Classes, including 101 Parishes and 2,245 persons; fourteen addresses were made and four program meetings held; two missionary rallies, exhibits were given and eighteen pageants.

Diocesan Educational Day:

January 25 brought a group of thirty together in the early morning to make their Communion. This group increased in number, filling the Classes and Conferences, until some 300 met in the afternoon, when, under the direction and leadership of Mrs. Longstreth, there was a real experience in Diocesan Unity—the Pageant, "Mother Church and the New Americans," into which our children from every part of the Diocese and every group were gathered, many contributing the beauty of their national costumes; flags flying, the Stars and Stripes uniting us all, and a child's voice telling us "We must live together in love, not so much because we are brothers but because we are all our Lord Jesus' brethren Who loved us and gave His life for us."

Diocesan Session of all Mission Study Classes:

Leaders and the members of their classes crowded Holy Trinity Assembly Room; an army of friends to co-operate with our Diocesan officers, for work among the foreign-born, Jews and Negroes—those particular groups of Americans.

The following resolutions were adopted:

I. That to the permanent Committee to help the Church's

work amongst the foreign-born, there shall be added a sub-Committee for intercession whose members shall undertake to offer intercessions for such needs of the work as shall be given them by the Archdeacon or the heads of the Committees.

II. *Resolved*, That the Study Classes definitely determine to secure a Church for the Polish congregation of the Holy Redeemer, and toward that end, to the gifts so designated tonight, all other undesignated offerings be devoted.

III. *Resolved*, That the Mission Study Classes present to our beloved Diocesan, The Rt. Rev. Philip M. Rhinelander, D.D., on his return to his Diocese a sum for the establishment of a "Foreign-born Emergency Fund."

The Prayer Circle for the Foreign-born:

As a result of the first resolution, a circular and prayer were printed, and sent to members of the classes. One hundred and fifty persons agreed to pray every week on a stated day for the special needs of the Church's work among the Foreign-born. On November 8, a Corporate Communion of the intercessors was held in St. Mary's Pro-Cathedral, followed by a Conference; where it was decided to adopt the name "The Prayer Circle for the Foreign-born." A Corresponding Secretary was elected. The Circle now numbers about 200 persons and is growing. Archdeacon White said, "I have been watching for answers to your prayers, and I have not been disappointed. Time and again when things seem most discouraging, the clouds have cleared and new ways have opened." Two missions which were special subjects of prayer now give special cause for thanksgiving.

In accordance with the second and third resolutions, \$400 was given towards the Church for the Polish congregation of the Holy Redeemer, and \$136 was presented to Bishop Rhinelander to start a Foreign-born Emergency Fund.

Among the many results reported by Educational Secretaries are the following: Twenty lending libraries started with Mission Study books. In one Parish where no class was formed, fifty persons read the Textbook. An Educational Secretary sold forty-five Church Missionary Calendars, resulting in a Prayer Circle for Missions. St. Barnabas', Germantown, gave 175 new birthday cards to the Hungarian Mission in Phoenixville. Mrs. Duer's Class of eighty young girls, formed a permanent organization, and forty members volunteered for work in the Diocese. A Church School Class was

formed in two Parishes for Negroes; three Russian orphans have been adopted by the Normal Mission Study Class, and placed in a Church Home. When asked if she liked it, the littlest one of these three answered, "Yes, because everybody loves us here." A class of little girls prayed daily for the release of Patriarch Tichon from prison, as we all know the prayer was answered. A worker in one of our missions writes, "The Mission Study Class has saved the day here."

During the summer the Educational Secretary edited the Church Missionary Calendar for 1924 and prepared the assignments for the study of "The Church in Japan." Bishop Rhinelander examined them, approved, gave the watchword "Incarnation" and the outline for Meditation. We believe that the function of a Mission Study Class is to study both the Faith and the Field. This outline for the study of the Incarnation is a most valuable contribution to the Diocese, a due appreciation could only be expressed by its use on the part of the whole Diocese.

In October the assignments were printed with a message from Bishop Rhinelander on each. October 29th we began the study of this course, which gives the first sessions to the discussion of the General Program, the following six sessions to the carrying out of the program in Japan.

During the Advent the Educational Secretary led four classes—a Normal Class, whose registration exceeded the limit of the Churchwoman's Club Room, kindly given for it. (The lack of a Mission Study Class Room, where charts, maps and books could remain, hampers the work.) A class at the Church Training and Deaconess House, and a class at St. Thomas', Whitemarsh, 103 members of the Parish attending, thirty-three men and seventy women.

Outside the Diocese:

Representatives from the Dioceses of New Jersey, Maryland, Pittsburgh, North Carolina, Rhode Island, Harrisburg, Western New York and Florida have been in our Classes. Addresses were made in Washington, Virginia, New Jersey and Harrisburg. A Class and Conference were held at Lancaster by the Educational Secretary and Librarian for the Diocese of Harrisburg.

Correspondence Course. Upon request this course was prepared by Miss Elsie Brown, of the Advent Normal Class, and sent out by the Librarian, Miss Fisher, to leaders of Normal Classes in Harrisburg, Baltimore and Washington and six other leaders outside of the Diocese.

The Field Secretary:

Mrs. E. D. Crawford, by her personal notes, telephone calls, and addresses, has knocked at the door of Parish after Parish for the Mission Study Class and in many cases has proved irresistible, answering to the question, "Do you want our money?" "No, we want you." As Leader she successfully carried through a schedule of five Mission Study Classes, a weekly Bible Class at the Y. W. C. A., four Bible Classes in Secular Schools, one in the Church School; attended three Normal Training Classes, Educational Secretaries' Meetings, Council Meetings, Commission on Mission Study Meetings; served on innumerable Committees, and is still ready to be called upon.

Educational Secretaries:

At the October Conference a group system was adopted: to notify Educational Secretaries of meetings and bring information to their notice. Four Secretaries were appointed, each to communicate personally with five others, the system being continued till all have been reached. This plan has greatly increased interest and attendance at meetings of Educational Secretaries. Of the fourteen Secretaries in the West Philadelphia group, thirteen have already reported for a Mission Study Class arranged for Lent on "The Church in Japan." A new leaflet of suggestions for Educational Secretaries has been published and distributed.

The Commission on Mission Study:

In May the name of the "Educational Department" was changed to "Commission on Mission Study" in accordance with the request of the Department of Religious Education, and in order to avoid confusion in regard to mail, etc. The Commission on Mission Study was organized, including four priests, four laymen and four women, Chairman, the Educational Secretary. The Commission is at work and has been particularly successful through its Clerical members in interesting the clergy of the Diocese in organizing and leading and encouraging Mission Study Classes in their Parishes.

Bible Class:

During the winter and spring of 1923 the Diocesan Bible Class, led by the Educational Secretary, studied "The Missionary Message of the Bible." Ten members of the Class led Bible Classes. As an Easter offering the Class financed the publishing of Bishop Rhinelander's Charge to the Convention

of 1915, "The Gospel of the Church," and personally sold most of the edition, giving the proceeds (which amounted to \$100) for work in Japan through a missionary volunteer from the class, Miss Jane Welte, who sailed for Japan in October to work in St. Agnes' School, Kyoto. In the spring of 1924 she is to take charge of a kindergarten under St. Agnes' School, but situated in the country near Kyoto. She writes to the Bible Class with the greatest enthusiasm and happiness. So this small class, both by printed word and human voice, is bearing witness to Christ in His Church. In October, 1923, the Bible Class began the study of the Life of Christ, to continue on Friday mornings until May.

Alumnae:

The Mission Study Class Alumnae has found pleasure and profit in correspondence with missionaries. Miss Randall, of St. Mary's Church, Wayne, has been appointed Secretary for this part of the work. The regular November meeting took the form of a luncheon; the guest of honor being Deaconess Newbold, of Japan.

Prayer Guild for the Teaching Office of the Church:

The Annual Retreat of the Prayer Guild was held at the Country Centre Mission, Wrightstown, beginning Friday, October 26th, at 8 P. M., and ending Saturday afternoon. The Conductor was Father Harrison. Those who attended the retreat in such peaceful and beautiful surroundings greatly appreciated the opportunity.

The result to be expected of every Mission Study Class is that each member shall *want* to obey our Lord's missionary command, "There was on the part of the first Christians a naive enthusiasm, an ecstasy of joy; this was the note of all that happened. No amount of business methods in the Church today will compensate for the loss of that 'joy in believing,' of which the New Testament is full." Realizing that this incentive

would enable us to obey the missionary command today, we took for our aim: "To recover the joy in believing, that we shall gladly do our part to understand and carry out the Church's Program."

MISSION STUDY SALES ROOM

Each year brings us greater opportunity for serving the Diocese with information on many subjects, books and materials of many kinds—orders for Church School supplies—Altar linens and furnishings have been doubled—a number of beautiful memorials—Communion Services, Crosses, vases, alms basins, etc., have been procured through us—2000 Prayer Books and 3000 Hymnals have been sold; it has been interesting to note the increased demand this past year—Christmas Cards and Calendars in large numbers.

Mission Goods, \$1,000.00 sold during the year over and above those sold at the Mission Sale.

Bishop Rhinelander asked us to take the balance of his stock of publications to dispose of for him. We are the only agents through whom they can be obtained; we will be glad to fill orders so long as the editions last.

A member of a Normal Mission Study Class told us of a little Chapel in the Mountain of Virginia, where they had a rough board for an Altar and a piece of muslin for a covering; we interested several people and sent a covering and Frontal for the Altar, Fair Linens for the celebration, a Cross, Vases, Chalice and Flagon, all as memorials.

The Italian girls from one of our Parishes made rag dolls for sale to raise money to give a Christmas Party to the children of our Hebrew Christian Synagogue, brought us one dozen to sell; we had to order six more; it was a pleasure to help in this expression of unity.

An outstanding event of the year's work was the three days' Mission Sale held in the Church House, October 31st, November 1st and 2nd, under the auspices of the Woman's Auxiliary and Commission on Mission Study.

Each of the five Committees of the Woman's Auxiliary had charge of the sale of their own Mission goods.

We collected articles from twenty of our Missions, and Mrs. Pancoast brought many beautiful things from the East.

Mrs. English served a very attractive Tea each afternoon in the Library, the proceeds of which were used for the expenses of the sale.

Total receipts from the Sale including the Tea amounted to \$2,356.58, each of the various Missions receiving a check for their consignment.

Mr. F. W. English was general cashier, which relieved us of much responsibility. We very much appreciated his interested help.

Besides the financial help we received for the Missions, the addresses of Missionaries who spoke and stories accompanying goods sent were of great value.

The Sales Room stands for much more than the selling of 9000 books and leaflets, numbers of Candles, Christmas Cards, Calendars, etc. We have the privilege of helping Missions not only in our Diocese, but throughout the Church, and welcoming the Missionaries when they come to see us.

THE UNITED THANK OFFERING DIOCESE OF PENNSYLVANIA
