ANNUAL REPORT

Greetings to my fellow workers of the Woman's Auxiliary.

May I tell you at once how deeply I appreciate your re-electing me your president? It has given me joy to work with you. Though I accept gladly, it is with keen realization how much I have left undone, and, also how much more I hope we shall accomplish together in the coming three years. Please always tell me how you think either the president or the board of the W. A can be of more service to your parish.

To understand your Auxiliary please study the Annual Report and see what a splendid record each of our five committees, Indian, Colored, Foreign, Domestic and Diocesan, has made. These committees show what can be accomplished by earnest leadership of chairmen and co-operation of delegates.

The All Day Missionary Meeting is planned by these committees and last year was held February 14 in St. James' Church. There was a splendid attendance and the addresses most interesting. This year Missionary Meeting will also be at St. James' Church on Wednesday, February 20. We hope you will bring others who do not know as much as you do, that they also may become interested.

Your president always feels more responsible for the Devotional Day in the autumn. We asked Bishop Creighton of Mexico to be our leader for that day, knowing what a statesmanlike bishop he had proved in a most difficult field, but I think none of us was prepared to hear such a deeply spiritual address as he gave us.

In July your Educational Secretary and your president attended our provincial Summer Conference, held in Frederick, Maryland. I most heartily recommend this Blue Mountain Conference to you and ask you to begin now to make plans to attend either this or some other church conference this coming summer. You cannot help the future of our Church in a much better way than by getting young people from your parish to attend these summer conferences; and the young people enjoy them—possibly to their surprise.

In October your delegates attended faithfully the Triennial at the General Convention in Washington. We are now trying

to carry out the resolutions and suggestions which were made there.

Publicity, the "Ministry of the Printer's Ink" was stressed at the Convention. It is gratifying that last spring your own board began a new publicity venture—The Woman's Auxiliary News. This is sent each month to the parish presidents; in it we try to give important notices for the ensuing month as much as possible; please give these notices to your rector and to your auxiliary. We are very glad to have others subscribe for this little information folder—25 cents a year.

Last summer it was finally decided to close our book room as we were quite heavily in debt. It was with much regret that we thus parted with Miss Avery. She had spent so many years in devoted service to the task she loved. As a mark of our appreciation of her work, her salary is being continued until June, 1929.

The Department of Religious Education has inaugurated an educational display room where full information about Sunday School and other Church literature can be had. We are glad to have you order your religious books from this department. You will be given a hearty welcome in Room 30, where the supplies are to be seen.

The treasurer of the United Thank Offering gives her own report, but I cannot refrain from expressing my gratitude to the Auxiliary that the amount presented this year in loving memory of our former United Thank Offering treasurer, Amie Clark Hollingsworth, amounted to \$94,305.55. With her memory is also associated this triennial corporate gift, which was \$10,227.00. We greatly miss her bright presence and enthusiasm, and we are eager to carry forward both Thank Offering and the Corporate Gift, which were so dear to her.

The Corporate Gift had a life and death struggle at the triennial. Our beloved presiding bishop, Bishop Murray, came to its assistance and asked us to vote unanimously to continue for the next Triennium our Corporate Gift. The Auxiliary thereupon resolved to undertake to raise between now and Epiphany, 1930, a Corporate Gift, the sum not to exceed \$100,000, the first \$25,000 of which shall be appropriated for the building of a church at Santo Domingo. At the Executive Board the amount was cut in half and \$50,000 was agreed upon, the other objects being \$10,000 for the water supply in Wind River Reservation, \$10,000 for Christ School, Arden, N. C., and \$5,000 for a chapel for Jamaican negroes in the Canal Zone. I am sure the women of our diocese are thankful that the Corporate Gift is continued. It assures the construction of four

greatly needed objects which were otherwise hopelessly stranded in the long list of Advance Work Projects, and it gives us all a definite education for a definite object with definite results.

The end of this three years brings change of officers. Mrs. William H. George has served most faithfully and energetically as your treasurer for two terms. She was therefore ineligible for re-election, so with regret we have to let her go, and as treasurer you have now Miss Charlotte Cheston, who will bring her youth into our older meetings.

Mrs. Charles P. Davis has also rounded out her six years of office and with regret we see her leave, but we greet with pleasure our new secretary, Mrs. Jacob S. Disston, Jr.

Under Mrs. Harry W. Baker our United Thank Offering has reached its highest peak. We are very sorry she was unable to accept a second term as U. T. O. treasurer. You have most wisely elected Mrs. Edward Ingersoll to be U. T. O. treasurer for the next three years.

It is with deep regret that we part with Miss Anne Dickson, as our Supply Secretary. She was young to undertake the work which Mrs. Lucas had developed so admirably, but she has continued to keep our Supply Bureau as a model for all other dioceses, and she hands it over to Mrs. Theodore Paul in such splendid condition that it will require all Mrs. Paul's well known skill to carry it to further perfection.

I am thankful that Mrs. Hill continues to be our Educational Secretary. She has proved of greatest value to us all.

The delegates-at-large are appointed by the president of the Auxiliary for special reasons. Your nominating committee last spring suggested that your president should appoint as delegates-at-large Mrs. Charles R. Pancoast, as she was not eligible for re-election as first vice-president, and Miss Anne Dickson, who had resigned as Supply Secretary. It gives me great pleasure to appoint these two former officers as delegates-at-large, the more so as I am sure they will ever be ready to give of their wise judgment and experience when called on to serve the Auxiliary. I am quite sure they will frequently be called in to help us. I wish also to appoint as delegate-at-large Mrs. Pharo, a former vice-chairman. Her knowledge of the past and her wisdom in the present are welcome additions to your board.

Perhaps being in the office I speak more of the board, but even such splendid women as are associated with your executive office could accomplish little were it not for the great, quiet strength of the auxiliaries in city and country. It is to

you that I render my loving appreciation for steady and unselfish service given through the Woman's Auxiliary to our Lord.

This is a report for 1928, but at this, our annual meeting, we must also look forward to 1929.

This morning at our Educational Day we talked over our aims for this coming year. First, there is always before us the goal of a strong branch of the Woman's Auxiliary in every parish, with its interest in all the branches of missionary service. For this we need Inspiration, Information and Action. It makes a lot of difference to us physically what kind of air we breathe into our bodies, and it makes a lot of difference what kind of religion we breathe into our souls. We need to pray:

"Come, Holy Ghost, our souls inspire;
And lighten with celestial fire,
Enable with perpetual light the dullness of our blinded
sight.
Teach us to know the Father, Son, and Thee of both
to be but One."

And: "Breathe on me Breath of God. Fill me with life
anew,
That I may love what Thou dost love, and do what
Thou wouldst do."

That we may do what Christ would have us do, we need information before action. Study and hard work are required of us. The Woman's Auxiliary and the Department of Religious Education should be able to supply us with helps for our work and for our study. Of course, the ideal is instruction from one's own rector.

The Mission Study Class is one of the best ways to gain information both of missions and world outlook. There should be a class in every parish or one available to a group of parishes —let us make this a definite aim.

The Triennial of the Woman's Auxiliary in Washington, in its suggestions for obtaining information, listed first our own Missionary Calendar. On the list are also The Church at Work (free) and the Spirit of Missions. We want to have you appoint one member of your parish to obtain subscriptions (\$1.00 a year) for this remarkable publication, and you are also asked to see that copies of it are in free and private libraries. Our new arrangement of the Book Department is in Room 30. Miss Young will gladly show you not only our Mission Study books, but also books for religious reading. The magazine "Findings in Religious Education" has been recommended to us, and also

the Social Service pamphlets of the National Council. It has been suggested that members of the Auxiliary should supply accurate information for their own parish bulletins.

With Inspiration and Information there must be Action. If we think of the Mission or Missionary instead of cash, we shall feel more enthusiasm to give the portion which our own parish should contribute to the diocese and the National Council. This year our diocese has been asked to give a smaller amount towards the National Budget; instead of the former \$316,000 it has been asked for \$229,000. When our diocese found that the parishes promised only \$190,000, the Auxiliary was asked what action we suggested before our diocese sent a promise to the National Council. In reply your Executive Board sent the following letter:

My dear Mr. Van Meter:—

At your request I presented at today's Board meeting the report of the Budget Committee which you gave me. The action taken with unanimous consent, was as follows:—

"The Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary has received with deep interest the report of the Executive Secretary of the Diocesan Council regarding the Parish expectations for the 1929 Quota.

"The Woman's Auxiliary wishes to assure the Diocesan Council that the Committees will continue as heretofore to support the Budget to their utmost ability. The Executive Board feels, however, that the real cause of the difficulty lies in the ignorance, indifference and irresponsibility of the average parishioner, and to overcome these difficulties would recommend that the Executive Office be responsible for personal interviews with every parish which has not accepted its full quota for 1929.

"The Woman's Auxiliary appreciates that this is a difficult task, but feels that only by deeper knowledge can interest and support be secured."

The foregoing expresses the very definite feeling of the Board.

Some days later our diocesan Executive Council met, and we are most happy and thankful to say they decided to accept the full Quota, and sent to us the following letter:—

“The Executive Council, relying upon the help of the Woman’s Auxiliary, accepted the full Quota which the National Church has asked of the Diocese of Pennsylvania, namely \$229,000. This is a venture of faith which will only be successful if all those in the diocese who are interested in the cause of Missions will make every effort to reach the goal.

“The Executive Council also passed the following resolution: *Resolved*, That the Woman’s Auxiliary in all the Parishes be requested to devote all their energies to items that apply upon the quota. There are innumerable objects of all kinds that apply upon the Quota. These can be taken by any Auxiliary, and they would seem to be diverse enough to satisfy the desires of almost any type of Parish. But I suppose that this is well known to all the Auxiliaries.

“With full assurance that the Auxiliary of Pennsylvania will make every effort to keep Pennsylvania in the position of leadership in the cause of Missions which she has now taken before the whole Church, I am,

This means that the women of the Auxiliary as individual members of their own parishes must be so filled with missionary zeal and knowledge that they are able to arouse interest in their rectors and fellow parishioners, and thus encourage their parish to give at least its full quota. We shall then be fulfilling the resolution the Woman’s Auxiliary made in Washington: “That we should use our influence to see that the Maintenance Budget of the Church is paid in full.”

Remember, however, that there is one “Special” to which the whole Auxiliary is pledged, our Corporate Gift of \$50,000.00 which must be completed by Epiphany, 1930. Of this, we in Pennsylvania, have promised before this coming Easter, \$2,500.00 of the \$25,000.00 pledged for the greatly needed Church in Santo Domingo. Let us make an effort to do this one piece of advance work this winter.

To help us in this aim, let us once more make our own a resolution passed by the whole Auxiliary:—

"Be it *Resolved*, That we pray that all hesitation in witnessing for Christ may be taken from our hearts, and that we pray to have a fervent desire to share Him with others."

Before beginning our annual report we wish to speak of the great loss the Church has sustained in the death on May 14th of Mrs. John Hollingsworth, who was especially endeared to us, having served so faithfully and so uniquely many years as Special Treasurer of the Indians' Hope. We give thanks to God for her example of faith well kept and work well done, and sorrow that we had to lose her while yet in her youthful prime. May she rest in peace and may light perpetual shine upon her!

The January, February and March meetings were devoted to regular business. The Annual Meeting was held after the January business meeting. A resolution of sympathy and condolence on the death of Mrs. Burleson was sent to Bishop Burlson of South Dakota, in February. The specials decided on for the year were \$1000 for the Bishop Rowe Foundation Fund, and \$500 for an automobile for Archdeacon Bulkley's work in Utah.

In April Dr. Grafton Burke of the Hudson Stuck Memorial Hospital, Fort Yukon, Alaska, gave us a very interesting picture of the work there. The hospital treats 250 to 300 cases a month and is the only one in a district of over 700 miles. Dr. Burke said that after twenty-one years of medical, clinical and social service it is wonderful to see what the Church means to the Indians.

Our September meeting was opened by a Corporate Communion in the Chapel of the Church House. The Rev. Churchill J. Gibson, D.D., of St. Mary's, Ardmore, was the celebrant and made an address, taking as his text the very ancient words, "Lift up your hearts," and the response, "We lift them up unto the Lord," our watchword for the year.

In October Bishop Roberts and Mrs. Robert Frazier gave us a report to date of the work in South Dakota. We are interested in two new ventures in that field: first, The Hare Industrial School at Mission, for which the Indians have hoped, prayed and saved for sixteen years, opened on October 22nd; and second, the new dormitory for girls started by the Rev.

David Clark, Fort Thompson. Twenty-five girls are now in residence. Mr. A. Abbott Hastings, St. Michael's Mission, Ethete, Wyoming, also addressed us in October, showing us moving pictures of life at the Mission, as well as old time Indian dress and dancing, and telling us some of his problems, the most important of which is the raising of the large sum of money needed to pipe the water from Wind River, three and one-half miles from the Mission, the work for which he has been obliged to begin to save the Government contract for the tuition of the Indian children amounting to \$8500.

We had no speaker in November, but some interesting letters were read, among others one from Archdeacon Bulkley, of Utah, expressing his thanks for the money for the automobile and giving us an excellent summary of the work in his district. Bishop Moulton also wrote thanking us for the money we sent for the automobile, and said that he thought it was the largest gift they had ever received for their Indian work in Utah, and will be of inestimable value. The Bishop's letter certainly gave us food for thought.

We selected our specials for next year at our December meeting, viz.: \$1000 towards the installing of water at St. Michael's Mission, Ethete, Wyoming; \$500 for The Hare Industrial School, Mission, South Dakota, and \$500 for the Hospital of the Good Shepherd, Fort Defiance, Arizona. After years of splendid work the latter hospital has recently been changed into an orphanage with a medical clinic. The reason for this is that the Government Hospital has lately taken over this work.

This year we decided to increase the amount given to our scholarships as the old sum of \$60 is now entirely inadequate owing to the increased cost of living. Last year we gave \$786 to scholarships and this year the amount given was \$1620.

Through the Supply Department knitted goods and clothing were given to many Indian missions. The knitting as well as the making of garments being work contributed by members through their parishes.

A nurse's bag fully equipped for emergency calls was given through the Indians' Hope to the hospital at our mission at Farmington, New Mexico.

Thirty-five dollars was sent for the Christmas candy at Rosebud.

We have answered many appeals, and we finish our year with all pledges and specials paid, a total expenditure of \$6051.89.

1928 has drawn to a close, and as we look over its records as regards the Domestic Committee, we find a great deal to be proud of and thankful for, and plenty of opportunities for improvement.

Financially, the money given through the Committee, \$7,837.45, exceeded the preceding years, for which we thank the Parish Auxiliaries whose interest and generosity made this increase possible. We also thank the delegates for arousing that interest, and for their loyal support in many other ways.

Our bold step of increasing our monthly pledge to the quota from \$500.00 to \$550.00 was an unqualified success, as in no month did we fail to reach at least that sum. During the year we also raised the salary (\$600.00) of Nurse Burgess at the Fort Yukon Hospital in Alaska, which was over and above our monthly quota. From now on we hope she will "belong" to our Committee as its special interest in that far-off, but always appealing, field.

As far as specials were concerned, we were happy to be able to send the last \$1,000.00 needed to make up Pennsylvania's share in the Corporate Gift, as well as a good many substantial sums for the use of our speakers. As reported last year, we tried to lay especial emphasis on the quota, and though our specials fell off slightly, we feel that we have been of more help to the Diocese in meeting its share of the quota, which after all should be our aim.

Alaska, Porto Rico, the Philippines, tubercular work in Arizona, mountain work in North Carolina, the missionary districts of Wyoming, Virginia, and Kentucky, have in turn held

our interest and attention, and we only wish space permitted a full report of each field.

During the year 41 Parishes increased their gifts, while only 26 decreased. This reverses the figures of last year, and is much more comforting. We are glad to welcome as new givers, Lansdale, St. Nathaniel's, and St. Stephen's Norwood, and to thank again the faithful Parishes who year after year have given through the Domestic Committee.

The Foreign Committee has closed the year with its pledges, amounting to \$5300.00 paid. We hope you will read the Treasurer's report so that you will know what work in the foreign field has had the support of the Auxiliary in this diocese.

As you know, the National Council found it necessary to reduce its appropriations this year, to close work already begun. This cut amounted to three per cent in the foreign field, and little can we realize the heartaches this action caused. There was no advance work undertaken in the whole Church except what the Corporate Gift of the women made possible. Twenty-five thousand dollars of it was appropriated for the foreign field, which was used for a much needed building at St. Agnes' School for girls in Kyoto. This committee made a contribution to it. What a blessing the Corporate Gift is to the missionaries, may it grow and grow as the United Thank Offering has!

But let me take you on a trip around the world month by month, and give you a glimpse of what the Church is doing.

In January, Rev. Harrington S. Littell of Hankow, and in February, Miss Alice Gregg, brought us encouraging reports from China, and predicted that a new order will be established in time through the means of the Christian institutions which have been training the young men of China. Young men, who like Dr. Francis Wei, for a time head of Boone University, with high ideals and unselfish aims will become the leaders of the National Party. In the meantime, they tell us, our duty as a Church is very plain to go out and hold Christ up, so that all men everywhere may see Him.

The Rev. Dennis Whittle of Covington, Va., in March gave us a very fine Lenten message. "Go ye into all the world,"

he said, "with conviction, with comprehension, and with consecration."

April brought us Bishop Campbell, and a very clear picture of what the Church is doing and could be doing in the Liberian republic. We in this country have a real responsibility towards the Liberians, for we bought the land for them and as freed slaves sent them out there to colonize.

In May Mrs. Bruce Ford was a gracious hostess to the Committee, and welcomed us to her home in Chestnut Hill for our meeting and sale of foreign missions' goods. Dr. John Wood, who had just recently returned from China, Japan, and the Philippines, was most interesting in his account of his trip, and it was encouraging to hear that in China the people are maintaining their high Christian standards and their religious life in spite of the disturbed and unsettled conditions of the country.

In September Mrs. Pancoast talked about some of the things to be considered at the Triennial in Washington.

We heard from Miss Etta McGrath in October about the Church in Japan, more particularly in the diocese of Kyoto.

Bishop Thomas of Brazil was our speaker in November. We should be very proud of our work in Brazil and help the Church to seize its many opportunities. An interesting thing to mention is the work that the Rev. Ito is doing. Mr. Ito, a product of our mission schools in Japan, has gone out to Brazil to minister to his own people in that country, of whom there are many. He and his wife are doing fine work.

No one who heard Mrs. William Wyllie in December will ever forget the story she told of the amazing, self-sacrificing work that she and her husband, as pioneers and unaided have done in twelve years in Santo Domingo, in order that the message of the Church might be brought to the forgotten people of this island, which is the cradle of our American civilization. Again we are thankful for the Corporate Gift which is to give them \$25,000 this coming Easter for a Church.

Golden opportunities everywhere, everywhere!

Two faithful delegates, Mrs. Lawrence Lewis and Miss Mary Schott have passed from this life during the year. For many years their energy and means were freely given in the interest of missions. Their splendid service will be greatly missed.

In the name of the new officers and the delegates I want to record the deep regret that the Committee feels in the necessary

retirement of Mrs. Pancoast as Chairman. A deep consecration to the cause of Missions, and a rare knowledge of the foreign Missions field peculiarly fitted Mrs. Pancoast for her work, and she freely gave of her spirit and enthusiasm to the Committee.

We are very happy to have Mrs. William J. Haines as our new Chairman.

The Committee on Colored Missions completed its budget of \$4,000.00 for 1928 and pledged to raise the same amount for this year. One thousand three hundred dollars will go for evangelical work in eleven dioceses and \$2,700.00 is for the American Church Institute Schools.

There were eight regular meetings of the Committee at which we had five speakers. Bishop Finlay, of Upper South Carolina; Mr. J. E. Blanton, Principal of Voorhees School; Mr. Henry Hunt, Principal of Fort Valley High and Industrial School; Mr. Wallace Battle, former principal of Okolona and now assistant Field Secretary for the Institute Schools, and the Rev. W. B. Crittenden, the first negro to be a general secretary under the Field Department of the National Council. It is well for us to remember if we become impatient, that the colored churchmen had asked for years for one of their own race to present the general work of the Church to colored congregations, before they got one. There are seven white secretaries.

Here are some things we learned listening to our speakers:

Ten per cent of the population of the United States is negro, but only 2 per cent of the money spent on public school education is spent on them. One State whose negro population is 51 per cent spent in 1927 (I don't know if conditions have improved since) \$17.00 per capita on white public school children and \$3.00 per capita on colored. You can see the importance of the Institute School in that State!

Don't we sometimes hear that the negroes are "lazy" and don't want to help themselves? Six hundred thousand homes are owned by negroes, and they did not inherit the money to buy them. One out of every four negro heads of families owns his home.

Of course we have no conception of the number of negroes in the South. In Georgia there are more than in Pennsylvania, New York, New England, Ohio, Indiana and Illinois.

Eighty-five per cent of all personal property or real estate taxes paid by negroes are paid by *Southern* negroes, and 75 per cent of the negroes in the South are agriculturists. Is it not fine that scientific farming is taught at all the Institute Schools except the Bishop Payne Divinity School?

The following account of one principal is applicable to other schools:

"We get \$10,000.00 from the National Council and \$2,000.00 from each of the Dioceses in the State; between five and six thousand dollars we get tuition from the pupils, and \$2,000.00 from the county for teaching the negro public school children in the town. This makes \$21,000.00 and a little over. Our budget is \$39,000.00, and we have to raise it somehow. Most of it comes in contributions; we have many poor people who are annual contributors and subscribe even as little as 25 cents.

"By teaching our public school children we train our pupils who are going to make teaching their profession. They teach the children under regular instructors and they know how to teach. That is why the American Church Institute graduates are so in demand as public school teachers."

In February I had the pleasure of motoring South and visiting four of the schools, all of which I took by surprise. I went Sunday morning to St. Paul's where there was a congregation of seven hundred colored people. You never heard such singing! The familiar service, the excellent, simple sermon preached by saintly old Archdeacon Russell, the school's principal, and the churchly atmosphere of the whole place is something never to be forgotten. Late that afternoon I was at St. Augustine's and saw St. Agnes' Hospital, one of the Institute Hospitals, neat, clean and efficient, and, later the Bishop Tuttle Memorial Training School. Next morning the assembling of the school for chapel in their beautiful church, built by the students. The college atmosphere pervades St. Augustine's, as it should, our highest institution of learning.

At Voorhees I motored into a Farmers' Conference, already assembled of 400 farmers and their wives. The chief theme of the day was "Buy and own your own farm." The speakers all did their part to show how to make the home healthy, happy, and more prosperous. Practical demonstrations were everywhere about the school, showing how this could be done. At

Fort Valley I saw the one Library from which a negro can take books (there is no other between Atlanta and the Gulf), and the Academic Building in construction; the boys from the trades school were the laborers and their instructors were showing them what to do. Some of the boys engaged in this labor were members of the Championship Colored Football Squad in Georgia, and their pictures appear in Spaulding's National Interscholastic Book of 1928. In the assembly hall of that building will be a movie show once a week. Mrs. Hunt, the wife of the principal, said, "With no books, no movies, nothing to amuse them, what can you expect our people to do but shoot craps and get in trouble?"

I have no words to describe the work for their people and country that these schools are doing.

Please, if your auxiliary does not send a delegate, come to our meetings as a visitor and help us put the importance of Colored Work before everyone we can reach.

We need your money, your prayers, and your interest.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF THE DIOCESAN COMMITTEE FOR 1928

The year 1928 has been noteworthy in the Diocesan Committee by the definite aim of being a social service committee.

January the work of the Home for the Aged was brought before us by Mrs. Knowles; also at that meeting donations from the floor of \$125.00 helped buy the organ for the French Church of St. Luke's, Bustleton.

Miss Canning came to us in February and told us of the needs of the City Mission and how we can help there.

In March we had Deaconess Adams, who told us of her work among the colored of Chester.

In April Mr. Greville Haslam gave us a thrilling account of our splendid Episcopal Academy, and showed why we should be financially interested in it.

In May Miss Edith Dallas told us how they care for their colored children from "their souls to their shoestrings" at the House of the Holy Child.

In October Mrs. Martin put forth a plan for bigger and better work. The aim is to have a real soc'al service committee with a Bureau of Information in the Church House.

Following this we had reports from the institutions who need helpers.

In November we learned what we could do to help Mrs. Jump in her prison work, and closed the year in December by hearing what our interest means to girls, in the Girls' Friendly Society and also in the Women's Trade Union League.

It is hard to imagine from this brief statement of meetings and speakers the real excitement and earnest effort that makes the meetings of the Diocesan Committee so well attended and a real working organization.

Annual Report—1927-1928

Sixty-seven volunteers, representing twenty-three Parishes, accomplished the work of the Supply Department during the winter of 1927-1928.

To the Mission Fields:

15,304 articles of new clothing, household supplies,
dispensary articles;
841 knitted articles;
19,167 surgical dressings;
At a value of \$17,029.79

To Diocesan Institutions:

5,089 articles of new clothing and household supplies;
616 knitted articles;
At a value of 5,614.19

This work required:

175 different patterns with a sample garment for each
pattern;

22,565 yards of material were used;
15,847 cut garments were assembled;
12,665 directions for making garments were typed;
22,332 notions enclosed in the assembled garments;
4,674 yards of ribbon, stickerei, lingerie tape, tape,
bobbin, elastic;
2,184 yards of bias were cut by hand;
2,256 yards of bias were purchased;

The women of the Diocese have done all the sewing and knitting for this large contribution to Missions.

The Convention of 1928 began a new triennium for the Woman's Auxiliary; and with 1929 there begins also a new triennium for the Supply Department. This brings a most important change of officers. Mrs. Theodore S. Paul is now Chairman, and the Supply Department is most fortunate in being able to go forward under her care and direction. Visit the Supply Department and thus help to maintain the close relationship between Department and Parish which has existed and which is so vital to the work of this Department.

In reviewing the past few years, the most important change in policy has been the effort or attempt of this Department to become, as far as is practicable, self-supporting. A careful study of the Treasurer's report will disclose the fact that this year this effort has, in a large measure, been successful. I want particularly to call attention to the item for expenses in the wool section, which shows clearly this particular side of the work has been, with small exception, entirely self-supporting. All expenses of salary having been paid by profit realized on very advantageous and careful purchases of wool.

The Shop has contributed its share to the support of the Department in addition to being a valuable aid to various missions in disposing of their industrial work. The greater the support of this sale of mission goods, the lighter the burden the Supply Department will be upon the budget of the Woman's Auxiliary.

The same is true of sales of wool and cut garments, the greater the volume of sales the less expense to the Auxiliary's budget. Parishes have the satisfaction of knowing that the purchase price of a cut garment includes the shipping of that garment to its destination, whether that be a Domestic or Foreign mission.

The work within the Department and in the Parishes has gone steadily forward. Within the Department, the continued assistance of the same volunteers covering the period of years since its inception is very remarkable and praiseworthy.

I ask your interested support of and thoughtful prayers for this side of the Church's mission, which is so peculiarly woman's work.

REPORT OF DIOCESAN EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY—1928

The Annual Report of the Educational Department is always rather stale news, for it concerns the study of the year past and gone, as unlike the other departments of the Woman's Auxiliary our year begins in June and ends in May. This, therefore, is the report of the year ending May, 1928.

We studied during that period a wonderful subject that must always be fresh and new and one we must always keep in mind,—“The Church and Her Mission.” We all found it stimulating and inspiring and I hope as a result are working harder than ever before to help the Church go into the world and carry the good news that “God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son that whosoever believeth on Him shall not perish but have everlasting Life.”

From September, 1927, until May, 1928, there were 40 parish classes with an enrollment of 721, led by 23 leaders, 4 of whom led for the first time. We were quite a representative group, three of our leaders being clergymen, one a Sister of St. Margaret's, and the rest of us just plain laywomen.

Your Educational Secretary led 2 Normal Classes at the Church House, with an enrollment of 38, one class in the Normal Study for Teaching Training, 3 parish classes during Lent, 8 one-day institutes of three sessions each with representatives present from 22 parishes. These days fill a real need, though by no means taking the place of regular Mission Study Classes, the attendance ranging from 20 to 100 women. I also led one class of two sessions which had an enrollment of 60 women, made four addresses on the Mission Study subject and eight on the Educational work of the Woman's Auxiliary, led a class on the Program of the National Council at the Normal School and one on the same subject at the Church Training and Deaconess House. In addition, I represented the Diocese at a meeting of Diocesan Educational Secretaries at Racine, Wisconsin, attended the Synod at Roanoke and planned for the Annual Educational Day. We aim to make this a day of real education which will send us back to our parish branches with renewed zeal and inspiration.

Our offering last year amounted to \$1,213.38. Of this \$49.25 was for Miss Cornwell-Legh's work among the Lepers in Japan, and \$10.00 for the Diocese of Southwestern Virginia. The balance, \$1,154.13, was for General Missions and applied on both Diocesan and Parish quotas.

I want to thank you for re-electing me for another term of three years and also for the very generous co-operation you gave me during my first term of office, and to assure you that it is a very real pleasure to be your Educational Secretary.

THE UNITED THANK OFFERING

The United Thank Offering of 1928 which was the final "in-gathering" of all the Offerings of the previous three years, was presented, with that of the whole Church, in the Cathedral of St. Peter and St. Paul, Mt. St. Alban, Washington, D. C., on October 11th. More than seven thousand women were present at the great Eucharistic Service, when into the golden alms-basin was poured a gift of over one million dollars.

The offering of the Diocese of Pennsylvania, which was \$94,305.55, was given in most loving memory of Amie Hampton Clark Hollingsworth, our beloved Diocesan Treasurer from 1919 to 1925, and who was called home, after a brief illness, on May 14, 1928. Mrs. Hollingsworth gave of her strength and great natural ability untiringly to the work of the Thank Offering, and it always seemed to be to her, truly a most "joyful service."

On the wall of that great Cathedral, still unfinished, is to be erected a large tablet, commemorating that glorious service, which was the first ever held there, and this will be done by the gifts of all the women of the Church.

Surely the Diocese of Pennsylvania will not be found wanting in contributions toward this record of a day to which so many of us will ever look back with happy thankfulness. The United Thank Offering, so different in spirit from all other "collections," has gone steadily onward and upward through fourteen Trienniums; never slipping behind, always progressing as more and more women learn of its purpose and usefulness, and delight to give of their prayers and of their substance to this service to God and the Church, which is so unique, so comprehensive, so blessed to those who give and those who receive.

We can in no better way show our appreciation of all she did than by carrying on for this coming Triennium the work she so loyally supported.
