My Dear Fellow Workers:

Again I wish to thank you one and all for the generous sympathy and the loyal support which you always give me. I am very grateful to you. I know you will continue this coming year in the same kindly spirit, and I ask for your prayers, that we all may be worthy of the vocation whereunto we are called.

It was very gratifying to have the large attendance at our two Special Auxiliary Services this last year. It is an anxious time, when the chosen speakers accept, and all things are ready, and we wait to see whether the house will "be furnished with guests."

There were splendid congregations in Holy Trinity Church at the Mass Meeting last February, when we had the very great pleasure of hearing Bishop Rowe, Bishop Atwood, Dr. Sturgis, Dr. Patton and Dr. Provost, and again this November, when Bishop Slattery led us to spiritual heights on our Devotional Day. Our sincere thanks are given to these very busy men for the help and inspiration they gave us. We also wish to express our appreciation of the hospitality extended to us on both of these occasions by the Rector and Auxiliary of Holy Trinity Church.

The Girls' Friendly, Daughters of the King, Church Periodical Club, Altar Guild and other organizations joined with us in our November Devotional Service, making it the Devotional Day for the women of the Diocese. We hope this was but a beginning of closer co-operation with each other.

In this year's Mission Study book, "A Church Awake," Dr. William Sturgis thus speaks of the Woman's Auxiliary:

"Within our own Church it is the Woman's Auxiliary which gives with a liberality out of all proportion to the wealth of its membership; and this, I think, is largely due to the fact that, for many years, the business of the members of the Auxiliary has been to read and study the textbooks which are issued annually, and to keep themselves in touch with the manifold needs of the world and the activity of the Church in meeting them."

Is that not an accurate description of our five standing committees: Indian, Domestic, Foreign, Colored and Diocesan? They surely keep in close touch with the needs of the world, and their financial reports will show you that if everyone gave in like proportion all these needs would be cared for. Dr. Sturgis tells in the same book how it is done—"Like power in prayer and effectiveness in service, Christian liberality is a supernatural grace—a direct gift from God, to be prayed for and exercised until it becomes the expression of love, habitual through practice."

This is the training of your five committees under the consecrated leadership of the chairmen of these committees, and to them is due the inspiration which is carried back by faithful delegates to be the vital force of the Auxiliary in our Diocese.

On each Wednesday morning there is, as you know, a meeting of at least one of these committees, and everyone, whether delegate or not, is gladly welcomed.

Of the doings of your executives, perhaps the most important is the renewed activity of the "Flying Squadron." Since last Autumn five or six of the executive officers have visited together different sections of the Diocese. We went to Doylestown, Coatesville, Media and Ardmore. On each of these occasions women from neighboring parishes were invited to meet us and all gave us a delightful welcome. After short statements by the officers about their several committees there was general discussion, which was, we hope, mutually helpful to us all. The "Flying Squadron" will be very glad to be invited to other groups of parishes and missions in the Diocese. It is a most satisfactory way of meeting and talking over difficulties and of encouraging each other.

This Autumn there have been several changes. The Speakers' Bureau had grown so much in usefulness that it was impossible for the office secretary to adequately attend to it, so Miss Henrietta Washburn was appointed chairman of the Speakers' Bureau, and has proved a most welcome addition in our office. Her hours are 10 A. M. to 1 P. M. on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

Another change has been the removal of the Book Salesroom from its former office to the Supply Shop. We hope you will all stop from time to time to see Miss Avery, to look over the religious books and cards, and have her order for you any special book you want if it is not on hand in the shop.

This is the year of the General Convention, and as we look forward to it we naturally turn back to see how we have fulfilled our promises. They were:

1. The payment in full of all general Church quotas.
2. The overcoming of luke-warmness by deeper spiritual understanding.
3. The awakening of the women of the Church to more effective service for Christ.
4. United parish effort.
5. The strengthening of our rural and foreign-born work.
6. Closer relationship with the missionaries in the field.
7. Furthering in every way the spirit of united Christian effort.
8. The carrying out of a constructive program of education for peace, and the use of our best efforts and strongest influence toward the promotion of international and inter-racial goodwill.

I am afraid we have fallen short of fulfillment of many of these promises. I know of no more stirring way to start afresh with eager desires than to study our book for this year which I have already mentioned, "A Church Awake." It would be profitable for everyone to join a Mission Study Class with this as a textbook. For some this is impossible, but it is not impossible for each to procure the book and give it faithful study. At first I found it difficult reading. If you find it so, I advise you to begin at Chapter II and read the first part later. It is good for us mentally and spiritually to do such reading. If we all study the book prayerfully it will help us to do our part in making this beloved Church of ours "A Church Awake."

I close this report with one more quotation from this Study book:

"In the familiar 'Deus Misereatur' we pray that God will be merciful to us and bless us; but our only justification for imploring God's mercy is that through our activity His way may be known upon earth, His saving health among all nations."

The work of the Indians' Hope for the past year is briefly summarized in the following report:

In January, Deaconess Bedell, of St. Andrew's Mission, Stephens Village, told us of her work at the Mission School, where twenty-seven boys and girls are under her care. The Deaconess also ministers to the sick in the village and in the fishing camps to which the Indians move in the Summer, visiting them in the mission launch. The appropriation for the work, in times past barely adequate, has been cut, making the problem of carrying on the work a very difficult one.

In February, Bishop Atwood made a short address, supplementing a letter from Miss Cady, telling us of the imperative need for a new wing for the Hospital of the Good Shepherd, Fort Defiance, Arizona. Bishop Tyler, of North Dakota, also told us of the work and needs of his district. His greatest need is for a church at St. Luke's Mission, five miles from headquarters at Standing Rock Reservation, which will cost \$2500. As we had not yet chosen our "big special" for the year we decided to give \$1000 to Bishop Tyler towards the new church at St. Luke's Mission, Standing Rock Reservation, North Dakota, and \$1000 to Miss Cady towards the new wing for the Hospital of the Good Shepherd, Fort Defiance, Arizona.

In March, Bishop Remington told us of his work in Eastern Oregon, and also interesting incidents of his work in South Dakota. The Rev. Aaron B. Clark was our second speaker, and told us he had spoken so much in the interests of South Dakota that he had been called "Rosebud" Clark.

In April we decided to give \$500 to Bishop Burleson towards the rebuilding of Trinity Chapel Mission, South Dakota, about which he had written us in March. We have also sent \$500 to the Rev. Charles W. Baker, of San Juan Mission, Farmington, New Mexico, towards the building of the Superintendent's house. Mr. Leon C. Palmer, Executive Secretary

of the National Committee on Evangelism, spoke to us on the results of the Bishops' Crusade, which he said were encouraging.

We had no speaker at the May meeting, which was devoted to reading letters from the field and to regular business.

We opened our September meeting by a Corporate Communion in the Chapel of the Church House, the celebrant being the Rev. William Y. Edwards, rector of the Memorial Church of the Good Shepherd, Germantown. In a short address Mr. Edwards gave us "prayer" as our watchword. The business meeting followed, the speaker being Mrs. Robert Frazier, who told us of the work of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Indian women of the Cheyenne Reservation, South Dakota. At this meeting, in answer to a plea from Miss Elizabeth Howland, a special fund of \$24 was given to purchase new geography books for St. Mary's School, Springfield, South Dakota. An acknowledgment and thanks was read for the \$125 sent to complete the \$500 for the bell for the Mission at Nixon, Nevada.

We had no speaker in October, and the meeting was devoted as usual to letters and regular business.

Bishop Burleson addressed the November meeting, giving us a report to date of the work in South Dakota and the changing conditions in the Indian field due to the Government's new policy of gradually making citizens of the Indians and slowly breaking up the reservations.

At the December meeting a very interesting letter was read from Bishop Rowe, telling of his twelve hundred mile round trip in three days from Nome to Point Hope by aeroplane, when he found he could not go by dog team and boat to make his annual visitation; a trip usually taking one month. A letter from Deaconess Todd, Orleans, California, gave us a report to date of work at the Karok Indian Mission, which the Indians' Hope helped to found in 1912.

We have given this year a total of \$7001.98, and have closed the year with all pledges paid and \$100 left in the treasury, of which sum we voted \$50 to Bishop Burleson and \$50 to Miss Cady. Fifty dollars additional was given at the December meeting to the Bishop Rowe Foundation Fund.

An itemized account of all our contributions may be found in the Treasurer's Report.

Another year comes to a close and finds the Domestic Committee successful in having fulfilled its monthly budget of \$500 to the quota, but unsuccessful as far as increased giving is concerned. We regret to admit that forty-five Parishes decreased their pledges during the year, while only twenty-three increased. We have welcomed four new Parishes as contributors, and hope that the few who have lapsed will again give through the Committee in 1928.

Letters are being sent out to each delegate stating what their Parish gave in 1926 and in 1927, and in this way we hope to stimulate enthusiasm for 1928.

We have increased our monthly budget to \$550, and it is the hope of the chairman that at the February meeting a salary of a woman worker in Alaska will be undertaken.

A real effort was made to stand back of the Diocese of Pennsylvania in the payment of its quota, but I am glad to report that no speaker went back to his or her field without a substantial sum from the Committee for special needs. These specials were practically unsolicited, but the fact that the Diocese has failed in meeting its quota forces us to a realization that even more effort must be spent on the side of our work which goes towards the quota.

To turn from the money side of our report, our year has been a tremendously interesting and educational one. We have had the pleasure of hearing Bishop Rowe on the work in Alaska, and Bishop Darst, of E. Carolina, who gave us an inspiring talk on The Bishops' Crusade. We have heard from eight Missionary Districts, and in each case have been thrilled

by the progress of the Church in its various phases. Schools, Hospitals, Churches, Parish Houses and Rural Work have in turn been put before us, and I am sure I speak for the Committee when I say that we are starting the new year with great hopes and rededication to the aim for which we are working. The delegates have been faithful and have increased in number.

In closing, I wish to thank the Presidents of the Parish Branches for their co-operation in the matter of sending so promptly the names of their delegates. To the Parishes who did not reply, we urge that they may be represented during the coming year, so that they may hear of the Church's work in this vast Home Field, and help the Domestic Committee with its share of the responsibility of maintaining the Missionary Work of the Church.

No report is complete without a tribute to the splendid men and women who have come to us month by month with stirring messages. Who can say what new vision gained from them may mean in the life of individual or parish?

1927 closed a successful year's work. We can give thanks again.

First—The committee accepts an increased budget for 1928—\$200 a month.

Second—1927 budget was oversubscribed.

Third—Increasing interest and publicity in colored work.

In addition to the budget, all of which counts on the quota, we sent substantial contributions to the following Specials:

- (a) St. Agnes' Hospital, when it was burned.
- (b) Archdeacon Baskerville, when the bank failed that had in it the money with which to pay the teachers of the little parish schools in South Carolina.
- (c) The Building Fund of St. Paul's, Lawrenceville, Va., and Fort Valley High and Industrial School, Georgia.
- (d) Two scholarships have been generously carried by a member of the committee.

There were speakers at four meetings: January, a graduate of Vorhees School, South Carolina; October, the Rev. Paul Micou, who organized the Students' Council in the American Church Institute School, told us what it was doing; in November the Rev. Edgar Gould, the principal of St. Augustine's School and College; in February at the all-day missionary meeting, Dr. James H. Dillard, administrator of the Jeanes and Slater Funds for Negro Education, spoke, and a quartette from the Institute Schools sang. It was an inspiring day for all who heard the address and the "Spirituals."

There were seven regular meetings (none in February), at which the average attendance was sixty-six.

In response to the letter sent each auxiliary president last January we have had a number of auxiliary giving or sending delegates that had not done so before. Last year there were eighty-one auxiliaries neither represented at the meetings nor contributing in money. This year that list has been decreased to sixty-four. However, there is room for improvement, as only eighty-four are now contributing and eighty-two sending delegates.

Contributions range from several who gave one dollar to one auxiliary which gave nearly \$900.

Nine auxiliaries asked me to tell them what our committee is doing and I was able to fill all these speaking engagements but one, when Mrs. W. W. Morris took my place. Other missions and parishes through the four trips of the "Flying Squadron" were put in touch with the work.

The officers arranged for five meetings in parishes and a private house last May, at which Dr. Patton spoke; the moving pictures of the schools were shown and a chorus from the schools sang. All these meetings were to raise money for the Building Funds of Fort Valley and St. Paul's. (This is not included in the treasurer's report, but is publicity). By paying off their indebtedness and raising an equal amount the schools would get a large gift from the General Education Board (Rockefeller Foundation). This offer from a non-sectarian source shows more plainly than anything else the position of leadership the Episcopal Church has in negro work. No other church can do the work as we can, for we are not divided into North and South, black and white, as are other denominations.

The negro population of the United States is 10 per cent. of the total, and we are only now touching the fringes of what is to be done, but the church and the schools have utterly transformed many communities, bringing physical, moral and spiritual health, even emptying the jails in some places. Please help us by contributing your presence at our meetings, your gifts to our treasurer, and your prayers for the teachers, clergy and bishops engaged in negro work.

### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF THE DIOCESAN COMMITTEE FOR 1927

At the January meeting our subject of the morning was the "Southern Convocation," reviewed by Mrs. Hill.

The Bishops' Crusade was the next topic. Notices of the missions to be held at Holy Trinity, St. Luke's, Germantown, and Church of the Mediator from January 16th to the 23rd were given out, to be followed by smaller missions in the different parishes.

In February, instead of the regular monthly meeting of the Diocesan Committee we had the all-day Missionary meeting of the Women's Auxiliary with the five committees. Dr. Jules L. Prevost, from the County Centre Mission, Bucks County, spoke on Rural Work in the Diocese.

At the March meeting Mrs. Rhoades gave a resume of the work of the Women's Aid to the West Philadelphia Convocation, which includes West Philadelphia and Overbrook.

Each of the parishes was asked to raise \$15 to pay the helper at St. John's Settlement. All who could responded.

A general discussion followed concerning the Social Service in the Convocation and the value of organizing to prevent overlapping.

At the April meeting the topic of the morning was the Convocation of Norristown, and Miss West gave a very interesting account of the work. In Montgomery County there are twenty churches and four missions.

The Diocesan Committee's flower table at the Church-women's Club was discussed and pledges of flowers were received.

At the May meeting plans were made for the outing on the site of the New Cathedral, to be held May 21st.

Mr. Tab told of the Summer Home of the Church of the Crucifixion in Chester County. Father Allen, of the City Missions, spoke of the work at Byberry. He told many interesting and amusing stories.

At the October meeting the speaker of the morning was Miss Dean, who gave a comprehensive talk on the work the church is doing among the foreign-born. In Philadelphia there are three distinct pieces of work of this kind—Roumanian, Polish and Italian.

The next speaker was the Rev. Mr. Crosby, of Hulmeville, Bucks County. He told of his Mission; a small, discouraged group, with a heavy debt, and how they paid it off in five months with 100 per cent. attendance.

At the November meeting Mrs. N. D. Gould, of St. James' Mission, of Moore, Pa., told of their need of an organ and equipment.

A letter from Father Allen was read, asking for Thanksgiving cigars. The money was raised immediately.

Mrs. Lane was appointed chairman of a committee for St. John's Settlement.

The subject of the morning was the Religious Education in Our Diocese, and the speaker was Dr. Tuke. He said there are no limits to missionary work; it includes every endeavor, and must be helped by religious education.

At the December meeting Mrs. Martin gave a delightful description of the President's visit to the Indians, and urged us to send better missionaries for Indian work.

Mrs. Lane gave a most interesting account of the social service work at the St. John's Settlement, especially the work in the library and the manual training work.

The Speaker of the morning was the Rev. Edward Hopkin, missionary in charge of St. Titus' Chapel, at Elmwood-on-the-Delaware. He told us that the people living there are in industrial and economical conditions like the slums. He said that they needed coal for the winter, sanitary improvements, fence to protect property, equipment and electric lights. His appeal met with ready response from many of the parish delegates from \$2 to \$25. Twenty-five dollars was pledged from the Diocesan Committee.

We have felt very keenly at the Supply Department the loss of Mrs. Albert Lucas, the organizer of the Department, who died March 1, 1927. While Mrs. Lucas resigned in March, 1925, after five years of devoted service, we were ever mindful of her prayers and her influence, for she dearly loved the work she created and fostered.

The Supply Department opened in October, 1920, at Inasmuch Mission, although Mrs. Lucas was busy all through the preceding Summer changing the Mission quarters into a well-equipped Bureau. Her wonderful spirit and zeal led those of us who helped the first year in the carrying out of the plan and putting it on a working basis, with the miraculous result of over one hundred percent increase in the contribution of the Diocese of Pennsylvania in missionary box work, and sixty more Parishes working for missions.

Mrs. Lucas had the vision to see an organization complete, and the wisdom and love to carry it to fulfillment, whereby the missionaries and their families should receive exactly what they need and long for, as they themselves would select; that the missions, schools, and hospitals should have every requirement filled; that those on the frontier should have the support and prayerful interest of the Church at home. With utmost tenderness and unlimited work Mrs. Lucas achieved this. It was her high example and loving spirit that made it possible, and the print of her rare and gracious personality will be a lasting influence in the lives of those who helped and those who received.

The work has gone steadily on and it stands a living memorial to her noble efforts. We trust and pray it will fulfill its purpose in the future, as it has in the past, of blessing all whom it touches. In her selfless devotion to all missionary enterprises Mrs. Lucas' life and influence stand the symbol of a true missionary of God.

and bobbin;

The women of the Diocese have done all the sewing and knitting for this large contribution to Missions.

## REPORT OF DIOCESAN EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY, 1927

In the old days when the Woman's Auxiliary was Auxiliary only to the Board of Missions the work of an educational secretary was comparatively easy. She had a very definite piece of work, to create an interest in the missions of the Church and teach a Mission Study Class on an assigned subject.

Times have changed, and now that we are Auxiliary to the National Council and its six departments, our work has greatly enlarged, and the educational secretary has a very much larger and more varied piece of work, for she has, in addition to the missions, that very much larger and more important subject, the Mission of the Church. The only limit of her usefulness is her own mental capacity and physical strength.

Of course we still place great emphasis upon the study of missions, because only a well-informed laity can co-operate fully with a National Council with a world-wide program. The subject we studied from June, 1926, to May, 1927, was the Church in Rural America, and a very disturbing one we found it to be. One of our clergy called it "an interesting and vanishing subject," but after intensive study by men and women of all communions throughout our country, I feel hopeful that worthwhile results will follow. It was not pleasant reading. A member of one of my classes said one evening just before the session began, "Are you going to tell us any more awful facts? I have hardly had a minute's peace since last week." Isn't it great to disturb anyone so thoroughly by conditions in the Church in Rural America?

Many of you may have forgotten the conditions and are growing too comfortable, so I will remind you once again of those forty million men and women in Rural America without any Church connection of any kind; of those two and a half million children growing up without a chance of religious education, and of those thirty-four thousand and more towns and villages in this great land without a Protestant Church of any kind. Don't forget them; keep on caring about them; keep on praying for them, and keep up your willingness to help the Church meet its great opportunity.

There were thirty-nine parish classes studying this subject, with an enrollment of 623, in charge of twenty leaders, five of whom were leading for the first time. In addition there were thirty-two addresses made by the leaders on Rural America.

In one parish a pageant, "The Hope of the Nation," was given very successfully by a group of G. F. S. girls.

In addition to this the Educational Secretary herself was rather busy. I began with an interdenominational class in September, 1926, in which I had sixty members, representing seventeen denominations. The prayer of the Rural Fellowship which I used at each session made such an impression upon three members that it was used in their own classes. One was a Presbyterian, one a Methodist, and the other a member of the Reformed Church. Following this I went to different sections of the Diocese and held four two-day and one one-day Institutes, Jenkintown, Newtown, Norristown, Chester and Downingtown being the places visited. At these institutes thirty parishes were represented with an enrollment of 161. After this came a two-day Institute at the Church House, two normal classes, two ten-session classes in connection with the Normal School for Teacher Training, five one-day Parish Institutes, one class of four sessions for G. F. S. leaders, and three parish classes. An enrollment of 310, representing fifty-four parishes. I also led two classes in Baltimore and made fifteen addresses in parishes on the work of the Department.

In all the total record of classes is 60, parishes represented 123, and an actual enrollment of 1094. Counting those who were so fortunate as to hear Dean Foreman on Educational Day and all those to whom we carried the message of the Mission Study Classes, more than 2000 in the Diocese have heard about the Church in Rural America. This is an increase of eight classes over last year, but, more important, we made contacts with twenty-eight new parishes.

What are the practical results of this? Well, the offering presented was a substantial one and one that will go on growing. It amounted to \$1515.66 and was disbursed as follows:

\$1000 to Dean Lathrop for scholarships for two divinity students, one from our own Divinity School and one from Seabury School; for Miss Cornwal-Legh's work \$43.00; the Rev. James F. Bullitt \$252.00, which was used to send two of our own rural clergy to a Conference on Rural Work, and their wives to represent the Diocese at the Conference in Princeton. An additional \$90.00 was sent to Dean Lathrop to help in sending men to the Rural Conferences; and \$35.00 was given to Miss Katharine Reeve for a scholarship to send a Japanese student to Wellesley.

In addition two new leaders volunteered for service, and

I am quite sure there is a growing intelligent interest in the whole work of the whole Church through the work of the Educational Department of the Woman's Auxiliary.

This year we are studying a big and inclusive subject, "The Episcopal Church and Her Mission," using as our text book "A Church Awake." It is a direct follow-up of the Bishops' Crusade, and is intended to deepen the spiritual life of each one of us and renew our zeal, so that we may indeed realize, not only our privileges, but also our opportunities and responsibilities.

Will you help by forming classes on this important subject in your own parish? If there is no leader available I shall be glad to send one.

In conclusion, I want to thank you one and all for the wonderful co-operation and loyalty you have given me. It is a real joy to be Educational Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary in this great Diocese of Pennsylvania, and have the privilege of being one of your fellow-workers.

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Two important changes have taken place during the past year; the Sales Room was included among the activities of the Woman's Auxiliary under the title "Sales Room of the Educational Department of the Woman's Auxiliary," and it was moved on September first from the second floor of the main building of the Church House to the first floor of the Annex, where we share an attractive and easily accessible room with the Supply Shop.

The Business Manager has had no regular assistant, but help has been occasionally engaged for special work, and since November 15th, an assistant has been engaged two days a week. Appreciation is here expressed for the volunteer help given early in the year by Miss Connelly, Miss Washburn and Miss Stuard, and by Miss Mildred Rhodes.

Gifts received by the Department include a beautiful Creche by Robbins, from a priest of the Diocese, which sold for \$20.00; four Christmas books by Margaret Weed, which sold for \$7.00.

A parish in the Diocese brought us three sets of Brocade Altar Vestments consisting of altar frontals, pulpit fall, burse, and veil—white, red and purple, and two fair linens, which we had the privilege of giving to a Mission in the Diocese now building a Church,—a gift very gratefully received. From

another source we received a large Bible, which we presented to a parish in New Jersey.

Our removal to the Annex has brought us new friends and greater opportunities for serving our Missions. We have sold more books, cards, Mission goods, candles and Church supplies than ever before, and we feel that the year has been a most successful one.

**ANNUAL REPORT OF THE UNITED THANK OFFERING  
THE DIOCESE OF PENNSYLVANIA**

**December 31, 1927**

By Resolution: The United Thank Offering of 1928 is to be used for women's work in the Mission fields; including the training, sending and support of women workers, and the care of such workers when sick or disabled; provided that not more than one-tenth of the offering be set aside and added to a permanent trust fund, the income of which is to be applied to the support of United Thank Offering workers; also provided that the sum of not less than \$30,000 be devoted to building purposes.

Resolved, also, That to our united gifts shall be added our united and earnest prayers that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give of themselves or of their substance to the work of the Master in the Mission field.

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To be presented at Washington, D. C., October, 1928.

## REPORT OF THE UNITED THANK OFFERING

January 26, 1928

The United Thank Offering is now in its Triennial Year, and will be presented in Washington, D. C., next October.

One hundred and sixty-seven parishes and missions in this Diocese contributed during 1927, out of 185 on the list; but though many failed to make an offering, many others substantially increased the amount of their Offering.

The balance in bank December 31, 1927, was \$55,016.53, which is over four thousand more than we had at this time in the last Triennium. This is very encouraging, and leads us to hope that the Diocese of Pennsylvania will pass the \$86,000 which was offered in New Orleans in 1925.

To do this will mean really faithful work on the part of every parish treasurer, and that she try in every way to interest the women of her parish, and to personally ask each one to accept a Little Blue Box.

I have given out several hundred Little Blue Boxes and have made twenty addresses in 1927, and I shall be very glad to go to any parish who wishes a talk on the subject of the United Thank Offering. I am happy to be able to announce to you that the Spring Presentation Service is to be held in the Church of the Saviour, Thirty-eighth and Chestnut Streets, and that Bishop Overs has kindly accepted my invitation to preach the sermon at that service.

May I earnestly ask that during this year, so vital to the United Thank Offering, and to the credit of Pennsylvania, that I have not only the natural interest of the parish treasurers, but also the co-operation of the Presidents of the Parish Auxiliaries?

Mrs. Burkham, chairman of the National Committee, writes on January 9th, 1928, that she is sure we will all rejoice with her when she tells us "that to date approximately \$78,000.00 has been sent to our Treasurer. Of this amount \$58,000.00 has been sent to Mr. Franklin. We have completed three of the objects—St. Agnes' School, Kyoto, Japan (\$25,000.); St. Mark's School, Nenana, Alaska (\$15,000.), and Holy Trinity Church, Port au Prince, Haiti (\$12,500. original pledge and \$1,500 additional), and besides these we have also sent \$4,000.—half the amount pledged—to the Church of the Nazarene, Livramento, Brazil. ## AT THE ANNUAL MEETING

JANUARY 26, 1928

Such an occasion was experienced by everyone present at the Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary; when our president, Mrs. Woodward, spontaneously called upon Mrs. Markoe, president ex-officio, to make the final prayer closing the meeting.

The address by Mrs. Markoe at the Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary:

"I suppose dear Mrs. Woodward asks me to say something because I am the Grandmother of the Woman's Auxiliary. There are some blessings in old age—for one can look back when one is seventy-eight and see what wonders God has wrought through our work. It is a glorious body of women, my good friends of the Woman's Auxiliary, and if I never see you again—and one does not look far ahead at seventy-eight—I should like you to say the Lord's Prayer with me, very slowly,—so slowly that we can think of the meaning of 'Thy Kingdom come,' first in each heart, for 'the Kingdom of is *within you*,' then in the Church, that more and more may come to know and love and work for and in the Church; and then in the whole broad world—the shortest, greatest Missionary Prayer. And then 'Thy will be done'—not the note of submission as if a hard fate, but His Will is to be *done* actively, with love and longing to serve as it *is* done in Heaven.

What is His Will?—our sanctification that we may grow in the knowledge and the love of God—and then 'Go ye into all the world teaching and preaching.' Let us pray."
