ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
PENNSYLVANIA BRANCH
OF THE
WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE
NATIONAL COUNCIL

Greetings to you fellow members of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Pennsylvania.

What a happy year we have had together. It has been happy to your auxiliary officers, because we have felt the bond of Christian fellowship grow stronger, bringing us not only individually closer to each other, but nearer to Him whom we try, but so imperfectly, to serve. Growth has come within the parishes; former branches are showing renewed vigor and new branches have been formed, needing only guidance in their early stages of development. So there is not only greater activity in our Woman's Auxiliary, but spiritual growth in parish life.

When *every* parish is interested, and delegates and others come from all branches to attend the five Missionary meetings, the chairmen of the Indian, Domestic, Foreign, Colored and Diocesan Committees will have even finer reports to give each year than the splendid ones which I hope you will all carefully read in this Annual Report. I do not think the women of the Diocese quite realize what a remarkable group of leaders these chairmen are; they are outstanding figures in the Church in America. Your president never has to ask, except for her own gratification, what these five standing committees are planning, nor what the Supply Bureau is doing under its secretary, Mrs. Paul, who has Mrs. Norris Williams and Mrs. Coxe ever ready to support her; nor does your president have to spur on Mrs. Ingersoll with the United Thank Offering, which is growing splendidly; nor does she have to inquire what the Mission Study Classes are doing under Mrs. Hill—each officer works out her own problems, but in thorough accord with all other departments. I can hear Mrs. Hill reproving me for not saying that she always consults her "superior officer," for she does so most loyally, but there is only commendation for what she has planned.

This year several new committees have been formed and are making fine progress. Mrs. Charles Biddle, the chairman of the Committee for the Isolated, has combined with it the interest of the Shut-Ins and the plans for the Intercessors.

Mrs. Biddle has given devoted service, first in securing the leaders for the sections of the Diocese, and then through these leaders reaching out in all directions to those in any way cut off from the Church's ministrations. This committee's special interest is intercessory prayer, something which can be given especially by the lonely and shut-ins, but in which all should take part, even the most hurriedly active. Mrs. Biddle still needs workers and also the names of those who are deprived, for any cause, of meeting with others in Church worship and service.

Another committee has been studying for some time how to reach younger women, not only because the Woman's Auxiliary greatly needs them, but because they sorely need what the Auxiliary has to give, knowledge, inspiration and spiritual growth through service. We have been most happy in having Miss Sallie C. Deane, of Richmond, come to help us. The results are not for this 1929 Annual Report, they are still in the hand of God, and let us all most earnestly ask Him to shower upon us all, young and old, the great blessing of serving Him faithfully.

The National Auxiliary has recently especially recommended taking interest in Christian Social Service—this has long been carried on in one Diocese through our Diocesan Committee. Mrs. Willis Martin is at work on plans for greater service.

In 1929 our two special Auxiliary days were particularly happy. The All Day Missionary Meeting on February 20th was held at St. James' Church, when Bishop Darnwell gave a forceful statement of the needs not only of Idaho, but the whole developing central western part of our country. He also gave a very clear account of our Indian work. Rev. R. I. Johnson made a plea for the Colored Missions, especially stressing the need of the hospital in New Bern, which has now been chosen one of our advance work specials.

Bishop Overs presented the cause of Liberia, which was the Mission Study subject for the year.

The Annual Devotional Day was held at Old St. Peter's on October 29th. Those who attended that service have not forgotten the inspiration we received from Dean Chalmers, of Dallas, Texas. He brought vividly to us, privileged women, our responsibility to all the "weary, waiting world" which is still without Christ, and that unless our nation rises to its great responsibility it will be numbered with the great nations of the past of whom we sing in the Magnificat: "He hath put down

the mighty from their seat." "Responsibility" might well become this year's watchword from his address.

During the year some of your officers attended the Woman's Auxiliary meeting in Racine, Wis., and the summer conferences at Wellesley and Blue Mountain; in fact, your Educational Secretary attended these two conferences and led a Mission Study Class in a third conference. I am very glad that fifty-nine (59) members of our Auxiliary attended various conferences this last summer. In these days when we all feel the lack of religious instruction, a summer conference is a marvelous opportunity for gaining knowledge of those things needful for our soul's health. Please make an effort to attend one of the excellent summer conferences in 1930.

This last year the Corporate Gift of the Woman's Auxiliary has again surpassed its expectations. The goal was made \$50,000 for this year, and there has been received over \$60,000, of which our Diocese gave \$6,019.51. This means that the women of the Auxiliary have built the Church in Santo Domingo for \$25,000, have built the \$5,000 church for the Church negroes of Panama, have by their gift of \$10,000 completed the water supply for St. Michael's Mission for the Arapahó Indians in Wyoming, and have given \$10,000 to build the dormitory for Christ School, Arden, N. C. I hope many of you heard Mrs. Wetmore tell what the building of this dormitory means to her and to the school.

The officers of the National Council this December asked the Woman's Auxiliary to give the efforts which they had used so successfully for the Corporate Gift to the carrying forward of the Advance Work Program of the Church. This they consented to do with the approval of the National Council.

The money given through the Church's National Budget is used for the support of missions and for salaries. There is never enough money for new buildings, not even to replace worn out ones. The need has become so great for new buildings and better equipment for the missionaries whom we send into the hard places in the field, that the National Council has made definite plans for Advance Work for the Church. Each Diocese is to be asked to take specific objects from the prepared list and to aim to complete the amount needed by Epiphany 1931.

The National Council has asked the Woman's Auxiliary to co-operate in every way with the National Council in the promotion of the Advance Work Program.

Your Bishop and your Auxiliary president conferred with the treasurer of the National Council, Dr. Lewis B. Franklin, and the buildings selected for our Diocese, and which have been approved by our Diocesan Executive Board, are the Iolani School in the Hawaiian Islands and the New Bern Hospital for the negroes in Bishop Darst's Diocese of North Carolina. Our Diocese has also taken some smaller pieces of advance work which will be of interest to us all. You will hear much about these chosen advance work projects during the year through out Woman's Auxiliary News, and we look forward so thoroughly for your co-operation, not only in giving but in educating the rest of the Diocese, that we are sure that by God's enabling power, what has been undertaken for His sake will be accomplished. We also hope that by education and general interest in the Church's work our budget or share of the support of the Missions of the Church will be paid in full.

Last spring many of your officers and members worked diligently for St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo. In our Diocese there was no Diocesan campaign in behalf of this great work of Dr. Teusler. As members of the Woman's Auxiliary knew more than most others of the great value of St. Luke's, much of the responsibility of raising money rested on them. In their efforts they were most generously helped in time and money by a number of men, some of whom are not members of our Church. Over \$61,000 was contributed for St. Luke's from Philadelphia. The hospital is in course of construction; the great metal frame work now rises conspicuously over other buildings in Tokyo, as the work done in the hospital shines conspicuously above all other humanitarian work in Japan.

Great sorrow fell upon the American Church in October by the death of the beloved presiding bishop, Rt. Rev. John Gardiner Murray. His marvelous combination of statesmanship, wit, humility and love endeared him to all who were fortunate enough to know him. Bishop Murray was deeply interested in the Woman's Auxiliary and showed his interest in our Pennsylvania Branch by giving to us his inspiring photograph, which hangs in our office in the Church House. Though we shall ever cherish Bishop Murray's memory, we give our loyalty to our new presiding bishop, Rt. Rev. Charles P. Anderson, and try to bear in mind his message to us of putting "first things first."

Were it not for our little green folder, the Woman's Auxiliary News of the Diocese of Pennsylvania, which is sent each month to every parish president and to which so many members

of our Auxiliary subscribe, this report would have to be far longer; but through the News we can talk over many things, such as Rotation in office, which we commend to you; give information about the Advance Work Program as the plans develop, and give general information as to the plans of our Auxiliary. We hope also soon to have programs with suggestions for the younger groups, which groups we trust are developing for the strength of the Auxiliary and for the benefit of the younger women themselves.

The thoughts of many nations are, today, turned to the conference in London, and prayers are ascending for the peace of the world. At our convention in New Orleans, when the Woman's Auxiliary was troubled over the wording of a resolution against war, Bishop Brent gave to me his little book called "Understanding," formed of the addresses delivered that year in Stockholm, and from his address on "International Life" I quote the following, the prayer with which he concludes was written three centuries ago:

"No longer can a man be a private citizen concerned only with his own affairs. We have always known that all the world is kin. Now all the world is one neighborhood. Science has demonstrated that to be a fact which Christianity has ever taught. It is the superb duty and opportunity of the Churches to shed their timidity, their self-importance, their localism, and put on the seamless garment of brotherhood and unity according to the mind of Christ. To this end Christ commissioned His Church. So to God we pray

'Lord lift us out of private mindedness and give us public souls to work for Thy Kingdom, by daily creating that atmosphere of a happy temper and generous heart which alone can bring the Great Peace.'

Following is the report of the meetings and the work of the Indians' Hope for the past year:

In January we had a report from Deaconess Lillian Todd, who is carrying on alone the work among the Karok Indians, in Orleans, California. Deaconess Todd has been called one of the unsung heroines of our times by the California Committee on Indian Relief and her work characterized as the most valuable accomplished among California Indians. Orleans is the wildest and most isolated part of the Klamath River country, where bootlegging is at its worst. The Indians' Hope helped to found this work and build the church, paying the missionary's salary for several years. We also built there a fine little bungalow rectory. After the January business meeting the Annual Meeting was held.

In February Miss Mildred Alley, of the Church Training and Deaconess School, spoke to us of the work in North Dakota, where she had spent some time and where she has been working since her graduation.

In March and again in April Mrs. Robert Frazier addressed us in behalf of the new Hare Industrial School at Mission, South Dakota, which together with the Crow Creek Dormitory for girls has had the life blood drained from it, as Bishop Burleson says, by the cut in appropriations made by the National Council. In March the death was announced of a faithful delegate to the Indians' Hope, Mrs. Ernest H. Chase, of St. Mary's Church, West Philadelphia.

At the April meeting a very interesting summary of the work in Alaska was read from Bishop Rowe's Thirty-third Annual Report. Great approval was also expressed at President Hoover's appointment of Mr. Charles J. Rhoads as Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Mr. J. Henry Scattergood as Associate Commissioner.

In May Mr. Frazier spoke to us in behalf of the Hare School, and Mrs. Frazier gave us the results of her two months' work in the same cause. Miss Cady, of the Good Shepherd Mission, Fort Defiance, Arizona, also addressed us in May and told us that as the Government had taken over all the hospital work the Mission is now filling a great need as the first orphanage for the Indians.

Our September meeting was opened by a Corporate Communion in the chapel of the Church House. The Rev. Percy J. Brown, of All Saints' Church, Torresdale, was the celebrant and made an address, taking his text from the Apocrypha, II Esdras 9, 44: "And those thirty years I did nothing else day and night and every hour but make my prayer to the Highest," and said that the text was not to be taken literally, but what was meant was a life of prayer which should be the aim of all Christians. At the regular monthly meeting that followed we were surprised to learn that the Rev. Robert Frazier had been appointed Field Secretary to the National Council and will leave South Dakota. Mrs. George Woodward gave a short account at this meeting of her recent visit to St. Michael's Mission, Ethete, Wyoming.

The October meeting was devoted to regular business.

In November we had two speakers: Bishop Burleson, who gave a brief up-to-date summary of the work in South Dakota, and Bishop Cross, of the Missionary district of Spokane, who is hoping to begin work among the 5000 Yakima Indians in his district.

We have given this year to the first item on our budget, "Salaries in the Indian Field" (South Dakota), the largest sum we have ever given to it in any one year, namely, \$1,411.60. We close the year with every pledge paid, including our three "big specials," to one of which, The Hare Industrial School, we gave over twice the sum pledged. Our total expenditures for the year amounted to \$7,831.40.

We have received throughout the year many letters from our missionaries, letters which breathe self-sacrifice from beginning to end and which should certainly spur us at home, who have the easier task, to greater efforts in giving them our prayers and our interest as well as our money.

I ask the co-operation of the Parishes and the delegates to help make 1930 even more successful than 1929, as without growth no undertaking can live, and in no better way can we show our loyalty to Mrs. Newbold than by carrying on to greater achievement what she worked for so untiringly.

Our treasurer's report shows an increase in the contributions made to objects included in the quota, but a decrease for Specials, making the total slightly under that of last year.

We are truly thankful to the Parishes for that amount and to the unfailing interest and devotion of the delegates on whom depends so much in carrying to their Auxiliaries the inspiration and enthusiasm of the workers in the field.

It was most gratifying to be able to send to Bishop Cross \$1000 for his rectories, and \$500 for the water system at Easter School, Baguio, besides smaller sums for other Specials.

It is impossible not to feel an intense interest in all the varied kinds of work that are being done in this vast Domestic field and our only regret is that we cannot send something for the quota and a special as well to each and every one.

This year Alaska, Idaho, North Carolina, The Philippines, Porto Rico, Southwest Virginia, Spokane, Utah and Wyoming are included in our contributions.

Twenty-eight Parishes have increased their gifts toward the Quota and twelve gave the same amount as last year. We are glad to say that we have three new givers and three who have revived, while only four have lapsed, and these were small amounts.

The Foreign Committee has this year lost a former much-loved leader, Mrs. George F. Knorr, whose rare spirit and beauty of character endeared her to all, and whose missionary zeal led the Committee into wide fields of service. Mrs. Knorr served the Committee many years as chairman, and when, because of advancing years she felt it wise to relinquish this office, she was elected Honorary Chairman, but she always retained her lively interest in its work and attended the meetings when she could. Her influence will live on.

The Committee also records the death of Mrs. Alphonso C. Ireland, a faithful delegate for more than thirty years, and bears tribute to her interest and loyalty to the missionary cause as well as to her splendid service for the Foreign Committee.

In 1929 this Committee assumed a budget amounting to \$5,400.00, \$5,000.00 for the Quota, and two Specials amounting to \$400.00, which were retained at Dr. John W. Wood's urgent plea and which are made up largely by individuals. The pledges are distributed in every part of the Foreign Field, and the amount given to each field is in proportion to the total amount of work in that field. They represent every kind of work,—evangelical, educational, and institutional. Each month a definite country claims our interest and support.

In the autumn we were behind in our pledges, but thanks to our delegates who carried the word to their parishes, we were able to close the year with all pledges paid, and in addition, had the pleasure of sending \$695.45 to the Diocese to be applied to the deficit in its quota for missions.

I know that you will read the treasurer's report to know just what work we are helping, so I shall tell you only of some things of interest that we learned from our speakers.

In January Miss Margaretta Ridgley spoke to us. More than twenty years ago she founded the House of Bethany, a girls school, at Cape Mount, in Liberia, with thirty-five girls. She is still there, think of it, and now has one hundred and thirty in the school and can't take any of the many others who want to go because she hasn't any room.

We had no meeting in February because it was the day of the All Day Missionary Meeting of the whole Auxiliary.

Bishop Tucker, formerly of Kyoto, came to us in March and reviewed the growth of the Church in Japan. He considers the spiritual development of the Japanese quite remarkable. The Church has appealed to all classes and has produced real Christian leaders. It has also made steady progress in assuming responsibility for its own support. Bishop Tucker said we must measure the success of Christian work by how much of Christ is found in the lives of the people.

In April, Dr. Harry Taylor, who had spent many years establishing St. James' Hospital at Anking, spoke. He told us that they had hoped to escape the ravages of the warring armies because of the isolation of Anking, which is situated two hundred miles up the river from Nanking, but they were not so fortunate. In 1927 he was ordered to leave by the United States Government, and the native staff of doctors and nurses were not able to prevent the looting of the Hospital and the other mission buildings by the soldiers. St. James had been the best equipped hospital in China; now it has nothing, but Dr. Taylor has gone back to begin all over again with the help of the native staff he has trained.

We heard some more about China in September from Deaconess Stewart, who also spoke of the dearth of new candidates for the mission field. One thousand vacancies exist on all boards for all fields! "Have the young people lost their vision of the world for Christ?" she asked.

With October came Bishop Carson, of Haiti. He told us when he went to Haiti seven years ago the material fabric of the Church was in a very disreputable condition, all of the forty Missions were shabby shacks. He has built a cathedral and a number of stone churches and reports great interest in the

Church. Haiti pays its quota. The people, though very poor, last year gave \$1,200.00 towards the work of the General Church, glad to have a share in the evangelization of the world.

In November the Rev. William R. Roberts, of Nanking, explained the Chinese political situation, and said the Church had its greatest opportunity in time of trouble, and that we must not make the mistake of doing nothing in this crisis. The Chinese Christians are loyal, and we must support them in every possible way, and hope that they can influence the Government.

Rev. Herbert A. Donovan stirred every one in December with his ringing plea for Liberia. He described the visit he had had from a tribal chief begging Mr. Donovan to send a God-man to teach his people. He had walked many days from the interior accompanied by two headmen and six favorite wives to present his plea. He told us, too, of a Church School at Cape Mount where, at the suggestion of a little girl, the pupils gave up one of their two meager meals a day during Lent and as a result sent \$162.25 to the National Council.

What do you think of the spirit of the Church abroad?

How about the Church at home?

The year 1929 was a good year for the Committee on Colored Missions.

We pledged ourselves to raise for the budget \$4,000.00. This amount was divided among nine schools of the American Church Institute for Negroes and eleven dioceses who ask for outside help for their work among the negroes. Because all these were "budget objects" the money contributed toward them counted on the diocesan and parish quotas. In addition to the \$4,000.00 we raised \$25,425, which was contributed to budget objects.

This work was possible because of the faithfulness and interest of the delegates from the Parishes. The attendance at the nine monthly meetings averaged sixty, and was better than in 1928. This improvement, we feel, was due in a large part to the efforts of the chairman, Mrs. Dillard. She wrote letters to each Parish Auxiliary president and visited eight of their Parishes, where she spoke at the Auxiliary meetings. That the improvement is continuing is shown by the good attendance at the first meeting of 1930, when seventy-four crowded into the room. Our meetings were interesting and often exciting, and well merited this fine attendance.

In January Mrs. Charles Biddle spoke to us of a recent visit she paid to St. Paul's School, Lawrenceville, Va., and told us of the splendid work being done there by Archdeacon Russell.

In February Archdeacon Baskerville told us of his work in South Carolina.

Our March meeting came in Lent and gave us the opportunity of hearing the Rev. Albert Lucas give an inspiring devotional address.

In April the Rev. John Logan, of our own Diocese, told us of St. Augustine's College at Raleigh, N. C., where he had been to a conference and where his son is studying.

May brought us Archdeacon Russell from St. Paul's, Lawrenceville, who told us of his own school, and gave us many interesting sidelights on the work of several of the other Institute Schools.

June was our most exciting meeting, for we waited long and late for the Rev. Warfield Hobbs, editor of the *Spirit of Missions*. He never arrived, owing to a broken-down car, but the Rev. E. C. Young, D. D., a visitor at the meeting, came to the rescue and spoke to us on the much-discussed subject of a separate negro episcopacy.

The Committee adjourned after the June meeting until October, when Bishop Bratton, of Mississippi, told us about the Okolona School, and the changing conditions in that section of the State.

In November the Rev. Warfield Hobbs redeemed himself and told us of his work as editor of the *Spirit of Missions*, and the negro episcopacy question. He also gave us some further interesting points on the situation at Okolona.

At the December meeting there was no speaker, as we felt it necessary to wind up our business for the year.

Besides these nine regular meetings a large special meeting was held by the invitation of Miss Sinkler at her house in February. Mr. Blanton, the principal of Fort Valley School, spoke to a large audience, and the Fort Valley Quartet sang negro spirituals. The meeting was successful in every way and Mr. Blanton received \$2,800.00 for his work.

The Committee also raised for special objects which do not count on the quota \$1,062.91.

The Committee's officers' names are at the head of the page. Don't hesitate to ask them anything that may seem puzzling in the workings of the Committee. Most important of all, don't forget that they are willing and anxious to come to your Parish Auxiliaries at any time and speak about the Church's work among the negroes.

Sixty-seven volunteers, representing twenty-three Parishes, accomplished the work of the Supply Department during the winter of 1928-1929.

To the Mission Fields:

13,882 articles of new clothing, household supplies, dispensary articles;
789 knitted articles;
21,501 surgical dressings;

This work required :

84 different patterns with a sample garment for each pattern ;
18,424 yards of material were used ;
11,356 cut garments were assembled ;
7,298 directions for making garments were typed ;
20,080 notions enclosed in the assembled garments ;
7,560 yards of ribbon, stickerei, lingerie tape, tape, bobbin, elastic ;
2,883 yards of bias were cut by hand ;
441 yards of bias were purchased.

All the sewing and knitting for this large contribution to Missions was done by the women of 128 Parishes.

You have heard the statistics of the work done by the Department in this Diocese during the year, and I want to bring to your attention part of a letter from the Department in New York. Last summer Mrs. Wade sent out a questionnaire concerning the "value of the missionary box in the life of the Church today." She had replies from nearly all the Dioceses, and the following quotation gives you the results :

"The concensus of opinion among the Bishops seems to be that, until such time as the salaries of the missionaries can be increased and the appropriations for missions more nearly cover their needs, the mission box should continue along the same lines as heretofore.

In almost every case the presidents of the Auxiliaries, in their replies, speak strongly of the value of the boxes to the women who send them. They mention, particularly, the great educational value of these boxes, and also state that they are a means of drawing the women together, especially in the rural communities, and in interesting them in the work of the Church."

With this assurance that the Church as a whole is back of the Supply Department, I do not hesitate to ask that you will help us more than ever before in prayer, in gifts, and in work.

REPORT OF DIOCESAN EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

1929

First, I want to thank you for your generous co-operation in making our 1930 Educational Day such a success. I am sure you agree with me that it was a day well spent and that as a result our Auxiliary work will show greater zeal, greater vision and greater devotion.

Some one said at the close of the day that it was our finest Educational Day, and I am sure many will agree with the statement.

Our leaders were women of rare gifts and brought to the task assigned them enthusiasm, which was so beautifully defined for us that day as "Christ in us," and real consecration. We shall never forget having had Mrs. Adams, of Pittsburgh; Miss Deane, of Richmond, and Mrs. Sibley, of Rochester, with us.

This report, may I remind you, is for work done from June 1928-May 1929, when we studied together "The New Africa" and found it to be a "Golden Land of Opportunity."

There were

- 47 Parish Classes with an enrollment of 702
- 2 Parish Institutes with an enrollment of 48
- 2 Pageants
- 2 Reading Circles
- 8 Lectures
- 5 Clergy used Africa as their subject for Week-Day Services
- 3 African Teas

Your Educational Secretary conducted 13 Parish Institutes with an enrollment of 507, representing 24 Parishes.

- 3 Parish Classes—enrollment of 85
- 2 Normal Classes—6 sessions each
- 1 Normal Class—10 sessions
- 1 Normal Class of 10 sessions on the "Program of the National Council"
- 1 Parish Class of 2 sessions on the Program.

And made 28 addresses either on the Mission Study subject or the work of the Auxiliary.

The offering of \$1,625.00 was for St. Mark's Hospital, Cape Mount, Liberia; \$50.00 was given for Miss Cornwall-Leighs work, and we completed our five-year pledge of \$200.00 per year for the Rev. Mr. Hoyas' work in Japan.

This year we are to study "The World Mission of Christianity," using as our text-book, "Roads to the City of God," by Basil Mathews, and I am hoping every Parish will plan to have the subject presented either in a Mission Study Class, an Institute, Program Meeting or Reading Circle.

I have one great worry about the work—new and more leaders. Most of you are willing to have me or another leader come to your Parish, but few feel the responsibility for sharing in the work. It would be so much more effective and interesting if you did. Won't you think seriously of it, remembering that the measure of your opportunity is the measure of your responsibility.

In conclusion, may I say I am at the Church House every Wednesday and will be glad to talk over your educational plan and problems with you. Our aim should be to increase in the knowledge of Christ and His Church so that we may be more worthy of the privilege of working with and for Him.
