## IN MEMORY of MRS. HENRY A. PILSBRY

The members of the Executive Committee of the Women's Auxiliary wish to express their personal sense of loss in the death of Mrs. Henry A. Pilsbry, on November 14th.

From her childhood she was interested in missionary work, and from 1905, under Mrs. J. Nicholas Mitchell's leadership, she led Mission Study Classes in this Diocese and in New Jersey.

In 1912 Bishop Rhinelander appointed Mrs. Pilsbry Educational Secretary of the Diocese of Pennsylvania, and her sphere of influence among our men and women cannot be estimated. For seven years she led classes at the Cambridge-Wellesley Conference; one year at Harrisburg; one year at Ocean City, Md., and the past year at Eaglesmere, Pa. Every year she led three Normal Mission Study Classes at our Church House, another class in the Deaconess House and she also led evening classes for men and women in each Convocation. Every Friday, from Advent to Easter, she organized a Diocesan Bible Class. Another very far-reaching work was the Church Missionary Kalendar, of which she had been the editor for many years. To every class she brought a rare intelligence, a thorough knowledge of the subject and a very deep spirituality. Her life was on fire with love of our Lord and while to us her loss is irreparable we know that she is at rest with Him.

To her husband and family we extend our deep and heartfelt sympathy and pray that the Master she served so faithfully may send them comfort and strength.

Grant her, Lord, Eternal Rest  
and may Perpetual Light shine upon her.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

"Time like an ever-rolling stream" has brought us again to another year's end, and for the last time it is given me to look back over our Auxiliary work and to sum up in a few words its result.

Last year at this time we were looking forward to Sacrifice Week and wondering what it would do for the Diocese. In a financial way the \$62,000 which was contributed by 95 per cent. of the Parishes and Missions was disappointing, but educationally it did much to quicken interest in the Missions of the Church and the sense of fellowship which developed from a common interest, did incalculable good. If only there could be closer co-operation between the men and women of our Parishes *early in the year* with a real effort to understand the whole quota problem I feel sure that the difficulties so apparent now would melt away and we would all be able to make real strides forward unhampered by this incubus that does so sorely "let and hinder us."

We are welcoming this year several new Auxiliaries already formed and doing good work. I wish that the next year may add still more to our list so that the next Triennium will find our work strengthened and inspired by new branches and members.

We have suffered a grievous loss in the death of our much-loved Educational Secretary. Mrs. Pilsbry was suddenly taken from us in the height of her usefulness, and it is with heavy hearts that we are trying to carry out her plans, always so well made and so joyously completed. Her report, which follows, will enable you to see how successful the year had been and how God had blessed her efforts.

The United Thank Offering and the Supply Bureau each have their separate reports, and each tells of steady and gratifying advance.

The Committee on Colored Missions and the Domestic Committee have made a real contribution to the Diocese by their determined efforts to make all their contributions count on the Quota. The Foreign Committee's great work this year for Japanese Reconstruction and the Indian Committee for the Tornado Fund in South Dakota have put them in front rank as "Special Pleaders." The Diocesan Committee has put be-

fore its members each month some part of the Church Work in our own community, unfortunately usually so little known and understood.

Each Committee has its own story to tell and its own difficulties, but one and all can speak of the steady growth of interest, the closer understanding of problems studied and prayed over together.

The Executive Board has had some changes in its officers. Mrs. Thomas' death has made Mrs. Garland our Honorary Vice-President, and Mrs. Pharo has taken the place of Mrs. Phillips, who resigned on account of leaving Philadelphia—this leaves one vacancy in our Vice-Presidency to be filled at our next executive meeting. Then we welcome two new Chairmen, Mrs. Dillard for the Colored Committee and Mrs. Newbold for the Domestic.

I should like to say in closing that I owe many thanks to the Executive Board for its loyal support during my term of office and hope that my successor may find as many friends and have as happy a time as I have to look back on these past five years.

Before beginning our Annual Report we wish to speak of the loss during the year of two faithful friends of the Indians' Hope, delegates of many years' standing: Mrs. W. Fishbourne Smith, of the Church of the Ascension, now the pro-Cathedral, and Miss Jane Horner, of the Church of the Saviour. We wish to express also our sorrow in the death of Mrs. Adeline Pilsbry, Educational Secretary of the Diocese, the zeal of whose work for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom has been an inspiration to all who knew her. May they rest in peace and may light perpetual shine upon them!

In January we were very much interested to learn that the Hope School, Springfield, South Dakota, had been bought back from the Government by Bishop Burleson. This school was one of four founded by Bishop Hare, and is named in a way after the Indians' Hope. With one other school it was closed years ago when the Government stopped distributing rations to the Indian children in the schools, as Bishop Hare felt he could not undertake to feed as well as educate the children.

In February Bishop Burleson addressed us and reported that he had moved St. Mary's School to the Hope School, advancing the standard and charging a tuition fee. They have at present thirty pupils. The Bishop also told us that the Indian Divinity School at Springfield, South Dakota, in charge of the Rev. John K. Burleson, is filling a great need, as the Indian does not do well in the white theological schools on account of his having no background and no knowledge of English. This school, and the Parshall Memorial Divinity School at White Earth, Minn., are the only two Indian Divinity

Schools of the Church. Bishop Burleson also reported that the Indians have raised \$6,000 towards the boys' school which the Bishop hopes to establish some day on the site of the old St. Mary's, and that St. Elizabeth's, Wakpala, South Dakota, is in a transition stage. When built everything had to be carried sixty miles; now the railroad runs near it. The Indian children attend a white public school, and it is hoped that St. Elizabeth's may be continued as a home or hostel for girls. The Bishop also spoke very favorably of the work being done by the Rev. George Irwin Baldwin at Dupree, South Dakota. We sent \$121 to Mr. Baldwin towards an automobile to be used in his work.

March was devoted to business and hearing letters from the field, one of which from Miss Alice Wright, St. Mark's Mission, Nenana, Alaska, telling how the children suffer from colds, as moccasins afford little protection from wetness and that shoes and rubbers are seldom sent nowadays in missionary boxes.

In April we had a letter from Bishop Burleson telling us about Archdeacon Ashley's fiftieth anniversary and giving us a sketch of his life and work. In reply we sent a purse of \$189 to be presented to him at the Convocation of South Dakota, which met at his home in Aberdeen, May 9-11, in appreciation of his notable record. Archdeacon Ashley is the best-informed living white man on subjects connected with the stirring Dakota Indian history of the last fifty years, through which he has passed, and his knowledge of their language and dialects makes his service invaluable.

In May we had a report from the Duluth Indian field. This year is the second of our three-year pledge of \$2240 for Priority No. 5, which sum we have raised and sent. At this meeting Mrs. Biddle asked for a year's leave of absence, which was granted. On account of the fact that our President and both Vice-Presidents would be in Europe it was decided at the May meeting, with regret, to omit our September meeting, and it was voted that we begin our Winter sessions in October with a Corporate Communion.

In July we sent out an appeal for contributions to a fund to rebuild the churches and chapels destroyed by the tornado in South Dakota. In reply to this we were able to send Bishop Burleson the sum of \$2442.50.

Rev. John A. Richardson, Jr., rector of St. Mary's, West

Philadelphia, was the celebrant at the Corporate Communion in October. The business meeting was devoted to hearing letters and reports and other business matters.

Miss Elizabeth Howland resigned as Registrar of the Indians' Hope before our Fall meeting, and Mrs. John Van Pelt was appointed to the office at the November meeting.

Our yearly pledges were all paid and many other contributions sent in answer to appeals, an itemized account of which may be found in the Treasurer's Report.

In reviewing the work for the past year I think our plan of choosing eight different places in which to interest ourselves in the work and workers and of budgeting the money raised in our eight meetings has proved helpful and successful; the one great drawback being our inability to advertise our speakers ahead of time. We have learned much about Porto Rico, I think, the political and Church history, as well as the Missionary problems and hospital work. We have met Bishop Colmore, of Porto Rico; Dr. Gray, Secretary for all Latin-America, and Miss Hicks, Superintendent of St. Luke's Hospital, all of which I feel has established a very real contact for us with the work and workers there.

We also had a most inspiring visit from Bishop Remington, of Eastern Oregon, which so stimulated our interest in all he was doing in his vast area of responsibility there that we not only sent him the desired \$500, but an extra \$727 (Special) to help to build a rectory for one of his clergy, whom he felt to be invaluable.

Then there is always our unfailing interest in the work done for the mountain people in the South, whether it be in the mill district, the mining district, the scattered missions through the mountains or the industrial schools. Our \$500 in May went to Mrs. Wetmore's School in Arden, North Carolina, for boys.

There were a few changes in the elections of officers in October owing to the resignation of Mrs. McLean, Corresponding Secretary; Mrs. J. Cheston Morris, Jr., who was First Vice-President, and the Chairman, who was no longer eligible for election, having served two terms. Their places have been filled by Miss Katharine King, Corresponding Secretary; Mrs. Frances R. Packard, Second Vice-Chairman, and Mrs. Fitz-Eugene Newbold, Chairman, during whose absence for the remainder of this year your old Chairman has been asked to act pro tem.

I look forward to a splendid future for the Domestic Committee under the leadership of these new officers, and I beg your hearty co-operation in all their enthusiastic undertakings.

As each year draws to its close and we look back over the months, it is always with the feeling that no matter how fine was the year that preceded it, this last was the best of all. Bigger opportunities for service, more inspiring speakers, and we hope a task better done.

In January the Committee held in Witherspoon Hall an evening meeting, at which Mrs. Pancoast spoke on the Missions of our Church in the Orient. This was illustrated with the many beautiful slides that Mr. Pancoast made from photographs which he took during his recent trip through the East with Mrs. Pancoast. Witherspoon Hall was given for the occasion, and was filled. It was, indeed, a rare treat.

February saw the completion of the \$3500 pledge of the Committee for the purchase of land upon which the new Science Hall at Boone University is to be built. In February Rev. Woodward came from Richmond to tell us of the work at St. James' Hospital, Anking, where he had worked for some years as a medical missionary before entering the ministry. It is an appalling thought that in China there are only 200 hospitals, averaging fifty beds each, to care for her population of 400,000,000. This means that there are fifty beds available for every 2,000,000 of Chinese. The Committee pledged the sum of \$1500 to build a much-needed ward for tuberculosis patients. This amount has been entirely raised.

At the March meeting we were fortunate in having both Bishop Garland and Bishop Lloyd to speak to us. Bishop Lloyd told us what the support of this Foreign Committee had

meant to him during all the years when he was President of the old Board of Missions; how, when he was not able to get a hearing anywhere, he would come to this Committee as to a shelter in the wilderness.

The May meeting was held at the home of Mrs. Warden, School Lane, Germantown. The Committee appreciates her hospitality and courtesy in opening her home to us for the day, for a Missionary Sale was held in conjunction with the monthly meeting, both morning and afternoon. In spite of the rainy day it was very well attended, which speaks well for the clientele that Mrs. Pancoast has established for her products from the various Mission posts of the foreign field. Dr. John W. Wood was the speaker.

September brought us Dr. Teusler and Rev. Shreiner, and our minds turned towards the great Japan Reconstruction Fund Campaign, in which Mrs. Pancoast was the leader of the Woman's Division, and many members of the Committee were hard workers.

Mrs. Boynton gave us such an interesting and vivid account of her visit to Mexico last Summer, telling us in a very illuminating way what the situation is there. I am sure those who heard her were pleased at all she said of the Hooker School.

Dr. Pott described his work at Chang Su, where he was sent to build and establish a hospital. This was at our November meeting. Dr. William C. Sturgis was the speaker at the December meeting. He is able, as few men are, to talk in world terms; he enables one to look at things in a big way; he points out the great things the Church is doing here, there, and everywhere; he shows one the splendid men and women in various parts of the world who are establishing educational, medical and evangelical institutions for the Church that one may well be proud of. Yet he leaves one not with the relaxed feeling of satisfaction, but with the will aroused, the spirit stimulated, and with the determination to work as never before, as much remains to be done at home and abroad.

To the delegates we extend a word of thanks and appreciation; without their faithful attendance at the meetings and their interest and labors nothing could have been accomplished.

The Committee on Colored Missions closes its second year of working for the Budget only, with all of its pledges for the support of the National Council paid in full. The monthly meetings have been well attended and considerable enthusiasm shown in response to our efforts to make the Budget interesting through carefully prepared papers read at the meetings by Mrs. Meigs and Mrs. Dillard.

As a result of our decision not to give to "specials" or even "priorities" until the maintenance for existing work is met, we have had only two speakers directly from the field. Bishop and Mrs. Demby told us of the difficulties of their work, without money or equipment, and of the great possibilities and opportunities open to the Church in the Province of the Southwest. The little Chapel, known as Christ Church, Forest City, Arkansas, built by the Committee on Colored Missions in 1920, is doing a good work. It now has attached to it a flourishing day school with plans for industrial training that promise to develop a future school for the American Church Institute for Negroes.

The Rev. George M. Plaskett, of Orange, N. J., came to tell us of the importance of building the proposed Training School for Colored Women Workers at Raleigh, N. C.

The Rev. Walter Mitchell, formerly of South Carolina, emphasized the responsibility resting upon the members of the Episcopal Church for the training and development of the Negro race.

The Rev. E. S. Thomas, of St. Barnabas' Church, Germantown, reminded us that the oldest Episcopal Colored Church in the United States is St. Thomas' Church, Philadel-

phia, and that the Committee on Colored Missions, being the only organization of its kind, has done a unique work for Missions in the South.

We were again privileged to hear the latest news of St. Agnes' Hospital from its founder, Mrs. Hunter, who, although officially relieved from all responsibility for the hospital, is yet working day and night to raise money to complete the much-needed annex.

The Committee felt that the Summer vacation of four months was too long, so the experiment of holding a meeting in June resulted in the pledges being paid to date, and the Treasurer had a nice balance toward the October budget.

A set of seventy lantern slides illustrating the mission work in the South is now available for Parish meetings, on application at the Auxiliary office. The various Churches and schools with groups of students in industrial classes give a very good idea of the methods used to train the Negro youth.

In closing I wish to express my heartfelt appreciation for the privilege of serving as Chairman of this Committee for over six years. I thank the delegates for their unfailing co-operation and support, and wish for my successor, Mrs. Dillard, the same joy and satisfaction in the service of this most interesting and important field of the Church's mission.

This year has been one of such interest in the life of the Diocesan Committee that one regrets to have it become a year of the past.

A great effort, through hard and faithful work, has been made to reach all Parish Auxiliaries by sending them each month the minutes in the form of a News Letter, that they may know of the work being done here at home.

At our January meeting the resignations of Miss Sarah D. Lowrie as Treasurer and Mrs. Henry Dillard as Corresponding Secretary were accepted with deep regret, their places being ably taken by Mrs. Theodore Paul as Treasurer and Mrs. Joseph Sims as Corresponding Secretary.

One evening meeting was held on March 17th, which proved a great success, over two hundred being present.

The work being done by the Church in the Diocese was covered as fully as possible through addresses during the Winter.

In January our speakers were Mrs. Gibson Bell, who gave us an account of the work being done by the Pocket Testament League, and Rev. Llewellyn N. Caley, who spoke on "Some Diocesan Problems."

In February our chairman, Mrs. Martin, spoke to us of our faith in Christ and the Bible as against Modernism. We also had a debate on Paid Social Workers versus Volunteers,

Mrs. J. Howard Clark taking the side of paid workers, Miss Julia Williamson that of volunteers.

March was given over to the colored work in the Diocese, Mrs. John D. Thomas giving a general survey, and Rev. Mr. Henry speaking for the work being done in West Chester, Coatesville and at Lincoln University.

In April Rev. C. T. Bridgeman, of New York, gave us a clear account of the Ninth Crusade, a movement for preserving the shrines and sacred places in the Holy Land. Also, Rev. Henry Davies, who made an appeal for a Parish House for Trinity Church, Collingdale.

In May Rev. A. M. Smith, our chaplain at the Eastern Penitentiary, made an address that not only stirred and moved us, but enlightened us as well.

In October Miss Ewing spoke to us of the Co-operative Shop; Mrs. Neale of the work being done by the "All Soul's Guild" at the Philadelphia General Hospital, and Miss Hicks of her work in Porto Rico.

In November Mrs. W. H. George gave us a clear explanation of the Diocesan Budget. Rev. John Hart, Chaplain at the University of Pennsylvania, spoke of the work being done there, and Deaconess Newbold told us of the work at St. Martha's House.

In December Archdeacon White spoke on the work for the Foreign-Born in the Diocese.

Our "out-of-door" meeting was postponed from June to September, when 150 delegates went in busses or automobiles to the Country Centre Mission at Wrightstown, where such excellent community church work is being carried on under Father Booth. The afternoon was delightfully spent at the artists' colony at New Hope.

Under the Committee a Social Worker was maintained for four months at the Holy Cross Mission at Bryn Mawr in order to start this work there.

We cannot bring this report to a close without expressing our deep and heartfelt sorrow in the death of our dear Mission Study Class leader, Mrs. Henry Pilsbry, for many years so closely connected with all the church work of the Diocese, and whose blessed memory will always live as an inspiration and help to higher and better living and a closer communion with the saints who from their labors rest, who Thee by faith before the world confessed, Thy Name, O Jesus, be forever blest, 'Alleluia.

## REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

### EASTER 1923—EASTER 1924

*The following is compiled from Mrs. Pilsbry's report at the closing session of the Mission Study Classes:*

During the year the regular work of the Mission Study Class organization was carried through according to schedule. The meeting of the Commission on Mission Study. The Mission Study Sales Room. The Council. The Parish Educational Secretaries Meeting and Luncheons. The Mission Study Alumni Meeting and Luncheon. The Prayer Guild for the teaching office of the Church and their day of prayer. The Diocesan Bible Class, which in accordance with the Resolution adopted at the Diocesan Session, April, 1922, meets each Friday morning at 11 o'clock, the subject for the year being "The Life of Christ." Membership 38.

The Mission Study Class on The Church in Japan we have studied by the light streaming from the great central fact of the Christian Faith—The Incarnation.

In the summer the assignments were made. October 24, 1923, the Commission, Leaders and Educational Secretaries had their Corporate Communion and Conference. October 28 we opened our Normal Class with a membership of 28; two other classes were held in Advent, one at the Church Training and Deaconess House, and one Parish Class. In Epiphany one Normal Class and sixteen Parish Classes; two of these continued as Bible Classes. In Lent one Normal Class and seventy-two Parish Classes and Interparochial Classes; twenty-two of these for men and women, twenty for young people, three for little children. Methodists, Presbyterians, Roman Catholics, Quakers and Baptists were members in these classes.

Classes were held in twenty-eight other Parishes, giving in one session a summary of the course to about 560 people. Forty-eight addresses were made on the Church's Work in Japan to various groups, Congregational, Woman's Auxiliary, Girls' Friendly, Church Service League, League of Church Parents, Church School and Public School, in 114 Parishes reaching 860, bringing our fellowship to 3154.

A special feature of this year's work is that the whole Church, clergy, laity, men, women, young people and little

children have come together into the fellowship of our Mission Study Class. Other special features of this year's study are:

1. Classes in private houses.
2. Classes for boys and their friends.
3. A Missionary Current Event Class.
4. Letters and visits from Missionaries.
5. The Rev. and Mrs. Lloyd Smith, former Missionaries in Japan, members of the Normal Class and leaders.
6. That Jane Welte, a former member of our Normal Class, went to Japan as a Missionary last October.
7. For the staff of nurses at St. Luke's Hospital, Tokio, fourteen pounds of candy were sent to Mrs. St. John for distribution. Her letter of acknowledgment contained a picture of the nurses and "thanks to all who joined in the delicious gift." Candy was also sent to Miss VanKirk, head nurse at St. Barnabas, Osaka.
8. A Prayer Circle was formed of the few members of the Normal Classes who did not lead classes.
9. An attempt has been made to group our Study Classes according to Convocations, with a Mission Study Class Educational Secretary of Convocation. This has been successfully done in West Philadelphia, and attempted in North and South Philadelphia, but without Convocation appointment as yet.
10. The Correspondence Course. Having led a Class for the Diocese of Harrisburg, various women volunteered to lead Classes in their own Parishes on our assignment if a Correspondence Course could be given. This was presented to the Normal Class, and one member volunteered to prepare such a course, session by session. This was sent to various leaders in the Diocese of Harrisburg, Washington, Florida, and North Carolina, also proving useful to our own leaders.

Classes were led by our own leaders in the Diocese of Harrisburg, and Delaware, and leaders were trained in the Normal Classes for New Jersey.

To the question asked leaders, "What is the value of Mission Study from *your experience*?" a clergyman leading several classes replied, "It is the only method in the Church today to get across the Church's program." Others answered, "Its great value is the experience of Christian Fellowship.

Fellowship in small groups, talking together of our Lord and the work He has entrusted to us." Mr. Hoyo, speaking to us on Educational Day, said: "I have looked for *this* everywhere since I came to the United States; I have found it here."

In all the Classes our aim was "to recover the Joy in Believing that we may gladly do our part to understand and carry out the Church's Program"—and was the aim in any measure accomplished? "To recover the Joy in Believing";—here are some of the answers on the questionnaire. "Yes, through knowledge of what the Church is doing in Missions, and a deeper, clearer conception of the Incarnation." "People never interested in Missions before, won to them through the meditation." "My chief joy was the feeling of being a co-worker with the missionaries themselves." "The aim of the course was realized through meditation, discovering the length and breadth and height of the meaning of the Incarnation." "Undoubtedly, personal joy in believing is the stimulus."

The second part of our aim "to do our part to understand the Church's Program" was achieved by a keen interest shown, careful reading of the text-book and other suggestive books, good discussion. Surprise at the practicability of the Program and religion in general was expressed. "The joy of finding that we can help carry out our Lord's command for the extension of His Church by knowing more of the missions, and telling others of them." "An awakening in individuals of a new sense of the *value* of the Church's Program, and stopping to *think things out* and *observe* the effect of a real faith." One member said, "If people would attend the Mission Study Classes they would understand the Church much better."

Many have written their appreciation of the leaders sent them, and I want here to express my recognition and appreciation of the devotion and self-sacrifice of the leaders who have carried the message into 113 Parishes.

On the Sunday preceding their final session each class made a Corporate Communion with this special intention; to see clearly what we each had to offer, that the Holy Ghost would direct our Program, that we would be given grace to carry it out.

To carry out the Church's Program. The following work was undertaken by the various classes at their last session. Our answer to the question we heard above all our discussions, through all our study, "Lovest thou me?" And this answer we have the joy of giving *together* tonight.

*Our Program*—1. To meet the Parish quota for 1924. 2. To help our Parish carry out the Reconstruction Program, to “rise up and build.” 3. Volunteer groups to collect funds for Miss Cornwall Legh’s work among lepers, and annual subscriptions. 4. To furnish the house for Jane Welte. 5. To keep in touch with the missionaries. To support a missionary in the field if we cannot go ourselves. 6. To send a gift of money now. 7. To pray definitely, and for a given time, especially for the new converts, the leper work, the Primary Schools, the girls in industry, for the missionaries in Japan and for more recruits to join them. 8. To stand for Christian industrialism. 9. To interest people in bringing the Gospel to the Eta. 10. To give to others what we have learned of the Incarnation, and the Church’s missionary work. To tell others what there is to do. 11. To read the Bible and meditate on it daily. 12. One Class decided to make a Corporate Communion once a month, and to use the collect for the sixth Sunday after Easter as follow-up work, in which they suggest that we join. 13. To provide Diocesan Mission Study Class leaders. Several volunteers reported. To circulate books. 14. To support Mission Study, and to tell what we know about the Church’s Program at every opportunity. To make people listen by communing with God, who alone can give us power to do this. To study, to pray, to tell.

I close this report with the message of an Intercessor to the Class: “The study of the Church in Japan is an appeal to you for sacrifice, for and in behalf of another star to be added to Christ’s Flag; and towards the placing of that star in the Flag as embodying, not only the giving to a great people of the Light of Life as their guide and mentor, but also in turn, of the pouring into human lives the genius of a new Christianity. This, indeed, is a wonderful thing behind Missions, not merely the gift of the living Christ to any race, but also and inevitably, the giving back of the race’s mental and spiritual power into the whole Church.”

A Conference of Educational Secretaries, Study Class Leaders and Alumnae was held at the Church House on Thursday, October 16, 1924, at 10.30 A. M. There were 41 present. Mrs. Pilsbry presided, and, after welcoming each back to the joy of working for our Lord, opened the meeting with a prayer of General Thanksgiving; first, for being safely home and together in the work; second, for the new members who have come into the work; third, for the opportunity of a fresh start; fourth, for the epistle for the week (seventeenth Sunday after Trinity), calling us to our vocation as members of the Household of Christ.

There are 103 Parish Educational Secretaries, 50 Mission Study Class Leaders and more than 200 in the Alumnae.

The Commission on Mission Study functions under the Department of Religious Education and the Woman's Auxiliary Department of Missions, reporting to the Convention through the Department of Religious Education (thereby taking care of the new Educational Secretaries).

The Commission consists of:

There is a Council of Advice, consisting of fourteen officers, which meets upon call.

The temporary resignation of Mrs. Harper as Secretary of Mission Study Classes was accepted with regret, and Miss Corry was appointed to take her place for the ensuing year.

Last year the gift to the Church in Japan from the Mission Study Classes amounted to \$1624.06.

At the closing session in the Spring two resolutions were offered; namely, that two "Circles of Friends" be formed; one, in aid of Miss Cornwall Legh's work among the Japanese lepers at Kusatsu, for which Mrs. DaCosta is warden, and the other in aid of Mr. Hoyo's work, of which Mrs. Pilsbry is Warden, the money for both to be sent them through the Foreign Committee as a Special. It is hoped that \$200 will be raised to send to Mr. Hoyo. A letter of appreciation from Mr. Hoyo was read by Mrs. Pilsbry, and Mrs. Lloyd Smith spoke in his behalf.

One feature of the Study Class work has always been friendship with the missionaries—when we think of Japan there are three missionaries who are constantly in our minds—Miss Jane Welte, Miss Cornwall Legh and Mr. Hoyo.

We, as Educational Secretaries, are now ready to offer our time, and our thought, and our wills to do certain things: To create and develop in the Parish an intelligent, informed interest in the Church's Mission and the missionary work of the Church. To do this, the Educational Secretary needs to be informed and interested herself, and the best way to get this information is to come into the Normal Mission Study Class. Another way is to read certain books recommended for study on the course for the year. The Librarian, Miss Fisher, read a list of books on China, which list will be placed in the Sales Room for ready reference, the starred books being in the Mission Study Class Lending Library, the underlined ones being those especially recommended by New York.

Miss Avery reported for the Sales Room. There are interesting cutouts and books, etc., on China for Junior work, which have just come in. Material for Christian Nurture Series can be ordered in the Sales Room. Educational Secretaries are urged to make more use of the Sales Room in securing supplies of all kinds, as the profits resulting from such sales are needed to run the Mission Study work—this being the only work in the Woman's Auxiliary without a budget.

The Church Missionary Calendar is in two forms this year, the fold over calender at 40c and the book form at 50c. The faithful use of the Church Missionary Calendar is commended to the Educational Secretaries, who should try to see that there is a calendar in each home in her Parish.

The Field Secretary, Mrs. Crawford, spoke on ways to create and develop interest in the missionary work of the Church, and urged the making up of a calendar by each Secretary for her own year's work. Mrs. Crawford also asked the Secretaries to send in applications for leaders for classes as soon as possible.

There will be an Institute on the Church's Program for 1925 at St. James' Church on October 21 and 22.

The Normal Mission Study Class, for Leaders only, will hold its first session on Monday, November 3, at 10.30. The subject for this year's work is the Church in China, and the

watchword is Sacrifice. The Bishop has written the foreword in the Calendar on Sacrifice and a message on each of the assignments. The first class using our assignments was led by Mrs. Pilsbry at Eaglesmere this Summer. There were twenty-five women in the class, twenty of whom have offered themselves as leaders of classes in the Diocese of Harrisburg. Another result of this first class was that the Dioceses of Harrisburg and Maine will use the same assignments with messages from their own Bishops printed on them. The assignments will do the work, if the leaders will make the Sacrifice.

### A TRIBUTE

Nothing can be penned to express adequately our love for Mrs. Pilsbry, who has given to so many of us in all her Mission Study Classes a more living and deeper faith. With us, who feel more keenly our separation from her personal presence on earth, she lives continually in the spirit.

The one word by which she will always be remembered is "fellowship." She lived with Christ. He was her continual waking thought. His abiding Presence was hers. His will was her rule of life. Her every moment was a living example of a rare gifted soul, full of the Spirit of her Lord. Simply she lived with Him here. Trustfully she committed herself to His keeping for this life and the life beyond. Together with that ardent love for Him was a consciousness of her fellowship in the Body of Christ, His Church. And this fellowship made her one with all the deathless spirits of the ages and equally one with all those who are fellow-citizens with the saints and of the Household of God on earth. She lived in the consciousness of that fellowship. It was her support in the final hours of her life on earth.

This absolute devotion to our Lord and a supreme realization of our mystical union with Him in the fellowship of the Church, gave her a consuming zeal and an ardent passion for the mission of the Church, which is the Will of its Head. She knew Him to be the one Perfect Personality, the Fullness,

the All-in-all. She knew, too, that the Church will grow into His likeness as it widens and grows in the world and that only as its Fellowship becomes world-wide will it mirror the Christ of all the ages. It was in this atmosphere that she lived and it was like climbing to the rarefied air of some mountain height to come into touch with the purity and sweetness of her mind.

Her complete devotion gave her an enthusiasm which was contagious, which radiated from her life into the lives of those around her. It was this enthusiasm which imparted to her work a quality which has made it conspicuous in the life of the Church in this Diocese. There was no effort too great and, in spite of physical weakness, she gave of herself and her rare personality without stint, inspiring to greater endeavor all with whom she came into more intimate contact, for in all her classes she taught personal religion.

But above everything else, above the contagion of her enthusiasm, was the happiness and joy of this unusual Christian soul.

She found true happiness in her religion which she lived day by day.

It was always a moment of supreme joy when she made her weekly Communion with her Lord. She really saw a transcendent Light about the Altar. It reflected itself on her face, and showed itself in her life.

She was in a very real sense Christ's "happy warrior," fighting the good fight and keeping the faith, knowing the joy of service and the blessedness of hoping in Him Whom she loved, till He called her to that more blessed Home of greater service in His nearer Presence. This joy of an abiding sense of our Lord's love which she has carried through the gate of death, will be the greatest heritage to all who knew her here as they follow her example and seek to grow in the knowledge and love of Christ through the pathway of joyous service in His Kingdom.

The meeting was called for the purpose of deciding how best to carry on Mrs. Pilsbry's Mission Study Class work, which was so dear to her heart.

It was moved and seconded that Mrs. J. Alison Scott be appointed Chairman of an Executive Committee, the members of which will be appointed by Mrs. Scott—which Committee will take over the business management of the Mission Study work.

The motion was made and duly seconded that, instead of appointing an Educational Secretary pro tem., six leaders should be appointed by the Executive Committee, each one to be responsible for leading one of the six sessions of the Normal Class. The material for the Class will be ready for the use of these leaders, as Grace Pilsbry is typing her mother's notes, and Elizabeth Pilsbry's notes, taken at the class led by Mrs. Pilsbry at the Eaglesmere Conference this Summer, will also be available. The suggestion was made that each leader should send to the Executive Committee the names of six leaders, who, in her estimation, would be best suited to lead each of the six sessions.

It was moved and seconded that all requests from Parishes for leaders for classes be referred to the Executive Committee.

The following suggestions were made:

That all preparations for the Normal and Parish Mission Study Classes be placed in the hands of the Executive Committee for action.

That the Executive Committee be asked to prepare a report to be brought before the meeting of the Educational Secretaries on Thursday, December 18.

That the Executive Committee draft a letter to be sent to all Parishes, to relieve any uncertainty which may exist as to the continuance of the Mission Study Class work, and to ask for reports of any Mission Study Classes arranged for at present.

That the Executive Committee be asked to appoint some persons to help in the Sales Room during December.

Mrs. Arnett, Mr. Groton, Mrs. Thomas, Miss West, Mrs. Wright, with Mr. Bird as Chairman, were appointed a Committee to arrange for a memorial to Mrs. Pilsbry.

The Secretary was asked to send out postals for the meeting of Parish Educational Secretaries on Thursday, December 18, as scheduled, adding to the regular postal the request that each Secretary be prepared to make her report at this meeting of any Mission Study Classes arranged for in her Parish.

All suggestions made met with a warm response from the leaders, who will hold themselves in readiness to answer any calls upon them made by the Executive Committee.

## THE UNITED THANK OFFERING DIOCESE OF PENNSYLVANIA

RESOLVED, That the United Thank Offering of 1925 be given to the National Council for the work of women in the mission field, whose appointment has been approved by the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary, including the training, sending and support of women workers, and the care of such workers when sick or disabled; *Provided*, that one-tenth of the Offering be set aside and added to the permanent trust fund to be invested and administered by the National Council, the income to be applied to the support of retired United Thank Offering Workers; also *Provided*, that the sum of not less than \$25,000 be devoted to the erection, completion or renewal of a building or buildings approved by the National Council on the recommendation of the Executive Secretary of the Department of Missions and the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary.

RESOLVED, That to our united gifts shall be added our united and earnest prayers that God will put into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves or their substance to the work of the Master in the Mission Field.
