FOREWORD

Moffatt's translation of St. John IV: 35-36 reads: "That proverb, One sows and another reaps", holds true here; I sent you to reap a crop for which you did not toil; other men have toiled, and you reap the profit of their toil." I fully realize the grave responsibility placed upon me as the successor of the able and devoted women who have toiled so faithfully to organize, inspire and perfect the Auxiliary of the Diocese of Pennsylvania, and now I am to reap the profit of their toil as President of an organization which has become a power for righteousness wherever our Church has gone. The officers of the different committees have done much towards this extension of Christ's Kingdom. Members of other Dioceses would agree that it is a rare privilege to work together with such women as you are, and to all I give my heartfelt thanks for your promises of loyal support. I need your friendship and your counsel.

My first duty is the pleasant one of expressing my gratitude to you in appointing me one of the delegates to the Triennial at the General Convention in New Orleans. The joy of loving service was certainly manifest in the Woman's Auxiliary gathered there; five hundred women assembled to learn how best to make Christ known and loved.

There the Auxiliary adopted as its own the Message its Executive Board had sent to the National Council of the Church. The Message stated that the women of the Auxiliary were deeply concerned in the grave financial situation facing the Church and were even more concerned by the apparent causes of this situation which they thought were apathy, personal luke-warmness and failure to use the power of Christ,—that they therefore offered to co-operate in any plans the National Council may set before the Church. We pledged ourselves "to go back to our Diocesan and Parish branches dedicated and committed to:

1. The payment in full of all general Church quotas.
2. The overcoming of our luke-warmness by deeper spiritual understanding and greater consecration through prayer.
3. The awakening of all women of the Church to more effectiveness for Christ.
4. To United Parish effort.
5. To the strengthening of our rural and foreign-born work.
6. To closer relationship with the missionaries in the Field.

"Realizing that only through personal dedication to Jesus Christ, our Lord, can we hope to bring to fruition our human endeavours, we rededicate ourselves to the service of our Lord Jesus Christ: to making the strength of our deeds, the measure of our faith; to a sincere and simple effort in our daily living to follow with humility the example of our Saviour."

With such a pledge we have a great task before us, and together we must work out its fulfillment. Let us have this task in mind when

we pray "Thy will be done on earth as it is in Heaven," we surely must use earnest prayer for guidance. Some years ago, in a Mission Study Class, Mrs. Pilsbry spoke of our Lord's petition, "Thy will be done" as a prayer of resignation. Mrs. Abbey was equally certain that it is a prayer of action, the **doing** of God's will. Both of course were right. I really believe that if every human being began today to fully do God's will that in a generation there would be no poverty, no wrong and no illness, for most of our illnesses if traced back come from wrong-doing; death of course would come, but at one end of a perfect life and not to be mourned. Each of us has more power to bring this about than we realize and together we can accomplish much. "Not failure, but low aim, is crime."

There are so many opportunities waiting to be seized to speak of only one: each year over 3000 persons are added to the Church in our own Diocese by confirmation. If the women of each Parish could find some way to retain these new members much that is usually lost might be retained for the strength of the future.

Let us unitedly make our Auxiliary prayer "Thy will be done on Earth as it is in Heaven", looking for strength and guidance, and so help bring nearer the time when "the kingdoms of this world are become the kingdom of our Lord and His Christ."

Before beginning our Annual Report we wish to speak of the loss of a faithful delegate, in the death on May 10, 1925 of Miss Marguerite Bement of St. Philip's Church. May she rest in peace and may light perpetual shine upon her!

Our January meeting was taken up with regular business. There was no speaker, and after the session, the Annual meeting was held.

A special meeting was called on February 6th, at which Bishop Burleson addressed us, telling us of conditions generally throughout South Dakota and the changes made in building and administration in that part of the State affected by the tornado of the summer before. The new churches and chapels have been planned and constructed to withstand such big storms.

Miss Alice Wright of St. Mark's Mission, Alaska addressed our regular February meeting, giving us an excellent account of the life and work at the Mission's school for Indian children.

In March Bishop Bennett of Duluth addressed us, telling of the work, needs and opportunities of his field, the second largest Indian work in the country, which we have been helping by a three-year pledge to raise the money for Priority No. 5.

We had no Speaker in April and the meeting was devoted to regular business.

In May a letter was read from Bishop Burleson telling us of the retirement of the Rev. Philip Deloria, an outstanding and honored Indian priest who after forty-two years of service and being well past the retiring age, has been persuaded to give up his active labors and take up a quiet little work in connection with the Chapel of St. Philip at White Swan. The Bishop made an appeal for contributions for a new rectory as a home for Mr. Deloria, the old one being too dilapidated to repair. Several parishes took this up for summer work thus enabling us to make a substantial contribution toward this object in the fall.

The Rev. Malcolm E. Peabody, rector of St. Paul's Chestnut Hill was the Celebrant at our Corporate Communion in September. At the meeting which followed Miss H. A. Sparkman gave a very interesting account of the work at the San Juan Mission for the Navajos at Farmington, New Mexico.

In October our time was taken up by regular business and Mrs. Hollingsworth gave us an account of the United Offering Presentation Service at the Convention in New Orleans.

November was devoted to regular business including the reading of letters from the field; one of the latter was from the Rev. Charles Baker, formerly missionary to the Karoks, Orleans, Calif. now in charge of the San Juan Mission, Farmington, New Mexico. Mr. Baker wrote that the work was greatly in need of help and that there should be a resident physician and two nurses stationed at the hospital there.

We had no speaker in December and the meeting was devoted to regular business.

An itemized account of the pledges and contributions to our Indian missions may be found in the Treasurer's Report.

The past year in the Domestic Committee, as in all branches of the Church's work, has been one of great interest and good results. The work was carried on last winter under Mrs. Ingersoll's able leadership, and it was with very real regret that the Committee was forced to say farewell to her last May. The new Chairman feels very inexperienced by comparison, and apologizes to the Committee for the period of unrest while she is stepping in to new responsibilities. She would like to take this opportunity to thank the delegates for their loyalty and patience, and looks forward to a delightful term of service with such splendid co-operation.

We still pursue the policy of budgeting our eight months and making \$500.00 a month our goal. As will be seen by our Treasurer's Report, this has been quite a success, and seems to appeal to the delegates. Unfortunately we are not able to announce our budget very far in advance, due to the unavoidable change in plans of the various speakers, but it seems so much better to give money to the fields from which we have had a speaker the previous month, that it more than makes up for our inability to publish definite plans for the whole year.

We have had wonderful opportunities during the past year, and our work has covered very diversified sections and types of undertakings; Southwest Virginia, Alaska, Nebraska, Southern Mountain work, Nevada, Montana, Porto Rico, Idaho, with most interesting and appealing speakers from all. We still continue with Bishop Thomas's Life Insurance, and hope very much to send him a substantial "special" to reconstruct the base of a memorial to Miss Sarah C. Neilson, presented by the Domestic Committee when Mrs. Thomas Neilson was its much beloved Chairman.

We are looking forward to the new plan for the Advance Work of the Church, and pledge our co-operation in whatever way we can help most, as it is our conviction that the Advance work must go side by side with the Budget, or at least follow very closely behind.

We would like to close with a word of gratitude to Mrs. Rowland Evans who has been our faithful Treasurer for several years and who has consented to continue to act as Assistant Treasurer, and a word of hearty welcome to Mrs. James F. Bullitt who has already become most active in, and necessary to, the life of the Committee.

To the Parish Auxiliaries, who make our work possible, we express our gratitude for their generosity in the past, the hope that they will remember the Domestic speakers when they plan their meetings, and that their interest in the work in the Domestic Field will continue and increase during the coming year.

As each new year comes around the minds of people are filled with the thoughts and plans of all they hope to accomplish in the year just ahead, and so full of possibilities. It is well to look ahead, but we must look back too. And so the Foreign Committee, though full of enthusiasm and of projects for 1926, looks back and asks itself —“What of the opportunities of 1925?”

It was our good fortune to hear many toilers in many fields;—Bishop Overs from Liberia, Rev. Tsen, Professor Ely, Dean of St. John's University, Shanghai, Bishop Hulse of Cuba, Miss Dexter from the Church General Hospital in Wu Chang; Dr. Ridgely from Nanking, Miss Ridgely from the House of Bethany at Cape Mount, who has worked twenty-five years in Africa; Bishop Graves, Bishop McKim, Miss Heyward, Principal of St. Margaret's School in Tokyo; and Bishop-elect Creighton of Mexico.

Each one told a story that made one swell with pride, grateful that the Church was able to send such splendid men and women to carry the Gospel abroad. Men and women who were doing big things for the Church, who could do bigger things had they the whole-hearted support of the Church at home.

This it seems to me was the challenge that fell from the lips of every speaker. The failure of the Church at home! Is America in reality a Christian nation? Does the Church at home care? These are questions that the missionary is asked and has to answer. What is his answer to be? When he sees the Church's splendid institutions —its churches, schools, universities, and its hospitals, eagerly sought out because of the benefits of a Christian education and Christian ministry, what is he to say to those who seek admittance and who must be turned away because of already overcrowded accommodation and inadequate facilities?

As a Committee we have met some of the many opportunities offered. We have paid our pledges for the year in full, due to the loyal support of the parishes, whose delegates compose this Committee and faithfully attend its meetings. In connection with the May meeting we held a Sale of products made at the various mission stations and sold over one thousand dollars worth of goods. The proceeds go towards the support of the mission sending the goods.

Finally, we cannot all be foreign missionaries, but to each one there comes many an opportunity of being a good Christian at home. This, I am confident is the purpose of every member of this Committee; if it be so, the messages of our speakers will not have been in vain.

During 1925 we set ourselves to raise the definite sum of \$3500.00 which applied entirely to the Quota. We followed the Committee's plan of having a definite Budget and worked for the items on it each month. The Committee was to raise \$1600.00 for evangelical purposes and \$1900.00 for education.

The evangelical work was divided between 16 Dioceses, most of them having a large negro population, and therefore unable to do the work without help.

The educational program applied entirely to the schools sponsored by the American Church Institute. We found out that through this agency of the Church as many negroes were being educated as at Hampton and Tuskegee combined and for one half the cost. It is an incentive to give when one realizes that in negro education one dollar counts with the Church the same as two dollars for a secular college. It is the aim of the Institute to have one American Church Institute School in each state of the South and Southwest, for the purpose of training teachers for the public schools and other leaders.

One of these schools is the Bishop Payne Divinity School which has supplied one half of the total coloured clergy now at work in the Church. At the February meeting we had as speaker the Rev. Joseph Hudson, who had taken up work in this Diocese. He is a graduate of the Bishop Payne Divinity School and gave us an interesting account of its founding and life.

In March Deaconess Adams of Chester told us of a visit she had paid to St. Paul's, Lawrenceville, Va., and of the extraordinary work done there under Archdeacon Russell.

In April we had as speaker Archdeacon Phillips of this Diocese to inform us of negro work in Pennsylvania. As our meetings are on the same hour and day as the Diocesan meetings we never hear any of the coloured speakers there, and we were very grateful to the Archdeacon for telling us of the work right around us.

We had no speaker in May and there was no meeting in June as we found our Budget was paid up to date.

The October meeting started our work for the autumn. Mrs. Meigs presided as the Chairman was away at General Convention.

In November we had the great pleasure of having Bishop Darst of East Carolina, who spoke chiefly of evangelical work. His view was so encouraging. The coloured missions are giving more to the general work of the Church and giving more of their services also, the work is getting stronger all the time, and people who once come into the Church stand so solidly for the faith as they have learned it; also there is an increase of self support in the missions.

In December Mrs. Charles Pencoast, who had been on the Committee to furnish the Bishop Tuttle Memorial Home for the training of coloured Deaconesses, gave us a detailed description of that new part of St. Augustine's to which every woman in the Auxiliary can look with pride. Mrs. Markoe was also present and spoke informally of a recent visit to St. Augustine's and St. Paul's, being most enthusiastic over the latter school.

To inform ourselves of the other work to which we gave we wrote and received letters from the following places and people: St. Mark's School, Birmingham, Ala; Hoffman St., Mary's Tennessee; St. Paul's, Lawrenceville, Va.; Okolona, Miss.; Mrs. Hunt, Fort Valley High, Ga.; The Rev'd F. D. Taylor, Chaplain of Gaudet School, New Orleans; two coloured clergy of the Diocese of Washington, describing rural work in Maryland and slum and settlement work in Washington; Archdeacon Wood, Florida and Bishop Demby of the Southwest Province.

Counting officers and delegates we averaged 59 7-10 people at each meeting. That is not good enough. While our meetings can't be as interesting of those of some of the other Committees who have speakers from all over the world, nor for some there is not the same appeal for work several hundred miles away, that there is for work near by, still we should remember that 1-10 of our population is negro, and in our country with the Church doing such a magnificent work for them we want more Parishes to hear this news, we want more delegates and more visitors.

The Treasurer's Report will show that we have more than paid our Budget for 1925.

Thank you all, officers and delegates, for the help and interest you have given, it gives the Committee an incentive and enthusiasm for beginning the New Year.

Efficient direction by the officers and interested co-operation of the delegates of the Diocesan Committee has made the year 1925 one of great interest.

In January our speakers were Miss Lilly Rendell, Secretary and Visitor of the Mission to the Blind, and Dr. Crouter, Superintendent of the Pennsylvania Institute of the Deaf. His appeal was for more schools for the deaf as they are "foreigners" until educated, and that their affliction is mental, physical and spiritual.

In February Miss Ormsby of the Hebrew Christian Synagogue asked for spiritual help, to show kindness to the Jews and not to despise them. Also Deaconess Young of St. John's Settlement House spoke delightfully of her first Christmas here among the Roumanians and Poles.

In March we were ably told of the work among the coloured in our Diocese by Archdeacon Phillips. He spoke of the splendid racial work the Church is doing and how enthusiastically the people did their part.

In April Mr. Hutton Kennedy, of the Church Service League, told of its work and discontinuance. Also the Rev'd Wood Stewart of the Social Service Department explained the aim to arouse the social Christian conscience of the people.

In May the Rev'd Mr. McHenry of the City Mission reviewed their work in Social Service and the Hospital for Tuberculosis at Chestnut Hill.

The Out-of Door meeting was held Tuesday, June 2nd, at Valley Forge. A truly lovely day.

In October the winter's work was discussed and a splendid program was presented and enthusiastically received.

In November Mrs. Ingersoll's vivid account of the Convention at New Orleans gave us a lasting picture of the solemnity and earnestness of it.

In December the first meeting of the new Program: "What the Parishes are doing" was interestingly reported by Mrs. Howland of Old St. Peter's, Mrs. Crankshaw of St. Mark's, Frankford, Mrs. Marmaduke Tilden, Jr., of the Church of Our Saviour, Jenkintown, Mrs. Randall of St. Mary's, Wayne and Mrs. B. Franklin Pepper of St. Paul's, Chestnut Hill.

In reviewing the results of the past, we are impressed and spurred onward to continued effort for the future. Each year has and should mark progress in the work of Christ.

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY, 1925.

The following report is of work done under a temporary Executive Committee (Mrs. J. Alison Scott, Chairman) formed after the death of Mrs. Pilsbry to carry on the Mission Study work till the general election of officers. In June Mrs. John E. Hill, of All Saints', Moyemensing, was nominated for the office and at once assumed the duties of Educational Secretary, although her election did not take place until the Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary on October 1. This was done so that she might attend the Wellesley Conference and prepare the Mission Study work for the coming year.

In the summer of 1924 Mrs. Pilsbry made the assignments for the course on China and taught a Normal Class of 25 at Eaglesmere Summer Conference. Twenty of those in the class became leaders of Mission Study Classes with the result that Pennsylvania assignments were used in the Diocese of Harrisburgh and Maine. In Ephrata one Normal Class and three Parish Classes were held; in Lent one Normal Class and forty-three Parish Classes. There were also six Program Meetings. In all about 2000 people in our Diocese were reached through the Classes. The offering amounted to \$1235.00.

A Class was led by one of our leaders, Mrs. Arthur Van Harringen, at Richmond, Va. with seventy-five in attendance, fifteen of whom became Leaders.

Other features of this year's study are:

In one Parish there was held a Social Evening and the guests of honour were ten Chinese students. Seventy-five others were present. Music by the choir. The leader says it was a beautiful occasion. Since then many members of the Class have invited Chinese students to dine with them. Three students have begun to worship at St. James' Church, Philadelphia.

The West Chester Class has given a scholarship for a Chinese girl in Deaconess Hart's School. This is the second year this class has given a scholarship in the Mission field.

Some classes have awakened great interest in Summer Schools, some have taken interest in industrial conditions, both at home and in China. Others have taken subscriptions to industrial magazines; some interested to try to vote intelligently and prayerfully in the labour questions. Others have volunteered for immigrant work.

There has been a renewed effort to support the Church's Program through Parish quota; others to send representatives to Normal Classes next year. Some want to place books in libraries, both here and in China, and were especially interested in Miss Wood's work at Boone University, China, where she is sending circulating libraries into the outlying districts, and even sent one to a "brigand leader."

To carry out the Church's Program, the following work was undertaken by the Normal Classes at their last Session:

1. To support the Program, Budget and Priorities; to have meetings to arouse interest and to tell facts.
2. To provide a scholarship for Mr. Goddard's School.
3. To look into Labour laws so as to vote intelligently as a Christian.
4. Send a Chinese student to a Summer Conference.
5. To show fellowship by hospitality to Chinese students in Philadelphia.
6. Scholarship in a girls' School. (This has been filled.)
7. Desire to help Mr. Cotter's work.
8. To try to get nurses to go to China for social service duty.

THE DEPARTMENT OF MISSION STUDY

Is being reorganized along Convocation lines. In each convocation a Chairman has been appointed who is responsible for all classes in her Convocation, and to whom all applications for classes should be made. The chairmen are: North Philadelphia, Mrs. F. Leighton Appleman, 308 South 16th Street; West Philadelphia, Mrs. T. N. Walker, 4316 Pine St.; South Philadelphia, Mrs. J. Alison Scott, 1917 Panama Street; Norristown, Mrs. W. C. Kent, Wyncoate; Chester, Mrs Arthur Van Harlingen, Bryn Mawr; Germantown, Mrs. Ralph Hayes, 171 E. Walnut Lane.

On the 20 and 21 of April Miss Laura F. Boyer, National Assistant Educational Secretary, will conduct an Institute to train leaders in the discussion method. These classes will be open to all women of the Diocese. Miss Boyer's coming is an important opportunity for us to interest more women and to train leaders for classes.

The Diocesan Educational Secretary hopes, next autumn, to use the Institute method, (giving 6 sessions in 2 days) going herself to each Convocation. This will give an opportunity to women who would find it impossible to come to the Church House for 6 consecutive weeks to attend the usual normal courses.

In Parishes where a six weeks' course is not feasible there may be arranged a Parish Program Day, when four speakers will present the year's course.

It has been decided to make a new adventure with our Mission Study Class Offering. One thousand dollars has been pledged to Bishop Carson of Haiti, to build a Church in the little town of Arcahae, where the Haitian flag was adopted. Our Church is represented at present by a ramshackle building, which, lacking doors, must often shelter the cattle as well as human beings. One thousand dollars will build the Church; the people have promised to equip it. By thus concentrating all our offerings we can take part in the forward work of the new Program.

As your new Educational Secretary I feel that the task before me is very great. I can not do it without your co-operation and prayers. I beg you to give me both. Then, I am sure, that together, we shall be able to accomplish a big piece of work with great joy.
