## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE AUXILIARY

This, my first annual report as president of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Pennsylvania, begins with my sincere thanks to you for the joy you have given me as your presiding officer. Each and every member of the Auxiliary has been so pleasant to meet, so helpful to work with, and so ready to overlook my shortcomings, that you have made my part a constant pleasure. My only regret is that I have not done more for the advancement of the Auxiliary, but I know you will be ready to help me to do more in the future.

I am sure no other diocese has such officers as we have in the chairmen of our five Standing Committees. Their noteworthy reports show how well you are going forward with missionary zeal to carry the "Good News" of more abundant life to all parts of the world.

We all know that the earliest ideal of the Woman's Auxiliary was to be worthy of one of Christ's commendations: "I was naked and ye clothed me." It is hoped that this department will always continue, and that the purchase of ready-made clothing may not too much displace the personal devotion of making garments for Christ's children. There is something about sewing together which has a uniting bond which means much in parish life. The chairman of the Supply Bureau, Miss Dickson, is carrying on splendidly what Mrs. Lucas so wisely inaugurated and put on so sound a basis.

I truly believe we are blessed in our Educational Secretary, Mrs. Hill. I commend her to you. Do all you can to help her in the Mission Study Classes, giving her the aid you can and not using up the strength she so generously outpours for her classes. She has additional plans for this year.

Another officer who has finished her first year of service is your United Thank Offering Treasurer, Mrs. Baker. Those who have had the pleasure of hearing her know why the U. T. O. should go on increasing.

The Thank Offering is endeared to us by many ties, and it is always a pleasure to meet our Thank Offering missionaries. There is also the *Corporate Gift* of the women of all the Auxiliaries. It is particularly easy in our diocese to confuse this with the United Thank Offering, because you naturally associate Mrs. Hollingsworth with that office. After

she so efficiently served her two terms of that treasurership she is now the diocesan treasurer of our Corporate Gift. Please remember that this gift is not for salaries nor for supplies, but is for definite buildings to be erected. This corporate gift is perhaps the only advance work which is definitely promised by the whole church.

One of the objects to which your parish branches are asked to contribute is the Budget. This is for the expenses incurred by the office in doing the work of the Auxiliary. We should really be thankful that we live in a great diocese where other generations have developed the Auxiliary into such a strong organization that we need an established office and a supply bureau. If any branch is still in doubt as to the need of executive headquarters, please send a delegate to the office, that she may report to you at least part of what is transacted there.

We all appreciated the ability and interest of our office secretary, Miss Mary Howland, who made the office a vital help to the Auxiliary. I personally felt stranded when she left us to go to the Church Service League, but she found Miss Katharine Bradford to take her place, and I am sure you approve of her last act for us. Miss Bradford is a help and inspiration to everyone who comes or telephones to the office for advice, or for speakers from the Speakers' Bureau. We are grateful to Mrs. J. Alison Scott for continuing as chairman of this important committee.

Last year it was the expressed wish of at least one of the five committees, and the desire of all, that our Diocese should send the full amount of the Budget (\$316,000) to the National Council, so that no missionary work should suffer because Pennsylvania had not sent its allotment. A Full Budget Committee was formed, but owing to the Diocesan Campaign, it was thought best to give up this committee. One of the successful objects of the campaign has been the payment to the National Council of about \$85,000, thus completing the payment of the Deficit pledge made in New Orleans, and the payment of \$50,000 over and above the \$200,000 promised by the parishes of our Diocese. The Auxiliary as an organization did not have an official part in the Diocesan Campaign, but we as members of our parishes and convocations were deeply interested in it, and we look forward to a stronger Diocese by its unifying effect and from the strengthened institutions and missions.

Our own most important day was November 23rd, when we had the great pleasure of having Bishop Oldham, of Albany, explain and illuminate the Bishops' Crusade. Surely our hearts burned within us as he talked to us of being part of the body of Christ and each being needed for the perfecting of the whole body. One of Bishop Oldham's most impressive illustrations was in the literal translation of Judges 6:34, "The Spirit of Jehovah clothed itself with Gideon." The spirit of the living God needed the human body, hands and feet, and mind, to gain the victory and to carry forward the work of God. The greatness is past man's understanding. He quoted also, "I would be as responsive to the living God as a man's hand is to a man." The rector, the Woman's Auxiliary and members of our beloved mother parish, Christ Church, were our most gracious hosts for this annual service, and they gave us all the joy of home-coming, for which we are very grateful to them. I am sure very earnest prayers ascended that day for the work and workers of the Woman's Auxiliary and for the Bishops' Crusade.

The Crusade ably expresses the aims of the Auxiliary when it says that it is a "united effort of the whole Church to draw nearer to God and then go out and draw others nearer to Him, through His Church." The need of such a Crusade is felt throughout the world. In a recent letter, Dr. Tueslar wrote from Japan, "Until the so-called Christian nations make Christianity their directing policy in all international dealings, it is almost impossible for the teaching of Christ to prevail here or anywhere else. . . . My heart and mind are very full of the great problems facing Christianity, and the poor and feeble way in which we, who have Christ, are meeting the challenge before us." Such a challenge puts us on our mettle and we wonder how best we can help. I think we can truly thank God for the Bishops' Crusade, and lend all our energies into making it the power it can be if each and every one works and prays for its success. One of its aims is for religion in the home. I have long felt that parents should have more help in teaching religion to their children. I felt and also was told, that that belongs to the Department of Religious Education. A short time ago I suddenly realized that our corporate name is no longer the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, but the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church, and as the National Council consists of departments of Religious Education and Social Service, as well as of the Department of Missions and Church Extension, we are, therefore, an auxiliary to these

departments. I earnestly hope that in the near future this auxiliary shall work in conjunction with the Department of Religious Education. The Diocesan officers of this Department have been most courteous to this suggestion.

At our meeting in New Orleans the wish was expressed that every parish branch of the Auxiliary should have one of its members obtain in her parish as many subscriptions as possible for the *Spirit of Missions*. Please send to the office the name of the one you appoint to do this truly missionary work.

The diocese of Rhode Island has been so signally blessed by the special intercessions of its Shut-Ins that we wish for our diocese a similar blessing, so a Committee on Intercessions, with Mrs. W. J. Haines, chairman, has been formed and prayers have been printed. If you know of any Shut-Ins or others deprived of church services will you please send their names to Mrs. Haines, 202 South Nineteenth Street?

The stirring adventure before us is the Bishops' Crusade. Let us most eagerly join this great crusade, even if it leads us far from our daily habits. No time has been set in which to win the victory. It is a calling to come back again into Christ's army from which we have been straggling away or deserting. We learn from history that crusaders must not forget their high ideals nor wander off for less important issues, but that it is necessary ever to fight manfully under the Standard of the Cross, which all crusaders carry, and to continue Christ's faithful soldiers and servants unto our lives' end.

Following is the report of the meetings and the work of the Indians' Hope for the past year:

Bishop Burleson addressed us in January, reporting among other things that the house built for the Rev. Philip Deloria, at White Swan, South Dakota, is finished and very complete and will make a comfortable home for the sunset years of this aged Indian priest whose high character and splendid record of devoted service entitle him to every honor that the Church can show and every reasonable comfort that can be provided. The Indians' Hope contributed substantially to the building of this house. At the January meeting we voted to continue to raise the money for Priority No. 5 for one more year, making a total of four years. We decided to do this after an earnest appeal made by Bishop Bennett, who hopes to raise the money for this purpose in his diocese after this year. The Annual Meeting was held after the January business meeting.

In February Miss Blacknall, of St. Mark's Mission, Nenana, Alaska, addressed the meeting and gave an interesting report of the work among the Indian children. A special gift of money was raised at this meeting for Miss Ruth Harmon, an U. T. O. worker in Nevada, to help pay for the expenses incurred while she was suffering an attack of trachoma, from which she fortunately recovered without loss of sight.

A special meeting was called on March 13th, which was addressed by Bishop Bennett, who gave us a very complete account of the Indian work in his diocese, the second largest Indian work in the country. The Bishop says that we helped him at a very crucial period by raising the money for Priority No. 5 for three years and for continuing one more year, in answer to his plea.

We had no speaker at the regular March meeting which was devoted to letters from the field and to the regular business.

In April, Miss Cady, missionary and superintendent of the Hospital of the Good Shepherd, Fort Defiance, Arizona, told us about the work being done there in treating trachoma. Forty per cent of the Navajo Indians have trachoma, which dreadful disease, Miss Cady said, was literally scratching out the eyes of this splendid people. While the Indians are in the hospital as patients they try to teach them some Christianity, and there is much pathos in the fact that a favorite collect is "Lighten our darkness." A new wing for contagious diseases is badly needed as epidemics break out each winter. We have contributed something towards this object.

The May meeting was devoted to letters and business. Miss Washburn spoke to us of the Sesqui-Centennial plans made by Christ Church and delegates were asked to sign up as guides.

We opened our September meeting by a Corporate Communion in the chapel of the Church House, Rev. Nathaniel B. Grotten, pastor of St. Thomas', Whitemarsh, was the celebrant, and made a short address, giving us the watchword "victory" drawn from the victory over evil presented by the Epistle for the day, St. Michael and All Angels. The meeting which followed was devoted to regular business and many interesting letters from the field; one of the latter from the Rev. Charles Baker, told us that the new water system was about to be installed at the Mary E. Hart Memorial Hospital, San Juan Mission, Farmington, New Mexico. At this meeting Miss Elizabeth Howland, formerly our Registrar, spoke of the new duties she is about to take up as a missionary teacher at St. Mary's School, Springfield, South Dakota.

At the October meeting the Rev. Elmer N. Schmuck, Field Secretary for the National Council, presented the situation which we face today in our Church's program, and in summing up said: "A priority, now called 'advance work,' is taken care of only when assumed by individuals or individual groups. Items in 'advance work' are distributed distinct from the budget. The budget itself was planned for bare necessities." We quote from Mr. Franklin, Treasurer of the National Council, "We have reached the point where we cannot cut." The situation is a direct challenge to every member of the Church.

The November and December meetings were devoted to regular business and many interesting letters from the field. In December also Mrs. Hollingsworth explained the purpose of the Corporate Gift of the Woman's Auxiliary, that of supporting the "advance work" of the Church.

We have answered many appeals during the year and have continued to contribute to the Bishop Rowe Foundation Fund, which now totals \$83,647.20. We have contributed \$39, a little more than usual, to the Christmas candy at Rosebud, South Dakota. We have given this year a total of \$5950.65, and closed our December meeting with all our pledges paid, including Priority No. 5. It is the first time in many years that we have no deficit to make up. An itemized account of our contributions may be found in the Treasurer's report.

The year 1926 has been one full of interest and opportunity for the Domestic Committee. We have tried to cover as varied a program as possible, and have been very fortunate in an unusually interesting series of speakers whom we were able to procure, largely through the efficient efforts of the Speakers' Bureau.

St. Katherine's Training School, Porto Rico; the Easter School at Baguio, in the Philippines; Christ School, Arden, and the Patterson Farm and Industrial School, Legerwood, N. C., are among the schools that have held our interest and made their appeal to us. St. Luke's Sanatorium, Phoenix, Arizona, and Dr. Burke's Hospital, Fort Yukon, Alaska, are two of the very worthwhile and tremendously useful hospitals connected with our mission work, which were taken up by the Domestic Committee during the past year. Each month at least \$500 was raised for one of these objects, and, in almost every case, a substantial sum was also given, practically unsolicited, to be used as a "special." The actual amounts sent may be seen in our Treasurer's report, and it is hoped that you will be interested enough to read it carefully, realizing that it shows a decided increase over last year.

Our delegates have been most loyal, and the officers want to take this opportunity of thanking them and the Auxiliaries behind them for their continued interest in the Domestic Committee. Again, we wish to extend a hearty invitation to any who might be interested, to attend any or all of our meetings, for we feel that it is mainly through these contacts with the workers themselves that the full force of the missionary appeal is brought home to us.

Stirred by the dictum of General Convention that the National Council should adjust the work of the Church during the next Triennium to the money actually expected from the dioceses, the Foreign Committee began the year's work with the determination to support the National Council to the limit of its ability.

Mrs. Pancoast impressed upon the Committee the seriousness of the situation if each diocese did not pledge the quota asked of it. Inevitably work would be curtailed, and appropriations, already very insufficient, would be reduced.

How should the Foreign Committee meet this challenge, uphold the hands of the workers in the field, and assist the diocese at this critical time?

There was only one answer. To increase our pledges. Accordingly, it was voted to add two thousand dollars to our budget for the year,—one thousand dollars for the salary of a

woman worker in China, and one thousand dollars for the salary of a woman worker in Japan. With the splendid interest of the delegates, and the support of the parishes, the pledges have all been met, more than \$10,000 having passed through the hands of our Treasurer during the year.

In early Spring word was received that the National Council had found it necessary to make a 2 per cent. cut in all work in the Foreign field, and as our speakers came to us we learned from their own lips what disappointments and heart-aches this word brought. The failure of the Church at home! Failure at home, but splendid progress in the field. Bishop Gilman, recently returned from China, emphasized the fact that China was going forward. "In the midst of political chaos caused by unprincipled military leaders who interfere with the civil government, and moral chaos caused by Bolshevik propaganda, the great bulk of the Chinese people have gone on their way trying to find a way to live, sending their children to the Mission schools, and using to capacity the Christian hospitals. The progress the Church is making in the midst of the turmoil is thrilling," he said. He told us he had come home to make known the strength and stolidity of the Church's work in China, to find more workers, and to seek financial assistance. And so it is in other lands.

We have studied the "Message" issued at New Orleans, by the Woman's Auxiliary, and we realize that the "failure of the Church at home" means that we as individuals have failed the Church, through our failure to use the power of Christ, and our Chairman has aroused us to a new realization of our responsibilities, to a rededication of our lives, and to constant prayer.

These, then, have been our efforts as a Committee and as individuals this past year.

We have much for which to give thanks this year.

First.—Our budget was more than completed (an increase of almost \$1000 over last year).

Second.—The attendance and interest of our meetings is increasing.

Third.—Parishes are asking more frequently for speakers on colored work.

The 1926 budget for \$3600 included \$2000 for the ten American Church Institute Schools and evangelical work in all the Southern Dioceses and three others, asking aid of the National Council. Naturally the South needs more help because it is there that the greater part of the work is located. In Georgia alone there are more negroes than in Pennsylvania, New York, the whole of New England, Ohio and Indiana.

The Institute Schools provide a large proportion of the public school teachers in the Southern States and are really centres of light, spiritually, educationally, and socially wherever located.

We had some splendid speakers at our meetings. Dr. James H. Dillard, who as administrator of the Jeanes and Slater Funds, probably knows more about negro rural school work than anyone else. Dr. Patton, the head of the American Church Institute; Archdeacon Russell, the principal of St. Paul's Lawrenceville, Va.; Mr. Wallace Battle, principal of Okolona High and Industrial School, at Okolona, Miss., and Mrs. Hunt, the wife of the principal of Fort Valley High

School, at Fort Valley, Ga. It is not too much to say that Mrs. Hunt embodies the spirit of this wonderful school which sheds light through that black belt valley of Georgia, where more than one-half million negroes live. Please read in the January number of the "Spirit of Missions" the account of this school and St. Paul's, Lawrenceville, Va.

All this report looks bright and prosperous for our committee, but we "took stock" this year and you must hear the bad as well as the good. Mrs. Churchman compiled the attendance statistics from the registering cards given out at the meetings in 1926. There were 95 parishes and missions who have not sent a delegate to one meeting. Of this 95 our Treasurer tells us only six have sent contributions. This year must be a busy one. We have plans already to get in touch with them by letter and three delegates have volunteered to speak to auxiliaries on the colored work after Easter.

In closing, I must express thanks for the unfailing loyalty of the parishes, delegates, and officers that have made it possible to do our work. They have made it a joy to me to serve as chairman, and I know they do their full duty to spread the news of the marvelous opportunity before our beloved church to serve their God and their nation.

## REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY, 1926

The report of the Educational Department extends from June to June, and this statement is for that period, when we studied "The Church in Latin-America." It begins with my election as Educational Secretary and is only possible because of the loyal co-operation and support I have received from the officers of the Woman's Auxiliary and the Mission Study Class Leaders. To one and all of them I extend my sincere thanks and appreciation.

There were Mission Study Classes in the Diocese as follows:

On Educational Day, 1926, there was an attendance of 250, making a grand total of 2141 to whom the Mission study Message was taken.

For the first time the offering of all the classes was combined and \$1523.00 sent to Bishop Harry Carson to be used to build St. Thomas' Church, Archahie, Haiti. The Church has been built and was consecrated on January 9, 1927. (For full account see February issue of the *Church News*.)

In addition \$100.00 was contributed for General Mission work in Haiti and \$10.00 for the Hospital of the Good Shepherd, Arizona; also \$20.00 was sent to Bishop Carson for a special on the day of consecration. One of the members of the G. F. S. sent a beautiful "Fair Linen," so Pennsylvania has a very concrete evidence of its last year's work and interest in Mission Study.

This year our topic is "The Church in Rural America," and we are all finding it a very interesting subject. With our offering we hope to build "men," for we have promised Dean

Lathrop \$1000.00 to provide two scholarships for divinity students showing special aptness for rural work to be sent for three months' field work in a successful rural parish. The scholarship will provide all necessary expenses, automobile included. Will you not help me raise this amount?

As usual, our closing session will be on Monday, April 25th, in Holy Trinity Parish House, when we hope to have representatives from every parish, and also one of the students whose scholarships we are supplying to speak to us. Remember the date and come.

In these days when adult education is becoming such a big question it is good for us of the Woman's Auxiliary to recall that in this field, as in many others, the Church has been a pioneer, for she long ago realized the need of educating her adult members. The field is a large one and the opportunities very great. If you have not yet shared in the work the Educational Secretary will be very glad to have your co-operation.

The past years brought many opportunities to serve the Diocese with information and supplies.

We sold more Christmas and Easter Cards than ever before, thus helping to emphasize the religious character of these festivals.

Several parishes and individuals have formed the habit of bringing us vestments, linens, books and church ornaments which they are not using. It is our privilege to pass these on to missions that need them.

The Sales Room gave thirty-two books to the Church Periodical Club, and all left-over magazines, and allowed it ten per cent. discount on books bought here.

In June eight letters were written to Church Shops in distant dioceses, offering Christmas Cards left from previous years, at cost. In this way about 1000 cards were disposed of in California, Seattle, Washington, and Florida.

From January to May we introduced the Christian Nurture Course to twelve church schools, and helped them re-organize along its lines, besides advising many others. Orders totaled \$424.50 (an advance on previous years). In May, the

Morehouse Company asked us to handle all the Christian Nurture Orders for this Diocese and be the depository of supplies. This would have necessitated a packing room and two extra employees. For financial reasons and lack of space, the Committee refused this offer, which was accepted by George W. Jacobs & Company, thus ending our connection with the Christian Nurture Material except with regard to advice which is often asked and given. We deeply regretted this decision forced upon us by lack of space.

On six Wednesdays before Christmas sales of cards, calendars and books were held in the Library after the Woman's Auxiliary meeting, and proved a popular feature.

The Business Manager had a full-time assistant during January and March, and part-time assistant during February, May and December. She wishes to express appreciation of the volunteer help given by Miss Sproul, who took charge of the Wednesday sales, and by Miss Connelly, Miss Clarkson, Miss Martin, Miss Steward, Mrs. Van Meter and Miss Washburn.

The aim of the Sales Department is to serve the Diocese, and we wish warmly to invite parishes and individuals to come to us for supplies, information and help.

BY RESOLUTION: The United Thank Offering of 1928 is to be used for women's work in the Mission fields; including the training, sending and support of women workers, and the care of such workers when sick or disabled; provided that not more than one-tenth of the Offering be set aside and added to a permanent trust fund, the income of which is to be applied to the support of United Thank Offering workers; also provided that the sum of not less than \$30,000 be devoted to building purposes.

*Resolved, also,* That to our united gifts shall be added our united and earnest prayers that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves or of their substance to the work of the Master in the Mission field.

The women of the Church are growing every year in their willingness and ability to help its work. Through the Woman's Auxiliary they have, for many years, been a strong support in every field. Since success always opens up larger opportunities, the Woman's Auxiliary has always been ready for large special gifts. The Bishop Tuttle Memorial and the Emery Fund are instances.

Now the proud strength of the Auxiliary is shown by its undertaking to attack what is known as "advance work" in the Church's program—buildings especially—work needed to allow the workers to succeed. The Woman's Auxiliary has established the "Corporate Gift"—to be presented in Washington in 1928. The amount sought is \$100,000. Of this amount \$86,000 has already been pledged and \$20,000 paid in.

Pennsylvania's natural share in the gift is \$10,000, of which \$1,200 is in hand. We are most anxious to send \$5,000 by Easter of 1927, and the balance by Easter of 1928 to the National Council.

Just a word about the six objects for the Corporate Gift:

St. Agnes' School is already overcrowded and our gift will complete an addition which is started.

The Liberian Hospital will serve three large tribes of Africans who depend entirely on the Church for medical aid.

The Cathedral at Port au Prince, the capital of Haiti, which our gift will complete, is in the midst of cruel rites and degrading superstition.

The \$18,000 sent to Baguio will further Christian faith among the Igorots.

Our northern neighbors of Alaska will also share in this great gift by having a new dormitory at St. Mark's.

In Livramento, Brazil, the hearts of a devoted native congregation will be cheered by our aid in building them a church.
